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INTRODUCTION TO THE STATISTICAL DISPLAY

OF THE

Diseases and Mortality of the Metropolis.

&c. &c. &c.

Abstracted from the prevailing excitement which the spread of Spasmodic Cholera from the banks of the Ganges to the shores of the Baltic, and at length to the North of England, has occasioned, my attention had previously been directed to the extent and causes of the mortality (rather than to the diseases) of the Metropolis, and having been favoured by a friend connected with one of the Insurance Offices with a complete set of the Bills of Mortality, published annually, for more than 200 years, by the Worshipful Company of Parish Clerks of the City of London, I was excited by curiosity, in the first instance, rather than by any specific design, to ascertain what their investigation might lead to and develope.

2. After much time and labour had been bestowed on the subject, I was restless until I had gone through the whole period, and thrown the details into a form to enable me to see clearly what conclusions could be drawn from them. Having done this, I deemed the exhibition both curious and interesting, and, having shown the details in manuscript to one or two eminent medical gentlemen, they encouraged me to believe that it was a development which the medical professors and practitioners, as well as the enlightened and liberal enquirers of all countries, would hail with grateful acknowledgement. I therefore resolved on their publication, which I have hastened in consequence of the prevailing excitement in regard to *Cholera*, and from a conviction in my own mind that their publication will tend to show the propriety and desirableness, independently of the prevalence of Spasmodic or any other peculiar disease, of measures being immediately adopted for obtaining the most accurate weekly returns of the diseases and mortality of the whole of this, now vast, metropolis.

3. A vulgar prejudice has for ages prevailed in regard to the unworthiness of the weekly and annual reports published by the Worshipful Company of Parish Clerks in London, under the title of "Bills of Mortality," from which the statistical display of diseases, here submitted to public attention, has been compiled. I shall, therefore, in the first instance, point out the origin of these reports, and then endeavour to show how far they are, or are not, entitled to regard. Parish registries of marriages, christenings, and burials, appear to have had their origin in England in 1538; and it was from the 21st of December, 1592, that the parish clerks of London first made a weekly return to the head of their fraternity, and first published the same in 1594, in consequence of the plague which prevailed in 1593: its publication was discontinued after the 18th Dec., 1597, the plague having then ceased. The first of the uninterrupted series of weekly bills commences on the 29th Dec., 1603, at which period there were only 13 out-parishes in addition to 96 parishes within the walls of the city of London, that of St. James's, Duke's Place, not being then included.

4. Subsequent to 1603, additional parishes were successively included, from which date an increasing interest appears to have prevailed respecting the weekly reports. The parish clerks of London had been incorporated as far back as 1233, under the title of the *Fraternity of St. Nicholas*; in 1611 they were re-incorporated under the title of the *Worshipful Company of Parish Clerks*, and, in 1625, their bills of mortality are stated to have acquired a general reputation. In this year the

company obtained a decree, under the seal of the High Commission Court, or Star Chamber, for the setting up of a printing press in their hall, in order to the printing of the weekly and general bills of mortality within the City of London and liberties thereof; for which purpose a printer was assigned by the Archbishop of Canterbury, and in this year, 1625, the number of burials in every parish was, for the first time, published; all that was done previously having been merely reporting the aggregate weekly number, as exhibited at pages 65—7.

5. The report of *Diseases* and *Casualties* was first published in 1629, and from this date the accompanying display commences; at this time 26 parishes in addition to the 97 within the walls of the City of London (St. James's, Duke's Place, being now included) made weekly returns, see Nos. 1 to 27 of the statement page 68, which page shows the years the additional parishes were included; such was the origin and progress of the account of the burials and diseases of that part of the Metropolis within the bills of mortality from 1592 to 1629, since which date a copy of the returns has been sent weekly to the Secretary of the Home Department of State, and the Right Honorable the Lord Mayor, and an annual account has been, and still continues to be published, and generally circulated, by the several parish clerks, amongst their fellow-parishioners, under the imposing title of

6. It seems not unreasonable to suppose that an account published under such distinguished sanction, in a city claiming the highest character for intelligence, public spirit, and all other qualities which give consequence and importance to society, and on a subject in which all have a common interest, would deserve, in a very high degree, the regard of the community at large, and especially so of the enlightened and enquiring portion of it. If it should prove that the returns have not been made with all the accuracy of which they have been susceptible, and which the subject demands, it is hoped that the perspicuous form in which their contents are here exhibited will serve to obtain accuracy for the future; and it must be obvious that the submitting to public attention from week to week, or from time to time, an accurate view of the extent of mortality, and nature of the diseases which occasion it, would tend to prepare the public mind to meet with calmness and fortitude any new disease, however inscrutable and severe, which nature, in its ever varying course, may occasion; and that such a display of the extent and cause of mortality would also operate as an additional stimulus to the genius and energies of the medical practitioners, to endeavour to allay and arrest the progress of disease in whatever form it may appear.

7. Proceeding now in the endeavour to show how far the accounts, such as they are, are entitled to regard for their accuracy, the subject presents itself in two points of view. First in regard to the proportion which the total number of *Burials* bears to the Total Population out of which the deaths have occurred; and, secondly, in regard to the *Diseases* or *Casualties* by which the deaths were occasioned. However imperfect the returns of the number of burials may have been, if the diseases and casualties which occasioned the demise of those returned as buried have been correctly made, the interest of the Statements of Diseases, as herewith exhibited, may be considered as not materially, if at all, affected by any defect in the return of the aggregate number of Burials, and I will therefore, in the first place, proceed to show the authority upon which the report of diseases is founded. Considering that a weekly return is made to the Secretary of State, and that a general bill is published annually under such exalted sanction as the KING'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY of the most powerful empire, and the RIGHT HONORABLE THE LORD MAYOR of the most populous, opulent, and enlightened, city in the world, it is natural to suppose that the office of reporting would be assigned to some of the most acute, discerning, enlightened, and industrious, of its medical professors; but what will the distant enquirer say when I inform him, as it is my duty to do, that the reports rest upon the authority of a parcel of elderly females, designated *Old Women* by those who indulge in vulgar prejudices against the returns?

8. It may serve, however, in some degree, to assuage English vanity to know that, over the greater part of Continental Europe, the duties of attendance during *parturition* are wholly performed by Females, who enjoy a respect and distinction in society beyond that of the Male Practitioner in Physic and Surgery. Why then should the Reports of Diseases in London be impugned for being made by Females? In a general sense, it affords no justifiable ground of objection; nor have I, from repeated opportunities of personal observation, and particular enquiry, been able to discover any justification for that indiscriminate censure and disregard which prevail in the Metropolis respecting them. But, admitting it to be justifiable, let it be asked, with whom does the odium rest?

9. The rule adopted by the Parish Clerks, from the commencement of their proceedings, has been to appoint two Females, whom they denominate *Searchers*, in each Parish, under the sanction of the Parochial Authorities, which Searchers, on a death being announced, visit the house of the Deceased, and inspect the Body, enquire the age, and disease which occasioned the demise; the inspection of the body being intended as a guard against death being occasioned by violence. Such being the course of proceeding, what more could be done by the most skilful Medical Practitioner, except by the one who attended the person previous to demise? No rational motive is discoverable for misrepresentation, except in some few cases, perhaps, of a desire on the part of the friends of the deceased to conceal the fact, when the death may have been occasioned or accelerated by *venery*, or indulgence in some vicious practice; but such cases, supposing them to occur at all, will, of late years, at all events, have been too few to affect the general interest of the Display herewith exhibited. The *Searchers*, so called, are personages, not perhaps possessing the first order of mental acquirement and discrimination, but possessing plain good sense, matronly deportment, and much practical experience in diseases, affording as fair a guarantee for exactitude in their reports as is likely to be obtained in any other manner, without consulting the medical practitioner by whom the deceased was attended previous to demise: a Medical Practitioner would probably report more *technically*, but not more intelligibly. This vindication, however, of the worthiness of the Searchers' reports must, after all, be considered as applying generally to the integrity of the question, rather than to that exactitude and nice distinction which the subject so imperatively deserves.

10. *The Note at the head of Page 67 refers to this Section for Historical Details of the Great Plague of 1345—1362. See Section 20.*

Could the Display herewith exhibited be viewed with confidence in respect to unerring accuracy, in the distinction and specification of the Diseases, and the numbers reported under each head, it might justly be regarded as the most interesting Statistical Picture ever submitted to human attention; and

more particularly so, could it have been accompanied by a corresponding display of the changes, extremes, and general state of the atmosphere in each year during the same period. However much the want of implicit confidence respecting the diseases, and the absence of all information on the state of the atmosphere, may, at the present time, be subjects of deep regret in respect to the past, it is to be hoped that the Display, such as it is, will superinduce such information, on both those points, as shall merit the most unqualified confidence for the future.

11. The most interesting features of the Display of the Diseases, as herewith exhibited, will be found to consist in the seeming uniformity of some, the extinction of others, and the seeming origin of new ones, as well as the manifest aggregate diminution in relation to the aggregate Population. To ascertain the exact relative proportion of any disease at one time compared with another, or the exact relative diminution in the aggregate, correct knowledge of the Total Population at corresponding periods is requisite; but here, unfortunately, information entirely fails, prior to 1750, and partially so up to 1801. The statement at Page 12 shows the Total Population of all the Parishes within the Bills of Mortality at different periods, commencing with 1700; but as Returns of Burials from the whole of the Parishes were not made until 1729, and the population of the Parishes separately was not given, all fair comparison is precluded. It appears, by the statement just referred to, that the Total Population, from 1700 to 1750, rather diminished than increased, and in the City of London within the Walls remarkably so; but, at the former period, the Four Parishes in Surrey, Nos. 15—18, page 68, were, in all probability, included in the City within the Walls: those Parishes under the distinction of the *Ward of Bridge Without*, were considered, previously to 1700, as part of the City; but in 1750, and subsequent thereto, they have been included under the head of the *Out Parishes* within the Bills of Mortality. According to an enumeration which seems to have been carefully made in 1631, the Total Population of the whole of the City of London, both within and without the Walls, including the Four Parishes above referred to, or the whole 1—18 as exhibited at page 68, was 130,178; which, in 1700, is represented at page 12 as amounting to 208,300.

12. From the preceding data, and statement of Burials, as exhibited at page 67, it appears that the proportion of deaths to the Total Population of the City, in 1631, was as 1 to 21; and, in 1700, as 1 to 24; while the proportion of Burials in the whole of the Metropolis, according to the Statements at pages 62, 63, and the Statement of the Population at page 12, was as 1 to 33 of the Total Population in 1700; 1 to 26 in 1750; and as 1 to 52 in 1820. It must be observed, however, in regard to the otherwise seeming disparity between the proportions of Burials in 1750 and 1820, that the two Metropolitan Counties of Middlesex and Surrey, in the twenty years 1801—1820, received an accession of more than 375,000 Inhabitants, as immigrants from other parts of the United Kingdom, &c.; and this, it will be seen on reflection, without, comparatively speaking, any material increase of Deaths. From this also it may be inferred not only how difficult it is, but how entirely futile it must be, to attempt to establish, with arithmetical precision, an exact scale of proportion which the deaths bear to the living, not only in the Metropolis, but in any particular district where the facilities of intercourse and tendency to change of location so extensively prevail.

13. It may be further observed, with respect to the proportions exhibited in the preceding section, that their credibility may be affected by the probable imperfection of the returns of the number of Burials, since 1750. It is well known and admitted that the Returns made to the Parish Clerks have been very deficient, and on reference to page 63 it will be seen to what extent they have been defective; one statement in that page showing the number as returned to the Parish Clerks, and another showing the number as returned to Parliament from the Parish Registers, and from all the Dissenting, and other private Burying Grounds: the Ratios exhibited in Section 12 are founded upon the amended and corrected Returns.

