GENERAL DUTIES AND ALLOWANCES.

1.

THE Pursers of His Majesty's Navy, previously to receiving their Warrants from the Navy Board on the Home Stations, or their first or any succeeding Appointment on Foreign Stations, are, with two competent Securities, to enter into Bond to His Majesty in the Penal Sums undermentioned, viz.:

2.

General duty. The Purser being the Officer intrusted to receive the Provisions, Slops, Tobacco, Soap, and all other Victualling Stores, and to keep and issue the same to the Ship's Company, and, upon particular and urgent occasions, to purchase, and, finally, to account for them; he is hereby required and directed strictly to observe the following Regulations and Instructions, and also the Regulations and Instructions relative to the Monthly Payment of Wages, the Receipt, Custody, and Issue of Slops and Religious Books, hereto annexed: and as the Captains and Commanders of His Majesty's Ships are fully acquainted with all the Orders, Certificates, and other Documents, which the Purser is required to produce with his Accounts, and will furnish him with the same at the precise periods at which the services to which they relate take place, and will also grant to him all the facilities for the execution of his duty which depend upon them, he is to observe that no irregularity or omission in any part of the duties here prescribed will be overlooked.

3.

Each Form in the Appendix to be considered as having the full force of a separate instruction.

He is also most strictly charged to consider each Form in the Appendix for vouching his Accounts, as having the full force and validity of a separate Instruction; to pay the most particular attention that, in every case, the Spirit, and, as far as possible, the Letter of these Forms be strictly complied with; that all the vacant spaces and columns be carefully and distinctly filled up, agreeably to the obvious intention thereof; and that all the Certificates or Notations directed to be made thereon, be duly inserted, and signed by the several parties required by the Forms so to do.

4.

On passing his Account in the Victualling Office, he will be allowed Credit for a quantity of all species of Provisions, (Fresh Meats, Vegetables, and Salt Meat, excepted,) equal to one eighth part of the full proportion for the number of persons he may have victualled, in full indemnity for Waste and for destruction by Vermin; and he will be paid for his Credits of the undermentioned Articles, *only*, at the following prices, viz. :

He is to provide the Ship sufficiently at all times, with Coals, (including what may be required for the ordinary use of the Airing Stoves, and of the Forge,) Wood, Turnery Ware, Candles, Lanterns, Signal-lanterns (the latter of which he is always to obtain from the Navy Board of an established pattern, which they have been directed to provide), and all other Necessaries; and to enable him to do this, he will be allowed Necessary Money according to the following Scale, viz. :

When the actual number of any Complement falls between any two of the numbers specified in the Scale, the Purser will be entitled to draw for Necessary Money at the rate to which the Complement of his Ship most closely approximates; but when it may lie exactly between a superior and inferior number, he must draw at the rate most favourable to the Crown: and such Purser as are entitled to the annual Allowance fixed by Article 4, will take Credit for the same, in their General Statement, upon the like principle. On passing his Accounts, he will also be allowed Sixpence per Lunar Month for such number of Supernumeraries as shall exceed the number of Men short of the full Complement; and if a Tender shall have been attached to the Ship, he will, on the production of a certified Copy of the Cap-

tain's authority for employing her, and of a Certificate from the Captain stating the tonnage of the Tender, and the number of Days she has been actually employed, be further allowed after the rate of Two Pounds Ten Shillings per Month for a Tender of Fifty Tons or under; Three Pounds Ten Shillings per Month, if from Fifty to Eighty Tons, and Four Pounds Ten Shillings per Month if a greater Tonnage.—The Coals which he will be required to furnish for the ordinary use of the Forge, are not to exceed per Annum, in

but when any extra Work is required to be done at the Forge, either for the Ship in which he serves, or for other Ships, he will, on passing his Accounts, be allowed for the Coals so expended, on his producing the Carpenter's Receipt and a Certificate from his Captain, stating that such quantity had been supplied by his Order, and expressing the nature of the work which had been performed. The Amount of the established Allowances of Necessary Money prescribed by the preceding Scale, (and which on the first fitting out of a Ship, or on the Ship being re-commissioned with another Purser, will be granted for Three Months beyond the period for which the Ship may be victualled,) will be paid to him by the Agent to the Commissioners of the Victualling, at the Port or Place where the Ship may happen to be, upon his producing a Certificate according to the Forms in the Appendix, No. 2 or 3, as the case may require,

Fuel, &c. received from the Dock Yards or Victualling Agents to be paid for.

But should the Ship be victualled at any place where there is not an Agent Victualler, he may, in that case, draw Bills upon the Commissioners of the Victualling for the Amount that shall appear to be due, in the same manner as is hereinafter directed with respect to Money required for the payment of Savings, (Art. 22), which Bills are to have the Certificates above referred to, No. 2 or 3, (as the case may require) duly inserted and signed at the foot of them, and are to be inserted in his Account Current (No. 22).—When the Purser is supplied by the Agents for Victualling with Weights and Measures, Fuel or Candles, or by the Navy Board with Firewood, Signal Lanterns, &c., he is to make immediate payment for all such Supplies, to the Officers from whom the same are received.

7.

In case the Ship in which he serves shall bear a Flag or Broad Pendant, or shall be employed in conducting a Convoy, an allowance will be granted to him for Top and Poop Lights, upon the passing of his Account, at the rates specified in the Form in the Appendix, No. 4, on his producing the Certificates there prescribed.

8.

When he shall be directed by a Flag or Senior Officer to purchase any Provisions or Victualling Stores for the Service of the Squadron employed under his Orders, he will be allowed (if he duly conform himself to Article 19 of these Instructions, and the Commissioners of the Victualling shall be satisfied with the propriety and economy of the transaction,) a Commission after the rate of two and a half per Centum, upon the value of such part of the Provisions and Victualling Stores, so purchased, as may be distributed to the other Ships of the Squadron, provided

he produces regular Receipts for the same, but none upon that part which may be received for the use of his own Ship.

9.

Tobacco and Soap--Allowances for waste & care thereof.

To compensate him for the loss by diminution of weight, and other unavoidable Waste to which Soap and Tobacco are subject while on board, a reasonable allowance upon the aggregate quantity of each which he shall appear to have issued will be made to him, upon the passing of his Accounts; and by way of recompense for his trouble in issuing the Soap and Tobacco, and keeping the Accounts, and to encourage him to a faithful discharge of his Trust, he will also be allowed a Commission after the rate of Ten Pounds per Cent. on the value of the quantity of each, which he shall have issued to the Ship's Company, who are to be charged for the Soap at the rate of Eightpence per Pound, and for the Tobacco at the rate of One Shilling and Sevenpence per Pound.

Prices at which Soap and Tobacco are to be charged to the Ship's Company.

10.

Never to sign any Accounts, Books, or Papers, without careful examination.

He is never to sign any Accounts, Books, Lists, Tickets, Receipts, or Vouchers for Provisions, Victualling Stores, Slops, or Tobacco, before he has so thoroughly examined and considered them, as to be satisfied of the truth and correctness of every particular contained therein; and if, at any time, discovery shall be made that he has knowingly signed, or suffered, or procured others to sign a collusive or false Ticket, List, Voucher, or Vouchers, of any kind, he will be discharged from his employment as a Purser, be deemed unfit ever to be entertained as an Officer in His Majesty's Service, will absolutely forfeit all the Wages due to him at the time of his dismissal, together with all such Sum or Sums of Money, Benefit, Advantage or Emolument, as might otherwise arise and become due and pay-

able to him on the balance of his Victualling Account, or for Soap, Tobacco, or Slops issued to the Ship's Company, and in addition will also be subject to such pains and penalties as a Court Martial may inflict upon him.

11.

The Captain being required to transmit to the Victualling Board Quarterly Accounts of Provisions and Victualling Stores, &c., received and returned, and also an Account of the Receipt and Expenditure of Fresh Meat, the Purser is to satisfy himself before signing the same, that they are made out in the Forms prescribed in the Appendix, No. 5, A. B. and C.; and that they contain all the Receipts, Issues, Expenditures, &c., for the whole Quarter.

12.

He is to take special care that the Receipts and Expenditures of Provisions and Victualling Stores in one Quarter, be not blended in the Quarterly Accounts with those of another; but that in all cases, Vouchers be given and taken, and the Accounts made up for each Quarter separately and distinctly, in conformity to the rules prescribed by Articles 43 and 59; and he is to notice that the Quarters are officially deemed to close on the 31st of March, 30th June, 30th September, and 31st December, in every Year.

13.

He is to inform himself of the time for which the Ship is ordered to be victualled, and to take care that there be no failure

on his part in demanding, according to the directions he may obtain from his Captain, and in timely getting on board, the full quantity of Provisions, Water-Casks, Soap and Tobacco, Necessaries, &c. ; and he is also, in conjunction with the Master, to satisfy himself that all the Provisions sent on board be sweet, good, and wholesome, and that the Casks appear to be sound, and full, otherwise to object to their being received into the Ship without a Survey. The quantity of Tobacco and Soap which he receives on board should, for the time the Ship is victualled, be at the rate of about Two Pounds of the former, and One Pound of the latter per Lunar Month, for a number of persons equal to two-thirds of the complement, beyond which proportions he is not allowed to issue them to any Individual. But no Supernumeraries borne for Victuals only are to have any Soap or Tobacco issued to them, until they shall have been two months on board, when it may be issued to them, under the Captain's authority, in the same proportion as to the Ship's Company.

14.

Provisions sent for the supply of His Majesty's Ships shall not be refused on pretence of being old, and unfit for keeping ; but when there shall be reasonable ground of objection against any part thereof, he is to apply to his Captain for a Survey on them ; and such part of the Provisions, as may on Survey appear to be unfit for the use of the Ship, are to be returned to the Agent or Contractor who supplied them, accompanied by a Copy of the Report : and he is immediately to call upon the Agent or Contractor, to replace what may be so returned with an equal quantity of the same species of a proper quality.

15.

Package of Provisions,

Every Cask and Package of Provisions sent on board His

Majesty's Ships, whether wet or dry (Bread only excepted, which is generally to be in Bags, containing One Hundred and Twelve Pounds each), is to have the contents thereof, as to species and quantity, marked conspicuously thereon, together with a number, and the time when, and the place at which packed; and the Casks with Beer, are to have the Contents in Gallons, marked on their heads: and in all cases of Provisions under Warranty supplied by the regular Agents of the Victualling Board, the same will be notified to the Purser in the Bills of Lading, when they are sent on board; but should this notification be omitted, he is to apply to the Agent supplying them for the requisite information. He is to guide himself with respect to the Warranty of Provisions supplied by Contractors, by the terms and conditions of their Contracts.

The Contents of each Cask to be marked thereon.

Warranty of Provisions to be also specified, and if omitted, the Purser is to apply for the information.

16.

The Beef provided for His Majesty's Ships is to be sent on board, cut into Eight Pound Pieces, and the Pork into Four, or occasionally Six Pound Pieces; and no unusual pieces, such as Leg Bones, Shins of Oxen, Cheeks of Hogs, Ox Hearts, &c., are to be put up with the Meat.

