

MR. JAMES EWING'S TRUST:—M.P. ACTION.

Referring to Messrs. Cowan & Dalmahey's circular of the 22nd October last explaining the proposed compromise for the settlement of this action, and to the subsequent Meeting of General Legatees and Annuitants held here on the 29th October, when the terms of settlement recommended for acceptance were approved of, we have now to inform you that at the request of agents of the parties to the Test Case, we have prepared a Scheme of Division showing what sum it is expected each General Legatee and Annuitant will receive under the compromise. We send you a copy of the Scheme, in order that you may see approximately how the compromise will work out. You will understand that the Scheme is to a considerable extent based on estimate, as the death duties exigible cannot be settled with the Inland Revenue nor the expenses definitely ascertained until the compromise has been sanctioned by the Court. The Scheme has the approval of the agents of the United Free Church of Scotland and of the Merchants' House of Glasgow, who are the parties most largely interested as General Legatees and Annuitants.

Counsel has advised that the concurrence of the General Legatees and Annuitants and holders of terminable annuities, as well as the residuary legatees, should be obtained to the Joint Minute which will now be presented to the Court on behalf of the beneficiaries, setting forth the terms of settlement, and craving the sanction of the Court to them. We annex a Form authorising Messrs. Cowan & Dalmahey to express your concurrence in the Joint Minute, and shall be glad if you will sign and return this to us within the next eight days.

ACTION OF MULTIPLEPOINDING.

Under reference to the Circular issued by us on 29th February, 1904, the Trustees have since settled the Death Duties as far as they are accountable for these, and have carried out the several matters which fell to be undertaken by them under the Court's Interlocutor of 5th February, 1904. In the adjustment and settlement of the Death Duties in particular, much trouble has been involved, and considerable time necessarily consumed.

The Trustees have now realized the whole of the Estate (with the exception of the real burden of £20,000, which only becomes payable in the event of the Estate of Strathleven being sold), and have lodged in process an Amended Condescence of the Fund *in medio*. They have also consigned the balance of the Fund in Bank on account of the Accountant of Court, and subject to the orders of the Court. For your information, we enclose a print of the Amended Condescence, and of the Appendix thereto—being an Abstract Scheme of Division; and a print of the Order of Court pronounced on 23rd inst., and of the detailed Schemes of Division to be lodged in compliance therewith.

No further step of procedure is competent until after the Court resumes its sittings in October: but, after the Amended Condescence has been approved of, the Trustees will ask for exoneration; and meantime we may remind you that it will devolve upon the various beneficiaries to lodge Claims in Process for the amounts payable to them respectively.

A further instalment of 2/- per £ on the legacies was paid on 28th April 1887 making in all 14/- per £. At the same time the Annuities were increased by a similar Amount.

All the securities forming the Capital of the Trust have been realized and the sum of £113,816.11.2d has been lodged with the Commercial Bank of Scotland on consignment Receipt conform to Certificate produced. The balance of cash due by the Factors amounts to £5.14. 5d.



