After a residence of about eleven months in the asylum she was discharged & continued to live about a week ago. She is unmarried & a dressmaker. While well she wrought regularly at her business. At about five weeks ago, when she left her situation became one of her fellowworkers had twisted her with having been previously insane. After this though somewhat depressed she went out to make dresses in the houses of those who might require her services, & continued to do so till about a week ago when she became so unsettled & restless as to require the watchful. Her grandfather was insane & her mother is at present a patient here.

On admission she is much excited & very restless, running about, dancing, laughing & singing, & talking incoherently. She recognised some of the attendants whom she saw in the reception room but made mistakes regarding others of them. She has not slept or rested for five nights, her bowels are constipated immediately

There was no written history obtained of the patient's case. The person who accompanied her stated that she had been admitted into the Taun Hospital two or three days ago but knew nothing further regarding her. On admission she seemed anxious, uneasy & afraid; no satisfactory answer was given, apparently because she could not comprehend the questions asked. Her pulse was feeble, but steady & of normal frequency; she is thin & weak.

15th Feb No change since admission; she is fidgety in her habits, wetting & soiling her bedding during the night & also her clothing during the day. Her memory is apparently almost entirely gone & she is in a state of great mental & also corporal torpidity.

1st March There is a slight improvement observable in her general health & she is a little more cleanly in her habits. In addition to the ordinary diet of the house she has had a coldp & a pint of beef tea daily.

30th March Continues to improve in bodily health - more lively & also more cleanly in her habits.

15th April Scarcely any change observable since last report.

1st May Has been suffering for a day or two from bowel complaint. Is using grey powder with Opium & Sallet acid. Has milk diet.

No cause can be assigned for her illness.

She is thin & pale, but is apparently free from any serious bodily disease. She is restless & uneasy. Answer questions about her previous history readily & correctly, but is too silent upon the subject of her present illness & all relating to it.

In the summer or autumn of last year she occasionally saw a young man - a student of divinity - who was on a visit to some friends in the island, and fell deeply in love with him. It does not appear that he ever paid her any attention, & nothing was observed in his conduct which could give occasion to her passion for him. For two or three months past she has been restless & unsettled, wandering about & running from house to house. She talks frequently of McWhirter - the person she is in love with & says she is married to him. About two years ago she conceived a similar groundless passion for another individual, but quickly got rid of it without having been put in confinement.

She seems in the enjoyment of good bodily health; is reserved, abrupt & hasty in her answers & cannot be engaged in conversation.

One of the assistants of the inspector of the poor of the City Parish brought this woman this afternoon from the Bridewell or North prison where she had been in close confinement for several months past. There was no untrustworthy of her case procured.

March 12 When seen during the ordinary visit this morning she was quiet & apparently in good bodily health. Said she had been brought from prison but would not tell what was the cause of her imprisonment. Feared that the forenoon of the prison was fond of her & that because of this the matron & doctor's nurse were jealous of her & to be revenged on her put poison very often in her food. Her sleep too at night she said was sometimes disturbed by these women, attempting to compel her to take a sickly child which they brought her. Said that she had had three children, but that they were all of them dead. Complained of slight headache - bowed loins. To have a dose of Castor oil.

13 Irrituous swellings on both sides of her neck. To use incisions of Iodide of Potassium ointment & to have Cool liver oil twice or three daily.

15 The following information in writing was obtained from Dr. David Gibson the medical officer of the prison. This is to the best of his knowledge patients first attack & commenced in the middle of December last. She is intemperate vicious in every sense of the word, haughty, & dangerous to all in charge of her. He supposes that frequent & most constant improvements for many years past are the cause of her mental disorder. She believes that all her food is poisoned; that every one who comes near her is her enemy & is in league with the devil for her ruin & destruction. She is frequently destructive & has at times struck her warder, but has never exhibited any suicidal tendency. Nurses generally regular. She is of the scrofulous disposition & has used cool liver oil with benefit. A blister was applied to the head in consequence of her mental disorder.

When reached she was in rags & clothed in a dress of strong canvas. She was restless, talking wildly and incoherently, clapping her hands & manifesting great excitement. Very soon after admission & previous to her being put in confinement, she tore all most every article of dress which she wore into tatters.

11th Continues much excited; is noisy, & utters nothing but the most abominably filthy language imaginable. To have a purgative of Comp^d Salop, calomel & Tartarized Anemone, as soon as possible & 3*gr* of Siccum of Opium at bed time.

No written history was obtained of this patient's case. She was brought from the Police Office by one of the assistant inspectors of the City parish. He stated that patient had last night attempted to commit suicide by leaping from the Custom house pier into the river. She was rescued immediately and taken to the police office where she was detained till the necessary arrangements could be made today for her removal here.

