### REPORT

OF THE

# GENERAL COMMITTEE OF GOVERNORS

OF

## ST. LUKE'S HOSPITAL,

FOR THE YEAR 1860.

To the Court of Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

Your Committee, in presenting to the Court their Report for the year 1860, have the great pleasure to announce, that the Income arising from Benefactions during the past year, reached no less a sum than £2,325. 15s. 3d., against £893. 16s. 3d. in 1859, thereby confirming an opinion they ventured to express in their last Report, viz.: that so soon as the Public were made acquainted with the usefulness of this valuable Institution, funds would be forthcoming towards its support.

The example so liberally set by the Worshipful Companies of Grocers and Clothworkers, in presenting Donations of £100. and £21., was, as your Committee had every reason to hope, followed by—

At the same time, they feel sure there are yet other Public Bodies prepared to assist in carrying out to the utmost, the benefits of this most needed Charity.

Your Committee are pleased to find, that the Hospital has not been forgotten by those friends who have been removed by death, and they take this opportunity of acknowledging the following Legacies:—

Your Committee regret to record the loss of two Governors, Alderman Sir George Carroll, nominated in 1851, and their late colleague Charles Few, Esq., who was for more than ten years a very active and useful member of your Committee, and after his retirement, continued to take a warm interest in the amusements of the Patients.

Your Committee, however, have the satisfaction of stating, that during the past year, 24 New Governors were nominated, besides the Masters, for the time being, of the Worshipful Companies of Fishmongers, Grocers, Goldsmiths, Merchant Taylors, and Mercers, and three friends who completed the payment of their qualification as Governors.

Some few responses have been made to the appeal for Annual Subscribers; and among them one of Ten Guineas from an active member of the Committee, who specially directed his subscription to be expended in procuring amusement for the Patients, by the hire or purchase of suitable books.

Your Committee have also the pleasure to acknowledge a Grand Pianoforte from Mr. G. Peachey, also one from Messrs. Stodart and Son, besides sundry parcels of music from Messrs. Keith, Prowse, and Co., Cramer and Co., T. Purdy and Co., Duff and Hodgson, and a Bagatelle Board from their much respected Surgeon Mr. Luke.

Your Committee urge upon the Governors severally to interest themselves in obtaining new Governors and Subscribers, so as to make the Income of the Charity more adequate to the required expenditure.

Your Committee regret to state that although they have repeatedly made known by advertisements the extension of the benefits of this Hospital, sanctioned by the last Annual Court, to Patients who have been afflicted more than Twelve Calendar Months, or who have been discharged from other Establishments, the Public have not yet sufficiently appreciated the advantages thus offered, only 18 such cases having been admitted during the year, and there have been only 13 Curable Cases received at 21s. per week under the Resolution of the Annual Court of 1858. Your Committee hope that there may soon be an increase in these numbers, the enquiries for the Forms of Application having recently been more frequent.

The amount of House Expenses in 1859 was £4,758. 0s. 2d.; in the past year, £4,896. 6s. 7d. The excess may be accounted for by the cost of an extra supply of Coals, and the improvement of the Wing Wards by covering the Floors with Kamptulicon.

Since the last Annual Court, the Commissioners in Lunacy have made their usual official visit to the Hospital, pursuant to Sec. 61 of the Act 8 and 9 Vic., c. 100. Their observations, dated 20th July, 1860, are recorded in the "Visitors' Book," kept for the purpose. And no complaint whatever is made as to the state of the Wards, or treatment of the Patients.

With respect to supplies for the past year, your Committee contracted from 1st April to 30th September last, for the best Wheaten Bread at 5½d. for a 4lb. loaf, and for Flour at 8s. per bushel; from 1st October to 31st December, 7¼d. Bread, 10s. 6d. Flour; 1st January to 31st March, 7d. Bread, 10s. 6d. Flour.

Your Committee also contracted for the usual kinds of Butcher's Meat, from 1st April to 30th September last, at 4s. 8d. per stone of 8 lbs.; and further, from the 1st October last to the 31st March next for the same, at 4s. 11d. per stone of 8 lbs.

As regards the patients admitted to the benefits of this Charity, your Committee report that there have been received into the Hospital since the 31st December, 1859, and up to the 31st December, 1860, 143 patients deemed curable.

During the same period, there have been discharged cured 69, uncured 22; as unfit 10; at the request of their friends 9; and there have died 8. Since the 30th July, 1751, the day on which the Hospital was first opened for the reception of Patients, and up to the 31st December, 1860, inclusive, there have been ad-

Since the opening of the Hospital in 1751, and up to the 31st of December, 1860, there have been admitted 797 patients DEEMED INCURABLE, who had been previously discharged uncured, exclusive of those patients (nine in number) who have, from time to time, been re-admitted, by virtue of an Annuity Deed (dated 11th June, 1788) of the late Samuel Whitbread, Esq.; and since the 31st December, 1859, and up to the 31st December, 1860, 13 patients, deemed incurable, have been discharged at the request of friends; 1 upon trial; 2 cured, 1 being a pauper, 1 friends not complying with Rules; 3 died.



#### REPORT

OF THE

## PHYSICIAN AND MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT,

FOR THE YEAR 1860.

To the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

My Lords, Ladies, and Gentlemen,

In presenting our report for the past year, we do so with a feeling of confidence that it will contain particulars agreeable to be noticed by you.

We are happy to state that the Hospital has continued to maintain the high reputation it has held in former years with respect to the number and proportion of Patients cured. It will be satisfactory to the Governors to know that out of 97 Patients whose treatment has been completed during the last year, an average of 69.696 per cent. have been discharged cured.

The deaths during the twelve months have been 11; 4 of these being caused by organic disease of the heart, existing previous to admission.

We have the pleasure of stating that no Epidemic disease has prevailed in the Institution during the year.

The escape of one Patient has occurred, and this was effected by one of the males, who, previous to admission, had escaped from a Private Asylum. He went voluntarily to his friends, by whom he was detained.

Many of the cases have been in a very debilitated condition at the time of admission; this sometimes arising from nervous exhaustion, consequent upon previous excitement, and sometimes from bodily ailments, aggravated by want of good nutriment and necessary stimuli, and it may particularly be stated that such cases have progressed favorably under the treatment which is so liberally allowed in this Institution. As presumptive evidence of this favorable progress, we

find that the increase of weight out of 73 Patients whose average duration has been 14 weeks, 4 days in the Hospital, and who have

been discharged cured, is 12 lbs. 6 oz.

We beg to thank you for the favorable consideration given to our recommendation to place Kamptulicon in the Wings of the Male galleries. This we feel confident will add much to the comfort of the Patients, and the good appearance of the Wards. We take this opportunity of suggesting that blinds should be fixed to all the large windows in the Wings, both on the Male and Female sides of the Hospital, for the purpose of keeping the Wards warmer and more comfortable.

We regret to learn that the steps taken to procure the waste piece of ground adjoining the Male Airing Court has been hitherto unsuccessful. We also regret that the intention of the Governors to devote the Central Airing Ground to the most quiet of the Female Patients has been frustrated by the annoyance resulting from persons inhabiting

the adjoining houses which overlook the said ground.

The liberal donation recently given by one of the Committee of Governors, of 10 guineas yearly towards the purchase of Books, has proved most valuable. Half the sum this year has been spent in the purchase of standard works, which are eagerly demanded by the Patients; and the other half has been devoted as an annual subscription towards the circulating library of Messrs. Smith and Sons, for which 30 volumes weekly are secured to the use of the Patients. The management of this arrangement has been undertaken by Mrs. Walker. The number of books belonging to the Hospital is at present 80 on the Male, and 120 on the Female side. A general catalogue of these is kept in each Ward: by this means Patients can avail themselves of books out of other Wards as well as their own. We would express a hope that this number will be speedily increased.

The Patients have been encouraged to engage themselves in the different employments existing in the Hospital with considerable success; the average number employed during the day being, males 80, and females 73 per cent. They have also had free access to the different amusements provided by the Institution, of which they have fully availed themselves. The fortnightly Balls have been carried on with considerable advantage during the winter months. We may mention here that we should be glad to see a Bagatelle Board placed in each of the Female galleries, so as to afford increased means for evening recreation, this being the time when your Medical Super-

intendent has found that Patients of a melancholic temperament exhibit more particularly the unhappy and apathetic state of mind characteristic of that form of mental disease. Some much lighter and less expensive than those on the Male side would be suitable.

Large numbers of Patients have availed themselves of your permission to walk beyond the Hospital boundaries, and with very great benefit to their mental and physical health.

We hear with much pleasure that gratuities have been granted to each of those Attendants who have remained some years in the Institution. We feel ourselves justified in speaking highly of the Attendants generally. This is the more important, as there must necessarily exist at all times considerable anxiety in the minds of the Medical Officers whether or not due attention be paid to the instructions given for carrying out the medical, dietetic, and hygienic treatment which they prescribe; and in this respect we are happy to believe that for the most part our wishes have been carried into effect. The sound policy of renewing this act of liberality from time to time, with a view to the maintenance and encouragement of zeal and duty in this part of your service, we hope will be continued as occasion may arise.

We are happy to know that publicity has been given by advertisement to your present arrangements, as we feel confident that good results are likely to follow the circumstance of the Hospital being thus brought under the notice of the public at large, and of medical men in particular, both in the Metropolis and in the Provinces.

In conclusion, allow us to offer our sincere and warmest thanks for the consideration and courtesy we have always received at your hands, and to express our hope that the use of means afforded us for the relief and comfort of the impaired and distressed minds of our Patients will continue to be attended with success.







### REPORT

OF THE

### GENERAL COMMITTEE OF GOVERNORS

OF

### ST. LUKE'S HOSPITAL,

FOR THE YEAR 1861.

To the Court of Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

Your Committee have the pleasure to report, that during the past year the Annual Subscriptions amounted to £43., and the Benefactions to £976. 4s. 3d., among which are a Second Donation of £10. 10s. from the Worshipful Company of Cutlers, and £52. 10s. 0d. from the Worshipful Company of Drapers; £105. from William Robert Mitchell, Esq., and an additional Donation of £100. from Alexander John Sutherland Esq., M.D., a most gratifying proof of his continued interest in the Hospital, the inmates of which have in former years received so much benefit from his professional skill.

Your Committee gladly take this opportunity of acknowledging a most useful present of Twenty-five Iron Bedsteads, of an improved manufacture, from their much respected colleague, Charles Woodward, Esq., F.R.S. Your Committee have also to announce the receipt of the following Legacies, viz.:—

From the Executors of the late Edwin Cuthbert, Esq. ... ... £100.

