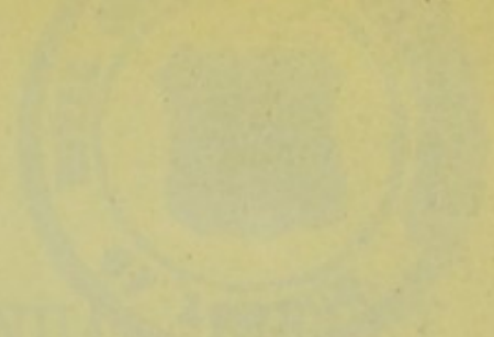

THE TWENTY-FIRST ANNUAL

Report of the Committee of Visitors

OF THE

*Cambridgeshire, Isle of Ely, and Borough of Cambridge
Pauper Lunatic Asylum.*

PURSUANT to the 62nd Section of the 16th and 17th Victoria, Chapter 97, the Committee of Visitors of the above Asylum beg to report to Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of Cambridge and Isle of Ely respectively, and to the Town Council of the Borough of Cambridge, as follows :—

Your Committee, by their special Report to the Quarter Sessions of the County and Isle respectively, and to the Town Council of the Borough, dated the 22nd May, 1876 (*vide* page 14 of the 19th Annual Report), applied for, and obtained a grant of £13,000 from those bodies for the enlargement of the Asylum in the manner in that Report, and by the plans and specifications which accompanied such Report described.

Your Committee then stated that, in their opinion, no necessity would exist for calling on the County, Isle and Borough to pay more than £2000 of the

above grant in any one year, and they have accordingly adhered to that course, having, since the date of that Report, made the following orders, viz. :

Since the above-named special Report and grant of £13,000 in 1876 were made, the following works, comprised therein, have been carried out by the Asylum Staff of Artizans, under the superintendence of Mr. Rowe, the Architect of the Asylum.

On the female side, a day and night Infirmary, a laundry, patients' day room, a boundary wall and gates, general w.c's., a general bath room, a corridor connecting it with the wards and Infirmary, and a corridor as far as the female entrances on the North, and also up to the new laundry day room. The extension of the East day room on the ground floor, and the widening of the front day room and sleeping room over it.

On the male side, an Infirmary and general w.c's.

Your Committee, on the 30th September, 1878, made an order that during the year 1879 the new dining hall and recreation hall on the male side should be built.

In April last your Committee discussed the ques-

tion of providing a temporary ward for the accommodation of some of the female patients during the progress of the widening of the front day room, but they finally decided to discharge thirty female patients from the Asylum as selected by the Medical Superintendent, during the time occupied in widening the day room.

In addition to the above-mentioned works carried out for the enlargement of the Asylum, according to your Committee's special Report of the 22nd May, 1876, the following works for repairs or re-construction have been carried out, viz. :

A service box, so constructed that the water will flow only so long as an attendant holds the handle, has been placed in each room at the back of the three w.c's. This was necessary in order to prevent a loss of water similar to that occasioned by an attendant named Ellen Denny, who left the tap in the out door day room running all night, for which neglect of duty she was discharged. Several repairs of the steam engine have been carried out during the year.

The drying closet having become worn and defective, Mr. J. I. Headly, of Cambridge, by orders from your Committee, has thoroughly repaired and improved it, at a cost of £47.

At their Annual Meeting, held on the 28th of January, 1878, acting on the Resolution passed on the subject in October, 1876, your Committee, on the recommendation of the Finance sub-Committee, fixed the charge for maintenance of pauper patients in the Asylum, chargeable to Unions in the County, Isle and Borough, for the current year, at 10s. 9½*d.* per head, per week, being the sum nearest to the actual cost of patients, per head, per week, during the year 1877. The following is a return of lunatics and idiots chargeable to Unions in the County, Isle and Borough, in Asylums and Workhouses, and those with friends elsewhere, on the 31st December, 1877, compiled by the Clerk to the Visitors, from annual Returns received from Clerks to Boards of Guardians, and presented to your Committee at their Meeting held on the 25th of February, 1878.

Dividing the actual numbers in the Asylum on the 31st December, 1877, by the proportion of charge of keeping up the Asylum, payable by each of the three bodies respectively, the following result appears :—

The County had 20 patients in the Asylum *less* than their Maximum.

