# REPORT

OF THE

# GENERAL COMMITTEE OF GOVERNORS

OR

# ST. LUKE'S HOSPITAL,

FOR THE YEAR 1880.

To the Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

Your Committee, in submitting their Report for the year 1880, are pleased in being able to refer to the continued prosperity of the Institution.

There have not been many incidents calling for special remark.

They are gratified in being able to announce that H.R.H. the Duke of Cambridge has graciously consented to become the President of this Charity.

As bearing on the improvement of the health and recreation of the patients, they have to report that during the year they have laid out afresh the former burial-ground as a pleasure garden for the male patients; the billiard-room has been thoroughly renovated; fifty exterior windows in the wards have been enlarged, to the great improvement of light and ventilation; all the wards have been re-papered; a number of additional bedsteads and a new carpet for D ward have been provided; three portable fire engines have been placed upon the premises for the better protection of

the Hospital in case of fire. Your Committee have to congratulate the Governors that they have been able to invest £1,000 in Reduced £3 per Cents.

They have to record their deep regret at the loss of Henry Francis Shaw Lefevre, Esq., a Vice-Bresident and their former Treasurer, who for many years devoted so much time and attention to the interests of the Hospital.

The Chaplain reports that the weekly attendance of Patients at Chapel during the year has averaged 100.7 males and 148 females, and that during the same period he has specially visited 294 Patients.

The Sacrament of "The Lord's Supper" was administered in the Chapel of the Hospital 10 times during the year.

Your Committee have also to report that between the 1st January and 31st December, 1880, there have been received into the Hospital 57 Patients deemed curable, and discharged 49—viz.:—cured, 24; uncured, 11; unfit, 1; at request of friends, 10; died, 3.

During the same period there have been admitted 14 Patients uncured, or deemed incurable, and discharged 14—viz.:—cured, 3; unfit, 1; at request of friends, 3; died, 6; not conforming with the rules, 1.

Since the 30th July, 1751, the day on which the Hospital was first opened for the reception of Patients, and up to the

31st December, 1880, inclusive, 22,968 Patients have been admitted into the Hospital, viz.:—

21,739 Patients deemed curable on their admission.

1,219 "Uncured, or deemed incurable on ditto.

May it please Your Royal Highness, My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen.

Your Medical Officers have the honour to present their Annual Medical Report and the usual Statistical Tables for the past year. During the year 71 patients were admitted, 54 were discharged and 9 died. On the 1st of January, 1881, there remained on the books of the Hospital 199 Patients, including 5 males and 7 females absent on trial.

Of the 71 patients admitted, there were 14 males and 57 females; of these 1 male and 7 females had been at some time previously in the Hospital; and 1 male and 7 females were transferred from other Institutions. Of the admissions 12 males and 45 females were received as curable, and 2 males and 12 females as chronic cases.

Three of the above cases had been resident 20, 25, and 26 years respectively; and 1 died at the age of 87, another 77, and five others were between 60 and 70.

The percentage of deaths upon the total number of patients under treatment during the year was 3.4.

The average weekly number of Patients upon the books of the Hospital was 193, namely, 61 males and 132 females.

Of the 63 discharges and deaths during the year, 48 were recent cases regarded as curable, but 9 of these were discharged at the request of friends, thus reducing the number of cases deemed curable which have had the opportunity of completing their year of treatment in the Hospital to 39; of these 24 were discharged recovered, giving a percentage of 61.53.

The remaining 3 who were discharged recovered were chronic cases, 2 of whom had been resident in the Hospital 5 and 7 years respectively.

We are again able to report favourably of the general health of the patients during the past twelve months; by careful attention in keeping the Wards and Dormitories at a healthy and comfortable temperature, the prolonged cold at the commencement of the year did not produce the ill effects to which those who are suffering from mental and physical depression, of all ages, are peculiarly liable.

None of the casualties to which the inmates of this and similar Institutions must always be more or less subject, have occurred

We may accept as evidence of the gratitude really felt by patients and their friends, the fact that letters and personal testimony are frequently received, expressing in warm terms their thankfulness for the means employed for their recovery and the benefits of a comfortable home afforded by the Hospital.

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



## REPORT

OF THE

## GENERAL COMMITTEE OF GOVERNORS

OF

## ST. LUKE'S HOSPITAL,

FOR THE YEAR 1881.

To the Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

Your Committee beg herewith to submit their Report for the year 1881.

They have continued to give their best attention to the improvement of the Establishment; the interior of the building has been whitewashed; the boilers for heating purposes have been converted and reset on Livet's Patent; and a new carpet has been supplied for Ward D.

In all alterations and improvements in the Hospital, their object is to make the conditions of existence within their walls cheerful to all Patients whose circumstances require them to seek admission, and much gratifying testimony has been received as to the success which has attended their efforts in this direction.

During the past year two legacies have been bequeathed to the Hospital—one of £1,073 is. 4d. by Mrs. Caroline Batty, and another of £100 by Mr. James Bentley.

£1,000 has been invested in Reduced £3 per Cents on account of the Hospital.

Your Committee desire to record their sense of the valuable services rendered to the Hospital by the late Dr. F. R. Philp during the last 33 years—first, as one of the Physicians; and, since 1860, as one of the Governors.