From the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery, being one-fourth part of the residue of the personal Estate of the late General Strode, who died 1766,—

In Stock, £1,183. 9s. 10d. 3 per cent. Consols, And in Cash, £1,634. 4s. 7d.

which has enabled your Committee to meet the current expenses without a further sale of the Funded property of the Hospital.

Your Committee regret to record the Deaths of Five Governors during the past year: William Lee Jortin, Esq., a descendant of one of the original Founders of this Hospital; Richard Hollond, Esq.; Isaac Onslow Secker, Esq.; their old colleague, Alexander Robert Sutherland, Esq., M.D., F.R.S., whose retirement they announced with great regret in their Report for the year 1859; and the Rev. Samuel Wix, M.A., F.R.S., who had been a Governor for upwards of twenty-three years.

Your Committee have however the gratification of announcing that they have enrolled the names of Eleven New Governors

during the past year.

Although the public do not yet sufficiently appreciate the advantages offered by the Resolutions of the General Courts of 1858 and 1859, admitting Patients at £1. 1s. per week, your Committee are glad to be able to state, that the number of those Patients is increasing: the amount received for their maintenance having been £240. 9s. in 1861 against £357. in 1860 for Curable cases, and £1,141. 17s. for Chronic cases against £694. 12s. in the year 1860.

Your Committee are renewing their endeavours to increase the Airing Court on the Male side of the building, and are in communication with the Parish authorities on the subject.

The amount of House Expenses in 1860 was £4,896. 6s. 7d., and in the past year, £5,512. 12s. 6d.: this excess may be

accounted for in part by the increased price of provisions, and the increase in the average weekly number of Patients in the Hospital.

Since the last Annual Court, the Commissioners in Lunacy have made their usual official visit to the Hospital, pursuant to sec. 61 of the Act 8 and 9 Vict., cap. 100. Their observations, dated 18th February, 1861, are recorded in the "Visitors' Book" kept for the purpose. Your Committee have endeavoured to carry out the suggestions of the Commissioners as far as practicable.

Your Committee report that they have renewed the Lease of their Premises for another forty years, on payment of the usual fine of £200. to the Governors of St. Bartholomew's Hospital.

Your Committee report that there have been received into the Hospital between the 1st January and 31st December 1861, 150 Patients deemed Curable.

During the same period, there have been discharged cured 89, uncured 37; as unfit 13; at the request of their friends 7; and there have died 7. Since the 30th July, 1751, the day on which the Hospital was first opened for the reception of Patients, and up to the 31st December, 1861, inclusive, there have been admitted into the Hospital 19,872 Patients, DEEMED CURABLE ON THEIR ADMISSION; of whom there have been discharged,—

Since the opening of the Hospital in 1751, and up to the 31st of December, 1861, there have been admitted 820 Patients DEEMED INCURABLE, who had been previously discharged uncured, exclusive of those Patients (nine in number) who have, from time to time, been re-admitted, by virtue of an Annuity Deed (dated 11th June, 1788) of the late Samuel Whitbread, Esq.; and since the 31st December, 1860, and up to the 31st December, 1861, 6 Patients, deemed incurable, have been discharged at the request of friends; 3 upon trial; 4 died; 6 unfit; 4 cured; 1 pauper.

The total number of Patients remaining on the books on the 31st December, 1861, was 149; namely, 66 Patients deemed curable, and 83 Boarders, including Mr. Whitbread's Patient.

Your Committee recommend that The Right Honorable the Lord Overstone be re-elected President of this Corporation.

That the Right Honorable the Earl of Abingdon, the Right Honorable the Lord Aveland; the Right Honorable the Viscount Eversley; Sir Edmund Antrobus, Baronet; James Bentley, Esq.; and William Henry Whitbread, Esq., be re-elected Vice-Presidents of this Corporation.

That Henry Francis Shaw Lefevre, Esq., be re-elected Treasurer.

Your Committee have prepared a List of Governors, whom they submit to the Court as fit and proper persons to act as the General Committee for the year ensuing.

And finally, your Committee recommend that the remaining Honorary Officers of this Corporation be severally re-elected, pursuant to the regulations.

All of which is nevertheless submitted.

#### REPORT

OF THE

#### PHYSICIAN AND MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT.

FOR THE YEAR 1861.

To the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

My Lords, Ladies, and Gentlemen,

WE have the honour of laying before you our Report

for the past year.

The number of those whose treatment has been completed, and who at the time of admission were deemed curable, is 133, being an increase of 36 over the preceding year. Of this number, 34 males and 55 females have been discharged cured, and 12 males and 25 females uncured, making a per centage of 66.91 cured. Of those insane for a longer period than 12 months before admission, I male and 4 females have been discharged cured, and one of the Boarders who had been six years in the Hospital was also discharged cured; eleven have died during the year, of these seven were deemed curable, one had been insane upwards of twelve months before admission, and three were old residents, of the respective duration of 33 years, 10 years, and 9 years.

In many of the cases presented for admission the stated time of previous existing attack has been of considerable duration, a fact which is always considered to render the probability of a cure being effected much less than if the Patient was brought to the Hospital at a more early period of the disease. Of those whose treatment has been completed in the past year, this duration exceeded by one-fourth that of the preceding year. It is a source of gratification, however, to know that an average per centage of cures has been effected, and that

the time of residence in the Hospital of those discharged cured has been only one day more for each Patient, than those so discharged in 1860, when the average was 14 weeks 4 days.

We alluded in our report last year to the debilitated condition of the Patients at the time of admission; during the past year patients suffering thus have even increased in number, it having been found necessary to place nearly one-fourth of those admitted in bed as soon as received; two indeed, of these Patients were received in an almost hopeless condition, and died in a few days after admission.

Notwithstanding the above facts, we are happy to state that the proportionate number of deaths is not larger than that during the last 10 years.

Great attention has been paid to preserve the general condition of the Hospital in a clean and healthy state.

In the autumn a severe form of diarrhea obtained a great degree of prevalence in the immediate neighbourhood, and a few cases occurred in the Hospital. One of the boarders at the same time died from an attack of English cholera. We are thankful in being able to state that this was the only case of that disease.

We regret to state that during the last year there has been more than the average of acute bodily disease, calling for a considerable amount of increased attention on the part of your Medical Officers, but happily with a generally successful termination.

There has been one casualty by the falling of one of the heavy trough beds, this received prompt attention, and terminated favourably. Since this casualty occurred, one of the Governors, who for years has taken the greatest interest in the Hospital, has liberally presented 25 Iron Bedsteads to replace the old ones in some of the single rooms. This gift proves to be a great benefit to the Patients, and we hope to see very shortly all the trough bedsteads removed, and substituted by similar bedsteads to those recently given.

Two escapes have been effected during the year, both males, one was brought back to the Hospital in three days, the other, who escaped from the attendant while walking in the streets, went to his wife and did not return to the Hospital, his wife had previously to his escape expressed her wish for him to remain at home.

During the year there have been 3 males and 13 females under seclusion, the average total duration of each seclusion being 6½ hours.

We have witnessed with great pleasure the improvements carried out

by the Governors in the structural alterations of the building, and also in the supply of means for increased domestic comfort.

The Bath Rooms have been newly adapted for the purposes of bathing and ablution. In these rooms, in each male and female wing, New Baths have been fixed, the windows enlarged, gas laid on, and in every bath-room kamptulicon has been laid down.

The walls of the staircase at the western end of the building have been covered with new wainscot, and kamptulicon has been laid down in the male wings.

The experimental enlargement of the windows, and the alterations in the doors of the two sleeping apartments recently effected, has been attended with great advantage to the comforts of the patients, and the lighting of the corresponding extremities of the galleries.

Four dozen additional chairs have been supplied, and these have been placed in the male and female wings in substitution of the forms formerly in use. A few more are still required for completing the furnishing of the single rooms.

Two dozen neat and durable washstands have also been procured.

Hair beds have been obtained for the use of a few dirty patients. These are found fully to answer the purpose for which they were intended, viz. to promote comfort and cleanliness.

The blinds for the large windows in the male and female wings, we regret to say, are not yet supplied. We think it particularly necessary that they should be provided to prevent the public gaze on the Bathstreet side of the building.

We beg to thank the Governors for their kind accession to our request for two Bagatelle Boards, which prove a source of amusement to the Patients, and add to the pleasing appearance of the wards. We think it very important that the aspect of the wards should present a cheerful appearance. The Governors and others who have visited the Hospital have concurred in this feeling, and kindly presented us with many objects of great interest to the Patients. Such donations will in future be thankfully received.

In further enumerating the benefits accruing from the interest which the Governors and others have taken in the Patients, it is with much pleasure that we acknowledge the kindness of those who gratuitously assisted in carrying out a series of Winter evening Entertainments, consisting of Lectures, Concerts, Balls, Illustrations, &c., all of which have proved beneficial to the Patients. During the summer months several of the Patients were sent short distances out of town for excursions. Seventy visited the Zoological Gardens, the tickets for admission being given by friends of the Charity.

The numbers walking beyond the limits of the Hospital have been larger than formerly. We find this mode of exercise especially beneficial to the convalescent patients.

We look forward with hope to the probability of a successful termination to the negociations at present going on with reference to an increased Airing Ground for the use of the Patients.

We are happy to report that the attendants have performed their duties with zeal and cheerfulness as heretofore. One of the female attendants, who had been very faithful to her work and who had been in the service of the Hospital for five years, left in the early part of the year to fill a superior situation.

We beg, in conclusion, to express our earnest hope that the great and good work of your Hospital may continue to flourish and progress.







There has been a small increase in the Income accruing from Patients admitted at £1. 1s. per week; the amounts received for their maintenance having been £467. 5s. against £290. 9s. in 1861, for Curable cases, and £831. 12s. against £732. 18s. in 1861, for Chronic cases.

Your Committee stated in their last Report, that they were renewing their endeavours to increase the Airing Court on the Male side of the Building, and were in communication with the Parish Authorities on the subject. Your Committee have now the pleasure to announce that the terms have been agreed upon with the Parish,—that they have obtained from the Governors of Saint Bartholomew's Hospital, permission to set back the Wall in Bath Street; and that they are preparing to Memorialise the Committee of Dulwich College, for a Grant of a small piece of land whereon to rebuild the Alleyne's Alms Houses, in order that the ground which they now occupy may be added to the Male Airing Court.

Your Committee have deemed it expedient to fill up the vacancy in the office of Second Physician, and have elected Dr. William Wood, who has had much experience in the treatment of insanity.

Your Committee recommend the following addition to the Rules, viz.:-- .

That after the word "Occasions," in Regulation 2, shall follow—

"Which same privileges shall belong to any person who has contributed, or may contribute, to the Funds of this Hospital the sum of Five Guineas or more Annually; and in the case of a Firm having contributed, or contributing such sum, they shall be at liberty to select one of their Members for Admission as a Governor, the office of Governor in each case continuing so long only as the said Annual Subscription shall be paid."

