PREFACE.

THE Council having determined that a record of the Society's work up to the close of the past century should be prepared and published, a sub-committee of the Publication Committee, consisting of Professor G. B. Howes, F.R.S., Dr. A. Smith Woodward, F.R.S., the Secretary, and the Vice-Secretary, was appointed to consider the subject. In conformity with the report of this sub-committee it was agreed by the Council that the proposed volume should be entitled "A Record of the Progress of the Zoological Society of London during the Nineteenth Century," and that it should contain the Charter and By-laws, the List of Fellows in 1901, a list of the Staff on January 1st, 1901, and a short History of the Society.

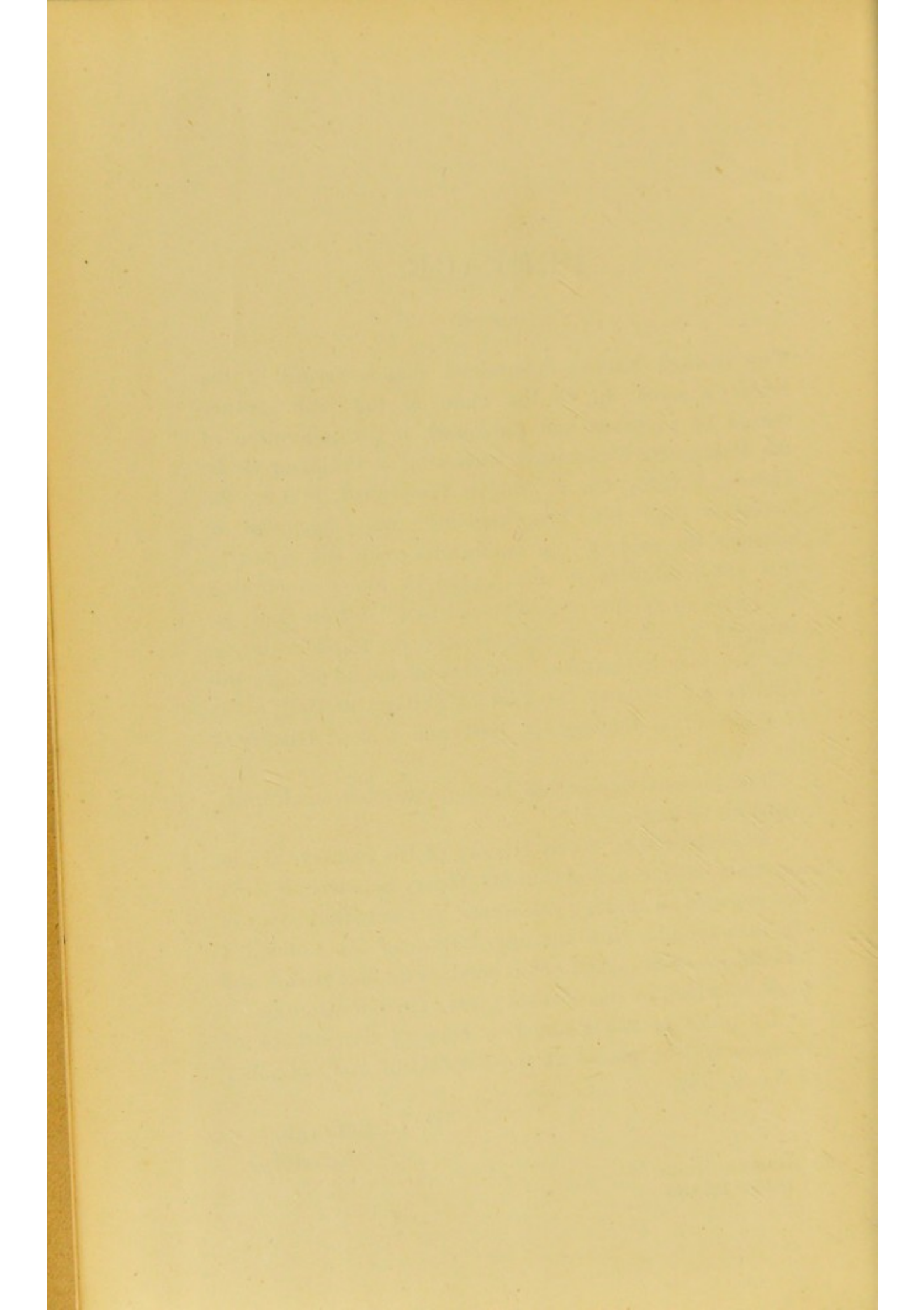
The present volume has been prepared in conformity with this arrangement.

By order of the Council, a copy of the Record of Progress will be placed at the disposal of every Member of the Society.

