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MEMORANDUM.

The object of this return is to show to what extent the powers conferred on parishes under the Baths and Washhouses Acts and the Public Libraries Acts, respectively, have been taken advantage of in the case of the parishes comprised in the County of London. Where these Acts, which are commonly known as Adoptive Acts, have been adopted, and baths or libraries have been established, an attempt has been made to state in a convenient form the amount of accommodation provided at each establishment, and the times at which such accommodation is accessible to the public. In addi-tion to this, the latest available statistics have been adduced to show to what extent the privileges afforded by these institutions have been made use of, and finally an analysis has been made of the expenditure of each authority for the year 1897-8 in respect of the Acts, showing the amount met by receipts-in-aid and the balance eventually falling on the rates, together with a statement of the total loans that had been borrowed, and the amount that remained outstanding at the end of the beforementioned year.

As the two sets of institutions to be dealt with are in no wise connected with each other, the return has been divided into two parts, part I. being devoted to public baths and washhouses, and part II. to public libraries.

PART I.-PUBLIC BATHS AND WASHHOUSES.

Statutory powers.

The first Act passed by Parliament, authorising the establishment of baths and washhouses by local authorities, was the Baths and Washhouses Act, 1846 (9 & 10 Vic., cap. 74).

The object of this Act is set forth clearly in the first section which runs as follows— "Whereas it is desirable for the health, comfort and welfare of the inhabitants of towns and populous districts to encourage the establishment therein of public baths and washhouses and open bathing places

In addition to this Act, four amending Acts have since been passed, viz.-

Baths and Washhouses Act, 1847 (10 & 11 Vic., cap. 61). Baths and Washhouses Act, 1878 (41 Vic., cap. 14). Baths and Washhouses Act, 1882 (45 & 46 Vic., cap. 30). Baths and Washhouses Act, 1896 (59 & 60 Vic., cap. 59).

In order to adopt these Acts in any parish in London, a special meeting of the vestry of that parish must be convened for the purpose. A resolution for adopting the Acts must be carried by at least two-thirds of the number of votes given on the question, and a copy of the resolution, extracted from the minutes and signed by the chairman of the vestry, must be sent to the Local Government Board for its approval, and when that has been obtained the Acts can come into operation in the parish. Prior to the Local Government Act of 1894, the vestry in such a case were then to appoint not less than three nor more than seven persons, being ratepayers of the parish, commis-sioners for carrying the Acts into execution, but the Act of 1894 altered this in that a vestry is now empowered to administer the Acts itself. The Local Government Act also provides that, in the case of a parish where the Acts are being administered by commissioners, the vestry of that parish may apply to the Local Government Board for the transfer of those powers to itself.

Under the London Government Act of 1899, the powers and duties under the Baths and Washhouses Acts, now being administered by commissioners and vestries, will be transferred to the newly formed borough councils. The Act also provides that the Baths and Washhouses Acts may be adopted in any borough by a simple majority of the borough council at a special meeting, and it further provides that where the Acts extend only to part of a borough, then in such a case they may be adopted for the rest of the borough in like manner as if it were a separate borough.

Execution of Acts.

At the present time there are 35 parishes in London in which the Baths and Washhouses Acts have been adopted. In 29 of these parishes establishments are in full working order, in 4 they are in course of erection, in one case, that of Bromley, the matter is under consideration, and in Plumstead the matter has been allowed to drop on the ground that no suitable site could be obtained in the parish at a reasonable price. Of the 34 authorities administering the Acts in these parishes, 8 are boards of commissioners, 25 are vestries and one the Local Board of Woolwich.

The following table gives a list of the parishes where the Baths and Washhouses Acts are being carried out, showing for each parish the date and its order in the adoption of the Acts, and also in the provision of accommodation for the public-

The Act of 1846 specially provides that two or more neighbouring parishes may combine in establishing joint baths and washhouses, but in no instance has this been done in London, where the limited extent of many of the parishes would render such a course advantageous.

Accommodation.