The Commissioners in Lunacy made their usual Official Visit to the Hospital, pursuant to sec. 61 of the Act 8 & 9 Vict., cap. 100, on the 22nd March last, and reported that "the general health of the inmates is good"; that "we heard no complaints from the Patients of any harshness or ill-treatment, indeed many of them spoke very gratefully of the kindness they had received."

The amount charged to House Expenses, in 1862, was £5,235. 13s. 11d., against £5,515. 18s. 4d. in 1861. The decrease may be accounted for by the decrease in the number of cases of "Acute Bodily Disease," referred to in the Report of the Medical Officers for 1861, which always require a very expensive dietary.

Your Committee report that there have been received into the Hospital between the 1st January and 31st December 1862, 137 Patients deemed Curable.

During the same period, there have been discharged cured 68, uncured 41, as unfit 16, at the request of their friends 5; and there have died 9. Since the 30th July, 1751, the day on which the Hospital was first opened for the reception of Patients, and up to the 31st December, 1862, inclusive, there have been admitted into the Hospital 20,009 Patients, DEEMED CURABLE ON THEIR ADMISSION; of whom there have been discharged,—

Since the opening of the Hospital in 1751, and up to the 31st December, 1862, there have been admitted 845 Patients DEEMED INCURABLE, who had been previously discharged uncured, exclusive of those Patients (nine in number) who have, from time to time, been re-admitted, by virtue of an Annuity Deed (dated 11th June, 1788) of the late Samuel Whitbread, Esq.; and since the 31st December, 1861, and up to the 31st December, 1862, 4 Patients, deemed incurable, have been discharged at the request of friends; 10 upon trial; 2 died; 4 unfit; 2 cured.

The total number of Patients remaining on the books on the 31st December, 1862 was 150; namely, 64 Patients deemed curable, and 86 Boarders, including Mr. Whitbread's Patient.

Your Committee recommend that The Lord Overstone be reelected President of this Corporation.

That the Right Honorable the Earl of Abingdon, the Lord Aveland; the Right Honorable the Viscount Eversley; Sir Edmund Antrobus, Baronet; James Bentley, Esq.; and William Henry Whiteread, Esq., be re-elected Vice-Presidents of this Corporation.

That Messrs. Fuller & Co. be re-elected Bankers of this Hospital.

That Henry Francis Shaw Lefevre, Esq., be re-elected Treasurer.

Your Committee have prepared a List of Governors, whom they submit to the Court as fit and proper persons to act as the General Committee for the year ensuing.

And finally, your Committee recommend that the remaining Honorary Officers of this Corporation be severally re-elected, pursuant to the regulations.

All of which is nevertheless submitted.



### REPORT

OF THE

# PHYSICIANS AND MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT

FOR THE YEAR 1862.

To the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

My Lords, Ladies, and Gentlemen,

Upon reviewing the events of the past year, we are happy to find, that the improvements which have been made in promoting the comforts of the Patients, and thus facilitating Curative results, have been equal to those of former years. We feel a special interest in alluding to these improvements, because they render the Hospital more suitable for a middle class of Patients, who are received, under the new regulation, upon payment of One Guinea per week towards their maintenance. The number resident of this class is now 37, as compared with 30 at the end of last year: thus shewing a tendency to increase; and we think it can only be for the want of a more extended publicity, that the numbers applying for admission under this Rule, have not been much larger.

We are happy in being able to state, that the health of the Patients during the past year has been very good. No epidemic or contagious disease has occurred, and the number of those suffering from acute bodily disease has been exceedingly small.

The deaths during the year have again reached the average number. Six died from Maniacal Exhaustion; one from Phthisis, two from Heart disease, and three from Apoplectic seizures. Four of those who died from exhaustion, were admitted in such a sinking condition,

that but little opportunity was afforded for rallying their remaining vital powers.

The proportionate number of recoveries have been

Males ... 61.53 per cent. Females ... 55.84 ,,

making a total of males and females together, 57.75 per cent. of those whose treatment has been completed. This per centage is rather lower than that of former years, and is accounted for by the circumstance, that a large number of those who were admitted in 1861, had been mentally afflicted during an unusually long period before they came under our treatment. This fact we mentioned in our last Report.

There has been no escape, suicide, or casualty of any importance

The male and female attendants generally have performed their duties with great credit, and may be fairly said to have been actuated by feelings of consideration, sympathy, and kindness towards the Patients. It has resulted that there has been but little seclusion, and the wards have presented an air of quietude and a degree of comfort sufficient to attract the notice of several visitors to the Hospital.

Great improvement has been effected in the Services of the Chapel, by the addition of one of Evans' Patent Harmoniums. This was obtained at a cost of Forty Guineas, half this sum being raised by subscription. A handsome set of Church Music Books was also given by Mr. William Horne, of 33, Russell Square. One of the Female Patients during the first four months, undertook the duties of playing the musical portions of the daily Chapel Service. This Patient (though once deemed incurable) has since been discharged cured. These duties are now undertaken by one of the Male Patients, who takes great pleasure in them. This manner of engaging the Patients ensures an amount of direct attention, which proves very beneficial in promoting an improved condition of the mind. The Patients have met at the Chapel, in the evening, during the winter months, once a fortnight, for the purpose of practising Sacred Music, under the direction of the Medical Superintendent.

Gatherings of the Patients once a fortnight, for dancing and other amusements, have this winter been substituted for the miscellaneous "Series of Entertainments" of last year.

During the summer months an increased number have been allowed

to make excursions into the country, and to visit public places of amusement. About 200 Patients, with their attendants, at different times have availed themselves of these opportunities; all who were suitable visited the International Exhibition. It need scarcely be mentioned, that the Patients at such times much enjoyed themselves, and many expressed much gratitude for such privileges. We hope that the Governors will continue the same liberality during the ensuing summer months.

The increased space of ground on the Male side, which, we believe, is about to be rented of the Authorities of St. Luke's Parish, will afford greater opportunities for the recreation and exercise of the Patients.

Four new Windows have been ordered for the Male and Female Wings, to be placed in the room of the heavy wooden framed ones now existing. We hope, as soon as the funds will allow, that this commencement will lead to a similar improvement, extending over the entire frontage of the Hospital; as much unnecessary prejudice still exists in the minds of the Public, owing to an absence of cheerfulness in the external structure of the building.

Since our last Report the Galleries, Wings, Ball Room, and some other parts of the Hospital, have been thoroughly renovated, by whitewashing and re-papering; new carpets have been laid down in two of the Female Galleries.

Correspondence between the Patients and their relatives and friends has become very general, and it is very seldom found necessary to interfere with it; when it is, any letter which it has been thought prudent to retain has been laid before the Committee of Visitors at their next ensuing visit, according to the requirement of the recent Act.

We cannot conclude our Report without acknowledging the valuable assistance we have derived from Mr. and Mrs. Walker, the Steward and Matron, in carrying out the recent improvements, and in maintaining the general good order of the Hospital.







#### REPORT

OF THE

### GENERAL COMMITTEE OF GOVERNORS

OF

## ST. LUKE'S HOSPITAL,

FOR THE YEAR 1863.

To the Court of Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

Your Committee, in taking a retrospect of the past year, regret to notice that the amount of Benefactions has been only £363. 7s. 8d., against £998. 5s. 0d. in 1862.

The amount of Annual Subscriptions has been £27. 11s. 0d., against £54. 17s. 0d. in 1862.

The Expenditure has been £5,095.7s.7d., against £5,291.6s.2d. in 1862.

The amount received from the friends of Patients paying £1. 1s. per week towards their maintenance, was £331. 16s. 0d. for Curable cases, against £467. 5s. 0d. in 1862; and £984.18s.0d. for Chronic cases, against £831. 12s. 0d. in 1862. The amount received from the friends of Patients deemed Incurable, was £1,989. 8s. 0d., against £1,590. 15s. 0d. in 1862.

Your Committee regret to record the deaths of several of their Governors, exceeded in number, however, by new names added to the List.

Your Committee made arrangements for the Patients to celebrate the Marriage of H. R. H. the Prince of Wales, when a liberal entertainment was prepared, in which they were materially assisted by one of their members.

Your Committee regret to state that their endeavours to enlarge the Airing Court on the Male side have not yet been successful; an objection having been raised by the Diocesan Registrar, in consequence of the ground being consecrated.

Owing to the resignation of their Resident Medical Superintendent, (Mr. Toller,) in July last, your Committee elected as his successor, Dr. Octavius Jepson, who had been for

upwards of three years the Assistant Medical Officer at the Hanwell County Asylum.

Your Committee have again to acknowledge the liberality of George Bishop, Esq., in presenting a grand Pianoforte, by Broadwood & Co., as well as a variety of Foreign and other Birds, for the amusement of the Patients. Dr. Wood, one of the Physicians, has also presented a Patent Bed for sick cases.

The Commissioners in Lunacy made their usual Official Visit to the Hospital, pursuant to sec. 61 of the Act 8 & 9 Vict., cap. 100, on the 16th February in last year, and reported as follows:—

"That they found the Hospital in proper and orderly condition.

"The Patients generally were free from excitement, and with very few exceptions their clothing was

good, and their appearance satisfactory.

"Upon the whole we regard the present condition of this Hospital as favorable, and its various offices are efficiently discharged. No complaints were made to us, and as the Medical Officer and the Matron accompanied us through the respective divisions, we saw evidence of the grateful feeling inspired among the Patients by their care and personal sympathy."

Your Committee beg leave to recommend the following alteration in Rule No. 44—namely, the substitution of the words "Twenty-fifth" for "Thirtieth" Year, as the age at which a Candidate for the office of Resident Medical Superintendent is eligible.

Your Committee contracted for the Best Wheaten Bread,-

For the 4 lbs. Loaf.

From 1st April..... to 30th September, at 6d.

" 1st October... to 31st December, " 54d.

And for the usual kinds of Butchers' Meat,

Per Stone of 8 lbs.

Your Committee report that there have been received into the Hospital between the 1st January and 31st December, 1863, 118 Patients deemed Curable.

During the same period, there have been discharged cured 61, uncured 39, as unfit 11, at the request of their friends 7; and there have died 4. Since the 30th July, 1751, the day on which the Hospital was first opened for the reception of Patients, and up to the 31st December, 1863, inclusive, there have been admitted into the Hospital, 20,127 Patients, DEEMED CURABLE ON THEIR ADMISSION: of whom there have been discharged,—

Since the opening of the Hospital in 1751, and up to the 31st December, 1863, there have been admitted 865 Patients DEEMED INCURABLE, who had been previously discharged uncured, exclusive of those Patients (nine in number) who have, from time to time, been re-admitted, by virtue of an Annuity Deed, (dated 11th June, 1788) of the late Samuel Whitbread, Esq.; and since the 31st December, 1862, and up to the 31st December, 1863, 4 Patients, deemed incurable, have been discharged at the request of friends; 3 upon trial; 2 died; and 5 unfit.

