Mr. Cunningham was one of the Clerks to His Majesty's Signet.

"I am sorry that, on the 24th of June, the French landed 1500 troops at the Bay of Bulls, Newfoundland, destroyed all the Fishery thereabouts." They are supposed to have taken four ships.