Salt Meat.—How it is to be cut and packed.

17.

When any of His Majesty's Ships come into Port, either at Home or Abroad, they shall, if it can be done, be supplied with Fresh Meat on each day of the Week, and with Vegetables, (or Vegetables and Fruit on Foreign Stations,) according to the proportion fixed by Article 30; observing that the proportion of Fresh Meat, Vegetables, or Fruit, is with reference to the Instructions upon the general Statement, No. 21 in the Appendix, to be as near as possible for the number of Men actually victualled, but if there should be any remains of Fresh Meat on

Fresh Meat and Vegetables—How to be supplied.

the last day of general issue, it is to be *served as Fresh Meat*, as far as it will go, at the rate of one Pound per Man with Vegetables, in lieu of part of the next day's Salt Meat. But no Savings whatsoever of Fresh Meat or Vegetables are expected to be made, or will be allowed to be paid for.

18.

Provisions from Contractors, &c. when on Foreign Service—How to be demanded and received.

If at any time whilst on either Home or Foreign Service, there should be a necessity to receive Sea Provisions, Fresh Beef, Vegetables, &c., from a Contractor, or an authorized Correspondent of the Victualling Board, he is to present to his Captain, a Certificate under his hand, of the exact remains of each Species of Sea Provisions on board, to which the Captain will subjoin a demand upon such Contractor or Correspondent, to supply the Provisions, Fresh Beef, Vegetables, &c., required, which demand being certified at the foot thereof by the Master, to have been inserted in the Log Book, is to be delivered in Triplicate to such Contractor, or Correspondent, and he is to grant to the Contractor, or Correspondent, such Vouchers as, in the former Case, the Contract provides for, and in the latter Case, such Vouchers as the Victualling Board have required these Functionaries to produce, the forms of which will always be exhibited by them, on his application.

19.

Purchase of Provisions when absolutely necessary.

He is never to purchase any Provisions, Victualling Stores, Fresh Beef, Vegetables, Water, Soap, or Tobacco, in places where there is an Agent, Contractor, or other authorized Correspondent of the Victualling Board; but when that is not the case, he is to certify to his Captain, under his hand, the remains of each Species, and having obtained his Captain's Warrant to procure the necessary quantities, he is to execute the Service

with the utmost frugality, procuring all the Vouchers and Certificates in Triplicate, drawing Bills on the Victualling Board for the amount agreeably to the Forms in the Appendix, No. 6. A. B. C. D. E. ; and taking care that the quantities purchased, correspond as nearly as possible, in amount with the quantities in the Order, and that the Articles be good, wholesome, and fit for His Majesty's Service: for no condemnations of such Provisions and Stores as may be purchased by him will be allowed, unless the causes of their decay are most satisfactorily accounted for. But in places where there is no such authorized Agent or Contractor, and when, from peculiar circumstances, the Captain may deem it absolutely necessary that a third Person should be employed to make the Purchases, which in ordinary cases are to be made by the Purser himself, such third person will be allowed a Commission of $2\frac{1}{2}$ per Cent, but in every such case, a particular report of all the circumstances is to be made to the Victualling Board by the first opportunity, and if the circumstances thus stated, should not be deemed sufficient to justify purchases by Commission, the Amount of such Commission will be charged against the Captain. He is however to observe, that as the price of Tea is frequently excessively high at particular places, it is never to be purchased when it cannot be procured at or under Two Shillings and Sixpence sterling per pound.

20.

But in case he shall have been supplied previously to, or after quitting Port with Money or Foreign Coins, for the purpose of purchasing Provisions and Victualling Stores for the Public Service, he is, instead of drawing Bills to pay for such purchases, to defray the same out of the Public Monies that may have been so committed to his custody, as far as the same will go. And he is strictly enjoined in such cases to have inserted

in the Form of the Voucher, directed to be taken by the preceding Article, a Certificate of the quantity of the Currency of the place for which the Money or Foreign Coin, in which he makes the Payments, passes there at the time, agreeably to the directions given at the foot of Form No. 6. D.; and if he fail so to do, he will be charged in the Victualling Office with the highest rate of Currency which such Money or Coins may appear to have passed for at the place within six months before or after his purchases, and at the same rate for any part of such Money or Coins as he may have retained in his hands, and neglected to disburse, before drawing Bills on the Victualling Board, unless he shall have received his Captain's authority to that effect, and transmitted a certified copy thereof with the Vouchers for the purchase.

21.

Savings of
Provisions.
Directions on
that behalf.

No Provisions or Victualling Stores are to be drawn or taken up on Shore, or to be sent out of the Ship on any Private Account whatever, and as the allowance of Provisions is calculated and intended for daily subsistence only, no savings made either by Officers or others of the Crew shall be paid to them in kind; but the Purser is at the expiration of every one, two, or three months, at the farthest, as his Captain may judge expedient, to pay the Officers and Ship's Company for all such quantities of Bread, Wine, Spirits, Beef, Pork, Flour, Sugar, Tea, and Cocoa, or the usual substitutes for those species, except Fresh Beef and Vegetables, as shall, during that period, have been saved by the different messes in the Ship from the established allowance of these species, or that may have become due to them, in consequence of their having been put on Short Allowance, according to the following prices;

or at such prices as may be hereafter directed. But the Ship's Company are never to be paid for any savings of Peas or Oatmeal, except when there shall have been a necessity for putting them on a general Short Allowance, in which case they are to be paid for them at 9d. per Gallon. For the purpose of carrying this Instruction into execution, he is (if unprovided with Public Money for making such Payment) after obtaining Money, as directed by Articles 22 and 23, to prepare three Accounts according to the Form in the Appendix, No. 7, and with special reference to Article 3 of these Instructions to proceed to make the Payments in precise conformity to the Forms prescribed. He must debit himself in his Particular Account of Provisions, &c., received, as required by the 43rd Article of these Instructions, at the time of such Payment, with the whole quantity of the various species so paid for, in the same manner as if he had received them from His Majesty's Stores, and to take notice, that the same are to be duly inserted in the Quarterly Accounts.

22.

In all payments for Savings or Short Allowance, the Seamen are to be paid in British Silver Coin, or in other Coin equal in value thereto, the Purser obtaining Money from the Agent Victualler for that purpose, at places where there is an Agent, who will furnish the Purser therewith, upon his granting to such

Money to pay
for Savings.

Agent, a proper receipt for the same, and delivering to him an Account and Certificate agreeably to the Form in the Appendix, No. 8. But where there is not an Agent, the Payments are to be made in British Silver Coin, when such can be procured, and, when it cannot, the Purser is to pay the Men in Foreign Coin, according to the Value specified in the Table, (No. 6. F.) in the Appendix ; but when neither British Coin, nor Foreign Coin (of the description specified in the said Table) can be obtained, the Purser is to make the Payments as nearly as possible, according to the principle on which the said Table has been formed. The Bills for these Payments are to be drawn as directed at Page 27, Article 17 of the Commander-in-Chief's Instructions, and the Purser is to debit or credit himself with any difference between the terms on which he takes up the Money, and those on which he pays it away. In either case the Purser is to take the Vouchers prescribed by Form No. 7.

23.

Savings or Short Allowance due from his Predecessor. How payment is to be made for them.

If he shall be directed by the Captain to pay the Officers, and Ship's Company, for any Savings or Short Allowance due to them by his Predecessor, (which he is most strictly enjoined never to include with what may be due by himself), he is to obtain Money and pay for the same, and to procure the same Vouchers as directed in the preceding Article ; taking care that the Provisions be charged to such preceding Purser in the Quarterly Accounts, in the line preceding the charge on himself by Survey of Remains, in order that they may be charged in his Predecessor's Account, and not in his own ; but the Money which he receives, and pays for them, must be charged and credited in his Accounts Current of Savings and Short Allowance, being a transaction of his own, and not of his Predecessor's.

CUSTODY OF PROVISIONS AND VICTUALLING STORES.

24.

HE is constantly to communicate with the Master with regard to the good order and preservation of the Provisions and Victualling Stores, and to issue out first such part thereof as shall be most liable to decay, or which shall, by marks upon them, appear to be oldest; calling the Master's attention regarding them from time to time, that they may be kept at hand. The greatest care is to be taken in the preservation not only of all the Water and Provision Casks, but also of the loose Staves and Hoops. If the Bread shall be discovered to be damp, he is to apply to the Captain to have it aired on the Quarter Deck or Poop; and if any Liquor shall have leaked out of the Salt Provision Casks, the deficiency is to be supplied from other Casks, that may have been opened, (the Pickle of which is to be occasionally reserved for such purpose,) the Casks to be new driven, and thereby, or otherwise, made tight.

25.

As there are proper and convenient places set apart in the Hold for securing Spirits and Wine from any abuses, and which are not to be applied to any other purpose whatever, he is to take care that the Casks containing these Liquors be sound and full at the time of their coming on board, and that they are lodged in the places appropriated for them, as he will be

Good order and preservation of the Provisions and Stores. To communicate with the Master thereon.

Security of Spirits and Wine.

No allowance can be made for Leakage. answerable for keeping them afterwards, and must not expect to be allowed any Claim for leakage thereon.

26.

Provisions under Warranty to be surveyed Seven Days before the expiration thereof.

All Provisions under Warranty are to be surveyed within Seven Days of, or as near as possible to the expiration thereof, to the end that if they are found defective, the value may be charged against the Persons by whom the same were supplied. The Purser is therefore, on all occasions, to make timely application to his Captain for such Survey; but as it may not always be practicable for the Captain to make application to a Senior Officer in due time, the Survey may be taken by the Officers of the Ship as directed in Article 45, although other Ships are in Company, provided it be stated therein why application could not be made to a Senior Officer. But if he neglect to apply for a Survey in due time, and the Provisions should be condemned after the expiration of the Warranty, he will not be allowed Credit for the same on the passing of his Accounts, unless the most satisfactory reasons can be shewn for the delay.

In case of neglect he will not be allowed Credit for the same.

27.

Shaking of Casks and extra expenditure thereof, without the Captain's Order, forbidden.

He is not to shake any Water or Spirit Casks without an Order from his Captain to that effect, and he is to obtain on the back of the Order, a Certificate from the Captain and Master, stating the Numbers and Descriptions of Casks that may be shaken, and the necessity for so doing. Neither is he to make any extra expenditure of Casks, without an Order in writing from his Captain; and he is to take notice that Casks used for Washing Tubs, Steep Tubs, or by the Cook, are included in the Ordinary Allowance for Waste, and are not to be deemed an extra expense. Nor are the Casks made use of in the Tops

or Quarters that are not cut, to be looked upon as expended, nor the Iron hoops on those cut to stand between the Guns. If the Casks prove defective, when there is no opportunity of returning them into Store, and receiving better, he is to apply to his Captain for his authority to have them repaired, new trimmed, converted or reduced, as may be necessary, by the Ship's Cooper, without any charge to His Majesty for Workmanship; and he is to obtain from the Captain and Master a Certificate, according to the Form in the Appendix, No. 9, which will be required as a Voucher to his Accounts. All expenditures of this nature are to be regularly entered in his Particular account of Provisions, &c., returned, as required by the 43rd Article, and he is to take great care that they are also entered in one line, in the Quarterly Accounts.