Under Section 36 of the Act of 1846, the number of baths provided for the labouring classes in any establishment must be not less than twice the number of baths provided of higher classes, and under Section 5 of the Act of 1847, the same provision is made with respect to the number of washing tubs or troughs. With regard to the latter provision, so far as London is concerned, only

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one class of washhouse has been provided in any of the establishments, but the extent to which the former provision, as to the proportion of private baths to be allotted to the labouring classes, has been adhered to, can be seen from the following summary of the amount of accommodation provided by each parish—

Charges.

The maximum charges authorised to be made for the use of baths and washhouses are set forth clearly in the Acts of 1847 and 1878. They are as follows—

1. Baths for the labouring classes-

Every bath to be supplied with clean water for every person bathing alone, or for several children bathing together, and in either case with one clean towel for every bather. For one person above eight years old—

For one hour only in any one day, any sum not exceeding ... one penny. For two hours together, in any one day, any sum not exceeding ... three pence. Any time over the hour or two hours respectively, if not exceeding five minutes, not to be reckoned.

For two hours not together, or for more than two hours in any one day, such charges as may be thought fit.

4. Washhouses of any higher class-

Such charges as may be thought fit.

5. Open bathing places—

Where several persons bathe in the same water-

Third-class-For one person, any sum not exceeding two pence. In the case of the private baths, these maximum charges seem to be well adhered to, except that at the establishments of Deptford St. Paul, Lewisham, St. Margaret and St. John, and Shoreditch, the charge for a 1st class cold bath is 6d., whereas the maximum charge laid down above is 3d. Turning, however, to the washhouses, the statutory maximum charge of Id. for the first hour seems. to be universally disregarded, except at the Greenwich, Islington and Shoreditch establishments. The charge of 2d. is made at the St. James' Washhouses, but at all the others it is 14d. A sliding scale of charges is adopted at many of the washhouses by which the rate of charge per hour is increased at the end of every successive hour during which a washing trough is used by the same person; the object of this is to keep out, as far as possible, the professional washers. With regard to the swim-ming baths, there being no provision in the Acts for the accommodation of the labouring classes, the only real effect of the above schedule is that the charge shall not exceed 8d. This, in fact, is in no case done, the charge being almost invariably 6d. for first class baths and 2d. for second class; children attending the elementary schools are admitted to most establishments at the rate of 1d. each. An instance worthy of note is that of St. Marylebone, where there is a third class bath for males, to which adults are admitted at 1d. each; this is the only case of the kind in the County of London. Mention. too, ought to be made here of Battersea, where free instruction in swimming is given to all classes of bathers during the summer season; the same privilege is also accorded to female bathers at the swimming baths of Bermondsey, Rotherhithe, Shoreditch and Whitechapel. At some of the establishments it will be seen that soap is included in the charge made for the private baths, and the use of costume, &c., in the entrance fee to the swimming baths, whilst at others a small extra charge is made.

Extent of use.

Public baths and washhouses are not limited as to use in any way, as is the case with public libraries, but are available for the use of any person on payment of the required charges. The estimated population at April, 1898, of the parishes in which public baths are now open

The estimated population at April, 1898, of the parishes in which public baths are now open was 3,206,573. This figure, however, can give no indication of the population actually served by these baths. In the first place, the population figure represents the number of persons actually sleeping in those parishes, whereas the baths can be taken as serving the day population as well, an entirely different figure from the night population, and one which would vary in the case of any parish according to whether the parish was mainly composed of property of a commercial or of a residential character. In central parishes, such as St. Martin-in-the-Fields, St. James Westminster, and St. Saviour Southwark, if the users of the public baths could be classified, it would in all probability be found that persons employed in the parishes, but resident elsewhere, formed the greater proportion. In the second place, too, the fact of a parish possessing an establishment of baths and washhouses does not mean that the whole of the population, day or night, of that parish is thereby benefited. In fact this is not so, for in the case of such a parish as that of Lambeth, an inhabitant, say, at Norwood or Brixton could hardly be said to be served by the baths established in the northern part of parish, although of course he is called upon to pay a proportion of the annual deficit in respect thereof; on the other hand, where baths have been established in small parishes such as St. Saviour Southwark or Whitechapel, residents of the neighbouring parishes are served just as much as the residents of the parishes which own the baths.