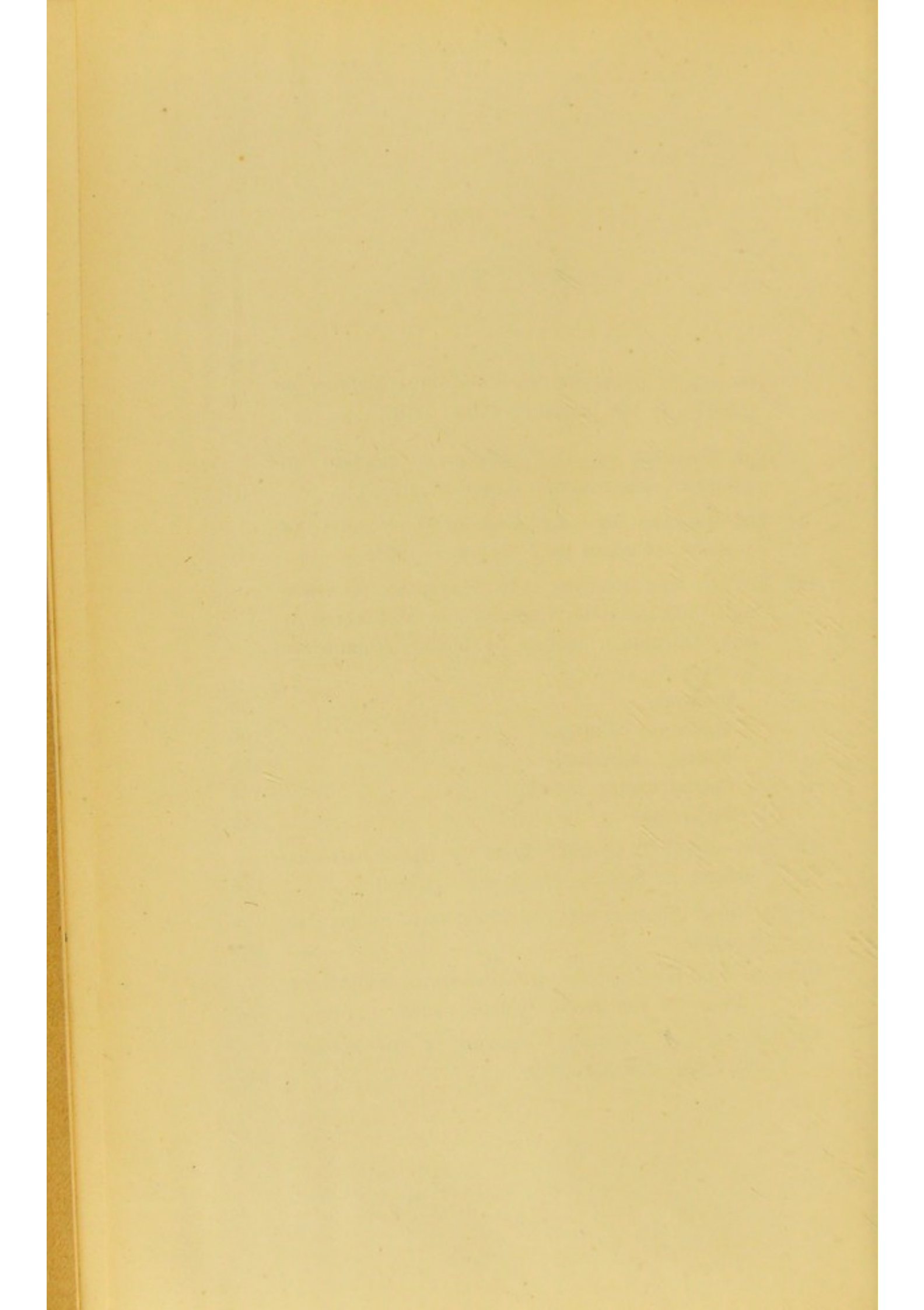

I. THE CHARTER

OF THE

ZOOLOGICAL SOCIETY OF LONDON.

(INCORPORATED MARCH 27, 1829.)

“GEORGE THE FOURTH by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland King, Defender of the Faith, To all to whom these Presents shall come greeting: Whereas several of our loving subjects are desirous of forming a Society for the advancement of Zoology and Animal Physiology, and the introduction of new and curious subjects of the Animal Kingdom; and having subscribed and expended considerable sums of money for that purpose, have humbly besought Us to grant unto them, and to such other persons as shall be elected as hereinafter is mentioned, our Royal Charter of Incorporation, for the better carrying on the same: Now therefore know ye, that We, being desirous to encourage so laudable an undertaking, have of our especial grace, given and granted, And We do hereby give and grant, that our right trusty and entirely beloved Cousin and Councillor *Henry Marquis of Lansdowne*, our right trusty and well beloved *George Lord Auckland*, and our trusty and well beloved *Charles Baring Wall*, Esquire, *Joseph Sabine*, Esquire, and *Nicholas Aylward Vigors*, Esquire, and such others as shall from time to time be appointed and elected Fellows of the said Society in manner hereinafter directed, and their Successors, shall for ever hereafter be, by virtue of these presents, One Body Politic and Corporate by the name of ‘THE ZOOLOGICAL SOCIETY OF LONDON,’ for the purposes aforesaid, and

by the name aforesaid, to have perpetual succession, and to have a Common Seal, with power and authority to alter, break and renew the same at their discretion; and by the same name to sue, and be sued, to implead and be impleaded, and answer and be answered unto, in every Court or Place of Us, our Heirs and Successors. And we do constitute and appoint, that the persons hereby incorporated, and their successors, shall be for ever able and capable in the law to purchase, receive and possess to them and their Successors any Goods and Chattels whatsoever, and (notwithstanding the statutes of Mortmain) to purchase, hold and enjoy to them and their successors any Lands, Tenements, and Hereditaments whatsoever, not exceeding at the time or times of purchasing such Lands, Tenements, and Hereditaments, respectively, the yearly value at a Rack Rent of Two Thousand Pounds in the whole. And We do hereby declare and grant that they the said *Henry Marquis of Lansdowne, George Lord Auckland, Charles Baring Wall, Joseph Sabine, and Nicholas Aylward Vigors*, shall be the first Fellows of the said Society; and that they or any three or more of them shall, and may, on or before the twenty-ninth day of April One thousand eight hundred and twenty-nine, under their respective hands in writing, appoint such other persons to be Fellows, Honorary Members, Foreign Members, and Corresponding Members of the said Society, as they may think fit. And We do further declare and grant, that for the better government of the said Society, and for the better management of the Concerns thereof, there shall from the date of these presents, thenceforth and for ever, be a President, Treasurer, Secretary, and Council of the said Society; and that such Council shall consist of twenty-one Fellows of the said Society, whereof the President, Treasurer, and Secretary shall be three. And We do further declare, that the said *Henry Marquis of Lansdowne* shall be the first President, the said *Joseph Sabine* the first Treasurer, and the said *Nicholas Aylward Vigors* the first Secretary. And that

they the said *Henry Marquis of Lansdowne, George Lord Auckland, Charles Baring Wall, Joseph Sabine, and Nicholas Aylward Vigors*, or any three or more of them, shall, and may, under their respective hands, appoint such other discreet persons, being Fellows of the said Society, to be Members of the said Council, as they shall think fit, nevertheless so that the number thereof shall not exceed twenty-one. And We do further declare, the aforesaid President, Treasurer, and Secretary, hereby appointed, and the Council to be appointed as aforesaid, shall continue in such their respective offices until the twenty-ninth day of April One thousand eight hundred and twenty-nine. And We do further direct, that the Fellows of the said Society, or any eleven or more of them, shall and may, on the said twenty-ninth day of April one thousand eight hundred and twenty-nine, and also shall and may on the twenty-ninth day of April, or as near thereto as conveniently may be, in every successive year, assemble together at the then last or other usual place of meeting of the said Society, and by method of Ballot remove from the then present Council five of the persons of whom it shall be composed; and also shall and may by the like method of Ballot elect five other persons, being Fellows of the said Society, into the Council, in the room and stead of those so removed, who, together with the persons not so removed, shall form the Council for the then next ensuing year; and also shall and may in like manner remove any other person from the said Council who may have been elected as hereinafter is provided, in the place of one dying or resigning, and in like manner may either elect another Fellow of the said Society in the room and stead of the one elected as aforesaid, or re-elect the one so elected. And also that the Fellows of the said Society, or any eleven or more of them, shall and may, at the time and in manner aforesaid, by the like method of Ballot, elect from among the Members of the Council, when formed and elected in manner aforesaid, one person to be

First Fellows, or any three of them, may appoint a Council.

First Council to continue until April 29, 1829.

The Fellows, or any eleven of them, shall, on the 29th of April in every year, remove, by ballot, five Members of the Council, and elect five other Fellows in their room. And also, remove or re-elect any other person who may have been elected during the year in the place of one dying or resigning.