Casks to be repaired by the Ship's Cooper.

28.

The Lemon Juice, which is never to be started into casks, but invariably to be kept in the Bottles and Cases in which it is shipped, is only to be issued to the Crew when the Ship is proceeding to, or employed on, Foreign Stations, and then in the proportion of half an ounce, with half an ounce of Sugar per Man per diem. They are to be either mixed with the Men's allowance of Grog or Wine, or to be made into Sherbet, according as the Captain in his discretion shall think proper to direct; to be used in no other way, nor to be issued whilst the Ship's Company are making use of Beer, or are furnished with Fresh Beef, or enjoying a supply of Fruit or Vegetables; nor during the space of a fortnight after the issue of Beer, Fresh Beef, Fruit or Vegetables, unless from the state of health of the Crew, the Surgeon should think the same necessary, and the Captain should give the requisite orders for that purpose, which

orders are to be transmitted with the Purser's Accounts.— And as it may, at times, be improper and prejudicial to some of the Crew to be supplied with Lemon Juice and Sugar, the Surgeon is in such cases to deliver to the Purser a list of the Persons to whom those Articles are not to be issued; and amongst the Papers required from each Purser for the passing of his Accounts will be an Account of the number of Persons to whom Lemon Juice and Sugar were daily issued, certified by the Captain and Surgeon, agreeably to the Form in the Appendix, No. 10. A. He is likewise to account for the receipt and expenditure of the Lemon Juice, with the Sugar issued therewith, as well as the Bottles and Cases, according to the Form in the Appendix, No. 10. B. He will occasionally have committed to his custody certain quantities of preserved Meats, Soups, &c., for the use of the Sick and Convalescents, which he is from time to time to issue to the Surgeon upon the production of regular demands from him, duly approved by the Captain. For the quantities so furnished, he must obtain duplicate Receipts from the Surgeon, which, together with the demand, are to be regularly transmitted by him with his Accounts as Vouchers for the credit which he will take therein for such supplies.

He is not to sell or make any undue use of the Provisions or Victualling Stores in his custody; and in order that the Crown may not suffer in the event of his becoming in debt for any Species, he will, in all cases wherein he shall have been furnished by the Agents for the Victualling, both Abroad, and at Home, be obliged to pay the following prices for such Provisions and Victualling Stores, viz. :

but, if he shall have received Provisions or Stores from Contractors, Correspondents of the Victualling Board, or other Persons either Abroad or at Home, or shall have purchased any himself, that shall have cost more than the prices above mentioned, he will, in such cases, be obliged to pay the highest prices which the species, he is in debt upon, shall have cost the Crown during the time of his Account.

ISSUES AND RETURNS OF PROVISIONS AND VICTUALLING STORES.

30.

Established Allowance of Provisions.

The Purser will be allowed to issue an annual proportion of Canvass for Pudding Bags, after the rate of one ell for every sixteen Men.

When the issue of Salt Meat is renewed after Fresh Meat has been served, it must be recollected that the Salt Meat on the first day of issue is not to be of the same species as that issued on the last day before Fresh Meat was served.

All persons embarked for Passage, and not doing duty on board, are to be victualled at two-thirds, Women at one half, and Children at one quarter of the Allowance established in this Article for Persons serving on board.

Established Allowance for Persons not doing duty on board.

31.

Prisoners of War, Pirates and Persons detained for illicit Traffic (the Names of whom are to be inserted in the Victualling Book, in a separate List,) are to be victualled at two-thirds Allowance only, but without Spirits, Wine, or Beer, excepting when required to work in navigating the Ship, at the Pump, or on any other Service, when they are to be victualled at full Allowance of all Species; and the Purser, at the foot of the List on which they are borne in his Victualling Book, is to obtain a Certificate, according to the Form No. 11. A. in the Appendix. But he is to observe, that when he Victuals such persons at two-thirds Allowance, he must debit himself in his General Statement, with the Proportion of Beer, and the Eighths thereon, for these persons, as he will have already taken Credit for such proportion in the aggregate Number of Men victualled.

Prisoners of War, Pirates, &c.

32.

When the Senior Officer, or his Captain, in the exercise of his discretion, shall direct him to shorten the allowance of Provisions prescribed by Article 30, or of any particular species, he is

strictly to comply therewith; but the Men are to be punctually paid for the quantities short issued, as directed by Article 21.

33.

Wine and Spirits not to be issued while Beer can be supplied.

He is to notice that Wine and Spirits are never to be issued in Home Ports, while Beer is supplied for the use of the Ship, nor at Sea till it be all expended.

34.

Condemned Provisions to be returned into Store if possible.

Under what circumstances they may be thrown overboard.

Condemned Butter not to be thrown overboard.

If the Ship, at the time when a Survey on decayed Provisions takes place, be at or near any Victualling Port, the condemned Provisions, more especially Bread, Flour, Peas, Tea, and Cocoa, are not to be thrown overboard, without the most urgent necessity, but are to be retained, for the purpose of being returned to the Agent, or other Instrument of the Victualling, or to be sold by the Purser if at a Port where no such Agent, &c., be present. But if the Ship be at Sea, and be not approaching a Port, and if the Surveyors shall give their opinion that the same are not safe, nor fit to be kept on board, nor can be made so by packing in Tight Casks, until an opportunity may offer to return them, (the express reasons whereof they are likewise to certify and set forth at large in the report of Survey,) the said Provisions are then to be thrown overboard, the Purser taking, on the Report of Survey, a Certificate from the Surveyors, of the species and quantities so thrown away. Condemned Butter is never to be thrown overboard, but to be delivered into His Majesty's Stores, or to the Contractor from whom it was received. If, however, any Condemned Butter, Tallow or Hides should be required for the use of the Boatswain, the Purser may supply the requisite quantity and number on the Captain's Order, and Boatswain's Receipt, which shall express that the Boatswain has charged himself with them in his Voluntary Account.

35.

If, on issuing a Cask of Beef, Pork, or Suet, it should be found short of weight, or of tale of the Contents, the Captain will issue his Warrant to the Master, and to one or more of the Mates, to survey all the Casks of Salt Meat or Suet (being part of the same supply) opened after that time, and to report, under their hands, on every Cask, whether it exceeds, answers, or falls short of the contents marked on it, or of the full weight, according to the Form in the Appendix, No. 12; which Survey, one or more of the Surveying Officers are, when the whole of such supply shall have been expended or otherwise disposed of, to complete, by totalling the number of Pieces over and short by tale, and number of Pounds over and short by weight, and by certifying the quantities in words at length, in conformity with the Form before mentioned. The Purser is forthwith to make an entry, in his Particular Account of Provisions Returned, of the number of pieces of Beef and Pork, and Pounds of Suet, respectively, that may be so certified to be deficient, and to debit himself in his Particular Account of Provisions Received, with any excess, if it should appear by the certified Account that there has been any. He is to take care that these entries are duly inserted in the Quarterly Accounts for the time at which such deficiencies or excesses are ascertained, obtaining the Vouchers in Triplicate, and transmitting them to the Victualling Board, as directed by Article 50. Any irregularity in the Survey, such as omitting to insert every Cask of the same supply subsequently opened, and the marks and numbers upon them, or neglect in not ascertaining that it is duly inserted in the Log, will exclude him from any allowance for the same. But if the Salt Meat or Suet found short, either in tale or weight, shall have been received from a Contractor, he is, if he remain on the same station, by the earliest opportunity, fully to inform the Com-

missioners of the Victualling of the particulars of such deficiencies, acquainting the Contractor that he has so done.

36.

Vouchers of various descriptions to be obtained at the precise periods when the circumstances, to which they relate, occur.

As the Quarterly Accounts will be expected to contain all claims for Condemnations, Loans, Supplies, Short Contents of Beef, Pork, and Suet, Extra Issues, Losses, &c., that may have taken place during the Currency of each Quarter, and as the Captain is not to require the Purser to make any Loans, Supplies, or Extra Issues, except on his written orders to that effect, nor to withhold from him such Certificates as may be just for Losses sustained by accident, or embezzlement, at the precise time when such Loans, Issues, Extra Issues, &c., may have been made, or when such Losses may have been sustained, or Short Contents of Salt Meat and Suet ascertained and certified, it will be the peculiar duty of the Purser, previously to signing the Quarterly Accounts, to satisfy himself that they contain all the debits with which he should be charged, and all the credits of every kind to which he can lay claim, agreeably to the Certificate required to be signed by him at the bottom of his general Account of Provisions returned, and that the same have been duly entered in the Ship's Log-Book, which the Master is to allow him to inspect for that purpose when he may require it.

37.

Returns into Store—Statement to be sent with them specifying when and where they were received and when the warrantry will expire.

When the Ship shall be laid up, the Purser is to send his Steward, or some other careful Person, with the Provisions and Victualling Stores remaining on board, to see the safe delivery thereof, and to send to the Agent, or Officer, a particular Statement under his hand, of the Provisions and Stores returned, specifying the times when, and places from whence, they were received, and, if under warrantry, when the same will expire;

observing that unless such Statement be sent with them, no Receipt will be given to him for the same, nor any Credit be allowed to him beyond the extent which the Agent or Officer admits to have been received, nor will any allowance be made to him for any part thereof, if condemned by Survey after the expiration of warranty, unless they shall have been previously surveyed and found good as directed by Article 26.

38.

When loose Staves are returned into Store, the Purser will be allowed Credit for them, according to their description, as follows, viz.—

He is to avail himself of fit opportunities before he leaves any Port, to compare most carefully his Accounts of all the Returns which he has made to the Victualling Yards, more especially those of Casks, Staves, Hoops and Biscuit Bags, and correct them, if necessary, with the Accounts of the respective Agents and Storekeepers. And he is to take particular care that he never leaves any Port without having previously executed the necessary Vouchers for all the supplies which he has received.

Returns—To compare his Accounts of them with the Agent's ;

and not to quit any Port till he has signed his Vouchers.

BOOKS AND ACCOUNTS TO BE KEPT.

40.

Victualling
Book.