The Chaplain reports that the weekly attendance of Patients at Chapel during the year has averaged 109.11 males and 127.46 females, and that during the same period he has specially visited 140 Patients.

The Sacrament of "The Lord's Supper" was administered in the Chapel of the Hospital 11 times during the year.

Your Committee have also to report that between the 1st January and 31st December, 1881, there have been received into the Hospital 60 Patients deemed curable, and discharged 63—viz.:—cured, 29; uncured, 18; at request of friends, 11; died, 5.

During the same period there have been admitted 12 Patients uncured, or deemed incurable, and discharged 19—viz.:—cured, 2; uncured, 2; unfit, 2; at request of friends, 8; died, 5.

Since the 30th July, 1751, the day on which the Hospital was first opened for the reception of Patients, and up to the

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31st December, 1881, inclusive, 23,040 Patients have been admitted into the Hospital, viz.:—



MAY IT PLEASE YOUR ROYAL HIGHNESS, MY LORDS, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

We have the honour to present the Annual Medical Report with the Statistical Tables for the past year. During the year 72 Patients were admitted, 72 were discharged and 10 died. On the 1st of January, 1882, there were remaining on the books of the Hospital 189 Patients, including 4 females absent on trial.

Of the 72 Patients admitted, there were 23 males and 49 females; of these 2 males and 9 females had been at some time previously in the Hospital; and 5 males and 2 females were transferred from other Institutions. Of the admissions 16 males and 44 females were received as curable, and 7 males and 5 females as chronic cases.

The deaths were all from natural causes: four of the females had been inmates of the Hospital for 41, 29, 27 and 21 years respectively.

The percentage of deaths upon the total number of Patients under treatment during the year was 3.7.

The average weekly number of Patients upon the books of the Hospital was 192, namely, 60 males and 132 females.

Of the 82 discharges and deaths during the year, 63 were recent cases regarded as curable, but 10 of these were discharged at the request of friends, thus reducing the number of cases deemed curable which have had the opportunity of completing their year of treatment in the Hospital to 53; of these 26 were discharged recovered, giving a percentage of 49.05.

The remaining 5 who were discharged recovered were chronic cases, 1 of whom had been resident in the Hospital 8 years.

The general health of the Patients has been good: the severe weather at the commencement of the year fortunately passed without adding materially to the sickness or death rate.

In May small-pox again became very prevalent; the Committee however sanctioned the adoption of such precautionary measures that, we are happy to say, were successful in keeping the Hospital free from the disease.

We have again found during the past year, owing to the want of knowledge of the nature of the malady, the injudicious interfering of friends has frequently interrupted the progress of the treatment, and led to the removal of Patients who in all probability would have perfectly recovered, if the treatment had been allowed to continue.

#### REPORT

OF THE

### GENERAL COMMITTEE OF GOVERNORS

OF

### ST. LUKE'S HOSPITAL,

FOR THE YEAR 1882.

To the Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

Your Committee submit their Report for the year 1882.

They have during the year carried out certain alterations and improvements. A new foul-linen wash-house has been erected on the Male side, and water closets have been added on the latest sanitary system. The skittle ground for the recreation of the Patients has been enlarged and improved.

During the year your Committee have to express their regret at the death of the late Matron, Mrs. Charlotte Eliza Walker, after 33 years' faithful service in the Hospital, and the retirement of the Steward, Mr. Thomas Collier Walker, on a pension of £200. a year, after having discharged his duties for the same number of years, to the entire satisfaction of the Governors. Miss Caroline Burrows was appointed Matron in succession to Mrs. Walker, but on her retirement at the expiration of six months, was succeeded by Miss Beatrice Elizabeth Sterne. Mr. Crespin, the Secretary, was appointed to act as Steward in addition to his present office, as it was considered that the saving thereby effected would not impair the efficient discharge of the duties of the two offices. The salary of Dr. Mickley, the Resident Medical Superintendent, has been raised to £400. a year.

A gratuity of £75 was granted to Miss Walker for her services pending the appointment of a new Matron.

A Head Attendant has been appointed at the recommendation of the Commissioners in Lunacy.

Your Committee regret to announce the death of John Williams, Esq., a Vice-President, and for 32 years a Governor

of this Hospital.

They have also to announce the resignation of Dr. Henry Monro, one of the Physicians, and beg to record their high appreciation of his valuable services and assistance during the period of the 28 years he has held office.

Your Committee recommend that Dr. Henry Monro should be appointed Honorary Consulting Physician. They further recommend that the office of Physician now vacant should not

at present be filled up.

The Chaplain reports that the weekly attendance of Patients at Chapel during the year has averaged 126.84 males and 113.75 females, and that during the same period he has specially visited 164 Patients.

The Sacrament of "The Lord's Supper" was administered

in the Chapel of the Hospital 11 times during the year.

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To the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Committee, and Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR ROYAL HIGHNESS, MY LORDS, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

Your Medical Officers have again the honour of presenting to you the Annual Medical Report and Statistical Tables.

During the past year 85 Patients were admitted, 63 were discharged, and 6 died.