14. It is stated, in Section 7, that the defect in the Return of the Total Number of Burials is a question totally distinct from that of a defect in the Reports of Diseases; the latter are not so much affected

by a defect in the Return of the Total number of Burials, as the Return of the Total number of Burials is by any defect in them, to the Total Population; except in the case of Women dying in Childbed, which case also deserves to be estimated in reference to the Total Number of Births, rather than to either the Total Population or Total number of Burials. The number of Deaths in Childbed are exhibited in the first column in each of the four periods of the Display of the Diseases; and forms not one of the least interesting features. The annual average of Deaths in Childbed during the first period was 234, and in the fourth, or last period, 201: the number of Births being nearly as two in the latter period to one in the former. The Abortions and Still-born are more uniform. The first and second periods exhibit a Column headed *Chrisomes and Infants*. *Chrisom* is a Greek word, signifying an ointment, used apparently to supple or soften the first garment or cloth of Infants at their birth: its use in the first instance probably emanated in kindness, and was afterwards converted into a superstitious practice, by the Priests of both the Greek and Romish Churches. The Custom appears to have been, to use the anointed, or *Chrisom Cloth* for one month from the birth of the Child, and, if the Child died within that month, it was stated to have died in *Chrisome*. This ridiculous custom, it will be seen, gradually decreased in the Metropolis of England from 1629 to 1726, when it became quite extinct. As the number of Deaths reported in *Chrisome* decreased, those under the head *Convulsions* will be seen to have increased, the cause of Death in both cases probably having been the same.

15. The great number reported from 1647 to 1752 to have died of *Teething*, and the progressive diminution since the latter date, form a feature deserving attention, as does also the gradual to total extinction of *Rickets*, after much prevalence from 1647 to 1715; and generally the diminution of diseases *incident to infancy* may be regarded a circumstance as honorable to the assiduity and integrity of the Medical Practitioner, as it is gratifying to the Friends of social Improvement. There are, however, some indications of Nature seeming determined to cross the purposes of the Medical Practitioner, in despite of all his assiduity: *Coughs, Croup, and Dropsy in the Brain*, all indicate a determination, since 1790, to fill up the void of Mortality which the diminution under the head of *Convulsions* otherwise seems disposed to occasion. *Dropsy in the Brain*, in particular (see Col. 10, Period IV), appears to deserve attention: how far this Disease may have been confounded with Convulsions, or otherways, prior to 1790, is a point which I must leave to the Medical Professor to determine. In the three preceding periods it is reported under *Headmoldshot, Horse Shoe Head, and Water in the Head*;—and its prevalence, as reported from 1715 to 1752, and gradual diminution, almost to extinction, subsequent to the latter date, form another feature deserving of notice.

16. In the third period, from 1740, to 1789, I have placed, from the statement at page 70 (showing the number of Burials within the Bills of Mortality, in each of the thirteen gradations of ages), the number reported to have died under two years of age in parallel columns, and in *juxta-position* with the Total number Reported to have died of diseases incident to infancy. So placed they will be seen to afford very interesting evidence of reciprocal confirmation of an approximation to accuracy, not only to those cases separately, but to the Returns at large. The Returns of ages commenced only with 1728; the comparison therefore cannot be made retrospectively; but, from 1790 to 1831, the comparison serves to strengthen the confirmation and credibility of the whole.

17. *Consumption*, which forms so prominent a feature in the Catalogue of Diseases, may be regarded as remarkable for its uniformity, and more particularly so if viewed in relation to Asthma and Phthisic, with which it is blended from 1690 to 1700, and 1729 to 1739. Prior to 1690 Asthma is not specified; in the three latter periods Consumption, and Asthma, and Phthisic, are placed in *juxta-position*. From 1629 to 1710, the eruptive fevers, *Small Pox* and *Measles*, are as remarkable for their variableness as some other diseases are for their uniformity. Subsequent to the introduction of inoculation, the Small Pox became far more general and confirmed in its virulence, which continued up to the period of the introduction of Vaccination, since which time it has gradually abated; but it is a fact, which seems in

a very high degree to deserve attention, that the *Measles*, which continued exceedingly variable and moderate down to 1800, since that date (notwithstanding, as is fair to be presumed, the improved treatment of the Disease) have become greatly increased and confirmed in virulence. The increase of *Erysipelas* also, as one of the order of Eruptive Fevers, although at present inconsiderable in its effects, is not undeserving of notice.

18. From 1629 to 1689, *Fevers* seem to have been exceedingly variable; from the latter date, down to 1750, more uniform and general; and, since 1750, down to 1831, gradually to have diminished; while *inflammatory* disease has increased in a greater ratio than Fever has diminished. Supposing the distinctions to have been properly made in the Reports, the decrease of fever, and increase of inflammation, are features of peculiar interest, and may be regarded as additional evidence of the inscrutable working of Nature, and its ever-varying, yet uniform process. *Dropsy* appears to have progressively increased from 1629 down to 1750, subsequent to which date it seems to have somewhat abated, but manifests a tendency to increase again since 1810. *Paralysis* (see Col. 36, Period IV.) shows a marked increase since 1790.

19. The *Spasmodic Diseases* now claim attention; under this head Columns 16—19, 28, 37, and 65, 66, in the first period 1629—89, should all properly have been placed, unless Col. 19 be excepted. In the subsequent period the *Spasmi* will all be found under their proper head. As these diseases all bear so close an analogy to the *Cholera*, which at present prevails in the North of England and Scotland, and which, at different periods, under the name of the *Plague* or *Pest*, has occasioned great ravages in different parts of the World as well as in England, it may not be out of place here to exhibit a general view of the periods of its prevalence. The term *Plague* or *Pest* is so familiar to all acquainted with the Geography and History of the Levant, Asia Minor, and Constantinople, as to render a recurrence to those parts of the world inseparable from a remembrance of the disease in question; and, to treat of the latter to the extent to which it has there prevailed, it would be necessary to give an annuary of their Mortality for the last five centuries. It appears during such a period, down to the present time, to have been what it was in England from 1593 to 1740, as exhibited at pages 66-7, and columns 65-6, first period, and 75—80 in the second period; that is, never extinct, and occasionally manifesting itself with unusual virulence.

20. One of the great ravages of this still inexplicable disease occurred at Athens, in the year 430 B. C. In the year A. D. 80, it committed great ravages at Rome; and again in 167 it produced the like effects over the greater part of the then vastly extended Roman Empire. It committed great ravages in Britain in 430. But all its effects, both before and since, appear to have been greatly exceeded between 1345 and 1362; and in England between the 1st of August, 1348, and the 1st of September, 1349. This remarkable devastation first broke out in 1345, in *Cathay* [Western Tartary] whence it spread west, north, and south, over every part then known to be habitable of Western Asia, Africa, and Europe. The consternation which it produced, and its various modes of action, were so well described by an accredited Greek historian of the time, *J. Cantacuzenus*,* that I shall here insert the account as translated by a seemingly faithful English historian† of the 17th century.

* J. Cantacuzenus was born in 1295, of a distinguished family in Constantinople. His liberal and elegant acquirements early in life obtained for him great respect and influence at the court of the Eastern Empire then held in that city. The government descending in 1341 to a minor, John Paleologus, Cantacuzenus was appointed Regent, which situation brought upon him the malice of all the servile courtiers with which Constantinople at that time abounded, from whose conspiracies he was compelled to retreat. He inherited from his family vast wealth, all of which was confiscated; to which spoliation he appears to have been disposed to have reconciled himself on condition of being permitted to return to Constantinople, and pursue, in peace and quietude, his indulgence in literary pursuits. But, these conditions being refused him, he put himself in an attitude of self redress, and after varied turns of fortune re-entered Constantinople in triumph in 1347; but such was his predilection for, and love of peace, that he appears voluntarily, in 1355, to have withdrawn himself from the cares and turmoil of government, by retiring to a convent, in which he is stated to have died in 1411, after living, if the dates of his birth and death be correct, to the great age of 116.

† Joshua Barnes, Fellow of Emanuel College, Cambridge, who published at Cambridge, in 1688, a voluminous History of the Reign of Edward III.

21. "This plague, taking its rise from the Scythians or Hyberboreans, overran almost all the sea coasts of the habitable world, and destroyed an incredible number of people. For it did not only pass through *Pontus*, and *Thrace*, and *Macedonia*, but also through *Hellas*, and Italy, and all the Isles; and Egypt, and Lybia, and Indæa [Ethiopia], and Syria, and in a manner all the world round about. But it was such an unconquerable evil, that neither any diet nor strength of body could resist it; for it pulled down all bodies alike, as well the strong as the weak, and those who were most diligently looked after perished as well as those who wanted all things. That year was free from all other distempers; but, if perhaps any person was sick before, all other distempers terminated in this. Here the knowledge of the physicians was put to a stand: for some, enduring a little, died the same day, some the same hour; but those that held out the second or third day were first taken with an acute fever, and, the distemper getting up into the head, were rendered speechless, and insensible to all that was done; and so dropt off as it were in a profound sleep. But, if any ever came to themselves a little, they endeavoured to speak something, but the tongue was with difficulty moved; and so uttering many inarticulate things, the nerves being stupified in the hinder part of the head, they presently died. Others were not taken in the head but in the lungs: these had an inflammation in their inwards, which created acute pains about the stomach, so that they sent up blood and a loathsome and cadaverous stink from within; their jaws and tongues were dried up with heat, and black and tainted with gore; and whether they drank much, or little, it was all alike: these could take no sleep, but were in continual pain and disquiet. Some had imposthumous ulcers, and black blisters, bigger or lesser on their arms and under their arm-pits; and some in the cheeks, and others in other parts of the body. And in others there arose black nodes, spots, or tokens, over all the body, in some more superficial and visible, in others deeper and obscure: and yet of both sorts all died alike; for some had all these symptoms together, others more or less, but to most even one of all was enough to do the business. Yet those few who recovered were no more touched with the same mischief, but remained secure; for it never took any twice so as to kill. Sundry times there were great imposthumes in the thigh, and in the arms, which being cut sent forth much stinking matter; and so the disease was carried off, flinging forth together therewith all the noxious humours. And yet some, though they had all these symptoms, were beyond all expectation saved. But there was no certain remedy: for what was good for one was to another in the same condition fatal: yet he that cured another got his own death thereby, and this made the greatest havoc, so that houses were emptied of inhabitants, even brute creatures dying with their masters. Yet nothing herein seemed more dismal than the despair to which men were reduced: for when any one perceived himself sick he abandoned all hopes of recovery; and thus they gave themselves over and died presently, adding their defection of mind as an assistance to the disease. Such a kind of malady cannot be expressed; and it was most manifest that it was not any plague natural or common to mankind, but a scourge from heaven: wherefore many also were bettered thereby, not only of those who died, but as many as survived. For then, casting aside all their vices, they applied themselves wholly to the study of virtue, and several gave all they had to the poor. But, when any found themselves affected, there was none so stony or so obdurate but that he repented heartily of his sins, and thereby gave the Divine goodness some occasion of being gracious at his tribunal."

22. The date when the preceding account was written does not distinctly appear, but it is highly probable that it was written in 1346, previous to its author's triumphant entry into Constantinople in the following year. Naples, and Avignon, appear to have suffered in an extreme degree; at the former place 300,000, and according to some 400,000 persons are stated to have perished; and Avignon, which was at that time the seat of the Papal see under Clement VI., was nearly depopulated. Of the members of an English College, then existing in that city, not one escaped, and upwards of 1200 citizens died in one day; and, according to an official report made to Pope Clement, 23,840,000 persons are stated to have died within the pale of the See in one year [1347]. The report significantly

concludes by stating, that "No Physician could tell the cause, or prescribe a cure: *what was saving to one was fatal to another*. No Astrologer could divine how or when it would cease."

23. As might be expected under such a fearful visitation, craft and ignorance propagated every kind of Hyperbole. The following account was disseminated from Florence, in which City 60,000 persons are stated to have fallen victims to its ravages: "It had its origin in Cathay by reason of a certain igneous vapour, or sulphureous fire, horribly breaking forth from the Earth (*or*, as others, descending from Heaven) which utterly consumed and devoured men and beasts, houses, stones and trees, to the very ground itself; and stretched forward, rolling along in smoky globes of horrid stink, and pestilential fire, for more than 200 leagues of the country, or fifteen days' journey together; whereby the air became so infected in those parts that there fell down some millions of young serpents, and other venomous insects; and in other countries, more remote from this fiery eruption, were found infinite quantities of *huge* vermin,* with eight short legs, and tail, all over black, some living and some dead, the latter whereof stank over all the country; and the former were not only most dreadful to behold, but whomsoever any of them chanced but to touch, they became immediately to them as mortal poison." This account is said to have been communicated from Asia to a citizen of Florence.