HE is to keep a Victualling Book, agreeably to the Form in the Appendix, No. 13, in which he is to insert the Names of all the Individuals borne upon the Ship's Books, together with their numbers thereon, the dates of their Appearances, Deaths, Desertions, or Discharges, as well as all the Muster Letters, and Cheques, and the Notations respecting Cheques, and Re-appearances, which the Monthly Muster Books contain, never omitting, if chequed as Sick, the name of the Hospital or Place to which sent, and observing that the division of the Ship's Company, &c., into Lists in his Victualling Book, is always to correspond exactly with the divisions in the Ship's Books. This Book, together with the Slop Book which he is directed to keep by the 11th Article of the Slop Instructions, will enable him to vouch, by his signature, the Ship's Muster Books, Pay Books, the Tickets, Pay, and other Lists, for the Wages, or Discharge of any of the Men, which he is to consider it a part of his duty to do : and as this Book will form the ground-work of the calculations which he will be required to make for the statement of his Victualling Account, as hereafter directed, it will be incumbent upon him to keep it with every degree of attention and exactness, and to pay the most particular attention to all the notations made thereon for his government ; observing that the Widow's Men are never to be entered on this Book. Besides the Victualling Book, which he keeps for common use, he is to keep a complete fair copy thereof, which will be the document required to be transmitted with his Annual Accounts, and the

rough one kept for common use, will remain in his possession, for the purpose of making out a complete duplicate, if the fair one should be taken or lost. Both these Victualling Books he must produce for the inspection of the Captain when required to do so, in order that he may be satisfied that these Books are not running into arrear. He will be furnished by his Captain with a sufficient quantity of Victualling Paper for keeping these Books, and he is to observe, that no wasteful expenditure thereof will be allowed.

41.

He is to take notice that all the Lists in his Victualling Book, which include any part of the Ship's Complement, are to be signed by himself, but each List of Supernumeraries must be certified by the Captain at the foot thereof, agreeably to the Form in the Appendix, No. 11. B: and he is to be very particular in placing against the name of each Supernumerary, from whence he was received and where discharged.

42.

He is to keep and transmit to the Victualling Office, with his Accounts, a Number and Content Book, in which every Package of Provisions, &c., received by him for the use of the Ship from whatever source, is to be distinctly entered and accounted for as opened, expended, lent, condemned, lost, returned into Store, carried to his next Number and Content Book, or transferred to his Successor agreeably to the Form, in the Appendix, No. 14. In this Book each separate supply is to be totalled, for the purpose of shewing that it agrees exactly with the receipts granted for it.

He is to keep a Particular account of Provisions and Victualling Stores, of every description, Received and Returned, in exact conformity with the Form of the Quarterly Account in the Appendix, No. 5, in which he is to enter, most carefully, all such Receipts and Returns, so as to agree exactly with the Receipts and Vouchers which he may have respectively given and taken, at the precise time when they take place, and by which he must examine the Quarterly Accounts transmitted by the Captain before he signs them, and from which he will also be enabled to make out the General Account of Provisions and Victualling Stores, required by the 59th Article to be transmitted for the purpose of Passing his Accounts.

44.

Live Cattle

When Live Cattle are received and slaughtered on board, he is to keep an Account of their produce, as directed by the Form in the Appendix, No. 15, and to return the Hides, Skins, and Tallow, into Store, unless otherwise directed by the Captain to dispose of them.

WHEN he receives an Appointment for any Ship not newly commissioned, but in the room of a former Purser, he is to make immediate application to his Captain for a Survey on the Provisions, Victualling Stores, Slops, Soap, Tobacco, Necessaries, &c., remaining on board; and the Captain will forthwith procure

from the Commander-in-Chief, or Senior Officer, the requisite Order, directed to one Lieutenant, one Master, and one Purser, of any of His Majesty's Ships in Company; but if no other Ship be present, the Captain will grant it himself, directed to one of the Lieutenants, the Master, and a Mate. The Purser is to attend the survey himself, to take care that it be taken by the Surveying Officers, in exact conformity with the Form prescribed for it in the Appendix, No. 16, and immediately transmit one of the original Reports of Survey, or an exact Copy thereof, attested by his Captain, to the Commissioners for Victualling His Majesty's Navy; taking care that the Surveyor's Report, in all cases of Surveys on Provisions and Victualling Stores, must be noticed in the Log Book, by inserting therein the quantity of each Article, with any observation that may appear necessary.

46.

If any of the Provisions prove defective, he is to make the necessary application for a Survey on the same, and at the time of Survey to furnish the Surveying Officers with all the information relative to the Provisions which the Form of the Reports they are to render requires. He is to prepare three Reports according to the Form in the Appendix, No. 17, for the Signature of the Surveying Officers, one of which (and which, in this as well as in all other cases of Survey, will be the document he is to transmit with his Accounts) is to be on the back of the Order for the Survey, and he will be held responsible for the correctness of the Form of the Reports prescribed, or to represent to his Captain if any impediment thereto be interposed.

If any loss of Provisions, or Victualling Stores, shall happen, either by action with the Enemy, through the misconduct or negligence of any Officer, by malice, or carelessness in taking them into, or returning them from the Ship, or by any unavoidable accident, or be embezzled by any person belonging to the Ship, the same is to be inserted and particularly described in the Log Book, and also entered in the Purser's Particular Account of Provisions Returned, and in the Quarterly Account. In cases of Loss, he is to procure a Certificate from the Captain, a Lieutenant, and the Master, stating the particulars of what was so lost, and the cause thereof, that it did not happen through the neglect or default of any person whatever, and that no part of what was so lost could possibly have been saved: And in cases of embezzlement, or loss by malice, misconduct, or carelessness, the Captain will grant him a Certificate, stating the particulars of the fact, the names, and numbers on the Ship's Books of the Offenders; and that the value of the Articles embezzled, or negligently or wantonly lost, have been charged against them at the Debt prices prescribed by Article 29, at which prices all Imprests against Officers made on Account of increased or unauthorized expenditure, &c. of Provisions will also be charged.

49.

Loans of
Provisions.

Whenever it shall be necessary to lend Provisions or Victualling Stores to any of His Majesty's Ships, he is to obtain the Captain's Warrant for so doing, and to procure the Purser's Receipts for the quantities so supplied, taking care to inform the Purser when the warranty will expire, and when, and from whom,

the same were received; all which is to be expressed in the Receipts which he takes: and should he be ordered to furnish Supplies to a Foreign Ship of War, or to a Merchant Ship, he is not only to take the Captain's or Master's Receipts as above directed, but also in the case of Merchant Ships, to cause the Master to insert in each Receipt, the names and residences of the Owners, that they may be applied to for payment of the value.

If supplied to a Merchant Ship, names & residences of the Owners to be obtained.

50.

All Reports of Survey of whatever description; all Vouchers for Purchases of Provisions and Victualling Stores, and Savings of Provisions; and all Receipts for Supplies to His Majesty's Ships, to Merchant Ships, or otherwise, are to be taken by the Purser, if possible, in Triplicate. One of these documents, with a proper Letter of Advice, he is to transmit, by the very first opportunity, to the Commissioners for Victualling His Majesty's Navy: and if he fails to transmit these Surveys, Vouchers, and Receipts, and the Contractors or other individuals liable to the Crown should become insolvent, he will not be allowed credit for such condemnations or supplies, on the passing of his Accounts. A second of each of these documents accompanied by the Captain's original Order will be considered as indispensable Vouchers to, and must be transmitted with his Victualling Accounts; and the third is to be retained in his possession after his Accounts shall have been sent to the Victualling Office, in case the loss of them, or any other unforeseen circumstances, should require its production. He is also to be very particular when a Survey is taken at an established Victualling Port in England for closing his Accounts, to give written notice to the Agent Victualler, of the day on which such Survey has been held.

Triplicate Documents to be taken if possible in all cases.

Directions for transmitting them.

51.

Attested Copies of Document. Directions in that behalf.

Of all such Orders, Reports of Survey, Certificates, Receipts for Supplies, and other documents necessary for passing his Accounts, which it may not be practicable for him to obtain in Triplicate, he is immediately, on receiving the same, to make out two fair copies, and to present them for the attestation of his Captain, that they may be transmitted as directed in the preceding Article; and he is to observe that when the first of these documents is transmitted, he is to note on each of the two remaining in his possession, the time when, and by what conveyance the original was sent, and also on the one which is to remain ultimately in his possession, the same particulars relative to the transmission of the second.

52.

Purser's Victualling Account, Directions for closing it.

When he shall have an Account due for Twelve Calendar Months, or upwards, or when he shall quit his Ship, he is to make immediate application to his Captain for a Survey on the Remains of Provisions and Victualling Stores, and as soon as the Survey is taken, he is to make up and transmit his Accounts. The Survey is to be taken as directed in Article 45, and in all cases when circumstances may unavoidably prevent the Surveying Officers from distinctly seeing the Provisions and Stores remaining, he is not only from his Number and Content Book and the personal information and explanation of himself and his Steward, to afford them all possible assistance for making correct Reports agreeably to the Form prescribed, but he is to subscribe such notation of the personal information and explanation afforded by him on these emergencies, as the Surveying Officers may think it just to make at the foot of the Reports.

53.

If the Ship shall be ordered to be completed for Service likely to occasion her long absence from Port, at any time after his Account shall be due for Ten Calendar Months, he is to make the necessary application for a Survey before the Ship's Provisions and Victualling Stores are completed, and to make up and transmit his Accounts, for such period, in the same manner as if Twelve Calendar Months had actually expired.

When ordered on Foreign Service Account may be made up after 10 Calendar Months.

54.

The Law Officers of the Crown being of opinion that neither the Sureties of the Pursers who die, desert, or are dismissed from the Service, nor even their own Estates, are liable for any Balances that may appear to be due to the Crown on the Settlement of their Accounts, in cases when Surveys on the Remains are not taken immediately after the death, desertion, or dismissal of the party, the following course is to be pursued in such cases, as well as when a Purser is invalidated. If the vacancy should take place while the Ship is in Port, or at Sea in company with other Ships, the Captain is, *without any delay*, to make application to the Senior Officer for the appointment of a Successor, and a Survey will be ordered in the usual way. But if the Ship should be at Sea and not in company with other Ships, the Survey is to be ordered by her Captain to be taken by a Lieutenant, the Master, and a Mate, and a strict and conscientious Report is to be made upon the quantity and number of every Article of Provisions and Purser's Stores; and also upon the value, according to the best of the Judgment of the Surveying Officers, of the Necessaries remaining on board. The Captain is forthwith to appoint his Clerk, or some other competent Person, to perform the Purser's duty till a Successor is appointed, and the Person performing the duty will, on passing his Accounts

Death, Desertion, or Dismissal of the Purser. Course to be pursued.

in the Victualling Office, be allowed such consideration for his trouble, as the Commissioners shall deem just. Every Book and Paper relating to the Accounts of a Purser who has died or deserted (such Extracts from the particular Accounts of Provisions received and returned, and the Number and Content Book, as may be necessary for the future execution of the duty, being previously made) is to be carefully collected and sealed up in a packet by the Captain's Clerk and Steward, in the presence of the Captain, and transmitted by him, by the first safe opportunity, to the Commissioners for Victualling His Majesty's Navy, accompanied by a Letter of Advice, a duplicate of which Letter is to be sent by the first opportunity that occurs.

COMPLETION AND TRANSMISSION OF ACCOUNTS.

55.

Victualling
Book to be
made up as
soon as the
Survey on
Remains
shall have
been taken.