On the 1st of January, 1883, 205 Patients remained on the Books of the Hospital, classified as follows:—

Of the 85 Patients admitted, 20 were males and 65 females; of these, 5 males and 10 females had been treated in the Hospital on some previous occasion; and 4 males and 3 females were transferred from similar Institutions. Of the admissions, 17 males and 57 females were admitted as curable, and 3 males and 8 females as chronic cases.

No Inquest has been considered necessary; the deaths were all from natural causes. One of the females had resided in the Hospital 30 and another 22 years.

The health of the Patients has been generally good, and no serious accident has occurred.

The average number of Patients on the books of the Hospital has been 201; namely, 70 males and 131 females.

Of the 69 discharges and deaths during the year, 59 were recent cases regarded as curable, but 7 of these were discharged at the request of friends, 1 as unfit, and 1 the friends not complying with the Rules; thus reducing the number of cases which have had the opportunity of completing their year of treatment in the Hospital to 50; of these 28 were discharged recovered, giving a percentage of 56.0. The other Patient who was discharged recovered was a chronic case.

The percentage of deaths upon the total number of Patients under treatment during the year was 2·1.







## ST. LUKE'S HOSPITAL,

FOR THE YEAR 1883.

To the Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

Your Committee submit their Report for the year 1883.

They have during the year carried out certain alterations and improvements. New carpets have been put down in the Male Wards A and C, and new fire mains and hydrants have been fitted throughout the Hospital. The Chapel has also been renovated.

Your Committee regret to announce the death of George Bishop, Esq., a Member of the Committee, and for 25 years a Governor of this Hospital.

The Chaplain reports that the weekly attendance of Patients at Chapel during the year has averaged 126.98 males and 123.96 females, and that during the same period he has specially visited 225 Patients.

The Sacrament of "The Lord's Supper" was administered in the Chapel of the Hospital 10 times during the year.

Contracts for the undermentioned provisions were entered into as follows:—

Your Committee have also to report that between the 1st January and 31st of December, 1883, there have been received into the Hospital 56 Patients deemed curable, and discharged 67—viz.:—cured, 30; uncured, 14; at request of friends, 9; unfit, 2; escaped, 1; died, 11.

During the same period there have been admitted 9 Patients uncured, or deemed incurable, and discharged 14—viz.:—cured, 5; uncured, 3; at request of friends, 5; died, 1.

Since the 30th July, 1751, the day on which the Hospital was first opened for the reception of Patients, and up to the 31st of December, 1883, inclusive, 23,190 Patients have been admitted into the Hospital, viz.:—

We have the honour to present to you the Annual Medical Report and Statistical Tables for the last year.

During the year 65 Patients were admitted, 69 were discharged, and 12 died.

On the 1st of January, 1884, there remained on the Books of the Hospital 189 Patients.

Of the 65 Patients admitted, there were 18 males and 52 females; of these, 1 male and 5 females had been at some time previously under treatment in the Hospital; and 4 females were transferred from other Institutions. Of the admissions, 11 males and 45 females were received as curable, and 2 males and 7 females as chronic cases

In one case, that of a female, death by suicide took place while she was absent on leave; during her stay in the Hospital she had made, apparently steady, improvement, and to all appearances was convalescent.

An Inquest was held on a male patient, affected with Paralysis of the Insane, death having resulted from impaction of food whilst taking his tea. The percentage of deaths upon the total number of Patients under treatment during the year was 4.4.

The average number of Patients on the Books of the Hospital has been 199—namely, 64 males and 185 females.

Of the 81 discharges and deaths during the year, 67 were recent cases regarded as curable, but of these 14 were discharged at the request of friends, and 2 as unfit, thus reducing the number of curable cases which have had the opportunity of completing their year of treatment in the Hospital to 51; of these 30 were discharged recovered, giving a percentage of 58.8. The remaining 5 who were discharged recovered, were chronic cases; one of these, a female, after nearly twenty-four years' residence.

FOR THE YEAR 1884.

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To the Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

Your Committee submit their Report for the year 1884

During the year extensive repairs have been carried out, necessitating an increased expenditure under the general item of repairs. A large number of the single rooms have been painted in the male and female wings, and all the lavatories have been thoroughly done up, including the enamelling of the baths. New steam coils have been fitted to the fire tanks connected with the hot water supply; and the piers to the entrance gate into the Hospital yard have been pulled down and entirely rebuilt in cement. The drainage has also been improved in several minor but important points, such as the ventilation from the waste pipes from the lavatories and baths by discharging them into open Yorkshire traps instead of direct into the soil pipes and drains.

Your Committee regret to announce the death of James Bury Capel, Esq., a Member of the Committee, and for 22 years a Governor of this Hospital.

The Chaplain reports that the weekly attendance of Patients at Chapel during the year has averaged 121.94 males and 102.94 females, and that during the same period he has specially visited 183 Patients.

The Sacrament of "The Lord's Supper" was administered in the Chapel of the Hospital 9 times during the year.

To the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Committee, and Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR ROYAL HIGHNESS, MY LORDS, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

Your Medical Officers beg to submit to you the Annual Report and Statistical Tables for the Year 1884.

During the year 68 Patients were admitted, 56 were discharged, and 4 died.