24. The History of the period is replete with accounts of atmospheric and other Phenomena as well as Hyperbole in what relates to the virulence of the Plague: it is stated that an unusual atmospheric phenomenon hung over Avignon, on the 20th of December, 1348; that in Germany, in the same year, it rained blood, and that "comets, meteors, fiery beams, and other coruscations appeared in the air, with divers mock suns, and the Heavens seeming to burn." In the same year, earthquakes appear to have prevailed at Rome, Naples, and generally over all the south-east part of Europe; violent storms in 1353; and a remarkable eclipse of the moon, from half-past four to half-past six A. M., occurred on the 17th February, 1355. In the following year earthquakes were again general in Germany, Spain, and the south-west of Europe. On the 21st April, 1359, the bishop and priests of Sienna were struck dead in a violent storm, while in the act of performing high mass in the Cathedral; and it is gravely stated that the chalice and cross were struck so deep into the ground that they could never afterwards be found!! In the present day a *crucible* would solve the latter mystery.

25. That the disease was terrific in its ravages, and various in its process and modes of action, there seems no valid reason to doubt; yet some allowance must be made for the exaggeration which terror and consternation, under all circumstances, are so strongly calculated to excite. In some districts the effects of the disease are stated to have been 2 deaths out of every 3 of the Population; in others 4 out of 5; in others 9 out of 10; in some cases, 19 out of 20; and an extensive district of Mesopotamia is stated to have been entirely depopulated, the pestilence having left only a few females who destroyed each other in their frenzy; and in evidence of its various and opposite modes of working, in addition to the lucid description of Cantacuzenus, see section 20. Another account states, that "It took men generally in the head and stomach, appearing first in the groin or under the arm pits, by little knobs or swellings, called kernels, being biles, blains, blisters, pimples, wheals or plague sores, generally attended with pestilential fever, which occasioned spitting and vomiting of blood; at Avignon it is stated to have been attended with bleeding at the nose, mouth, and fundament; that the Rivers ran with blood, and that streams of putrid gore issued from the Graves and Sepulchres of the dead—while in other cases it is stated to have produced pimples, hard and dry, with but little purulent matter, and, in one District, that all living creatures perished, and became as hard as stones.

* These would probably be *locusts*, which in recent times have occasionally emerged from the dense forests of Tartary and parts of Africa, and desolated extensive districts, both East and West. Chensi, a north-west province of China, is frequently subjected to desolation by these animals. The Canary Islands, so recently as 1812, suffered greatly by them, and their destruction of all vegetation was followed by a pestilence:—this species of locust is a *small* insect, but the consternation of the period, 1345—50, would readily magnify it into *huge* vermin.

26. The numbers Reported to have fallen Victims to the disease, in different parts of the World, supposing them to be accurate, or nearly so, would at this distance of time be exceedingly interesting, as serving to show the former importance of places now become comparatively insignificant. In Venice 100,000 persons are stated to have perished; in Lubeck, 90,000; in Paris 50,000; St. Denis, 14,000; in Germany, 1,244,434; in the City of Norwich, between the 1st of January and the 1st of July, 1348, 57,104, or, according to another account, 57,343; in Yarmouth, 7052,—the circumstantiality of the numbers, in the two latter places, increasing their credibility. Respecting this Virulent Distemper, Hume, Guthrie, and one or two other voluminous historians are entirely silent. In a collection of English Histories, published in London in 1706, is the following Account, viz., after speaking of the exultation consequent on the success of the English Army on the field of Cressy, in 1347, and the subsequent surrender of Calais, in 1348, the Historian states, “But before the end of this year England’s mirth was turned into bitter mourning by the invisible Sword of Heaven. A contagious Pestilence which, first beginning in the East and South parts of the World, spread into all parts of Christendom, and raged so violently in England that it is said to have destroyed more than half of its inhabitants, so that the church-yards were not large enough to bury the dead, but they were forced to purchase new ground for that purpose. In London there died, in six months, 57,354* persons, and other Cities and Towns suffered as deeply according to their proportion of Population. This Plague was attended with as mortal a Famine, Murrain of Cattle, and Barrenness of the Ground, caused through the Contagion of the Air, and want of Husbandry.”

27. *Rapin*, Book X., after treating of the Affairs of Cressy and Calais, adverted to in the preceding Section, has the following paragraph:—“During the prosperity enjoyed by the English, it is no wonder that ease and plenty threw them into the excesses that are the usual attendants thereof. All the Historians unanimously affirm that an unbridled debauchery at this time prevailed throughout the kingdom, and the women laying aside their modesty, the great ornament of their sex, seemed to glory in the loss of their virtue. Nothing was more common than to see them riding in troops to the Tournaments, dressed like Cavaliers, with swords by their sides, and mounting their steeds, adorned with rich trappings, without any regard to their honor or reputation. The men’s excesses were no less scandalous. God permitted not these disorders to go long unpunished. A terrible plague, after raging in Asia, and part of Europe, spread itself into France, and from thence into England, where it made such desolation, that one half of the nation was swept away. London especially felt the effects of its fury; it is observed in one year [1348-9] above 50,000 persons were buried in a church-yard belonging to the Cistercians.”†

28. On the 1st. of August, 1348, this seemingly unexampled Calamity commenced its devastation in England, on the Dorsetshire Coast, whence it spread Westward along the Coast of Devonshire, and soon became general over all the Western Counties, and, within six months, over every part of England. It first appeared in London on the 1st of November, after having broke out at Oxford: it appears not to have commenced its ravages in Norwich until after the 1st of January, 1349. At Leicester it appears to have been very fatal; its desolating consequences may in some degree be in-

* This number, it will be seen, corresponds nearly with the number just before stated to have died at Norwich; according to *Rapin*, see Section 27,—above 50,000 persons are stated to have been buried in a churchyard belonging to the Cistercians:—see, however, Section 35.

† Not so. The ground appropriated for the interment of the dead, on this occasion, was a field of 13 acres 1 rood, called *Spittle Croft*, belonging to the Master and Brethren of St. Bartholomew Spittle, from whom it was purchased by Lord Walter Manny, a distinguished Captain and Courtier of his day, by whom, or by whose descendants, it was subsequently conferred on a body of Cistercians. In the present day it forms an extra Parochial District [the CHARTER HOUSE], surrounded by the Parishes of St. Botolph without Aldersgate, St. James and St. John Clerkenwell, and St. Luke. See Nos. 10, 34, 37, 38, page 2. The Charter House Buildings retain all the characteristics of a Monastic and by-gone age; while the ground is surrounded by a high brick wall, forming one of the greatest nuisances of the Metropolis; the more annoying inasmuch as there is no part of the Metropolis which affords a more favorable opportunity for tasteful, or even splendid Architectural Display; none more requiring improvement, nor any where it would be attended with greater advantages,—both as respects reward for individual enterprise, and public utility.

ferred from the diminution which it occasioned in the value or Money price of all commodities. In the *Chronicon Preciosum*, published in 1707, it is stated that in the Pestilence [1348] things were sold almost for nothing. A Horse worth 40s. was sold for 6s. 8d., a Cow for 1s., which in 1344 would have sold for 5s., and so in proportion for all other things; both cattle and sheep, however, appear to have fallen Victims either to the Disease, or to hunger occasioned by want of attention and provision during the Winter; it is mentioned that 5000 Sheep perished in one district. The loss of animals, and the seeming suspension or limitation of Agricultural pursuits, in 1349, after the Pestilence had ceased, which it did before the end of August in that year, occasioned the price of Provisions to rise again to a degree that exposed to the risk of Famine those who had escaped the Pestilence; but, as the people soon recovered their wonted energy, liberal supplies of Corn were obtained from distant parts, whereby confidence and activity soon again became permanently re-established. The Scots, between whom and the English great strife at this period prevailed, attempted to take advantage of the Consternation in which the Pestilence had involved the English, by marching a considerable body of Troops into the North of England, which Troops immediately became infected with the Disease, so that they were soon glad to return, carrying back with them the Pestilence, as the merited reward of their enterprise. In Ireland the Plague appears to have committed great ravages among the English settlers, while it affected the Native Irish but very partially.

29. Although this unexampled Pestilence is stated to have raged in different parts of the World, from 1345 to 1362, its Virulence appears to have considerably abated after 1350, and in England entirely so before the end of August, 1349; and the Mortality in other parts, subsequent to the latter date, was probably occasioned as much, or more, by the privation and destitution of all social comfort, in which such a calamity was calculated to leave large numbers of Survivors, as from any marked or Specific Pestilential Disease. See Column 66 of the first, and 75—81 of the second, Periodical Display of Diseases, for the effects which the Plague of 1665 appears to have left behind it: all those Diseases, as well as those in Columns 16—20, and 28, in the first period, appear to have been consequences of the more virulent effects of the Pestilence which committed such ravages in the Year in question [1665]. One of the worst features to which the Pestilence of 1345—50 gave rise, was the accusation of different Sects and Parties of Poisoning the Waters, and other similar Mal-practices, and assigning to them the cause of the desolation which had prevailed. Both Christians and Jews, in their turn, appear to have been persecuted unto death in great numbers. At Mentz 12,000 Jews are stated to have fallen victims to the fury of an ignorant and brutal populace, under the pretext of their having poisoned the waters of the wells of that city.

30. In Section 63 it is stated that in Florence more than 60,000 persons fell victims to the Pestilence, in 1347. This was the period of Italian glory in literature and art, and in political importance. *Giovanni Villani*, one of the most elegant and faithful of her historians, was one of the Pest's victims. *Giovanni Boccaccio*, however, another of the luminaries of Italian literature, survived to adorn the subsequent pages of her history, and the Pestilence in question appears to have led to the production of the deservedly celebrated Ten Days Tales [*Il Decamerone*], the introduction to which, as versified by an English Translator, is so confirmatory of the consternation of the period that, although in verse, I shall venture to introduce an extract therefrom:—

"This Preface to remembrance calls
A Plague of such forlorn career,
That yet the soundest mind appals,
The dreadful narrative to hear.

* * * * *

Know then, my gentle readers fair,
A Plague broke out in Florence gay,
Which neither age nor sex did spare,
And swept off hundreds every day.

No human skill neglected was
Its dreadful progress to restrain,
But, from an unknown heavenly cause,
All earthly efforts proved in vain.

No language can the misery paint,
No artist's pencil has the power,
For words and colours are too faint
To represent each shocking hour.

Suffice it then that I should say,
 God, doubtless for some dreadful crime,
 One hundred thousand swept away
 In little more than three months' time.

* * * * *

What troops of youths of noble line,
 What groups of virgins full in bloom,
 Here healthful with their parents dine,
 And sup with friends beneath the tomb.

Weary am I of this sad theme,
 No more on wretchedness I'll dwell,
 It now appears a frightful dream
 Work'd up by some damn'd fiend of Hell.

One Sunday evening, as I've heard,
 The virgin's bell began to toll,
 Miraculous, as then appeared
 Within its aisle no living soul.

31. The biographers of Boccaccio, *Filippo, di Matteo Villani*, observe that "Just before Boccaccio wrote, the Plague at Florence had totally changed the manners and customs of the people; only a few of the women had survived this fatal malady, who, having lost their husbands, parents, or friends, gradually grew regardless of those constraints, and customary formalities, which, of course, before influenced their behaviour. For want of female attendants they were obliged often to take men only into their service, and this circumstance greatly contributed to destroy their habits of delicacy, and gave an opening to various freedoms unsuitable to the sex, and frequently productive of very serious consequences. As to the monasteries, it is not surprising that Boccaccio should have made them the scenes of his most libertine stories. The Plague had thrown open their gates. The Monks and Nuns wandered abroad, and, partaking of the common liberties of life, and the levities of the world, forgot the rigour of their institution and the severity of their ecclesiastical character. At the ceasing of the Plague, when the religious were compelled to return to the cloisters, they could not forsake their attachment to those secular indulgencies; they continued to practise the same free course of life, and would not submit to the disagreeable and unsocial injunctions of their respective orders. Contemporary historians give a striking representation of the unbounded debaucheries of the Florentines on this occasion; and ecclesiastical writers mention this period as the grand epoch of the relaxation of monastic discipline."

32. A remarkable circumstance, in relation to the ravages of this eventful period, is the silence of the French and English historians respecting it. In between seventy and eighty printed works, and tracts, under the head *Pestus*, in the library of the British Museum, only one slight reference is made to it, except in a little tract, entitled *Flagellum Dei*, which is hereafter inserted. Mr. Johnes's edition of *Sir John Froissart's Chronicles*, printed at his seat at Hafod in Wales in 1803—10, contains the following chapter.

