all the other accommodations he can give you; nor will any thing so effectually abate fatigue, or shorten the distance of a remote port. I am a little suspicious that you military men will wish to meet with a Spaniard in your way, but I, whom you know to be always peaceably disposed, shall make it my prayer that the heavens may favour you in the whole course of your voyage, and nothing fall out to interrupt the pleasure of it. The writer was son of John Hough, citizen of London, and of Margaret his wife, daughter of John Byrche, of Learcroft, in the county of Stafford, Esq.; was educated at Magd. College, Oxford, and elected President thereof on the 15th of April, 1687, in opposition to the mandate of King James II., which caused a great sensation at the time, which was one of the forerunners of the revolution the following year. He was consecrated Bishop of Oxford the 11th May, 1690; translated to Lichfield and Coventry, 5th Aug. 1699, and from thence to Worcester, 28th Sept. 1717. He was born April 12th, 1651, and died May 8th, 1743, in the 93rd year of his age.
