1848 July 14

Was brought here this evening by two of the attendants from Coatsbridge. No difficulty was experienced in conveying him here, as he was perfectly aware when he was to be brought to and had made up his mind to it. Has been very intemperate for some time and for a few days before coming here has been noisy and destructive. On admission is very feverish. Pulse 120 full & soft. Skin is very hot, perspiring profusely. Eyes are considerably injected and have an anxious expression. Is very restless & uneasy. Hands are trembling & tongue which is much coated, is very tremulous when protruded. Bowels are confined.

Passed a sleepless and very uneasy night. Tremulosity continues. Eyes still much injected. Pulse 120. Skin very hot & perspiration profuse - Pills produced one scanty stool. Craves constantly for brandy which he says is the only thing to relieve his great uneasiness.

Pills produced copious evacuations with acknowledged relief. Tongue still much furred

Got out of bed this morning & feels much better. Appearance much improved. Slight tremulosity continues, though anxiety of expression has disappeared. Bowels have not been opened since yesterday morning.

Bowels have been freely moved. Feels much more comfortable and appearance is very much improved. Tremulousness nearly gone and gait more steady. Talks rationally and collectedly. Promises to give over his intemperate habits which he says were caused by circumstances and not by natural desire.

Has been out in the grounds and in the billiard room daily and was therefore dismissed at the wish of his relatives

In a state of great intoxication very noisy and disposed to be violent. Craving constantly for stimulants. Is much less stout than before; countenance haggard & expression wild. Is reported to have made no water for two days. Bladder seems to contain no urine. Perspiration profuse but free from unusual odor. Commenced drinking three days after being dismissed and since that time has continued almost constantly in a state of drunkenness.

Has quite recovered. Amuses himself with his fellow patients but worries the medical officers to discharge him, pleading his business and his engagements.

July 21

Has brought in from Camperie by two attendants this evening. Was brought without difficulty as he had agreed to come having formerly been in the house.

On admission was sent to bed as he felt cold and sleepy. Pulse small and feeble. Tongue and limbs tremulous. Talks hesitatingly but quite coherent. Forgets and has so much difficulty in recalling past events that he soon relinquishes the effort and becomes quiet.

1848 July 21

Was brought from Glasgow this evening, after a great deal of persuasion, for having been a patient before he was perfectly aware where he was to go to!

On admission, is in a state of intoxication and talks incoherently. Recognized Dr. Stacheson, pressed his hand, insisted he should not leave him and entreated for brandy. Face much flushed; skin hot. Complains much of headache. There is no tremulousness. Pulse 100, rather small.

. 22 Slept none. This morning had another glass of brandy. Face still flushed & skin hot. Complains much of headache. Tongue coated & Bowels slow. Seems somewhat inclined to go to sleep.

. 23 Slept well; Bowels have acted freely and today feels much better. Pulse more natural. Heat of skin and flushing of face have disappeared. Tongue cleaner.

. 28 This morning disappeared & though sent after could not be found.

Augt 1 Was sent after on three different occasions but no trace of him could be had till today when his brother-in-law sent out a letter which he had received from him in London. Letter was perfectly well written and stated that he left Gartnavel because he felt his liberty too much controlled. After reading the letter and reflecting over the case the Physician dismissed him

- Augt 15 Was brought here today by two of his friends in a state of intoxication. Took the medical officer by the hand and said he had come of his own accord and insisted he should promise not to detain him too long. Was very affectionate and caressed all around him; hesitated much about coming in and frequently insisted on our not detaining him altogether. On being allowed allowed himself to be taken to this room and put to bed. Talks with hesitation. Face much flushed. Tongue very foul. Complains much of headache.

- 21 Slept little but to day feels and looks much better.

Began to dissipate almost immediately after dismissal, and tonight came here of his own accord in a state of great intoxication. Retired quietly to bed.

Henry Freelaud Oct. 32

1848 July 22 Was brought here from Glasgow late this evening by the Physician Superintendent, and immediately retired to bed. Is very restless and noisy and much inclined to be merry. Is said to have been of very intemperate habits for some time past.

23 After a very restless and noisy night fell into a sleep of about an hour's duration this morning. On being asked how he feels, replies 'he never felt better in his life', that he is comfortable & happy. Laughs much and frequently jokes about his fellow patients in whose state he expresses himself much interested. Placed himself alongside of the medical officers when visiting the gallery & gave additional instructions to both patients and attendants.