On the 1st of January, 1885, 197 Patients remained on the Books of the Hospital, classified as follows:—

Of these, 2 females were absent on trial.

Of the 68 Patients admitted, 17 were males and 51 females; of these, 1 male and 10 females had been treated in the Hospital on some previous occasion; and 3 males and 5 females were transferred from similar Institutions.

Of the admissions, 14 males and 43 females were admitted as curable, and 3 males and 8 females as chronic cases.

All the deaths which have occurred resulted from ordinary causes, excepting one in which a patient having sufficiently recovered to justify a trial at home on leave of absence, had gone on fairly well for three months, when, to the astonishment of his family, who were in no way prepared for it, committed suicide by hanging himself in an out-house. It will be remembered that in the last Report, death by suicide was

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noticed in the case of a female Patient who was absent on leave, and who left the Hospital apparently convalescent, but with just sufficient doubt as to the permanency of her recovery to suggest caution as to the form of her discharge. The expediency of this caution was justified by the result. These two cases illustrate in a striking manner the difficulty of determining absolutely the existence of insanity, or the complete recovery from its attack. On the one hand it is of course necessary to guard against the undue prolongation of control, but on the other, it is the most anxious duty of every medical man having charge of an insane person to determine when that control may be relaxed or altogether removed.

The percentage of deaths upon the total number of Patients under treatment during the year has been 1.5.

The general health of those resident in the Hospital has been well maintained.

The average number of Patients on the books of the Hospital has been 190—namely, 60 males and 130 females.

In all statistics so much depends upon the principle which is adopted in their preparation, the result varying widely accordingly; for instance, the important question of the number of Recoveries depends, to a considerable extent, upon the character of the cases upon which the average is made. The total number of admissions includes a certain proportion of chronic cases, and counting these, the average of Recoveries for the year has been 48.3 per cent.; whereas, if the estimate is made upon the recent cases admitted, these being in fact regarded as the curable cases, the average of Recoveries for the past year has been 50.8 per cent.; so that, in fact, more than half of all the curable cases admitted have recovered.

It may not be inappropriate, in the light of these facts, to impress upon the friends of all those suffering from any degree of mental disorder, the vast importance of seeking advice with a view to prompt and efficient treatment, the prospects of recovery as a rule depending upon the early recognition of the true state of the case.

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





#### REPORT

OF THE

### GENERAL COMMITTEE OF GOVERNORS

### ST. LUKE'S HOSPITAL,

FOR THE YEAR 1885.

To the Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

Your Committee submit their Report for the year 1885.

During the year numerous minor repairs have been needed in the Building, and have been carried out at some expense.

A large amount of papering, whitewashing, and internal painting has been done in the wards, and in addition the whole of the corridors and staircase in the Middle House have been painted. A very important addition has been made to the Building in the shape of a new staircase from the B Ward to the sleeping rooms above, to provide an additional exit for the Patients to facilitate escape in the event of fire.

The Chaplain reports that the weekly attendance of Patients at Chapel during the year has averaged 130.4 males and 106.96 females, and that during the same period he has specially visited 355 Patients.

The Sacrament of "The Lord's Supper" was administered in the Chapel of the Hospital 9 times during the year.

During the past year two legacies have been bequeathed to the Hospital—one of £100. by George Dryden, Esq., and another of £1000. by Miss M. A. Smith, which latter sum has been invested in Reduced £3. per Cent. Annuities on account of the Hospital.

Your Committee have also to report that between the 1st January and 31st December, 1885, there have been received into the Hospital 47 Patients deemed curable, and discharged, 41, viz.:—cured, 21; uncured, 8; at request of friends, 12. Three females and two males have died.

During the same period there have been admitted 12 Patients uncured, or deemed incurable, and discharged, 11, viz.:—cured, 1; uncured, 3; at request of friends, 6; friends not complying with the rules, 1. Two females and one male have died.

Since the 30th July, 1751, the day on which the Hospital was first opened for the reception of Patients, and up to the 31st December, 1885, inclusive, 23,317 Patients have been admitted into the Hospital, viz.:—

22,033 Patients deemed curable on their admission.

1,274 ,, uncured, or deemed incurable on ditto.
10 ,, admitted from time to time under an Annuity
Deed (dated 11th June, 1788) of the late
Samuel Whitbread, Esq.

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#### REPORT

OF THE

#### MEDICAL OFFICERS,

FOR THE YEAR 1885.

To the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Committee, and Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

May it please Your Royal Highness, My Lords, Ladies, and Gentlemen.

We have the honour to present the Annual Medical Report with the Statistical Tables for the past year.

During the year 59 Patients were admitted, 52 were discharged, and 8 died.

The number of admissions has sensibly diminished in comparison with the average admissions during the last five years, which was 72 per annum; this year being 59; this is no doubt in great measure owing, as we have occasioned distinct evidence, to the unwillingness of medical men to sign certificates, the result being that a certain proportion of cases have been deprived of the benefits to be obtained by systematic treatment.