VICTORIA, &c.—WHEREAS it is humbly meant and shewn to us by our lovites, THE GLASGOW ROYAL ASYLUM FOR LUNATICS, incorporated by Royal Charter,—*Pursuers*; against ELIZABETH MONTGOMERIE, residing at Moffat, and JAMES BROWN FLEMING, writer in Glasgow, as surviving trustees for, and as representing the Kelvinside Estate Company; THOMAS RUSSELL of Ascog, iron-founder in Glasgow; WILLIAM YOUNG, 1 West Bank, Hillhead, Glasgow; JAMES REID, No. 15 Montgomerie Crescent; Professor JOHN NICOL, LL.D., No. 14 Montgomerie Crescent; JOHN MOWAT, No. 13 Montgomerie Crescent, all of Kelvinside, Glasgow; the Reverend JOHN MIDDLETON WARD, the Rectory, Broomyard, Worcester; and THOMAS WILSON, Advocate, Aberdeen, the trustees of Mrs. HOBSON, wife of Richard Hobson, Postmaster-General, Glasgow; MARCUS ROBERT MENDELSSOHN, No. 11 Montgomerie Crescent aforesaid; ANDREW DOW DIXON, stockbroker, Glasgow, and HELEN DIXON, his wife, both residing at No. 10 Montgomerie Crescent aforesaid; and the said ANDREW DOW DIXON as curator and administrator-in-law of his said wife; WALTER DUNCAN, No. 9 Montgomerie Crescent aforesaid; GEORGE CRICHTON, ironfounder, Glasgow, and MARION CRICHTON, his wife, both residing at No. 8 Montgomerie Crescent aforesaid, and the said GEORGE CRICHTON as curator and administrator-in-law of his said wife; JAMES MORRISON of Asheraig, Kelvinside, Glasgow; Mrs. BALL, wife of Henry William Ball, residing at Averly, Kelvinside, Glasgow, and the said HENRY WILLIAM BALL, as curator and administrator-in-law of his said wife; Mrs. MACKIE, residing at Ravelston, Kelvinside, Glasgow; JAMES MARSHALL of Carlston, Kelvinside, Glasgow; ALEXANDER ERSKINE MURRAY of Sundown, Kelvinside, Glasgow; JAMES HISLOP of Darial, Kelvinside, Glasgow; JAMES M. In addition to the asylum and superintendent's residence, there is a farm-steading on the lands situated at the south-east boundary, close to the Hay Burn after-mentioned, where it leaves the said lands.

ANS. 1 for the Trustees of the Kelvinside Estate Company. Admitted that the pursuers are heritable proprietors of lands at Gartnavel, extending to about 68 acres, lying within the parish of Govan, royalty of Glasgow, and county of Lanark. Admitted that those lands were acquired in 1841, and that a large asylum for lunatics, with a house for the medical superintendent, has been erected on them. Admitted that there is a farm-steading on the lands at the point mentioned. *Quoad ultra* denied. The pursuers' property, although

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situated about a mile and a half outside the municipal boundary of Glasgow, is within a quarter of a mile of streets and rows of houses, which are continuously connected by streets with Glasgow, and which truly form part of Glasgow, being within the ordinary postal deliveries of Glasgow. The suburbs of Glasgow, which lie to the east, overlap on two sides (viz., the north and south) the property of the pursuers, while to the west it is enclosed by the Harbour branch of the North British Railway Company.

Ans. 1 for *Mrs. Ball and Others*. The present defenders adopt and refer to the defences given in for William Young and others, feuars in Montgomerie Crescent.

COND. 2. The stream or burn called the Hay Burn flows through the pursuers' said lands at two parts. It flows through the lands for about 87 yards at the north-east corner, and after flowing through the adjoining lands of Kelvinside on the east, it again enters and flows through the south-east corner of the pursuers' said lands for about 122 yards, as is shewn on the Ordnance Survey plan, herewith produced. Until recently the said burn was a pure and unpolluted stream. Its waters, in their course through the said lands of Gartnavel, were, until within a short time ago, clear and pure, and well fitted for all domestic pur-

poses, as also for watering cattle, and for such and all other necessary purposes and uses it afforded to the pursuers and their authors in the said lands a constant supply of fresh and unpolluted water.

Ans. 2 for the Trustees of the Kelvinside Estate Company.
The course of the burn is stated with substantial accuracy. *Quoad ultra* denied, and reference is made to the defenders' Statement of Facts.

Ans. 2 for Thomas Russell and Alexander Erskine Murray.
The course of the burn is stated with substantial accuracy. *Quoad ultra* denied, and reference is made to the defenders' Statement of Facts.

Ans. 2 for Mrs. Ball and Others. The present defenders are feuars from the defender Thomas Russell, of portions of the ground described in the third article of the Condescendence annexed to the Summons, as the 54,266 square yards, or thereby, of the estate of Kelvinside, situated on the north side of the Great Western Road, and no part of the ground feued by any of the present defenders, is contiguous to the Hay Burn, and none of them discharge sewage into that burn. They all discharge the sewage into drains or sewers provided for the purpose by their superior Mr. Russell, and by his authors, the Kelvinside Estate Company, both of whom are bound in a question with the present defenders to carry off the whole sewage and water coming from the lands and houses of the present defenders, who state the present defences without prejudice to and under reservation of all claims competent to them in the premises against both Mr. Russell and the Kelvinside Estate Company.