The Fellows or any eleven of them, may elect from amongst the Council, a President,

President, one person to be Treasurer, and one person to be Secretary of the said Society, for the year then next ensuing. And We do further declare and grant, that in case of the death or resignation of the President, Treasurer, or Secretary, or of any other Member of the Council for the time being of the said Society, the Members for the time being of the Council of the said Society, or any five or more of them (the whole having been duly summoned), shall and may from time to time, within the space of three Calendar Months next after such death or resignation, or as near thereto as conveniently may be, by method of Ballot elect some other person being a Fellow of the said Society, to supply the place of such President, Treasurer, or Secretary, or other Member of the Council so dying or resigning; and the person so elected shall be and remain a Member of the Council of the said Society, and President, Treasurer, or Secretary, as the case may be, until the next Annual General Meeting of the said Society ensuing such election. And We do further will and declare, that the President for the time being so soon after his appointment as conveniently may be, shall and may nominate and appoint any number of persons, being Members of the said Council, not exceeding six, to be Vice-Presidents of the said Society for the year ensuing; and in case of the death or resignation of any person so appointed, he shall and may nominate and appoint any other person, being a Member of the Council, in the room or stead of the person so dying or resigning, for the remainder of the year then ensuing. And We do further declare and grant, that from and after the said twenty-ninth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-nine, the Fellows of the said Society, or any eleven or more of them, shall and may have the power from time to time, at the General Meetings of the said Society, to elect by method of Ballot such persons to be Fellows, Honorary Members, Foreign Members, and Corresponding Members of the said Society, and such Fellows, Honorary Members,

Foreign Members and Corresponding Members to remove from the said Society, as they shall think fit.

And We do further declare and grant, that the Council of the said Society for the time being, or any five or more of them (the whole having been duly summoned), shall and may from time to time nominate and appoint such persons as they shall think proper, to be Officers and Servants for carrying on and executing the necessary concerns of the said Society; and such Officers and

Council, or any five of them (the whole having been summoned), to appoint and remove Officers and Servants.

Servants to remove as they shall see occasion; and also shall and may have power, according to the best of their judgment and discretion, to make and establish such Orders and By-Laws as shall appear to them useful for the regulation of the said Society, for the management of the Estates, Goods, Lands, Revenues, and Businesses thereof, and for fixing and determining the times and places of meeting of the said Society, and also the times, place, and manner of electing, appointing, and removing all Fellows, Honorary Members, Foreign Members, and Corresponding Members of the said Society, and for regulating and ascertaining as well the rights, privileges, and advantages as the qualifications of persons to become Fellows, Honorary Members, Foreign Members, and Corresponding Members of the said Society respectively, and also the sum and sums of money to be paid by them respectively, whether upon admissions or otherwise, towards carrying on the purposes of the said Society; and the same Orders and By-Laws from time to time, as they may see occasion, to alter, suspend, or repeal, and to make such new Orders and By-Laws in their stead as they shall think most proper and expedient, so as the same be not repugnant to these Presents, or the Laws of this our

Council, or any five of them, to make Orders and By-Laws—and to alter, suspend, or repeal the same.

Realm. Provided that no By-Laws to be made, or alteration or repeal of any By-Law shall be considered to have passed and be binding on the said Society until notice of such By-Laws or such alteration or repeal of any By-Law shall have been publicly given at a General Meeting, nor until the same shall have been hung up

in writing in some conspicuous place in the common Meeting-room of the said Society during the space of three calendar months, nor until the same shall have been confirmed by method of Ballot by the Fellows of the said Society, or any eleven or more of them, at the next General Meeting of the said Society, to take place after such notices shall have been given as aforesaid.—
In witness whereof we have caused these our Letters to be made Patent. Witness ourself at our Palace at Westminster this twenty-seventh day of March in the tenth year of our Reign.

II. THE BY-LAWS

OF THE

ZOOLOGICAL SOCIETY OF LONDON.

(IN FORCE ON JANUARY 1, 1901.)

CHAPTER I.

Of the Fellows.

SECT. I. Every Candidate for admission as a Fellow of the Society shall be proposed and recommended by three or more Fellows, who shall at an Ordinary General Meeting of the Society cause to be delivered to the Secretary a paper signed by themselves, signifying the name, description, and usual place of residence of such person; all which shall be certified by at least one of the recommending Fellows, from his personal acquaintance with the Candidate.

SECT. II. Every Certificate, having been read at one of the Ordinary General Meetings, shall be hung up in some common Room of the Society; and the person therein recommended shall be balloted for at the next Ordinary General Meeting after such reading.

SECT. III. No person shall be declared duly elected unless two-thirds of the number of Fellows balloting shall vote in his favour.

SECT. IV. Persons so elected shall have immediate notice thereof transmitted to them by the Secretary, accompanied by a copy of the Charter and By-laws.

SECT. V. No person shall be deemed a Fellow until his admission fee and contribution for the current year be paid, or the annual payments be compounded for. If any person elected as a Fellow shall omit to pay the admission fee and annual contribution (or composition in lieu

thereof) within six months after the day of election, the Council shall have authority to declare such election void, unless the admission fee or annual subscription, or both such payments, be remitted, in whole or in part, by special order of the Council.

SECT. VI. The admission fee shall be £5. The annual contribution of every Fellow elected on or before Dec. 6, 1832, shall be £2, and the composition in lieu thereof £20 : the annual contribution of every Fellow elected after Dec. 6, 1832, shall be £3, and the composition in lieu thereof £30 ; but no Fellow elected on or after the first day of October in any year shall be liable to pay the annual contribution for that year.

SECT. VII. The payment of the admission fee shall be considered as distinctly implying the acquiescence of every Fellow elected into the Society in all the Rules, Regulations, and By-Laws thereof.

SECT. VIII. The annual contribution becomes due on the 1st of January in every year in advance, and is recoverable as a debt due from the Fellow to the Society as upon a contract by him or her with the Society for the payment of the same accordingly ; and if any Fellow shall omit to pay the same within three months after it becomes due, the Council shall be empowered to prevent such Fellow from exercising his privileges ; provided nevertheless that the Council shall have authority to restore such defaulter upon payment of arrears.

SECT. IX. When any Fellow shall be in arrear of his annual contribution for two years on the day of any Anniversary Meeting, he shall be apprised by letter, addressed to his last known place of residence, that unless the amount due by him be paid before the end of the current year, his name shall be removed from the list of Fellows ; and in the event of his omitting to pay the amount within the time limited, whether the Society have sued for the same or not, his name shall be removed accordingly (except under special circumstances at the discretion of the Council and to be recorded on its minutes) ; but such removal shall not prejudice the right

of the Society to sue for or recover the arrears then due of his annual contribution; provided nevertheless that the Council may, on ballot, restore the name of any person so removed, who shall have paid, within two years after his removal, the arrears then and subsequently due by him.

SECT. X. Any Fellow who shall be absent from the United Kingdom during the space of one year shall, upon previously giving to the Secretary notice in writing of his intention, be exempt from the payment of his annual contribution during such absence.