March 16 Is quiet, answers many questions readily & correctly. Was not at first inclined to be communicative, but afterwards stated that she had been a "gay lady" for about eight months. About a fortnight ago, a young man who was very fond of her and used to see her often, died, after a very short illness. Previously in contrasting her present with her former life she had experienced feelings of sorrow & remorse & these were greatly increased by the sudden shock which the sudden death of her friend occasioned. She soon became restless & uneasy & drank spirituous liquors to sleep. On Sabbath last the 12th inst she went out with another girl for a drive in an open phæton. During the drive her friend who had died a few days previously appeared then dived in white, and took a seat in the front of the carriage. Her companion did not see him. He entered into conversation with her & wished her to come with him. She refused to do so & thus put him into a great rage & while in a paroxysm underwent various changes of colour & threatened to kill her with a knife. The moment the carriage stopped & set her down, instead of entering the house last "Curly" who still followed her night & day, she ran off to speak to a priest. After leaving him she went into chapel & though she did not see her friend she heard him storming & making great noises about the roof. On leaving the Chapel she went to the house where she lodged to leave some articles of dress which belonged to the mistress of the house. She was not allowed to go out again & does not think she took any spirit that night. In the course of Monday she had two glasses of wine & a evening set in she got out to go to chapel. On entering it she approached the altar & there saw the Saviour & the Blessed Virgin both of whom engaged in conversation with her. They promised to take

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her to heaven that night at twelve o'clock
she told her to drown herself as she must
first die before getting there. She then
left the chapel & wandered about till

No written history was received of this patient's case. She has on several previous occasions been an inmate of this institution & was last dismissed about a year ago. For some months after dismissal she seemed well, but in the beginning of the winter shortly after the death of her mother she became melancholy & continued so for some time but ultimately got better. These changes were repeated at short intervals with varying intensity & duration, until about three months ago, since which date she has gradually been becoming worse.

She could not sit alone in the house without having the door open, nor lie in bed at night without having a light burning in the room - Sometimes she would sit at night to go out & wander about if not prohibited; & one night lately she wandered from her own residence in Stockwell St to Putney. She was in constant fear she said, everything had a dismal aspect & seemed going wrong. Of late she has not infrequently indulged somewhat freely in the use of laudanum & whisky. These usually caused much drowsiness & she became noisy - would scold or strike her children or put them out of doors. Occasionally it appears from her speech she entertains delusive notions of wealth &c &c

Her countenance has a dull unhappy expression - pupils natural - conjunctive a little injected - tongue spined transversely - moist - thin brownish fur - pulse 116-soft - Skin hot but moist - bowels constipated - appetite much impaired - sleeps little - rest much disturbed. Complains of pain & a sense of heaviness in her head. To have $\frac{1}{2}$ oz of castor oil & of rucapay a similar dose in six hours after.

16 Bowels have been freely moved - relieved night better than usual - pulse 82 - fell headache continues - Appetite much To have a cold & beef tea daily.

Anne McDougall or McTytte 40

Patient was brought to the asylum tonight from Inverary, by a Sheriff's officer. She had been confined in jail for some time previously - was tried before the Sheriff, found to be insane & ordered to be confined in an asylum; she was admitted into this institution at the instance of Mr MacLullich procurator fiscal Inverary. Patient is a widow & has been insane since December last. Some time previously she had heard voices & this is supposed to be the cause of her present illness. She had on a former occasion been insane & was naturally of very changeable temper. "She imagines herself every thing" is always rich & doing much good. She attempted her life by a razor, was destructive to property & threatening & ~~desirous~~ to injure others.

On admission she was restless & gesticulatory. The ring finger of right hand was much swollen & of a dull livid hue. The second phalange was crooked obliquely on to anterior & radial aspects by an irregularly shaped wound of more than an inch in length. A probe introduced through the opening came in contact with bone & could be carried a short distance along under the integuments. Patient is thin & pale - pulse rapid & feeble.

June 21 Since admission has been very restless & talkative - is neither violent nor mischievous, but uncontrolled - running about from place to place. Talks much to herself but incoherently. Occasionally gives a relevant answer, but cannot be engaged in conversation. Apparently fancies she is some important personage but avoids saying who she is. The wound on her finger is now closing. Takes her food well - bowels regular.