Of the said 865 Patients (admitted as Boarders) exclusive of the Whitbread Patients,—

136 have been discharged by the desire of friends.

49 have been discharged cured.

31 upon trial.

19 uncured.

11 by order of the Committee, being paupers.

33 in consequence of the friends not complying with the Rules of the Hospital.

20 being deemed, in point of circumstances, improper objects of the Charity.

475 have died, and

91 were in the Hospital on the 31st December last, exclusive of Mr. Whitbread's patient.

The average weekly number of Patients in the Hospital during the year, has been 158.

The total number of Patients remaining on the books on the 31st December, 1863, was 152; namely, 60 Patients deemed curable, and 92 Boarders, including Mr. Whitbread's Patient.

Your Committee recommend that The Lord Overstone be re-elected President of this Corporation.

That the Right Honorable The Earl of Abingdon, the Lord Aveland; the Right Honorable the Viscount Eversley; Sir Edmund William Antrobus, Baronet; James Bentley, Esq.; and William Henry Whitbread, Esq., be re-elected Vice-Presidents of this Corporation.

That Henry Francis Shaw Lefevre, Esq., be re-elected Treasurer.

That Messrs. Fuller & Co. be re-elected Bankers of this Hospital.

Your Committee have prepared a List of Governors, whom they submit to the Court as fit and proper persons to act as the General Committee for the year ensuing.

And finally, your Committee recommend that the remaining Honorary Officers of this Corporation be severally re-elected, pursuant to the regulations.

All of which is nevertheless submitted.



#### REPORT

OF THE

# PHYSICIANS AND MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT,

FOR THE YEAR 1863.

To the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

My Lords, Ladies, and Gentlemen,

The past year has been marked by no event requiring special comment as affecting the health of the Patients under our care; the Hospital has been exempt from the visitation of any epidemic, and no serious amount of acute illness has prevailed.

Though many Patients admitted during the year gave us but little hope of their ultimately recovering, we are gratified in being able to state that the per centage of cures is slightly in excess of that of the year preceding, being in the ratio of 58.65 against 57.62.

There remained under treatment as curable cases on the 1st of January, 1863, 29 males and 35 females, in all 64; during the past year 36 males and 82 females deemed curable were admitted, making a total of 182; of these it was found necessary to discharge as unfit 7 males and 4 females; 3 males and 4 females were removed by their friends; 26 males and 52 females were discharged recovered; leaving 16 males and 44 females whose term of residence in the Hospital has not yet expired; in addition to these, 41 male and 51 female chronic cases remain, making our total number of cases on December, 31st 1863—152.

We notice that the number of cases admitted as Boarders, paying 21s. per week towards their maintenance in the Hospital, is steadily on the increase, there being now 41 inmates of this class compared with 37 at the close of last year.

We have much pleasure in recording the fact, that the number of deaths is much smaller than it has been for many years past, six only of our Patients having died since the publication of the last Report. The cases of two of these are worthy of special notice:—C. A., a female boarder, was admitted on the 28th of September, 1827, and had thus spent thirty-six years in the Hospital; the cause of her death was Cancer of the Stomach. The other case particularly referred to was also that of an old resident, E. B. B., a male, who entered the Hospital on the 19th of July, 1839; he died of Pneumonia after a short illness.

Among those whom it has been our pleasure to recommend for discharge as recovered, are two cases, also worthy of a passing comment. G. B., a clerk, was brought to the Hospital on the recommendation of the Commissioners in Lunacy, he having been under treatment for a long period without benefit, the form of disease under which he laboured was Melancholia; his anguish of mind was at times very painful to witness, he refused food, and was in a deplorable condition; after five months' residence, a marked improvement in his state became observable, and in seven months from the date of his admission he was dismissed on trial for a month with his friends, at the expiration of which period he was finally discharged cured. The other case was that of J. B., also a clerk; he was placed by his friends as a Boarder in this Institution in May last, being deemed hopelessly insane, his illness having extended over two years and a half; the form of insanity in this case also was that of Melancholia; in a short time he was much improved, his depression vanished, he became cheerful, entered with zest into the amusements provided, and within a few months of his admission accompanied the other patients in their walks out, and in excursions to the Crystal Palace and other places; he suffered no relapse, and in November was deemed sufficiently well to go out on trial; he left for a month, and at the expiration of his period of probation returned benefited by the change, and was then discharged cured; a recovery so unexpected was welcomed with gratitude by his friends, who addressed a letter of heartfelt thanks to the Committee.

Through the liberality of the Committee, the Patients, during the summer months, again enjoyed the indulgence of excursions into the country, and with very gratifying results, many dating their return to mental convalescence from these expeditions. The usual winter fortnightly Balls are now being held; these gatherings are always anticipated with much pleasure, and on no occasion has any breach of decorum occurred to mar the happiness of the assembly; the evening's amusement is diversified by singing, many of the patients and servants proving themselves excellent vocalists.

The practice of sending out Patients to walk in the streets, having been found to act beneficially, is continued, and many of the convalescing Male Patients are allowed to go out in couples without an Attendant, and in some cases alone; in one instance a forfeiture of the promise to return in time for tea occurred, and then the Patient voluntarily came back the following evening, apologising for the anxiety he had occasioned. Many Patients are allowed to go home with their friends for the day, this treat is much enjoyed, and contributes materially in our opinion to mental restoration.

The Wards on the Male side have been much improved by the introduction of Carpets in place of the Coir Matting, with which the floors were formerly covered; this improvement has been effected at no inconsiderable cost, but the increased cheerfulness of ther ooms amply compensate for the outlay thus incurred.

We have to thank George Bishop, Esq., one of the Governors, for valuable presents in the shape of Birds, Plants, &c.; such gifts are much appreciated by the Patients, often proving a source of benefit to them.

Divine Service is performed daily in the Chapel as usual; the Harmonium purchased last year being presided over by one of our Patients, who, previous to his admission, had been Organist to one of the London Churches, he has bestowed considerable pains in organising a Choir, and the whole of the responses are now chanted.

The four new windows mentioned in the report of last year have been supplied; the portions of the building where they have been placed, formerly dark, are now light and cheerful; the appearance of the Hospital from the street is also much improved by the substitution, and we hope that we shall yet see this beneficial alteration carried out on a more extended scale. Seclusion, a very valuable remedial agent in some cases, has been seldom employed during the past year, but few cases suffering from that form of disease to which it is most applicable having been admitted.

The Attendants, generally, both Male and Female, have performed their duties to our satisfaction; many of the Patients when discharged having spoken in grateful terms of the kindness they had received at their hands.

We regret that obstacles still exist to our obtaining possession of the Burial Ground referred to in previous Reports, but hope that these may eventually be removed and the land made available as an Airing Court.

The Governors will, we are sure, be gratified to learn that the greatest harmony of action prevails throughout the Hospital, a circumstance tending in a very material degree to increase the comfort and happiness of the Patients.







### REPORT

OF THE

## GENERAL COMMITTEE OF GOVERNORS

OF

## ST. LUKE'S HOSPITAL,

FOR THE YEAR 1864.

To the Court of Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

Your Committee have to report that the Benefactions during the past year amounted to £333. 3s. 9d., against £363. 7s. 8d. in 1863, and that the Annual Subscriptions amounted to £66. 8s., against £48. 11d. in 1863.

The amount received from the friends of Patients, paying one guinea per week towards their maintenance, was £393. 15s. for Curable cases, against £331. 16s. in 1863, and £1,117. 4s. for chronic cases, against £984. 18s. 0d. in 1863.

The amount received from the friends of Patients, deemed Incurable, was £1,817. 4s. 0d., against £1,989. 8s. 0d. in 1863.

The Legacy of £31. 10s. 0d., from the late Beriah Botfield, Esq., M.P., has been paid.

The Expenditure has been £9,391. 6s. 1d., against £8,791. 18s. 9d. in 1863; this increase is accounted for by your Committee having taken advantage of the low price of coals to lay in a large supply at 18s. 6d. a ton, also by the necessary outlay in white-washing the whole of the interior of the building, as well as by some additions to the furniture of the Wards.

Your Committee are sorry to add that more than £1,000. is required to be raised by the sale of Stock, to provide for the payment of the Christmas bills.

Your Committee regret to record the decease of the following Governors—

The names of seven New Governors have been added to the List during the past year.

Your Committee have on former occasions mentioned the various difficulties which they had experienced in endeavouring to procure the Bath Street Burial Ground as an addition to the Male Airing Court: they have now the pleasure to report, that they have at length succeeded in obtaining the Faculty from the Diocesan Registrar, authorising the use of this consecrated piece of land for the purposes intended by your Committee.

To render this ground available for the additional Airing Court, an immediate outlay of several hundred pounds will be required, which will cause a further reduction in the amount of Stock held by this Corporation, unless there be a liberal response on the part of the Public to the appeals made for its support.

Dr. Octavius Jepson having resigned the office of Resident Medical Superintendent, your Committee elected in his place Mr. James Ellis, who has had considerable experience in the treatment of Lunacy at the Northampton and Hanwell County Asylums.

Your Committee are preparing to substitute Iron Window Frames for the present heavy Wooden Frames, in the Wings; and they hope that the Wings will be made much more cheerful, and that the external appearance of the Hospital will be improved by the alteration.

Your Committee gratefully acknowledge the following presents to the Wards of the Hospital:—

Three rolls of valuable Engravings, from

Messrs. Colnaghi & Co., ,, Graves & Co.,

and Mr. Gambert;

as well as a fourth from an Anonymous Friend.

A beautiful assortment of Parian Statuettes, from Mr. Alderman Copeland; and a number of interesting and suitable Slides, from Mr. Nottage, of the London Stereoscopic Company.

At the request of the Resident Medical Superintendent, your Committee have altered Rule 122, so as to give additional leave

of absence to the Attendants.

Your Committee have also raised the rate of Wages of the

Attendants after five years' service.

The Commissioners in Lunacy made their usual Official Visit to the Hospital, pursuant to sec. 61 of the Act 8 & 9 Vict., cap. 100, on the 22nd July last, and reported as follows:-

> "We found the Patients on the whole in a very quiet state, and no one was secluded or restrained."

> "Restraint has not been employed for a very long period, and the instances of seclusion have been very rare."

> "The Wards were all clean, and the Bedding in good

order."