The Isle had 6 patients in the Asylum *more* than their Maximum.

The Borough had 14 patients in the Asylum *more* than their Maximum.

On the 26th March, 1878, an inquest was held at the Asylum on the body of Elizabeth Dewey, one of the patients, who died in an epileptic fit, which resulted

in a verdict of "died by the visitation of God," and the jury having expressed their opinion that another night attendant should be appointed, and the Commissioners in Lunacy having, by letter of the 15th April, 1878, expressed the same opinion, your Committee, on the 29th of that month, decided on appointing a second night attendant for the Asylum.

On the 15th June, 1878, one of the male attendants, Charles Kitteridge, died suddenly while on duty. An inquest was held on the 17th of that month, when a verdict of death from heart disease was returned. The deceased had been nearly four years in the service of the Asylum, and Dr. Bacon found him very attentive to his duties, and a useful and well behaved attendant. The deceased was buried in the Asylum cemetery, at his widow's request, and your Committee provided a memorial stone over his grave, in token of his good services as an attendant at the Asylum.

Books for
Artizans' Time
and Stocktaking.

In consequence of there being so many artizans employed on the new works at the Asylum, and a large stock of building and other materials in store, your Committee have, during the past year, established books for more correctly ascertaining the time and work on which each artizan is daily employed, and arrangements are in progress towards a systematic plan in taking and keeping accounts of all stock received into store, and issued for use in the Asylum.

We have again to report an increase in the number of patients under treatment in this Asylum. The number on the books to-day is 319, of whom 149 are males and 170 females, shewing an increase of 14 patients since our colleagues' visit a year ago. But the increase since the visit in July, 1875, has assumed the formidable proportion of 50 patients without any adequate extension of the accommodation which the Asylum can afford. We will however presently refer to the structural alterations and improvements which have been effected since the date of the last visit.

Among the causes of death recorded, phthisis and other diseases of the lungs account for as many as 13 deaths; and we regret to observe that two deaths occurred from erysipelas and gangrenous inflammation respectively. The other recorded causes of death do not call for special notice. Post-mortem examinations have been made in 27 cases, but the holding of an inquest has not been necessary in the case of any of the deaths.

We find that no mechanical restraint has been used. Two men, one on five occasions and altogether for 28 hours, the other for two days; and six women, one for five days, three for one day each, and two each for six hours, have been secluded.

Two men and four women are to-day in bed, and nine men and ten women are under medical treatment. Having regard to the large mortality of the past year, amounting as it does to about 16 per cent. of the patients under treatment, we fear that we cannot report the general bodily health of the patients as being satisfactory. The high rate of mortality and the recurrence of erysipelas and diarrhoea point to a defective sanitary condition, which we think results from the present overcrowding of the Asylum.

One man is away on probation. With this exception, we have seen all the patients. Their demeanour was quiet and orderly, and very little excitement was manifested during our progress through the wards. We had no complaint but the usual one of improper detention here. The dress of

the patients of both sexes was satisfactory. We found the wards and dormitories clean, and the beds and bedding in good order and sufficient in quantity. The dinner to-day consisted of meat-pie, with potatoes and carrots, and was good and abundant.

As regards employment, we find that 104 men are usefully employed: 25 on the land, 20 in the workshops, 12 about the new building, and the remainder in various other ways; 116 women are at work, of whom 22 are engaged in the laundry and 6 in the kitchen. Fifty-five men and 49 women take walks outside the grounds; and 36 of the male and 51 of the female sex meet at the weekly dance.

About 30 of the patients attend church in the village; and according to the last report, 103 men and 68 women were present at the chapel services on Sunday.

The staff of attendants remains the same as before reported. The female night watch has now to traverse an increased distance in going her rounds, and we doubt if one person can efficiently perform the duties. We would suggest the employment of another night attendant on the female side, and the bringing together the epileptic and suicidal patients under her supervision, as before recommended.