"This Year of our Lord, 1349, there came from Germany persons who performed public penitences by whipping themselves with scourges having iron hooks, so that their backs and shoulders were torn; they chanted also, in a piteous manner, canticles of the nativity and sufferings of our Saviour, and could not by their rules remain in any town more than one night; they travelled in companies of more or less in number, and thus journeyed through the country, performing their penitence for thirty-three days, being the number of years Jesus Christ remained on earth, and then returned to their own houses. These penitences were thus performed, to intreat the Lord to restrain his anger, and withhold his vengeance; for, at this period, an epidemic malady ravaged the earth, and destroyed a third part of its inhabitants. They were chiefly done in those countries the most afflicted, whither scarcely any could travel; but were not long continued, as the church set itself against them. None of these companies entered France, for the King had strictly forbidden them, by desire of the Pope, who disapproved of such measures, by sound and sensible reasons, but which I shall pass over. All clerks, or persons holding livings, that countenanced them, were excommunicated, and several were forced to go to Rome to purge themselves. About this time, the Jews throughout the World were arrested and burnt, and their fortunes seized by those lords under whose jurisdictions they had lived, except at Avignon, and the territories of the church dependent on the Pope. Each poor Jew, when he was able to hide himself, and arrive in that country, esteemed himself safe. It was prophesied that, for one

hundred years, people were to come with iron scourges, to destroy them; and this would now have been the case, had not these penitents been checked in their mad career, as has been related."

33. *On this chapter Mr. Johnes observes*, "Here endeth the additions. I cannot help supposing there must have been more, for Froissart would certainly have particularly mentioned this sad calamity of the plague, that afflicted all Europe, and he scarcely notices it.

"It began," says Mr. Johnes, "in the spring of the year 1348, and came from Asia. It destroyed in some parts the fourth, in others the third of their population; sometimes it left not the tenth part. It carried off in Paris from 40 to 50,000, and in the little town of St. Denis 1600. There were sometimes, at Paris, 800 Burials in a day; and in the single church-yard of the Charter House, London, were buried 200 daily. It broke every bond of attachment asunder; servants fled from their masters, wives from their husbands, and children from their parents. There were no laws in force: the greatest excesses were committed, and when the contagion was at an end the morals were found corrupted."

Lord Hailes dates its ravages in 1349, and says, "The great Pestilence which had long desolated the Continent reached Scotland. The historians of all countries speak with horror of this pestilence. It took a wider range, and proved more destructive, than any calamity of that nature known in the annals of mankind."

34. *Holinshed, in his Chronicles*, after treating of the Peace between England and France effected by the intervention of Pope Clement VI., which followed the battle of Cressy and the surrender of Calais to the English in 1347—8, has the following passage, *viz.* "But, now that there was a peace thus concluded betwixt the two kings, it seemed to the English people that the sun brake forth after a long cloudie season, by reason both of the great plentie of all things, and remembrance of the late glorious victories; for there were few women that were housekeepers within this land but that they had some furniture of household that had been brought to them out of France as part of the spoile got in Caen, Calis, Carenton, or some other good towne. And, beside household stuffe, the English maides and matrones were bedecked and trimmed up in French women's jewels and apparrell, so that as the French women lamented for the losse of those things, so our women rejoiced of the gaine. In this twenty-second Yeare [Edw. III., 1348] from Midsummer to Christmasse, for the more part it continually rained, so that there was not one day and night drie together, by reason whereof great flouds insued and the ground therewith was sore corrupted, and manie inconveniences insued, as great sicknes, and other, in so much that in the year following, in France, the people died wonderfullie in diverse places. In Italie also, and in manie other countries, as well in the lands of the infidels as in Christendome, this grievous mortalitie reigned to the great destruction of the people. About the end of August, the like death began in diverse places of England, and especially in London, continuing so for the space of twelve months following. And upon that insued great barrennesse, as well of the sea as the land, neither of them yielding such plentie of things as before they had done. Whereupon vittels and corne became scant and hard to come by.

"Anno Reg. 24. About the end of August the Death in London ceased, which had bin so great and vehement within that citie, that over and beside the bodies buried in other accustomed burieing places, which for their infinite number cannot be reduced into account, there were buried that year daillie, from *Candlemasse till Easter*, in the Charterhouse yard of London, more than two hundred dead corpses."

35. Mr. Johnes's Account, in Section 31, of the Number reported to have died in St. Denis, will be seen to differ greatly from the number stated in Section 26: the greater number is, probably, the more correct; for, although Mr. Johnes calls it the little town of St. Denis; when reflecting on its richly endowed abbey of Benedictines, founded in the ninth century, and looking now at its magnificent Cathedral, and remains of other splendid edifices, it is impossible not to suppose but that it must, in past times, have been a place of far greater population and importance than at present; a discrepancy

also appears in regard to the number reported to have died in Norwich, the 57,343 stated in Section 26, to have died in that city, are in the same Section stated by another Historian to have been the number that died in London. Norwich, as well as St. Denis, in the fourteenth century, appears to have been a place of far greater importance than subsequently, and the 57,343 deaths in question, when assigned to Norwich, are more likely to be correct than when assigned to London. The Accounts relating to the extent of the mortality in London, at this period [1348], are so very contradictory as to render a just conclusion on the subject difficult to be arrived at. In addition to the contrariety exhibited in the note to Section 26, page ix., in which *Rapin* states in round numbers that about 50,000 persons were buried in a churchyard belonging to the Cistercians, Mr. Johnes, the Annotator of Sir John Froissart's Chronicles, see Section 33, states that, "in the single church-yard of the Charter House, London, were buried 200 daily;" and *Holinshed*, who was probably Mr. Johnes's authority, states (see Section 34) "that over and beside the bodies buried in other accustomed burying-places which for their infinite number cannot be reduced into account, there were buried that year dailey, from *Candlemasse till Easter*, in the Charter House Yard of London, more than 200 dead corpses." Now, as in no year, would *Candlemasse till Easter* embrace a period of more than 80 days, 200 daily during such [period] gives only a total of 16,000 instead of above 50,000, as stated by *Rapin*. The several accounts, also, all appear at variance with the fact of the case, in regard to the burying ground in question as then belonging to the *Cistercians*, see note to Section 27. Such contradictions are a disgrace to History; and they are pointed out here to afford an opportunity of repeating the hope expressed in Section 2, "that measures will be immediately adopted for obtaining the most accurate Weekly Returns of the Diseases and Mortality of the whole of this, now vast, Metropolis; Mr. RICKMAN, the Assistant Clerk of the House of Commons, whose diligence, taste, and perspicuity of arrangement in all that appertains to the highly important and onerous situation which he fills with so much honor to himself and advantage to the country, in the Introduction to an Abstract of the Population Returns of 1831, states in Section 5, page 11, that "London used always to suffer heavily from the Plague, and in the great Pestilence which, originating in the East, in 1345, reached England in 1348, it seems well established that 100,000 persons died, and were buried in the City."

36. Whatever credit may be due to Mr. Rickman for his general accuracy, and the general soundness of his conclusions and inferences, it will be seen that in this instance he is not borne out by any of the other authorities here introduced, and, in the absence of all satisfactory information in regard to the extent of the Population of London at that time, it seems difficult to draw any thing like a certain conclusion in regard to the extent of the ravages which the Pestilence then occasioned. In addition to the plague of 1348—9, *Holinshed* states that, in Anno Reg. 19. Edw. IV. [1479] "There was great mortality and death by the Pestilence, not onlie in London, but in diverse parts of the realme, which began in the latter end of September, in the year last before passed, and continued all the year till the beginning of November, which was about fourteen months; in the which space died innumerable of people in the said citie and elsewhere." And again, in 14, 15, Hen. VII. 1499; "The next yeare after there was a great Plague whereof men died in many places, verie sore; but specialee, and most of all, in the citie of London, where died in that year thirtie thousand."

37. The Tract adverted to, in Section 32, entitled *Flagellum Dei* [Scourge of God] being a collection of the several Fires, Plagues, Pestilential Diseases, &c., that had happened, in London especially, and other parts of this Kingdom, from the Norman Conquest, relates as follows, viz.

- "20. WM. the CONQ. A great fire from West to East, after which great mortality ensued.
 WM. RUFUS. 600 houses destroyed by a tempest.
 RICHARD I. Malling in Kent destroyed by Fire, followed by Mortality so great that the living hardly sufficed to bury the dead.
 HEN. III. 20,000 people died in London for want of food.

The *Chronicon Preciosum* states that, in 1270, [54 Hen. III.] wheat was so dear that it was sold at £4. 16. 0 the quarter, and sometimes at 16s. the bushel, which makes it at £6. 8. 0., but no cause is assigned for this inordinate price, which may be considered as equal to £40 per quarter, in the present day [1832].

The next great event is the Plague of 1348—9; and thirteen Years after another great mortality is mentioned, of which the nobility suffered greatly.

3. Rich. II. [1379] Mortality so great in the North that the Country became almost desolate.

38. The numbers that died weekly during the two last enumerated periods are exhibited at pages 65—8, from which date the detailed display of the Diseases and Mortality of the Metropolis in the present Work commences; since when numerous treatises, both in France and England, have appeared, endeavouring to show the cause and nature of Pestilential Diseases, and offering innumerable remedies for their prevention and cure; they are, however, all equally deficient in facts, and equally vague and unsatisfactory in their attempts at reasoning—all alike appear to have overlooked the basis upon which all physical investigations should be founded, viz., a simple record of facts—the past and still prevailing aversion to which in physical and social inquiries is a feature of the times as remarkable as it is to be lamented for the consequences which it involves. It is also as much a matter of surprise as of regret that while the mechanical arts, and some of the abstract sciences, have been carried to a degree of perfection which bespeaks an unlimited capability in man, in all that relates to his animal and social economy, as well as agriculture, as far as any chemical, or strictly scientific, or philosophical appliances are concerned, the greatest uncertainty still prevails, and, consequently, they remain exposed to a constant conflict of opinion and conceit. The elementary principles of nature are simple and determinate; men, in common with all other animals, subsist by a reciprocal interchange with the vegetable part of the creation, of the opposite gases which they respectively absorb and exhale: what is food to one is poison to the other, and *vice versa*. The Atmosphere is the common depository for the reception and supply of both; while the well-being of the whole depend, not on the existence of the means of subsistence, *per se*, but simply on their *due proportion* to each other. If, therefore, the Atmosphere abounds in any particular locality with an *undue* preponderance of either hydrogen or oxygen, or venomous animalculæ which the decomposition of vegetable matter engenders, animals and Vegetables must respectively and necessarily alike be subject to derangement.

39. The first duty of man, therefore, obviously is, where circumstances enable him to do it, to weigh and ascertain carefully the state and condition of the atmosphere, and register correctly the effects which it produces under each, and all, of its ever varying degrees of combination, as the best means of forming a basis on which to found all social as well as physical enquiry. The pliable and reasoning faculties of man fit him pre-eminently for such investigations, and renders his indifference to them a culpable sin of omission, and palpable dereliction of duty.

The delight and gratification, also, which a digest of a well arranged registry of the effects simultaneously produced in different localities by atmospheric causes is calculated to afford, and the benefits which it would doubtless offer to man, render the absence of a well organised and all efficient Meteorological Association another of those subjects which are as much a matter of surprise as regret; and it is hoped that the omission being now pointed out it will no longer remain a libel on the discernment and assiduity of Englishmen. The time is favorable for exciting the phlegmatic tendency of their nature; and, as no subject to which the mind of man can be directed is more universal in its character, there is none better calculated to rend asunder the chains which have heretofore bound men to local prejudices, militating as much against their individual advantage as against that of each other.

40. There are no effects without causes. However subtle the cause may have been which occasioned such direful effects as the preceding pages relate, and however inexplicable the nature and effects of some now prevailing diseases may seem, supposing even that the nicest and most diligent attention which can be bestowed on the state and effects of the Atmosphere should not afford all the satisfaction which may be wished or desired, there can be no doubt but that it would develop much in the highest degree interesting and important to man, and certainly contribute more towards developing the cause of all physical diseases than ten thousand times ten thousand speculations, however ingenious the hypothesis and however logically sustained.