"We saw the Patients at Dinner, and tasted the food,

which was good, and neatly served."

"The Patients seem to be carefully attended to by the Medical Superintendent and other Officers, and their comforts are evidently cared for."

Your Committee contracted for the Best Wheaten Bread,-For the 4 lbs. Loaf.

From 1st April..... to 30th September, at 51d. " 1st October... to 31st December, " 51d.

And for the usual kinds of Butchers' Meat,

Per Stone of 8 lbs.

From 1st April..... to 30th September, at 4/8 ,, 1st October... to 31st December, ,, 4/7

Your Committee report that there have been received into the Hospital between the 1st January and 31st December, 1864, 126 Patients deemed Curable, being 8 in excess of the year 1863.

During the same period, there have been discharged cured 77, uncured 25, as unfit 9, at the request of their friends 8, and, there have died 7. Since the 30th July, 1751, the day on which the Hospital was first opened for the reception of Patients, and up to the 31st December, 1864, inclusive, there have been admitted into the Hospital, 20,253 Patients, DEEMED CURABLE ON THEIR ADMISSION; of whom there have been discharged—

Since the opening of the Hospital in 1751, and up to the 31st December, 1864, there have been admitted 878 Patients DEEMED INCURABLE, who had been previously discharged uncured, exclusive of those Patients (nine in number) who have, from time to time, been re-admitted, by virtue of an Annuity Deed, (dated 11th June, 1788) of the late Samuel Whitbread, Esq.; and since the 31st December, 1863, and up to the 31st December, 1864, 8 Patients, deemed incurable, have been discharged at the request of friends; 4 upon trial; 1 died; and 6 unfit.

Of the said 878 Patients (admitted as Boarders) exclusive of the Whitbread Patients,—

144 have been discharged by the desire of friends.

49 have been discharged cured.

35 upon trial.

19 uncured.

11 by order of the Committee, being paupers.

33 in consequence of the friends not complying with the Rules of the Hospital.

26 being deemed, in point of circumstances, improper objects of the Charity.

476 have died, and

85 were in the Hospital on the 31st December last — exclusive of Mr. Whitbread's patient.

Total 878

The average weekly number of Patients in the Hospital during the year, has been 163, being 5 in excess of last year.

The total number of Patients\* remaining on the books on the 31st December, 1864, was 146 namely, 60 Patients deemed curable and 86 Boarders, including Mr. Whitbread's Patient.

Your Committee recommend The Lord Overstone be re-

elected President of this Corporation.

That the Right Honorable the Earl of Abingdon, the Lord Aveland; the Right Honorable the Viscount Eversley; Sir Edmund William Antrobus, Baronet; James Bentley, Esq.; and William Henry Whitbread, Esq., be re-elected Vice-President of this Corporation.

That Henry Francis Shaw Lefevre, Esq., be re-elected Treasurer.

That Messrs. Fuller & Co. be re-elected Bankers of this Hospital.

Your Committee have prepared a List of Governors, whom they submit to the Court as fit and proper persons to act as the General Committee for the year ensuing.

And finally, your Committee recommend that the remaining Honorary Officers of this Corporation be severally re-elected pursuant to the regulations.

### REPORT

OF THE

## PHYSICIANS AND MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT

FOR THE YEAR 1864.

To the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

My Lords, Ladies, and Gentlemen,

In laying before the Court of Governors our Annual Retrospect for the year just past, it is very gratifying to us to be enabled to state, that with few exceptions, the health of the Patients, and the condition of the Hospital, has been satisfactory.

On the 31st of December, 1863, there were in the Hospital, including both sexes, 60 Patients presumed to be curable, and during the year there were admitted 126 similar cases; of these, 77 have been discharged cured, and there remains under treatment, 21 male, and 39 female Patients, exclusive of the Boarders.

From the above it will be seen that the Admissions during the year 1864, of Patients presumed to be curable, have slightly exceeded the Admissions of similar cases during the year 1863, whilst, as would be expected, the Discharges of the past year have exceeded those of the previous one, there being a total, including both sexes, of 70.64 per cent. of Patients restored to their homes as cured.

The average number of Patients daily resident during the year, was 163, a number slightly in excess of the previous year, and which is due to the Admissions of the year 1864 exceeding those of 1863, and must not be regarded as showing a permanent increase in the numbers resident; a circumstance which is not to be expected from the fact, that as some of the old Boarders yearly die off, their places are not filled up by similar cases, this class, now doubtless finding their way into County Asylums, a home for them which formerly did not exist.

The previous residences of those admitted, appear to be equally divided between the metropolis and the provinces.

During the year, seven deaths have occurred, giving a percentage on the numbers resident of 4.29, a small number, considering the very shattered condition of many of the cases which have been admitted.

The Chapel Services continue to be performed as usual, a lady Patient kindly presiding at the harmonium.

The substitution of eighteen iron window frames, ordered by the Committee, for the present decayed wooden ones, will, when completed, form a great advantage to the Hospital by giving additional light and ventilation.

One among the many advantages of the alteration of Rule 122, is the opportunity the Patients will have of exercising in the Airing Grounds on Sunday afternoon and evenings, a practice which we could not till now carry out.

During the summer months, the usual excursions into the country, and visits to the Crystal Palace and other places of amusement, have been resorted to with benefit; and in the winter months, the Balls have been looked forward to with great pleasure.

We must congratulate the Committee on the success of their endeavours to obtain additional Airing Grounds for the men's side.

To the Steward and Matron our thanks are due for their very valuable assistance.

The Attendants and Servants have, we believe, without exception, discharged their duties with care, kindness, and attention, and we, in conclusion, have to acknowledge the confidence the Committee continue to repose in us.

FOR THE YEAR 1865.

To the Court of Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

Your Committee have to report that the Benefactions during the past year amounted to £393. 10s. 0d., against £333. 3s. 9d. in 1864, and that the Annual Subscriptions have been the same in both years.

The amount received from the friends of Patients, paying one guinea per week towards their maintenance, was £387. 9s. 0d. for Curable cases, against £393. 15s. 0d. in 1864, and £1,161. 12s. 0d. for chronic cases, against £1,117. 4s. 0d. in 1864.

The amount received from the friends of Patients deemed incurable was £1,586. 18s., against £1,817. 4s. in 1864.

The Legacies of £900. Os. Od. from the late H. Sikes, Esq.

£2,000. 0s. 0d. ,, ,, R. Thornton, Esq. £379.10s. 0d. ,, ,, W. Cole, Esq.

have been paid and invested.

On the other hand, more than £2,000. Stock has been sold, to provide for the expenditure of the last two years, viz.:—on 10th March, 1865, £1,034. 9s. 8d. Reduced 3 per Ct. Annuities. and on 1st February, 1866, £1,183. 9s. 10d. Consols.

The Expenditure in 1865 has been £9,174. 13s. 6d., against £9,361. 6s. 1d. in 1864

Your Committee record with most sincere regret the death of their late Colleague, Mr. Richard Martineau, whose great abilities and sound judgment they highly appreciated.

Four other Governors have died since the last Meeting of the

Court, and eight new Governors have been nominated.

The Commissioners in Lunacy made their usual Official Visit to the Hospital, pursuant to sec. 61 of the Act 8 & 9 Vict., cap. 100, on the 3rd October last, and reported as follows:-

- "We found the Patients generally quiet and orderly, and no one in seclusion."
- "The Bedding throughout was in excellent order, and all the rooms well ventilated and quite clean, and we were pleased to observe how much had been done to render the Wards more cheerful and comfortable."
- "We had no complaints of harshness from any of the Patients, and many expressed themselves well satisfied with and grateful for the kindness they had experienced."
- "We are glad to be able to report favourably upon the present condition and management of this Hospital."

Your Committee contracted for the Best Wheaten Bread,-For the 4 lbs. Loaf.

And for the usual kinds of Butchers' Meat,

Per Stone of 8 lbs.

Your Committee report that there have been received into the Hospital between the 1st January and 31st December, 1865, 126 Patients deemed curable.

During the same period, there have been discharged cured 48, uncured 31, as unfit 6, at the request of their friends 7; and, there have died 10. Since the 30th July, 1751, the day on which the Hospital was first opened for the reception of Patients, and up to the 31st December, 1865, inclusive, there have been

Since the opening of the Hospital in 1751, and up to the 31st December, 1865, there have been admitted 889 Patients DEEMED INCUBABLE, who had been previously discharged uncured, exclusive of those Patients (nine in number) who have, from time to time, been re-admitted, by virtue of an Annuity Deed, (dated 11th June, 1788,) of the late Samuel Whitbread, Esq.; and since the 31st December, 1864, and up to the 31st December, 1865, 2 Patients, deemed incurable, have been discharged cured; 5 at the request of friends; 5 died; and 7 unfit.

Of the said 889 Patients (admitted as Boarders) exclusive of the Whitbread Patients,—

149 have been discharged by the desire of friends.

51 have been discharged cured.

35 upon trial.

19 uncured.11 by order of the Committee, being paupers.

33 in consequence of the friends not complying with the Rules of the Hospital.

33 being deemed, in point of circumstances, improper objects of the Charity.

481 have died, and

77 were in the Hospital on the 31st December last, exclusive of Mr. Whitbread's Patient.

Total 889

The average weekly number of Patients in the Hospital during

the year, has been 147.

The total number of Patients remaining on the books on the 31st December, 1865, was 142, namely, 64 Patients deemed curable, and 78 Boarders, including Mr. Whitbread's Patient.

Your Committee recommend The Lord Overstone be reelected President of this Corporation.

That the Right Honourable the Earl of Abingdon, the Lord Aveland; the Right Honourable the Viscount Eversley; Sir Edmund William Antrobus, Baronet; James Bentley, Esq.; and William Henry Whiteread, Esq., be re-elected Vice-Presidents of this Corporation.

That Henry Francis Shaw Lefevre, Esq., be re-elected Treasurer.

That Messrs. Fuller & Co. be re-elected Bankers of this Hospital.

Your Committee have prepared a List of Governors, whom they submit to the Court as fit and proper persons to act as the General Committee for the year ensuing.

And finally, your Committee recommend that the remaining Honorary Officers of this Corporation be severally re-elected pursuant to the regulations.



#### REPORT

OF THE

# PHYSICIANS AND MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT,

FOR THE YEAR 1865.

To the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

My Lords, Ladies, and Gentlemen,

In presenting to you our Report, for the past year, on the state of the Hospital and condition of the Patients, we have again much pleasure in informing you that both are satisfactory.

On the First of January there were in the Hospital 146 Patients of both sexes, and during the year 114 Patients have been admitted, 103 discharged and 15 have died, a number above the usual average, the explanation of this being that a large proportion were admitted in a feeble and shattered state of bodily health.