Several structural additions and improvements have been effected since the last visit of the Commissioners. The principal of these are the male and female infirmaries, which are finished and occupied: the day room for the patients employed in the laundry, finished but not yet occupied; and several

excellent water-closets on each side. The general bath room for women is unfinished, but it will be a very good one. A considerable addition to the day space has been gained, but very little, if any, additional sleeping accommodation ; for the new bedrooms have only enabled the reduction of the beds in other parts of the house to more reasonable numbers. We greatly fear that the accommodation to be afforded by the completed additions and those contemplated will be found inadequate to meet the increased and still increasing demands for Asylum space ; and we regret to learn that the Visitors adhere to their determination to spread the work in progress over so great a period of time. The inconveniences in such an establishment as this of protracted building operations are obvious.

The laundry drying-yard is entirely destroyed for that purpose by the buildings erected and to be erected in it, and it will be necessary to provide a new and properly enclosed drying-ground. We have noticed that there is no proper place for drying wetted mattresses, which have now to be placed, in dry weather, in the airing courts, and in wet weather, by the fire in the day rooms. Nor is there any proper place for washing and drying the mattress hair. It would be very desirable to remedy these defects. We have suggested to Dr. Bacon some alterations in the position of the gas-lights in the new closets, by which one jet may serve in the place of two, and be safer.

We regret to find that the cemetery chapel

(the state of which was referred to in the last entry) remains in the same condition.

Dr. Bacon has for some years past afforded to the medical students of the University, facilities for studying in this Asylum the various diseases of the brain, and has delivered clinical lectures on the subject; and we are glad to learn that the Senate have recognised his services by conferring on him the honorary degree of Master of Arts. He is still, notwithstanding the increasing number under his care, without the aid of an assistant medical officer.

Report of the Chaplain.

CAMBRIDGESHIRE ASYLUM,
FULBOURN, NEAR CAMBRIDGE,

28th December, 1878.

GENTLEMEN,

It becomes once more my duty to make my annual Report to you respecting my duties at this Asylum.

On the 3rd February, last, I was so ill that I could not get to the Asylum, and there was no service on that Sunday morning. With this exception the customary service has been duly performed every Sunday during the past year; but in consequence of my serious illness it was performed by deputy for eleven weeks. Since the latter part of April, I am thankful to say, I have been able to perform my duties as usual, both on Sundays and weekdays, as recorded in my diary.

During the past year 20 persons have been buried in the cemetery, including one attendant, who died very suddenly.

The chapel is well attended on Sunday mornings, and I am glad to be able to say, as in former years,

that the patients behave in a very quiet and orderly manner.

I believe that many take much interest in the services, and I think this, not merely from their quiet behaviour in chapel, but from their conversations with me on Wednesday afternoons.

Report of the Medical Superintendent.

FULBOURN ASYLUM,

January, 1879.

The increase in the number of patients during the past year has been remarkable, the admissions exceeding those of any previous year since patients from outside the County have been excluded. Of 117 admitted during 1878, there were 42 male and 46 female new cases. The recoveries amounted to 37, of which 13 were among the males, and 24 females. Thirty-nine others were discharged unrecovered. Thirty-six patients died, of whom 20 were females.

On the 31st December, there remained 162 males and 156 females in the Asylum. All the beds were then occupied on the male side. On the female side there were a good many vacancies, but eighteen females belonging to the County were in other Asylums, so that the total number of female patients would be, properly, about 174.

The enlargement of the wards on the female side has given ample space for those under care, and the new bath room has been a source of great comfort and convenience to all.

The deaths have been at about the normal rate. One of them was from typhoid fever, and this case was remarkable as being an isolated one, and occurring in a chronic patient who had not been exposed to any known infection. He was in a ward with some fifty other patients, and no one else was affected. Of the other cases, some presented unusual features. One female died from scirrhus of the mammary gland, and was found to have secondary deposits of the same disease in the lung and liver. Another woman had an enlarged spleen, which weighed nearly 5 lb., and the liver, similarly enlarged, weighed upwards of 7 lb. Another female had three large hydatid cysts on the liver, and also one in the substance of the right lung, though she had not shown any signs of illness till a few days before her death. Two females died in epileptic fits at night, and their deaths were inquired into by the Coroner.

The extract of *Hyoscyamine* has been employed in many cases of late, here, and I have found it a very useful sedative, but have never obtained the sudden curative results spoken of by some writers as consequent on its administration.