Expression, that of great good humor. Frequently sings and whistles. Talks confidentially about his affairs which he says must immediately be looked after. Speaks of great sums of money owing him and of other sums which he is to be lent in order to commence business. Says, 'he is going into the counting house this afternoon' as it is impossible for business to go on without him. Bodily health appears infirm. Is very thin. Pulse 70. rather small. Tongue red. Bowels have not been opened since admission.

1848 July 24 Was brought here from Edinburgh this forenoon. Has a very indecisive expression & is very quiet and retiring. Totters much in his gait. Speaks hesitatingly and after much exertion of thought. General health seems indifferent. Appetite slight. Pulse feeble. Bowels habitually slow. Tongue slightly Coated.

Stat p.r.n Pil Purg;
To have regular exercise and amusement.

August 1 Has improved slightly since admission. Gait much steadier and general appearance better. Appetite excellent. Complains of nothing, at all times behaves well and seems perfectly contented.

15 Improves apace. Is considerably stouter since admission walks more decidedly and is much more active in all his movements. Expression more lively.

Contd.

Sept 1 Gait nearly natural, only rather slow. Is becoming stouter and stronger. Expression more intelligent. His relatives know him much improved.

Has had regular exercise & amusement. At the evening parties seems to enjoy himself but is too slow to keep time in dancing.

Contd.

Oct 1 Continues to improve both in flesh and strength. Motions more active and mental faculties are quicker. Is somewhat discontented at being kept here but is easily assuaged about its propriety.

Contd.

Nov 1 Is on the whole more active in his motions and steadier and more upright in his gait. Mental state does not seem much changed and expression is markedly indecisive. Very quiet and retiring though seems foolish being talked to. Health is considerably better since admission.

Contd.

Admitted July 24: 1848.

Nov: 16 Has been going on in the same way as at last report, and on the whole is considerably improved.

Today his wife came to me and insisted on doing so contrary to the advice of the physician. He was then dismissed.

John Kirkwood Aet: 24

1848 Aug 12 Was brought here this forenoon from Glasgow at his own desire and request. Has been very dissipated for about six months and states he had indulged in the vice of masturbation about two years but that for about three months he had given it up. Says he has great irritability of the genital organs & that he experiences sensations when asleep which invariably end in seminal emissions. Has had sexual inter-course but says it consisted merely of an emission without erection. The night before last had some kind of fit but from his description it does not appear whether it had been of an epileptic or of a syncopeal character. Suffers from great debility, coldness & clamminess of surface, more particularly of extremities, oflassitude and depression. Is slightly robust in appearance but is flabby and pallid. Pulse of average rapidity but weak. Tongue is slightly furred. Bowels have been very irritable for some days.

Sept 1 Has improved somewhat in appearance since admission and states that he feels upon the whole more comfortable. Complained of the bitter infusion after a few days and thought it produced diarrhea. It was stopped and the following pills substituted

Felt decidedly better after taking the pills, though bowels have still continued rather loose. Nocturnal emissions continue frequent as before and the same cold clammy state of hands & feet is felt as much as ever.

Sept 15 Considerably improved in appearance and feels decidedly better since admission. Complains of an almost total want of feeling over sacrum and of a too pale state of bowels. Seminal emissions almost as frequent during the night as ever. says that opium powerfully had the effect of diminishing their frequency. Cannot bring up his courage to the pitch requisite for taking the shower bath in the morning but thinks he could do so if he had a cup of hot cocoa immediately after getting out of bed.

20 Says he feels much better after the cocoa and that it invigorates him during the remainder of the day. States that he has had no emission from the urethra since commencing the opium. Has been applying the douche to spine with benefit.

Oct 1 Feels himself steadily improving though slowly. Complains of slight diarrhea and of great debility amounting to prostration after every stool. Seminal emissions are now rare. Feeling of coldness & numbness at lower part of spine continues.

18 Wishes to give up the Tonic pills as he thinks they may have something to do with the diarrhea, which continues. On the whole feels more comfortable, though the clammy state of hands and feet is very disagreeable.

- 18 Aug 16 Was brought here about midday and shortly after retired to bed. Had attempted suicide by cutting his throat the day previous. Wound was seen and dressed by a medical man who stated that it was not serious. On admission, seems very feeble. Pulse 100. Small. Face has an anxious vacant expression. Tongue very much furred. Is somewhat emaciated. No organic disease can be detected. Talks with hesitation about religious matters. Says his soul has been lost by his not obeying a Divine command to dedicate himself to God.

