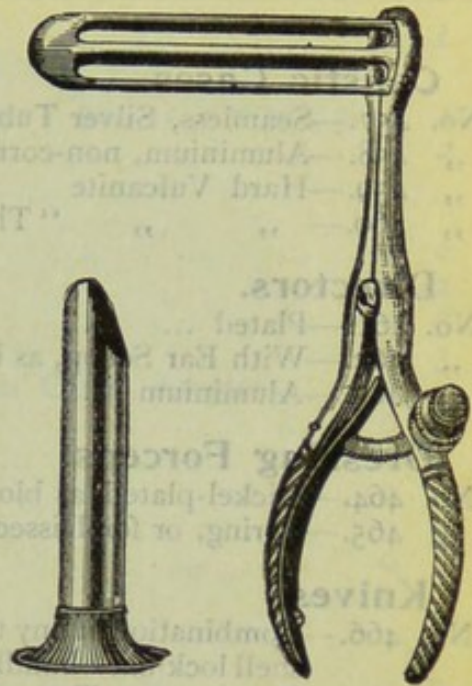
The ordinary caustic holder for the pocket-case has many drawbacks. Those made of beaten silver are expensive, and those of other materials are not durable; while in all the point is hidden, and when wanted is often found to have become corroded, and therefore inefficient. On these grounds I have asked Messrs. HOCKIN, WILSON & Co. to construct one which I venture to think, is without these disadvantages, and shows distinct improvements on the older forms. The case itself is made of hardened glass tubing, divided in the centre into two compartments. Into each is fitted an ordinary silver gilt quill, with a reversible vulcanite mount, rendered easily fixable and air-tight by a rubber collar. Different points may be kept in the different compartments—*e.g.*, nitrate of silver and sulphate of copper. The materials of which it is made are indestructible by the caustics, and inexpensive. Being made of glass, the condition of the points can always be seen at a glance, and the size is such that it exactly fits the ordinary pocket case. I have had one in use for some months now, and have found it satisfactory in all respects.

The danger arising from using an instrument liable to crack or break at any time is very serious, but with the Belfast Linen Instruments this cause of danger is quite removed; the flexibility of the material is so marked that but little difficulty is ever experienced in use, and, as they are made with cylindrical, olive, or mercier points, their adaptability to all cases is, of course, considerably enhanced. These Catheters will withstand the action of a solution of Hydrarg Bichlor of the strength generally used for antiseptic purposes.

Antiseptic. Flexible. Non-Breakable.

Heretofore in all Flexible Catheters, whether with woven or cut eyes, at least one quarter of the body of the tube is displaced where the eye occurs, and the Catheter is consequently made weakest at the very part where the most strength is required. This general defect has been overcome in the Metal Eye Belfast Linen Catheters, by attaching a properly constructed German Silver Eye Piece, which is firmly woven inside the tip of the Catheter, so that it not only thoroughly protects the weak part about the eye, but makes the head of the Catheter perfectly solid and aseptic.

Prostatic Catheters.

FOR SELF-USE. WITH RIGID PORTION AT OUTLET END.

These Catheters have been made at the suggestion of a well-known Hospital Surgeon in London, who has furnished us with the following descriptive memorandum with regard to them.

"It is a matter of common knowledge among all persons who, like myself, require the habitual use of an elastic Catheter by reason of prostatic enlargement, that much difficulty is sometimes experienced in introducing the instrument, on account of the flexibility of its anterior portion. Especially in warm weather, when the gum elastic is very soft, it frequently happens that the tip of the Catheter encounters an obstruction, over which it ought to ride, or through which it ought to pass, but that, instead of its doing so, the stem of the instrument bends and becomes contorted within the urethra, so that it may be introduced quite up to the meatus, while the tip nevertheless refuses to enter the bladder.

