April 1

Was brought to the Asylum today, by two sisters and an attendant who was sent for her, from 65 King Street Carlton and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to the City Parish Glasgow.

She is 36 years of age, widowed, is a Protestant and was formerly employed as a servant.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted one week, and the cause is disappointment in marriage. She is dangerous to others, but not suicidal. No hereditary tendency.

The history given of this case by her sister is that she is a widow, her husband having died three years ago, that she had five children, the first being born alive but died soon, that she had other four all dead born and premature, each successive birth occurring at an earlier period of utero-gestation, and that she is now pregnant five or six months to a person who promised to marry her.

The attack commenced eight days ago by her leaving her work and reading passages in the Bible especially Ruth. She then commenced to write letters and said she would make the person who promised to her, explain. Next she became incoherent, and ultimately violent and destructive, tearing her clothes and whatever came in her way. The night prior to admission she was so restless and excited that she had to be held all night during which time she bit her sister severely on the finger and injured her in several other parts of the body.

On admission she is quiet, and can with difficulty be got to reply to any question, almost everything she says being wandering and ~~and~~ incoherent. She says she got poison which now makes her breath more freely.

She is in feeble bodily health, her condition is reduced and she is very anaemic.

• 2 Last night she was restless interfering with the attendant and other patients. She had to be put into a room out of the happy. She would not take breakfast.

• 5 She requires to be fed. During the night she took her bed and took the straw out of it and wet the room. This morning she is very stupid.

• 11 She still continues stupid and restless. Last night she was noisy complaining of pain in bones. She is still dressed in canvas which she has been since admission to prevent her from tearing her clothes or undressing herself.

May 8

For some time past she has been constantly confined to bed on account of her dirty habits. She takes her food well, but is quite demented and gives no reply when spoken to. She is sometimes violent.

• 9 Today she is found to have lost the power of voluntary motion of the right arm; when raised it falls like a dead weight by her side. On her hand being pricked there is slight sensation.

• 16 She was today transferred to Dundee Asylum by authority of Sir James G. — and dismissed —

April 3

Was brought to the Asylum today by her son from 13 Clyde Terrace Glasgow and admitted as a Private Patient.

She is forty nine years of age, widowed, & a Protestant and was formerly employed as a Shop keeper.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted about three months, and the cause is said to be the death of her mother. There is hereditary predisposition in the case, she having a sister at present in Lockgilphead District Asylum. She is suicidal, but not dangerous to others.

The history received of this case is that shortly before the death of her mother which occurs on 31st December last she began to complain of a burning pain in the belly, that on New Year's Day she took to bed and has been in bed ever since. Three weeks ago after a sound sleep she began to talk incoherently, a fortnight ^{ago} became outrageous, and for the last four days has taken little or no food.

She has arrived at the second critical period. Prior to admission she had delusions, such as that the flames of hell were burning around her, that it was the Millennium, that she had revelations from heaven and that all were lost.

On admission she talks a great deal; says the devil is in her daughter, asks what parish is paying for her and says she has plenty of money. She says that the never dying worm is within her, that that is what is wrong with her and that she never can be cured.

Bodily health feeble: Condition reduced
Pulse 104, small.

• 4 Last night she was quiet and slept about three hours. Today she refuses her food.

• 5 Yesterday she continued to refuse food and in the evening was fed by the stomach pump. Today she has taken her breakfast.

• 9 She continues to take her food, but is very dull and melancholy, sits idly in the gallery and scarcely ever speaks or looks about her.

• 13 She has improved since last report has begun to do a little sewing and her aspect is more cheerful.

• 29 There has been little change since last report, the work she does is little, she seldom speaks, but when asked go generally says she is better.

May 9 She is more depressed, and does not take her food so well. Bodily health feeble.

• 19 Since last report she has been gradually becoming more unwilling to eat. Yesterday after dinner she was observed looking near the left food and dirty dishes that were about to be carried away. Something wrong was suspected and on examining her, she was found to have her hands filled with potato and charred flesh. Today it was found necessary to feed her by means of the stomach pump. Her bodily health is very feeble.

June 2 She now takes her food herself. She is still very depressed.

She is still depressed, but has taken her food
pretty well since last report. Her bodily health is
somewhat improved.

Jane Cameron or Goodland abt 75

April 11

Was brought to the Asylum today from 501 Caltongate Street Glasgow and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to the City Parish.

She is seventy five years of age, widowed, is a protestant and was formerly employed as a Housewife.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted for three years and the cause is unknown. She is said to be neither suicidal nor dangerous to others. There is no known hereditary tendency.

Prior to admission she was very restless, the fancied that her mother was alive, and often wandered away to near Ladywell where her mother had formerly lived. She could not be kept in bed at night, would get up and kindle the fire, and often destroyed clothing and other articles in it. She was also in the habit of stripping off her clothes, was at times violent, and latterly was altogether unmanageable.

On admission she is quiet and seems not to understand anything that is done; talks incoherently about her mother wishing to get married again and can give no account of herself.

On being examined she is found to have Procidentia of the uterus; apparently of long standing; the mucous membrane of the vagina being hard and thick and nearly similar in appearance to the skin.

Bodily health feeble: condition reduced.

Last night she was very restless would not keep in bed and had to be removed to a room. Today she is still rather going about shaking the handles of the doors; she is dressed in canvas to prevent her taking off her clothes.

• 12 She is very restless and talkative and will allow nothing to remain in its place. She mistakes identity and her memory is much impaired.

• 13 For some time past she has been suffering from incontinence of urine, and every night was wet in bed. She generally manages to keep herself dry during the day. Last night she was wet, dirty and very restless.

May 1

She is very weak and has been in bed for some day. The night before last she was very restless and tore a blanket. She still believes her mother is alive and often talks of having been to her house to see her yesterday.

• 14

Since last report she has had an attack of erysipelas extending over the face, head and back. The treatment was Fumet. Mrs. Stori in twenty drop doses four times daily. The disease has now disappeared but she is still in bed on account of feeble bodily health.

June 18

She is often restless and troublesome at night and occasionally wets and dirties herself. Her mind is quite gone and her conversation is wandering and childish.

July 13

She was today transferred to Bonhill Parochial Asylum, and dismissed.

April 24

Was brought to the Asylum today from 176 Kent Road Glasgow by her mother and two friends and admitted as a private patient.

She is twenty two years of age, single, is the daughter of a ship worker and belongs to the Church of Scotland.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted about two months, (but she has always been of weak intellect), and the cause is inflammatory of the brain. She is very suicidal but not dangerous to others. There is no known hereditary tendency.

Prior to admission she slept none for several months even although she had large doses of Dr. New Morph. Her language was incoherent and she laboured under extravagant delusions. Said she was lost and going to hell, fancied that she was a devil and attempted to cut her throat with a knife and scissors.

She has had a peculiar mental temperament for many years supposed to have followed on some inflammatory action of the brain.

On admission she was quiet and had a very depressed and melancholy aspect. Her language was incoherent; she says she never was happy; that once she was sick and cut off her head and got it changed; that she is all changed and that it occurred on account of a wrong name that was on a picture.

She is in very feeble health, condition retarded, is anaemic, pulse 104, weak.

+ 30

During the night she imagined she was being blown up in the air, and slept none. She has eaten but sparingly.

May 1

Today she tied a handkerchief tightly round her neck and attempted to choke herself. During the night she had slept for three hours.

+ 2

She slept none during the night and this morning was very anxious to get into the fire. This sleeplessness continues although she has each night at bed time had a draught containing Spt. Dr. New Hyoscam 30

+ 4

She slept from 10 o'clock last night till 5:30 this morning. Yesterday she was walked in the grounds, had Dr. Dr. gtt. Nt, was well purged, and had a bottle of tea and porridge, and a hot foot bath at bed time.

+ 11

Since last report she has generally slept for some hours more or less till last night when she slept none and was rather fancying there was a man in the gallery making a foot of her.

June 2

There is no mental improvement. Her bowels are obstinately constipated and she never has relief except from the action of medicine. She is very restless and has several times struck her attendant pretty severely.

+ 21

She is quite demented when spoken to, she attempts to reply and the words seem to lie away upon her lips before she can utter them.

July 17

Since last report there has been no perceptible change.

She was taken home today by her mother and dismissed — Relieved

22

Admitted 29th April 1885

May 1

Was brought to the Asylum today from Cowan Workhouse (her former residence was 3 Tulliallan Place) and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to Cowan Parish.

She is twenty seven years of age, single, was formerly employed as a Domestic Servant and belongs to the Established Church.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted about one week, and the cause is unknown. She is both suicidal and dangerous to others. Hereditary predisposition not known.

Prior to admission she was incoherent and excited, and required restraint. She was very delusive believed that she was the second prophet sent by God to convert the wicked of Glasgow, and that he gave her direction what to do by the hand of an angel at the heat of night. She said that all Highlanders would be saved (she being one) and that all others would not be saved.

She has taken no food for four days, and while in Cowan Workhouse, which she has been for two days, she resists every attempt to feed her.

On admission she will at times give no reply at other times she speaks & and cannot begin to stop, when she does reply her invariable answer is, it is nothing to you. She asks what is wrong with me to put me in Bridewell and in hell. When asked her name, she says my name is above your name & I am what I am.

She is in good bodily health and condition.

Yesterday she refused to take food and resisted any attempt to feed her. Last night she was by the stomach pump. After being fed, she said you have brought me here to kill me. She was quiet during the night and today still refuses food.

She still refuses to eat and is fed three times daily by means of the stomach pump; she says she gets food from heaven.

Her sister called today to inquire for her. She says that she is 34 years of age, and that she knows no cause for her present illness, but that another sister during the time of the late revivals became affected and was ill for twelve weeks, but was kept at home.

Today she has taken all her food but would eat none except under the eye of the Medical Assistant. The attendants have great difficulty in managing her; she calls them ill names and says they have no right to order her.

Since last report she has taken her food pretty well but otherwise there is no improvement. She has become uncleanly in her habits, and last night she was noisy throwing her pot about and dirtied her bed & walls of her room. She has discoloured her breast by striking it with her hands.

She was today transferred to Lockgilphhead District Asylum and dismissed.

June 8

May 5

Was brought to the Asylum today by her son from 256 Eglinton Street Glasgow and admitted as a private patient.

She is forty four years of age, married, is a blacksmith's wife and belongs to the Church of Scotland.

This is the second attack of insanity, and it has lasted about two years. Her former attack took place four years ago, when she was under treatment in this Asylum from 23 May till 2^d July 1861 - see vol XXXI page 168. The cause is said to be the change of life. She is palsied, is at times dangerous to others, but is not suicidal. There is no known hereditary tendency.

Prior to admission, she was very restless, and could not be left alone for a moment. She was in fear of evil persons getting into the house and was constantly examining doors and windows to see and prevent them. She believed the house was falling and she was blind and had various other delusions. She cried about fire and darkness, talked constantly, and was afraid of coming to want.

On admission she is talkative, and her memory is very defective. She says she was out walking with her son and that he brought her here, she does not know why. She is very anxious not to be kept waiting, for that he has a long road to go & the cat is waiting.

On examination she is found to have varicose veins upon the left leg. She says it is a bad leg from Rheumatism, and talks incessantly about the blood running up & up and into her knee and her womb and her heart and through all her body and keeps talking and gesticulating as if describing something very amazing.

Bodily Health feeble. Condition reduced. Pulse about 70 but very weak.

" 9 She slept well last night, is quiet and has taken her food. She cannot remember who brought her to the Asylum, but after considerable mental effort says she thinks it was her son.

" 18 She has been constantly confined to bed since admission has taken her food pretty well. She is disturbed by the most trifling event, and talks in a disconnected and incoherent manner.

" 25 Yesterday she became more corporeal, picked up and hid the other patients clothes when visited by her son he found five pocket handkerchiefs belonging to others in her pocket. Afterwards she tore her dress and became quite unmanageable. It was found necessary to dress her in canvas and seclude her.

June 5 She is constantly confined to bed, is very restless and requires an attendant constantly beside her. She can hardly be got to take any food, is very much emaciated and her pulse intermits.

" 16 She is much emaciated and is labouring under a severe attack of diarrhoea. Today while attempting to raise herself in bed she received a small contused wound on the right elbow by coming in contact with the edge of the bedstead.

Am July 7 The diarrhoea which has lasted for a considerable time has now yielded to treatment. She was prescribed various astringents both in the form of draught and pill, but the following formula answered best.

May 10

Was brought to the Asylum today by three friends from Park Farm Eaglesham and admitted as a Private Patient.

She is twenty years of age, single, is a farmer's daughter, and belongs to the Established Kirk of Scotland.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted about six months and the cause is said to be over exertion at reaping machine in Sept. last. She is suicidal but not dangerous to others. There is no known hereditary tendency.

Prior to admission she was abstracted and melancholy, and although quite able would do no work, for day she would never say almost no work or answer one question and refused to leave her bed. She threatened to commit suicide by drowning herself, and at times went away and hid herself under bushes and in out of the way places.

On admission she is quiet and appears to be depressed. She can with difficulty be got to speak but what she says is quite coherent. She says she is very dull, but when asked the cause will give no reply.

Bodily health and condition good.

May 13

She sleeps little during the nights and is depressed. She has taken her food pretty well and is doing a little work but is often inclined to cry; when asked the reason she says she is thinking about home and the work that is there for her to do.

May 18

She is still depressed, but does a little work she speaks little and can hardly be got to reply to questions.

May 26

While walking in the grounds today she was found to be unable to speak. She had unobserved tied a long lace tightly round her neck in an attempt to choke herself.

June 11

She continues depressed and melancholy, and can with difficulty be got to speak; any thing she says being scarcely audible. She takes her food pretty well and is in good health and condition.

July 18

Since last report she has improved very much. She is now cheerful, converses readily, and is very inquisitive.

August 9

She was today dismissed -

May 12

Was brought to the Asylum today from Donegal Town Works Shotts and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to Shotts parish.

She is twenty years of age, widowed, was formerly employed as a field worker, and is a Roman Catholic.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasts three weeks and the cause is unknown. She is dangerous to others and said not to be very suicidal. There is no known hereditary tendency.

Prior to admission she is said to have had a wild maniacal appearance, and to have cried, laughed more and talked incoherently by turns. Her friends were worried watching to prevent her doing bodily injury to herself, and her mother who came with her to the Asylum said that she had slept worse for the last fortnight. She has also more than once attempted to injure others.