Conn. 3. The said lands and estate of Gartnavel adjoin the estate of Kelvinside, belonging to the defenders, the said Elizabeth Montgomerie and James Brown Fleming, as surviving trustees for the said Kelvinside Estate Company. A considerable portion of the Kelvinside estate has been feued off, and streets and terraces and self-contained dwelling-houses have been built thereon, and form that part of the west end of Glasgow known as Kelvinside, which lies outside and west of the boundaries of the burghs of Glasgow and Hillhead. In particular, Montgomerie Crescent, consisting of sixteen self-contained dwelling-houses, has been built upon a part of the said estate; and in 1873 the

defender, the said Thomas Russell, feued or bought from the then trustees of the said Kelvinside Estate Company, 54,266 square yards or thereby of their said estate, situated on the north side of the Great Western Road, and on a part thereof he has erected a self-contained dwelling-house, and on other parts which he has sub-feued, villas and other self-contained dwelling-houses have already been and are being erected.

Ans. 3 for the Trustees of the Kelvinside Estate Company. Admitted.

Ans. 3 for Thomas Russell and Alexander Erskine Murray. Admitted, with the explanation that the defender Mr. Erskine Murray is one of the feuars of the defender Mr. Russell.

Ans. 1, 2, and 3 for George Crichton and Spouse. Not known and not admitted.

COND. 4. Several of the dwelling-houses in Montgomerie Crescent, and all the villas and dwelling-houses erected upon the 54,266 square yards before referred to, as well as the farm-houses of North Balgray and the dungstead thereof, tenanted by Semple, and belonging to the said Kelvinside Estate Company, have pipes and drains, wrongfully constructed, for leading the sewage therefrom into the said Hay Burn, at points above the places where it enters the pursuers' said lands and estate of Gartnavel at the two parts before referred to. In particular, the defenders, the said William Young, James Reid, Professor John Nicol; the said John Mowat, and the said Reverend John Middleton Ward, and Thomas Wilson, as trustees of the said Mrs. Hobson; Marcus Robert Mendelssohn, Andrew Dow Dixon and Helen Dixon, Walter Duncan, George Crichton and Marion Crichton, James Morrison, Mrs. Ball, Mrs. Mackie, James Marshall, Thomas Russell, Alexander Erskine Murray, and James Hislop, respectively own or occupy dwelling-houses at Kelvinside aforesaid, the drainage from which is led into the said Hay Burn at points before it enters the pursuers' said lands and estate of Gartnavel at the two points before referred to, thereby polluting the water thereof and depriving the pursuers of its legitimate uses. Further, the defenders, the said James M Thomson, Hugh Morrison, and John Miller are each now building, or are about to build, as owners, a villa on parts of the said 54,266 square yards, the sewage from which it is

also wrongfully planned and designed shall flow into the said Hay Burn at a point before the said burn flows past or through the pursuers' said lands.

Ans. 4 for the Trustees of the Kelvinside Estate Company.

Admitted that the drainage of the houses mentioned as already finished is led into the Hay Burn, and that the houses here mentioned as not finished are designed to have their drainage led into the Hay Burn at points above the entry of the burn into the pursuers' lands below the defenders' lands. The existing houses have so drained into the burn for several years without any complaint or remonstrance from the pursuers. *Quoad ultra* denied.

Ans. 4 for Thomas Russell and Alexander Erskine Murray.

Believed to be true that the drainage from the houses of the present defenders, as well as that from the other houses mentioned, is conducted into the Hay Burn. *Quoad ultra* denied, and reference made to the defenders' Statement.

COND. 5. The sewage thus discharged into the Hay Burn above the pursuers' lands is a nuisance of recent date, and the arrangements of the defenders, the said Kelvinside Estate Company, and Thomas Russell, will certainly increase it and make it permanent, unless they are prohibited from being carried out. As it is, the sewage from the houses and others of the defenders, which is at present being led to the Hay Burn, renders the said burn polluted as it passes through pursuers' lands, and unfit for domestic use, or for cattle or other primary purposes, and the water is being brought into a state offensive as well as injurious and dangerous to the health of the inmates of the asylum, and injurious to the rights and interests of the pursuers. The said pollution is a nuisance to the pursuers.