SECT. XI. Ladies may be admitted as Fellows upon the same terms, with the same privileges, and under the same regulations in all respects as gentlemen.

SECT. XII. No Dividend, Gift, Division, or Bonus, shall be made by the Society, unto or between any of its Members.

CHAPTER II.

Withdrawing and Removal of Fellows.

SECT. I. Every Fellow, having paid all fees due to the Society, shall be at liberty to withdraw therefrom upon giving notice in writing to the President or Secretary.

SECT. II. Whenever it shall be proposed to remove any Fellow from the Society, the same shall be done by a resolution of Council, which shall be read at three successive Ordinary General Meetings, and be suspended in the intervals as in the case of Certificates, and at the last of the said Meetings the proposition shall be balloted for; and if eleven or more Fellows shall ballot, and two-thirds of the Fellows balloting shall vote for such Fellow's removal, he shall be removed from the Society accordingly.

CHAPTER III.

Privileges of Fellows.

SECT. I. The Fellows have the right to be present and to vote at all General Meetings; to propose Candidates

for admission into the Society as Fellows; and (under such regulations and restrictions as the Council may deem it expedient to adopt, subject to the approval of a General Meeting) to have personal access to the Gardens, Museum, and other places of a similar nature in the occupation of the Society; as also to introduce either in person or by signed orders, visitors to the same, according to the regulations of Council.

SECT. II. No Fellow shall be entitled to vote on any occasion until he shall have paid his Subscription for the then current year.

SECT. III. Any Fellow of the Society, by making application (in writing, if required) to the Secretary, may have the liberty of inspecting any of the manuscript books or papers belonging to the Society; the Secretary having it in his power, if he shall deem it expedient, to refer such application to the Council, by whose direction, should it be found necessary, the application may be refused, subject to an appeal to the Fellows at a General Meeting.

SECT. IV. Ladies who are Fellows of the Society have the right to vote by proxy at all General Meetings; having previously announced to the Secretary, in writing, their appointment of any Gentleman, being a Fellow of the Society, to be their proxy, who shall be registered as such accordingly, but who shall not be changed within the year, unless in the event of his ceasing to be a Fellow.

CHAPTER IV.

Of Honorary Members.

SECT. I. The Honorary Members of the Society shall be eminent and distinguished persons, subjects of the United Kingdom, and zealous patrons of Zoology, and shall not exceed Twelve in Number.

SECT. II. Every person proposed as an Honorary Member shall be recommended by the Council, and be balloted for and elected, and be liable to be removed, in

the like form and manner, and be subject to the same rules and restrictions as Fellows.

SECT. III. Honorary Members shall be exempted from the payment of fees and contributions; they shall have the privilege of attending the Meetings and visiting the Gardens, Museum, and other similar places open to Fellows; but they shall not be entitled to vote at the Meetings of the Society, nor enjoy any other rights or privileges than those above mentioned.

SECT. IV. Any *ex-officio* Honorary Member of the Society ceasing to be an Honorary Member, shall be eligible to be immediately elected by ballot as an ordinary Member, on being proposed at a Monthly Meeting.

CHAPTER V.

Of Foreign Members.

SECT. I. Every Foreigner, not being domiciled in the United Kingdom, who has distinguished himself as a Zoologist, or who has shown himself able and willing to promote the ends for which the Society is founded, may be elected a Foreign Member provided that the number of such Foreign Members do not exceed twenty-five.

SECT. II. Every person proposed to the Society as a Foreign Member shall be recommended and elected, and be liable to be removed in the like form and manner as Honorary Members.

SECT. III. Foreign Members shall be entitled to the same privileges, and be subject to the same rules and restrictions as Honorary Members.

CHAPTER VI.

Of Corresponding Members.

SECT. I. The Corresponding Members of the Society shall be constituted of such persons, not resident in England or Wales, as may show a willingness to promote the objects of the Society, and shall be recommended and

elected, and be liable to be removed in like form and manner as Honorary and Foreign Members.

SECT. II. Corresponding Members shall not exceed two hundred in number; they shall enjoy the same privileges, and be subject to the same rules and restrictions as Honorary and Foreign Members.

SECT. III. In case of Corresponding Members taking up their residence in England or Wales, their privileges shall cease at the expiration of two years from the date of the commencement of such residence, and their names shall thereupon be removed from the List. Provided always, that if the services of any Corresponding Member appear to the Council to deserve an extension of such privileges, the Council may grant it. Provided also, that Corresponding Members shall have the privilege of becoming Fellows without Ballot, on paying admission fees and annual subscriptions, or Compositions, at the rates paid at the period of their elections as Corresponding Members. Provided also, that any Corresponding Member of five years' standing and upwards, becoming resident in England and Wales, and applying to the Council to become a Fellow, shall be entitled to have his admission fee remitted.

SECT. IV. Corresponding Members of the Society are required to keep the Secretary informed of their addresses, or of that of some agents in London through whom communications may reach them. The name of any Corresponding Member, whose address or that of his agent, shall not be known for the space of two years shall be removed from the List, but may be restored again on his application to the Council on the occasion of the first vacancy that occurs.

CHAPTER VII.

Of the Annual General Meeting, and of the Election of the Council and Officers.

SECT. I. Notice of the time and place of the Annual General Meeting shall be advertised by the Council in four

or more of the public Newspapers, at least fourteen days before the same shall take place.

SECT. II. The course of proceeding at the Annual General Meeting, after the Chair has been taken, shall be as follows :—

1. The reading of the Minutes of the previous Annual Meeting.
2. The appointment of Scrutineers and opening of the Ballot.
3. The reading of the Auditors' Report.
4. The reading of the Annual Report of the Council.
5. To receive the Report of the Scrutineers on the result of the Ballot.

No other business shall be transacted at such Meeting.

SECT. III. The Council for the time being shall annually cause to be prepared two Balloting Lists, one of which (No. 1) is to contain the names of such Five Fellows as they shall recommend to be removed from, and of other five Fellows to be elected into the Council; and the other List (No. 2) is to contain the names of such Fellows as they shall recommend to fill the offices of President, Treasurer, and Secretary for the year ensuing; which Lists shall be read at the Monthly General Meeting in March in every year, and then fixed up in the Meeting-room of the Society for the space of fourteen days at least. And if any six or more Fellows shall desire to substitute the name or names of any other person or persons not exceeding five in number, then such as shall be contained in the said Lists to be removed from or elected into the Council, or to fill the respective offices of President, Treasurer, or Secretary, such six or more Fellows shall leave notice in writing at the house of the Society of the name or names they propose to substitute within seven days after the said Lists shall have been read. Balloting Lists shall, after the expiration of the said seven days, be printed according to the forms (Nos. 1 and 2) in the Schedule, in case no notice shall be previously left as aforesaid; but in case of any such notice or notices being

so left, then the name or names of the person or persons proposed to be substituted shall be added to the Lists respectively proposed by the Council, according to the forms (Nos. 3 and 4) in the Schedule; and such Lists shall be transmitted to every Fellow whose known residence shall be in London, or within ten miles therefrom, at least ten days before the Annual General Meeting shall take place.

