He specifies the various abuses then prevalent, particularly the bribery and corruption exercised by the connivance given to irreligion and immorality, and adds on the margin, in his own hand, "the manufactures of England are uisibly going to decay 3'm His royal heart is filled with grief at this state of affairs, and his whole thought and study is to devise an effectual remedy, believing that the time is at length at hand when the Divine Mercy will terminate these misfortunes by restoring to the people him, their natural born prince. This he would desire to be done without the intervention of any foreign power ; but as he has too much regard for his subjects to allow them to be exposed without the assistance of regular troops, he has obtained of "our dear brother, his most Christian Majesty," (of France.) a Force sufficient to protect and unite the true lovers of their country, and to aid their deliverance. He promises a general pardon for all offences committed against himself or his royal Father; to assemble a free parliament as soon as tranquillity will permit, wherein no corrupt influences shall be suffered to exist; to support the Church of England, as by law established, in all its rights and properties; to allow toleration to all Protestant dissenters ; to maintain the Habeas Corpus Act ; to refrain from unnecessary taxation ; to recompense and employ men of merit and probity ; and thus hopes that the native genius and honour of the nation may be soon retrieved, and the past divisions soon buried in oblivion. He engages for the preservation of the strictest discipline amongst his foreign troops, who are to be sent home as soon as the public tranquillity will allow. He arranges for the collection of supplies of money and provisions, and promises an exchange of higher