On admission she is quiet, so much so that she cannot be got to reply to my question whatever. The only words that escape her lips is that her head is sore. She is labouring under a very severe attack of Ophthalmia Tarsa. The eye-lashes are encrusted with purulent matter, the eye-lids are inflamed and thickened so that she cannot open her eyes.

Bodily health feeble condition reduced.

• 13 She slept well during the night and has taken her food. Today at the medical visit she rolled out of bed and fell on the floor where she lay until lifted into bed again. She was not injured.

• 16 She was noisy during the night. Today her language is somewhat incoherent and insolent. She sang in such a loud voice and was so noisy disturbing all the other patients in the happy that she had to be removed to 503.

June 1 There is no mental improvement; she is very disorderly and at times makes use of very bad language. Bodily health improving.

• 16 Last night between 11 & 12 o'clock the attendant hearing a noise in the dormitory in which this patient sleeps entered it and found her with a piece of wood in her hand which she had wrenched from the bedstead of another of ~~another~~ patients (Mrs Kelly) whom she had severely injured. The floor of the room was covered with blood and Mrs Kelly was severely cut about the head; and her body, arms and hands were much bruised and discoloured. She threatened to kill her and also take the lives of the other two who slept in the same dormitory with her. Today she is still very violent and threatening.

July 3 She is still very threatening in her language and she omits a great deal of her food.

• 18 She has been prescribed Hydrocyanic Acid 1 drap per tumb daily in water but the vomiting still continues. There is now almost no vomiting and she has been pretty quiet for some days.

August 7 She continues quiet takes her food well and is much improved both bodily and mentally.

September 25 She is quiet and orderly, is in very good bodily health and condition and is very well mentally.
October 4 She was today dismissed.—
was Cured.

May 17

Was brought today by her brother to the Asylum from 146 West Graham Street, Glasgow and admitted as a Private Patient.

She is thirty six years of age, single, was formerly occupied as a lady's maid, and belongs to the Free Church of Scotland.

This is the second attack of insanity and has lasted under four months. During the present attack she was for two months in Kilmarnock Asylum near Bath and lately for some time at home but was there found unmanageable. During her former attack which occurred in 1853 she was under treatment in Morningside Asylum. The cause of insanity is said to be too much thought about religion, but there is hereditary tendency, her father having been in Morningside Asylum 16 years ago. She is both homicidal and dangerous to others.

Prior to admission she talked continually and insolently; she fancied she knew every person upon the streets, said she crossed Niagara Falls in Blondin's barrel and imagined she had visited various Foreign countries although she never was abroad. She thought her friends were conspiring against her, that they found fault with her eyesight walk &c. has a great dislike to all her family, and threatened to stab her mother with a poker, and to hang or drown herself.

In admission she talks continually, thinks she knows every one and gives them a name. She mentions the same delusions as above noted and says she was in Brazil many and in the fight with him in New York four and a half years ago.

Physically health feeble, condition reduced.

• 18 During the night she slept only two hours, was very noisy, ran up & down the ward (top) and coughed a good deal. Today she has eaten sparingly, is as talkative as ever, and mistakes identity.

• 19 Last night she was violent to the attendant and swore before going to bed. During the night she was restless noisy & slept none, and daubed the walls of her room with urine and some black substance. Today she is as talkative as ever; she says that last night she thought she was made of crystal, and that she was away on Lake Ontario with Mr. Bowdoin North fishing.

June 1 She is restless noisy and troublesome. Her talk is very absurd and generally incoherent. She is often restless at night and two nights ago she broke her hair brush in pieces.

• 22 For some time past she has been quieter and slept better at night. She is still disorderly during the day and her language is very insolent and coarse, and often quite incoherent.

July 23 Since last report she has improved very much; she is quiet, orderly and industrious, and is now almost well.

August 7 She was today dismissed—
Quarrelled.

Admitted 17th May 1865

May 20

Was brought to the Asylum today from the Eastern Police Office, Glasgow and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to the City Parish.

This is at least the second attack of insanity and has lasted a few days, cause unknown. During her former attack she was treated in Barnhill Lunatic Asylum from 5th Oct till 31 Dec. 1863. She is neither suicidal nor dangerous to others. Her known hereditary tendency. She is twenty one years of age, single, is Roman Catholic, and was formerly employed as a millworker.

Prior to admission she maintained that she was a Nun, and that her place of residence is in St Mary's Chapel, and that ^{she} was married to a Roman Catholic Priest. She was moreover would remain silent for hours and answer not a question.

On admission she is very quiet and slow to speak, but replies to questions quite coherently. She says this is the third day since she was taken to the Police Office, and that she was taken there from St Mary's R.C. Chapel; says that she has no home, and that the house she lives in was not her home, and that she left off work two months ago because it was too heavy for her.

Her delusions are the same as before admission - she fancies she is a Nun and says she has been so for two years, and say she is married to a R.C. Priest named Mr. Ghilt or Italian. She has she says been in this country five years.

Bodily health and condition good.

" 21 She slept well during the night and has taken her food. She is quiet and never speaks, but when spoken to.

" 29 She is still and very quiet, and employs her time knitting. Delusions unchanged.

June 19

She is still delusive, and has become somewhat irritable and anxious to get away. She blames the Asylum as being the cause of her confinement in the Asylum.

July 18

She is very irritable and abusive in her language, and say that those who keep her here will be cursed. She says she should get a nail put through her hand to be made like Him.

August 7

Today she is very excited, demanding her own clothes and threatening to run away.

September

She is very stubborn and tractious. She will give no reply to anything said to her although she seems quite capable of understanding.

October 12

She is still tractious and at times refuses her food. Bodily health & condition pretty good.

November 6

She never speaks no voices but continues to talk at any thing, at times she will not put on her clothes and at other times she has to be prevented from undressing herself.

December 8

She is as tractious as ever. Today she attempted to strangle herself by tying a handkerchief round her neck and twisting it with her hands.

Admitted 20th May 1865

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1865

May 26

Was brought to the Asylum today from Govan Workhouse and admitted as a Major patient chargeable to Govan Parish.

She is thirty seven years of age, single, is a Protestant, and was formerly employed as a Muslim dower etc.

This is the first attack of insanity and is said to have lasted a few days. The cause is unknown but is supposed to be hereditary. A brother being at present a patient in the Asylum. She is neither suicidal nor dangerous to others.

Prior to admission she was incoherent in her conversation, and had various delusions. She said that people were poisoning her, that they laid poison at her door for her to take, that it was put into her food, and that all this was done on account of her religion. Says she is persecuted and has to shift from place to place to escape her enemies.

On admission she seems weak minded and at times roanders in her conversation. She smiles and talks freely of her delusions - says the Gilmore Hill folks gave her poison, that it was put into her tea and that some of it ran over on to the table which she took to the Police Office to get it tested - says she thinks it was antimony and that it made her ill but not sick. She also talks of her fellow workers having forced her name to a forty pound, and then bills.

Bodily health and condition ordinary

May 27

She slept well during the night, and has taken her food. Today she is employed washing sheets.

June 4

Since admission she has been quiet and orderly till this morning when in consequence of her delusions she became excited and threatened to destroy herself with a pair of scissor. She says that the Gilmore Hill folks and some young men from Paisley who wished to poison her are in the Asylum.

July 18

She is full of delusions especially about poison and things connected with the church. At times she is very excited and threatening.

August 7

There is no mental improvement, she takes in ill will at other patients in consequence of her delusions, and today called another patient a bad woman.

September

She continues to be delusive and is in consequence subject to paroxysms of violent excitement.

October 25

For some time past she was quiet and was about to go to the concert last night; during the singing she became very excited, threw her hands above her head, screamed and cried out this is the house of the Devil.

November

She has been quiet since last report, says there is nothing wrong with her mind and is very anxious to get away. She is very delusive. Bodily health ordinary.

137

Admitted 26th May 1875

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June 16

Was brought to the Asylum today by her son in law from 2 Norfolk Court House and admitted as a private patient.

She is forty nine years, widowed, has one daughter and belongs to the United Methodist Church.

This is the third attack of insanity she lasted ten days and the cause is said to be unknown, but her father was insane. During her first attack which occurred about seventeen years ago she was under treatment in this asylum. When the second attack occurred she was confined in Transient Asylum for a few days and then in Garrigad Asylum for about seven months. She is said to be neither suicidal nor dangerous to others but threatening to strike her relatives.

Prior to admission she was much excited and fancied that her friends were trying to poison her, she complained greatly of her head, covered with the dead and said that fairies worked magic upon her.

On admission she was rather talkative but her language was quite coherent. She spoke for several persons who had formerly been connected with the Asylum, said that when at home she had fought with her relatives and said that she would also fight here.

She is in good bodily health and condition.

" 17 She was put to bed last night in the bdy. but slept none about 3 o'clock in the morning she became so excited and threatening she had to be removed to a strong room. Today she fancies that her relatives and a number of acquaintances know she manners are in the Asylum.

" 21

Last night she tore the straw out of her mattress and slept none. Today she is very restless singing and dancing, and threatening violence towards the other patients.

July 13

She is very disorderly and unmanageable, last night she threw her urine about the walls of her room.

August 7

She is noisy excited and violent, last night she again destroyed her room with urine.

September 18

She is delusive, incoherent and very disorderly. Last night she had rubbed the walls of her room with her excrements and urine.

October 15

She is now cleanly in her habits, but is still very delusive and rambling in conversation. A tumor on the right side of her neck is getting larger and painful. She says it has been operated on before by Dr. Towne & Dr. Tyron.

November 6

At present she is quiet; for the last two day she has taken no food on account of the swelling and pain of the tumor. She would not allow it to be touched but today it has burst and discharged a large quantity of putrid pus.

Admitted 16th June 1865

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Oct 16

June 20

Was brought to the Asylum today from 17 Young Street Glasgow and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to the City Parish.

She is sixteen years of age, single, is a Protestant and was formerly occupied as a servant.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted about six months, and the cause is unknown, she is dangerous to others, but not suicidal. There is no hereditary tendency.

Her mother says that the attack commenced about six months ago when she was staying with her sister and that the symptoms have gradually increased. She began to be sulky and mad at times insolent; when asked to do anything she would bid whoever asked her to do it themselves. About six weeks ago she had to be taken home, having become quite unmanageable refusing to dress herself and being also destructive, tearing her dress and breaking about the furniture, she also illused the children.

On admission she is quiet and can hardly be got to reply to any question, but what she says is quite coherent.

She is in good bodily health and condition.

" 21

She was quiet during the night but slept only about two hours. Today she would not take her breakfast, could not get her to speak and is often inclined to cry.

" 22

She is very restless and her language is somewhat incoherent. She often interferes with the other patients and is in danger of being injured.

July 17

She is quiet and sleeps well at night during the day she is mischievous and disorderly in her habits.

August 4

She has improved since last report, continues to sleep well at night, and assists in the work of the day room.

" 19

She continues to improve. She has menstruated for the first time the discharge was normal.

September 7

She is not so well as she was at last report; she is somewhat insolent and not inclined to do any work.

October 7

Since last report she has improved; she is daily employed assisting in the work of the gallery. She is very anxious to know when she is to get home.

November 8

She was today dismissed,

Cured

Admitted 28th June 1875

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June 22

Was brought to the Asylum today from 317 Gallowgate Street and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to the City Poor Clay.

She is twenty six years of age, single, is a protestant and was formerly occupied as a Domestic Servant.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted two weeks and the cause is unknown, she is neither suicidal nor dangerous to others, and there is no hereditary tendency.

Eight days ago she left her home in Kilwinning and travelled to Glasgow. She went to a friend's house in Gallowgate Street where she arrived with her clothes all wet and dirty. She again left her friend's house in the evening following and returned in the morning in the same state. She was very restless and sleepless, and destroyed and burned her clothing. At times she was quiet and talked coherently, other times she was incoherent and delusive, - fancied that there was vanity and dishonesty about her clothes, and said she would never send a letter by post because Jesus had never done it. Yesterday and today she has taken almost no food.

On admission she is quiet and rather depressed, she is somewhat inclined to converse, but what she says is quite coherent and she says she knows quite well that she is in an asylum.

Bodily health and condition ordinary.

• 26 She has been quiet, takes her food, and sleeps well at night. She has altered since admission seems rather drowsy, but today is employed very.

July 1

She is delusive and her language is somewhat incoherent. She very often refuses food and has to be fed by means of the stomach pump.

• 17 She still refuses to take her food and continues to be fed by means of the stomach pump. This morning she would not put on her clothes and while being dressed by an attendant, she attacked and struck her on the face it was found necessary to dress her in canvas and put her in a room.

August 7

She has now for some time taken her food freely, but is inclined to be a great deal in bed. Her language is wandering and somewhat incoherent.

September 9

She constantly complains of headache and is at times very violent.

October 3

Last night she was very disorderly going into other patients beds and annoying them; when checked by the nurse she seized a chamber pot & struck her with it.

November 18

She is indolent but is delusive and very irritable. Bodily health ordinary.

Admitted 24th June 1885

June 28

Was brought to the Asylum today by her father and uncle from 46 Washington Street Glasgow and admitted as a private patient.

Oct 25

The is 25 years of age, single, was formerly employed as a milliner and belongs to the United Presbyterian church.

Nov

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted three weeks, and the cause is disappointment in love. She is suicidal, but not very dangerous to others, having attempted to bite when restrained. There is no hereditary tendency.

Prior to admission she was extremely violent in her conduct and had to be kept constantly under restraint. She would take no food fearing it was poisoned, and imagined that every one was her enemy. She was restless and sleepless and on the night before admission twice attempted to jump over the window and is said to have required five persons to restrain her.

Dec

On admission her arms were fixed to her sides by means of a handkerchief tied round them and passing behind her back. She was quiet and had a depressed and melancholy aspect. She said little, but her language was quite coherent; when asked to do anything she always said she would do it if it was right. On the dorsal aspect of the right hand there is an incised wound measuring about an inch in length with several scratches, caused by her smashing out glass.

Jan

She is in pretty good bodily health and condition. She was quiet and slept well during the night; in the afternoon she became restless and very excited running wildly from place to place.

Mar

She was so unmanageable that she had to be isolated. She will take no food and it has been found necessary to feed her by means of the stomach pump which she resisted very much. She cannot be by any means induced to speak.

Apr

Yesterday and the day previous it was found necessary to feed her through the nose, on account of her keeping her jaws so firmly locked that they could not be opened. She is losing strength and becoming much exhausted from excitement.

June

Since last report she has been almost constantly confined to bed, and has received the greater part of her food by means of the stomach pump, sometimes through the nose and sometimes by the mouth. For the last two days she has taken her food well, has been out of bed and employed picking berries in the garden. At the medical visit she stands and looks out of the window and cannot be got to look round, nor speak.