As soon as the Survey on the Remains of Provisions and Purser's Stores shall have been taken, as directed in Article 45, he is to proceed to complete, in his Victualling Book, all the Appearances, Muster Letters, Cheques, and Re-appearances; as well as all the Deaths, Desertions, and Discharges that may have taken place since his last comparison with the Captain's Clerk at the time of making up the last Monthly Muster Book, as directed upon the Form of the Victualling Book, up to the day on which the Survey was held; and he is to discharge, on the same day, all the names that will remain quite open, as well as those that stand chequed, or sick, upon the old Victualling Book, into the new Victualling Book, which he must open on the succeeding day, for his next Account.

56.

After having made the comparison, and signed the Certificate, with the Captain's Clerk, directed in the Form of the Victualling Book, he is to cast out, against each person's name, in the three columns of his rough and fair Victualling Books, appropriated for that purpose, the total number of days that each individual may have been Chequed, Sick, and Borne, including in the latter column the total number of days from the day of appearance, to the day of final discharge on the Victualling Book. The three columns are to be carefully totalled at the foot of each folio, and the totals of each folio carried to the abstract of totals which it will be requisite to make at the end of each List of the Ship's Company, Boys, and Marines, of Supernumeraries for Wages and Victuals, of Supernumeraries for Victuals only, and of Prisoners, respectively, for the purpose of forming a general abstract of Totals, as required by the succeeding Article.

Victualling Book, Directions relative to closing it.

57.

From the aggregate numbers appearing as Chequed, Sick, and Borne, upon each of the Lists enumerated in the preceding Article, the Purser is, towards the end of his Victualling Book, to make out a general Abstract, agreeably to the form in the Appendix, No. 19, which, after deduction of Cheques, will exhibit the exact number of days on which his calculations are to be made for the proportions of Provisions, Casks, Hoops, and Biscuit Bags, for the number of Persons victualled, and also for Necessary Money for the Complement, and Extra Necessary Money for Supernumeraries: And as the accuracy of most of these calculations will entirely depend upon the correctness with which the Victualling Book is kept, the number of days checked and victualled cast, the totals made, and the several

General Abstract of Victualling Book to be made.

Abstracts of these formed, it will be incumbent upon him to give the strictest care and attention thereto.

58.

The Live Cattle Account to be made up for the whole period of the Victualling Account.

The General Account of Live Cattle received, and slaughtered, which the Purser is required to render with his Accounts, is not to be made out, in separate Quarters, (for Form of which see Appendix, No. 15,) but for the whole period of his Account, and to be totalled at foot; and he is to enter into the Columns for Fresh Meat the exact number of Pounds, which it shall appear by his Live Cattle Account that the Cattle slaughtered on board have produced; and into the Columns for Suet, Tallow, and Hides, the quantities or number of each which may have been yielded.

59.

General Account of Provisions Received and Returned, how to be made out.

The General Account of Provisions and Victualling Stores Received, and Returned, which he will be required to render into Office, for passing his Accounts, is to be made out agreeably to the Forms, No. 20, A. and B., and which will agree with the Particular Account required to be kept by the 43rd Article of these Instructions, except that, in order to facilitate the examination of his Accounts, with those received from the regular established Victualling Ports *at Home*, the Supplies received from each or any of those Ports are to be inserted Quarterly, and not according to the respective Receipts and Vouchers given and taken for the same, and both sides of the Account are then to be totalled at foot, as shewn on the Forms before referred to.

60.

How to total and balance the General Account, & convert the Substitutes.

After the General Account is totalled, he is to bring the total of the Credit side of the Account, after conversion of the Staves, (as shewn on the Form of the Statement, No. 21, in the Appendix,) to the Debtor side, and to deduct it from the

total received, and then to convert the several species of Provisions which have been supplied or issued, as substitutes, into the species for which they may have been substituted, as shewn upon the Forms, No. 20, A. and B., by drawing his Pen distinctly through, but not obliterating the totals of such Articles at the foot of the Account, and inserting in the columns for which such Articles were supplied as substitutes, the respective quantities of the Articles to which they are equivalent, as shewn in Article 30. A new total must then be made, which will shew the quantities of each species with which he must stand charged, in the Statement of his Victualling Account. The manner in which the conversion is to be made, is distinctly shewn on the Form of the General Account in the Appendix No. 20, A. Both parts of the General Account are to be sewed together, when complete, that the Affidavit required to them may distinctly apply to both.

61.

Having completed, according to the directions already given, his Victualling Book, and General Account of Provisions Received and Returned, which are the chief Documents on which the Statement of his Account is to be formed, he is to make out the Statement itself, agreeably to the Form in the Appendix, No. 21. The DEBTOR side of this Account must contain the total of each species of Provisions, Victualling Stores, Soap, Tobacco, Necessary Money, &c., received by him, during the currency of the Account, brought from the total of the Debtor side of his General Account, after abatement of all his Credits, and after due conversion of all the Substitutes. The CREDIT side of the Statement must contain,

1st. The Victualling for a day, on all Species, except Meat, Flour, and Peas, for the number of Persons appearing by the General Abstract to the Victualling Book (Form in the Ap-

pendix, No. 19,) to have been victualled on board, as well as his allowance for Waste of Casks, Hoops, and Bags. 2nd. The number of Persons victualled for a day on Fresh Meat, and Vegetables. 3rd. The number of Persons victualled for a day on Salt Meat, Flour, and Peas. 4th. The Allowance of One-Eighth, under the head Waste made to him by Article 4. 5th. Necessary Money for the Complement. 6th. Necessary Money for Supernumeraries exceeding the number short of the Complement, and other Credits, as shewn in Form of the Appendix, No. 21; adding also such Claims as he may be entitled to for Necessary Money for Tenders: and for Top, Poop, and Convoy Lights. The Credit side must then be totalled, and both sides of the Account must be made to balance exactly, by adding to each Item on the one side of the Account, as much of each Article as may be required to make it agree precisely with the quantity contained in the corresponding Column on the other side. The quantities required to be added to the Debtor side of the Account will shew the Surplus of each Article to which the Purser is entitled, or his Credit. The quantities that are added to the Credit side will shew his deficiency or Debt. Both sides are to be then finally totalled, and will consequently perfectly correspond. On the back of the Form in the Appendix, No. 21, the manner of casting the proportions for the number victualled, is distinctly shewn.

62.

Cause of Debt
or excessive
Credit to be
explained.

When it shall appear by the Purser's Statement of his own Account that he is in Debt for any Article of Provisions, &c., he is to transmit with the Statement the most satisfactory explanation that he can afford, as to the cause of such deficiency: and when he may appear to have a Credit of any species of Provisions exceeding his allowance for Eighths, he is to send

with his Statement a similar explanation as to the cause of such extraordinary Credit.

63.

If the Purser should prove in Debt on the final balance of the Account after being cast into Money, and if his explanation as to the cause of the deficiencies which occasioned that Debt be deemed satisfactory, and the Amount be moderate, it will be carried to his next Account, should he continue in employment; otherwise he will be immediately called upon for payment, or his Sureties in case of his failure. If he shall be in Debt to any considerable Amount, on his succeeding Account, without transmitting with it satisfactory explanation, his Sureties will be immediately called upon for payment, and he will be considered as undeserving of employment in a Ship of a large class. And if he should be in Debt on a third Account, without transmitting with it the most satisfactory explanation, accompanied by the most unequivocal testimony of his Captain, as to the correctness, attention, and integrity of his conduct, his Sureties will not only be called upon for immediate payment of the Debt, or the Penalty of their Bond, as the case may require, but he will be superseded in his Ship, and be held unworthy of further employment in the Naval Service: and he is to observe, that in no case will he be placed on the Half-Pay List, until he shall have delivered his last Accounts into Office, nor even then, if he should appear in Debt thereon, or if he should be previously in Debt to the Department, until such Debt or Debts be discharged.

64.

If any Provisions or Victualling Stores shall have been purchased by him during the period of his Account for the use of the Ship, or if he shall have drawn for or have received any

Penalty in cases of the Purser's appearing in debt.

Account Current and Affidavit to disbursements, &c., to be sent with Victualling Account.

Necessary Money, or have made any payments to the Ship's Company for provisions saved out of their daily allowance, or short allowed to them, he is, with special reference to Article 3, to transmit, with his other papers, to the Victualling Office, an Account Current and Affidavit, of all his Disbursements for such Purchases and payments, agreeably to the Form in the Appendix, No. 22.

65.

Account of Tobacco and Soap issued to be also sent.

He is to transmit with his Accounts, agreeably to the Form in the Appendix, No. 23, a Certified Account of the quantity of Tobacco and Soap issued by him to the Ship's Company, from the commencement to the termination of each Account that he delivers into Office, in order that it may be ascertained whether the quantity taken credit for in his General Statement be correct, and how far the quantity issued, and the quantity that may appear to remain on Survey at the close of the Account, correspond with the quantity that remained on his charge at the commencement of his Account, and what may have been subsequently received.

66.

Duplicate set of Accounts in case the original should be lost.

In addition to the Triplicate Vouchers and attested Copies referred to in the preceding Articles of his Instructions, he is positively required always to retain in his own possession such other sufficient Documents as may be necessary to enable him to make up a Duplicate set of his Accounts, if the Originals should be captured or lost; and in the event of his being at any time reduced to that necessity, he is to prepare and transmit a second set of Books and Accounts from those retained in his possession, which he is still to preserve for the purpose of being delivered into Office, if the Duplicate should not be received.

67.

When he is removed from one Ship to another, or invalidated or discharged, or in the event of his being dismissed from the Service, he is to complete all his Papers, and make up his Accounts to the time when he may be so removed, invalidated, discharged, or dismissed, precisely on the same principle as directed by these Instructions, if his Annual Account should have become due; and he is to transmit them to the Victualling Board within one Month, unless he should be on a Foreign Station, and circumstances should require his leaving it before that time, in which case he will be called upon by the Commander-in-Chief or Senior Officer, to deliver to him a declaration under his hand to that effect, agreeably to the Form in the Appendix, No. 24, with which he is hereby directed to comply. But Commanding Officers, having charge of Pursery Stores, are to observe that the last Monthly Muster Book, and Quarterly Account, will never be dispensed with by the Senior Officer, as no means will remain to the Party for producing them when he quits the Station.

Purser to make up his Accounts to the day on which he may be invalidated or discharged;

and to transmit them within one Month afterwards.

68.

Having prepared all his Accounts in the manner already directed, (and which will consist of the Books and Papers enumerated in the List in the Appendix, No. 25,) and having made the requisite Affidavit thereto, he is within one Month at the farthest after the date of the Survey, to pack them carefully up, and to address them to the Commissioners for Victualling His Majesty's Navy, London, and not to any private Agent. On the left hand lower corner of the Package he is to write distinctly the Name of the Ship with the words "Purser's Accounts from the
to the
" (inserting the proper dates), and to forward them by a safe Conveyance to

Accounts to be sent to the Victualling Board, and not to a private Agent.