41. A high degree of heat as a *disinfecting* power has recently been much expatiated on as a new and important discovery. The hypothesis is reasonable, its importance good for all it is worth, but its originality very questionable. The destruction of the greater part of London by fire, the Year following the great Pestilence in 1665, doubtless did much to prevent a recurrence of so virulent a disease; and it is stated that during the raging of the Plague at Avignon, in 1347, Pope Clement VI. kept up great fires by night as well as by day in every room of his palace, and that the Disease was unknown within its walls. Importance has also been attached to a recent assertion that the Spasmodic Disease which at present occasions so much excitement has diminished where it had hitherto prevailed with the approach of spring and summer heat: it may have been so—and the Disease may probably arise from causes totally different from those which engendered virulent distempers at all former periods, but it is a fact not undeserving of notice that in all the Years of Pestilence in London, from 1593 to 1665, inclusive, the virulence of the Disease uniformly increased with the advance of summer, and decreased only with its departure.—See page 69.

42. On taking a retrospective view of the several accounts heretofore exhibited in evidence of the desolating effects of the Pestilence of 1345—62, no one certain conclusion can be drawn either in respect to its cause, or means of cure; the same uncertainty appears also to have prevailed during the prevalence of Pestilence in England, from 1593 to 1665; in the latter Year it is stated that “the practitioners in physic stood amazed to meet with so many various symptoms, which they found among their patients who were ill of the Plague. One week the general distempers were blotches and boils, the next week as clear skinned as may be, but death spared neither, one week full of spots and tokens, and perhaps the succeeding week none at all.” The remedies proposed at this period were innumerable, and as various as numerous. The Queens, Mary and Elizabeth, and their Majesties, James and Charles, all contributed their nostrums; theirs, as well as many others, were amusing and palatable, but all were eclipsed by the recipe of Lord Bacon, which was, “Take a pint of Malmsay wine burnt, with a spoonful

of bruised grains, i. e. cardamom seeds, of the best treacle a spoonful, and give the patient to drink of it two or three spoonfuls pretty often, with a draught of Malmsey wine after it, and so let him sweat, if it agree with him, and it stay with him, he is out of danger; if he vomit it up repeat it again;" and another, as characteristic of the temper and tone of the period, I hope to be pardoned for inserting.—In 1603 it is stated that "a citizen was *whipped* for venturing to appear at Court from a district in which Pestilence was raging."

42. Milan, in 1575, Marseilles, with its neighbouring cities Aix, Arles, &c., in 1720, and Messina, in 1745, all suffered severely by Pestilence; but the accounts which have been published of the ravages of the Disease at each place are equally inconclusive with all that preceded them in regard to the cause that produced it, and the means of its prevention and cure. In short, down to the present day [March 1, 1832] the only safe conclusion that can be arrived at is, that Nature, in reference to certain maladies, has hitherto, baffled all the efforts of man, to discover their cause. What has happened once may happen again; so that there is as much reprehension due to the indulgence of an over sanguine confidence in the efficacy of medical skill and energy, and eleemosynary aid, in preventing or allaying the threatened prevalence of Spasmodic disease, as there is in implicitly yielding to fearful anticipations of its direful consequences. The Austrian government have published a seemingly circumstantial account of the extent of the ravages of Spasmodic Cholera in 1831, in the metropolitan city of Vienna, and the Austro-Polish province of Galicia. In the former in 18 Weeks 411 Deaths occurred out of 690 cases within the city, and 1547 out of 3000 attacked in the suburbs. In Galicia 77,770 are reported to have died out of 260,944 attacked: but all this, it will be seen, proves nothing useful: numbers are interesting only in reference to relation and proportion—and, for the above information to have been either useful or interesting, the whole population, and the average rate of current mortality of the respective places, should have been given; then it would have shown how far the spasmodic disease in question had been an increase of malady, or how far it had only superseded other diseases. In like manner all the reports that have been published in England in reference to the fatal effects of *Spasm*, are unsatisfactory.

44. A distinguished speculatist has advanced the hypothesis "That, however much medical skill and energy may alter the form and pressure of Disease, Death will have its quota; that the stream of Mortality is uniform, and that the Totality will always prove pretty much the same. The Statistical Display of the Diseases and Mortality of the Metropolis herewith exhibited seems to support this hypothesis; and should it prove true, on a more diligent and minute investigation, the introduction of new forms of Disease will at all times be liable to less fearful apprehensions than under the absence of correct information on the subject. On this ground it has been that I have ventured to submit to legislative, executive, and professional wisdom, and the prevailing acumen and intelligence of the age, the facts and suggestions which the accompanying pages contain, in the hope that whatever imperfections and faults may be detected, I shall escape the charge of presumption, inasmuch as I imposed upon myself the task under the fond expectation that, if I failed in establishing any new principles, the large mass of facts which I proposed to myself to collate, and have now brought into a focus, would suffice to enable future inquirers to arrive at just conclusions, and develope causes which shall lead to the adoption of measures to promote alike the physical, the social, and the moral improvement of my species.

PAGE 19 contains an Account of Money raised on Annuities, granted by the Parish of St. Luke (see No. 38, Page 2, and 91, Page 9). The Statement formed part of a Report on the General State of the Finances of the Parish made to the Parishioners by the Vestry Clerk on the 21st October, 1828, and, in reference to this particular Account, the Report states that it exhibits "an unparalleled Instance of the most abandoned Venality and Jobbing:" in addition to the Injury which the Parishioners appear to have sustained by the transactions which this Account exhibits, other Accounts which accompany it represent Defalcations by Embezzlement and otherways to the Amount of £5,698, during the Period 1810—1826.

PAGE 20 exhibits the Counties of England and Wales arranged in order of their Total Population in 1801, showing the Population, and the Proportion of Males and Females in each County, as returned to Parliament in that Year, and then the Number of Marriages, Baptisms, and Burials, unentered as well as registered, in each County in the 10 Years 1801—1810, distinguishing the Proportion of Males and Females both Baptized and Buried. The opposite Page (21) then shows the Ratio of Marriages in the 10 Years to every 100 of the Total Population in 1801,

and the Ratio of Baptisms and Burials to every Marriage; the Total Increase of Population in each County in the 10 Years 1801—1810; the Excess in each County of the Baptisms over the Burials in the same 10 Years; and the Counties in which the Total Increase in the 10 Years exceeds the Excess of Baptisms over Burials; and, *vice versa*, the Counties in which the Excess of Baptisms over Burials exceeds the Total Increase; or, in other words, the Counties whence Numbers have emigrated, and those into which Numbers have immigrated.

PAGES 22, 23, exhibit the Counties of England and Wales arranged in order of their Total Population in 1811, showing the Population, and the Proportion of Males and Females in each County, in that Year, with the Number of Marriages, Baptisms, and Burials, Ratios of ditto, &c. &c., in the 10 Years 1811—1820, in the same order as in the two preceding Pages from 1801—1810.

* * In the former of these two Periods the Increase of Females exceeds that of the Males, and in the latter Period the converse; this Difference may be accounted for in part from the large Number of Seamen and Soldiers discharged and distributed over every part of the Country between 1811 and 1820; while in the former Period drains on the Male Population were constantly being made. According to the Enumeration Returns in 1801 and 1821, the Total Increase of Population in all England and Wales, in those 20 Years, exceeded by 931,267 the Excess of Baptisms over Burials; from this result, supposing the Enumerations to have been correctly made, one of two things is certain, either that the Immigrations into must have exceeded the Emigrations from England and Wales, or that the Births must have exceeded the Deaths to that extent beyond the Number returned; but the probability is, that the Enumerations have not in any instance in the aggregate been accurate. Amidst such migration and uncertainty, it will be seen how difficult it is, as expressed in Page 12 of Introduction, to arrive at any satisfactory conclusion in regard to the exact Proportion which the Dead bear to the Living.

PAGES 24, 25, exhibit the Counties of England and Wales arranged in order of their Total Population in 1821; the Population of each County, as returned to Parliament at each of the Three Periods 1801, 1811, and 1821; the Total number of Marriages, Baptisms, and Burials, in each of the 10 Years ending with 1790, 1800, 1810, and 1820; the Ratio of Marriages to every 1000 of the Population, and of Baptisms and Burials to every 100 Marriages in each County in each of the Four before-mentioned ten-yearly Periods.

PAGE 26 exhibits the Counties of England and Wales arranged in order of their Total Population in 1821, and the Total Population of each County at each of the Five Periods 1700, 1750, 1801, 1811, and 1821; the Ratio of Increase per Cent. in each County between 1700 and 1821; the Total number of Baptisms and of Burials, and the Excess of Baptisms over Burials in each County in the aggregate of the 40 Years 1781—1820.

PAGE 27 shows the Total Number of Baptisms and Burials in each County of England and Wales in each of the Seven Years 1798—1804.

PAGES 28, 29, exhibit the Counties of England and Wales, again arranged in order of their Total Population in 1821, with the Number of Baptisms and Burials in each County in 14 different Years from 1700 to 1820. The Notes at the head of these and the preceding Page show why the Years therein exhibited were selected for exhibition.

* * * The Counties being arranged in order of their Total Population in 1821 enables the Disproportions of the Baptisms and Burials in the several Counties to be seen with great facility.

PAGES 30, 31, contain an Account of the Amount of Money expended for the Maintenance of the Poor in each County of England and Wales Annually, on an Average of Three Years ending Easter 1750; in the Year ending Easter 1776; Annually on an Average of the Three Years ending Easter 1785; in the Year ending Easter 1803; and in each of 18 Consecutive Years ending Easter, or the 25th March, 1830—the Accounts again arranged in order of their Total Population in 1821, by which Arrangement the Disproportions of Amount expended in the different Counties, and which will be seen to be very considerable, are readily discernible.

* * As the Amounts expended for the Maintenance of the Poor may fairly be supposed in some degree to be influenced by the Price of Subsistence, the Total Amount of the Parochial Assessments, and the Average Price of Wheat in each Year, are also exhibited; while Page 13 will show the Money Amount in each Year converted into Quarters of Wheat: the Average Prices of Wheat in the Two Statements will be seen not to correspond with each other. The Note at the head of Page 31 states the Authority from which that Statement was compiled; but, after my Statement had been printed off, there appeared a corresponding Account laid before Parliament on the 6th of December, 1830 (Paper No. 52 of that Date), differing only in regard to the Average Price of Wheat, which is as given, in the Statement herewith, at Page 13. The discrepancy probably arises from the Average at one Time having been taken from the 1st of January to the 31st of December, and at another Time from the 25th of March in one Year to the 25th of March in the next Year; and then by taking the Average for any one Year ending the 25th of March, say March 1814, and putting it down for the Year 1814; when after the 25th of March the Price might alter materially, either lower or higher, as was the case in that Year; it is sufficient to account for the Discrepancies which the two Accounts more particularly exhibit in regard to that Year; both Accounts will be found to differ from another Statement of Averages exhibited at Page 43, which, being made up uniform from the beginning to the end of each Year, is the most deserving of Notice for general reference.

PAGES 32, 33, show the Number of Committals for Crime in each County of England and Wales, in each of the 25 Years 1805—1829; the Counties again arranged in order of their Total Population in 1821, with the Population of each County in 1801 and 1821, and the Amount expended for the Maintenance of the Poor in 1803 and 1828, for the purpose of showing how considerably the Increase of Crime exceeds the Increase both of Population and Pauperism.

PAGES 34, 35, show the various Offences for which the Numbers in the Two preceding Pages were convicted in each of the 20 Years 1810—1829. Page 35 also shows the Annual Average Number of Capital Convictions and Executions in *London* and *Middlesex* during the 81 Years 1749—1829.

PAGE 36 shows the Total Population of each County of England at each of the Six Periods 1700, 1750, 1801, 1811, 1821, and 1831, with the Ratio of Increase per Cent. in each County, from 1801 to 1811, from 1811 to 1821, and from 1821 to 1831, and from 1700 to 1831—the Counties arranged in order of their greatest Ratio of Increase since 1700.

PAGE 37 shows the Proportion and Parts of Scotland engaged in Manufacturing distinct from the Agricultural and Highland Counties, with the Annual Value of Real Property in each Division.

almost, if not entirely, every subject of interest to the Statesman and general Inquirer, in any way connected with the Extent, Resource, and Condition of Scotland; the Numbers in the Column of Towns and Counties refer to the Number of each respectively in the Topographical Arrangement.—see *announcements* herewith of Works now printing by Mr. Haddon.