July

She is continually in bed and won't speak to or look at any one. She eats and drinks herself and gets all her food by means of the stomach pump.

Aug

She is still confined to bed and is often wet and dirty. She allows the attendants to feed her but never speaks nor does anything for herself.

August 7

September 18

Admitted 28th June 1875

1865

- October 26 There has been no change since last report till today when she would not take her food from the attendant, and had to be fed by means of the Stomach Pump.
- November 9 Since last report she has received all her food by means of the stomach pump till to day, when she eat her food, but would not put forward her hands to take it. She is always confined to bed and constantly wet herself. Bodily health failing.
- 26 She has been fed four times by means of the stomach pump since last report. She has not spoken a single word for upwards of four months, but last night she rose out of bed and eat a biscuit with the attendant and said she would like to get home just now.
- December 1 She is extremely uncleanly in her habits, wet her bed every night and last she got out of bed defecated herself and then going to bed passed her faeces in it. Would not speak.
- January 17 Continues very filthily in her habits. Four days ago she had an attack of vomiting and purging and sent up a little blood, but is now better and tells of being very hungry she eats very irregularly.
- February 14 Wet every night in bed. She is very troublesome during the day, foolishly throwing away things asking of her refuse to take my medicine and her tongue is very foul.
- March 23 Has been wet in bed every night and occasionally whenever filthily with the exception of one night, since last report, when she was noisy and angry much.
- April 18 Even more filthily than at last report deliberately passes her faeces in her clothes although very consciousness is near. Filthy night and day and has been lately much excited and dangerous in her conduct.
- May 15 She has been again refusing all food and four days ago was fed by the stomach pump, but has now begun to take her food although irregularly. She wet her bed last night, but was dry the three preceding nights.
- June 19 Wet in bed every night and during the day is restless and very erratic in her conduct. She seldom speaks coherently except when asking for anything.
- July 25 She was today taken away by her father on trial.
- August 17 She was today dismissed
Believed.

1865

July 21

Was brought to the Asylum today, by her husband, from 3 Salisbury Place Glasgow, and admitted as a private patient.

She is twenty seven years of age, married, has received an ordinary education and belongs to the United Presbyterian Church.

This is the second attack of insanity, has lasted between seven & eight weeks, and the cause is said to weakness consequent on a miscarriage which she had about three months prior to admission. The former attack occurred in Nov 1864 when she was ill for a month, and treated at home. She is neither suicidal nor dangerous to others. There is no known hereditary tendency.

Prior to admission she was very depressed and restless. Would not converse, and seldom replied to the simplest question. She had a constant desire to get out of the house, and sometimes wandered away and had to be brought back. Her husband states that she has been a bed only two out of the last six nights, and that she often falls asleep sitting in a chair. She fancies that she has got money left her and that the late Sir John Maxwell's Estate belongs to her.

On admission she is quiet and seems careless about everything. She says that there is nothing the matter with her, and that she is quite happy. After when spoken to she only reply she gives in a smile.

Bodily health and condition good.

• 22 She was restless during the night, but slept about five hours; after getting up she was constantly going to the door and trying to get out. She has taken no food since admission and was this afternoon fed by means of the stomach pump.

" 25 She continues restless and continually tries to wander away. She still refuses food and is regularly fed by means of the stomach pump.

August 2 She kept a bad litter last night but is still restless. She is now fed by the attendants but is somewhat unwilling to eat.

• 21 She is restless and very stubborn. Yesterday she struck one of the servants several blows on the face which caused his nose to bleed profusely.

September 12 She has to be constantly watched by an attendant to keep her from the door. She continues to be violent and when striking always aims for the face.

October 15 At present she has to be watched to prevent her rolling over on her head and leaping over the scats.

November Since last report she has improved. She has now commenced to do some work. Bodily health good.

Admitted 21st July 1865

Mary Johnston

Age 25

July 22

Was brought to the Asylum today by her sister from 67 High Street, Rothesay and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to Rothesay Parish. She is twenty five years of age single, is a Presbyterian and was formerly employed as a milliner.

This is the second attack of insanity, has lasted about two weeks and the cause is said to be grief on account of the death of her father. During her former attack she was a patient in this Asylum from 24th Nov. 1860 till 11th June 1861 (see Vol. XXVII page 62). She is suicidal but not particularly dangerous to others. No hereditary predisposition.

Patient's sister states that since the death of her father which occurred in December last, she has not been so well; that about four months ago the menses were suppressed and that she has been gradually getting worse up till a fortnight ago, when she became very depressed and suicidal in her tendencies, saying she was a great sinner and deserved to die. She attempted to injure her hand with a hatchet and tried to get hold of a knife to injure herself with. For some time before admission she was uncleanly in her habits, riding her scortions about her clothes, but she is said now to be clean.

On admission she has a dull melancholy and depressed appearance, and can hardly be got to reply to any question. She is in ordinary bodily health, but is somewhat reduced in body, the muscles being relaxed and soft and the pulse feeble.

- 23. She was quiet and slept a little during the night; she has taken no food since admission and was fed by means of the stomach pump.
- 26. She still refuses all food and is regularly fed by means of the stomach pump. She says that she is satiated and does not deserve food.
- 25. She has today taken her food herself. She is still very depressed.

August 7

She sleeps well at night and continues to take her food pretty well, but cannot be induced to do any work.

- 22. She sits idly all day. She takes her food pretty well & her bodily health has improved.

September

She is still depressed. She has not altered since admission. She has been ordered by Dr. G. to take half ounce doses, three times daily.

November 10

Today she refused her food saying that she did not deserve it. During the previous month she had improved and was induced to do a little work.

Admitted 22nd July 1865

1865

July 24

Was brought to the Asylum today from Cowan Workhouse and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to Cowan Parish.

She is thirty six years of age, widowed, was formerly employed as a millworker, and is a Protestant.

This is the first attack of insanity, is said to have lasted four weeks and the cause is unknown. She is suicidal, but not dangerous to others. No hereditary tendency.

She was an inmate of Cowan Workhouse for some time before admission where she was incoherent and had paroxysms of excitement, during which she tore her clothes to pieces. She has delusions about being lost and having committed some hideous crime, and also refused food.

On admission she is very restless, cannot be got to remain for a minute in one place, but constantly wanders away. She is very depressed says that she has killed her husband and that she should be put in jail and hanged.

She is in feeble bodily health, condition much reduced, pulse very small.

• 25 She slept for four hours last night but when awake was very restless. She will take no food and was fed by means of the stomach pump.

• 27 She continues restless and sleeps very little at night. Yesterday she stripped off all her clothes and it is found necessary to have her dressed in coverings. She still refuses all food.

August 2 She slept well last night and today has taken her food. She is very depressed and says she should be hanged for killing her husband.

• 22 She is depressed and neither bodily health improving.

September 15 She generally sleeps well at night but continues depressed and restless during the day. She says that she is the bad woman and that she has done evil.

October 6 She is very suicidal; today a pin was found in right thumb he hand; on the back of both hands there was also a number of small bleeding points caused by pressing in the pins.

November 18 There is no mental improvement; she requires to be constantly watched to prevent her from creeping under the beds and forms. She wishes to be given over to the police to be punished for her wickedness.

Admitted 24th July 1865

1866

August 1

Was brought to the Asylum today from 234 Cattle Street Glasgow and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to the City Parish. She is thirty three years of age, married has been employed as a housewife and is a Protestant.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted for nine months and the cause is unknown. She is said to be both suicidal and dangerous to others. No hereditary tendency.

The attack commenced by the patients mind becoming absent, accompanied by constant muttering to herself. She then became delusive fancying that there was a large sum of money that had been left her lying at Dublin University. She also imagined that she had been married to Lord Fergan. For three nights prior to admission she slept none and two days ago she seized a hatchet and threatened to injure her children.

In admission she is quiet and answers questions readily. Her delusions of which she speaks in a very positive manner are the same as before admission.

Her body is covered with vermin and she is affected with梅毒 extending over the whole body but chiefly upon the arms. Otherwise she is in ordinary bodily health and condition. Her youngest child which she has been suckling is three months old, and the mammae are still secreting milk.

• 2 She slept well last night, and has taken her food. She attended to her breast herself. She talks quite coherently and says the Prince of Wales is a half brother of hers.

• 7 She is quiet, orderly and intelligent, but very delusive. The skin eruption has now disappeared.

• 19 Today she was sent to the West House to assist in C. 2.

September

She works very well, but at times in consequence of her delusions she becomes suddenly excited, dangerous and very violent. Bodily health good.

• 27 It has been found necessary to bring her back to the East House on account of the sudden paroxysms of excitement to which she is subject.

October 14

There is no mental improvement. She is very delusive and at times excited. She says she is lady Fergan, and speaks of her husband as Joe Beattie.

November 3

She assists the servants in the private house. Today she became suddenly excited, scolding and striking her hand on the table. She says that when the masters come to her, she must come back to them.

Admitted 1st August 1865.

1876

August 1

Was brought to the Asylum today from 18 Frederick Lane Glasgow and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to the City Parish. She is fifty three years of age, married and has been employed as a housewife and is a Protestant.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted for one month and the cause is intemperate habits. She is both suicidal and dangerous to others. No hereditary tendency.

Patient has been of intemperate habits for twenty years, and for the last three months she has been drinking very hard and pawned the furniture and clothing to get drunk. She was also in the habit of taking Laudanum. For some time before admission she slept none at night and was violent to her relatives. She was delusively fancied that she got poison in her food and drink, and that her husband was married to another woman.

On admission she is very talkative, and her language is extravagant, wandering, somewhat incoherent, and full of delusions. She says she is Queen of Denmark, talks about her brother being King of Granada, and fancies there is large sums of money belonging to her in the West Indies. Immediately before being brought to the Asylum she drank a glass of whisky, which she vomited, and asserts that it was poison.

Her bodily health is feeble and condition reduced.

She slept little last night, and only for about fifteen minutes at a time. Today she is quiet and has eaten little.

She now sleeps well at night and takes her food pretty well. She is still very delusive.

September 1
She makes herself very useful in the Gallery. Her conversation is rambling and extravagant and full of delusions.

" 15 She has been sent over to the West House to assist the servant at the door.

October 8 She is very indolent but her conversation is rambling and she is very delusive. She says that she is higher than the Queen of Denmark and that she has relations in every country in Europe.

November 13 There is no mental improvement. She talks of large sums of money which she is to get, and about Estates and Castles which she is going to give away. She works well but her health is feeble.

Admitted 1st August 1885

1765

1766

August 8

August

Was brought to the Asylum today from 1 Eglington Lane and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to Gowen Parish.

She is thirty four years of age, married has a family and belongs to the Free Church.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted one week, and the cause is said to be religion. She is both suicidal and dangerous to others. No hereditary tendency.

Prior to admission she was much depressed, said her sins were so great that her soul was lost; that she should be hung and wished to die. When left alone for a few minutes she was found in possession of a large and apparently intent on cutting her children's throats; and on the night before admission attempted to strangle her husband.

On admission she was labouring under great dyspnoea and palpitation of the heart, and almost fainted in the waiting room. She was taken up stairs and put to bed in the M.P.

After being put to bed she became much excited; fancied that another patient who was being fed was being poisoned, said she heard her children voices in the next room and would not keep in bed. Her cheeks and lips were livid, and the pulse was very feeble and intermittent, but on account of her restlessness a very particular examination of the chest could not be made. Upon percussing however an abnormal clearness of sound was detected all over the chest, any dullness to indicate the region of the heart not being found. From the examination that has been made, it is evident she is labouring under organic disease of the heart complicated with hydrocephalus of the lungs.

- 9 Last night she slept none, was restless, coughed a great deal and expectorated mucus purulent matter with blood.
- 11 She continues sleepless, is at times much excited and noisy and has always to be propped up in bed in consequence of urgent dyspnoea. Her feet and legs have become oedematous and she has been ordered to have a diuretic and also Apt. Nord. XIV daily.
- 15 She slept for three hours last night, but she is gradually becoming weaker. Her belly is much swollen and emits a tympanitic sound on percussion.
- 17 The dyspnoea is very great, and the heart action is so feeble that the pulse at the wrist can with difficulty be detected.
- 19 Since last report she has been gradually sinking and this morning shortly after 12 o'clock she died.
- 21 A post mortem examination of the body was made today.

August 21 Thorax.

On the thorax being opened a large quantity of serum was found in the cavities of both pleurae and in the pericardium. The cavities of the heart were found to be completely filled with clot of dark venous blood, and the mitral valve and cardiac tendons were cartilaginous and an earthy deposit was found in them. The lungs were in a state of great congestion and partly emphysematous on the anterior aspect.

Abdomen.

The abdominal viscera were quite healthy but there was a large quantity of serum in the cavity of the peritoneum.

Lower Extremities.

The legs and feet were very edematous

1865

August 18

Was brought to the Asylum today from 34 Gylefield Street Glasgow and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to the West Parish.

She is thirty years of age, married, was formerly employed as a Steam Room weaver and is a Protestant.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted one week and the cause is said to be the burning of an infant child which died in consequence. She is suicidal but not dangerous to others. No hereditary tendency.

Her husband who accompanied her to the Asylum say that her mind has been more or less affected ever since the burning of her child three years ago; that about a week ago she had a quarrel with her neighbours, and that five days ago she became incoherent and maniacally excited. For the last five days she has slept none except for an hour on the night before admission, and for the same length of time she has taken almost no food. At times she was quiet and at other times very excited.

On admission she was quiet and answered questions coherently but her memory is much impaired. She cannot tell the age of her child and has to be asked questions several times before giving any reply. Her body was dirty and covered with vermin and there were several marks of discoloration on her arms and legs caused by restraining her while excited.

Bodily health and condition ordinary

a. 13 Yesterday she refused all food and had to be fed by means of the stomach pump. She was quiet till 4 o'clock, when she became much excited, after a time she became quiet and slept for about two hours. Today she still refused food & was fed.

a. 22 She has for some days taken her food hardly but is stupid, confused and restless.

September 1 She is still restless and confused, wanders about and when spoken to seems not to comprehend what is said to her.

a. 18 There is little or no mental improvement, she sometimes asks to be let away.

October 1 She is quite demented she tears her clothes, and when spoken to, seems not to be aware she is doing it.

November 7 She now sleeps well at night and has commenced to work a little but she is absent in mind and has to be constantly directed.