Ans. 5 for Thomas Russell and Alexander Erskine Murray.

Denied, and reference made to the defenders' Statement.

COND. 6. The defenders, the proprietors before mentioned, have no right to lead the sewage and polluting drainage complained of, or any part thereof, into the said Hay Burn, nor to pollute the water thereof in any way whatever. The acts of each of the before-mentioned proprietors, as already accomplished or threatened in conducting house-drainage and sewage into the said Hay Burn, materially contribute to the pollution thereof, and as they

will so continue to contribute if they are not interdicted, the pursuers are compelled to raise the present action for the protection of their rights and interest in said burn.

Ans. 5 and 6 for the Trustees of the Kelvinside Estate Company. Denied. The pursuers and defenders recently met on the ground with the inspector of nuisances for the parish (viz., of Govan), and that official pronounced that there was no nuisance arising from said watercourse.

Ans. 6 for Thomas Russell and Alexander Erskine Murray. Denied.

Ans. 4, 5, and 6 for George Crichton and Spouse. Admitted that the present defenders occupy a dwelling-house in Montgomerie Crescent. Denied that it has pipes and drains wrongfully constructed for leading sewage therefrom into the Hay Burn, and explained that the drainage from their house No. 8 Montgomerie Crescent is not led into the Hay Burn, but is led in a totally opposite direction, and so as to fall into the river Kelvin.

Ans. for William Young and Others. The present defenders adopt the whole of the defences lodged for the defenders, the Trustees for the Kelvinside Estate Company, with the exception of article 7 of their Statement of Facts.

III.—STATEMENT OF FACTS FOR THE TRUSTEES OF THE KELVINSIDE ESTATE COMPANY.

STAT. 1. The defenders Miss Montgomerie and Mr. J. B. Fleming, as trustees for the Kelvinside Estate Company, are heritable proprietors of the lands and estate of Kelvinside, comprehending, *inter alia*, the lands of Gartnavel, South and North Balgray, Horselethill, and Kirklee, all lying in the parish of Govan and county of Lanark. Their predecessors in the lands acquired the same from John Marshall Moubray, Esq. of Hartwood, by disposition by him, with consent therein mentioned, in favour of Matthew Montgomerie, writer in Glasgow, James Beaumont Neilson, civil engineer there, and John Park Fleming, writer there, all now deceased, in trust as therein written, dated 18th and 19th December 1840, and these disponees were infeft in said

lands, in virtue of said disposition, conform to instrument of sasine in their favour, dated 22d, and recorded in the said General Register of Sasines 31st December 1840.

STAT. 2. The defenders the Kelvinside Estate Company have for upwards of forty years prior to the date of service, or of the signing of the Summons in the present action, been in the uninterrupted possession of the lands of Kelvinside, including the ground now occupied and possessed by all the other defenders, and during the whole of that period they have used the watercourse in question for conducting away the sewage from the dwelling-houses erected on their lands. They did so at a date earlier than the erection of the asylum, and prior to the acquisition by the asylum directors of ground for the purpose thereof, and they have done so ever since.

STAT. 3. The pursuers have, since their acquisition of the lands at Gartnavel, made the like use of the said watercourse. Where the burn first flows through the asylum grounds for about 87 yards the pursuers themselves pollute it by putting into it the drainage from the lodges and wash-houses thereat at their entrance gates. For many years after the erection of the asylum, and until recently, the whole sewage thereof was poured by the pursuers into the stream in question, and in regard to some of the dwelling-houses connected with the asylum is done still. Moreover, further down the said watercourse the whole sewage of the asylum is discharged into it by the pursuers. The pursuers materially contribute to any pollution of the water which at present exists.

STAT. 4. The water of the said burn or watercourse has not, within the prescriptive period, been fit or been used for drinking purposes, and for many years it has been unfit for any of the primary purposes. Besides the sewage conducted into it as aforesaid, it has been used by the Corporation of Glasgow, and the Police Commissioners of Partick, Hillhead, and Maryhill, for discharging the refuse of their gas-works. The pursuers have their supply of water for household purposes from Loch Katrine.

