TWENTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
BOARD OF MANAGERS
PRESENTED TO THE CONTRIBUTORS,

JANUARY 1st, 1878.

The Managers of the Hospital, in presenting this their Twenty-Sixth Annual Report, desire to express their profound gratitude to Almighty God for the many and signal tokens of His favor, not only during the year that has just closed, but also throughout the quarter of a century that has elapsed since the Hospital was founded. They feel admonished by the many changes which during that period have taken place within their own body, of the duty of increased faithfulness in the discharge of their trust. The wise and great Bishop, under whom the work was projected, has gone to his reward, but he was permitted, before his departure, to see it placed upon a firm and, as we humbly trust, upon a lasting foundation. Of the

Board of Managers as originally constituted there now remain connected with it but three of the clerical members, including the present Bishop of the Diocese, and one of the lay; and it seems fitting to mention that to this layman* belongs the honor, when Bishop Potter was hesitating which of several charities should be first proposed to the Churchmen of Philadelphia, of having made to the Bishop such representations as induced him to select the Hospital.

Twenty-five years ago the work of the Hospital was begun in a private dwelling-house which had been generously given for the purpose. It now possesses, free from all incumbrance, a spacious and noble building that will compare well with any similar structure in this country.

During the first year, 180 patients were treated in the Hospital. For nine years past there has been a yearly average of more than 1000. The first year's expenses were \$3000. For five years past they have averaged more than \$45,000. The subscriptions and pledges for the endowment of the Hospital in December, 1852, amounted to \$40,000. The invested fund is now \$350,000.

A tabular statement, carefully prepared by Dr. Knight, the Superintendent, is herewith submitted, which exhibits the work of the Hospital and the annual expenses during its first quarter of a century:

The number of cases treated in the Dispensary during the same period were 141,110.

Since the first day of January, 1877, the resources of the Hospital have been taxed to the utmost to meet the demands for the admission of patients.

During the year, 1282 patients have been received as new cases: 706 medical and 576 surgical. The whole number under treatment has been 1387: 1001 men and 386 women. Of these 800 have been discharged cured; 389 improved; 19 with no improvement; 72 died, and 108 remaining.

The average daily number has been 119, at a daily cost of 94 cents per day.

The average duration of treatment has been 33 days, and the mortality for the Medical and Surgical Wards together has been a fraction over 5 per cent.

The number of Dispensary cases during the year has been 12,229: of whom 4011 were surgical and 8218 were medical.

The managers regret to say that they have not yet been enabled to proceed to the furnishing of the new wing. It is greatly to be desired that this should be done at the earliest possible day, and first for the sake of those who are now under treatment. The older portions of the building, after more than fifteen years of continuous occupation, should be thoroughly freshened and cleansed, as they cannot be, until the patients are removed. It is greatly to be desired, moreover, in order that the beneficent work of the Hospital may be extended to a larger number of patients than at present. If these shall continue to be in the future, as they are now and have been in the past, almost entirely gratuitous cases, the necessity is evident of large additions to the Endowment Fund and of increased annual contributions. The present income of the Hospital barely suffices to meet its necessary annual expenses, and it is earnestly hoped that those to whom God has given the power, will also be endued with the disposition to give liberally of their substance for the extension of a work which must commend itself to every Christian heart; a work conceived in the spirit of His religion whose love embraced mankind, and

which, in its benevolent operations, knows no distinction of race or creed.

The managers have learned with pleasure that the Sunday Schools of several of our leading Parishes have already undertaken the work of providing beds for the children's ward in the new wing. This can be done at a cost of \$50 each, and they beg most earnestly and respectfully to suggest to the Rectors of the various Churches of the Diocese that they bring the claims of this work before their Sunday Schools, as well as that of providing an Endowment Fund for the support of the occupants of such beds.

CONTRIBUTIONS.—It is an occasion of regret, though not of surprise, that owing to financial depression the Thanksgiving collections in our Parishes have fallen short of the amount of the preceding year. They have amounted for 1877 to \$12,036.69.

Their thanks are also due to the North Pennsylvania and the Lehigh Valley Railroad Companies for

rebate of freight of coal, and to congregations and individuals for delicacies sent to the patients, and garments and other necessaries; acknowledgments of which will be found in the Superintendent's list.

LEGACIES.—In the month of January, a ground rent payable in gold, of the yearly value of \$174, was received from the estate of the late Charles Peneveyre, Esq.

Legacies have also been received from the estate of the late Mr. J. S. Lybrand, of \$100, and from that of the late Capt. William H. Hart, of \$1000.