Of the 59 Patients admitted, there were 17 males and 42 females; of these, 2 males and 3 females had been at some time previously in the Hospital; this proves that the notion which commonly prevails, that a large proportion of the Patients discharged recovered are not permanently restored, is not well founded; as of the 59 Patients admitted, 46 of them had not been previously affected, and only 5 had been Patients here on former occasions; 4 after intervals of 27 years, 13 years, 16 years, and 4 years respectively. The other after an interval of 1 year.

Of the remaining 8, 4 males and 4 females were transferred from other Institutions.

Of the admissions, 13 males and 34 females were admitted as curable, and 4 males and 8 females as chronic cases.

Of these, 8 males and 11 females were discharged at the request of friends, and 1 female on account of the friends not complying with the Rules.

There were 8 deaths during the year, namely, 3 males and 5 females; they were classified as follows:—

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The deaths were all from natural causes; one Patient, a female, died at the age of 86, having been resident in the Hospital 48 years. The percentage of deaths upon the total number of Patients under treatment during the year has been 3.12.

There were 22 Patients discharged recovered, namely, 5 males and 17 females; all with one exception, a female, having been admitted as curable cases.

During the last two years the proportion of recoveries has sensibly diminished; in the year 1883 there were discharged recovered 57·3 per cent.; in 1884, 48·3 per cent.; in 1885, 43·1 per cent.; the explanation of this fact appears to be that whereas Patients were formerly admitted at an early stage of their malady, by reason of the comparative facility with which the necessary forms could be complied with, a great difficulty has recently arisen in obtaining certificates, the consequence of which has been the postponement and in some cases the absolute prevention of treatment at the most hopeful period, and too often the establishment of a chronic and indeed hopeless condition.

The average daily number of Patients upon the Books of the Hospital was 196, namely 61 males and 135 females, being 5 in excess of the preceding year.

On the 1st of January, 1886, there were remaining on the Books of the Hospital 196 Patients, including 2 males and 4 females absent on trial.

#### REPORT

OF THE

FOR THE YEAR 1886.

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To the Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

Your Committee submit their Report for the year 1886.

The Building has been maintained in a sound state of efficiency. The Painting of the Hospital internally has been continued through the year, and the female side has been completed. There now only remains a portion of the male side, the completion of which will leave the Hospital in an excellent condition of repair in this respect.

Numerous repairs and improvements have been carried out during the year, among others, the tar paving of the upper male airing court, the addition of a great number of chimney pots to all chimneys affected by down draft, and the remodelling of the sculleries and closets on the male side, so that they are now in closer accord with the requirements of and wishes expressed by the Commissioners in Lunacy.

The staff have been constantly drilled in the use of the Fire appliances by an experienced chief fireman of the Metropolitan Fire Brigade; and should a fire occur, it is hoped the staff would be able to effectually deal with it in the earlier stages, without external aid.

The Chaplain reports that the weekly attendance of Patients at Chapel during the year has averaged 119.65 males and 107.28 females, and that during the same period he has specially visited 209 Patients.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered in the Chapel of the Hospital 10 times during the year.

Your Committee have also to report that between 1st January and 31st December, 1886, there have been received into the Hospital 37 Patients deemed curable, and discharged, 40, viz.:—cured, 25; uncured, 6; at request of friends, 8; and as unfit, 1. Two males and one female have died.

During the same period there have been admitted 19 Patients uncured, or deemed incurable, and discharged, 9, viz.:—cured, 3; at request of friends, 4; and as unfit, 2. Two males and six females have died.

Since the 30th July, 1751, the day on which the Hospital was first opened for the reception of Patients, and up to the 31st December, 1886, inclusive, 23,373 Patients have been admitted into the Hospital, viz.:—

22,070 Patients deemed curable on their admission.

#### REPORT

OF THE

#### MEDICAL OFFICERS

FOR THE YEAR 1886.

To the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Committee, and Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR ROYAL HIGHNESS, MY LORDS, LADIES, AND GENTLEMEN.

We have the honour to submit the Annual Medical Report with the usual Statistical Tables for the past year.

During the year 56 Patients have been admitted, 49 were discharged, and 11 died.

As was observed in the last Annual Report, the number of admissions continues to decline, the same cause apparently still operating as an impediment to the completion of the necessary forms, viz., the unwillingness of medical men to sign certificates in the face of the serious responsibilities they incur in doing so. It is to be feared that a consequence of this must be the ultimate increase in the number of the permanently insane, a very considerable number of whom might have recovered if subjected to efficient treatment in the earlier stage of their malady.

Of the 56 Patients admitted, there were 19 males and 87 females, of whom 13, viz., 5 males and 8 females, had been at some time previously under treatment in the Hospital after intervals varying from 13 to 2 years.

Of the 37 Patients admitted who were classed as Curable, 13 were males and 24 females; while of the 19 classed as Chronic, 6 were males and 13 were females.

There have been discharged and died 60 Patients; of these, 22 were males and 38 were females. Recoveries occurred in 6 males and 22 females; 3 of each sex were relieved; 9 males and 6 females were not improved; and 4 males and 7 females died.

The proportion of recoveries has been somewhat higher than in the two previous years, amounting in fact to 50 per cent. on the admissions, a large number of which were admitted as chronic cases and were not expected to add to the number of cures.