STAT. 5. The estate of the defenders has for about forty years been laid out as feuing ground, and the houses mentioned in the

Condensence have been erected on ground formerly occupied by the farms which drained into the said watercourse as aforesaid.

STAT. 6. For many years, from about 1854 onwards, the defenders, by their mineral tenants, Messrs. Robert Addie & Sons, worked the minerals in their lands on the line of this burn. There were ten pits in all open at the same time, but generally four or five going. The miners' houses at all these pits, except one, all drained down the Hay Burn. The defenders have now ceased to work the minerals, and all the miners' houses have been removed. The Hay Burn is therefore now less polluted from this source than it has been at any time during the last quarter of a century.

STAT. 7. The said pits having ceased to be worked, there has been a cessation of the large contribution of water therefrom, which had for some time flushed the said watercourse, and accordingly the said burn has been very much drier. Owing to this change, and also to the other alterations on the adjoining properties, the defenders have deemed it convenient for all concerned that some new system of drainage should be provided for the properties which previously had drained into the said burn. The defenders have been actively engaged, as is well known to the pursuers, in endeavouring to procure the co-operation of the several persons and bodies concerned, in making such arrangements for the permanent provision of sanitary arrangements for the district of Kelvinside as shall be most beneficial and convenient. Several schemes have been proposed, as for the formation of a separate police burgh of Kelvinside, or for the annexation of that district to one of the adjoining municipalities. The defenders have recently entered into negotiations for the annexation of the district to the police burgh of Partick, and a petition for such annexation at the instance of the Commissioners of that burgh is being prepared, and will be proceeded with. Under such burghal jurisdiction full provision would be made for the sanitary requirements of the houses presently draining into the burn now in question. The pursuers have been made aware of the progress of this application, and the present action is entirely unnecessary and embarrassing to the arrangements of the interests involved. Moreover, the defenders made other proposals for conducting the

drainage from the houses on their ground along the watercourse in closed pipes, which were reasonable and appropriate, at least as temporary arrangements.

IV.—STATEMENT OF FACTS FOR DEFENDERS, THOMAS RUSSELL
AND ALEXANDER ERSKINE MURRAY.

STAT. 1. The defender, Mr. Russell, is proprietor of the area of ground (extending to 54,266 square yards) mentioned in the Summons, having feued the same from the defenders, The Kelvin-side Estate Company, conform to feu-contract, dated 1st and 3d, and recorded in the Register of Sasines the 7th February, all in the year 1873. An extract of the said feu-contract is produced and referred to. The defender, Mr. Erskine Murray, has feued from the defender, Mr. Russell, a building-stance forming part of the said area, and has built a house on the said building-stance. The defender, Mr. Russell, has also himself built a house upon another stance forming part of the said area.

STAT. 2. No part of the said area of 54,266 square yards abuts upon or adjoins the said Hay Burn, nor do the defenders, Mr. Russell and Mr. Murray, or either of them, send any sewage into the said burn. By the foresaid feu-contract, the superiors, The Kelvinside Estate Company, were taken bound to receive the whole drainage from the houses on the defender, Mr. Russell's ground, at a point upon their (the superiors') lands outside the defenders' boundary. The said point is shown on the plan annexed to the said feu-contract. No provision was made in the said feu-contract as to the further disposal of the said drainage, nor does the said plan show any connection with the Hay Burn, as existing or contemplated. The present defenders have made no connection between their drains and the said burn. They have no control over the disposal of the said drainage after it leaves their property.

STAT. 3. The defenders believe and aver that the Hay Burn has for upwards of forty years been so polluted by sewage and other impurities as to be unfitted for the primary uses, or other-

wise and at least for some of them. Further, they believe and aver that the pursuers themselves materially contribute to the pollution of the said burn, by discharging polluting matter into the same in the first part of its course through the pursuers' grounds.

V.—PLEAS IN LAW for PURSUERS.

I. The pursuers, as proprietors of the said lands and estate of Gartnavel, are entitled to the use and enjoyment of the water in the Hay Burn in its natural state, free of any pollution caused by the defenders, or any of them.