Admitted 12th August 1885

Catherine Baird Miller or Currie 1865

August 21

She was brought to the Asylum today from 118 Castlebank Street Partick by a Police constable and other two men and admitted as a private patient.

She is forty three years of age, married, is a shipkeeper and belongs to the Church of Scotland.

This is set down as her second attack of insanity, the former attack having occurred eight years ago, but she is known to have been at least three times previously in this Asylum. The present attack has lasted sixteen days, and the cause is said to be premature birth of child and loss of blood. She is dangerous to those but not suicidal, and a sister is said to have been insane.

Thirteen days ago her husband returning from his work found her lying on the floor with a large quantity of blood about her and also a premature child beside her. Since then she has been maniacally excited and before admission was violent and destructive, talked constantly and incessantly, shouting and swearing at all around her, for several nights she has slept none and has taken little or no food.

On admission she was very much excited, swearing and using abusive language towards every one she saw, she also tried to strike and when prevented kicked at any person within her reach. Her arms were much discoloured and her wrists were abraded from having been tied to restrain her before admission.

Bodily health fair: condition ordinary.

She slept little during the night; today she is kept in bed, and requires to have an attendant constantly with her. She is very restless and noisy.

September 1

She is restless, noisy and incoherent and seldom sleeps now at night.

She continues noisy and very disorderly. She fancies that another patient in C.8 is the fever.

October 14

There is no mental improvement. She says she gets no food, curses and swears and today her language is very obscene.

18

She is more quiet and sleeps better at night. She is still somewhat disorderly and says she can get no food.

November

She was today taken home by her husband and dismissed

Relieved

Admitted 21st August 1865

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August 26

Was brought to the Asylum today from Crofton, the Dumbarton and admitted as a proper patient chargeable to Dumbarton Parish.

She is forty five years of age, Widowed was formerly employed as a Hawker, is a Roman Catholic and can neither read nor write.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted four weeks and the cause is unknown. She is dangerous to others but not suicidal. She had a sister insane.

Prior to admission she was delusive - fancied that people watched her while she followed her occupation. She fancied that the Captain of the "Iona" wanted to know her secret, and that he stopped the steamer to do so but was prevented by the passengers. She also imagined that she got poison in her food and refused to eat for some time before admission, and was violent to her son and daughter and broke furniture. Her daughter who accompanied her to the Asylum says that she quarrelled and made a disturbance in a Shakespear shop and was taken to the Police Office, where she has been for the last two days.

On admission she was at first quiet, mentioned the delusions stated above and also that on the night before admission she heard men putting up a scaffold, and that there was a rope in her cell in the Police Office with which she was to be hung. After being put to bed she became very restless and was violent towards the Attendant.

Bodily health and condition ordinary.

- 27 She slept none during the night and was very violent in her conduct. Today she is restless, incoherent and very delusive.

September 1

She continues to be noisy and restless and fancies she hears her relations about the house. She rambles a great deal in conversation.

- 16

She is inconstant, restless and very disorderly constantly annoying the other patients. Last night she burnt her room and scalded her right hand in it.

October 8

She is dangerous, destructive, and very disorderly she puts saliva in her hands and throws it on the Attendant and Medical Officer. She eats a large quantity of food and is never satisfied.

November 1

She is noisy and very destructive, after tears her bed and body clothing last night although she was dressed in canvas she tore the lining out. She shows the rags she makes, and fancies she is doing work.

Admitted 26th August 1865

1865

August 29

Was brought to the Asylum today by her son from Brownbank Villa Maryhill and admitted as a private patient. She is fifty six years of age, widowed, is in comfortable circumstances and belongs to the Church of Scotland.

She has had several attacks of insanity and been previously confined in Hartnacres and Morningside Asylums. The first attack came about twenty years ago. The present attack has lasted eight days. She is dangerous to others but not suicidal. A homicidal tendency.

Prior to admission she was eccentric, restless and incoherent. She slept none, wandered up and down the house night and day and talked incessantly. She also threatened to take the lives of those in the house with her.

On admission she was very restless, wandering and incoherent in her language. She had no great many demands to make but the most particular request was to have snuff and whisky.

Bodily health feeble. Condition reduced. She sleeps pretty well during the night, but today is restless talkative and incoherent.

September 3

She is very restless and incoherent. Last night she would not sleep in bed but got up and drew her bed about the room.

* 16 There is no mental improvement; she is disorderly and constantly in mischief. Last night she wet her room and today her right eye is a little inflamed.

October 4

Her disorderly and has to be dressed in canvas to keep her from abusing herself. This morning she carried away a shoe belonging to another patient and kept it rolled up in the skirt of her dress.

November

She is restless, incoherent, and destructive. She is constantly asking for snuff and whisky.

Admitted 29th August 1885

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1875

Sept. 6

Was brought to the Asylum today by her brother from 34 Helvington Street Glasgow and admitted as a private patient.

She is fifty one years of age, single, formerly took charge of her brother home and belongs to the United Presbyterian Church.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted six weeks, and the cause is hereditary tendency and domestic trouble - a brother of the patient destroyed himself with a pen knife. She is suicidal but not dangerous to others.

Prior to admission she was very melancholy and depressed, she said that she had committed sin and was afraid she would not be pardoned.

On the 23rd of August last she left home and walked about all night and the following day and did not come home till 8 o'clock in the evening; on Friday 25th she was found in the water closet with her throat cut, and the blood running from it. Since then she has been watched night and day to prevent her destroying herself.

On admission she was very depressed and had a melancholy look. She could with effort be got to look up or speak, and any reply she made was in a mere whisper. The wound on her throat is in a state of suppuration with a little suppuration.

Bodily health fair; condition reduced.

* 7 She was quiet but slept none during the night. Today she is still very depressed but has taken her food pretty well.

* 18 Since last report she has slept well at night and was removed to G. I. She could not sleep here on account of being afraid of something, and had to be taken back to the Infirmary.

October 3 She has had several attacks of bronchitis with cough and urgent distress. She is very depressed and constantly in bed. The wound on the throat is healed.

* 15 She is still confined to bed and has a cough. She is depressed and somewhat irritable, and says that the medicine is the cause of her cough.

November 25 The depression continues she sometimes reads her bible but will not look at any other book. She cannot be induced to get out of bed.

* 25 She has been out of bed for the last three days and has done a little sewing. She is still depressed and seldom speaks.

December 8 She is very much improved. She is very quiet but converses rarely. She has still at times little attacks of depression.

* 14 She was today dismissed. — Cured

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Admitted 6th September 1885

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1875

Sept. 12

Was brought to the Asylum today from Greenock Police Office (Her residence was New Dock Lane) and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to Greenock Parish.

She is sixty three years of age, widowed, is a Protestant and was employed as a housewife. This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted eight days, and the cause is said to be drinking. She is neither suicidal nor dangerous to others. No hereditary tendency.

Prior to admission she was greatly excited constantly muttering and wandering about her cell, she tore off and destroyed her clothes and was with difficulty prevented from going about in a state of nudity. The day before admission she stated that she was then married but was not present at the ceremony & two days ago was so outrageous that it was necessary to use constraint.

On admission she was rather excited and incoherent, fancied she heard the voices of her friends and persons she knew also that she saw persons who were not present and was in great dread of being injured.

Her bodily health is feeble and condition reduced; the legs and arms are much dislocated and contracted.

Sept. 13 She slept none during the night and was very restless and noisy.

Sept. 18 She continues restless and noisy and seems quite bewildered. She fancies that she sees people coming out of the roof and walls of her room.

October 3 For some time past she slept well at night up till two nights ago when she became restless and noisy. Her tongue is dry and furrowed and she is constantly crying for water. She has吞下 three small alumina powders.

Oct. 26 She is now quiet but too weak to walk and she is much exhausted from her former exertions.

November 11 She is now quiet and orderly and has begun to employ her time sewing in G.L. to which she has been removed.

December 12 She continues to be sedentary, quiet and orderly and is now very well mentally.

Dec. 23 She was today dismissed.

Elizabeth Rhodes a McLellan Ad. 32

Sept. 18

Was brought to the Asylum today by her husband from 216 New City Road Glasgow and admitted as a private patient.

She is thirty two years of age, married, is a United Presbyterian, and was formerly occupied as a Teacher.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted six years, and the cause is hereditary tendency, her mother is eccentric and her mother's brother's brother was insane and died in an Asylum. She is both suicidal and dangerous to others.

Prior to admission she was depressed and melancholy with occasional fits of violence and excitement. At times she was absolutely treacherous. She fancied that people called her a dog and that every body was unkindly to her. She was violent to her husband and unable to do any household duty, throwing food and other things about the house. She picked down her child fancying he was going through the neighbours spreading false reports about her character.

On admission she was quiet and had melancholy aspect. She spoke now unbroken, and her language then was quite coherent. She said she did not know where she was but suspected she was in an Asylum of some kind.

Bodily health feeble condition reduced

She slept little during the night but was quiet. She has taken food pretty well.

October 1

She continues depressed and melancholy but has not been excited since admission. She employs her time sewing.

Oct. 28

This morning she was much excited and at times crying but could not tell why.

November 7

She is still very depressed but continues to be incoherent. Her bodily health is feeble and she is much troubled with flatulence.

Nov. 23

Today she attacked another patient striking her a severe blow on the face.

Admitted 18th September 1875

1876

Sept. 26

She was brought to the Asylum today from Hitchcroman Castle by her brother and sister and admitted as a private patient.

She is twenty nine years of age, single is a Clergyman's daughter and belongs to the Church of Scotland.

This is the first attack of insanity, and has lasted ten years, during part of which time she was under treatment in the Asylum. Cause unknown. She is neither suicidal nor dangerous to others. She had an attack of insanity.

Prior to admission she was violent, very restless and incoherent constantly talking and gesticulating. Among other things she said, when the bedroom door was locked, a black ghost, the evening of souls came into the room.

On admission she was very restless and took no notice of anything that was said to her but kept constantly talking and at times springing suddenly forward and bursting out her hands to have her pulse felt. Her language was gentle, incoherent, wandering and had no meaning whatever.

Oct. 27

Bodily health indifferent condition good. She was restless and noisy during the night and slept only two hours.

October 2

She is dirty in her habits and is violent and destructive. Yesterday she tore her dress and last night was noisy and broke a butter porcher chamberpot.

" 17

She is still at times dirty in her habits and often noisy and restless at night.

November 6

Her habits have improved but she is still dangerous; today she attacked an attendant, struck her on the face and tried to kick her.

29

Admitted 26th September 1870

Catherine Murray or Bell Oct 24

1875

Sept. 29

Was brought to the Asylum today from Loran Workhouse and admitted as a Pauper patient chargeable to Loran Parish.

She is twenty nine years of age, married, formerly resided at 13 Cumberland Lane, and is a Roman Catholic.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted three days and the cause is unknown. She is dangerous to others but not suicidal. No hereditary tendency.

Prior to admission she was excited, incoherent and refused food. She had delusions, - fancied that her child had been murdered, that her neighbours had conspired against her and that her husband was an evil spirit. While in Loran Workhouse she was violent and destructive; she cleared her prayer book to pieces and attempted to bite those about her.

On admission she was very restless and obstinate, she rolled her body to & fro and kept constantly repeating the words. Blessed Jesus and blessed savion. She said there was nothing wrong with her mind, would not allow herself to be called Bell and said that that name had been her ruin.

Bodily health and condition ordinary.

The only slept about an hour last night. She has taken nothing since admission and today was fed by means of the Stomach Pump.

She continues to refuse food, saying that she does not require it. She resists so much that it is found necessary to feed her through the nostrils by means of the Stomach pump.

* 13 She has now commenced to eat her food, but will only take certain things; persisting that she does not require food.

November 1
She now takes the ordinary diet of the house but is very obstinate and contradictory. She says that there is nothing wrong with her mind and that she should never have been here.

" 26 Last night she became excited, attacked and tore the night dress of another patient and attempted to bite her. Today she is still excited and dangerous.

Admitted 29th September 1885

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1865

Nov 24

Sept. 30

Was brought to the Asylum today from 78 Old Darnell and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to the City Poor Glasgow. She is twenty four years of age, married. was formerly occupied as a boot binder, and is a Protestant.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted ten days, cause stated as unknown but she is much reduced from sucking her infant child. She is neither suicidal nor dangerous to others. Nothing is known as to hereditary tendency.

Prior to admission her looks were dull and melancholy; she said she was to be burned in hell fire for not being good to her husband; that she has seen the devil and that he says that she is to be punished by him.

On admission she had a dull absent expression of countenance and could not be got to look up or speak. She was in a wretched condition with dirt and vermin so much so that it was found necessary to have her head shaved and all her clothes burned.

Her bodily health feels condition reduced, and she is very anaemic.

October 1

She was very restless during the night. Her breasts were hard but she had them foreisted and they are now softer.

" 11

Last night she became excited, talked and sung loud songs, and was so noisy that she had to be removed from the infirmary to another.

" 18

She has not been excited since last report, but otherwise there is little improvement. She sits all day with her head bent forward, never speaks and seems to have no desire whatever.

November

There is little change mentally. Her bodily health and condition are much improved.

December 5

She is depressed and listless, speaks now, takes fits of crying fits, and sits with her face in her hands supported on the table.

Admitted 30th September 1885

Margaret Gillies Oct. 55

October 10

Was brought to the Asylum today from Harthill by the Inspector of Poor Schools and admitted as a Pauper Patient.

She is fifty five years of age, single, was formerly employed as a Shopkeeper and sewer and is a Protestant.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted for six months and the cause is unknown. She is neither suicidal nor dangerous to others. No hereditary tendency.

Prior to admission she was delusive; fancied a murdered barn was in her house, that she continually heard its wailing, and that her neighbors had serious intentions of doing her great wrong. She was very restless, frequently wandered at night to Harthill Schoolhouse where she thought she heard sounds of murder coming from, but could see nothing.

On admission she was restless and very anxious to get away, she said she had no need to be here for she was able and willing to work for herself. She does not talk about her delusions but when spoke to about them says that she heard sounds both day and night and that she was subject to hallucinations.

Bodily health ordinary. Condition good.

* 5 She was quiet, but often awoke during the night. She has taken her food well and is now employed knitting.

* 11 She slept more last night on account of hearing cry as if from some person being illused.

* 28 She is quiet orderly and very industrious, but is often annoyed both night and day by sounds which she fancies she hears.

November 9

Today she says she thinks the house is coming down, because she hear such loud noises in different places. Her in good bodily health.

* 25 She is irritable today and anxious to get away. She quarreled with the attendant and told her that she made a god of her keys.