SECT. IV. On the day of election each Fellow voting shall deliver to the person in the chair his Balloting List or Lists, who shall put the same into the respective Balloting Glasses to be provided for the occasion, the name of such Fellow being first entered by the Secretary or his Deputy.

Each voter, before he delivers his List or Lists, shall strike out the name or names of those persons recommended for whom he does not vote; and if more names shall be suffered to remain in any List than the number of persons to be elected or removed, such List shall be rejected, and in case the names suffered to remain shall be less than the number of vacancies to be supplied, those names only which shall remain in the List shall stand as voted for. The President shall appoint two or more Scrutineers, being Fellows present, not Members of the Council, to superintend the Ballots and Report the results to the Meeting.

SECT. V. In the event of any Cross-list being nominated the Ballot for the Council shall remain open for the space of one hour at the least; and the Ballot for the Officers for one half-hour at the least after the result of the Ballot for the Council shall have been declared.

SECT. VI. If from any cause any election shall not take place of persons to fill the Council or any of the officers aforesaid, then the Election of the Council and Officers, or the election of Officers as the case may be, shall be adjourned until the next convenient day; of which notice shall be given in like manner as is directed for the Annual General Meeting.

CHAPTER VIII.

Of the President and Vice-Presidents.

SECT. I. The business of the President shall be to preside at all the Meetings of the Society and Council, and regulate all the proceedings therein; and generally to execute or see to the execution of the By-Laws and Orders of the Society.

SECT. II. In case of his absence from any of the Meetings of the Society or Council, his place shall be filled by one of the Vice-Presidents, or by a Member of Council then present, who shall for the time being have all the authority privilege and power of the President. If no Member of Council shall be present at any Ordinary General Meeting, the Fellows present shall nominate and appoint to be Chairman such Fellow as they shall deem fit.

CHAPTER IX.

Of the Treasurer and the Accounts.

SECT. I. The Treasurer or his Deputy shall demand and receive for the use of the Society all moneys due or payable to the Society, and shall keep full and particular accounts of all sums so received.

SECT. II. An Account in the name of the Society shall be opened, and all moneys shall be deposited at a Bankers to be appointed by the Council.

SECT. III. Every sum of money exceeding £5 shall be paid by an order made in Council, and by a Cheque upon the Banker, which shall be signed by two Members in Council, and Countersigned by the Secretary or Assistant Secretary.

SECT. IV. An account shall be opened with every Fellow of the Society, stating the several sums payable by him, and the times of payment of the same; the particulars also of all sums of money received and disbursed in the several departments of the Society shall

be entered, and the Books and Vouchers shall be open to the inspection of every Fellow.

SECT. V. The Accounts shall be made up to the end of every year, and be audited in the February following by a Committee to be appointed at the Ordinary General Meeting in January, and to consist of seven Fellows of the Society, not Members of the Council, nor to be elected into the Council during the ensuing year: three of the said Committee to be a quorum.

SECT. VI. The Auditors shall have the power of calling for a statement of the debts, credits, and assets of the Society, and for any information relative thereto.

SECT. VII. The Committee for auditing the Accounts shall make their report to the Society upon the day of the Annual General Meeting, stating not only the balance in the Banker's hands, but also the general state of the Funds of the Society; which report shall be printed for distribution among the Fellows.

CHAPTER X.

Of the Secretary.

SECT. I. The Secretary, or in his absence the Vice-Secretary, shall have inspection over the Assistant Secretary, Clerks, Keepers, Gardeners, and other the Servants of the Society, and shall see generally that the By-Laws and Orders of the Society and Council be executed.

SECT. II. The Secretary shall conduct the scientific correspondence of the Society.

CHAPTER XI.

Of the Assistant Secretary, Clerks, Keepers, and Servants.

SECT. I. The Assistant Secretary, Clerks, Keepers, Gardeners, and other the Servants of the Society, with their respective salaries and duties, shall be subject to the Orders of the Council. They shall not under any pretence

whatever receive any perquisite or profit from their connection with the Society, excepting what shall be expressly allowed by the Council; and any misconduct in this particular shall subject them to immediate dismissal.

SECT. II. Every Servant of the Society receiving or paying money on behalf of the Society shall be required, before he enters upon the duties of his office, to give security for the due execution thereof, in such penalty, and with such surety or sureties, as the Council may deem expedient.

CHAPTER XII.

Of the Ordinary General Meetings of the Society.

SECT. I. The Ordinary General Meetings of the Society shall be of two kinds: 1st, For the Despatch of General Business. 2nd, For the transaction of Scientific Business.

SECT. II. No stranger shall be permitted to be present during any General Meeting of the Society, unless by permission of the person in the Chair, on the recommendation of some Fellow.

SECT. III. The Ordinary General Meetings for the despatch of General Business shall be held on the Thursday following the third Wednesday in every month of the year, except September and October, beginning at Four o'clock P.M., or on such other day and hour as the Council shall from time to time direct.

SECT. IV. The ordinary course of proceeding at the General Meetings for General Business, after the Chair has been taken, shall be as follows: 1st, The names of the strangers present shall be notified. 2nd, The minutes of the proceedings of the previous Meeting for General Business shall be read and submitted for confirmation. 3rd, Ballots for the Election of Fellows and other Members shall take place. 4th, A report shall be made by the Council, giving an account of the proceedings in the several departments since the last Meeting for General Business; a list of the presents which have been received since that time (such presents, when convenient, being exhibited); and an abstract of the account current of

receipts and disbursements. And lastly, recommendations of candidates for ballot shall be announced.

SECT. V. When any motion not relating to elections or the construction of the By-Laws shall be proposed for consideration, it shall be reduced to writing and delivered to the Secretary, and shall thereupon be read from the Chair, and be fixed up in the Meeting-room, and at the next meeting for General Business the question shall be put to the vote or ballot if demanded.

SECT. VI. The Ordinary General Meetings for the transaction of Scientific Business shall be held twice a month in every month in the year, except July, August, September, and October, beginning at half-past eight o'clock P.M.

SECT. VII. The ordinary course of proceeding at the General Meetings for Scientific Business, after the Chair has been taken, shall be as follows: 1st, The names of the strangers present shall be notified. 2nd, The minutes of the proceedings of the previous Meeting for Scientific Business shall be read. 3rd, Correspondence with Scientific bodies and individuals shall be read. 4th, New or interesting subjects of Zoology shall be exhibited. 5th, Papers shall be read and communications received on subjects of Zoology and Animal Physiology. And 6th, Discussions shall be had on the various subjects which shall have been brought before the Meeting.

