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
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



Columbia Hospital for Women and Lying-in Asylum.

WASHINGTON, D. C., August 31, 1888.

GENTLEMEN: The Board of Directors of Columbia Hospital for Women herewith respectfully transmit to you the annual reports made to us by the Surgeon in charge and the Treasurer.

The number of patients treated last year exceeded that of any previous year. As our city grows with our growing country obviously the numbers and annual expenses of the institution will increase beyond the mark of former years, and will naturally call for increased liberality. It is hoped that the new building contemplated by the recent special and welcome appropriation by Congress for enlarged accommodations will speedily be erected. It is also hoped that for the coming year the increased receipts from the pay patients' fund will, in addition to the usual annual appropriation of \$15,000, meet all requirements.