17 Slept none and was very restless. Made several attempts to tear off the dressings about his neck. Looks somewhat sunk and talks incoherently. Bowels have never acted. Tongue much furred & dry. Pulse 120 feeble.

- 18 Yesterday afternoon the wound was dressed. It is slight and has healed, only a few drops of pus being seen on the bandage. Spent a very restless and sleepless night. Bowels acted freely after the enema. Today is more sunk. Pulse 120 feeble. Face wears an anxious and typhoid expression. Speaks none. Surface rather cold, especially limbs.

To have beef tea frequently and heat applied to surface.
- 19 The medical man who had been patient previous to admission called today and on being asked said that but little blood had been lost. Feocrich symptoms had appeared previous to admission. Slept none during the night and made frequent attempts to tear off the dressings about neck. Several times tore at the scrotum with his fingers. Is much sunk. Pulse 120 feeble. Surface cold. Face anxious and typhoid. Slight jaundice - no eruption of any kind on skin.

Occasionally mutters incoherent sentences, but does not reply when spoken, and does not seem to comprehend what is addressed to him.

Bowels have not acted since the 17th.

1848 Aug 24 Was brought here this morning by two of the attendants who had been with him during the previous evening. His admission was unable to walk without assistance looked depressed. Pulse 100 very feeble. Stuttered much when speaking. Talked about being the wrong person having been mistaken for another man.

Wine & beef tea were ordered for him but he was unable to take them himself and when given them seemed to have great difficulty in swallowing and was very anxious not to do so.

Is much emaciated. Tongue purred.

Stat indies 1 mi Xerici all 3rd
25 Slept somewhat last night & today seems rather stronger. Had to be fed this morning and seemed the same disinclination to swallow. Tried to walk about the gallery but tottered so much that the attendant made him sit down.

Has constant tremulousness. Hands cold and face slightly livid. Pulse still very feeble. Prolongation in speaking continues. Delusions the same. Bowels have not acted since admission.

Stat Pil Purg 1j

Yesterday evening refused to take food altogether and made considerable efforts against it. This morning having refused breakfast, a tube was passed down into his stomach and a pint of strong beef tea with two dashes of Sherry injected.

Still tottering and feeble. Pulse 100 small. Bowels acted poorly in a repetition of the purgative medicine. Contd.

31 Last night got highly excited and broke one of the window panes.

When seen by the medical officer was sitting quietly on a sofa and seemed in his ordinary state. For the last three days has taken his food when given him by the attendant but this morning having again refused, was fed in the usual manner. Is very feeble. Pulse 100. Inves eat. Contd

Yesterday evening got again highly excited and made efforts to get out of bed but was unable to do so. When seen had a slightly excited look but was much sunk and with rapidity of breathing. Hands & feet very cold; Face slightly livid. Pulse 100. feebly. Refuses everything and speaks now.

Tube was passed down into his stomach and wine beef tea injected

Has gradually become more sunk and is now moribund.

Scalp firmly adhered to calvarium and dura mater internally with difficulty detached. Veins & sinuses presented no abnormal appearance, and on brain being dissected no appearance different from natural could be detected.

Lungs presented towards their apices a few concrete particles of an earthy matter but no tubercles. Heart normal.

A few milia in the mesentery but no abnormal appearances were seen in any of the abdominal viscera M.

Matthew Smellie Oct: 33

18/18 Augs Was brought here this morning from Campsie by his relations.

Is said to have been of very intemperate habits and to have been very violent for several days. At present tongue and limbs are very tremulous; Expression stupid. Gait tottering. Is much disposed to amuse himself by running about and laughing. Says that the school is missing and that he must run and hide himself from the children. Repeatedly calls on persons by name fancying they stand before him.

Pulse ordinary rapidity rather feeble. Tongue loaded
Stat Stat Spirit Hordei 3ij

26 Slept worse during the night and today is very restless. Optical delusions are constant, but they seem to amuse him. Tremulousness continues. Bowels have not acted since admission.

27 Is somewhat sunk today but has been quieter. Slept some during the night and talks more rationally. Optical delusions continue but now he does not cry out at them nor speak of them unless questioned. Tremulousness diminished - Bowels acted after purgative medicine.

28 Today is much better. Speaks rationally says that delusions have now gone. Slept well today feels a returning appetite. Gave the history of the past few months and confessed to having been very intemperate. Bowels are regular and functions becoming natural.