If on a Foreign Station to be delivered to Naval Storekeeper, and Receipt obtained for them.

London. But if he be employed on a Foreign Station, he is to deliver them to the Naval Storekeeper at the Port where he may be, for transmission, who will grant him a Receipt for the same. But as the Commander-in-Chief or Senior Officer will occasionally direct public Accounts and Papers to be sent on board the Flag Ship, or some Ship of War destined to England when proper opportunities occur, he must in such case deliver them according to such order, and the Commander-in-Chief or Senior Officer will direct a Receipt to be given to him from the Ship to which they may be sent. He is to obtain from his Captain two certified Copies of such Receipt, and to send one of them by the first opportunity, to the Commissioners for Victualling His Majesty's Navy, in a Letter, advising them of his Accounts having been closed and forwarded. The second is to be sent by the next safe opportunity, and the third is to be retained in his possession like the other Triplicate Documents.

MISCELLANEOUS.

69.

No charge will be allowed in Purser's Accounts for Storehouse Room.

Craft and Boats to be hired only in cases of indispensable necessity.

HE is to take notice that in receiving Provisions and Victualling Stores there will not be allowed in his Accounts any Charge for Storehouse-Room, nor for Commission (except as specified in Article 8.) And Craft and Boats are never to be hired but upon indispensable necessity, when he is to have his Captain's Order for so doing, stating the service to be performed, and why the Ship's Boats are not equal to it; and he is further to produce a Certificate from the Captain, a Lieutenant, and the Master, specifying the necessity of their being hired, the time employed, the service actually performed, and that it could not

be performed in less time; taking care likewise that the service so performed, be duly entered in the Log Book, so as to correspond with the Certificate.

70.

Whenever the other duties of the Ship will admit, the Captain will, on his application, allow the Ship's Boats to be employed in conveying on board the Necessaries and other Stores belonging to him, and not subject him to the expense of hiring Boats for such purposes, when it may, without actual inconvenience to the Service, be prevented.

Ship's Boats will be allowed for getting on board Purser's Stores.

71.

Whenever his Captain shall be desirous of passing his Accounts, or when the Captain or himself shall be removed from the Ship, he is to give the Captain a Certificate in the Form prescribed in the Appendix, No. 26, unless circumstances shall have occurred to render it improper, in which case the Purser is immediately to represent the same by Letter to the Commissioners of the Victualling.

Certificate to be granted to the Captain.

72.

He is, on every occasion, to present his Accounts and Papers to his Captain, in sufficient time to enable him to examine them minutely, before signing them.

Presentation of Accounts for Captain's signature.

73.

In case of the loss of the Ship, he is to use his utmost endeavours to preserve all his Books, Papers, and Accounts, but more especially his Victualling and Slop Books, so that the Pay Books may be made out, and the defalcations set off therefrom, in the event of the Captain's Slop and Muster Books being lost.

In case of the loss of the Ship—Injunction for preserving his Books and Accounts.

74.

Complaints
to be made to
the Victual-
ling Board be-
fore Payment
of the Ship.

If he has any cause of complaint against any Officer of the Ship in relation to the disposition of the Provisions and Stores under his charge, he is to represent the same to the Victualling Board, before the Payment of the Ship, in order to their applying to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, to do right between His Majesty, himself, and such Officer, before that Officer receives his Pay.

75.

Importance
of strict at-
tention to his
duties.

The eligibility of Pursers for Ships of high Rates, or their fitness for other employment in the Naval Service, will not fail to be appreciated by the degree of attention, accuracy, and regularity, with which they may be reported by the Victualling Board to have kept and rendered their Public Accounts.

INSTRUCTIONS

MONTHLY PAYMENT OF WAGES.

1.

It being enacted by the Act 6 Geo. 4th, Cap. 18. (No. 37 in the Appendix) that a portion of the pay actually due to such of the Warrant and Petty Officers of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels in Commission as are not entitled to draw Bills, and to the Seamen, Non-commissioned Officers, and Privates of Marines, and Boys, who shall be desirous of receiving the same, may be issued and paid to them in such proportions per Month, to such amount, and according to such rate as shall be ordered by His Majesty in Council, such payment to be made in any Port Abroad, or at Home, at the expiration of every Month, or as soon after as the necessity and convenience of the Service will admit, with Cash obtained on Bills drawn by the Pursers at three days' sight, upon the Commissioners of the Navy: And it being directed by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 5th July, 1825, that the proportion of Wages to be paid, shall be Four Shillings a Month to Men, and Two Shillings to Boys, and to be paid when practicable in British Silver Coin, the value thereof to be fixed in British Money, according to its contents in Standard Silver, estimating such Standard Silver at Five Shillings and Two Pence per Ounce:—

The Purser is to make payment of the said Monthly allowance in the manner and under the Regulations prescribed by the said Act, and at the rates fixed by Order in Council, observing with reference to the 5th Section of the Act, that the sums paid be charged against the respective Men on the Ship's Books, in the

same manner as Slops are charged, and that the Purser, on making out his Slop and Bed Lists, is in an additional column (as shewn in the Forms Nos. 30 and 31 in the Appendix) to insert the sums paid to the respective parties within the periods those Lists comprise.

The Payments are to be made in British Silver Coin when such can be procured, and when it cannot, the Purser is to pay the Men in Foreign Coin, according to the value specified in the Table No. 6 F. in the Appendix to the Victualling Instructions; but, when neither British Coin nor Foreign Coin of the descriptions specified in the said Table can be obtained, the Purser is to make the Payments as nearly as possible, according to the principle on which the said Table has been formed.

The Bills for these Payments are to be drawn as directed by the before-mentioned Act, and the 17th Article of the Commander-in-Chief's Instructions, Page 27, and the Purser is to debit or credit himself with any difference between the terms on which he takes up the Money, and those on which he pays it away.

SLOPS, BEDS, AND RELIGIOUS BOOKS.

2.

Slop Clothes
and Bedding.
How to de-
mand them.

WHEN the Ship is fitting for Sea, and at any future time when Slops and Bedding may be required for the use of the Crew, the Purser (who is to have the charge of the Slop Clothes, Religious Books, and Bedding) shall, with the approval of his Captain, demand the proportion of those Articles from the Storekeeper or Naval Officer at the Port where she is, agreeably to the Establishment in the Form No. 27 in the Appendix, and shall use all due expedition in getting them on board.

3.

He is never to purchase any Slop Clothes or Bedding at Ports where there is a Naval Officer or Storekeeper, nor at any other places, except in case of absolute necessity, but when such a measure becomes indispensable, each species is to be obtained of the kind as near as possible to that issued from His Majesty's Stores: Previously to such purchase he must obtain his Captain's authority for the same, and take triplicate Vouchers in exact conformity to the Forms in the Appendix, No. 28. One set of these Vouchers, in which it is provided that Ten per Cent. shall be added to the amount of the purchase, (at which increased rate the Slops or Bedding are to be issued to the Ship's Company) is to be sent by the Purser to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy by the first safe conveyance, the second by the next good opportunity, and the third to be retained in his own possession, to be produced, if necessary, on passing his Accounts.

When and how to be purchased.

Vouchers to be taken; and how transmitted.

4.

All new raised men, who may appear to be in want of Slops or Bedding, are to be supplied therewith according to their necessities, but not exceeding in the whole the amount of Two Months' wages to any one person. Care, however, is to be taken that the pressed men are not supplied with any thing more than is absolutely necessary to keep them clean, and protected from the weather.

How to supply new raised Men.

5.

No Men are to receive a second supply until they shall have served full Two Months, and then not above the value of Fourteen Shillings, and every Two Months afterwards they may be supplied to the value of Fourteen Shillings more.

The extent of succeeding Supplies.

6.

Lists to be sent of Men raised when removed from one Ship into another.

Directions respecting such List.

When any Men raised for His Majesty's Service, and borne on board a Ship or Vessel for Victuals only, are removed from her into any other Ship or Vessel, a List signed by the Captain and Purser, is to be sent with them, containing the names, whether Volunteers or Pressed, and the times of their being respectively entered for His Majesty's Service, from which times they are to be borne for Wages upon the Books of any Ship or Vessel in which they shall serve as part of the complement; and particular care is to be taken to set off upon such List the value of all Slop Clothes, Bedding, &c., that may have been supplied to, as well as other Charges incurred by, any of the Men contained therein, upon pain of its being deducted from the wages of any Captain who shall fail to have the same duly set off; and the Captain of every Ship or Vessel, into which any such men are removed, is to take care that a List, agreeably to what is above prescribed, be received with them, for which he is to return a Receipt, and (whether he receives them as Supernumeraries, or as part of his Complement) he is carefully to note on his Books from what Ship or Vessel they came, the times of their first entry into the Service, and of their appearance on board his Ship, and to charge against their names the value of the Slops, Bedding, &c., also the amount of other Charges set off upon the said list; but if any such Supernumeraries shall be Dsqd., Die, or Desert, or be discharged from the Service, whilst they are borne for Victuals only, they shall then be considered as having been borne for Wages as well as Victuals, and their names be accordingly entered upon the Pay Books.

7.

Vouchers for Loans from one Ship to another.

Whenever it shall be found necessary to lend Slop Clothes or Bedding, the Purser shall procure triplicate Receipts for the

same, describing the quantity and price of each particular species, which are to be transmitted to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy, as directed with respect to Vouchers for purchases in Article 2, observing that his Captain's order for the loan will be required as an indispensable Voucher for passing his Account.

8.

When any one dies on board, or deserts, his Clothes and other Effects in the Ship may be sold by auction, and the produce thereof shall be charged against the Buyers on the Muster and Pay-Books, and other documents for pay; also a distinct account kept of the same in the Slop-Book, expressing the name and number of the person that died or deserted, the particulars of the effects, the rates at which they were sold, and the names of the buyers, with their numbers on the books. In the case of Dead Men, the Purser shall make out and sign a bill of the Clothes and other effects so sold, according to the Form No. 29, which being also signed by the Captain, Senior Lieutenant, and Master, is to be transmitted by him to the Navy Office, with or at the back of the Ticket for the Wages of the deceased. In the case of Run Men, the Purser, if continuing in the Ship until Pay-Books for the time of the sales are made out, and if otherwise, the Captain shall on one or more of the last sheets of each Book insert the full particulars of the Run Men's Effects sold during the time of the Pay-Books.

Directions to be observed with regard to the Clothes and Effects of Persons dying.

9.

No Seamen shall be permitted to bid for the Clothes of deceased Officers, that are above their wear, nor be suffered to bid for any Effects beyond their real value, according to the judgment of the Master or Purser, who shall be present; nor

to purchase more than the wages due to them can answer, agreeably to the allowance of Slop Clothes: nor shall any Commission Officer of Royal Marines, or Royal Marine Artillery, Pilot, or Person not borne for Wages on the Ship's Books, be allowed to purchase Dead or Run Men's effects; excepting on the condition of immediately paying for the same to the Captain, who in such case shall place on the Ship's Muster, Slop, and Pay-Books, the sum for which such effects may be sold, as a charge against his own pay.