December

She is often much annoyed at night with cry as of people being murdered. She is industrious and generally quiet and orderly. Bodily health good.

Admitted 1st October 1876

185

October 7

Was brought to the asylum today from Alton parish of Londonderry, Tyrone, by the Inspector of Poor, and admitted as a pauper patient.

She is sixty seven years of age, widow, was formerly occupied as a pinfitter, and belongs to the Established Church of Scotland.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted one week, and the cause is clear of poverty. She is suicidal, but not dangerous to others. No hereditary tendency.

Prior to admission she was poor and helpless and her memory was completely gone, she could not remember the day of the week nor any event, however recent its occurrence. She was afraid of coming to work and always went about in rags although she had plenty of bed and body clothes in the house. She frequently threatened to destroy herself, and on Sunday last told her brother that he would never see her again, that she was wretched and could not live. A few days before admission she threw herself into an old pit containing fourteen feet of water and was rescued - nearly drowned.

On admission she talked in a silly and wandering manner, and could give little or no account of herself. Her legs and arms were much discoloured but no fractured bones could be detected. She says that the discolourations were caused by people pulling her up out of a hole with strings.

Bodily health fair. Condition reduced.

She has been confined to bed since admission, but she takes her food pretty well. She is always quiet at the Medical visits but at other times she occasionally uses bad language towards the attendants.

She is weak minded and talks in a silly childlike manner. She is generally quiet and orderly.

There is no change whatever. When spoken to her answer always is - I am just about it.

November 1

She is very weak minded, easily agitated and seems to be incapable of doing any work.

December 13

Since last report she has been confined to bed from having caught a cold; her throat is very much inflamed upon the left side and she has great difficulty in swallowing; it has been swabbed several times with a solution of gentian violet gr XXX to the ounce.

22

Admitted 7th October 185

1875

October 7

Was brought to the Asylum today by the Inspector of Poor Bonhill Parish from the Parochial Lodging House Alexandria and admitted as a pauper patient.

She is stated to be sixty years of age but looks younger, a single, a Protestant and was formerly employed as a Mintfield Worker.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted eight day, and the cause is said to be violent bad temper. She is dangerous to others but not suicidal. Nothing is known of her relation; she is a native of Ireland.

Prior to admission she was wandering in her habits; and when spoken to replied in very obscene language. Her conduct was violent and she threatened to injure the Patron of the Parochial Lodging House with a knife.

On admission her language is rambling and full of delusion. She cannot tell her age and can give very little account of herself. She says that while in the Parochial Lodging House that they gave her boiling mineral to drink which caused all her skin to become black.

Bodily health and condition ordinary.

" 9

Since admission she has taken her food and slept well. Today she is restless, says that her head was squeezed by something last night, that she has no business here and must get away.

" 15

She is weak minded and rambling in conversation is at times irritable and anxious to get away.

November 9

She is delusive and very weak minded and cannot be induced to do any work.

December 12

She is very indolent in her habits, stands at and looks out of the window the greater part of the day and is very weak minded and irritable.

" 1

She says that there is a lassie from Bonhill outside the window crying about her companion and that she will get her parsoned.

" 2

Admitted 7th October 1875

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1866

October 16

Was brought to the Asylum today by Mr Clark her former employer from 115 Nelson St. Govanhill Glasgow and admitted as a private patient.

She is forty years of age, married, was formerly employed as a Domestic Servant and is a Protestant.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted two months, and the cause is said to be unknown but it would seem that she has not been altogether well since the birth of her child in April last. She is dangerous to others but not suicidal. No hereditary tendency.

Prior to admission she was restless and excited, moving about the house in her night dress and laughing and speaking to herself. She was dangerous to herself and others, illused her step daughter and destroyed articles in the house, and when prevented from doing as she wished, she became violent and threatening and cried at the top of her voice.

On admission she was restless and stupid constantly moved her body from side to side and talked incoherently. Her body and limbs were much discoloured, the second phalane of the little toe of the right foot was fractured - the tissues around it swollen, and there were two wounds on the left arm the result of burns.

Bodily health and condition ordinary.

- 17 She slept a little during the night and was quiet today she is restless and talkative.

- 20 Since last report she has been restless and had to sleep in a room at night. Last night she tore up her bed and bedcover, there was blood on the floor and walls of her room, her face was discoloured and swollen but no wounds were found on her body.

November 3

She continues restless, noisy & incoherent, and often washes herself both by night and day.

- 25 Since last report there has been symptoms of Paralysis. She has had ten drop doses of Nitrate of Casterides combined with Nit. Mus. Ton. And also Extract of Belladonna in half grain doses in the form of draughts, but the Convulsions still continue.

December 7

She has not wet herself for the last few nights. She walks up and down the gallery in a state apparently dementia, is curious to know everything that is going on and laughs in a silly manner when spoken to.

" 13

This morning about 9 o'clock she had an epileptic seizure with violent convulsions, vomiting and bleeding at the nose. The attack lasted about two and a half hours.

" 17

She had a slight seizure yesterday and one today, they have left her mind much impaired. She can comprehend nothing said to her, but when asked to repeat she says the same word again and again.

Admitted 16th October 1885

1865

October 14

Was brought to the Asylum today from Alexandria by the Inspector of the Bonhill and admitted as a pauper patient.

She is thirty one years of age, single was formerly employed as a print field worker and belongs to the Free Church.

This is the second attack of insanity has lasted six days and the cause unknown. Her former attack occurred three years ago and passed over without treatment. She is neither suicidal nor dangerous to others. No hereditary tendency.

Prior to admission she was very excited would not remain at home and required restraint. She also talked constantly and was quite incoherent.

On admission she was very restless, stupid and excited. She kept constantly moaning and talking and seemed to know nothing whatever of her position. In the night of her visiting she would often say that she was the Child of God, that she had formerly resided in the Beatties Church, and that she came here to get married.

Bodily health feeble; condition reduced. On her body there a large number of discolorations.

- 20 She was very restless during the night and could not be kept in bed. She was therefore bound in canvas to keep her warm. She had an attack of diarrhoea which has been checked by Atropine.

- 23 She is stupid, restless and sleeps very little. Yesterday she was violent kicking and striking the attendants.

- 30 She is now quiet and altogether greatly improved but her conversation is wandering; she says that she came here to get married.

November 1 Since last report she has relapsed. She is restless and stupid won't lie in bed at night and has to be dressed in canvas to keep her warm.

December 6 She is not so stupid but is still very restless constantly moaning as if in pain, is incoherent in language and disorderly in her conduct.

January 13 1866 This morning she is very stupid and required two women to dress her and it was found necessary to put on lockfist gloves to prevent her assaulting herself.

Admitted 19th October 1875

1865

October 23

Was brought to the Asylum today from Stirling Prison by the Inspector of Poor Camps and admitted as a Pauper Patient.

She is fifty nine years of age, single was formerly employed as a Domestic Servant and Mill-worker and is a Protestant.

She is the first attack of insanity, brother unknown, cause intemperance. She is said to be neither suicidal nor dangerous to others. Hereditary tendency not known.

Prior to admission she had a maniacal aspect and was constantly in a state of great mental excitement talking incessantly and incoherently. She fancied that twenty young women led on by some married women were conspiring against her. She had been three times before the present in Prison for breaches of the peace.

On admission she was somewhat restless and excited, and very talkative. Her language was wandering and incoherent and full of plot against her. She said that there was nothing wrong with her mind, but that the Sheriff of Stirlingshire & Mr. Thirton Inspector of Poor were insane she was sure.

Bodily health feeble. Condition reduced.

- 24 She laughed and talked to herself during the night and was incoherent to the night nurse. After getting out of bed she refused to wash or dress herself.

November 2

She now employs a good deal of her time during the day in delusion and rambles in conversation.

- 16 Since last report she has become disorderly interfering with the management of the other patients. She was noisy all last night, and today she is excited and her language quite incoherent.

- 23 Today she was quite maniacal, turning her head, body, and arms in all directions, and could not keep on her clothes. She had to be dressed in canvas and put into a room.

December

She is now much quieter and sleeps pretty well at night, but is still restless and disorderly in her conduct and incoherent in her language.

Admitted 23^d October 1865

1865

November 11

Was brought to the Asylum today by her brother from Boisling and admitted as a private patient.

She is thirty nine years of age, single, is a teacher and belongs to the Church of Scotland. This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted under one month, and the cause is over mental exertion. She is suicidal but not dangerous to others. No homicidal tendency.

Prior to admission she was melancholy and depressed and subject to violent paroxysms of excitement. She also seemed very suspicious and had an eager wish to die - said that she was an awful sinner and fancied that her soul was lost beyond redemption.

On admission she was depressed and miserable said that she was the most wicked woman in the world, that she had not done her duty, and that she could not live and was unable to die. She fancied that the newspapers were filled with reports of her awful crime, and asked if the Rev Mr McGregor of the Non Church had not told how wicked she was.

Body health feeble: condition reduced.

• 12 She was quiet but slept none during the night. Today she is anxious to know if her friends were calling to inquire for her and says she thinks they will never come to see her.

• 16 Today she is very unhappy; she slept none during the night being afraid another patient was going to set fire to the house. She has pain in riding urine, which is scanty and high colored, with a large deposit on standing.

• 25 Since last report she has had a diarrhoea, with hot hip bath and suppositories at night. Her urine is now more healthy and abundant. She is improved mentally, slept well last night and for the last two days has employed her time sewing a little.

December 1 She did not sleep well last night but can assign no cause for it. She continues to improve in daily employments and is anxious to know what Dr Mackintosh thinks of her case.

• 13 She is now very well mentally, she has also improved very much in her bodily health and condition since admission.

• 19 She was today dismissed. —

Janet Mc. Kay or Lindsay 20170

1865

November

Was brought to the Asylum today by her husband from 37 St Andrew St. Glasgow and admitted as a private patient.

She is seventy years of age, married, is the wife of an Insurance Agent and Factor and belongs to the Church of Scotland.

This is about the fortieth attack of insanity has lasted about three months, and the cause is intemperance. She is very suicidal and dangerous to others. Her father committed suicide.

She has been at least thirty-four times previously in this Asylum. (See Vol. XXIII page 324). At this time she has been away an unusually long period, having been dismissed on 13th April last. Her husband had taken a country house and used every means to wean her from her bad habits but without any ultimate good effect.

Before admission she was perfectly furious, striking all around her and threatened to take away her husband's life. She also threatened to commit suicide by taking arsenic and other means. Her husband's face was bleeding from an attack she had made upon him while bringing her to the Asylum.

On admission she was in a tremulous, confused state. She said she was a patient that there was nothing wrong with her mind, and was violent to all around her.

Bodily health feeble; condition reduced.

19

She was quiet during the night, but slept none and was very thirsty. Today she is confined to bed is very tremulous and has taken very little food.

December 2

She has been quiet and employed her time sewing for some days. Today she is confined to bed on account of having a slight attack of bronchitis.

Admitted 18th November 1865

1865

November 20

Was brought to the Asylum today from 269 Gallowgate Street Glasgow and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to the City Parish.

She is thirty one years of age, married, was formerly occupied as a Housewife and is a Protestant.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted ten days, and the cause is unknown. She is suicidal but not dangerous to others. No hereditary tendency.

Her husband who came with her to the Asylum says that since the death of her child in February last she has been depressed and that her mind has been getting weak; that for the last ten days she has slept none, and for three or four days has taken nothing but a little coffee.

She said that she was a great sinner, and that she tried to go out at the window and to set the bed on fire but could not tell why. She was very restless and her conversation was interrupted by incoherent mutterings.

On admission she was depressed, nervous and agitated; and seemed to be in great distress of mind and gave no reply when spoken to. When she was given her supper she would not eat, saying she could not for there was something in her throat. She was fed by means of the stomach pump.

Bodily health very feeble. Condition reduced.

- 21 During the night she was very restless and slept none. Today she refused food and was again fed by means of the stomach pump.

- 30 She takes her food pretty well. She is nervous, childish and afraid of bodily injury. Today she fancies her head is to be cut off and begs to be spared.

December 5

She has slept well for the last three nights but is restless during the day and in continual dread of bodily injury.

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Admitted 20th November 1865

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December 1

Was brought to the Asylum today from 6 Bright Street Glasgow and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to the City Parish.

She is thirty four years of age, single, was employed as a Millworker and is a Roman Catholic.

This is the first attack of insanity, duration set down as one week and cause unknown. She is dangerous to others but not suicidal. No known hereditary tendency.

The brother who accompanied her to the Asylum says that she has not been well mentally for upwards of three years. He says that she worked in the Glass Mill Darnhead along with her sister but she was very irritable and threatened to stick her sister with a knife which she used at her work, would not attend to her work, and tormented all the other workers. She has not been at work for the last three days.

She laboured under the delusion that her grandfather who has been dead many years appeared to her two days ago, and that he has left her twenty seven pounds a year for life. On account of the above delusion she refused to work.

In admission she was excited and violent scolding and threatening all sorts of violence. She could give no proper account of herself, said she was forty four years of age because she was born on Good Friday or Saint Patrick's Day and her whole conversation was very rambling.

Bodily health good. Condition reduced.

She slept five hours during the night. This morning she was noisy, but is now quiet and has taken her food well.

She is quiet and works during the day, at night she sleeps very little and often makes a noise by singing a number of songs.

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Admitted 1st December 1865

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December 4

Was brought to the Asylum today from 35 Canon Street Glasgow and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to the City Parish.

She is twenty four years of age, single, was occupied as a sewer and is a Roman Catholic.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted one month and the cause is unknown. She is suicidal but not dangerous to others. Nothing is known of her relations.

Prior to admission she was depressed, restless and incoherent in her language. Her parents are dead and she lived with Peter Waters and his wife at 35 Canon Street when she called Uncle and Aunt, and earned a living by sewing. The account they give of her is that six years ago she was taken into a convent at St. Mary's R.C. Chapel, Abercromby Street, Glasgow and lived there for five years and that since she has been depressed.

For a month past she has been very restless, unable to do any work and slept little at night, for the last four nights slept none, has taken no food for three days, two days ago threw herself over a two story window from which she received severe bodily injury.

On admission she seemed to be in great distress of body and mind. She was unable to walk on account of the injuries she had sustained in falling from the window and had to be carried in. She kept repeating a prayer making a distinct pause between each word and took no notice of anything said to her.

Both legs, near and around the ankle joints were discoloured and much swollen, she also complains of pain in the region of the left hip joint, but no fracture was detected. Bodily health very feeble. Condition extremely reduced.