II. In respect that the water of the said Hay Burn has been and is being polluted by the defenders, all, or some of them, to the nuisance of the pursuers, the pursuers are entitled to decree of declarator and interdict as concluded for, with expenses against such of the defenders as appear and oppose the conclusions of the action.

VI.—PLEAS IN LAW for THE KELVINSIDE ESTATE COMPANY.

I. In the circumstances stated, the present action is unnecessary, and ought to be dismissed, or at least sisted.

III. The material averments of the pursuers being unfounded in fact, the defenders should be assoilzied.

IV. The pursuers are barred by the use made by them of the


The Sheriff, as you are no doubt aware, has refused the prayer of the Petition of the Burgh of Partick for the extension of its boundaries so as to take in Kelvinside. The Proprietors of Kelvinside Estate concurred in and promoted that Petition as, in their opinion, the best method of dealing, amongst other questions with the question of the sewage passing down the Hay Burn. Having been unsuccessful in that method, they mean now to have recourse to the method suggested by the Sheriff in the Note to his Interlocutor where he says, "If any real difficulty should arise in this matter" (the carrying off of the sewage), "the proper remedy would not be annexation, but the erection of a Drainage District or the putting in operation of the provisions of the Public Health Acts for that purpose."

By Section 76 of the Public Health Act of 1867, provision is made that "upon the requisition to that effect made in writing by not fewer than Ten Inhabitants of the District," the Local Authority may form a Special Drainage District. I am accordingly sending in to the Clerk of the Local Authority a Requisition for the formation of a Special Drainage District, having the Hay Burn for its outlet, and I shall be much obliged by your concurring in that Petition. It seems now to be the only proper method of dealing with this question, and it is of as great importance to the Feuars as it is to the Superiors that it should be dealt with by some Public Authority, for if the Superiors are compelled to deal with it themselves without the intervention of any Public Authority, the only method in which they can deal with it would be by putting up filtering Ponds between the Great Western Road and the Skating Pond, and there purifying the sewage. Certainly no one would suffer more by the necessity of such filtering Ponds having to be formed than the Superiors themselves, but every one interested in the Locality would suffer in a greater or less degree, for however well such works might be constructed or carried on, the very *fama* of their existence would be injurious.

Annexed is a copy of the Requisition for the formation of a Special Drainage District, your concurrence in which I shall be much obliged by your signing and returning to me.





I have inspected
and measured the three tenements Nos 5, 6, 7 and 8 Firpark Terrace, Dennistoun, which belong to Mr John Herbertson.

They are comparatively new buildings of four square storeys above the street, and there are sunk cellars under part of all the tenements. The fronts are polished ashler with handsome cornices &c and the back walls are very good rubble. The property is substantial, well finished, and in good order. The tenements are divided into houses of three and four rooms, a kitchen and a bathroom: in one of the tenements there is a house of two rooms and a kitchen.

I value the different tenements as follows:-







Agreeably to your instructions we have examined the field adjoining the East march of the Asylum Lands, and had a number of bores put down thereon for the purpose of ascertaining if Freestone of a workable thickness exists there.

Annexed is a plan of the field showing the position of bores, also sections of the strata passed through in each bore.

Of the seven bores put down only that marked 'A' found sandstone at a workable depth from the surface and even this is not such as would induce quarrymasters to offer readily for it although the area proven had been sufficient. The area in which this stratum exists however appears to be so small that no hope can be entertained of getting anyone to offer for a lease of it. If employment for the inmates were wanted, the stone might be opened up for the building of the proposed new enclosing wall, but if the whole labour be to pay for, it is probable that the stones could be purchased as cheaply as they could be worked, and the ground restored.

I am informed that as high as 2/- per 25 $\frac{1}{2}$ cwt
of ladders has been paid for this stone but as a
wayleave would require to be paid to the neighbouring
proprietor and the workings would probably be at
some distance from the pits. 2/- per 20 cwt might
be as much as could be got. at this rate the
ladders on the above mentioned 71,000 tons would be
£7,100. this figure I might have occasion to alter after
getting more certain information about Mr Adies &
Mr Montgomery's searches on the adjoining ground to
the North and East than I could get on Saturday.