Among the Male Patients was one who after residing in the Hospital some few weeks, had manifested no symptoms of insanity, was discharged accordingly.

The most frequent cause of death among the curable Patients was exhaustion, and among the Boarders old age, one Patient having been in the Hospital thirty-three years.

An Inquest was held in the case of a Male Patient who died in a fit during the night; the facts were as follows:—The night-watch left the Patient alive at five o'clock in the morning and found him dead at six o'clock; as there was no one present at the moment of death, the Coroner deemed it necessary to hold an Inquest, to comply with the Act of Parliament, when the Jury returned a verdict of death from Apoplexy.

In October last the Commissioners in Lunacy made their Annual Visitation, and again recorded in the Visitors' Book their entire satisfaction as regards the state of the Hospital and condition of the Patients; we may here mention that we have received from their Board several Circulars, which have been laid before the Committee, and which have received from us that attention which we considered they required.

We continue to avail ourselves of a recent Act of Parliament, to send out on trial Patients who we believe would be benefitted by a change of scene and association, and whom we consider convalescent, but whom (owing to some peculiar circumstances in their individual cases), we could not with prudence recommend for immediate discharge; and we take this opportunity of

reporting favourably on the final result.

One Female Patient who had been in the Hospital, as a Boarder for some time, was taken by her friends to the sea-side, on trial, but having relapsed, she was brought back to the Hospital and shortly afterwards symptoms of Variola were developed, she was placed apart from the other Patients, was soon restored to sound bodily health and in a few weeks after was discharged as recovered in her mind, and has continued well. No other case of this disease has occurred since.

The orderly and devotional appearance of the Patients at Chapel, and the regularity with which some attend, lead us to hope that the ministrations of the Chaplain are not without good effect. The daily average number of Patients attending Chapel is 92.

All the Patients in the Hospital, their bodily health admitting, are encouraged to occupy and amuse themselves in the way most agreeable to their own feelings, several of the men occupying themselves in the various workshops, and a good many of the women in the laundry and at needlework. The men amuse themselves with billiards, skittles, and bowls, and the women with bagatelle and music; all have free access to the library of standard and useful books, and any can review the current literature by means of the Subscription to the Circulating Library of Messrs. W. H. Smith and Son.

The principal event in the amusements of the year was the Annual Ball and Christmas Tree, which took place in January.

The Tree this year was unusually large, being nearly 14 feet in height, and on its twigs and branches were hung a great many handsome, useful, and appropriate articles, the work of the inmates of the Establishment. This Ball is always anticipated with feelings of pleasure and remembered with those of delight, and the thanks of all present are due to the Steward and Matron, for their unwearied exertion and hospitality on the occasion.

From among those Patients who are in pretty good bodily health, we select all who are harmless and send them for walks into the Parks, and sometimes to the Zoological Gardens or Crystal Palace, whilst others who are aged and feeble we can now send in a carriage for a drive into the Country, and we venture to express the hope that we shall always be able to continue this very beneficial practice.

The Attendants and Servants have discharged their several duties to our entire satisfaction, and we lastly desire to express our acknowledgments to the Committee for their great con-

sideration to ourselves.

# GENERAL COMMITTEE OF GOVERNORS

OF

# ST. LUKE'S HOSPITAL,

FOR THE YEAR 1866.

To the Court of Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

In presenting their Annual Report, your Committee have to express their regret, that they cannot announce any improvement in the financial position of the Hospital, the Sale of a further sum of £2,000. Stock being required to pay the Christmas Bills.

The Benefactions during the past year amounted to £343. 5s. against £393. 10s. in 1865, and the Annual Subscriptions amounted to £45. 15s.

The amount received from the friends of Patients paying One Guinea per week towards their maintenance, was £237. 6s. for Curable cases, against £387. 9s. in 1865, and £1,317. 15s. for Chronic cases, against £1,161. 12s. in 1865.

The amount received from the friends of Patients, deemed incurable, was £1,376. 4s., against £1,586. 18s. in 1865.

The Legacies of

£100. from the late THOMAS HENRY WHITE, Esq.,

£100. from the late Miss Ann White have been paid.

The Expenditure has been £9,981. Is. 8d., against £9,174. 13s. 6d. in 1865.

The Master of the Rolls having decided against the admission of this Hospital to participate in the Bequest under the will of the late Lord Henry Seymour, your Committee have authorized their Solicitors to take such proceedings as may be necessary to enable them to take advantage of any new construction which may, on appeal, be put on the language of the said Will.

In common with other Charitable Institutions, this Hospital has been assessed to the Poor Rate, at a rental of £2,000.

Your Committee having authorized their Solicitors to appeal against this assessment, they have taken the opinion of Mr. Charles Lee, the eminent Surveyor, who advises that the amount is very much in excess of the proper rateable value of the Hospital; your Committee have, therefore, given instructions to appeal against the assessment.

Your Committee record with sincere regret the loss, by death, of two of their Colleagues, Thomas Pickard Warren, Esq., who, for 20 years, had most regularly attended the House Committee in his rotation; and Dr. A. J. Sutherland, the Consulting Physician of the Hospital. George Smith Thornton, Esq., has resigned; from the long connection of his family with the Hospital, and the warm interest taken in it by his late father, it would have been gratifying to your Committee to have retained him as a Colleague.

There is also a vacancy in the Committee of Audit, by the death of William Cotton, Esq.

Four other Governors have died since the last meeting of the Court, viz., W. S. Lewis, Esq., C. G. Thornton, Esq., Miss Ann White, and T. H. White, Esq.; and five new Governors have been nominated, namely,

F. Du Cane Godman, Esq.,
J. Luke, Esq.,
H. S. Pownall, Esq.,
H. N. White, Esq.

Your late Surgeon J. Luke, Esq., having ceased to reside in London, resigned his appointment. Your Committee desire to record their high sense of his valuable services during the long

period of 34 years. They have elected in his place Charles Hewitt Moore, Esq., Surgeon of the Middlesex Hospital, a gentleman, of very high standing in his profession.

The Commissioners in Lunacy made their usual Official Visit to the Hospital, pursuant to sec. 61 of Act 8 & 9 Vict., cap. 100, on the 5th July last, and their report concluded as follows:—

"We think the state of the Hospital, on the whole, to be extremely praiseworthy, making [allowance for the very great drawbacks, incident to its position and construction."

Your Committee contracted for the Best Wheaten Bread,-

For the 4lbs. Loaf.

From 1st April... to 30th September, at 64d., 1st October to 31st March, ,, 62d.

And for the usual kinds of Butchers' Meat,

Per Stone of 8lbs.

From 1st April... to 30th September, at 5s. 10d., 1st October to 31st March, ,, 5s. 8d.

Your Committee report that there have been received into the Hospital, between 1st January and 31st December, 1866, 106 Patients deemed curable.

During the same period, there have been discharged cured 67, uncured 31, as unfit 4, at the request of friends 6; and there have died 9. Since the 30th July, 1751, the day on which the Hospital was first opened for the reception of Patients, and up to the 31st December, 1866, inclusive, there have been admitted into the Hospital, 20,466 Patients, DEEMED CURABLE ON THEIR ADMISSION; of whom there have been discharged.—

Since the opening of the Hospital in 1751, and up to 31st December, 1866, there have been admitted 897 Patients DEEMED INCURABLE, who have been previously discharged uncured, exclusive of those Patients (9 in number) who have from time to time been re-admitted, by Virtue of an Annuity Deed, (dated 11th June, 1788,) of the late Samuel Whitbread, Esq., and since 31st December, 1865, and up to 31st December, 1866, 4 Patients deemed uncurable have been discharged cured; 5 at the request of friends, 1 died, and 2 unfit.

Of the said 897 Patients (admitted as Boarders) exclusive of the Whitbread Patients,

- 154 have been discharged by desire of friends.
  - 55 have been discharged cured.
- 35 upon trial.
- 19 uncured.
- 12 by order of Committee, being paupers.
- 34 in consequence of friends not complying with the rules.
- 33 being deemed, in point of circumstances, improper objects of the Charity.
- 482 have died, and
- 73 were in the Hospital 31st December last, exclusive of Mr. Whitbread's Patient.

The average weekly number of Patients in the Hospital during the year has been 134.

The total number of Patients remaining on the books on the 31st December, 1866, was 127, namely, 53 Patients deemed curable, and 74 Boarders, including Mr. Whitbread's Patient.

Your Committee recommend that The Lord Overstone be reelected President of this Corporation.

That the Right Honourable the Earl of Abingdon; the Lord Aveland; the Right Honourable the Viscount Eversley; Sir Edmund William Antrobus, Baronet; James Bentley, Esq.; and William Henry Whitbread, Esq., be re-elected Vice-Presidents of this Corporation.

That Henry Francis Shaw Lefevre, Esq., be re-elected Treasurer.

That Messrs. Fuller & Co., be re-elected Bankers of this Hospital.

Your Committee have prepared a List of Governors, whom they submit to the Court as fit and proper persons to act as the General Committee for the year ensuing.

And finally, your Committee recommend that the remaining Honorary Officers of this Corporation be severally re-elected pursuant to the regulations.

All of which is nevertheless submitted.

#### REPORT

OF THE

## PHYSICIANS AND MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT,

FOR THE YEAR 1866.

To the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

My Lords, Ladies, and Gentlemen,

It is with pleasure we have to report to you that during the past year the health of the Patients, and the condition of the Hospital, has been satisfactory.

The average number of Patients daily resident was 134.

On the Curable List there have been admitted 34 males and 72 females; and there have been discharged as recovered, 15 males and 52 females, giving a percentage of 63.20, calculated on the admissions.

On the Boarders List there have been admitted one male, and seven females; and there have been discharged, as recovered, four females.

From the Curable List, 5 males and 13 females have been sent out on trial, and from this number two males and seven females were discharged recovered, and are included in the list of recoveries, the others were discharged as relieved; one male and one female are still absent on trial.

The deaths during the year have been ten in number, five males and five females; they have been from ordinary causes,

and are less in number than in 1865; as usual several of these were in almost a dying state on admission.

On the first of January of the present year there were on the Hospital books on the Curable List 19 males and 34 females, inclusive of one male and one female absent on trial; and on the Boarders List, 30 males and 44 females.

In the month of July the Commissioners in Lunacy made their Annual Statutory visit, and have recorded at length in the Visitors' Book, the satisfactory state in which they found the Hospital. They suggest that more furniture be placed in the Wings, a suggestion which we hope the Committee will carry out.

There have been no Statutory additions to, or alterations made in the Lunacy Laws affecting this Hospital.