The number of bathers and washers at the public baths and washhouses during 1897-8 reached the large total of 5,090,990; of these, 4,463,109 were bathers in either the private or swimming baths, and the remaining 627,881 were women who used the washhouses. The number of hours paid for by the latter was 2,064,393, or an average of 3.3 hours per washer.

As regards the bathers, in two or three cases where book tickets, available for either the private or swimming baths, are sold, the proportion of such tickets used between the two kinds of baths is not recorded. Apportioning such figures, however, we are able to get out the following—

It is impossible to set out these figures between males and females, as in many establishments no such record is kept; but in those cases where the information is available the proportion between the sexes has been worked out, and it is found that of the users of the private baths 18 per cent. are females, and in the case of the swimming baths only 10 per cent.

The School Board for London is authorised to incur expenditure in connection with the teaching of swimming, and it will not be out of place here to quote a summary of a return published by the Board which gives particulars of the swimming instruction carried out at each school during the 1898 bathing season. The system under which this instruction is carried out will best be explained by quoting the resolution of the Board on the subject as passed on the 24th March, 1892, and amended

payment of expenditure in connection with the use of existing baths for the purpose of instruction in swimming, a fee not exceeding a penny a child a lesson be paid to bath proprietors for a number of lessons not exceeding twenty a year in the case of each child attending a swimming class, subject (i) to proper instruction being provided; (ii) to an entry of the subject being made upon the time-table; (iii) to any other condition, or conditions, which experience may hereafter prove to be necessary; and (iv) to this arrangement being limited to scholars of Standard IV. and upwards, and to scholars of eleven years of age and upwards.

In considering the following figures, it must be borne in mind that the instruction is not necessarily carried out at the public baths. Unfortunately the return confines itself to merely giving the distance of the nearest swimming accommodation from each school, and does not give the name of the establishment, so it is impossible to get at the proportion of the Board's children instructed at the public swimming baths-

Winter arrangements.

The private baths and the washhouses of all establishments must be kept open for the use of the public the whole year round, but it is specially provided in section 5 of the Act of 1878 that, from the beginning of November to the end of March, any swimming bath, whether covered or open, may be kept closed, or a gymnasium or other means of healthful recreation may be established therein. Charges may be made for the use of the gymnasium or other means of recreation, or for the use of any covered swimming bath as an empty room. At most of the establishments the smallest bath is kept open during the winter season, the other baths either being closed or fitted up and used as halls as provided above. The following is a list of the establishments where a gymnasium is provided during the winter season-

The same section quoted above also specially states that no covered or open swimming bath when closed may be used for music or dancing, but this clause was repealed by the Act of 1896, which gives power to the London County Council to grant a licence for music and dancing for any bath, should they so think fit. Under these provisions, the first-class swimming baths of the following establishments are licensed to be used as halls for music or dancing-

Lewisham-Ladywell. Plans also have been approved by the Council for the first-class swimming baths of the Battersea, Paddington and Whitechapel establishments.

The first-class baths at a few of the other establishments are fitted up as halls during the winter season, but 'none of these are licensed to be used for music or dancing. The reason for this is that the halls do not conform to the requirements of the Council in the matter of exits, &c., and it has not been thought worth while to incur the large expenditure that would be involved in carrying out the structural alterations rendered necessary.

Water supply.

The expenditure on water forms a considerable item in the accounts of baths and washhouses authorities. The total cost of water supplied at the 26 establishments which were open during the year 1897-8, and which were supplied wholly by one or other of the eight companies was £12,522. The rates per 1,000 gallons charged by the several companies vary considerably, even in the case of the same company, as will be seen from the following-

In consequence of these high charges, wells have been sunk or are in course of construction at 12 establishments. At Greenwich and Deptford St. Paul, the baths are supplied wholly from this source. A statement is published by the Lewisham Vestry, showing the consumption and cost of water at the Ladywell baths during the summer season, 18th April to 15th October, 1898, with the quantities obtained from the well and from the Kent Waterworks Company respectively. A calculation can thus be made of the actual saving effected by the well which will be both instructive and interesting to set out briefly here—

Finance.