She slept well during the night. She says there is a whale in her belly, has taken no solid food but drunk two cups full of milk. She could not pass water and was visited last night and this morning by means of the catheter. Pulse very small.

She slept only one hour last night. She can take no solid food and whatever fluids she takes, even water is shortly afterwards vomited. She complains of great pain all over the region of the Abdomen, the pulse at the wrist cannot be detected and she seems to be in a dying state.

She slept now during the night and refused everything but cold water. The vomiting still continued and this morning at 9:45 she died.

Admitted 1st December 1865

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December 6

Was brought to the Asylum today from Staly Woodend by Tollcross and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to Old Monkland Parish.

She is thirty years of age, married, was employed as a housewife and is a Protestant.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted eight days and the cause is unknown. She is both suicidal and dangerous to others. No hereditary tendency.

Her husband who accompanied her to the Asylum say that about a year since she had a fever and that three months ago she gave birth to a stillborn child. Before admission she was excited in her manner, talked incoherently and was very querulous. She has taken no food for three days, was violent and wished to take the place of her husband and children.

On admission she was maniacally excited, was in great fear of bodily injury, and could with difficulty be restrained.

Bodily health indifferent condition good.

• 7 She did not sleep during the night, was restless and very noisy, so much so that she had to be kept in a room all night. Today she is quiet, but very stupid and unable to answer the simplest question.

• 11 She is very stupid never speaks, but has a habit of placing her hands on one shoulder and looking steadfastly into their face as if wishing to make some inquiry.

• 25 Since last report she has improved very much. She is now industrious, quiet and orderly, and is very anxious to get home.

• 30 She was today dismissed. —

Chired.

Admitted 6th December 1865

Oct 24

1865

December

Was brought to the Asylum today from Gowan Poorhouse and admitted as a Proper Patient chargeable to Gowan Parish.

She is twenty four years of age, single, was formerly occupied as a servant at 17 Flybank Street, and is a Protestant.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted a few days, and the cause is unknown. She is dangerous to herself but not to others. Hysterical tendency not known.

The history given of the patient by the Gowan Poorhouse nurse who brought her to the Asylum is that she has been in the habit of annoying a person who formerly made love to her by often ringing his door bell; that on Wednesday night last about 11 o'clock she was caught ringing the bell and taken to the Police Office from where on the following day she was taken to Gowan Poorhouse, in which place she has been for two days, and that this morning about 6 o'clock she leaped through a Plate Glass Window, whereby she dislocated her left arm at the shoulder joint, sprained the right ankle and received several incised wounds. She is said to be a Nymphomaniac.

On admission she was unable to walk, was far from all excitement and talked quite coherently. She said the reason she leaped through the window was to obtain her liberty.

Patient complains of pain in the left shoulder joint and the parts around it are swollen, but the dislocation has been reduced. The right ankle joint is also stiff and swollen. On the right arm there are two incised wounds, also one on the left thumb and one on the sole of the right foot. The nurse who accompanied her told the matron that she had had connection with several men before being taken to Gowan Poorhouse.

Bodily health and condition with the exception of the above good.

- 10 She was quiet and slept well during the night. Today she has taken her food well but is confined to bed on account of the injuries received before admission.

- 18 She has recovered from the injuries received before admission, was in C. L. for ten days, but had to be taken back to the P. H. to be under observation on account of her milder, depressed state. She has altered since admission.

December 21

Was brought to the Asylum today from Cowan Poorhouse and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to Cowan Parish.

She is twenty one years of age, single, formerly resided at 11 Albert Street Cowan, was a domestic servant, and is a Protestant.

This is the first attack of insanity, it is said to have lasted four days, and the cause is unknown. She is dangerous to herself and others. Hereditary tendency not known.

Little is known of the patient before admission. The Cowan Poorhouse nurse who came with her to the Asylum said that yesterday she was taken to the Poorhouse from her sister's house 11 Albert Street, where she had been since she became mad. When taken into the Poorhouse the nap of her neck was raw from the effects of a blister that she was noisy, incoherent and excited, was dangerous to herself & others, fancied she was Mr. Richard and refused food.

On admission she was restless, noisy, and quite incoherent, she talked without intermission but all in garrulous. She would not remain in bed nor keep on her clothes when up and had to be dressed in canvas to prevent her assaulting herself, she also refused to take any food but the attendants managed to feed her.

Bodily health and condition

She slept for about four hours, took off her canvas dress but did not destroy anything. She would not take her breakfast and was fed by the Attendants. Is quite incoherent.

Admitted 21st December 1865

Margaret McFarlane or Sharer Adm'd

1865

December 29

Was brought to the Asylum today from Govan Poorhouse and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to Govan Parish.

She is forty years of age, married, is a Protestant and formerly resided at 87 Bonnace Street.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted a few days and the cause is unknown. She is neither suicidal nor dangerous to others. Hereditary tendency not known.

Prior to admission she was delusive, said that she must be offered up as a sacrifice, - that she was annoyed by spirits, - fancied that she was under the influence of mesmerism, that there was sulphur in her food, - that her husband had evil designs upon her, and was worthless, excited and sleepless.

On admission she talked quite coherently said that she had a feeling of numbness and prickling in her arms and legs and thought she would be the better of a blister on the back of her neck, for that she had had one nine years ago when a brother died and it did her good. She believed said she got something in her food which injured her, and that for one thing there was a great deal of sulphur in it.

She is very anaemic, bodily health feeble and condition reduced.

Admitted 29th December 1875

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December 24

This patient was brought to the Asylum today by her son from 514 St. Vincent St. Glasgow and admitted as a private patient.

She is sixty years of age, Widowed, is a Reformed Presbyterian and resided with her son.

This is the second attack of insanity, has lasted ten days, and the cause is said to be weakness of body from cough and pain in side. She is not suicidal but is dangerous and destructive. She has a son at present under treatment in this Asylum.

Prior to admission she laboured under hallucinations and illusions, was restless, incoherent and talked incessantly. She fancied that she was Herod, and that she was eaten up of worms; that a son was Prince Charles Stewart, that others of her family were devils, and that she constantly saw little devils which annoyed her greatly. She also slept very little, refused food, was destructive and much excited.

On admission she was very restless, talkative, incoherent and delusive. She fancied she knew every person she saw and had some manna to give them.

Body health very feeble: condition reduced.

Admitted 29th December 1885

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January 10

This patient was brought to the Asylum today by her son from 157 Holm Street Glasgow and admitted as a private patient.

She is thirty eight years of age, married, belongs to the Established Church and was formerly employed as a housekeeper.

She has been eight times previously under treatment in this Asylum. The present attack has lasted two days and the cause is said to be brain fever. She is dangerous to others but not suicidal. No hereditary tendency.

Prior to admission she was delusivo, incoherent and wandering in her conversations. She was suspicious of and violent towards her relatives, and refused to take food. She also had some fits similar to Epilepsy.

On admission she had a depressed and melancholy appearance, and was absolutely taciturn. She seemed to understand what was said to her, but every attempt to get her to speak failed.

Bodily health very feeble: condition relapsed.

She slept none during the night but was quiet. Today she is confined to bed and won't speak nor look at anything. She refused to take any food but allowed the attendants to feed her.

15 She still requires to be fed, she was excited for some time last night, found that another of the patients was a man and would have her put out.

April 14

Admitted 10th January 1866

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1866

January 16

This patient was brought to the Asylum today from the City Workhouse and admitted as a Pauper chargeable to the City Parish. She formerly resided at 592 Gallowgate Street Glasgow.

She is twenty eight years of age, single, is a Protestant and was formerly employed as a nurse.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted four days, and the cause is said to be unknown, but she is subject to Epilepsy. She is dangerous to those but not suicidal. No known hereditary tendency.

Prior to admission there was great maniacal excitement and incoherency. She refused food, was extremely violent and took at everything and everybody about her. Two days before admission she was taken to the City Workhouse by two policemen who had to be secured in a cell to prevent her injuring the other inmates.

On admission she was much excited; quick and incoherent in her language. She could not give any account of herself but when spoken to, said in an angry and menacing tone of voice that she was a serpent.

Physically healthy: Condition reduced. On her legs and arms were found a number of scratches and discolouration; also a large tear upon the knee, the result of an injury received during an epileptic seizure.

A number of scratches and discolourations were found upon her arms and legs, and a large scar upon her knee. Physically healthy: Condition reduced.

Admitted 16th January 1866

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1866

January 7

Was brought to the Asylum today from 53 Brown Street, Bridgeton and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to the County, Pa.

She is forty four years of age, single, is a Protestant and was formerly employed as a Power Loom Weaver.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted about two months, and the cause is unknown. She is suicidal, but not dangerous to others. No hereditary tendency.

Prior to admission she had a melancholy and dejected aspect, gazed abstractedly from her and laughed apparently without any object; was idle, often refused to work and talked in an unconnected way. She often wept and said she had thoughts of drowning herself as she had no home, no friends and no peace of mind. She also laboured under the delusion that she was covered with vermin which were devouring her and that she could not get clear of them.

On admission she was depressed and somewhat confused, but talked pretty clearly. She said she felt unable to do her work but could not tell why. Four months ago the index finger of her right hand was injured and amputated at the second joint; this she said was sent as a judgment upon her. When spoken to about her delusions she says she only thought it.

Bodily health fair. Condition reduced.

Admitted 17th January 1866

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January 7

Was brought to the Asylum today from 116 Duke Street Glasgow and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to the City Parish.

She is thirty six years of age, married, is a Protestant and was formerly employed as a Housewife.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted one week and the cause is unknown. She is suicidal and dangerous to others. No hereditary tendency as far as known.

Prior to admission she had the idea that she was a lost sinner and that there was no hope of salvation for her. She imagined that she saw Hell fire and the Devil constantly before her and threatening to destroy her. She was generally melancholy but at times very excitable, often singing Hymns & Psalms and threatened to throw herself over the window.

About four months ago she had a stillborn child, since which period she has been in indifferent bodily health, and unable to do her usual household duties.

On admission she was very depressed and melancholy. She kept constantly moaning and laboured under the idea that she could not live. She also seemed to be in great dread of every one near her and implored that they would not do anything to her.

Widely health very feeble: Condition reduced.

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Admitted 17th January 1866

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January 24

Was brought to the Asylum today from 203 Main Street Anderson and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to Parson, Mich.

She is thirty one years of age, married, is a Protestant, and was formerly occupied as a Housewife & Cotton Factory Worker.

She was under treatment in this Asylum six years ago. The present attack has lasted two weeks and the cause is unknown. She has a tendency to be suicidal and is dangerous to others. Hereditary tendency not known.

Prior to admission she was very delusive, fancied that people spoke to her out of the walls of the house, that poison got into her food in some unknown way, that people hunted her on the streets and spoke ill of her, that her clothes were being constantly taken away by her neighbors and other substituted for them, and that her husband when he came home at night was his brother or some other person.

Her husband who accompanied her to the Asylum, says that on Sunday last she was much excited, attacked and threatened to injure her daughter with a table knife, and that when he spoke to her, she seized the poker and attacked him with it.

He also says that she is five months advanced in pregnancy, and that she is always ill when she is in that state. Her appearance is that of a woman in whom extra-gestation has gone on for nearly six months.

On admission she was free from all excitement and somewhat depressed. Her language was absent but undecided and hesitating.

Bodily health ordinary: condition good.

She slept well during the night and has taken her food. She is very quiet and seldom speaks to any one.

February 3

She is quiet and makes no complaints, but when questioned her delusions are found to be the same as before admission.

Admitted 24th January 1886

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February 2

Was brought to the Asylum today from 5 Cameron Street Glasgow and admitted as a Pauper Patient - chargeable to Barony Parish.

She is twenty two years of age, single, was formerly employed as a millworker and is a Roman Catholic.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted for twelve months and the cause is not known. She is both suicidal and dangerous to others. No hereditary tendency.

Prior to admission she was stubborn, obstinate and very unwilling to speak. She fancied that her relations were leagued against her, trying to injure her in various ways. Said that her relations cursed her and that they put their fingers in the fire and made faces out of the fire at her.

Her mother said she had to leave her work for the voices that were in her head, and for the last three months she has sat in the house and her chief occupation has been combing her hair. She slept little or none at night, was at times very violent, threatening to strike and using horribly obscene language. On Sunday last 28th Jan. she attempted to leap over the winter.

On admission she was depressed, absent, and very unwilling to speak. She said she had to leave her work on account of sounds in her head, and voices telling her to stop and put on her bonnet. The parts around the left eye were discoloured, the cause of which she said was a blow from her brother.

Body health and condition good.

She slept well during the night. Today she has taken her food well, is quiet, and somewhat depressed.

Admitted 2nd February 1866

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Margaret Lyon or Mc Lachlan Adm'd

1866

February 6

Was brought to the Asylum today by her husband and brother in law from Hamelburgh County of Kent and admitted as a private patient.

She is fifty years of age, married, is the wife of a Carpenter and belongs to the Free Church.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted for eight years off and on, and the cause is hereditary, her mother having been frequently insane. She is dangerous to others but not suicidal.

Prior to admission she was excited unsettled and suspicious; her language was suspicious and she had absurd and changing fancies - she imagined that she was to be shot or stabb'd by people coming into the house, and that she heard the devil whispering into her ear to come to her bed in hell. She also thought that she was to be poison'd by her friends, could not rest and wished to escape from them by the windows. She was violent, destructive and dirty in her habits - constantly soiling herself, tore and destroyed her clothes books &c, attacked her relatives and was bound hand and foot to restrain her.

On admission she was peevish and talkative, she spoke to every person she saw and fancied she was personally acquainted with them. Her language to the servants was very rude and insolent, she talked incessantly and interfered with every thing going on in the Infirmary ward into which she was placed. She fancied she was going to be shot and begged that it would not be done.

Bodily health very poor. Condition much relaxed
She slept none during the night and was very noisy. Today she is extremely disorderly and talkative.

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Admitted 6th February 1866

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February 12

The patient was brought to the Asylum today by her brother from their School House Dunoon.

She is twenty one years of age, single, is a Parochial schoolmaster's daughter, and belongs to the Church of Scotland.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted under three months and the cause is hereditary, her mother having weak minded and her maternal grandfather having been insane for years.

She is said to be neither violent nor dangerous to others, but has been very unmanageable for the last ten days.

Prior to admission she was very restless and noisy, she slept little and for the last two days has taken almost no food. She refused to answer questions or speak to anyone, but kept repeating passages of the scriptures of Shakespeare and of Milton. She had numerous delusions - fancied that her relations were conspiring against her, also that she was the Queen of Spain, the Virgin Mary, the Lady Godiva, Peer Rosamond &c.