PAGE 38 shows the Annual Value of Property assessed to the Property Tax under each of Five several Heads in each County of England and Wales, in the Year ending the 5th of April, 1804, and the Total Nett Proceeds of the Tax in each County, in each of the Years ending the 5th of April 1804, 1800, and 1813—the Counties arranged in the order of their Value of Property in 1802.

PAGE 39 shows the Superficies in Statute Acres deduced from the Trigonometrical Survey of each County of England and Wales; the Rentals of each, according to the Property Tax Returns of 1815; the Average Rate per Acre of the Total Superficies of each County; the Amount of Parochial Assessments for the Year ending the 25th of March, 1829; and the Amount of Contributions to the Land and Assessed Taxes in the Year 1829, in each County—the Counties arranged in order of their Total Superficies, whereby the Rental, Parochial Assessments, and Assessed Taxes, in Proportion to the Superficies, are rendered the more readily discernible.

PAGE 40 shows the Proportion of the Parochial Assessments in each County of England and Wales levied on Land, distinct from the Proportion levied on Houses,—Factories, Mills, &c.,—and Manorial Profits. This Page shows also the Amount expended in each County for County, Church, and Highway Expences, as well as for the Relief of the Poor, &c.

PAGE 41 contains a Summary View of the Population of Great Britain, showing the Proportion thereof dependent on each great Branch of Production and Occupation for Subsistence, as exhibited in detail, in a Topographical and Statistical Display of the Locality, Relation, Numbers, Resources, and Condition, of all the Towns and principal Parishes of England and Wales. The Reference to Pages 8—90, at the head of this Page, refer to the Pages of the Topographical Work just mentioned.—see *announcement* herewith of Works now printing by Mr. Haddon.

PAGE 42 shows the Number of Persons among whom £29,000,000 of Annual Income is divided. This is the Property assessed under Schedule C, as exhibited in Pages 18 and 42. It will be seen, by the Statement at Page 18, that in 1803 more than one-fourth of this Kind of Property was assessed in the Metropolis; and it is probable that an equal or even greater Proportion of the Amount at the present time is directly re-expended therein.

PAGE 43 was originally compiled as an accompaniment to a Proposal for publishing a Digest of all the Accounts and Papers relating to the Commerce and Finances of the Kingdom, presented to Parliament during the last 50 Years.—see *announcements* herewith of Works now printing by Mr. Haddon.

* * This, as well as the 23 preceding Pages, may, on a *prima facie* View of the Matter, be thought more applicable to a Work on the State and Circumstances of the Country generally than to one on the Metropolis exclusively; but when it is considered how singularly involved all the Relations of Great Britain are, and with what extraordinary Facility and Activity the Metropolis maintains Intercourse with every part of the Kingdom, it will be seen how difficult it is to convey an accurate Idea of the relative Results of the Metropolis with other Districts, without exhibiting it in conjunction with the Kingdom at large.

PAGES 44—55 exhibit the Amount of the Parochial Assessments, the Number of Persons under various heads who received Parochial Relief, the Amount expended for such Relief, as well as for all other Local or Parochial Purposes under various Heads, in each of a Series of Years

between 1775 and 1830, in each Parish of the Metropolis within the Bills of Mortality, as well as in every other of the Metropolitan Parishes within the limits of the Metropolitan Police. For the Population of these Parishes at each of the Four ten-yearly Periods 1801, 1811, 1821, and 1831, see Pages 45, 47, and 55; see also Notes at head of Pages 49 and 55.

PAGES 56—60 show the Population, &c., at different Periods, of each Province of Spain, Portugal, Holland, Belgium, Prussia, and Sweden.

* * These Statements all possess great interest; the Note at the head of Page 58, however, shows that while those relating to Holland and Belgium profess to have been arranged with the utmost possible regard to precision, they contain some Discrepancies fatal to their character for accuracy. The conclusion of Page 60 exhibits a Comparative View of the Ratio of the Population of Sweden and England in each of 13 Gradations of Ages, by which it will be seen that from the Age of 20 to 80 the Ratios preponderate greatly in favor of Sweden, while extreme Old Age, as well as Infancy and Youth, preponderate in England.

PAGE 61 shows the Total Number of Marriages, and of Baptisms and Burials, in all England and Wales annually, on an Average of Eight ten-yearly Periods, from 1700 to 1780, and annually in the 40 Years 1781—1820, distinguishing the Periods of unusual Increase or Decrease, and also the Proportion of Males and Females both Baptized and Buried.

PAGE 62 shows the Number of Marriages, Baptisms, and Burials, during the same Periods and Years, as in the preceding Statement, in each of the Five great Divisions of the Metropolis; while the corresponding Page, 63, shows the Total thereof: the Notes at the head of these respective Statements show the authority on which they are founded, and the Note at Page 61, in particular, shows how far they may be confided in for their accuracy.

PAGE 63 further shows, in *juxta position* with the Summary of the Five Divisions of the Metropolis, the Numbers, according to the Annual Bills of Mortality, in each of the 67 Years 1754—1820, with the Price of Bread in each Year.

PAGE 64 shows, for the same Periods and Years as exhibited in the Three preceding Pages, the Number of Marriages, Baptisms, and Burials, in the County of Lancaster, and West Riding of Yorkshire.

* * This Page deserves attention, not only as furnishing the means of Comparison with regard to the Results in the Two Districts, but also in reference to those exhibited in the preceding Pages.

PAGES 65—68 show the Extent of the Mortality of the Metropolis in all the Years of Pestilence between 1592 and 1666. Page 65 shows the Total Number of Burials Weekly in each of 20 Years between those Dates, Page 66 the Proportion reported to have died of the Plague, and Page 67, the Proportion reported to have died of Parish Infection, in each Week during the same 20 Years: Page 67 also exhibits a Summary View of the Total Number of Burials and Christenings in each of the 79 Years 1604—1682, distinguishing the Proportion of Burials in the City within the Walls, and in the City without the Walls, from the Proportion in the Out Parishes, and the Number reported to have died of the Plague in each Year. *The Diminution in the Number of Christenings from 1642 to 1660 deserves attention.* If during that Period there was no unusual Defect in the Returns, the Diminution is remarkable.

PAGE 68 shows the Total Number of Burials, and the Proportion reported to have died of the Plague in each Parish of the Metropolis, in each of the Four great Plague Years 1593, 1625, 1636, and 1665; the Parishes are arranged in order of their incorporation within the Bills of Mortality, with Numbers of Reference to their place in the Topographical Arrangement in Page 2.

PAGE 69 shows the Receipt and Disposal of Pauper Children into, and out of, the several Work-houses of the Metropolis in the Year 1828, with a Comparative View of the Totals in each of the Five Years 1798, 1801, 1810, 1822, and 1829. Column 11 of this Statement purports to show the Proportion of the Children born *Illegitimate*, which, supposing the Number to be accurate, bears a fair Proportion to the Number of Illegitimate Children born in Sweden as exhibited at Page 82; while in the Department of the Seine, in France, with less than 1,000,000 of Inhabitants, the Number of *Naissances naturel*, implying Illegitimate Births, is represented as exceeding 10,000 annually, indicating a great restraint of Sexual Intercourse in the British Metropolis as compared with that of France: but the Returns involve Fallacies both ways; in London all that are not specified as *Illegitimate* are received without Distinction in that respect, and therefore stand as Legitimate; while in France all Children received into the Hospitals are pronounced *naturel*. The reason of this is, that, as there is no Parochial Provision for Destitution, the State supplies the deficiency, and provides for Infancy, Infirmary, and Age, on an adequate and liberal Scale, and the Hospitals and Receptacles for Infancy bear an analogy to the *Foundling* Hospitals of London and Dublin, rather than to a Parish Workhouse; and, from the accredited care bestowed on the Inmates of the French Hospitals, all who are either destitute of natural affection for their offspring, or unable to provide them with sustenance, cause them to be received into the Hospitals; the term *Naissances naturel*, therefore, includes all Children abandoned and exposed, as well as illegitimate.

PAGES 70, 71, show the Number of Deaths within the Bills of Mortality in each of 13 gradations of Ages in each of the 103 Years 1728—1830.

However justifiable the charge of imperfection in the Returns may be, these two Pages bespeak a very marked change in the physical condition of the Metropolitan Population since 1740. The Number that died under 2 Years of Age in the 10 Years 1740—49 was as 34 to 29 in the 10 Years 1820—29; while of those from 2 to 29 the Number that died in the latter 10 Years exceeds the Number in the former by 1 in 17. From 20 to 50, the Numbers in 1740—49 were as 29 to 25 in 1820—29; and, of those 50 Years of Age and upwards, the Number in the 10 Years 1740—49, was as 28 to 22 in the 10 Years 1820—29. For the Proportion which the Total Number Buried bore to the Living at different Periods, &c.,—see Section 12 and 16 of Introduction.

PAGES 72—81 show the Number of Burials in each of the Metropolitan Parishes within the Bills of Mortality in each of the 174 Years 1657—1830: the first Two Pages embrace a Period of 72 Years, from 1657 to 1728, subsequent to which Date the Limits of the Bills of Mortality were considerably extended; from the latter Date also there is exhibited the Annual Average Prices of Wheat in each Year at Oxford and Eton, at each of which Places careful Records of Prices have been kept consequent on part of the College Lands being let at a Corn Rent. The Prices at Oxford were taken from a Work published in 1831, on the Supply, Abrasion, and Consumption of the *precious Metals* by MR. JACOB, the Comptroller of Corn Returns. The Prices for 1800 and 1801 are palpably erroneous: from the mode in which the Returns are exhibited in these Pages, the defaulting Parishes are easily discernible; the most recreant will be seen to be St. Ann, and St. George Westminster. St. Matthew, Bethnal Green, from 1779 to 1787; St. Luke, Middlesex, in 1823, 24; and St. Leonard, Shoreditch, in 1825, 26, bespeak culpability.

PAGE 82 shows the Total Population in each of the 24 Provinces of Sweden in 1820; the Number of Deaths under Six separate Heads, and of Diseases under Twelve Heads, in each Province, distinguishing under each Head the Proportion of Males and Females.

*** The Note at the head of this Page deserves attention.

* * In an Appendix to the enumeration Returns of the Population, presented to Parliament in 1821; Mr. Rickman, to whom the compilation of the Returns was assigned, represents the Population of the CITY of LONDON, within the Walls, in 1700, at 159,500; at 87,000, in 1750; and 78,000, in 1801; but, on seeking for the cause of the great diminution in the 10 Years from 1801 to 1811, it proved that in 1801 the Precinct of White Friars, No. 5; St. Botolph, without Bishopsgate, No. 11; and Trinity, in the Minories, No. 13; containing together 11,741 Inhabitants, (see first Page of the Topographical Position, of the Metropolitan Parishes) were included in the City, within the Walls, and in 1811, and 1821, without the Walls. Although, the City, within the Walls, at the commencement, and middle of the preceding Century, doubtless contained a much greater Number of Inhabitants than at present; it is probably greatly overrated by Mr. Rickman, and indeed his own mode of putting the case, implies a doubt of its accuracy, which the above stated details in regard to 1801, seem to confirm; The Bank of England, and Mansion House; Blackfriars Bridge; and the East India House, and Warehouses, and other Public Buildings, have all, since 1700, occasioned considerable demolition; the two first, in the Parishes Nos. 25 to 27; Blackfriars Bridge, in Nos. 39 and 31; and the East India House, and Warehouses, in No. 79, &c.; the chief cause, however of the diminution, may be assigned to the progressive tendency of inclination, on the part of the Inhabitants of the City, for Country residence, which all, whose means have admitted of it, have availed of; whereby, most of the Houses contiguous to the Exchange, Bank, East India House, and other Public Buildings, are merely used as Counting Houses, or places of Business during the day, without any Family Occupation. Since 1801, the New Post Office has displaced more than 1,000 Inhabitants, in Nos. 5 to 9; The Southwark Bridge, a considerable Number in Nos. 38, 39, and 55; and the New Palace of the Goldsmiths Company, contiguous to the New Post Office, in No. 9, and approaches to the New London Bridge, in Nos. 72, 73, 90, and 91, will cause still further considerable diminutions in 1831; Other Improvements also are contemplated, between St. Stephens Coleman Street, and Allhallows London Wall, Nos. 21, and 22; which when carried into effect, will displace a further very considerable Number of Inhabitants.