Under the Act of 1846, the expenses of executing the Acts for a parish are payable out of the poor rate, and it is also provided that any surplus arising therefrom shall be paid to the aid of the same rate. The parish of Woolwich, however, is an exception to this rule in that the expenses of executing the Acts are paid out of the general district rate. In no case in London is an establishment carried on so as to produce a surplus, though there are many instances where the actual deficit is less than the charge in respect of the repayment and interest on debt. Prior to the re-building of the St. Marylebone Baths in 1895, there was a surplus for several years which was paid over to the relief of the rates. There was no actual charge on the rates for the year 1897–8 in respect of either St. James Westminster or St. George-in-the-East establishments, but there were deficits to the extent of £660 and £184 respectively, which were met by corresponding decreases in balances.

For the purposes of the Acts, baths and washhouses authorities may borrow money, but the sanction of the Local Government Board must first be obtained, and where the authority is a board of commissioners, the sanction of the vestry must also be obtained. The total amount of loans borrowed up to the end of 1897-8 was £1,227,368, and the amount of loans outstanding on that date was £785,395.

Bathing at parks and open spaces.

Wherever possible the Council makes provision for bathing at the parks and open spaces under its control, and perhaps it would be as well to give here a list of such places, with the hours at which bathing is permitted—

Brockwell-park-From opening of park to 8 a.m. on week-days, and to 9 a.m. on Sundays.

Clapham-common-Before 8 a.m. and after 8 p.m. (on Sundays up to 9 a.m. only).

Hampstead-heath and Parliament-hill—Before 8 a.m. throughout the year, except on Sundays, when the hour is 9 a.m.; no evening bathing on Sundays, but on other days as follows in April and September from 6 to 7 p.m., in May and August from 7 to 8 p.m., and in June and July from 8 to 9 p.m. At Parliament-hill, bathing is permitted on Thursdays and Saturdays after 2 p.m., conditionally upon bathers wearing the costume approved by the Amateur Swimming Association.

Plumstead-common-Before 9 a.m. and after 6 p.m. (except on Saturdays and Sundays, when there is no bathing in the evening). Bathing is also permitted for boys only between 9 a.m. and 12 noon every week-day from May to September.

Victoria-park—Before 9 a.m. and after 5 p.m., and on Saturdays by boys only between 9 a.m. and 12 noon.

The principal amount of bathing is carried on at Victoria-park, where there is a special bathing lake; as many as 25,000 people have been known to bathe here on a fine hot Sunday, some of the bathers starting as early as 4 o'clock in the morning.

In addition to the above bathing is also permitted in the Serpentine in Hyde-park. This park is under the control of Her Majesty's Office of Works.

Bathing at all these places is quite free of charge, and is limited exclusively to males.

PART II.-PUBLIC LIBRARIES.

Statutory powers.

The first Act of Parliament authorising the establishment of public libraries by local authorities was passed in 1845, but this, together with several amending Acts, has since been repealed and the only Acts now in force are the—

Public Libraries Act, 1892 (55 & 56 Vict., cap. 53).

Public Libraries (Amendment) Act, 1893 (56 Viet., cap. 11).

The scope of these Acts is not limited to the provision of libraries alone, but also includes any or all of the following institutions, namely, public museums, schools for science, art galleries and schools for art. As far as London is concerned, every parish is a library district for the purposes of the Acts; the areas under the district boards, together with the City of London, are also constituted library districts. In order to adopt the Acts for any of these library districts, a requisition in writing must be made by ten or more voters of the district to the overseers, or in the case where the requisition is in favour of the Acts being adopted for an area under a district board, then in such a case to the district board, requiring either authority to ascertain the opinion of the voters in the parish or district with respect to the question or questions stated in the requisition. County electors are the voters for the purposes of the Acts.

A requisition may contain any question with respect to-

(1) The adoption of the Acts.

(2) The limitation of the rate.

(3) The formation of a joint library with a neighbouring library district.

On receipt of such requisition, the overseers or district board shall proceed to ascertain by means of voting papers the opinion of the voters with respect to the said question or questions stated in the requisition, and, in the event of there being a majority of valid voting papers in favour of the adoption of the Acts, the Acts shall forthwith be deemed to be adopted for that parish or district. Where the opinion of the voters in any library district is ascertained upon the question as to the adoption of this Act, or upon a question as to the limitation of the rate, no further proceeding may be taken for ascertaining the opinion of the voters until the expiration of one year at least from the day on which the opinion of the voters was last ascertained.