30 Finger is now nearly well. Is generally excited, restless & talkative & is not usefully employed. In a petition which her brothers presented to the Parochial Board of the City of Glasgow praying to have her placed in this institution at the expense of the parish, it was stated "that the principal feature of her delusions is that she has been married to a Mr Crosby, Prince of Wales & that she has had children by him - that a conspiracy of persecutors have confined him & torment him & have also laid hold of the children & that the Rev Dr Anderson is the main agent in the conspiracy & employs men to abuse & defile her." The petition is accompanied by a note from Dr Anderson who says, "both myself & a number of the ^{elders} members of our church have for a long time been much annoyed by Agnes Nixon. Lately her mania has assumed such violence especially toward myself that unless measures are promptly taken..... I must apply to the police for protection. I may also state that previously to her aberrations, she was an industrious modest & altogether well behaved woman; although her language is now at times shockingly prof."

Always from her childhood even her temper was irritable & at times violent. Several of the relatives on her mother's side have been insane. She has a strong aversion to her sister - fancies she sees persons who are not present before her, & abhors them sometimes in very violent & abusive language. She has occasionally broken articles of furniture & was in the habit of taking articles out of the house to bestow in presents on the people living beside her. When she could get possession of any money she would give it away & then she was in the habit of calling upon - or put it into the collecting box at church on Sabbath, in larger sums than was quite agreeable to her friend Patient is single - was never confined in any asylum - nor has anything been done for her recovery.

On admission she seemed cheerful & happy - & apparently in the enjoyment of good bodily health. Came to pay a visit to some of her friends whom she expected to see here.

- July 5 In consequence of her imperfect knowledge of English she cannot enter into conversation. Her conduct since admission has been proper & marked by no unkindness. Hat 00 Shillin 3*s*

Agnes Watson or Dalfiel at 32

Patient was brought to the asylum this afternoon by the Inspector of Poor Cambusnethan & her brother. She, a needlewoman - married & the mother of two children aged respectively 11 & 8 years. The present is probably second attack & is of only ten days duration & so far as is known was not preceded by any bodily disorder, though she is not unaptly affected with headache & biliousness. Her previous

illness occurred eleven years ago, during her confinement & continued for about nine months, during all which period of time she was kept at home among her friends. None of her relatives has been known to be eccentric or insane. Incapable till her raving career has been assigned as the cause of her present attack. Naturally she is quiet, meek & affectionate in her disposition, but since she became ill she has been much excited - mischievous & attempted to strike & bite those near her, though she never attempted to injure herself. Is not known to harbour any particular delusion.

On admission she was well up & much excited. Tanned though she around her were distinguished personages ("Queen of heaven" prince of Wales etc) and addressed them as such. Talked one moment in a religious strain & the next of Byrons, a volume of whose writings she produced from her pocket. Wept, lamenting the loss of one of her boys who, she said had been murdered, & her own wickedness, & the next instant was laughing singing & dancing. Her arms and legs are marked by numerous abrasions & discolourations of the skin. Pupils somewhat dilated & sluggish. Pulse frequent & soft - Tongue foul.

July 22 Since admission has been excited & roared & has in consequence been in seclusion. Is clad in a canvas dress - Raves, utters & sings by turns. Bowls have been added on by progressive & she has had sprats to procure rest but with very painful effect.

July 31 Since last report has been principally in seclusion. Is still generally excited & when at liberty is restless & mischievous. Since the 25th has had a pint of porter daily & an allowance of beef soup. Has an opportunity to procure sleep

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Cat 32

Admitted 18th July 1854

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August 19 Patient has been gradually lapsing into a state of apathy & torpor & is becoming emaciated & feeble. She is listless & indifferent to what is happening around her & says little or no heed when she is spoken to. She is generally clad in a canvas dress & pays no attention to personal cleanliness. She is weak thin & pale. Is using cod liver oil & has but soup if she was omitted some time ago.

Sept 12 Had an attack of diarrhoea since last report, but is now better. Is feeble & much emaciated. Fluid feebly & torpid. Has cod liver oil, gruel & iron & beef tea

Sept 31 Continues much in the same state as at the date of last report. Is so feeble as to be occasionally in bed for a day or two or part of a day. Sept 12 Continues to improve. Is more lively & can walk with a quicker & a firmer step. Mind is still weak & slow, though it has obvious improved & the expression of her countenance is less vacant & stupid. Takes her food & sleeps well.