In October last, the executors of the late Mr. W. J. L. Kiderlen placed in the hands of the Treasurer, one hundred and twenty-two bonds of the Williamsport and Elmira Railroad Company, of \$500 each, par value, in all amounting to \$61,000, "to secure perpetually twelve beds and the necessary support to sick and destitute natives of the kingdom of Wurtemberg, or natives of Germany." The time for handing over this property was anticipated at the request of Mrs. Kiderlen, the widow of the deceased, who heartily sympathized in the benevolent purpose of her late husband.

REPAIRS.—During the year the wooden floors of the Laundry, the Mortuary Room, and those adjoining, have been replaced by stone and tiles. Soapstone tubs have also been introduced into the Laundry, thus lessening the danger of the absorption of deleterious matter. The roof of the boiler house has also been renewed. The street to the east of the Hospital has

been curbed, and that on the west both curbed and paved. These improvements have been paid for, but further outlays will be required in the coming year for sidewalks and the introduction of water pipes.

OFFICERS.—At the annual election held in January, all officers whose terms expired at that time were re-elected, and two vacancies existing in the Dispensary staff were filled by the appointments of Drs. William H. Hawkes and Charles Shaffner. At the election of House Residents in the Spring, Drs. Fairfax Irwin and J. Edgar Dean were chosen in place of those whose terms expired, respectively in May and August. Dr. Samuel Ashhurst having resigned his post as an attending surgeon, the thanks of the Board were tendered to him for his long and faithful services. Dr. Charles B. Nancrede was chosen to fill the vacancy. Dr. Russell H. Johnson was elected a member of the Dispensary Staff, *vice* Dr. Nancrede, resigned. At the election of Resident, in November, Dr. J. M. Anders was chosen.

The religious services of the year have been conducted by the Chaplain, the Rev. David H. Lovejoy, whose record shows an amount of duty exceedingly large, both among the patients privately, in the wards and in the Chapel.

To the members of the Medical Board and of the Dispensary Staff, to Dr. Knight, who has now completed his nineteenth year of faithful and judicious service as Superintendent, to the Resident Officers of the

Hospital, and to the Matron, Miss Lehman, the Managers take great pleasure in here testifying their high appreciation of the way in which they have discharged their respective duties.

In the month of March, 1858, Mr. John Welsh was elected a member of the Board of Managers in place of the Hon. Joseph R. Ingersoll, resigned; and in November of the same year was appointed Chairman of the Building Committee. From that time Mr. Welsh has devoted, in the most ungrudging way, his time, his great abilities and his ample means to the work of the Hospital, and to him more than to any one else is due the completion of the Hospital building in accordance with the original designs. In November last he was appointed by the President of the United States, to the universal satisfaction of his fellow-citizens, as Minister to England, the position formerly filled by Mr. Ingersoll, his predecessor in the Board of Managers.

At the meeting of the Board in November, the following minute from the pen of the Bishop of the Diocese was unanimously adopted:

“ Meeting as we do this day without the presence of our fellow manager, John Welsh, who leaves his native city to-morrow to enter upon his duties as envoy extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary from the United States to the Court of St. James, it seems most appropriate that the Board should place upon the minutes of this day’s meeting a brief record of its appreciation of his invaluable services to this institution. From the first meeting called to organize the Hospital, in 1851, of which meeting he was the Secretary, to the present moment, he has been actively interested in whatever could efficiently establish and wisely carry out to its largest extent the aims and purposes of this institution.

“As the chairman of the committee to secure funds for building and equipping and superintending the construction of the Hospital, and as the chairman of the Committee of Arrangements upon whom devolved the general care and oversight of the building, our respected associate has given the freshness of his strength and zeal, as well as liberally of his means, in forwarding this noble charity.

“We cannot let him go on his high mission without conveying to him the assurance of the very sincere and exalted esteem in which we individually and collectively hold him; of our deep appreciation of the unremitting services which he has rendered for a quarter of a century to this institution, and of our earnest prayer that He who holds the winds and waves in the hollow of His hand may bring him in safety to the haven where he would be; that He who giveth man wisdom and understanding may give him the spirit of counsel and strength in his representative position, and that He who ordereth all our goings may ever keep him in His holy care and bring him back to us laden with fresh honors, so that he may long be spared to enjoy what he has so richly earned, the love and confidence of his fellow-citizens and his fellow-Churchmen.”

STATISTICAL REPORT FOR 1877.

SUMMARY.