When brought to the Asylum she would not answer any question put to her was very obstinate, and talked incessantly in a loud measured tone of voice - saying she was tempted by the devil but that he would not prevail against her, and that the power of the Prince of the air was against her. She very often repeated the words - the noble lady married to the Moor, and said I am the Virgin Mary.

Bodily health and condition ordinary, tongue coated, pulse quick, Catarrhia present.

13 She slept none and had to be held in bed for the greater part of the night, she was violent and threw out of the night nurses upon the floor.

18 She is extremely restless and unmanageable requiring an attendant constantly with her. Her delusions run very high and she desires to be worshipped.

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Admitted 12th February 1881

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February 12

Was brought to the Asylum today from 57 Garnet Road Glasgow and admitted as a Pauper Patient chargeable to the City Parish.

She is sixteen years of age, single, has no occupation and is a Protestant.

She has been insane from infancy, the cause is not known and no relations are known to be insane. She is neither suicidal nor dangerous to others.

She is a simple, childish, silly girl with an idiotic expression of countenance.

Prior to Admission she was quite unable to take care of herself and had to be taken from the school on account of the children annoying her.

In admission she was in a very naked dirty state, her hair had to be shaved off and every thing that was on her burned to get rid of the vermin that were about her.

She was able to tell her name, said she could read the bibles and knot, but could not tell the name of the street she lived in. When being put to bed she became much alarmed and said her mother would be angry if she for going to bed so soon.

Bodily health poor: Condition reduced the skin on the trunk of the body is almost as black as that of a negro.

• 13

She slept well during the night, has taken her food well and seems much pleased with her position.

• 23

She is very quiet and has been employed doing a little knitting. Her head has had to be shaved on account of scabs caused by vermin.

March 10

She takes her food well, sometimes does a little work, and is quite happy & contented.

Admitted 12th February 1886

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February 17

Was brought to the Asylum today from 233 High Street Glasgow and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to City Parish.

She is sixty eight years of age, single, is a Protestant and was formerly employed as a Winder.

This is set down as the first attack of insanity has lasted one week and the cause is unknown. She is neither suicidal nor dangerous to others. No hereditary tendency so far as known.

Prior to admission she was in an agitated depressed state of mind, laboured under delusions believed that she was a great sinner, that the Lord had forgotten her and that the devil appeared to her during the night. She lived in a house by herself did not sleep at night and disturbed the neighbours by singing and dancing.

On admission she was agitated, and complained greatly of being taken from her own home so hurriedly. She is weak minded and delusive but talked coherently. She said she had seen in her face a month ago, that since then she has heard sounds in her head, and that there is something like a wheel going round in her head. She also says that thirty five years ago she was ill with a nervous complaint which affected her mind, and she is extremely anxious to know if ever she will get better.

She was found to be affected with prurige all over the trunk of the body and her clothes were covered with vermin. Bodily health feeble: condition much reduced.

18

She did not sleep any during the night but was quiet, she is very debilitated and complains of great weakness of body.

22

She slept well last night, but is at present labouring under an attack of erysipelas of the face. She says there is a sound like a railway train running through her head. Her sister called to inquire for her & he says that thirty three years ago she was a patient in the C.R.I. Asylum in Parliamentry Road.

March 18

The erysipelas has disappeared and she has been out of bed for the last three days. She is weakish, foolish and discontented.

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Admitted 17th February 1886

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1866

26th May 17

Was brought to the Asylum today from City Workhouse (she formerly resided at 148 North Hanover Street Glasgow) and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to City Parish.

She is twenty six years of age, single is a Protestant and was formerly occupied as a Servant.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted ten day and the cause is unknown. She is both suicidal and dangerous to others. No hereditary tendency so far as known.

The patient has been deaf for the last fourteen years, but up till two days ago is said to have understood what was said to her by signs. Before admission she was excited, restless noisy and violent, she also attempted to go over the window and required two persons to restrain her. She was taken to the City Workhouse on the day before admission where she was quite maniacal slept none and refused food.

On admission she was excited and very restless and noisy, she kept working with her hands about her dress and had her breast all exposed and her clothes in disorder. She required an attendant constantly with her and at time one person was quite unable to restrain her.

A number of discolourations were found upon her arms, and scaw over her knees. Bodily health very feeble. Condition reduced.

18 She slept none during the night, and was very restless and excited; she will take no food and when anything is put into her mouth she spits it out. She was fed by means of the stomach pump.

19 She slept for 5 hours last night and is now quieter and much excreted. She allowed the nurse to feed her, swallowing the food when put into her mouth.

20 21 She is evidently labouring under an attack of pneumonia. There is a livid flush on the cheeks, pulse quick, breathing frequent and short with moist rales but no cough or expectoration. A particular examination of her chest cannot be made on account of the state of her mind. She seems always to be in fear of bodily injury.

Admitted 17th February 1886

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February 19

Was brought to the Asylum today from the Central Police Office Glasgow and admitted as a female patient chargeable to City Parish.

She is nineteen years of age, married, is a Protestant, and was formerly employed as a servant.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted four days and the cause is unknown. She is neither suicidal nor dangerous to others. Hereditary tendency not known.

Prior to admission she was taken to the Police Office, where she was found in a very highly excited state, frequently starting and screaming and loudly saying that she was a bird. She also thought that she was in Newcastle.

In addition she had an excited appearance, was restless and somewhat incoherent, and her mind was to some extent preoccupied. She labour under delusions of hearing, said she heard the voice of a man whom she knew at a great distance.

Said in a狂暴的 agitated manner that her mother was stabbed yesterday in her place and then buried and that the account of it was in this day's newspaper also that the ringing of bells this morning told her of the burial of the body.

She was found a number of discolorations upon her arms and legs, a scar upon her knee, and a foul ulcer upon her tongue the result of a wound inflicted by her teeth while excited. Bodily health good.

She slept well during the night, but today is confused and restless, she says she hears her husband down stairs calling on her and she is very anxious to see him.

She is much improved especially in her bodily health, the discolorations have disappeared and the ulcer upon the tongue has healed. She has commenced to be industrious, but is still delusive.

March 13

She continues to improve, is industrious and cheerful and her delusion have now nearly disappeared.

April 7

She is now very well mentally and makes herself very useful assisting in the work of the laundry. Her bodily health is also much improved.

May 17

She was today dismissed - cured.

Admitted 19th February 1776

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February 22

Was brought to the Asylum today from 3 Athole Terrace Queen's Park new Bldgs and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to Berchamstead Parish.

She is thirty four years of age, single is a Protestant and was formerly employed as a Domestic Servant.

She has been insane before, her age a first attack was about three years and she has been under treatment in Morningside and Belmont House Asylums, and altogether is said to have been in Asylums for ten years. The present attack has lasted two days and the cause is said to be unknown but evidently is from predisposition from previous attacks and troubling her mother who is now still having been insane. She is neither suicidal nor dangerous to others.

On admission she talked incoherently and incessantly, sometimes on religion, then swearing lay in her bed would not rise and could be induced to do anything asked of her. To one of the Physicians who examined her she said you are my father from below and he is dead.

On admission she talked and laughed to herself and took no notice of anything about her. When spoken to she seldom gave any reply but any answer she gave was either irrelevant or quite incoherent.

Bodily health and condition good.

She was restless for some time after going to bed over quiet and slept six hours. Today she was crying and when asked the reason said it was for her mother for she liked her real well.

March 3

She has improved very much is now quiet, orderly, and industrious, but rather depressed and somewhat weak minded.

- 12

She had commenced to be industrious, but has now given up work and is very irritable and abusive towards the attendants.

- 21

The irritability has gone off, she is now quiet and more contented, and has again begun to work.

April 4

She still continues to be industrious, but today was excited and quarrelsome, finding fault with everything and interfering with the servants and other patients.

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Admitted 22nd February 1886

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1866

March 1

Was brought to the Asylum today from 6 Margaret Street Glasgow and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to City Parish.

She is twenty years of age, single, is a protestant and was formerly occupied as a servant.

This is the second attack of insanity, has lasted two months and the cause is unknown. During her former attack she was under treatment in the Lunacy Ward City Workhouse from 1st June till 1st October 1866. She is both suicidal and dangerous to others. She had a cousin insane and under treatment in this Asylum.

On admission she had a peculiar, sullen, discontented appearance and was very unwilling to answer questions. She would do nothing, but said she was willing to work and would not be allowed. At times she was violent and threatening, at other times she would start suddenly from her seat and begin to dance and sing, and then she would as suddenly stop and weep, and say she was sorry for making a noise and fancied she would be taken to jail and hung for her conduct. She had to be constantly watched to prevent her from injuring herself and others; has repeatedly swallowed pins, needles and broken glass from her clothes, was always trying to get out and was violent to those who prevented her, at time she refused food at other times swallowed it in a hasty manner.

On admission she had a gloomy, discontented appearance and could scarcely be got to speak any. Her mother who accompanied her to the Asylum says she destroyed her clothes, refused food, & showed a number of recently inflicted lacerated wounds on her hands inflicted by the patients. She also states that a few days ago she swallowed a number of pins which are still in her body.

Body health fair. Condition ordinary
Catamenia irregular

2 She would eat nothing yesterday, but slept well during the night; the attendants today with considerable difficulty today succeeded in feeding her.

18 She is very obstinate and discontented, has to have an locksmith glove to prevent her destroying herself and is constantly asking to get on her own clothes & to get home to her mother.

April 13

There is no mental improvement. She still tries to get her clothes taken off and since last report has been fed several times by means of the stomach pump.

Admitted 1st March 1886

March 3

Was brought to the Asylum today by her husband from 12 Whitehall Place Clapham and admitted as a private patient.

She is thirty two years of age, married, was formerly employed as a mill-worker and is a Protestant.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted twenty one days, and the cause is set down as unknown. She is dangerous to others, but not suicidal. No hereditary tendency.

Prior to admission she was melancholy; lay in bed, could not be made speak, and refused food or any kind of nourishment. She seemed not to recognise her relations, was quite indifferent to everything, and at times was very outrageous and abused her children.

On admission she had a stupid, melancholy appearance, seemed to care or know nothing about her position and could not be induced to speak a single word. She was also very obstinate, refused to eat or allow anything whatever to be put into her mouth.

Her husband says that her youngest child is six months old and that a month ago it had to be taken from her. That for three weeks past she has taken very little nourishment and for the last four days has refused everything after being put to bed she was fed by means of the stomach pump.

Bodily health very feeble condition reduced. She slept none last night and sat in bed. She could by any means be induced to speak, and refuses all food. She was again fed by means of the stomach pump.

She is constantly confined to bed, never speaks, nor tries to help herself in any way.

Admitted 3rd March 1886

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March 20 1866	<p>Was brought to the Asylum today from City Workhouse Glasgow and admitted as a lunatic patient chargeable to the City Priest.</p> <p>She is forty years of age, married, is a Protestant and was formerly employed as a nurse.</p> <p>This is the first attack of insanity has lasted four days and the cause is unknown. She is dangerous to others but not suicidal. Hereditary tendency not known.</p> <p>Prior to admission she was very easily excited, talked in an incoherent manner, and laboured under delusions about some property which she fancied belonged to her. She was an inmate of the City Workhouse for some time when she passed sleepless nights, and was restless and noisy. At times she was also violent and two nights before admission she threatened to take the nurses life.</p> <p>On admission she was confused and rambled in conversation. To some questions she answered quite coherently, to others her replies were irrelevant or quite absurd. She talked of places in Glasgow at a considerable distance from each other as being in the same locality, and said that she had children in an institution where their bodies were made use of for some purpose.</p> <p>Bodily health and condition ordinary.</p>

Was brought to the Asylum today from City Workhouse Glasgow and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to City Parish.

She is twenty four years of age, single, is a Roman Catholic, and was formerly employed as a sewer in Dublin.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted four days, and the cause is unknown. She is dangerous to others but not suicidal. Hereditary tendency not known.

The patient came from Dublin to Glasgow about three weeks ago, and for four days prior to admission was an inmate of the City Workhouse. She was under the influence of a religious狂热 (possessed) and talked irrelevant nonsense about religion. She fancied that she had come to Glasgow from Dublin with a Government order to look after her sister, could not tell how long she had been in Glasgow and marched up and down the ward in a defiant manner with a prayer book in her hand. She had also taken a shovel to force her way out of the ward.

On admission she was very obstinate and took dangerous when interfered with. Her mind was confused and she could give no reason for leaving Dublin and coming to Glasgow. She however said that she had no friends in Glasgow, but either could or could not tell her or where she had lived since she had left Dublin.

She was very dirty and covered with vermin but in good bodily health and condition.

April 1

She slept none during the night and was abusive in her language towards the night nurse this morning when getting her up to dress her she struck at and tried to bite the Attendants, she also refused to take her food and when being fed seized the spoon with her teeth and broke it.

11 She is always stubborn and insolent. This morning she was much excited; attacked the night nurse took her hair and attempted to bite her.

Admitted 31st March 1866

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March 31

Was brought to the Asylum today from City Workhouse Glasgow, and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to City Parish.

She is twenty five years of age, married, a Protestant, and formerly resided with her husband at 83 Duggate Street.

This is the first attack of insanity has lasted one week, and the cause is unknown. She is neither suicidal nor dangerous to others. No hereditary tendency so far as known.

Prior to admission she manifested great restlessness of mind, laughed immoderately without cause, talked incoherently about her family and imagined that her husband was to undergo severe punishment on her account. At night she was very restless and unmanageable and wished to wander all over the ward of the Workhouse in search of imaginary friends.

On admission she talked in a silly wandering manner. She talked of having a great many children, but could not, she said, tell how many, could not tell whether her husband was dead or alive, was very irritable and discontented answered questions in an irrelevant and rather insolent way, and acted as if everything that was said and done was in jest.

Bodily health feeble. Condition reduced.

April 1

She was quiet and slept well during the night. She has taken her food pretty well, but says it is too coarse for her, and is very querulous and childish.

- 15

She is composed and irritable, very satisfied with anything and always asking to be dismissed home.

Bodily health improving.

May 2

There is no mental improvement. She has been destructive since last report, having destroyed to new petitions that she was wearing. She does know anything of how they were destroyed.

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Admitted 31st March 1866

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April 2

Was brought to the Asylum today from 37 Wallace Street and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to Gran Parish.

She is nearly four years of age, undressed, was formerly occupied as a domestic servant, and is a Protestant.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted two weeks and the cause is said to be unknown. She is both suicidal and dangerous to others. No hereditary tendency.