"Such a difficulty is very liable to arise when the bladder is full, and when there is a desire to empty it hastily, as during the stoppage of a railway train. I have met with several contrivances intended to render the external portion of the Catheter more rigid, but have found none of them effectual until I requested Messrs. HOCKIN, WILSON & Co. to extend the principle of their metallic eyes, and to construct a Catheter containing about 6 inches of thin metallic tube in its external portion. I have now had such Catheters in constant use for many months, and have never experienced any difficulty in introducing them, as the rigidity of the external portion, conferred by the metallic tube, at once enables the point to ride over any obstacle which it may encounter. It is obvious that these Catheters cannot be coiled into a pocket case, and my own practice is to carry one of them in a walking stick specially made for the purpose, after a plan once suggested by Mr. BUCKSTONE BROWNE. My walking stick is furnished with a loop immediately below its screw top, and by this loop I can suspend it from one of the buttons of my coat, in the event of requiring the Catheter in some place, such as a railway or other public urinal, where the stick could not be put down with safety. I have made many attempts to carry also an oil-bottle in the stick, but have not succeeded in devising any convenient method of doing so; and find it the best plan to have the oil-bottle carefully fitted into a small case for the pocket."

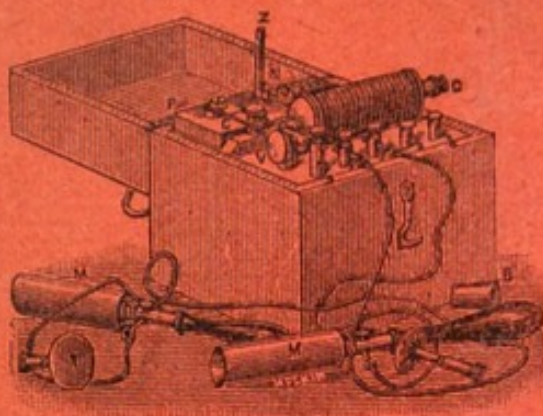

We believe these Catheters will fill a want, and especially the Olive and Conical, as the flexible part beyond the eye, made as in the ordinary Metal Eye, will, we believe, insinuate itself through most structures when backed up by the spiral spring, which prevents all fear of the Catheter doubling, and without the fear of making a false passage.

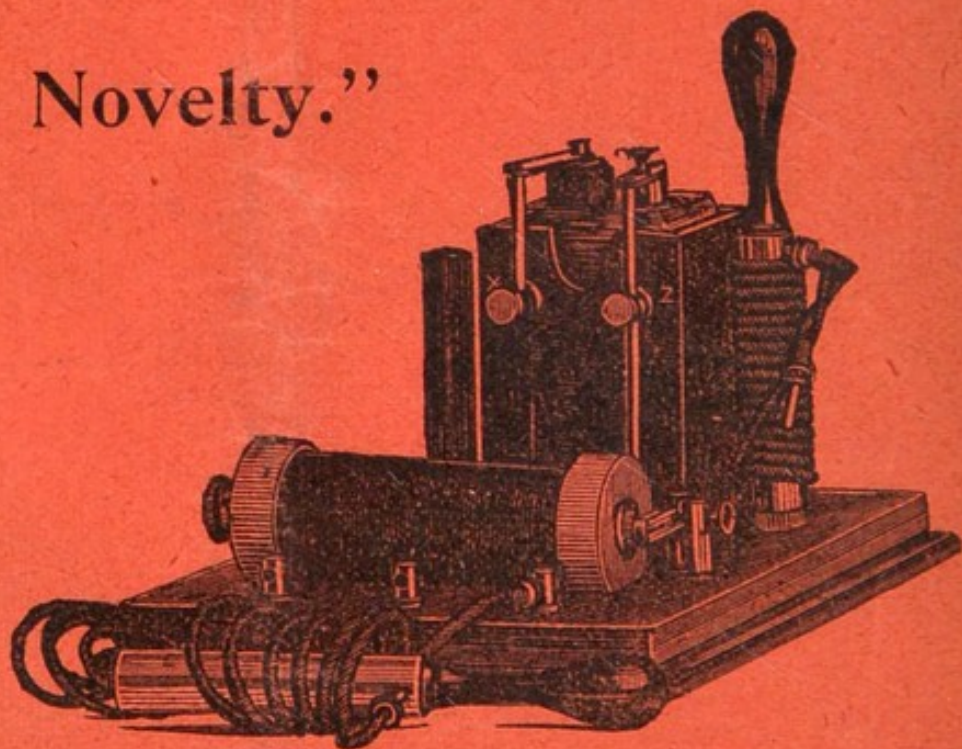
