Patients sent by any parish which has contributed a sum proportioned to its population, as stipulated by the Regulations, pay according to a rate of board fixed annually.

Patients sent by other parishes, pay according to the first rate of board.

The board is, in all cases, paid quarterly, and in advance.

When any patient is dismissed, or dies, before the close of a quarter, an application may be made to the Weekly Committee, to ascertain if any, and what portion of the sum advanced for board, shall be refunded.

Patients have no claim to remuneration for their labour.

A fee, on admission, is paid to the Physician, by each patient at the second rate of board, and upwards. On the dismissal, or on the death of the patient, after six, and within twelve months, the fee is repeated. But should the patient remain a year or longer, the fee is repeated only on the expiry of the year, and on that of each succeeding year of the patient's residence in the Asylum. No fees are paid for parish patients, or by patients at the first rate of board.

Patients are admitted and dismissed by orders from the Physician.

No patient is admitted, without a written application addressed to the Directors, from one or more of the nearest relatives, or from the guardians of the patient; a certificate of lunacy from a respectable medical practitioner; a warrant from the Sheriff of Lanarkshire, in terms of the Statutes 55, Geo. III. Cap. 69. and 9.—Geo. IV. Cap. 34; and a written obligation for payment of board, as well as for due observance of the rules of the Institution, from one or two responsible persons resident in Glasgow. The forms of these documents herewith furnished, or copies of them, must be properly filled up and subscribed.

No person affected with contagious fever, or in a dying state, can be admitted as a patient. Harmless idiots, and pregnant women, are also inadmissible, unless under peculiar circumstances, to be judged of by the Weekly Committee.

Patients verging to the state of idiocy, epileptic patients, and others whose cure, after due trial of treatment in the Asylum, appears to be hopeless, are dismissed.

When any patient is ordered to be dismissed, timely written notice of the order for dismissal is always sent by the Secretary, to the person or persons in Glasgow, who have subscribed the obligation for payment of board; and when the patient is not removed from the Asylum, within a week after the time fixed in the notice, the rate of board is doubled.

Near relatives or guardians, or others producing proper written authority, from the subscribers of those letters of application, on which patients have been admitted, are, by an order from the Physician, allowed to visit patients at such hours as he may specify.

No visitor is permitted to enter the apartment of any patient of a different sex, but under proper restrictions.

No person shall bring into, or carry out of the house, any article for a patient, without the knowledge of the Superintendent, or of the Matron.

Every patient must be provided with a proper suit of apparel, and with a sufficient number of changes of those articles of dress which will often require to be washed. An accurate list of every article brought with the patient, must, on admission, be delivered to the Superintendent. If any necessary part of dress should not be duly supplied, after intimation has been given that it is wanted, it will be furnished by the house, and the cost of it charged against the relatives, guardians, or parish, by whom the patient has been placed in the Asylum.

*N. B.* Patients, in cases of urgency, will at any hour be admitted; but, in ordinary cases, they must be sent to the Asylum, after seven o'clock in the morning, and before seven o'clock in the evening. Timely notice of the hour when any patient may be expected to arrive, ought always, if possible, to be given to the Superintendent. Sir,

Margaret Anne Wallace, my sister in law, who is about to be admitted as a patient into the Glasgow Royal Lunatic Asylum, has been insane for about three months. The causes of her malady & I believe a disappointment in love. She was distinguished for her susceptibility of feeling. A gentleman marks the family more frequently than was consistent with propriety, seeing that I consider only of a mother & three daughters; & though he made no proposals nor ever addressed her on the subject, yet his conduct in coming so often made her think that he had a fondness for her. The sudden cessation of his visits threw her into deep melancholy, which gradually terminated in mental aberration. Being a pious girl, she at first took refuge in visiting the dark imagery of the tombstones & in applying the threatening to herself - during this time she made two attempts at self destruction - one by a large dose of Laudanum which she vomited & the other by a lozenge attached to a hot iron. Being removed from Helensburgh to Dumbarton, her mind was taken off from the tombstones while she had friends - & the sun to grow better - but was still very restless & could not be kept from gnawing her fingers. On her return to Helensburgh, the scene of her associations, she grew worse again, & became exceedingly outrageous - broke the windows - & tried every means

of getting out of the house, obviously with the view of seeing the object of her attachment, whose name she was constantly repeating. Her friends thinking that it would be undesirable to try removal from the scene of her folly, brought her to Dumbarton. The leading feature is still a disposition to get out - & a home consciousness. She is managed with difficulty - beats the door - annoys her visitors - & will not permit them to do any thing. It may be mentioned that at first the ship kept very little - ate little - & was very consolidated in her bowels - but now she keeps well - wants down great quantities of food when she alludes, while all the operations of nature seem tolerably regular. Her head was once shorn - & became pale as death - mentioned - but very little, as the cuts did not trouble her. Even though turns take enormous - & she is vexed upon to take it. Sir