Should the minerals come to be let it would
require to be noted whether and to what extent
the minerals ^{under} the road which bounds the
asylum lands on the North belong to the
asylum.

Report on the Mining Operations
of the Monkland Iron & Steel Company
in the lands adjoining the grounds
attached to the Royal Lunatic Asylum
Gartnavel.

Having been requested by John Heu Esquire
Writer, Glasgow, acting for the Directors of the Asylum
to make an examination of the Monkland Iron & Steel
Company's mining operations near Gartnavel and en-
deavour to ascertain whether or not an encroachment
had been made by them on the minerals under the
grounds belonging to the Asylum, the reporter visited
the place on the 20th instant and found that three
pits were being wrought by the Company to the North
West of the Asylum. The strata dip to the north
and rise to the south, and two of these pits, one
situated near Anniesland and one near Scotrigg
farm (standing) are only sunk to and work minerals
which "crop off" about half way between the pits and
the Asylum grounds and of course it is not possible
that any encroachment can have been made from
these pits. The third of the above mentioned pits
situated directly to the West of the Asylum grounds
and on the opposite side of the Crow Road, is sunk
to a seam of blackband ironstone and a working
of comparatively rich clayband ironstone, which will
be found in all likelihood throughout the Asylum
grounds but the sinking has only been completed
lately, the workings are but a few feet distant
from the pitbottom and it will probably be more
than a year hence, before any encroachment in
these

these seams could possibly be made.

A working of an inferior quality of Clay
Ironstone about 15 fathoms above the present bottom
of the pit was carried on for some time in the
direction of the Asylum grounds, but the Company's
Manager told me that these workings were stopped
before reaching the Asylum grounds on account of
the inferior quality of the stone and that now
from falls of the roof and foul air they are
quite inaccessible. The mode of working being
the Long wall by which all the mineral is taken
out and the ground allowed immediately to
subside, and this working being less than 100 feet
in depth from the surface, the subsidence is shown
very markedly on the surface; the wall fences of
the Crow road have been destroyed and the Road
itself so much sunk where the workings have been,
that the Company are obliged to raise it, (which
they are now doing.) The subsidence continues into
the field next the Asylum grounds, being terminated
abruptly over a considerable part of the field, but
the termination is not so decidedly marked towards
the North West corner of the Asylum grounds,
probably from the working here being in advance
of the other and not wide enough to allow the
strata to settle thoroughly down. Close to the
West March of the Asylum grounds is an old
pit which the manager informed me had been
sunk to the same seam, as a trial pit, but a
small quantity only was taken out and that
no encroachment was made; the Debris at the
pit mouth is small in quantity and the appear-
-ance

-ance of the place is that of little having been done.

From the poor quality of the stone and the Company having left stone unwrought in their own grounds nearer to the pit than the Asylum grounds, the reporter is of opinion that they or their Contractors had no temptation to encroach on the Asylum grounds; And the figure of the subsided ground shows that in the ordinary way of working no encroachment can have been made from the pit to the West of the Crow Road, neither can he see reason to suspect any encroachment from the trial pit, so as to warrant him to recommend the Directors to be at the expense of proving it.

Should the newly found Limestones turn out well, it is possible that encroachments might by negligence or otherwise be made on the Asylum grounds but an examination of their workings on the part of the Directors will not be required for a year or two.

Agreeably to your favour of 20th Dec^r last, I on the 26th Ult. sent to Mess^{rs} Jas Kemlop & Co's pit near Gartnavell to have the workings surveyed, in order to ascertain whether any encroachment was being made upon the Aoylum Lands.

My assistants found the workings in that direction inaccessible, having been, to all appearance, in that condition for some considerable time. They were informed by the manager that no operations had been carried on in the direction of the Aoylum lands for nearly 3 years, the last survey having been made in May 1841, and Mr Niven the general manager confirmed this to myself.

The tenant's plan shews that two mines had been driven in that direction nearly to the north side of the Parish Road, about 300 feet westwards from the

entrance to the Asylum, but not
into the road.

I have no reason to
suppose that the workings are
otherwise than correctly represented
on the plan.

The workings at present
going are on the other side of
the pit from the 'Asylum'
and not likely to approach these
lands for a year or two.