Where these Acts were adopted for any parish prior to the Local Government Act of 1894, the vestry of that parish, or the district board in the case where the Acts were adopted for a district, had to appoint not less than three or more than nine voters in the parish or district to be commissioners for carrying the Acts into execution, but the Act of 1894 now provides that a vestry or district board may administer the Acts itself. The Local Government Act also provides that in the case of a parish or district where the Acts are being administered by commissioners, the vestry or district board may apply to the Local Government Board for the transfer of those powers to itself. As far as the City of London is concerned, on the Acts being adopted, the Common Council shall be the library authority.

Where the Acts have been adopted in any two or more neighbouring parishes or districts, the authorities may by agreement combine for any period in carrying the Acts into execution. The library authorities, also, for any two or more parishes or districts for which the Acts have been adopted may, with the consent of the voters (ascertained by means of a poll) in each parish or district, agree to share for any period the cost of the purchase, erection and maintenance of any library situate in one of the parishes or districts.

Under the London Government Act of 1899, the powers and duties under the Public Libraries Acts, now being administered by commissioners and vestries, will be transferred to the newly-formed borough councils. The Act also provides that the Public Libraries Acts may be adopted in any borough by a simple majority of the borough council at a special meeting, thus doing away with the present necessity of taking a poll of the voters, and it further provides that where the Acts extend only to part of a borough, then in such a case they may be adopted for the rest of the borough in like manner as if it were a separate borough.

Execution of Acts.

At the present time there are in London 34 parishes and 4 districts in which the Public Libraries Acts have been adopted. Of these areas 33 are already served by libraries in full working order, in 3 areas libraries are about to be provided, and in two the matter is under consideration. In the case of two of the parishes, viz., St. Martin-in-the-Fields and St. Paul Coventgarden, advantage has been taken of the provision mentioned above, and a joint library established for the use of both parishes. Making allowance for this, there are therefore 37 library authorities administering the Acts in London. Of these authorities 19 are boards of commissioners, 17 are vestries, and one the Local Board of Woolwich.

The following table gives a list of the parishes and districts where the Public Libraries Acts are being carried out, showing for each the date and its order in the adoption of the Acts, and also in the provision of accommodation for the use of the public—

Accommodation.

Most of the libraries established in London consist of three departments, viz., a lending department, from which duly qualified persons may borrow books for the purpose of home reading; a reference department, in which any person over the prescribed limit of age may obtain books for the purpose of reference on the premises; and a news and reading-room, where the current numbers of newspapers, periodicals, magazines, &c., are provided. In the parishes where, on account of their large area, it is necessary to have more than one establishment, it is usual to provide a reference library at a large central establishment and to limit the branches to a lending library and news, &c., rooms. This, however, is not always the case. The following is a summary of the number of establishments provided in London up to the present, but in considering this table it must be borne in mind that it is in no way intended to serve as a basis of comparison between area and area—

The library in course of erection in Lambeth is being built jointly by the Lambeth Library Commissioners and the Corporation of Croydon. When finished it will be maintained by an equal contribution from each body.

At some of the libraries special attractions are offered to children, a separate room being devoted to their use, in which books for reading on the premises and juvenile periodicals are provided; indoor games, too, are in one or two cases provided. Again, at several places a reading-room is set apart for the use of ladies, and at Westminster Central Library a separate room in addition has been provided for the use of ratepayers of the parish. A special feature worthy of note in connection with the work of four libraries, viz., Fulham, Newington, St. Saviour's and Whitechapel, is the holding of free lectures during the winter season; at Newington and St. Saviour's Libraries free lantern lectures for boys are also held from time to time.

A very useful feature at most libraries is the exhibition in the early mornings of the situations sheets of the daily papers for the benefit of persons seeking employment. At Fulham "situations boards" are also provided at four other parts of the parish.