Patient's mother who came with her to the Asylum, states that her husband died in August and her child who was three months old in October last. That since then domestic affairs have been neglected by her and her mode of life has been irregular; - She bought, sold and pawned articles in a foolish and reckless way, and while in a warehouse making extravagant purchases while she had not money to pay, she had slipped a pair of stays under her shawl. She had seemed when detected to be unconscious that she was stealing. Latterly she was incoherent, excited and dangerous, and attempted to destroy herself by going over the window.

On admission she was quiet and had a careless, satisfied appearance, her answers when spoken to were either incoherent or quite irrelevant. She laughed in a silly way and her mind seemed to be very weak.

Bodily health indifferent. Condition ordinary.

- 3 She was quiet and slept well during the night, has taken her food and when spoken to is inclined to cry.

- 14 Although she sleeps well at night, she is listless and often falls asleep in the day room. Her memory is very defective, she picks up coins and trifling article and puts them in her pocket, and seems to be quite unconscious of having done so.

May 2 She has improved since last report and for some time has been incoherent. She is still weak and

Admitted 2nd April 1866

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April 4

Was brought to the Asylum today from Clyde Police Office Glasgow by her mother and brother and admitted as a Private Patient.
She is thirty two years of age, single, is a Housie daughter and belongs to the Established Church of Scotland.

The first attack of insanity came when she was about thirteen years of age, and she was twice previously under treatment in the Asylum, having been admitted on 24th September 1855 See Vol XVIII page 334, and again on 13th October 1858 See Vol XX page 116. She is somewhat dangerous to others but not suicidal. No hereditary tendency. The present attack has lasted for ten months.

Prior to admission she was rather excited, could not rest anywhere, but went about from one friend's house to another. She had an ill feeling towards her relatives, threatened them at dinner with her knife and fork. Threatened them also to break windows but did not commit any actual violence. She fancied there was a large sum of money due to her which her father had left, and last week went to a lawyer to see after it, and was continually annoying her relatives by her restless, talkative and violent conduct.

On admission she was free from excitement but restless and very talkative. She inquired after patients who had been formerly in the Asylum when she was a patient here, and had a great many complaints of being ill-used by her brother, brother and sister. She also spoke of having gone to Captain Ross at Flamburgh who told her that her father had left a will and advised her to go to Mr Justice Dick a Lawyer in Glasgow to see after it. Her brother says her father died intestate. Bodily health and condition ordinary.

May 5 She was quiet during the night but slept none today has eaten sparingly.

May 12 She is violent in her habits, fond of reading novels and is with difficulty induced at times to do a little sewing. She is also very discontented and says the food she gets is stiff for pigs.

May 2 She is restless, irritable and very troublesome. Since last report she quarrelled with and struck the attendant on the face. It was found necessary to remove her to another gallery.

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Admitted 4th April 1886

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April 12

Was brought to the Asylum today from Port Bannatyne and admitted as a Pauper patient chargeable to North Kite Parish.

She is thirty nine years of age, married is a Protestant and the wife of a labourer.

This is the first attack of insanity, it lasted eight days and the cause is a fright. She is suicidal, but not dangerous to others. No known hereditary tendency.

Prior to admission she was haunted by the idea that a murder had been committed in the neighbourhood and that the ghost of the murdered man was wanting her away. She was also of opinion that her soul was lost and that she must die as the murdered man would not leave the house without her. The cause of the above is said to have been a quarrel, a week ago, of two neighbours, husband and wife, and the wife having cried murder. Since then she has not slept would not keep in bed, and said if she could get she would go over the window.

On admission she had a stupid, bewildered appearance; seemed unable to comprehend the simple question, seldom gave any reply, and when she did her answers were quite irrelevant.

Her husband says she has a child four months old which she has been suckling. Her bodily health is very feeble, she has symptoms of pneumonia - lips and cheeks livid, tongue coated, pulse 100, breathing frequent but not laboured.

13

The sleeps were during the night, purped very much and her bladder had to be relieved by means of the catheter. She would not take her food but allowed the attendants to feed her.

19

Since last report she has been quite maniacal at times she fancied the house was on fire and was often in great dread of bodily injury. She occasionally becomes so violent and unmanageable that it is found necessary to confine her.

Act 39

Admitted 12th April 1886

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April 18

Was brought to the Asylum today from 13 West Blackhall Street Greenock and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to Greenock United Parishes.

She is forty two years of age, single, was formerly occupied as a Milliner and is a Protestant.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted six years and the cause is unknown, but she has a sister insane, who has been epileptic and is about to be taken to Largs Asylum. She is not suicidal but is rather dangerous having threatened to strike her father.

Prior to admission she was very delirious, and when spoken to became very excited. Said that she was persecuted by all the people of Greenock. Explained that through the evil speaking of some Club, and her relations (her work enemies) the milk, coffee, tea, sugar and bread were mixed with some poisonous substances, which tortured and dined and contracted her body so that her existence was rendered miserable and her life shortened, to which Government and ministers were subordinate and by which her father restricted her in the amount and quality of her food, exercise &c.

Her father was afraid to live in the house with her as she was at times dangerous and on one occasion threatened to strike him with a hammer.

On admission she was free from contusions, but displayed great weakness of muscle. She had high notions of herself; said she was degraded by being put in a common ward with others, said she did not like the appearance of those she saw, and fancied she was in danger of bodily injury.

Her skin and underclothing were very dirty and she admitted that her head had not been washed for more than half a year.

Body health fair. Condition retarded.

She slept for four hours has taken her food pretty well and is quiet.

Just night she was excited and noisy, but today is again quiet. She sometimes sews a little but her work has often to be taken out & done over again.

No 42.

Admitted 18th April 1886

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1866

April 20

Was brought to the Asylum today, from 157 Broad Street, Kirk End, Glasgow by two friends and a nurse and admitted as a private patient.

She is twenty six years of age, single, is the daughter of a Merchant and United Presbyterian.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted under one month, and the cause is disappointed love. She is dangerous to others but not suicidal. Some of her relation have been insane.

Prior to admission she was excited, noisy and incoherent; for she lost two nights she slept none, tore her clothes and kept calling out on religious subjects, but without connection or reason. She also refused food and although she had a nurse sent from the Asylum to attend her, it was found quite impossible to keep her at home.

On admission her appearance was fierce; her conduct violent, destructive, restless and dangerous, and her speech quite incoherent. She fancied there was something in her hands which she tried to wipe off but which resisted every effort she made. She could with difficulty be kept in one place and she would not walk when wished to do so.

Bodily health fair. Condition reduced. There are a number of small wounds behind the knee joints, caused by the application of leeches.

21

Yesterday after admission she refused to take any food and was fed by means of the stomach pump. During the night she slept none and was very noisy, she passed no water and was this morning relieved by means of the catheter. Today she was again fed by means of the stomach pump.

26

She sleeps little and is often very excited; she still refuses food and is fed by means of the stomach pump. She has stared since admission.

Aet. 26

Admitted 28th April 1866

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1866

April 25

Was brought to the Asylum today from Cowan Poorhouse and admitted as a Major Patient chargeable to Cowan Parish.

She is thirty six years of age, single was formerly employed as a Weaver in a mill and is a Protestant.

It is not known whether or not this is the first attack of insanity, but she is supposed to have been ill mentally for three weeks & the cause is not known. She is dangerous to others but not suicidal. No relatives known.

Prior to admission she was incoherent, and at times excited and violent. She had delusions such as that she was the daughter of Christ, was born of the house of David and was in heaven and hell. This morning she had attacked her landlady and thrown a tumbler at her which cut her face; she was taken to the Police Office.

On admission she showed great weakness of mind, she fancied everything said to her was in jest, laughed when spoken to, and when questioned was at times ready to strike. When being brought to the Asylum she said she was going to Palestine but did not know that this was the place.

Bodily health feeble, condition reduced.

25 She was restless and noisy during the night singing loud and praying. Today she has taken her food pretty well and she says she is a goddess.

Act 36

Admitted 24th April 1861

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1866

April 21.

Was brought to the Asylum today from Cowan Workhouse and admitted as a lunatic patient chargeable to Cowan Parish.

She is twenty eight years of age, single, was formerly employed as a domestic servant and is a Protestant.

This is not the first attack of insanity but she was never before under treatment in an Asylum; the present attack has lasted six weeks and the cause is unknown. She is suicidal but not dangerous to others. No known hereditary tendency.

Prior to admission she was a domestic servant at 31 Whetford Place but was for some days past in Cowan Workhouse, where she was dull, depressed and melancholy and refused to answer questions. She also refused to take food and laboured under the delusion that there was poison in it.

On admission she had a dejected, melancholy look and could not be induced to speak a single word.

Bodily health very feeble. Audition reduced. On the left hip and more than an inch from the anus there is a sinus, discharging thin pus, in which the probe found freely for fully two inches in the direction of the coccyx, the tissues on the left ankle joint externally are much inflamed and there is an unhealthy surface over the right tibia.

* 25 The slept for four hours during the night and was quiet, not having spoken a single word to any one. She refused to take food but allowed the attendants to feed her.

* 30 She has not spoken since admission, is quiet at night but became excited when put into a bedroom without light. She continues to refuse food and was today fed by means of the stomach pump.

Was brought to the Asylum today from 36 Chapel Street Avenue and admitted as a Pauper Patient chargeable to New Montreal Parish.

She is twenty seven years of age, married, is a Protestant and was formerly occupied as a Housewife.

This is the first attack of insanity has lasted three weeks and the cause is bodily weakness. She is not suicidal but has at times threatened to be violent. No known hereditary tendency.

She had a child three months ago, (her third) and since the birth of the child her health has been feeble. She tried to nurse the child up till three weeks ago when her mind was noticed to be affected, and the child was taken from her, but she never had a sufficiency of milk to nurse the child upon. The symptoms began by her neglecting her household duties - she had not her Husband's food ready at meal-time and excused herself by saying that she was afraid of her neighbours. Before admission she was unsettled and restless in her habits, talked continually and incoherently upon religious matters, and her mission on Earth and had an idea of saving the world and her friends from destruction.

In admission she talked readily but always wandered away into religious subjects and had ideas of suicide running in her mind. She said that she got up at night and was about to leap through the window, but the Lord prevented her, and also that there was a well near her house that could drown her and five or six more.

Bodily health feeble: condition reduced.

She only slept one hour but was quiet, she has taken her food pretty well.

She has not been well mentally for some time and her mind is said to have been much affected by the death of her son who was killed four or five years ago during a riot in Austria. She is neither vicious nor dangerous to others. None of her relations are known.

Prior to admission she was restless and wandering in her habits.

May 5

Was brought to the Asylum today from 210 Thrille Street and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to Govan Parish.

She is sixteen years of age, single, is a Protestant and was formerly employed as a domestic servant.

This is the first attack of insanity, but the duration and cause are unknown. She is both suicidal and dangerous to others. No known hereditary tendency.

Prior to admission she had a dull, vacant and absent expression of countenance, was melancholy and listless - memory absent - and when she spoke or answered questions was incoherent. She refused to take food, was at times excited and tore her hair and at other times wept.

On admission she had a stupid bewildered expression, seemed quite unable to comprehend anything said to her, and could give no account whatever of herself. When spoken to she sometimes replied, but was always incoherent and often repeated the words 'long long ago.'

She is reported to have been ravished, and on examination a number of inflamed and discoloured patches of integument are found in the line of the spine, extending from between the shoulder to the anus. Bodily health very feeble; condition reduced.

She is as peaceable said to be neither suicidal nor dangerous to others. No relations known.

On admission she was excited, incoherent and delirious; she fancied she had a great many enemies who wished to injure her; imagined that a fire had been raised in the land she lives in, said that she ran out naked to put it out and became a crucifix. She had been taken to the Police Office from where she was taken to the City Porhouse.

In admission she was free from excitement, knew where she was and could answer questions fully coherently, but she was very nervous and her memory defective. When she tried to give an account of herself and more especially of her present illness, she always stopped suddenly or wandered away from one subject to another.

Admitted 5th June 1866

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June 7

Was brought to the Asylum today from Netherton Carronnoch and admitted as a pauper patient chargeable to the Parish of Carronnoch.

She is sixteen years of age, single, is a Protestant and was employed as a Farm Servant.

This is the first attack of insanity, has lasted three weeks and the cause is unknown. She is said to be dangerous both to herself and others. No known hereditary tendencies.

About three weeks ago she became excited, incoherent and unmanageable; in a few days she got better and was able to go about her work; she again about a week ago had a relapse. She saw imaginary persons, spoke to and struck at them, and knocked her head against the wall; threatened to do for herself, and three day ago was nearly suffocated by thrusting her hands into her mouth.

On admission she had the appearance and manner of a person labouring under the influence of drink or some powerful narcotic; she could not walk was unable to hold up her head and seemed quite unconscious of existence. After being put to bed she went into a fit somewhat like hysteria, but with pretty severe convulsions — this lasted for a considerable time. During the fit she rolled about, was in danger of injuring herself and had to be closely watched.

She is stated by her husband to be neither vicious nor dangerous, but one of the medical certificates in her case state her to be dangerous to herself & others. She is hereditarily predisposed to insanity; her paternal uncle and grandmother having been insane.

Prior to admission she was subject to paroxysms of excitement and was at times quite incoherent. She had also delusions of which she frequently spoke. She believed herself at times to be the Messiah, and at other times became excited and stated that she had been fighting with the Devil.

When she went she complained of headache and was much exhausted having slept none for several nights.

On admission she was in a feeble exhausted state, but her manner was restless and her appearance confused; her language was quite incoherent. She was carried in and put to bed in the Infirmary. Upon examination an abrasion was found on her left arm and discolouration on other parts of her body, apparently the result of her former restless excited state.

She slept only ten minutes during the night, was restless and noisy, but drank freely of milk and water which had been ordered for her.

She continues to be very restless and excited but last night she slept four hours. This is the first sleep she has had since admission and apparently the result of three forty minute doses of solution of minium of Morphia which were given to her yesterday to be given at intervals.

Yesterday she was more quiet and less coherent, but towards evening she raged, was noisy, singing etc and slept little during the night. She now takes her food better.

She is excited, restless, and noisy; she is dirty in her habits and at times cannot be kept in bed. She continues to take her food well.

She is uncleanly in her habits and restless and excited in her manner. Last night she destroyed her bedding and tore up her clothes.

Her bodily health has improved very much since admission, and she was today raised from the Infirmary to Gallery No. 3. Mentally there is very little improvement. She is restless, excited, and abusive in her language to the attendants.



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