I have been requested to transmit to you an account of the case of Ann MacLaren who is intended to be placed under your care in the Lunatic Asylum - She is the natural daughter of a gentleman of this place and has always been brought up with her mother residing in the same village - Another natural daughter of the same gentleman was brought up with him and now takes charge of his home. In this she has always been envied by her sister MacLaren and this spirit has carefully been fostered by her mother - The girl herself was of a quiet thoughtful disposition and brooded much over the ignominy which she supposed hung over her. It was an idea with her that the neighbours talked of nothing but her case - In the meantime she rarely moved off her seat her bowls were totally neglected while her stomach was pampered by her mother in order to entice the girl to remain with her - The manners after being long neglected at last were supposed about 18 months when I saw her she complained of sleeplessness, a confused feeling in her head, her appetite was capricious, bowls remark-  
ably sluggish her pulse rather quick but by no means strong, her habit of body full but flesh remarkably flabby - I advised frequent exercise which was unfortunately neglected - I should have mentioned that when I saw her first her manners were very peculiar and it was scarcely possible to obtain a reply to my queries. Shortly after this in consequence of some petty quarrel with her mother she became furious vociferously accusing every person about her of some plot against her safety or honour and urging her claim of maintaining a higher rank in society to which she thought her father's opulence entitled her. Until this stage of the melody

her father had been kept ignorant of her malady - I urged him to remove her immediately to an asylum and this he was exceedingly willing to do but his resolution yielded to the violence of the mother who would <sup>not</sup> consent - In consequence of this advice of mine the patient was placed by her mother under the care of another practitioner who left her repeatedly and gave her great quantities of opium salts with an occasional dose of castor oil which she was allowed to indulge herself constantly in b'd. about the middle of summer she took a fancy to go to a house which her father had in the country and remained there until the present date. For many months past she is sufficiently quiet only except in some way or other but in that case she becomes furious - She has ever been rather violent in the temper when crossed - She herself states that of late the catamenia have become regular and she is exceedingly anxious respecting her health - Her feet were a little galled by walking to the village and this gave her immense uneasiness. Occasionally she would wish to go the Infirmary and next moment she thinks herself quite well - Her father lies just below the woman who nursed her became melancholy in consequence of the loss of several children but that she has since recovered - These are all the circumstances of the case so far as I know them

According to the rate of board, a difference will be observed, in some of, or in all, the following particulars, viz. in the size of the bed-room, in the number of apartments, in the quality of furniture and of diet, in the rank of associates, and in the proportion of keepers or servants, appointed to a given number of patients. If a keeper or servant be provided solely to attend a single patient, or if the exclusive use of a suite of apartments be required for a patient of the highest class, a charge is made in addition to the rate of board.

Patients sent by any parish which has contributed a sum proportioned to its population, as stipulated by the Regulations, pay according to a rate of board fixed annually.

Patients sent by other parishes, pay according to the first rate of board.

The board is, in all cases, paid quarterly, and in advance.

When any patient is dismissed, or dies, before the close of a quarter, an application may be made to the Weekly Committee, to ascertain if any, and what portion of the sum advanced for board, shall be refunded.

Patients have no claim to remuneration for their labour.

A fee, on admission, is paid to the Physician, by each patient at the second rate of board, and upwards. On the dismission, or on the death of the patient, after six, and within twelve months, the fee is repeated. But should the patient remain a year or longer, the fee is repeated only on the expiry of the year, and on that of each succeeding year of the patient's residence in the Asylum. No fees are paid for parish patients, or by patients at the first rate of board.

Patients are admitted and dismissed by orders from the Physician.

No patient is admitted, without a written application addressed to the Directors, from one or more of the nearest relatives, or from the guardians of the patient; a certificate of lunacy from a respectable medical practitioner; a warrant from the Sheriff of Lanarkshire, in terms of the Statutes 55, Geo. III. Cap. 69, and 9.—Geo. IV. Cap. 34; and a written obligation for payment of board, as well as for due observance of the rules of the Institution, from one or two responsible persons resident in Glasgow. The forms of these documents herewith furnished, or copies of them, must be properly filled up and subscribed.

No person affected with contagious fever, or in a dying state, can be admitted as a patient. Harmless idiots, and pregnant women, are also inadmissible, unless under peculiar circumstances, to be judged of by the Weekly Committee.

Patients verging to the state of idiocy, epileptic patients, and others whose cure, after due trial of treatment in the Asylum, appears to be hopeless, are dismissed.

When any patient is ordered to be dismissed, timely written notice of the order for dismission is always sent by the Secretary, to the person or persons in Glasgow, who have subscribed the obligation for payment of board; and when the patient is not removed from the Asylum, within a week after the time fixed in the notice, the rate of board is doubled.

Near relatives or guardians, or others producing proper written authority, from the subscribers of those letters of application, on which patients have been admitted, are, by an order from the Physician, allowed to visit patients at such hours as he may specify.

No visitor is permitted to enter the apartment of any patient of a different sex, but under proper restrictions.

No person shall bring into, or carry out of the house, any article for a patient, without the knowledge of the Superintendent, or of the Matron.

Every patient must be provided with a proper suit of apparel, and with a sufficient number of changes of those articles of dress which will often require to be washed. An accurate list of every article brought with the patient, must, on admission, be delivered to the Superintendent. If any necessary part of dress should not be duly supplied, after intimation has been given that it is wanted, it will be furnished by the house, and the cost of it charged against the relatives, guardians, or parish, by whom the patient has been placed in the Asylum.

*N. B.* Patients, in cases of urgency, will at any hour be admitted; but, in ordinary cases, they must be sent to the Asylum, after seven o'clock in the morning, and before seven o'clock in the evening. Timely notice of the hour when any patient may be expected to arrive, ought always, if possible, to be given to the Superintendent. Thus due preparation will be made for the patient's reception; and, if immediate medical attendance should be requisite, the patient shall, as soon as possible after admission, be visited by the Physician.