Of the 6 Patients discharged relieved a certain number may be reckoned upon as completing their unfinished recovery (which had commenced in the Hospital) after their discharge, and therefore, upon the whole, the result of the year's work as regards the cases that have come under treatment may be considered as satisfactory, and 252 have been cared for during the year.

The deaths were all from natural causes, although in one case it was thought well that an inquest should be held in consequence of the death being somewhat sudden. The percentage of deaths upon the total number of Patients under treatment during the year has been 4:30.

The general health of the Patients has been good.

The average daily number of Patients upon the Books of the Hospital was 190, viz., 58 males and 132 females; and on the 31st of December, 1886, there were 192 Patients, including 1 male and 5 females absent on trial.

The benefits conferred upon the community by the Hospital are not restricted to the care and treatment of the Patients, but a very important service is rendered by training younger members of the profession, who, as Clinical Assistants, have the opportunity of practically studying insanity, and have thereby acquired such valuable experience that several have obtained important appointments in the large County Asylums.

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
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



### REPORT

OF THE

### GENERAL COMMITTEE OF GOVERNORS

OF

### ST. LUKE'S HOSPITAL,

FOR THE YEAR 1887.

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To the Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

Your Committee submit their Report for the Year 1887.

The Painting of the Hospital internally may now be said to be completed, though, of course, in such a large building, cut up as it is into so great a number of separate rooms, there is necessarily something to be done year by year as occasion arises.

The Drainage of the Hospital, which had been reported to be very defective, if not actually dangerous, has been entirely reconstructed on the most modern and approved sanitary principles, at a cost of upwards of £520.

The Hospital may now be said to be in an excellent sanitary condition, a fact which is of the highest importance in the maintaining of such a large number of inmates in good bodily health.

The Lower Male airing Court has been entirely covered with tar paving, and a permanent Tennis Court laid down in its centre, for the use of the male patients; its former condition was most unsatisfactory, from the fact of the gravel being worn badly, and it being necessary to stop the patients exercising in wet weather. Except in actual rain the Patients can now obtain exercise, and immediately after the rainfall has ceased.

The attention of your Committee having been directed to the state of the Steam Cooking Kitchen, which was so small and inconveniently built, that steam had to be turned off some time before it could be entered with comfort for the purpose of removing the food, and moreover the roof had given way and become dangerous, they issued instructions for the architect to prepare plans for a structure more suitable in all respects for its work. This was done, and a larger Steam Kitchen has been erected, on the old site, of white glazed brick, which has greatly facilitated the work in the kitchen, and there is a decided improvement in the cooking. All the old fittings were used with the exception of one of James Slater & Co.'s Steam Chests for Fish and Potatoes, which has so far done its work well.

During the year new carpets have been laid down on the male side with Linoleum parquet side fittings, which are kept polished, and greatly add to the comfort and appearance of the wards.

The general repairs have been continued and your Committee are able to report that the condition of the Hospital, as a whole, is decidedly satisfactory, and may be said to be improving from year to year.

Through the kindness of SIR JAMES TYLER, a Vice-President, a full-sized Broadwood Grand Piano has been obtained, at a small cost, for Special Entertainments.

The Rev. T. C. Webster having been preferred to the Lord Chancellor's living of Rettendon, Essex, has resigned the office of Chaplain, which he has held for 16 years, and has been succeeded by the Rev. George Smith.

The Chaplain reports that the weekly attendance of Patients at Chapel during the year has averaged 107.48 males and 92 females; and that during the same period the number of special Visitations of Patients has been 162.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered in the Chapel of the Hospital 10 times during the year.

Your Committee have also to report that between the 1st of January and the 31st December, 1887, there have been received into the Hospital 47 Patients deemed curable, and discharged, 37, viz.:—cured, 21; uncured, 5; relieved, 4; at request of friends, 6; and friends not complying with the rules, 1; two females have died.

During the same period there have been admitted 4 Patients uncured or deemed incurable, and discharged, 9, viz.:—cured, 3; at request of friends, 5; and as unfit, 1; three females have died.

Since the 30th July, 1751, the day on which the Hospital was first opened for the reception of Patients, and up to the 31st December, 1887 inclusive, 23,424 Patients have been admitted into the Hospital, viz.:—

22,117 Patients deemed curable on their admission.

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#### REPORT

OF THE

### MEDICAL OFFICERS

FOR THE YEAR 1887.

To the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Committee, and Governors of St Luke's Hospital.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR ROYAL HIGHNESS, MY LORDS, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

We have the honour to present the Annual Medical Report, with the Statistical Tables, for the past year.

During the year 51 Patients were admitted, 46 were discharged, and 5 died.

Of the 51 Patients admitted, 19 were males and 32 females, of whom 10—viz, 3 males and 7 females—had been at some time previously under treatment in the Hospital.

Of the 47 Patients admitted as curable, 18 were males and 29 females; of the 4 admitted as chronic 1 was a male and 3 were females.

There have been discharged and died 51 Patients, of these 12 were males and 39 were females.

Recoveries occurred in 7 males and 17 females; 4 females were relieved; 5 males and 13 females were not improved; and 5 females died.

The proportion of recoveries has not been quite so high in the past year, being 47 per cent. on the whole number of admissions; of the males admitted many were of an unfavourable character as regards their chances of ultimate recovery.