Sept 30 Since last report had a slight attack of diarrhoea which yielded readily to opium, aperients & a regulated diet. in either pleural cavity. The left ventricle of the heart was firm & contracted, the right soft & flaccid, & both cavities were empty. The stomach was displaced downwards & greatly distended, containing probably not less than 2*1/2* or 3 pounds weight of semi coagulated blood. The smaller intestine also contained blood in a similar condition & their peristoles in numerous places were discoloured by it. A large fragment of bone in triangular form & with sharp edges & angles was found firmly impacted in the oesophagus, a little below the point where it is crossed by the arch of the aorta. At the place of arrest, ulceration of its periosteum to a considerable extent had taken place & at a point corresponding with one of the angles of the impacted piece of bone all the layers of the oesophagus had been perforated. It is probable - or rather it is certain - that at this spot & by the same agency a similar opening had been effected in the walls of an adjacent blood-vessel (veina azygos?) though owing to the previous disturbance of parts, it was found impossible to determine from what source the fatal haemorrhage proceeded. Slight effusion into both lateral ventricles of brain - Subarachnoid effusion & the presence of a few small whitish patches on the membranes were the only abnormal conditions observed in the head. Janet Weir or Pelly 145

Brought her afternoon from Stockwell by the town hospital surgeon officer. She is a widow & supported herself by keeping lodgers. No written history of her care was obtained. Her brother who accompanied her, stated that more than 20 years ago, & after being disappropated in a love affair, she had become depressed & very melancholic & had continued so for six months. On the present occasion symptoms of mental alienation have been observed for more than a year, though it is only within the last few months that they have been very marked or constant. In her habit, she was temperate; as her friend thought - a little proud, & exceedingly religious. None of her relatives, & it is supposed were ever insane, but her father was an intemperate man; a sister also was addicted to the same vice & committed suicide by hanging. Patient has had four children the eldest of whom is 14 years of age & the youngest about 7 years. Her treatment at the hands of her brother in law is alleged as the cause of her illness, he having deprived her of a sum of money, & also caused the burial place of her husband & family to be opened in order to remove the bodies of some of his own relations and inter them in another burying ground. She imagines that she is favoured by visitors from heaven; that the Almighty speaks to her & warns of the plots which her enemies are contriving for her ruin; that the Rev'd B. & others are leagued together for the purpose of destroying her good name. One night she mistook the ticking of a clock, in the room below her own, for the voice of an angel & called thereon who lodged with her to hear it. She is neither violent, suicidal, nor destructive & was never before confined in any asylum.

On admission she was considerably excited; very eager to speak often wrong she had suffered or supposed her belief that she would get the better of those who had illused & depauperated her. Since acquiring this patient has been quiet & conducted herself with propriety. She is employed daily in the general work of the falling or with her needful apparel sleep & bowls material. Enters readily into conversation upon the subject of her delusions, which to her at least have all the reality pertaining to facts. Although on some

- April 30 Has excellent health. Menstruates regularly, but discharge is very scanty. Propensity now much more control over her actions tho' still occasionally gives way & indulges in her propensity for theft & falsehood.
- May 30 Has now almost perfect control over her actions - is lively & active & always usefully employed.
- June 11 Removed by her parents, who came with a note from the Inspector of Poor authorizing her removal.

Mrs Agnes Daly 30

This is patient's first attack which is of about three weeks duration. Her husband died five or six weeks ago of cholera & she herself is said to have had an attack of the same disease. She has three children the younger being about 4 months old. Her husband's death - her inability to meet one of his bills, which had become due & in indulgence & self in the use of spirits are thought to have been the cause or causes of her present illness. Talks frequently about cholera - says she can cure anyone & has attempted to cure some of her relations (who were in perfect health) by putting their hands in a basin of cold water & laying the water about their arms & sprinkling it over them. She is a Roman Catholic. She fancies she is rich, or ought to be, but that she has been wronged & deprived of her money. She has sometimes struck those around her & occasionally her broken glass.

Sept 17 Has been quiet since admission - speaks readily upon any of the topics referred to above but in a confused & rambling manner. Bowels constipated by foul Hab P Hhie 3rd Calomel gr 14.

30 A slight improvement is observable in patient's state. her temper is less irritable & she is at times usefully employed. For a few days the state of her breasts - full of milk - occasioned some little annoyance, but of a little attention they soon got well. Delusions persist. In speaking she manifests considerable antipathy to some of her relatives, & accuses them of having put her head wrong by some queer kind of snuff which they gave her.

Oct 31 During the past month patient has been making favourable progress toward recovery. She is less confused in mind & does not speak so profusely on the subjects of her delusions. Her bodily health is greatly better & she is now daily employed in the West House.

Nov 30 Continues to improve. No longer relapses in the delusive notions stated above. General health good - Asists in the West house. Strives to get home & her relatives are desirous that she should be permitted to go. Her mind however is not yet in such a settled state as to warrant her being discharged. Though she is still weak, vacillating & unable to form conclusions for herself.