10.

All Slop Clothes, Bedding, and Dead and Run Men's Effects, are to be issued out to the men publicly upon deck in the presence of the Officers and Ship's Company. The Captain is not to suffer any one to be supplied with them, who is not really in want; so he is to oblige those who are ragged, or in want of apparel or bedding, to receive such necessaries as they want, not exceeding the quantity mentioned in the 3rd and 4th Articles: and the Captain is not to permit any Slop Clothes or Bedding to be issued to a Commission Officer of Royal Marines, or Royal Marine Artillery, or Pilot, with the exception of what is allowed the Pilot.

11.

The Captain is to take care to note upon the Muster-Books, Pay-Books, Pay-Lists, and Tickets, the value of the Slop Clothes, Bedding, Religious Books, Soap, and Tobacco, Dead and Run Men's Effects, that each man may have been supplied with, also all other charges incurred by him, and notations affecting his Wages, as the Captain will be held responsible for every omission or inaccuracy. He is likewise to keep a complete Slop-Book, agreeably to the Form in the Appendix No. 30,

shewing under the name of each man the particulars of the Slop Clothes, Bedding, Religious Books, Dead and Run Men's Clothes, and Soap, and Tobacco, issued to him, the exact dates of the several issues, and their separate and total values. Such Book, with those of his predecessors, if any, he is, if superseded, to deliver to his Successor, taking his Receipt for the same, or if paid off, to the Commissioner attending the payment, for transmission to the Navy Board. On passing an Annual or final Account, he is to furnish a Slop-Book, shewing the full particulars and total amount of the issues to each individual during the time of the Account, according to the Form No. 30, and signed by himself and the other signing Officers of the Ship. The Purser is to keep a Book in the same form, for the purpose of enabling him to attest the Ship's Pay-Books, Muster-Books, Lists, and Tickets, and to make out the Slop, Bed, Religious Books, Soap, and Tobacco Lists, agreeably to the Forms Nos. 31 and 32, necessary for passing his Accounts.

12.

Upon the death or removal of a Purser, the Officers who survey the Provisions and Victualling Stores, shall also take a separate Survey and Account of the remains of Slop Clothes, Bedding, and Religious Books, and certify the same under their hands in the Form No. 33, to be produced with the other Papers necessary for passing the Purser's Accounts; and also a copy thereof shall be entered in the Slop-Book, and signed by the Officers who took the Survey.

Survey of Slop Clothes, &c., to be taken on the Death or removal of a Purser.

13.

Upon every occasion of the Payment of the Ship, the Purser is to transmit to the Navy Board, Lists of the Names of all Persons to whom Slops, Bedding, Religious Books, Soap and

Tobacco have been issued, since the preceding payment of the Ship, according to the Forms Nos. 31 and 32, *viz.*, one List containing the Names of all the Men to whom Slops, and Beds, and Religious Books have been issued, and another List of those to whom Soap and Tobacco have been issued, distinctly shewing the total amount of the Articles supplied to each, and taking care that the respective amounts, credited in his Slop Account Current, correspond with the several amounts in the former List. The Account Current, together with a Voluntary charge, agreeably to the Form No. 34, to be attested by him upon Oath as mentioned in the said Form, a Report of Survey of Remains, and such other documents as may be required to substantiate his Accounts, are to be transmitted to the Commissioners of the Navy on the 31st December in each year, or as soon after as an opportunity may offer. And in closing the said Account Current, the Purser is to take Credit for such Issues as may have been made between the last payment of the Ship and the date of the Survey, of which Issues a Certificate is to be produced agreeably to the Form No. 35, observing that the total amount of such Issues and of the Remains on Survey, is to form the first Charge of his succeeding Account Current.

And in the event of the Ship being paid off and re-commissioned, the Purser is also to send in his Slop Accounts agreeably to the Forms herein mentioned.

14.

How to proceed with regard to Slop Clothes, &c., at the end of the Voyage.

At the end of the Voyage, and before the payment of the Ship, the Purser shall return into Store such of the Slops, Bedding, and Religious Books, as remained unissued, and forthwith render a just and true Account of all the Slops, Bedding, and Religious Books that have been committed to his Charge,

and of which he may not already have given an Account. But he will not be allowed Credit for Slop Clothes or Bedding, returned as unserviceable, unless he produces a condemnation of them upon Survey, certified under the hands of the Senior Lieutenant, Master, and Boatswain; and therein shall be expressed the time when, and the place where, the Slops were taken on board, and also the cause of their damage, together with an Affidavit agreeably to the Form No. 36, in the Appendix; nor shall he be allowed Credit for any unserviceable Slops thrown overboard; for whatever unserviceable Slops may arise are to be carefully packed up and preserved, that they may be returned into Store.

15.

When Soldiers are serving on board any Ship in lieu of Marines, the Purser is to obtain separate Bills in Triplicate for any Slops, Soap or Tobacco, that may have been issued to them, from the Commander of the Detachment, on the Agent of the Regiment; the one made payable to the Commissioners of the Navy, or their order, for the Slops, and the other made payable to the Commissioners of the Victualling, or their order, for the Soap and Tobacco; each Bill to be accompanied by Lists of the Soldiers, containing the whole amount of the Slops in the one case, and of the Soap and Tobacco in the other case, respectively supplied to each Man: these Lists (which are to be taken in Triplicate) shewing the total value, are to be signed by the Captain of the Ship, the Commanding Officer of the Detachment, and the Purser; one set of which, together with one of the Bills, the Purser is to transmit to the said Commissioners of the Navy and Victualling respectively by the first opportunity, and a second set, with another of the Bills by another fit opportunity; and although Soldiers never pay for

Beds, if any have been issued to them, a separate List signed as above shall be transmitted to the Navy Board, in order to clear the Purser, and to remain as a document in the Navy Office.

16.

Slop Accounts to be kept and sent separate from the Victualling Accounts.

As the Purser's Slop Accounts are examined and passed at the Navy Office, he is to be careful that the Surveys on Slops, and all other documents relating to those Accounts, are kept separate and distinct from the documents relating to his Victualling Accounts; and in the transmission thereof, he is, in order to guard against their being lost or mislaid, to put them under cover addressed to the Commissioners of the Navy, and to cause them to be forwarded with the first Muster Books that may be afterwards due from the Ship.

17.

Allowance to the Purser.

For the careful custody of the Slop Clothes, and Bedding, and for the faithful discharge of this part of his duty, the Purser will be allowed at the final settlement of his Slop Account, One Shilling in the Pound on the amount of the Slop Clothes and Bedding issued by him, excepting on those issued to Supernumeraries for Victuals only discharged to other Ships, and on those which shall appear to have been purchased by the direction of his Captain. He will also be allowed One Shilling in the Pound on the amount of Dead and Run Men's Clothes and Effects sold on board, which will be deducted from the amount of such Clothes Bills on the Pay Books of the Ship.

18.

The Religious Books furnished gratis for the use of His Majesty's Ship's and Vessels are, under the authority of the

Captain or Commanding Officer, to be demanded by and placed in charge of the Purser, in sufficient quantities for being issued, in the following proportion, *viz.*, One Copy of the New Testament, two Common Prayer Books, and two Psalters to each Mess, composed of eight men, and one Bible to thirty-two men, but the said Books are not to be issued to Supernumeraries. The Books are to be put into covers for their preservation, and mustered at Divisions with the Clothes of the Ship's Company, and a Certificate to this effect, signed by the Captain or Commanding Officer, is to be produced by the Purser on the passing of his Accounts; and when the Ship is paid off, the said Books are to be returned as Ships' Stores into the Dock Yard.

19.

In addition to the Religious Books to be furnished gratis, as mentioned in the preceding Article, such a number of Bibles, Testaments, and Prayer-Books is to be demanded by the Purser, as the Captain or Commanding Officer may approve of, for the purpose of being issued to such men as may be desirous of purchasing them, and the said Books are to be charged to the men at the following reduced rates, *viz.*,

MEMORANDA.

1. On proper demands being made (in which the Purser is to shew the state of his Remains, attested by the Captain or Commanding Officer) the Establishment of Slops for each Ship is to be completed a short time before she is ready for Sea, and after each Man shall have been supplied with as many Slops as he may require for immediate Use: And the Purser is to be careful to issue the oldest Slops first.
2. As Slops are packed in large and small Bales or Cases for convenience in being issued, the half Bale or Case inserted in the above Scheme is in all cases to be considered the same as a small Bale or Case; and for the purpose of keeping down the Store of Loose Serviceable Slops, each Ship will be supplied with a few in part of the established quantity, or where the quantity required to complete amounts to less than a Bale or Case, also for present Use, unless in consequence of any very particular Circumstance in regard to Stowage, &c. the Commissioner should think proper to dispense with it.
3. No Slops that are damaged or decayed, or otherwise unfit for Service, shall be returned into Store from on board Ship unless a Survey shall have been taken upon them according to the Form No. 36; and in case any part of such Slops shall appear to have become damaged or decayed, by being kept too long on board Ship, or through a want of due care on the part of the Purser by being stowed in an improper place, the Storekeeper is to make a report thereof to the Navy Board.
4. Boys' Clothing, being now packed separate and in large quantities, will be issued loose, and Purser are therefore to demand such quantities of each Article as may be necessary for the number of Boys on board.
5. The Guard Ships being established with a reduced Complement of Men, the Establishment of Slops for them is to be considered the same as the Establishment for a Fifth Rate.

An Act to make further Provisions for the Payment of the
Crews of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels.

[2d May 1825.]

WHEREAS by an Act made and passed in the Thirty-first Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King *George the Second*, intituled *An Act for the Encouragement of Seamen employed in the Royal Navy, and for establishing a regular Method for the punctual, frequent, and certain Payment of their Wages; and for enabling them more easily and readily to remit the same for the support of their Wives and Families; and for preventing Frauds and Abuses attending such Payments;* it is, amongst other Provisions for the due Payment of the Navy, enacted, that whensoever and as soon as any Ship or Vessel of His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, having been Twelve whole months or more in Sea Pay, shall be or arrive in any Port of *Great Britain* where any Commissioner of the Navy shall be or reside, the Commissioners of the Navy at their Board shall solicit such Sums of Money as shall be sufficient, and as soon as the same shall be issued, shall cause immediate Payment to be made of all the Wages due upon the Pay Books (therein-before directed to be transmitted to the said Commissioners) to all such Officers and Seamen, their Executors and Administrators, or to their respective Attorney or Attornies duly authorized as therein-after directed, deducting thereout whatever Monies shall have been paid before by way of Advance, or that shall stand against them in the

Books of such Ships or Vessels on account of any Defalcation, leaving always Six Months' Wages and no more due to such Officers and Seamen for their Service in such Ship or Vessel unpaid and in arrear: And whereas it has since been found convenient and expedient that His Majesty's Ships and Vessels shall be occasionally paid at Ports and Places where a Commissioner of the Navy shall not be or reside, and it is necessary that a proper and discretionary Authority should be given to the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of this United Kingdom, to order Payments to be made at any such Ports or Places when found expedient for the Public Service; Be it therefore enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That from and after the passing of this Act, it shall and may be lawful for the said Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral aforesaid, as often as they may think convenient and expedient that any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels shall be paid at a Port where a Commissioner of the Navy shall not be or reside, to signify their Directions in Writing for that Purpose to the principal Officers and Commissioners of the Navy, who shall thereupon take the proper Steps for causing Payments to be made accordingly by the Clerks of the Treasurer of the Navy, in the usual Manner, in the Presence of a Commissioner of the Navy to be sent thither for that Purpose, or other Officer to be appointed as hereinafter mentioned, and of the proper Clerks of the Navy Office.