To the Governors it will be especially gratifying to learn that five-sixths of the Patients are more or less usefully occupied in various employments, not so much with the view of making such employment remunerative to the Hospital, as with the object of engaging the Patients' attention, and improving their general health, by moderate bodily and mental exercise. We cannot but be aware that the employment of Patients in out of door occupations, such as gardening, is not so practicable in the metropolis as in the country, but we feel certain that the Committee must regard with satisfaction any successful means used for the recovery of the Patients. We are, therefore, glad to be able to inform them that some of the Patients are engaged in gardening in the Hospital grounds, and we would venture to call attention to the circumstance, that a better green-house would materially increase their interest in such occupation, as well as adorn, by its produce, the grounds and the Hospital.

The Senate of the University of London has been pleased to signify its willingness to receive the certificates granted by us for attendance on the medical practice of this Hospital, for the purposes of graduation in Medicine in the University.

Your Physicians and Medical Superintendent cannot conclude their Report, without remarking on the loss the Hospital has sustained by the resignation of their colleague, Mr. Luke, F.R.S., who had held the office of Surgeon for thirty-four years. We believe we may state that the only cause of Mr. Luke's resignation was his retirement into the country, and his desire to relinquish the more active duties of his profession. The Committee, as well as ourselves, know how truly he carries with him the gratitude of his many Patients, and our sincerest wish that he may long live to enjoy the honorable repose his distinguished career so justly deserves.



#### REPORT

OF THE

### GENERAL COMMITTEE OF GOVERNORS.

OF

## ST. LUKE'S HOSPITAL,

FOR THE YEAR 1867.

To the Court of Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

Your Committee regret to inform the Court that the Sale of an additional sum of £2,000. Consolidated 3 per cent. Annuities has been required to pay the Tradesmen's Bills for the past year.

The Benefactions during the past year amounted to £208. 1s., against £343. 5s. in 1866; and the Annual Subscriptions amounted to £74. 6s., against £45. 15s. in 1866.

The amount received from the friends of Patients paying One Guinea per week towards their maintenance was £472. 10s. for Curable cases, against £237. 6s. in 1866; and £1,315. 13s. for Chronic cases, against £1,317. 15s. in 1866.

The amount received from the friends of Patients deemed Incurable was £1,389. 10s., against £1,376. 4s. in 1866.

The Legacy of £100. from the late Thomas Pickard Warren, Esq., has been paid.

The Expenditure has been £9,479. 19s.1d., against £9,981.1s.8d. in 1866.

Your Committee acquainted the Court at their last Meeting that the Hospital had been Assessed to the Poor Rate at a Rental of £2,000., and that they had appealed against that Assessment; they have now the satisfaction of stating that it has been reduced to £1,200. They believe this amount to be in excess of the fair rateable value of the Premises, but they hope that some legislative enactment will soon be made to liberate Hospitals from liability to the Poor Rate.

Your Committee have ascertained that the proposed widening of Bath Street is under the consideration of a Committee of the

Metropolitan Board of Works.

Your Committee have endeavoured by weekly advertisements in the "Lancet" and other newspapers of that class to invite the attention of the Medical Profession to the advantages of this Hospital as an Asylum for the Middle Classes; and for the same purpose they have recently addressed a letter to the Editor of the "Times," which was inserted on the 13th January. Your Committee are sorry to add that these publications have not produced any appreciable result.

Your Committee regret to record the deaths of two of the six Vice-Presidents of the Hospital—Lord Aveland and William Henry Whitbread, Esq. Considering the large annuity which the Hospital has received from the liberality of an ancestor of Mr. Whitbread, they beg leave to recommend that the Court do elect, as his successor, his brother, Mr. Samuel Charles Whitbread, who, as a Member of the Committee, has always

taken great interest in the welfare of the Hospital.

Five other Governors have died since the last meeting of the Court, viz.: Sir H. Des Vœux, Bart., a Member of the Committee, Robert Hanbury, Esq., M.P., Sir John M'Taggart, Bart., The Rev. P. W. Pegus, and George Smith Thornton, Esq., and three new Governors have been nominated, viz.:

Your Committee have received with much regret the resignation of their Colleague, Mark Hunter, Esq., who for more than 30 years had taken an active part in the management of the Hospital, until prevented by illness. They have the satisfaction of adding that his resignation was accompanied by a donation of £31. 10s. as a qualification for his son, Mark Wm. Hunter, Esq.

The Commissioners in Lunacy made their usual Official Visit to the Hospital, pursuant to sec. 61, of the Act 8 and 9 Vic., cap. 100, on the 9th August last, and reported as follows:—

- "We have to report most favourably of the demeanour and personal condition, as to dress and otherwise, of the Patients of both sexes and all classes.
- "The Sanitary state of the Hospital is satisfactory, the Patients under Medical treatment (none for any serious disorder) are 8 Males and 19 Females.
- "The Medical Books and Registers are carefully kept, and the Hospital generally is under good management."

And finally, your Committee recommend that the remaining Honorary Officers of this Corporation be severally re-elected pursuant to the regulations.

#### REPORT

OF THE

## PHYSICIANS AND MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT,

FOR THE YEAR 1867.

To the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

My Lords, Ladies, and Gentlemen,

It is with pleasure we have to report to you that during the past year the health of the Patients and the general condition of the Hospital has been satisfactory.

The average daily number of Patients resident was 133.

On the Curable List there have been admitted 47 males and 78 females, and there have been discharged as recovered 20 males and 45 females, giving a per centage of 66-32 calculated on the admissions.

On the Boarders' List there have been admitted 8 males and 5 females, and there have been discharged as recovered 1 male and 1 female.

From the Curable List 7 males and 5 females have been sent out on trial, and out of this number 5 males and 3 females were discharged recovered, and are included in the List of Recoveries, the others were discharged as relieved, 1 male and 3 female Patients are still absent on trial.

The deaths have been 9 in number—5 male and 4 female, and have been from ordinary causes.

On the 1st of January of the present year there were on the Hospital books, on the Curable List, 19 males and 43 females, inclusive of 1 male and 3 females absent on trial, and on the Boarders' List 32 males and 44 females.

In the month of August last the Commissioners in Lunacy made their Annual Statutory Visit, and have recorded at length in the Visitors' Book the satisfactory state in which they found the Hospital.

The very unsatisfactory manner in which many of the Medical Certificates are filled up in some of the cases applying for admission requires from us a few remarks, as it frequently happens that the Certificates brought with Patients from the country contain only the opinion that the Patient is insane and not the special facts of the state in which the Medical Practitioner found the Patient on his examination. Hence other Medical Certificates have to be obtained, a circumstance which gives a great deal of trouble, and such a further expense to the friends, as in many cases can be ill-afforded; and we wish to impress on the profession the necessity that exists for recording plainly in each case the amount of perversion as regards the intellect, habits, instincts or affections.

On referring to the Statistical Tables the Committee will observe the high rate of cures that obtains in this Hospital: this we consider to be mainly owing to the assistance our special remedies receive from the liberal and admirably served dietary of the establishment, supplemented as it is with Brandy, Wine, &c. These things carefully administered are not less essential than medicine in the cure of this disease, and the Committee does not need to be informed, after hearing the history of the many cases applying for admission, that insanity is probably as much as any other disease a disease of debility. We often observe indeed that long before any mental lesion is suspected, the bodily health of the Patient has been gradually giving way, and that the brain shows itself to be ill-nourished by the restless


fretfulness of the Patient; hence the peculiar necessity, for kind nursing and generous diet, and we gratefully thank the Committee for placing so liberally at our disposal these means.



#### REPORT

OF THE

### GENERAL COMMITTEE OF GOVERNORS

OF

## ST. LUKE'S HOSPITAL,

FOR THE YEAR 1868.

To the Court of Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

The Court will be gratified to know that the following letter has been addressed to the Secretary by Sir William Jenner:—

"18, Harley Street, W.
"1st March, 1868.

" Dear Sir,

"I am commanded by the Queen to forward the accompanying copy of "Leaves from the Journal of Our Life in the Highlands" to the Library of St. Luke's Hospital, for the use of the Patients.

At the last meeting of the Court, your Committee reported that they had addressed a letter to the Editor of the "Times," inviting the attention of the public to the advantages afforded by this Hospital as an Asylum for the Middle Classes. Your Committee regret that they have to repeat what they stated on that occasion, that the letter has produced no appreciable result.

Your Committee have pleasure in informing the Court that they have at length succeeded in obtaining possession of the Burial ground, which is now being laid out as an extension of the original Airing Court. The expense of this alteration, together with that of setting back the Wall in Bath Street will exceed £1,000.

The Benefactions during the past year amounted to £709. 6s. against £208. 1s., in 1867; and the Annual Subscriptions

amounted to £61. 4s., against £74. 6s. in 1867.

The amount received from the friends of Patients paying One Guinea per week towards their maintenance was £399. for Curable cases, against £472. 10s. in 1867; and £1,481. 11s. for Chronic cases, against £1,315. 13s. in 1867.

The amount received from the friends of Patients deemed Incurable was £1,416. 9s., against £1,389. 10s. in 1867.

The Legacy of £10. from the late John White, Esq., has been paid.

The Expenditure has been £10,763. 14s. 2d., against

£9,479. 19s. 1d. in 1867.

Your Committee regret to add that a further sum of £3,000., Consolidated 3 per Cent. Annuities, has been sold for the payment of the Tradesmen's Bills.

Your Committee contracted for the Best Wheaten Bread,-

For the 41bs. Loaf.

From 1st April ... to 30th September, at 8½d.

" 1st October to 31st March, " 7¼d.

And for the usual kinds of Butchers' Meat,-

Per Stone of 81bs.

From 1st April... to 30th September, at 4s. 10d., 1st October to 31st March, ,, 5s. 0d.

Your Committee report that there have been received into the Hospital, between the 1st January and 31st December, 1868, 136 Patients deemed Curable.

During the same period there have been discharged Cured, 65; Uncured, 20; as unfit, 28; at the request of friends, 16; and there have died, 10. Since 30th July, 1751, the day on which

the Hospital was first opened for the reception of Patients, and up to the 31st December, 1868, inclusive, there have been admitted into the Hospital, 20,727 Patients, deemed Curable on Their admission; of whom there have been discharged,—

Since the opening of the Hospital in 1751, and up to the 31st December, 1868, there have been admitted 930 Patients deemed Incurable, who have been previously discharged uncured,

exclusive of those Patients, (9 in number,) who have from time to time been re-admitted by virtue of an Annuity deed (dated 11th June, 1788), of the late Samuel Whitbread, Esq.; and since 31st December, 1867, and up to 31st December, 1868, 2 Patients deemed incurable, have been discharged cured; 9 at request of friends; 1 died; 5 unfit; and 1 the friends not complying with the Rules.