The only instances in London where institutions, provided for under the Acts other than libraries, are established, are at Camberwell and Whitechapel. Owing to the munificence of Mr. Passmore Edwards and others, Camberwell possesses in the "Lord Leighton Memorial Art Gallery" a fine building where loan exhibitions of pictures are held from time to time. Adjoining the gallery and really forming an entrance to it is another building, the Camberwell School of Arts and Crafts. This school is maintained by the Technical Education Board of the London County Council, but the premises belong to the Camberwell Vestry. At Whitechapel there is a museum attached to the library; a lady curator is specially appointed in charge, whose duty is to assist students or give information respecting the specimens to visitors. Mention also ought to be made of Newington where loan exhibitions of pictures, &c., are held from time to time in the library.

Extent of use.

The estimated population at April, 1898, of the parishes and districts in which public libraries are now established was 2,630,316. This figure, however, can give no indication of the population actually served by these libraries, for the reference departments and news and reading rooms of all libraries are available for the use of any person over the prescribed limit of age, and therefore the same remarks would apply in this case as were made in discussing the case of the population served by baths and washhouses (see p. iv. *ante*).

The majority of library authorities make up the statistics relating to books and borrowers for the year ending the 25th or 31st March; in 11 cases, however, the year ended 31st December or other dates is taken. Disregarding this variation, the total issues of books for home-reading during the year is found to amount to the large figure of 3,893,671. Owing to the various methods of classification adopted at the different libraries, it is impossible to split up this figure into more than two classes, viz., fiction, which would include juvenile literature, and non-fiction.

As was reasonably to be expected, the percentage of fictional issues is somewhat high, but on consideration it will clearly be seen that the two classes do not at all well lend themselves to comparison. The novel, of its very nature, is chiefly borrowed for purposes of amusement, and the time during which it is in use is very limited; on the other hand, when a book is obtained for educational purposes, not only is the effort expended on it much greater, but the period for which it is retained is very much longer than is the case with regard to works of fiction. Thus, a constant reader of fiction may reasonably be supposed to get through, say, four books in fourteen days, the usual period allowed for borrowing, whereas the average student would probably retain a book for the whole period. It is probable, indeed, if the actual time for which the books of the two classes were retained could be ascertained, that the disparity indicated by the above figures would disappear.

The total issues of books for reference purposes on the premises during the same period amounted to 554,642; in addition to these there were 66,540 issues in the juvenile departments of certain libraries.

The number of books in stock at the end of the period being dealt with, available for homereading, was as follows-

and the number available for reference purposes only was 127,272; there were in addition 2,624 books in the juvenile departments of certain libraries for reading on the premises only. The total number of books in use at the libraries was therefore 601,526. It must be remembered that at all the libraries non-fictional works of the leading departments are available for reference purposes on the premises, provided they are in and are not required by anyone for borrowing. In considering these figures, and in comparing one library with another, due regard must be paid to the following points---

(1) At some libraries the whole of the books of the reference department are kept in open cases, at others there are many, while at others there are few books which can be used without application and therefore without any record being kept.

(2) The time allowed for borrowing books from lending departments may be seven or fourteen days. It follows that in a library where only seven days are allowed, a large proportion of books are renewed which would not, under the fourteen days' limit, require renewal, and renewals being counted as issues, a fair comparison cannot be made.

The total number of borrowers who were qualified to borrow books for home-reading at the end of the period under consideration was 138,870; it is impossible to classify this figure, but in the return itself a classification has been given of the borrowers at individual libraries, wherever possible. It will be noticed that in some cases an attempt has been made to give a classification of the occupations, but owing to the vague descriptions given and also to the large proportion of "not stated," this is of little use. It is a pity that a more careful classification of the occupations of the borrowers could not be carried out by library authorities; such a return would be most interesting in showing whether the libraries were meeting the needs of the class for which they are primarily intended.

Finance.