Sept 1 Had been walking about and amusing himself. Tremulousness quite gone. Behaves well. Appetite good. Says he is comfortable and happy

Nov 30 Is helpless as a child but beyond the attention which this state requires gives no trouble. Walks out daily. Takes almost no notice of any one. Gait is still uncertain and feeble. Contd

Dec 31 Much as at last report. Eats and sleeps well. Walks about the gallery when the weather does not permit of going out and seems quite contented. Contd

1849 Jan 31 Paralysis does not make any progress. Mental state is unchanged. Requires the same attention as a child. Contd.

Feb 28 Health habits and manner continue precisely the same as at last report. Contd.

March 31 Has an occasional walk among the grounds but is unable to go far. Always walks slowly and with a very uncertain step. Health, both bodily and mental continues much as at last report. Contd.

April 30 Walks out regularly in the airing court and occasionally in the grounds. Never occupies himself in any other way and never speaks save when addressed. Stain only in monosyllables. General health keeps stationary Contd.

Robert Penney Oct: 41

1848 Aug 28 Today arrived here from Canada under the escort of two attendants who had been sent for him.

Is very restless and excitable. Runs about from place to place pulls at his clothes and hair. Expression unbecile and somewhat vacant. Says that his soul is lost for ever; that the devil has possession of it and that he controls all his actions. Seldom talks long continuously on one subject and when speaking is very restless, though sometimes he catches hold of the person to whom he speaks and is with difficulty detached. 30 Continues very sulky and domineering takes the slightest notice of the Physician even when addressed. Pursues his studies and writes a great deal. Never makes any complaint even to the attendant but is not looking well. Face is thin and pallid. Expression is anxious and wild. Takes his food well. Remains quiet during the night but attendant says he does not sleep well. Bowels are regular. Contd

Admitted September 7, 1849

- 1849 Oct 11 Broke out in very abusive language against the Physician this morning; looked much excited and occasionally seemed as if about to strike. Demanded a dentist to perform some operation on his teeth but would not explain what was wrong with them, saying he had no confidence in any one here. Contd.
- 12 Saw a dentist today. Manner and habits continues before.
- 31 Has not spoken to the medical officers since last report. Continues to read and write much; studies are wholly of a scriptural character. Conducts himself very well and gives but little trouble. Is rather reserved to his fellow patients and frequently walks about in an abstracted manner. Contd.
- Nov 30 No change has taken place on manner, appearance or habits since last report. Continues his biblical studies. Bodily health seems much the same as before reported. Contd.

Walked about, the shoulders thrown back, the head erect and the step picked & demonstrative, and was heard uttering some such sentences as "If a man does not think like other people, put him in prison; look in on your victim every day and see how he stands it; If a day or two does not do try a month or two and if that is insufficient try a year or two - Bearing this language has a prejudicial effect on his fellow patients Place him in seclusion

1849

Sept 16 Was brought to the Asylum this evening by his relatives.

Is in a state of great excitement singing and shouting out in a low tone of voice. Is in good humor with every one, is much elated & inclined to amuse himself.

Talks in a most incoherent manner about sheep, relations and religion. Calls those about him by some name and when asked a question generally acts it back again instead of replying. Instead of allowing his pulse to be felt or showing his tongue insists on feeling the pulses and seeing the tongues of those about him.

General health seems to have been pretty good. Eyes are clear. Scalp and skin generally are cool.

17 Was very noisy during the entire night and slept none.

Sheriff Wilson Esq, Glasgow
Dear Sheriff

Allow me to turn your attention and to inform you of the case I have by your authority been placed here to the undoubted injury of my character and future prospects and I would sincerely hope and confidently trust after patiently hearing the following particulars that you will exercise that power & please which has all along marked your public career. No doubt my dear Sheriff you will not credit the following statement but allow me to inform you that the below named individuals Sam sorry to confess are my pretended guardians yet in truth they are my most hardened enemies - At the same time the following particulars are truth and nothing but the truth as I swear to God.

Particulars

I am the son of James Hunter Writer Dundee as you are aware. About three months ago I wrote to Mess^{rs} Wright, Sons & Wright - Hop Merchants and General Commission Agents Edinburgh - to the effect that I should feel very much obliged to them if they would take the trouble of getting me a situation either in an Advocates, Solicitors, or H. G. Office in Edinburgh or elsewhere as I am determined to study and appear in public as an advocate. I received no answer to my letter - I formerly lived with my uncle Thomas Ken Hawkhill Brewery and agreed to leave him for a short period - I had a written agreement that I would receive a certain sum per year under a penalty of ten pounds etc which was to be paid by the party failing to implement said contract to the party willing over and above to perform said agreement - For some reason unknown to me I suppose unknown to himself he said he would have nothing to do with me.