CHAPTER XIII.

Of the Publications.

SECT. I. An account of the business transacted at the Meetings of the Society for Scientific purposes, and the communications made to those Meetings shall be published under the title "Proceedings of the Scientific Meetings of the Zoological Society of London."

SECT. II. The Publications of the Society shall be supplied to Fellows, and Corresponding and Foreign Members of the Society, upon payment of a Subscription of One Guinea for the same in advance before the Anniversary Meeting in each year.

SECT. III. The Fellows, Foreign Members and Corresponding Members of the Society, shall have the right of purchasing any of the Society's publications at three-fourths of the price charged for them to the Public.

SECT. IV. The superintendence of the Publications and the arrangement of the Agenda for the General Meetings for Scientific Business, shall be entrusted to a Committee, which shall consist of nine Fellows and the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Secretary, and Vice-Secretary.

SECT. V. Of the nine Members of the Committee of Publication, who shall not be Officers of the Society, three shall be annually removed from the Committee and three other Fellows shall be elected in their stead at the Annual General Meeting, lists of the Members recommended to be removed and of the Fellows recommended to be elected being prepared by the Committee and submitted to the Council previously to the first Ordinary General Meeting in April. The proceedings at such elections shall be regulated according to the By-Laws for regulating the election of the Council.

CHAPTER XIV.

Of the Council.

SECT. I. The Council shall meet at such times as shall be appointed by the President, or in his absence by one of the Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, or Secretary; due and sufficient notice being previously sent to every Member.

SECT. II. No business shall be transacted in Council unless there be Five or more Members present.

SECT. III. The ordinary method of voting in Council shall be by show of hands; but a ballot shall be taken in cases prescribed by any regulations of the Council, or when demanded by any Member present.

SECT. IV. The majority of votes shall decide every question; and in case of an equality of votes, the question shall be adjourned.

SECT. V. Any Member of Council who shall be personally interested in the question before the Council shall withdraw during the consideration and decision of the same.

SECT. VI. The Council shall present and cause to be read to the Annual General Meeting a report on the general concerns of the Society for the preceding year; and such Report, or the substance thereof, shall be printed, under the direction of the Council, and be transmitted to the Fellows.

CHAPTER XV.

Of the Common Seal and Deeds.

SECT. I. Every Deed or Writing to which the Common Seal shall be affixed, shall be passed and sealed in Council, and signed by the President, Vice-President, or Member of Council in the Chair, and countersigned by the Secretary.

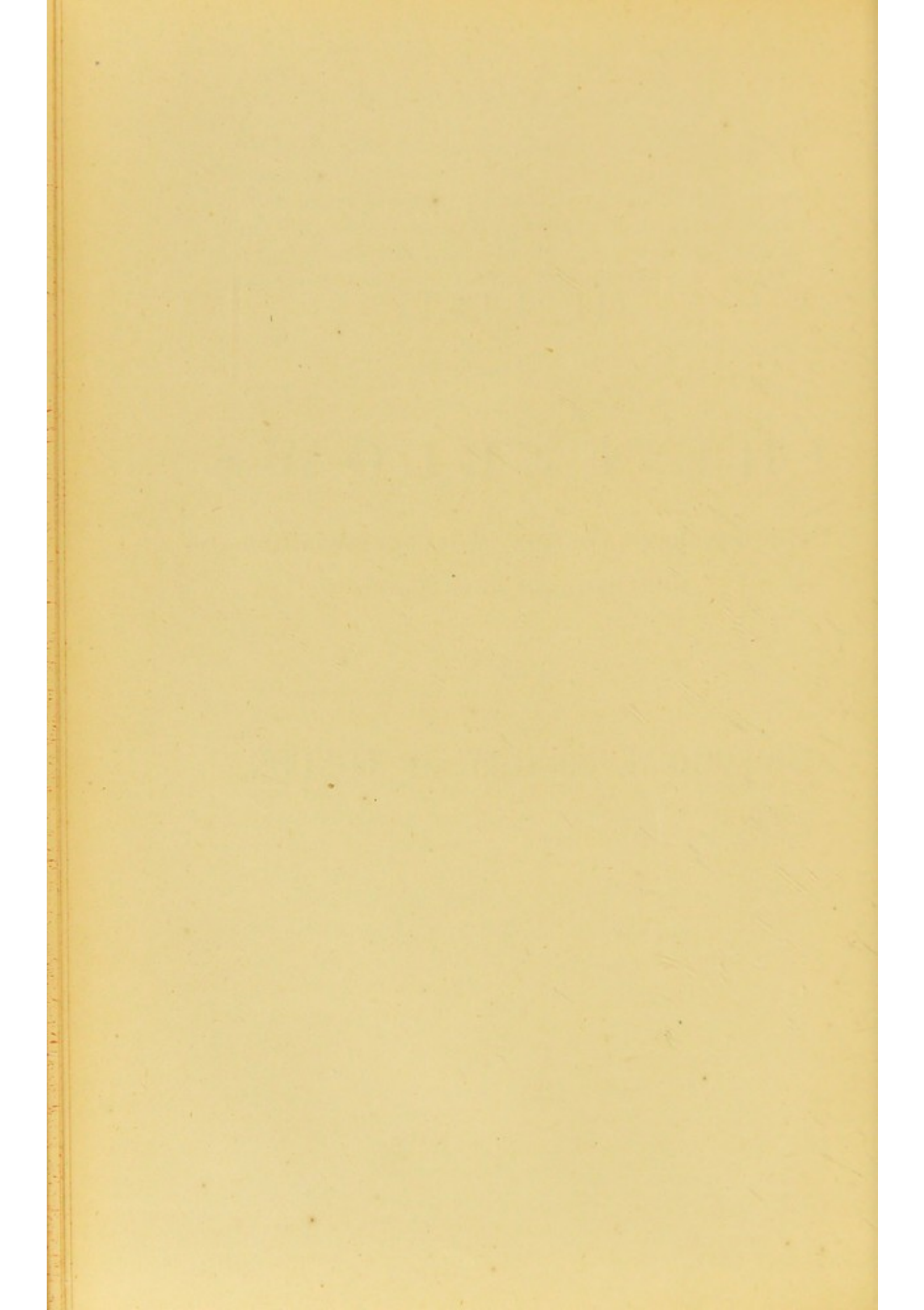

V. A SHORT HISTORY

OF THE

ZOOLOGICAL SOCIETY OF LONDON.

PRELIMINARY REMARKS.

THE first idea, so far as is known, of founding a Zoological Society in London originated with Sir Stamford Raffles. From the 'Life,' written by his widow,* it appears that so long ago as in 1816, Raffles "meditated the establishment of a Society on the principle of the Jardin des Plantes, which, finally on his return from the East, he succeeded in forming in 1826, under the title of The Zoological Society of London."

