He says: "Since I am upon the serious subject of death, I cannot help expressing, to one who feels as you do, that I am affected with much melancholy on the death of Mr. Gray. His Elegy in a country churchyard has been long like a part of myself I have just been enjoying the very great happiness of a visit from my illustrious friend Pascal Paoli. He was two nights at Auchinleck, and you may figure the joy of my worthy father and me at seeing the Corsican Hero in our romantick groves . . . I had lately a kind letter from our friend Mr. Samuel Johnson. He still flatters me with hopes of seeing him among the rocks of Scotland!" This long and interesting letter contains allusions to Mr. Temple, Mr. Mickle; and other literary topics.

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He acknowledges with elegant compliments the receipt of a letter from Garrick, "when Mr. Johnson and I arrived at Inverary, after our expedition to the Hebrides, and there, for the first time after many days, renewed our enjoyment of the luxuries of civilized life Dr. Goldsmith's death would affect all the Club much Dr. Young has a fine thought, to this purpose, that every friend who goes before us to the other side of the river of death makes the passage to us the easier." He makes some punning remarks on a motto to one of Garrick's prologues, and says: "Mr. Johnson is ready to bruise any one who calls in question your classical knowledge and your happy application of it." He concludes by requesting Garrick to join with him in urging Dr. Johnson to the publication of an account of his tour.

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Soliciting Lord Buchan's interest in obtaining for him the vacant Mathematical Chair. Lord Buchan has written a long indorsement upon the letter, and says: "Mr. Brewster is certainly an extraordinary young man, and ought to have an establishment."

I have had but a very small share of the publick monney. You give Mrs. Cibber 6 hunderd pounds for playing sixty nights, and three to me for playing a hundered and eighty, out of which I can make it appear it coasts me a hunderd in necessarys for the stage, shure you need not want to take any thing from it." (verb. et lit.) The letter is continued in justification of her own and in deprecation of the manager's conduct.

I know how much she disoblig'd you, but by this time I hope you have forgot your resentment and will look upon her behaviour as having been taken with a dreadfull fit of vanity, which for that time took her sences from her, and having been tutored by an affected beast who help'd to turn her head. But pray recolect her in the other light, a faithful creature to you on whom you cou'd allways depend, certinly a good actress, aimiable in her character, both in her being a very modest woman, and very good to her family." (verb. et lit.) Etc. Endorsed by Garrick "My pivy - excellent?"

Yet from a monarch to a beast is not so violent a transition as from a spiritual man to such a man as I have been these many years." He alludes to a recent quarrel with Mr. Johnson, his publisher, who had made some unceremonious criticisms upon his Poems, some of which Cowper admits to have been judicious, but is glad to find that he is a civiller man than he had supposed him. This puts me in mind of the Highland officer, who was so warmed and elevated by the heat of the battle, that he had forgot, till he was reminded by the smarting, that he had received no less than eleven wounds in different parts of his body All I have to say or will say, upon the occasion is this, if Mr. Churchill has attacked his Pasteboard Majesty of Drury Lane from Resentment, I should be sorry for it, though I am conscious it is ill founded; If he has attacked me merely because I am the Punch of the Puppet Shew, I sha'nt turn my back upon him and salute him in Punch's fashion; but make myself easy, &c. In his Rosciad he rais'd me too high, in his Apology he may have sunk me too low; he has done as his Israelites did, made an Idol of a calf, and now—the Idol dwindles to be a calf again! To be a little serious, you mentioned to me some time ago that Mr. Churchill was displeased with me, you must have known whether justly or not. If the first you should certainly have opened your heart to me and have heard my apology; if the last you should as a common friend to both have vindicated me and then I might have escaped his Apology; but be it this, or that or tother I am still his great admirer," etc.

Let me repent of the sins of my past years, and so keep Thy laws for the time to come, that when it shall be Thy good pleasure to call me to another state, I may find mercy in Thy sight. Brown to the Earl of Buchan (at the end of the volume), dated Sept. 30, 1818, in which he says: "I am instructed that this MS. was written by the Poet, and presented to the then Duke of Montrose, and his brother, Lord George Graham, either by Mr. Thomson or Mr. Mallet. It has been bestowed upon Mr. Goodhugh by Miss Graham, grand-daughter to Lord G.—a single lady, rather advanced in life." He then states he was encouraged to address his Lordship by a friend, as your Lordship was peculiarly liable to feel an interest in whatever concerned the memory of the Bard, you might not be disinclined to countenance Mr. Goodhugh's intention of publishing a superbedition of the Seasons, combining the best pieces or passages contained in this MS. collection," &c.

The poems are 29 in number, and unfortunately some have been rendered imperfect, but have all been neatly mended by paper of nearly the same colour. The time of these productions has been given, but is partly erased; it appears to have been at the age of 11 years

or thereatbous.

At the end of the volume is also another long and interesting autograph letter from Mr. J. Brown, containing some very important memo-

rials, added to which is the following note :-

"These original poems of James Thomson, the well-known author of the Seasons, and hitherto unpublished, were kindly presented to me by my old and much valued friend, Henry Colburn, of New Burlington Street. This MS. cost him Twenty Guineas.