During the year, twelve hundred and eighty-two (1282) patients have been admitted. At the date of last report, one hundred and five (105) patients were in the Hospital; making the total number treated during the year, thirteen hundred and eighty-seven (1387). Of these twelve hundred and seventy-nine (1279) were discharged; 800 being cured, 389 improved, 19 unimproved, and 72 having died, leaving 108 under treatment, of whom 57 were medical and 51 surgical, or seventy-three (73) men, thirty-one (31) women and four (4) children, in the wards at the end of year. There have been twelve thousand two hundred and twenty-nine (12,229) new dispensary patients prescribed for during the year. Of this number, eight thousand two hundred and eighteen (8,218) were medical, and four thousand and eleven (4,011) were surgical cases, making an increase of 1,175 new cases over those of the previous year.

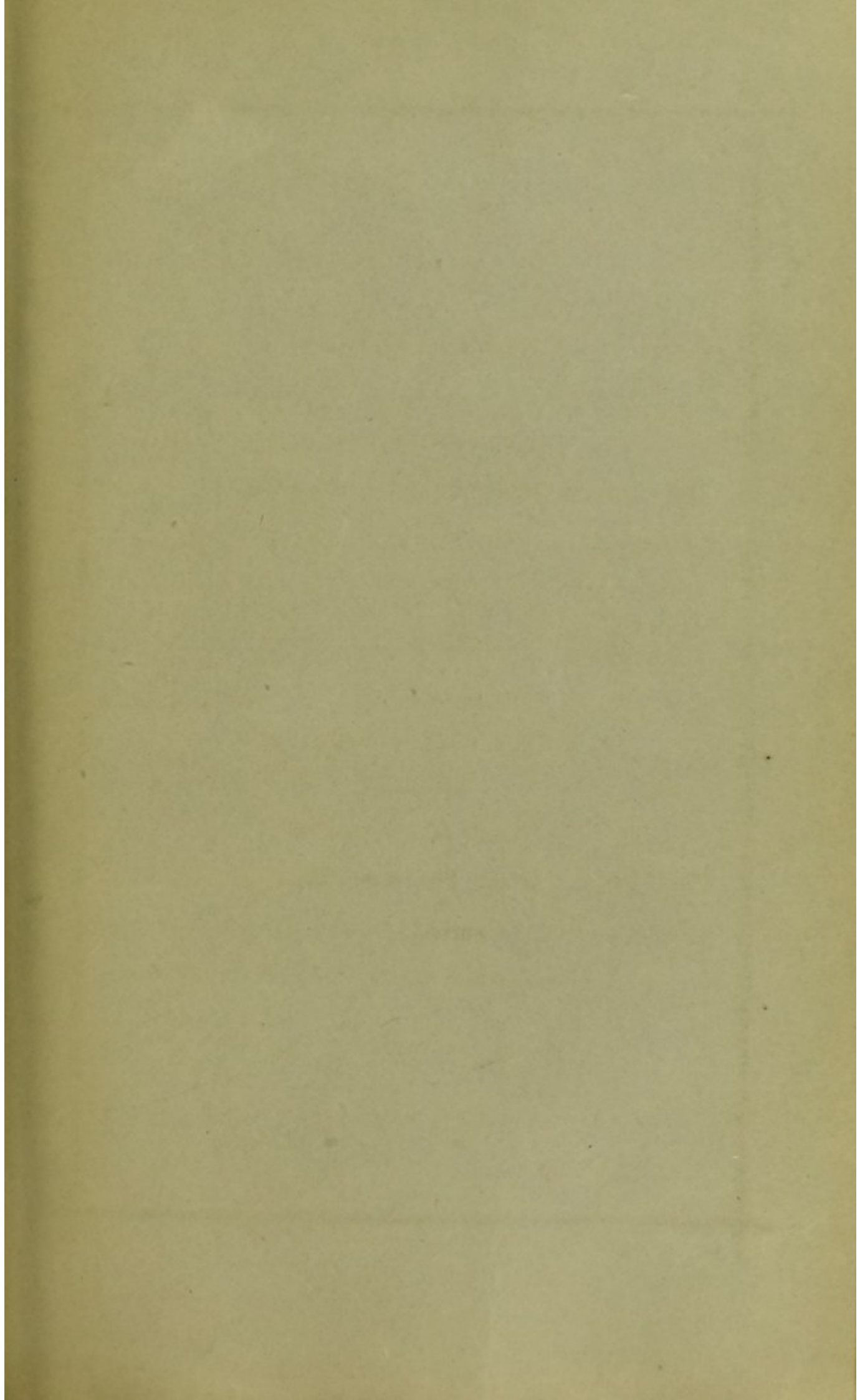