STATEMENT shewing the Topographical Position of the 61 Church Benefices, within the limits formerly bounded by the Walls of the City of London, with the rated annual Value of each, &c. &c.

Of 97 Parish Churches within the Walls of the City of London, all except the 16 printed in *Italics*, as well as the Cathedral Church of St. Paul (see No. 2.) were destroyed by the Great Fire in 1666; forty-five printed in Small Capitals, were soon after rebuilt, the first Column of figures shewing the cost at which rebuilt. The Benefices of 50 other Parishes were united with 35 of those, the Churches of which were rebuilt, and the remaining ten Parishes have continued entire. The Statement below shews the whole 97 Parishes as constituted into 61 Benefices subsequent to the great Fire of 1666, with the rated annual Value of each under the Augmentation Act of 44 Geo. III, shewing also in whom the Presentation of each Benefice is vested; with the amount of the Estimates of the Annual Value of the real Property, as assessed to the Property Tax in the Year ending Easter 1815. The Cathedral Church of St. Paul, as well as that of St. Bride, Fleet Street (No. 65) were also entirely destroyed by the Great Fire in 1666; St. Bride's was rebuilt at a cost of £ 11,430, its spire forming one of the distinguishing ornaments of the Metropolis: the rebuilding of St. Paul's, commenced in 1710, and was completed under the entire Architectural superintendence of Sir Christopher Wren in 35 Years, at a cost of £ 747,954, including the Iron Balustrade with which it is surrounded: it is 500 feet from East to West; 250 feet in breadth; and 310 feet to the top of the cross with which its dome is surmounted.

For the object of the arrangement below into five divisions, see Statement of the Population of each of the 97 Parishes. The Church of St. Mary at Hill, No. 59, and St. Mary Woolnoth were greatly damaged by the Fire of 1666; that of St. Dunstan, No. 60, since 1818 was repaired at an expence exceeding £ 25,000.

The Number of Children in the County of Middlesex belonging to those permanently relieved out of Workhouse in 1802—5, was 4,347 under 5 Years of Age; and 6,690 from 5 to 14, and out of the Total Number relieved 8,407 were above 60 Years of Age, or disabled from labor by permanent illness or other infirmity: of the amount expended for maintenance of the Poor in the same Year, £224,948 was the proportion for those maintained in Workhouse, being at the rate of £14 14 10 $\frac{1}{4}$ head.

On referring to the Statement of the Assessment and Expenditure of the several out Parishes of the Metropolis, the rate $\frac{1}{4}$ head for maintenance of the Poor in Workhouse, in the Year ending Easter 1803, will be seen to vary from £6 18 0 in St. John Wapping, to £44 15 9 in St. Mary Islington; this disparity (admitting the accounts to be correct) bespeaks extreme insufficiency on one side, or great profusion on the other; but, the probability is, that the disparity arises more from the want of method and competency in making up the accounts than from any actual difference in the scale or cost of subsistence; items which in one case will be charged under one head, will in another case be charged under other heads, precluding all fair comparison, and thereby shewing the desirableness for some uniform mode of account being adopted and enforced into practice, in all the parishes of the Kingdom.

The feature first deserving of attention in the above Statement, is the large amount expended for the relief of the Poor within the Walls of the City of London; which relatively, very considerably exceeds, the amount expended for the like purpose in any other place in England; the Church, Bye Highway Rates, Law Charges, and other local Rates, also exceed in the like proportion, the similar charges in any other place; it is deserving of attention, how far so many small Parishes, might be formed into five, or fewer Divisions for Parochial purposes; Bristol, Norwich, and other places afford precedents, and reference, for the consideration of adopting such a measure: most of the out Parishes exhibit extraordinary increases since 1776; but, the Population of those Parishes, has, since that date increased in corresponding proportions, whilst the City of London within the Walls, has progressively decreased in Population. (see Note to Statement of the Population of each of the 97 Parishes.) The operative part of the Silk Manufacture, prevails more particularly in the Parish of St. Matthew, Bethnal Green; and Mile End, Old Town; partially in St. Leonard, Shoreditch; and very partially in the Parish of Hackney: Christ Church, Spitalfields, is the original seat of the Manufacture, and in which many of the principal employers still reside, but the Parish being circumscribed, it precludes any extension of Population, within its limits, and occasions the spreading of the operatives over the adjoining Parishes. For 60 Years previous to 1823, the Rate of Wages for Weaving of Silks in this District had been regulated by legislative enactments, and during the whole of that period, the District exhibited, relatively, less poverty and Parochial burthen, than any other Manufacturing District in the Kingdom; in the Session of Parliament 1823 all those enactments were repealed, whereby the employees became more directly subjected to the will of the employers,—see the effect, as exemplified above, in the difference of Parochial Expenditure.

For the Population of each of the out Parishes, see Statement of the Topographical Position thereof.

STATEMENT shewing the Amount of Money expended for the Relief of the Poor, in each of the 14 Parishes and Districts, forming part of the METROPOLIS; and the Total thereof: and also of the amount in the like manner expended for the same purpose, in each of 15 of the principal Cities and Towns in different parts of the Kingdom, in the Year ending Easter 1776; annually, on an average of the three Years ending Easter 1785; in the Year ending Easter 1803; and annually, in each of the 17 Years ending Easter, or the 25th. March 1829: shewing also the Estimated Value of the Real Property according to the Property Tax Returns of 1815; and the Population of each Parish, District, City, and Town, at each of the 3 Periods 1801, 1811, and 1821.

The following features of this account deserve attention, Viz.: 1st. the inconsiderable amount in Liverpool, being only in the proportion of 1 to 6, as compared with the City of London within the Walls; 2nd. the sudden diminution of Amount in the Town of Sheffield since 1821-2; 3rd. the great fluctuations in Nottingham and Leicester, between 1815 and 1823; 4th. the large amount of Birmingham, as compared either with Sheffield or Manchester; 5th. the Panics of 1816 and 1825 are strongly manifested in Manchester.

* * The Total Gross Receipt of the *House Duty* in all *England and Wales*, in the Year ending the 5th. of January 1830, as credited in the Finance Accounts for that Year, was £ 1,241,791; the proportion of the Metropolis as exhibited below, being £ 770,166, exceeds $\frac{1}{2}$ of the whole; it is proper, however, to observe, in regard to this comparison, that the Duty on £ 11,154,109 of Rental, in all *England and Wales*, at the Rates of Duty, as exhibited on the preceding Page amounts to £ 1,327,940; whether the difference of £ 86,149 arises from arrears, awards on appeals, or from some other cause, cannot here be determined; the difference deserves consideration, in forming an estimate of the proportion between the Metropolis, and all *England and Wales*: the Rate of Duty on Windows, varies in a way to preclude the forming an estimate of the proceeds of the Duty from the Statement below, but the fair inference is, that the proportion of Amount which the Window Duty in the Metropolis, bears to the Duty in the whole of *England and Wales*, is about one-third.

The Statement below will be seen to be a continuation of that on the preceding Page, and to contain an exhibition of the progressive change in the procreative and decremental state of the Population of England and Wales, in the Forty Years ending with 1820. The Parish Register Returns up to 1800, were more or less defective, those from the Counties only noted with an * in the first Column of the Ratio of Marriages being considered complete. The Totals for each of the Ten Years ending with 1790, and 1800, contain 162,243 Baptisms, and 113,454 Burials, more than the details, a Summary of additional Returns to that amount being included in the Totals, this defect in the Returns will be seen to affect the fair comparison of the Numbers in the Counties with one another, but not the Ratios, which is the more and most important feature of the account, and one which will be seen to deserve in a very high degree the attention equally of the Statesmen, Physiologists, and Moralists, of all Countries. It has been a generally received opinion that Marshy Countries or districts, are unfavorable to an increase of Population, as well from their tendency to retard or check fecundity, as accelerating Mortality. The Counties of England which wholly or partially come under the denomination of low Countries are Numbers 8, 11, 12, 36, and 41, which Counties will be seen to exhibit the greatest changes both in the increase of Births and decrease of Mortality, but it is a fact worthy of being known to the patriotic and philosophical enquirers of all Countries, that during the period of the important changes which the account below exhibits, the Marshes in the Counties in question have been converted by drainage from dreary and pestilential Wastes, to the most productive tracts in Europe.

* These Statements it must be admitted, exhibit a very unfavorable picture of British Society, more especially so when it is considered, that they exhibit only those Criminals who have been committed for Trial at the Assizes; the Numbers Committed under Summary Process, exceeding those Committed for Trial at the Assizes, by several thousands annually; nor does the subject appear more favorable when viewed in comparison with the extent of Crime in other Countries, as will be seen by the Statement of following Pages; and when viewed in comparison with the extent of Crime in England from the middle of the last Century as far as the account of the Number of Convictions in London and Middlesex serves for a comparison, the result is fearfully unfavorable; it is somewhat consolatory however to see, that the more atrocious offences against the Person, have not materially increased.

A Return of the No. of Persons convicted of Forgery, or passing of Forged Notes of the Bank of England, in each of the 33 Years 1797-1829, represents 1138 Persons to have been convicted in the 6 Years 1816-1821.—Vide Par. Paper No. 442, Session 1830: whilst the Statement below represents only 767 to have been convicted in those 6 Years in all England and Wales!!!

The annexed STATEMENT exhibits the annual aver. No. of Capital Convictions & Executions, in LONDON and MIDDLESEX, during the 81 Years 1749-1829. The account for the Years 1749-1817, was presented to Parliament in the Session of 1818, Vide Vol. XVI., of Papers of that Session;—it was at first considered that the Convictions applied to all who were not either acquitted or against whom no Bill was found, but on perceiving the vast disparity between the Total Number of Convictions since 1817, when compared with those of previous Years, it led to a further investigation of the accounts, when it proved, that the Number Convicted comprised those only who were *Sentenced to Death*, termed *Capital Convictions*; and hence, it will be perceived that the annexed account affords no just criterion of the relative extent of *CRIME*, at the different periods in the aggregate; inasmuch as the spirit and temper of the Courts and the Times may have tended considerably to influence the nature of the Sentences; the Number of Executions when relatively considered will be seen to have greatly diminished, but whether as a cause of less atrocity of *CRIME*, or a less sanguinary infliction of Punishment does not appear. For the Years 1811-21, of the account below, see Folio 282, Appendix to Report on the Police of the Metropolis, Session 1828; and for the Years 1823-9, Folio 7, Part, Pa. No. 197, Session 1830; of the Number Committed for all other Offences in 1842, (line 35) 71 were for taking and administering unlawful oaths; 21 for Frame breaking and destroying of Machinery; and 13 for *High Treason*; the Numbers in the same line, in the Years 1828-9, arise from a modification of the Law relating to *Burglary*, the Numbers Committed for Burglary, (line 4) shewing a corresponding diminution.

The above Statement shews the change that has taken place in the relative importance of the English Counties since 1700, in a more perspicuous point of view, than any in which it has heretofore been exhibited; the increase is seen to preponderate greatly in the Manufacturing and Mining Districts, while the Statement of the Population of the Principal Towns of England and Wales, shews that the increase of the Agricultural Counties is principally in the Towns; so, that the Rural Population of England, as, in the Agricultural Counties of Scotland, appears not materially, if at all, to have increased since 1700. The ratio of increase in the aggregate of the Kingdom in the 10 Years ending with Easter 1831, is less than in the preceding 10 Years, which may be accounted for by the large Number of Soldiers and Seamen, dispersed over the Country between 1815 and 1821, making due allowance for that extraneous excess, during that period, the ratio of increase from 1821 to 1831 is remarkable for its uniformity.

STATEMENT shewing the proportion and parts of SCOTLAND, engaged in *Manufacturing*, distinct from the *Agricultural* and *Highland Counties*, with the annual Value of Real Property in each Division; by this Analysis, it is seen, that the increase of Population since 1755, has been wholly concentrated in the Towns and Manufacturing Districts, and that while in the 75 Years, the Total Number has doubled, the *Agricultural Population* has remained stationary. The gregarious tendency, and preponderance of Town Population, which this Statement shews to have prevailed in Scotland, whether considered as a question of general Policy, or of individual advantage, merits the serious regard of a Wise and Paternal Government; the suggestions which the preponderance excite, are too numerous and important to be entered upon here, they will be found adverted to, in the introductory Pages.