On Nov. 29th, 1823, the birthday of John Ray, a club was founded in connection with the Linnean Society by certain of the Fellows desirous of promoting the study of Zoology. It was called the "Zoological Club of the Linnean Society," and was an important factor in the establishment of the Zoological Society. Its original members numbered twenty-eight, and of these the names of fifteen appear in the first List of Members of the Zoological Society of London (Jan. 1829), as follows:—

The published Addresses* of the Chairmen of the Zoological Club at their Anniversary Meetings (1826-29) contain many laudatory references to the newly-established Society, and on the occasion of its dissolution in 1829, Mr. Vigors, its last Chairman, said:—

“One more topic of congratulation remains to be noticed. I referred to it when I began to address you, and I return to it with heartfelt interest in my closing words. I allude to the establishment of the Zoological Society. On the eve of the dissolution of this Club it is a theme not merely of consolation, but of triumph, that we have been one embryo of that higher body which has now sprung into the perfect form. The individuals who are now about to separate

will carry in their recollection, to their latest day, the share which they have had in this great consummation."

Early in 1824 a detailed prospectus of the proposed Society was privately circulated, and in July a Committee was appointed. A circular issued in February 1825, contains the names of 151 subscribers, including those of the first three Presidents (Sir Stamford Raffles, the Marquess of Lansdowne, and Lord Stanley, afterwards Earl of Derby), the first Treasurer (Mr. Joseph Sabine, F.R.S.), and the first Secretary (Mr. Nicholas Aylward Vigors, F.R.S.). In March a revised copy of the Prospectus was issued, and the objects of the Society were defined to be "for introducing and domesticating new Breeds or Varieties of Animals, such as Quadrupeds, Birds, or Fishes, likely to be useful in Common Life, and for forming a general Collection in Zoology."

In a letter to his cousin, the Rev. Thomas Raffles, D.D., bearing date March 9, 1825, Sir Stamford says of the Society: "Sir Humphrey (*sic*) Davy and myself are the progenitors; and while he looks more to the practical and immediate utility to the country gentlemen, my attention is rather directed to the scientific department."

The terms of admission suggested were either an entrance fee of £5, with the annual payment of £2 on January 1, or a donation of £25 or upwards.

The first Office of the Society, No. 4 Regent Street, must have been taken early in 1826, for Sir Stamford Raffles reported the fact to the Committee held on

April 28th. On the following day the first General Meeting was held at the House of the Horticultural Society, Regent Street, when Sir Stamford Raffles was unanimously elected President.

The first meeting of the Council was held on May 5th, when Committees were appointed for framing by-laws, for acquiring a site for breeding fishes and rearing water-fowl, and for the management of the grounds in Regent's Park, the menagerie, the museum, and the library. It was resolved that "an arrangement be made with the Keepers at Exeter Change and the Tower for taking charge of such animals as may be presented to the Society till their own establishment is completed." The first living animals to come into the possession of the Society were a Griffon Vulture (*Gyps fulvus*) and a White-headed Eagle (*Haliaëtus leucocephalus*), presented by Mr. Joshua Brookes, and a "female Deer from Sangor." On June 3rd, the house No. 33 Bruton Street was taken for the Offices and Museum, and here living animals were kept even after the Gardens were opened. There is an amusing story in Broderip's 'Zoological Recreations' of a Wanderoo Monkey (*Macacus silenus*) kept in Bruton Street, which snatched the wig from the head of a bishop and put it on his own.

At this time the sum of £5,000 was appropriated for the Gardens in Regent's Park, the plans of which, prepared by Decimus Burton, were approved of, and the sum of £1,000 for the Museum. About this time also Cross, of Exeter Change, offered his services to the Society, and wished to sell his collection, but the Council "were not prepared to consider his proposal;" and Mr. Samuel Laman Blanchard was appointed clerk at £100 a year.

At the meeting of July 8th, the death of Sir Stamford Raffles (on July 5th) was reported. The Museum at the house in Bruton Street must have been opened about this date, for cards of invitation to view it were issued to members of both Houses of Parliament, and to such other persons as might be "likely to forward the views of the Society."

The income of 1826 (including that of 1825) was £1,829, the expenditure £679, the number of Fellows on December 31st was 342.

1827.

On March 7th, 1827, Henry, third Marquess of Lansdowne, was elected President of the Society in the place of Sir Stamford Raffles, deceased, and held this office until his resignation in 1831.

In April 1827 ladies were declared eligible as Fellows of the Society. It was also determined to appoint a number of Corresponding Members, and fifteen persons were recommended for election. On April 24th, the Sumatran Collection of the late Sir Stamford Raffles was presented to the Society by Lady Raffles, who was thereupon made an Honorary Member. About this time a circular was issued to foreign correspondents, asking for assistance, and printed directions for preserving animals and packing specimens of all kinds were sent to collectors abroad. Towards the end of the year it was resolved to take steps to procure a Charter, and Mr. Bichenov and Mr. Septimus Burton were instructed to prepare the draft of it. A gardener was engaged for the Regent's Park Garden.

The income of 1827 amounted to £4,079, and the expenditure to £4,375. The number of Fellows in 1827 was 602.

1828.

On Feb. 25th, 1828, the first sheet of 'Occurrences' was received at the Offices, No. 33 Bruton Street, from the Gardens. It contained the following particulars:—

Menagerie.—Received 11 wild ducks, from the lake,* caught for the purpose of pinioning and then to be returned.

Received 6 silver-haired rabbits from Mr. Blake.

Otter died in consequence of a diseased tail.

Emu laid her fourth egg on 24th.

All animals and birds well.

Works.—Pit for bear, house for llamas in progress.

Boundary wall for supporting the bank next the bears' pit begun.

Servants.—All on duty.

No. of Visitors.—Four.

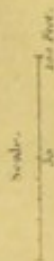
Particular Visitor.—Lord Auckland.

The sheet of 'Occurrences,' as the daily journal is called, has been continued in nearly the same fashion ever since, and is sent down to the Office every day. The set of 'Occurrences' at the Society's Office is complete from the commencement.

On the 27th April, Mr. Edward Amond Johnson was appointed Superintendent of the Gardens, and the Gardens and Museum were opened to the public on payment. The Council had resolved that "strangers be admitted to the Gardens by the written order of a Fellow on payment of 1s. each; the holder of a ticket to be allowed to introduce any number of companions at 1s. each."

About this time also the late Mr. John Gould, F.R.S.,

* This was the large lake in Regent's Park, which for some time was in the occupation of the Society.





was appointed Curator and Preserver to the Museum. The first catalogue of the Mammals exhibited in the Museum bears date June 24th of this year, though a manuscript note on the title suggests that it did not actually appear till July. There were then 450 specimens of Mammals in it, arranged on the Quinary system—*Feræ*, *Primates*, *Pecora*, *Glires* and *Cetacea*.