The expenses incurred in the execution of the Public Libraries Acts may be defrayed, where the library district is a parish, out of the poor rate, subject, however, to the qualification that any person assessed in respect of lands used as arable, meadow or pasture ground, or as woodlands or market-gardens, or nursery grounds, shall be only liable for one-third of such rate. Where the library district is a district under Schedule B of the Metropolis Management Act, the expenses are to be defrayed out of the general rate, but there is apparently no qualification as to land similar to that in the poor rate. The parish of Woolwich comes under the clause of the Act of 1892 which deals with urban districts, whereby it is provided that the expenses of a library are to be met out of the general district rate. With the single exception of the City of London it is expressly enacted that the rate for the purposes of the Acts shall in no case exceed one penny in the pound for any one financial year. In the case of the City of London there is no limit as to rate, but as a matter of fact no rate is levied, the adopted for any library district subject to a condition that the rate shall not exceed one halfpenny or three-farthings, but these limitations may be subsequently removed provided that on a poll of the voters being taken a majority is recorded in favour of such a course being taken. In 29 of the 38 areas where the Acts have been adopted, the full penny rate was levied in

In 29 of the 38 areas where the Acts have been adopted, the full penny rate was levied in 1898-9; in Shoreditch a ³/₄d. rate, and in the Holborn District, Kensington, Lewisham and St. George Hanover-square, only a ¹/₄d. rate was levied; in Bromley the expenditure was met out of balance, and in Bow, the Limehouse District, and Mile-end Old-town, no expenditure had been incurred.

The total produce of the rates, not necessarily levied, but authorised to be levied for library purposes during 1898-9 in the parishes and districts of London in which the Acts had been adopted is estimated at £72,772. The statutory rateable value of these parishes in force at April, 1898, was £20,825,435.

For the purposes of the Acts, library authorities may borrow money, but the sanction of the Local Government Board must first be obtained, and where the library authority is a board of commissioners with the sanction also of the vestry or district board. The total amount of loans borrowed up to the end of 1897-8 was £225,630, and the amount of loans outstanding on that date was £174,209.

Assessment.

The question of the assessment of public libraries was a vexed one for many years. The income of public libraries being limited by statute to a rate of one penny in the pound, the payment of large sums as rates and taxes had the effect of considerably limiting"the sphere of usefulness of many libraries, and in 1897, consequent on the decision of the House of Lords in an appeal case by the Manchester library authority, some of the assessment committees and overseers took the libraries in their respective districts out of assessment, or confined themselves to rating only those portions occupied by officers or servants. The question raised in this case was whether the Corporation of Manchester was liable to pay income tax under Schedule A in respect of their public libraries, the contention of the Corporation being that such libraries were "literary" institutions within the meaning of the Income Tax Act, 1842, which provides that allowances are to be made in respect of the duties in Schedule A "... on any building the property of any literary or scientific institution used solely for the purposes of such institution and in which no payment is made or demanded for any instruction there afforded by lectures or otherwise; provided also that the said building be not occupied by any officer of such institution, nor by any person paying rent for the same."

The decision of the House of Lords was in favour of the contention of the Manchester Corporation, and not only provided for the future exemption of all public libraries from the payment of income tax, but also brought into prominence an Act of 1843 which provides that any land, houses or buildings belonging to any society instituted for purposes of science, literature or the fine arts exclusively, shall be exempt from the payment of any county, borough, parochial or other local rates, provided that such society shall be supported wholly or in part by annual voluntary contributions and shall not make any dividend, gift, division or bonus in money unto or between any of its members, and provided also that such society shall obtain a certificate from the Registrar of Friendly Societies. As stated above, this advantage some of the authorities were not slow in taking hold of, and as a consequence of their action the Council addressed a communication to the assessment committees acting for parishes in which free libraries were situate, intimating that the Council had served notices of objection to the omission of free libraries from the valuation lists of certain parishes, and suggesting that, in order to place all parishes on an equal footing, all free libraries might be omitted from assessment, the Council reserving the right to carry a test case to sessions if so advised. At the same time, the Council referred the whole case of the rateability to counsel, but their opinion was that the question was not free from doubt, and they suggested that a test case should be taken to the High Court. The Council, however, considered this an undesirable course, and decided that no further action should be taken for the present in the matter.

As far as the London public libraries are concerned, this arrangement as to local rates is fairly satisfactory, but their position as regards Imperial taxation is far from being so: In the clause of the Income Tax Act, 1842, quoted above, it is expressly stated that only those buildings are exempt from the payment of Schedule A duties which are not occupied by any officer or by any person paying rent for the same. As, however, rooms are provided at many libraries so that the librarian may reside on the premises, this provision in the clause is sufficient to disqualify such libraries from the enjoyment of the exemption.

I.