There are two disparities, noted with an * which require explanation; the Number of Families in *Dunfermline Burgh* in 1811, are stated at 5,601, the 5 should doubtless have been 2, it of course alters the Totals and proportions of the Columns to which it applies; The Parish of *Govan* in the under Ward of *Lanark* in 1811, included a part of the *Gorbals* of *Glasgow*, which in 1821, was returned under that head, take the 2 lines of Under Ward and *Glasgow* together, and the disparity is reconciled.

SUMMARY of the 82 Pages 8—90 shewing the proportion of the POPULATION of GREAT BRITAIN; engaged in, and dependant on each great branch of Production and Occupation.

The first Lord Ellenborough in his place in Parliament once stated that there were upwards of 3,000,000 Persons in Great Britain, engaged in, and dependant on the Woolen Manufacture; the Edinburgh Review more recently asserted, that upwards of 1,000,000 Persons were so occupied and dependant: from the Statement below, it will be seen to be doubtful, whether in all its varied operations, more than 250,000 (certainly not 300,000) Persons, are engaged in, or dependant on that branch of Industry: similarly mistaken notions almost universally prevail, in regard to the greater or lesser extent and importance, of each great branch of Production, and Occupation; one important conclusion deducible from the following analysis, is, (comparatively speaking,) the limited proportion of the Population engaged in Manufacturing, that is in the prevailing acceptance of the term Manufacturing. The middle Column of occupations, it is important to understand, includes all Artificers, such as Masons, Carpenters, Smiths, Wheelwrights, &c. &c.; as well as Millsters, Millers, Bakers, and Butchers; and Handicraftsmen such as Tailors, Shoemakers, &c., and all Interchangers or Shopkeepers, and Carriers, so that it is questionable, whether out of a Population exceeding 14,000,000 more than 600,000 Persons are actually engaged in, and 1,000,000 wholly dependant on Manufacturing employment for subsistence.

STATEMENT of the *Geographical Position*, of each of the 40 *Kingdoms, Provinces, Principalities, &c., &c.*, of the Peninsula of *SPAIN and PORTUGAL*; shewing the *SUPERFICIES and POPULATION* of each; increase $\frac{1}{2}$ Cent. of Population since the close of the last Century; and Ratio of Population $\frac{1}{2}$ Square Mile, in 1825. * * The Population of the Peninsula at the close of the last Century as exhibited below, has been taken from a work published in Paris during the occupation of Spain by the French in 1810; and the Numbers in 1825, have been taken from another Work recently Published in that City; other authorities represent the Population of Spain at the commencement of the last Century, at about 7,000,000: the increase since 1799, supposing the Numbers as stated below to be accurate, is remarkable; more particularly so, under the circumstances in which the Country during that period has been involved. The extreme Latitudes of the *Peninsula* are, from Cape Ortegal in Galicia, in 43. 47 North, to *Gibraltar* in Andalusia in 36. 7 North: being a mean distance between those two Points of 533 English Statute Miles; but, as the South parts of Andalusia and Granada form a Promontory the average extent of the Peninsula from North to South will not exceed more than about 475 miles: the extremes of Longitude are, from the Rock, in 9. 35 West, 25 miles West of Lisbon; to Cape Rosas in Catalonia, in 3. 5 East, being a Total of 12 Degrees, 40 of Longitude, or 665 English Statute Miles; (the degree of Longitude between 37 and 43 of Latitude being $45\frac{1}{2}$ Geographical, or $52\frac{1}{2}$ English Statute Miles) but the average extent of Longitude will not exceed 10 Degrees, or about 525 English Statute Miles; these averages give a Total Superficies of 249,375 English Statute Miles, which corresponds, or nearly so, with the detailed Superficies below, supposing them intended as Geographical Miles.

*. These Statements relating to the Population of the *NETHERLANDS*, have been compiled from an Official Work of 31 Sheets, printed at the Hague in 1837, in pursuance of an order of His Majesty's the King of the Netherlands, bearing date the 3rd. of July of the preceding Year; the first 10 Sheets purport to shew all the changes in the Numbers of the Population in each Province of the Kingdom, in each of the 10 Years 1815-24; the 11th. Sheet is a Summary of the 10 preceding Sheets; the 19 following Sheets purport to shew the change in each of the 19 Provinces separately, in each of the aforesaid 10 Years 1815-24; and the 31st. and last Sheet is a Summary of the 19 preceding ones; in this Work the proportion of the Births and Deaths to the Total Population distinguishing the Number in Towns, from the Number in the Villages, (*communes rurales*) is worked out to 2 places of Decimals, and the proportion in the Births and Deaths which the Males bore to the Females is worked out to 4 places of Decimals with various other minutiae of detail; with such a display of circumstantiality it was deemed fair to suppose that some additional light on the subject of the causes which influence the changes and progress of Population might have been derived; but on investigation it proved, that the 31 Tables contained a greater display of calculation and detail, than Philosophy; for, it will be seen that whilst in *Liege* (see No. 17, in the Order of Geographical Position) the Births in the 10 Years 1815-24, exceeded the Deaths by 30,925, and only 986 in the 10 Years represented to have emigrated out of the province, the Population in 1825, is stated to be 27,084, less than in 1815; on the other hand, the increase represented to have taken place in *Luxembourg* is as irreconcilable, as is the decrease in *Liege*; and although the results of the other Provinces indicate a probable approximation to accuracy; they contain several trifling errors, the less excusable on account of the display of minutiae of calculation, whilst a suspicion is thrown over the whole by the results of the two Provinces here specifically adverted to.

The diminution of Births, and great increase of Mortality in 1817, deserve notice; the result was probably occasioned by the extreme uncongeniality of the Season of 1816. In *England and Wales* in 1817, there was a diminution of Births, without any diminution of Births; a great increase of Mortality however ensued: in 1818-19 the Number of Divorces, in North and South Holland, bespeaks peculiarities in the domestic habits of the People of those Provinces.

(Vide Folio 449, of the Abstract printed in 1801.) and those on enquiry proved to be principally Chapelries, whose accounts were probably included in the Returns made from the Registers of their respective Parent Churches, and the Totals of the 20 Years 1801–20, include the unentered Marriages, Baptisms, and Burials, as well as the Registered, so that the account below may be considered as exhibiting a tolerably near approximation to a correct view of the progressive increase of Numbers since 1740. The Years most remarkable for change are noted with + plus, or – minus. The period 1710–40, (comprising the 27 Years of Peace which followed the War in the Reign of Anne) seems to have been a period of depopulation. The decrement however appears not to have been general over the whole Country; in Yorkshire and the Four Northern Counties, as well as in the Counties of Derby, Stafford, Gloucester, Hants, and Sussex, the Baptisms exceeded the Burials; the parts of the Country in which the Burials more particularly exceeded the Baptisms, were the Metropolis, Wales, and the Counties of Lancaster, Lincoln, Chester, Bedford, Berks, and Somerset.

* * * The Topographical exhibition of the Parishes which compose the British Metropolis, will shew the extent of its Population at different Periods, and the direction in which it more particularly inclines to extend, the Numbers in the CITY OF LONDON within the Walls, appear to have sensibly diminished, to which diminution, various causes have contributed. The Site of the New Post Office completed in 1820, occupied a space which in 1801, contained more than 1,000 Inhabitants. The Bank of England, and other Public Buildings, at earlier Periods displaced proportionate Numbers, but the main cause of the seeming diminution of Numbers in this division of the Metropolis arises, from the tendency which has prevailed for many Years past, to desert it as a permanent residence, by which most of the Largest Houses are now used only as Offices for Business during the day. It will be noticed that from 1801, there appears a sudden diminution in the City of London without the Walls. This arises from the Parishes of St. John Horsley Down, and of St. George, St. Olave, St. Saviour, and St. Thomas, in the Borough of Southwark, up to 1800 inclusive, having been included in that division; but subsequent to 1800, in the division of Out Parishes, within the Bills of Mortality, which reconciles at the same time the otherways seeming disproportionate increase subsequent to 1800, in that division. The relative difference between the Baptisms and Burials in each of these divisions is a feature that deserves attention.

•• The Statement below shews the aggregate result of the Parish Registers of the METROPOLIS, composed of the five Divisions, as exhibited on the preceding page, and distinguishes the proportion of Males and Females, both Baptised and Buried, and the excess in each Year of Burials over Baptisms, and the converse. Although in the aggregate of all England and Wales, the Baptisms have considerably exceeded the Burials in each Year since 1740, the excess of Burials over Baptisms in the Metropolis, will be seen to have continued down to 1801, since which Year a striking change has taken place in the relative increase of Baptisms, and decrease of Burials in every part of the Country; it deserves attention that whilst in Lancashire, the West Riding of Yorkshire, and some other parts of the Country, the Burials in 1801, very considerably increased, there was in the Metropolis contrary to what might have been expected a very considerable diminution.

The Statement of the Total Number of Baptisms and Burials, in all England and Wales, in each of the Seven Years 1798-1804, will shew more clearly the Counties and the Years in which they were affected by the high price of Subsistence in 1800-1, in some it seems to have produced its effect in 1800; in others, in 1801; and in others, not till 1802-3; and in Norfolk, and one or two other Counties, but little or no effect appears to have been produced.

STATEMENT shewing the Number of *Marriages, Baptisms, and Burials*, in the Counties of *LANCASTER*, and in the *West Riding of YORKSHIRE*, at Periods of 10 Years from 1700 to 1780, and in each of the 40 Years 1781–1820; distinguishing in the Baptisms and Burials the proportion of Males and Females, and the excess of Baptisms over Burials. * * The Population of these 2 Districts in 1820, was as 10½ in *Lancashire* to 8 in the *West Riding*, whilst the Deaths as indicated by the Burials in the 10 Years 1811–20, will be seen to have been in the proportion of 18 in *Lancashire* to little more than 12 in the *West Riding*. This is an additional confirmation to the numerous others shewn in various parts of this Work, of the deleterious effects upon Human life of the Manufacturing operations of *Lancashire*, notwithstanding which, numbers seem to press towards the vortex with accelerating force; and the difference of the Mortality of these 2 Districts from the similarity of their pursuits is remarkable and merits investigation. The results exhibited of the Baptisms and Burials of *Lancashire* prior to 1780, imply its being naturally favorable to health and longevity. The effects of the high Money price of Subsistence in 1800–1, appear to have effected *Lancashire* in a far greater degree than any other part of the Kingdom, the result together with the great reaction in the 3 following Years deserves attention.—see *Notes to the other Statements relating to this same subject*.

The details exhibited on this and the preceding page for the Year 1593, were published separately at that time. On the Plague appearing in 1665, there was further published an account of the four great Plagues, viz.; 1593, 1603, 1625, and 1636; and in the following Year, Mr. Bell, the then Clerk of the Company of Parish Clerks, published under the Title of "London's Remembrancer;" a true account of every particular Week's Christenings and Mortality, in all the Years of Pestilence, within the cognizance of the Bills of Mortality, being XVIII Years from 1606 to 1665. These were all collated in 1759 by an anonymous Compiler, under the signature of J. P. Esq., F. R. S. and printed in that Year in a confused and inconvenient form, being diffused over more than 30 pages of Quarto. The annexed Statement shews the extent of the Plague in different parts of the World, during the period 1603-1665. —For some particulars relating to still greater virulence of Disease and Mortality in England, between 1345-9, and in different parts of the World from 1545-62,—see following page.

* On comparing this Statement with the London Bills of Mortality, one feature which it presents unfavorable to Sweden, is the Number of Females reported to have died in Child-bed, which are as 3 in Sweden, to 2 within the London Bills of Mortality; The Number (1833) of Illegitimate Children dying under a Year Old in Sweden, is considerable, but there is no corresponding data in England, on which to form a comparison; An Account of the Children annually received into all the London Workhouses makes the Number about 12,000, of whom, about 900 are reported as Illegitimate, and 200 Foundlings; The Numbers reported Drowned, and to have died of Drunkenness, as well, as the Murders, Suicides, and Executions, specified above, are all indications unfavorable to the moral Character of Sweden: The legitimate object, and end of STATISTICS, is, to enable the relations and conditions of Society to be correctly understood, whereby its social and moral improvement may be progressively advanced. Unfortunately the object and end of STATISTICS, as yet, do not appear to be understood in Sweden, notwithstanding their long continued popularity.