Of these 930 Patients (admitted as Boarders) exclusive of the Whitbread Patient,

- 172 have been discharged by desire of friends,
  - 59 have been discharged cured,
  - 35 upon trial,
  - 24 uncured,
  - 12 by order of Committee, being paupers,
  - 35 in consequence of friends not complying with the rules,
  - 33 being deemed, in point of circumstances, improper objects of the Charity,
- 486 have died, and
- 74 were in the Hospital 31st December last, exclusive of Mr. Whitbread's Patient.

#### Total 930

The average number of Patients in the Hospital through the year has been 147.

The total number of Patients remaining on the Hospital Books on 31st December, 1868, was 134, viz.: 59 Patients deemed curable, and 75 Boarders, including Mr. Whiteread's Patient.

Your Committee recommend that the Lord OVERSTONE be re-elected President of this Corporation.

### REPORT

OF THE

# PHYSICIANS & MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT.

FOR THE YEAR 1868.

To the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

My Lords, Ladies, and Gentlemen,

It is with pleasure we have to report to you that during the past year the health of the Patients has been satisfactory.

The average daily number of Patients resident has been 147.

On the Curable List there have been admitted 46 males and 90 females, and there have been discharged as recovered 25 males and 40 females, giving a per centage of recoveries of 68.42 calculated on the admissions.

On the Boarders' List there have been admitted 6 males and 9 females, and there have been discharged as recovered 2 females

From the Curables' List 15 males and 12 females have been sent out on trial, and out of this number 11 males and 8 females were discharged recovered, and are included in the List of Recoveries, the other Patients were discharged as relieved, 2 male Patients are still absent on trial.

The deaths have been 11 in number, 2 male and 9 female, and have been from the ordinary causes.

On the 1st of January of the present year there were on the Hospital books, on the Curable List, 20 males and 40 females, and on the Boarders' List 34 males and 43 females, including 2 males absent on trial.

In the month of December last, the Commissioners in Lunacy made their Annual Statutory Visit, and have recorded at length in the Visitors' Book the State in which they found the Hospital. As regards the Patients they say—"With few exceptions we found these Patients in a favorable state, not one was suffering from any degree of excitement in either side of the Hospital, and their appearance as to dress and tidiness, and generally as to bodily health and condition, was throughout very satisfactory."

In the month of June last, the Committee appointed a male night attendant, and thus relieved the ordinary male attendants from night duty; and we have much pleasure in recording our opinion as to the very satisfactory way in which this arrangement works, and we beg leave to suggest for the consideration of the Committee the expediency of adopting the same practice on the female side.

The considerable addition that has recently been made to the male airing grounds, goes very far to remove the objections which have been urged as to our means for out-door recreation. It has afforded the opportunity of removing a boundary wall, and of substituting a light ornamental iron fence as a division between

the airing grounds. The open space thus acquired, with its broad gravel walks and large grass plot, adds greatly to the cheerful aspect of this part of the establishment.





#### REPORT

OF THE

### GENERAL COMMITTEE OF GOVERNORS

OF

### ST. LUKE'S HOSPITAL,

FOR THE YEAR 1869.

To the Court of Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

Your Committee beg leave to submit the following Report.

The Burial Ground obtained from the Parochial Authorities at a rent of £30. per annum, has been converted into an Airing Court to the great advantage of the Male Patients, but the expense of the alteration, so strongly urged by the Commissioners in Lunacy, together with setting back the wall in Bath Street, has been greater than was anticipated, viz., about £1,500.

To increase and improve the supply of hot water throughout the Hospital, two new Cornish Boilers have been substituted for the old ones at a cost of £288. The vacancy announced in the last Report in the office of the Resident Medical Superintendent, was filled up on the 9th of April, by the appointment of Dr. J. Thompson Dickson.

A Sub-Committee was appointed on the 9th April to make the required arrangements consequent on the union of the offices of Chaplai and Secretary, which was then decided upon. In the following month, the Rev. T. H. Cole, M.A., was elected to the combined offices of Chaplain and Secretary, and entered on his duties on the 1st of July.

The Benefactions during the past year amounted to £647. 2s. 5d., against £709. 6s. in 1868, and the Annual Subscriptions amounted to £160. 8s., against £166. 4s. in 1868.

The amount received from the friends of Patients towards their maintenance was £533. 8s. for Curable Cases, against £399. in 1868; and £1,617 for Chronic Cases, against £1,481. 11s. in 1868.

The amount received for Incurable Cases was £1,449, against £1,416. 9s. in 1868.

Under the Will of the late Lord Henry Seymour, the sum of £400. has been received as a portion of the Legacy.

The sum of £1,000. Reduced 3 per Cent. Stock bequeathed by the late W. Hollins, Esq., has also been received and transferred into the names of three Trustees as required by the Will.

The Expenditure in 1869 was £11,517. 10s. 8d., against £10,763. 14s. 2d. in 1868.

Your Committee regret to state that during the past year they were obliged to sell £4,000. Consolidated 3 per Cent. Annuities, more than one-half that amount being required to meet the cost of Improvements in and about the Hospital.

In accordance with the sanction of the Annual Courts of 1858 and 1859, your Committee have made such alterations in the scale of charges for Patients not on the Free List, as will, in their opinion, both improve the finances of the Hospital, and meet the requirements of every class of Patients seeking admission.

The details of this are set forth in a scheme prepared by the Secretary.

There have been received into the Hospital, between the 1st January and 31st December, 1869, 120 Patients deemed Curable.

During the same period there have been discharged Cured, 60; Uncured, 25; unfit, 15; at the request of friends, 11; and there have died, 8.

Since 30th July, 1751, the day on which the Hospital was first opened for the reception of Patients, and up to the 31st December, 1869, inclusive, there have been admitted into the Hospital, 20,847 Patients, deemed Curable on THEIR ADMISSION; of whom there have been discharged,—

During the past year, of the Patients, deemed incurable, 4 have been discharged cured; 12 at request of friends; 2 unfit, and 3 have died.

Since the opening of the Hospital in 1751, and up to the 31st December, 1869, there have been admitted 964 Patients deemed incurable, exclusive of those Patients (9 in number,) who who have been from time to time re-admitted by virtue of an Annuity Deed (dated 11th June, 1788,) of the late Samuel Whitbread, Esq.

Of the above 964 Patients (admitted as Boarders) exclusive of the Whitbread Patients,

185 have been discharged by desire of friends,

### Total 964

The average number of Patients in the Hospital throughout the year has been 132.

The total number of Patients remaining on the Books on 31st December, 1869, were 141, viz.: 60 Patients deemed curable, and 81 Boarders, including Mr. Whitbread's Patient.

Five Governors have died since the last Meeting of the Court, viz., the Marquis of Westminster, Richard Baggallay, Esq., Nathaniel Clark, Esq., T. Musgrave Musgrave, Esq., and W. Nockells, Esq.

The following new Governors have been nominated, viz.: the Right Hon. Earl Cowper, Charles Percival Titt, Esq., and Edward C. Healey, Esq.

Your Committee cannot close this Report, without protesting against the many unjust strictures on the management of the Hospital, which have from time to time appeared (chiefly anonymously), in various Newspapers.

So strongly did your Committee feel the injustice of these statements, and so desirous were they that a full investigation as to the accuracy of those reports should take place, that they applied to the Lord Chancellor to institute an independent enquiry into the entire management of the Hospital, but they regret to say that his Lordship declined on the ground that the case was not within his jurisdiction.

Although your Committee thus failed to obtain an authoritative investigation of their alleged mismanagement, they have the satisfaction of knowing that the false statements of which they complain have not deterred the friends of Patients from applying for admission, for the number received of those whose friends contribute to their support have doubled since the beginning of last year; and your Committee confidently expect that a further increase in the number of Patients will result from the financial scheme proposed by the Secretary, and adopted by your Committee.

Your Committee recommend as follows:-

That the Lord OVERSTONE be re-elected President of this Corporation.

That the Right Honourable the Earl of Abingdon, D.C.L.; the Right Honourable the Viscount Eversley; Sir Edmund William Antrobus, Baronet; Samuel Charles Whitberead, Esq., F.R.S.; W. Foster White, Esq.; be re-elected Vice-Presidents of this Corporation; and that Earl Cowper be elected a Vice-President in the place of James Bentley, Esq., who has resigned.

That Henry Francis Shaw Lefevre, Esq.; be re-elected the Treasurer.

That Messrs. Fuller & Co. be re-elected the Bankers.

Your Committee submit a List of Governors, as fit and proper persons to act as the General Committee for the year ensuing, and recommend that the number of that Committee be increased from 30 to 40.

You will also have to elect a Committee of Audit.

#### REPORT

OF THE

### PHYSICIANS & MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT,

FOR THE YEAR 1869.

To the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

My Lords, Ladies, and Gentlemen,

WE beg to present our Annual Report for the year 1869.

The average daily number of Patients resident was 132.

On the Curable List 44 males and 76 females were admitted, and 22 males and 38 females were discharged as recovered.

Of 93 Patients whose treatment was completed, 60 were discharged as recovered, giving the average of recoveries as 64.51 per cent.

On the Boarders' List 6 males and 20 females were admitted, and 4 females were discharged as recovered.

From the Curable List 10 males and 17 females were sent out on trial, and out of that number 5 males and 10 females were discharged recovered, and are included in the List of Recoveries; 4 of the remaining number were discharged as relieved, 1 died, 1 returned to the Hospital, and 4 males and 1 female are still absent on trial.

There were 11 deaths—5 male and 6 female, all from natural causes.

On the 1st January of the present year there were, (on the Hospital books) on the Curable list 22 males and 38 females; and on the Boarders' list 31 males and 50 females, including 4 males and 1 female absent on trial.

The Commissioners in Lunacy made their Annual Statutory Visit in April last, and recorded in the Visitors' book the state in which they found the Hospital.

In the month of June last your Committee appointed an additional night-watch on each side of the establishment, and we are pleased to state that the result is satisfactory.

The Committee also introduced Dent's system of Tell-tale in order that the night-attendants might register their visits the more accurately. We have pleasure in reporting also that the operation of this change is satisfactory.

The Committee further have erected two new steam boilers of greater capacity than those formerly in use, also two additional hot-water tanks. The supply of hot water is now ample, and sufficient for all emergencies.

The ground used as a drying-ground for the Laundry, has been levelled and turfed to form a croquet-ground, where, during the summer, the Patients daily have the opportunity of taking exercise and amusement. The skittle alley, which was removed for the purpose of building the new wall on the male side, has been replaced, and is a source of considerable amusement to the male Patients.

Numbers of the Patients take exercise beyond the Hospital boundaries; as many as twenty, and sometimes even more, are allowed in the same day to take walks in the streets in charge of attendants.