I said stay well but told him I

"found and would hold him liable for such strange conduct as the written agreement had been before signed - I have as yet rec'd nothing and I suppose never will unless some professional Gentleman forces him to pay it which he could not do as I suppose it has long since been burned. I refer to the written engagement. X

After I had waited an answer for three or four days from Messrs Wright sons & I might instead writing me a letter they came over to see me - I was delivered up to Uncle James and kept in his house and prevented seeing them - I slept in a sofa that night - Next morning the morning which said Gentleman came over to see me he 'Uncle James' ill used me calling me a 'Damned Fool' and my friends 'Damned Rascals' people whose character are well known and long established in Edinburgh -

About 5 O'Clock that evening Mr Wright held up while passing the window which I was looking out at a number of letters being applications stating what I should receive and the terms in being answers to my letters requesting a situation which I wrote to the Messrs Wrights and which letters they had received after making enquiry in Edinburgh if such a situation could be obtained & at that very moment when I should have received my letters Uncle James came & pulled me forcibly from the window by the ears and of course resistance was useless -

I was so vexed at not receiving my letters and of him thus calling my friends who had come over to see me that I determined it should not pass - James my Brother took me with him seeing that I was so ill used - No, Uncle James, soon followed us to Miles Buildings and I irritated him a little by saying he was a feckless cadger or he would never keep any persons letters from them he instantly rose up and said 'Good Night' and instead of going home when he got every person out of the parlour he rushed in struck me with his fist on the head gripped me by the ears and attempted to choke me I wrestled and got away and cried 'Witnesses in this case of assault step forward'

I wrote a letter to Duncan McNeil to raise an action against James Kerr and got 5 persons to sign said letter but instead of sending the letter to the Post Office

My brother James Hunter ^{Junior} Sust. coupled
with Jane Kerr my Aunt and Elizabeth
Hunter my sister got upon me & dragged
me down the passage, threw me into a
bed and after having disabled me to be

He is naturally of a cheerful disposition, and obliging and gentlemanly in his conduct - The cause of his depression is supposed to have been the loss of his daughter.

About a month before his admission into the Asylum, an attendant was sent to accompany him to the coast - At that time the attendant wrote that he was in a state of extreme depression - States himself as coming here that he then thought that the attendant was the Devil. He was in a state of great alarm & apprehension & supposed that he saw all the houses rising up before him.

Having recovered considerably, he returned home, where he soon again fell into his former depressed state in consequence of which he was brought to the Asylum.

He is very melancholy & despondent. Thinks that his affairs have fallen into a state of confusion and that he has lost all his property. His bowels are rather costive, for which he has laxatives from time to time.

May 3.

Twenty two hours after death present; Dr J. M. Paget, J. Couper, Alex' Mackintosh, T. Brown & W. W. Sh.

Body much emaciated. Large bone over Sacrum and right ischium, the inner side of right knee and outer side of left knee.

Brain. On removing the calvarium the left parietal bone was found considerably thinner than the right, no unusual adhesions of dura mater, and no unusual congestion of vessels. Under the dura mater at least four pounds of clear serum was found. The longitudinal sinus for about one third of its extent near the middle was rough on its inner surface, and contained a yellowish deposit of about the consistency of thick jelly. The base of the skull under the right middle lobe of the cerebrum was rough, cribiform, and easily perforated over a surface of about the size of a sixpence.

The grey matter of the cerebrum was rather paler than usual, and the white matter especially directly above the latter matter, was of a firmer consistency than usual.

The ventricles contained an ounce and a half of colourless serum. The foramen of Monro was more than twice as large as usual.

The thalamus opticus and corpora quadrigemina were natural except that the grey matter was paler than usual.

Cerebellum natural except that the grey matter was rather paler than usual.

Chest - Lungs quite healthy and show no adhesion of pleurae. No morbid state of heart or pericardium.

Abdomen - Liver, spleen and kidneys quite natural, and no morbid state of stomach or bowels observed. Bladder nearly empty.

Sacrum and right ischium ulceratively affected with caries. Os coccygis carious and detached in pieces from the sacrum. Sore on the right knee penetrating into the joint.