The total number of Patients under treatment during the year was 243.

There were 5 deaths, all females, reducing the per centage upon the total number of Patients under care to 2.5. Two died at the age of 78 and two at 64 years. Three had been resident in the Hospital for 9, 17, and 18 years. The deaths were all from natural causes.

The average daily number of Patients upon the books of the Hospital was 193—viz., 62 males and 131 females; and on the 31st of December, 1887, there were 192 Patients, including 1 of each sex absent on trial.

The general health of the Patients has been good; the cold of the winter months, particularly trying to this class of Patient, and so a cause for much anxiety, was combated successfully.

In our last Annual Report we referred to the fact that there seemed to be a steady diminution in the number of admissions, doubtless referable to the unwillingness of the friends of Patients, as well as their medical advisers, to assume the responsibility of executing the forms required by law before any treatment can be adopted. We have to record the

continuance of this unwillingness, as evinced by the still further reduction of admissions, and cannot but lament that further difficulties are contemplated in the way of prompt treatment by more stringent laws in reference to the admission of Patients.

It will be noticed that the number of admissions during the past year was 5 less than in the year 1886, and 10 less than in the year 1885. There is probably another explanation of the reduced numbers admitted to be found in the almost universal depression that has so long prevailed. Cases that are only eligible for admission on making the small payments required, not being presented from want of means.







OF THE

## GENERAL COMMITTEE OF GOVERNORS

OF

### ST. LUKE'S HOSPITAL,

FOR THE YEAR 1888.

To the Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

Your Committee submit their Report for the year 1888.

During the year your Committee have devoted a considerable sum to carrying out various improvements, one of the most important of which has been that of new laying out, asphalting, and improving the Female Airing Court. It has been made as cheerful as possible in the heart of the City; is a vast improvement on its former condition; and is much appreciated by the Patients.

The whole of the Wards and Wings have been re-decorated. A new departure has been made in papering the Wards and Wings with Sanitary paper; it is expected that these papers will not only retain their brightness longer, but be much cleaner and, in the end, economical.

The Gas Lighting of the Hospital not being satisfactory, your Committee decided to renew the Service throughout the Building. The old pipes were in such condition as to render a smaller undertaking useless, and they have been taken out and replaced. The actual Lighting was left an open question until your Committee had had the opportunity of testing the various systems suggested. The light which has given greatest satisfaction, both for quality of the light and economy in consumption of gas, as well as its general suitableness to the Wards, is the "Wenham," and during this month they hope to have a complete installation of that light, but the subject is still under discussion. Much has been done towards re-furnishing—no fewer than 3 of the Wards having been re-carpeted during the year.

Electric fire alarms have been fitted, in addition to the fire drill of the attendants who are under the instruction of an experienced officer of the Metropolitan Fire Brigade. The attendants have shown the greatest interest in the work, and your Committee place great confidence in their activity and ability to cope with any emergency arising from an outbreak of fire.

The Hospital generally is in an excellent condition in every respect, and the improvements that have been carried out during the last few years have unquestionably increased its efficiency and rendered it more capable of performing its allotted work in a satisfactory manner.

The Chaplain reports that the weekly attendance of Patients at Chapel during the year has averaged 99.27 males, and 106.57 females; and that during the same period the number of special Visitations of Patients has been 112.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered in the Chapel of the Hospital 12 times during the year. Contracts for the undermentioned Provisions were entered into as follows:—

Your Committee have also to report that, between the 1st of January and the 31st December, 1888, there have been received into the Hospital 44 Patients deemed curable, and discharged 44, viz.:—cured, 22; uncured, 10; relieved, 3; at request of friends, 7; friends not complying with the rules, 1; and as unfit, 1; 3 males and 1 female have died.

During the same period there have been admitted 10 Patients uncured or deemed incurable, and discharged 9, viz.:—cured, 1; and at request of friends, 8; 1 male and 1 female have died.

Since the 30th July, 1751, the day on which the Hospital was first opened for the reception of Patients, and up to the 31st December, 1888, inclusive, 23,478 Patients have been admitted into the Hospital, viz.:—

22,161 Patients deemed curable on their admission.

#### REPORT

OF THE

### MEDICAL OFFICERS.

FOR THE YEAR 1888.

To the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Committee and Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR ROYAL HIGHNESS, MY LORDS, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

We have the honour to present the Annual Medical Report with the Statistical Tables, for the past year.

During the year 54 Patients were admitted, 47 were discharged, and 6 died.

Of the 54 Patients admitted, 18 were males and 36 females, 9 of whom—viz., 4 males and 5 females, had been at some time previously under treatment in the Hospital.

Of the 44 Patients admitted as curable, 12 were males and 32 females; of the 10 admitted as chronic, 6 were males and 4 were females.

There have been discharged and died 59 Patients; of these, 24 were males and 35 were females.

Recoveries occurred in 5 males and 18 females; 3 males and 3 females were relieved; 12 of either sex were not improved; and 4 males and 2 females died.