Patient was brought to the asylum this afternoon by her husband, who gave the following information regarding her. She is 42 years of age & has 8 children the eldest of whom is 24 & the youngest six years of age. For about two years now she has had but indifferent health - frequently complaining & threatened with dropsy. A few months ago she fell into the hands of some quacks who told her her illness arose from "a stoppage of the circulation" of which however they kindly promised to cure her. Vapour baths & friction with salt & water after coming out of the bath were always the means employed for effecting this end, but unfortunately in this instance although they "salted" the patient they did not "cure" her; or rather perhaps it should be said although they "cured" her she did not recover. For two months aberration of intellect has been evident to her relatives. Occasionally she is excited, noisy, talkative & restless & at other times despaired. She appears to be becoming worse & lately attempted suicide by tying a napkin round her ~~neck~~ & attempting to get out at a window. She has also been known to secrete knives & other weapons under her bed, for the purpose it is supposed of impaling herself. She is neither vicious nor violent. No relatives of hers have been known to be insane & both her father & another lived temperately. The menses it is said appear regularly.

When seen in the reception room her countenance had an uneasy anxious & unhappy expression. She had been advised she said to come to consult the doctor about her case & at once took up a detail of all her past ~~sufferings~~ & present suffering which she narrated with an untroubled brow. She had an unending series of ailments - the blood would not circulate - it was stopped in the veins - the veins were full of steam & salt - the steam rose between the ~~fell~~ & the flesh & rained down & flew all over her & up to her head - the salt was in her veins & a small principle to which she pointed on her arm was the salt coming out. When told that with a view to her recovery she would be kept here for a time she cried like a child & begged to be allowed to go away.

Patient was brought this afternoon by the sergeant officer of the City Guard from the police office where she had been confined for two or three days. No other history of her case was obtained than that while in a state of incarceration, she had been taken to the police office & that while there she had so conducted herself as to induce the police official to have her removed hither.

It is not quite a year yet since she was discharged from the place & this now is the third time she has been admitted. When seen in the reception room she recognized some of the officials whom she had known during her previous residence & for a time took apart quite rationally in conversation. The expression of her countenance, however, & her manner were indicative of an irritated unsettled state of mind. At length she began to make complaints of the ill-treatment & abuse she had frequently been subjected especially by the police & said she knew well what she would suffer tonight when she went up stairs. When questioned upon this subject, she said that beasts & little birds would come & peck at her & make blue marks all over her body as they ^{had} often done before. Several times too she has felt she says something within her urging her to take away her own life. So pale & thin & in a feeble state of bodily health.

Nov^r 20 Since admission patient has been quiet & decorous in her manner & behaviour. She is obedient to the nurses, works when desired & has repeatedly been out in the laundry. When not employed she usually sits alone & is gloomy, sullen & taciturn. At times, too she seems irritable.

Dec^r 4 Continues in much the same state as last report. Cannot be engaged in conversation. To inquiries regarding her health etc. she utters monosyllables answers in an almost inaudible voice. Occasionally vomits her meals - Sensitive to Stomach - Mult. deb. Two days ago was removed from 111 to 118 but tonight begged that she might be allowed to go back to 111, as she could not sleep in 118. Little birds she said came & pecked at her & tormented her so that she felt strongly

Very soon after she was last dismissed (though at that time apparently sane) she began to manifest symptoms of insanity - became depressed & melancholy refused to go out, sat constantly in the room - was wakeful & restless during the night & threatened to kill her sister & afterwards destroy her own life. She was repeatedly examined by a medical practitioner with a view to her removal at once, but on each occasion she was so carefully guarded in her speech as to afford no tangible evidence of her insanity.

Her bodily health seems much improved since she was discharged - she is now thin & pale & has a feeble pulse. She is depressed & unhappy & in the course of a brief conversation repeatedly burst into tears. She did not know how I was, she said, but she thought she was not like any other person. Her nights she says are usually restless & she has frequent strange dreams. One night her mother (who died more than a year ago) came into bed beside her, but only remained for a very short time & did not speak to her. These appear regularly.

So far as they know she was never before insane & it is only within the last week that they have observed any mental aberration.

Apparently she was in good bodily health up to the accession of present attack, tho' she suffered from depression of spirits. They have no idea of what is a strong to the cause of her insanity. So far as known no relations of the patient have ever been insane. She has never manifested any suicidal tendency, nor has she been violent, nor destructive.

Her eyes become very irritable and troublesome. Let her go & will not assist the attendant nor to say Head of no. 1 opposite either independent. 