Admiralty may direct Ships to be paid at Ports where no Commissioner resides.

Payments may be made, though Books are not examined.

II. And whereas it may be expedient to pay the Crews of Ships on their Arrival at the Port, or previous to sailing from thence, under Circumstances which will not admit of the Delay which must necessarily occur in sending the Pay Books of such Ship or Vessel to the Navy Office, to be examined previously to Payment being made thereupon, as is required by the said recited Act; be it therefore further enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy, in cases of Urgency, as they shall see necessary, to cause Payment to be made upon such Books without the previous Examination thereof as aforesaid; but it is nevertheless hereby required and directed that the said Books shall, immediately after Payment shall have been so made thereon, be trans-

mitted to the Navy Office, for the Purpose of undergoing the necessary Examination and Adjustment, and in order that any Charges omitted to be made, or any Overpayments that may have occurred thereon, may be set off, or abated and recovered, at the first Opportunity, from the Arrears of Wages or growing Wages of the Men in respect of whom such Omissions or Overpayments may have taken place.

III. And whereas it may be occasionally inconvenient and inexpedient to the public Service, at Ports where a single Commissioner may be or reside, and incompatible with his other public Duties, that he should superintend and control Payments of Ships and Vessels; and it may be proper that a discretionary Authority should be vested in the said Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral aforesaid, to substitute an Officer to superintend and control the said Payments instead of a Commissioner of the Navy; be it therefore further enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral aforesaid, when and so often as they may deem it expedient, to appoint an Officer of the Navy, of the Rank of Captain or Commander, to superintend and control the Payment of any of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels; and that all Payments to be made in the Presence of and under the Superintendence and Control of such Officer shall be held as Payments made in the Presence of a Commissioner of the Navy, and be passed to the Credit of the Treasurer of the Navy accordingly.

IV. And whereas it has been considered beneficial to His Majesty's Service, that a certain Portion of the Pay which may be due to the Warrant and Petty Officers, not allowed to draw Bills for their Pay, and to each Seamen, Non-commissioned Officer and Private of Marines and Boy serving on board His Majesty's Ships and Vessels, who may be desirous of receiving it, shall be issued to them at the Expiration of every Month, or as soon after as the Convenience and Necessity of the Service may admit, on the Ship's Arrival at any Port at Home or Abroad where Money can be procured for that Purpose, which Regulation cannot be carried into Effect without an Alteration of certain Provisions for the better Payment of the Navy, which have been established by the said Act before recited; be it therefore further enacted, That from and after the

passing of this Act, it shall and may be lawful for the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral aforesaid, to authorize and direct the Issuing and Payment to such of the Warrant and Petty Officers of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels in Commission as are not entitled to draw Bills, and to the Seamen, Non-commissioned Officers and Privates of Marines, and Boys, who shall be desirous of receiving the same, a Portion of the Pay which may be actually due to them, in such Proportions *per* Month, to such Amount, and according to such Rate, as shall for that Purpose be authorized, and ordered by His Majesty in Council; such Payment to be made in any Port Abroad or at Home, at the Expiration of every Month, or as soon after as the Convenience and Necessity of the Service will admit; and for the Purpose of carrying this Regulation into Effect, the Captain or Commanding Officer is hereby directed and enjoined to make out or cause to be made out a complete List of the Names with their respective Numbers on the Ship's Books, of such of the Description of Persons before mentioned as shall be willing to receive such Portion of their Pay, and who shall be actually on board at the Time of making out the said List, which List shall be signed by the said Captain or Commanding Officer, One other Commissioned Officer or Warrant Officer entitled to draw Bills, and by the Purser; and that the Purser of the said Ship or Vessel shall then draw, for the Amount of the said Portion of Pay so to be issued, a Bill at Three Days' Sight upon the Commissioners of the Navy, according to the Form set forth in the Schedule to this Act annexed, which Bill shall be certified by the Signature of the Captain or Commanding Officer of the Ship or Vessel in the Manner prescribed by the said Schedule; and the Commissioners of the Navy are hereby directed and enjoined to accept the said Bill, and assign it for Payment in the usual Manner on the Treasurer of the Navy, who shall be entitled to take Credit for the same, and the Amount shall be charged against the said Purser, who shall clear his Account in the Manner hereinafter directed; and that as soon as Cash shall have been obtained on the said Bill, the said Portion of Pay shall be paid by the said Purser to the Parties entitled thereto on the said List, in the Presence of the Captain or Commanding Officer, and a Commissioned or Warrant Officer entitled to draw Bills, and the Payment shall be certified on the said List by the said Captain or Commanding Officer, the said Commissioned or Warrant Offi-

cer, and the said Purser ; and that as soon after the said Payment as may be, the said Captain or Commanding Officer shall transmit the said List by the first safe and convenient Opportunity to the Commissioners of the Navy ; and the Captain or Commanding Officer and the Purser shall likewise, under their respective Hands, certify at the End of each Muster Book the full Amount, in Words at Length, of the Monies which shall have been so paid during the exact Period of Time of such Book, and that the several Sums so paid have been duly charged against the respective Men's Names on such Books ; provided always, that in case after any such Payment there shall be a Balance remaining in the Hands of the Purser, he shall give Credit for the Amount thereof in the next Bill to be drawn by him for Monthly Payments, so that he shall not be at liberty to draw for more than what, including such Balance, shall be sufficient to answer the next Monthly Payment.

V. And be it further enacted, That on the Receipt of the said List, the Payments made thereon shall be carried to the Credit of the Purser of the Ship or Vessel by whom the Bill for the Amount shall have been drawn as aforesaid ; and on the making out of the Pay Books, Muster Books, Slop Books, Pay Lists, and Pay Tickets of the said Ship or Vessel, the Sums so paid shall be charged against the Wages of each Person having received the same.

VI. And whereas it may happen that some of the Persons desirous of receiving such Portion of Pay at the Time of such Payment be absent on Duty or Sick, or on Leave of Absence, or from other sufficient Cause ; be it therefore further enacted, That on the Return to the Ship of any Individual so absent, his Name may and shall be subjoined to the next Lists to be made out for Payment, such Lists specifying the Cause and Date of Absence, and Date of Return ; and in case any Individual shall be discharged to another Ship or Vessel, and shall at the time of his Discharge be entitled to any Payment, or Portion of Payment, not then made, he shall be entitled to a Certificate from the Captain or Commanding Officer of the Ship or Vessel from which he may have been discharged, who is hereby required to furnish the same, specifying the Rating of such Individual in the Muster Books of the said Ship or Vessel, and

the Time for which he is entitled to such Portion of Pay, which Portion shall be paid to him on the next Payment to be made to the Crew of the Ship or Vessel into which he may have been discharged, and shall be allowed to the Purser of such last-mentioned Ship or Vessel in the Account of such next Payments; Provided nevertheless, that in all Cases where any of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels shall be at a Port where a Commissioner of the Navy shall be and reside, and whereat there shall be an Establishment of Clerks, having Money in their Custody for the Payment of Wages, and that such Monthly Portion of Pay herein-before authorized and directed to be advanced shall at that time be due and payable, the Purser shall draw a Bill for the Amount thereof, subject to such Abatement, and certified and attested in manner and form as herein-before directed, which Bill shall be cashed to him by the Clerks to the Treasurer of the Navy at such Out-Port, out of the Monies in their Hands for the Payment of Wages, and the Amount thereof shall be charged by the Commissioners of the Navy against the Purser, as before directed, and the Treasurer of the Navy shall be entitled to take Credit for the same.

VII. And be it further enacted, That in case of a Payment made on board a Ship or Vessel which, from her Establishment or other Circumstances, may not have a Purser on board, the Commanding Officer of every such Ship or Vessel shall act as and be deemed to be the Purser for all the Purposes of this Act; and that in such Case the Payment shall be made in the Presence of any other Commissioned Officer of the said Vessel, and One Warrant Officer, or if there shall be no other Commissioned Officer, then in the Presence of any Two Warrant Officers, who shall certify and attest the Lists in the Manner before required.

VIII. And be it further enacted, That the Purser of every Ship or Vessel, or in case the Vessel shall not have a Purser on board, then the Commanding Officer, shall debit himself, and be charged with any Premium which the Bills drawn by him in pursuance of this Act may bear, as Part of the Balance which may remain on Hand at the Conclusion of each Payment; and in case the said Bills shall be at a Discount, he shall add the said Discount to the Amount of the Bill to be drawn by him, which Discount shall be allowed in his Accounts, provided the Amount be truly

certified at the Foot of such Bill, in the Form set forth in the Schedule to this Act: Provided nevertheless, that if the said Bills shall be drawn at any Port within the Foreign or Colonial Territories of *Great Britain*, where there shall be a resident Naval Officer, such Naval Officer is hereby enjoined and directed to give Cash for the Amount of such Bills at Par, upon which no Premium or Discount shall be charged or taken; and in case he shall not have sufficient Cash in Hand for the Purpose, he shall certify the same by Indorsement on such Bill.

IX. And whereas by an Act passed in the Fifty-seventh Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled *An Act for making further Regulations respecting the Pay of the Officers of the Royal Navy, in certain Cases therein mentioned*, Officers and Persons of the Ranks and Rates therein expressed, and (amongst others) passed Mates and passed Midshipmen entitled to full Pay, are authorized to draw upon the Commissioners of the Navy at the End of every Six Lunar Months or Twelve Months for their Pay, as therein provided: and whereas His Majesty was pleased by his Order in Council, bearing Date the Twenty-fourth of *June* last, to establish a new Class of Officers in the Royal Navy, under the Denomination of Master's Assistants; be it therefore enacted, That from and after the passing of this Act, every Master Assistant, who shall have passed for a Master, or Second Master, shall have Licence, and he is hereby authorized to draw upon the Commissioners of the Navy a Bill or Bills for his Pay at the Expiration of every Six Lunar Months or Twelve Months, but not for a less Period than Six Months, for the whole net Amount of his Pay in the same Manner, subject to the like Deductions, and under similar Regulations, Limitations, Prohibitions and Restrictions, in every respect, as are in the recited Act expressed and declared with regard to passed Mates and passed Midshipmen.