We may refer to one case of special interest of the wife of an officer in the army, who recovered after a residence of 14 years. She left the Hospital eight months since, and we have every reason to believe she continues well. There is some encouragement to persevere with treatment beyond the ordinary term of twelve months in the fact that 7 of the recoveries took place in the second year of residence.

The proportion per cent. of recoveries to the cases admitted as curable during the year was 52.27.

It will be observed that, in the majority of deaths, the causes assigned had no reference to the insane condition of the Patient, but were such as ordinarily occur in persons not insane.

The proportion per cent. of deaths to total number under treatment during the year was 2.43.

The total number of Patients under treatment during the year was 246.

The average daily number of Patients upon the books of the hospital was 191—viz., 64 males and 127 females; and on the 31st December, 1888, there were 187 Patients, including 2 females absent on trial.

The general health of the hospital has been satisfactory.





### REPORT

OF THE

# GENERAL COMMITTEE OF GOVERNORS

OF

### ST. LUKE'S HOSPITAL,

FOR THE YEAR 1889.

To the Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

Your Committee submit their Report for the year 1889.

During the year your Committee have had due regard to keeping up the efficiency of the Hospital, and they can confidently point to its existing condition to prove that this has been fully maintained.

Various additions have been made to the furniture and general decorations of the Wards, and every effort has been made to compete with the modern requirements of the housing for the Insane.

The re-carpeting of the Wards is now completed, and the Billiard Room has been supplied with a new Table and generally refurnished and decorated—the old table has been transferred to a corridor on the male side, and thus forms a reserve room for the less orderly Patients, as it also offers facilities for a greater number of Patients to play, is besides especially useful in inclement weather, and is much appreciated.

There has been no building or structural alteration during the year, but your Committee hope to improve the condition of the Chapel in the near future. They are themselves conscious of necessary embellishments here, and the fact is further emphasized by the remark of the Commissioners in Lunacy at their last visit when they observed that the Chapel needed re-decorating.

An additional 250 feet of fire-hose have been purchased, on the advice of the officer of the Metropolitan Fire Brigade, who superintends the fire drills of the attendants, thereby greatly adding to the means of extinction of any outbreak, more especially should such occur in the roof. Not only do the attendants themselves take a lively interest in these drills, but your Committee are pleased to be able to add that in their judgment the appliances are now in the highest state of efficiency.

The Chaplain reports that the weekly attendance of Patients at Chapel during the year has averaged 88 males and 92 females, and that during the same period the number of special visitations of Patients has been 58.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered in the Chapel of the Hospital 12 times during the year.

Your Committee have also to report that between the 1st of January and the 31st December, 1889, there have been received into the Hospital 43 Patients deemed curable, and discharged 36, viz.:—cured, 24; uncured, 4; and at request of friends, 8; 1 male and 2 females have died.

During the same period there have been admitted 10 Patients uncured or deemed incurable, and discharged 7, viz.:—cured, 1; and at request of friends, 6; 2 males and 2 females have died.

Since the 30th July, 1751, the day on which the Hospital was first opened for the reception of Patients, and up to the 31st December, 1889, inclusive, 23,531 Patients have been admitted into the Hospital, viz.:—

22,204 Patients deemed curable on their admission.

### REPORT

OF THE

## MEDICAL OFFICERS

FOR THE YEAR 1889.

To the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Committee and Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR ROYAL HIGHNESS, MY LORDS, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

We have the honour to present the Annual Medical Report with the Statistical Tables, for the past year.

During the year 53 Patients were admitted, 43 were discharged, and 7 died.

Of the 53 Patients admitted, 16 were males and 37 females, of whom 9—viz., 2 males and 7 females, had been at some time previously under treatment in the Hospital.

Of the 43 Patients admitted as curable, 12 were males and 31 females; of the 10 admitted as chronic, 4 were males and 6 were females.

There have been discharged and died 50 Patients, of these 14 were males and 36 were females.

Recoveries occurred in 3 males and 22 females; 2 of either sex were relieved; 6 males and 8 females were not improved; and 3 males and 4 females died.

The proportion per cent. of recoveries to the cases admitted as curable during the year was 58·13; calculated on the whole of the admissions it was 47·17. Of the 12 male curables although only 3 are reported as recovered, 4 remain who will probably recover, so that the average of cures may

be taken to be 58.33 per cent. of the male curable admissions, which is much smaller than usual this year.

The proportion per cent. of deaths to total number under treatment during the year was 2.91. Of those who died, one male had been resident in the Hospital 27 years, and one female for 25 years.

The total number of Patients under treatment during the year was 240.

The average daily number of Patients upon the books of the Hospital was 190—viz., 59 males and 131 females; and on the 31st December, 1889, there were 190 Patients, including 2 males and 1 female absent on trial.

Although new remedies, possibly including many valuable preparations have been brought into use, under careful and cautious observation, no sensible addition to the list of recoveries has so far been apparent. It is remarkable how nearly the same averages are maintained, whether as regards the number of admissions or the number of recoveries. There has never been occasion to refuse admission on account of insufficient accommodation.

Up to the end of the year we have been free from the prevailing epidemic of Influenza, and although a few cases have presented some of the ordinary symptoms of that malady, other characteristic symptoms were wanting, and they have all, without exception, done well. In other respects the general health of the patients has been good.