In July 1828 plans for the houses in the Gardens were prepared, and on Aug. 7th plans for buildings on the north side of the road were submitted to the Council, and referred by them to the Commissioners of Woods and Forests. In October 1828 a stable and room were hired in Park Street, for the reception of animals that needed more protection than could be afforded them in the Menagerie; and in the following month it was ordered that a list of the animals be kept from January 1st of the following year.

The income of 1828 amounted to £11,515, and the expenditure to £10,044. The number of Fellows was 1,226. The admissions to the Gardens were 98,605.

1829.

The first printed list of members bears date January 1st, 1829, and contains the names of 1,294 ordinary Fellows, 3 Honorary Members and 37 Corresponding Members.

The most important event of this year was the grant on March 27th of a Charter to the Society by His Majesty King George IV. The Marquess of Lansdowne, Joseph Sabine, and Nicholas Aylward Vigors were named in it as

the first President, Treasurer, and Secretary, respectively, of the incorporated Society, to remain in office till April 29th, on which date, or as near thereto as conveniently might be, the Annual General Meeting was to be held in this and in every successive year. Mr. Rees was appointed Assistant Secretary, and Mr. Alexander Miller Superintendent.

In 1829 negotiations were completed with Mr. Pullmer and the Corporation of Kingston for the occupation of a farm of about thirty-three acres, in a "beautiful situation just under the wall of Richmond Park." The farm was established (1) to relieve the menagerie in Regent's Park by removing from it such animals as required a quiet place to breed in, to receive duplicates, and animals that needed a more extended range; (2) to rear domesticated quadrupeds and birds, with a view to effecting improvement in quality, and to domesticate others not yet introduced to our poultry or farm yards; and (3) to conduct experiments in all matters relating to breeding and points of animal physiology connected therewith. Arrangements were made with the Board of Woods and Forests for the secure occupation of the Garden within the Park, and for that of other land on the north side of the Inner Circle, with a frontage of 1,200 feet, which contained about five acres. The tunnel connecting the two Gardens was built this year, and a building was erected in the North Garden, in which some of the animals were kept during the winter.

The income of 1829 amounted to £13,994, and the expenditure to £12,414, the number of Fellows was 1,528. The admissions to the Gardens were 189,913.

1830.

In 1830 Mr. Decimus Burton was appointed architect to the Society. The principal works executed were the laying out of the North Garden, and the erection there of houses and sheds for Deer, Antelopes, Zebras, Ostriches, Kangaroos, and Swine. In the South Garden a pit with a pond was provided for the Polar Bear, and a den and pond were made for Seals.

At this time His Majesty King William IV. signified his pleasure to become the Patron of the Society, and presented to it all the animals belonging to the Royal Menagerie in Windsor Park, which were the following:—

Mammals.—14 Wapiti, 3 Axis and 1 Sambur deer, 1 American Roe, 3 Gnus, 2 Nylghaies, 2 Llamas, 4 Cashmere goats, 3 Barbary Goats, 1 Cape Ram, 7 Zebus, 2 Mountain Zebras, 2 Burchell's Zebras, 2 Hybrids between both species of Zebra and the Common Ass, 1 Wild Boar, 1 Peccary, and 13 Kangaroos.

Birds.—1 King Vulture, 2 Sea Eagles, 1 Peregrine Falcon, 2 Great Eared Owls, 4 Macaws, 2 Cockatoos, 1 Scarlet Lory, 2 Golden Parrakeets, 1 Rosehill Parrakeet, 5 Widow birds, 11 Emus, 1 Curassow, 42 Peafowls of different varieties, 4 Crowned Cranes, 1 Scarlet Ibis, 1 Spoonbill, and 7 Cereopsis Geese.

Owing to this great accession to their stock, the Council was now enabled to offer some duplicates to the Society about to be formed in Dublin, and to the Royal Menagerie in Paris. On July 21st a 'Committee of Science and Correspondence' was appointed "for the purpose of suggesting and discussing questions and experi-

ments in animal physiology, of exchanging communications with the Corresponding Members of the Society, of promoting the importation of rare and useful animals, and of receiving and preparing reports upon matters connected with Zoology." Meetings were ordered to take place on the second and fourth Tuesday of the month. The first of those Meetings was held on Nov. 9th, 1830, when the Chair was taken by Mr. R. W. Hay, and Mr. (afterwards Sir Richard) Owen read the first part of a paper on the Anatomy of the Orang. These meetings subsequently developed into the General Meetings of the Society for Scientific Business, and the 'Proceedings of the Committee of Science and Correspondence' were converted in 1833 into the 'Proceedings of the Zoological Society of London,' which have been continued, under slightly different titles, ever since.

The income of 1830 amounted to £15,958, and the expenditure to £14,615. The number of Fellows was 1,769, the admissions to the Gardens were 224,745, and to the Museum 14,323.

At the Anniversary Meeting of 1831 the Marquess of Lansdowne resigned the office of President, and Lord Stanley (afterwards 13th Earl of Derby) was elected in his place.

The King presented to the Society the collection of animals in the Tower, expressing a wish that such as

were not required for the Regent's Park Collection should be sent to the Zoological Society of Dublin. The armadillos bred in the Gardens, and "hopes were entertained of this animal, so valuable as an article of food, "becoming naturalised in this country." The collection formed by the late King (George IV.) at Cumberland Lodge, together with specimens obtained during expeditions to North America (under Sir John Franklin), and Patagonia (under Captain King), were handed over to the Museum by the Government; and Mr. Gould presented to the Society his collection of birds from the Himalayas.

At the Gardens the chief works carried out were the Elephant paddock and pond, the carriage sweep, the exit turnstile from the north side, a house for the under-keepers and the Clock tower.

The income of 1831 amounted to £17,663, the expenditure to £15,913, the number of Fellows was 2,048. The admissions to the Gardens were 258,936, and to the Museum 11,626.

The apartments for the under-keepers in the Gardens were completed this year; the only other works of importance were the fencing in of the North Garden, and the formation of the ponds in the South Garden. Some inconvenience was experienced at this time from the crowded state of the Society's House in Bruton Street, and the Council were anxious to obtain more space for their Museum.

In this year 25 mammals and 26 birds, new to the collection, were exhibited. The Farm Committee published a Report, from which it appeared that the increase of stock by breeding was satisfactory. They attributed the increased outlay to the animals received from the Royal Menagerie at Windsor; but expressed their opinion that this additional expenditure had conduced to the general welfare of the Society. On June 28th a sale by auction of the duplicates from the Menagerie and Farm took place in the Gardens. Fifty lots were offered; one lot (a pair of emus), on which was a reserve of £10, was bought in; the remaining forty-six fetched £93 18s. 6d. The highest price made was £18 10s. for a seven-year old male wapiti, and the lowest 3s. for a pair of bald-head pigeons.

An alteration of the by-laws took place in this year, by which the annual contribution of Fellows was raised from £2 to £3.

The income of 1832 amounted to £15,493, and the expenditure to £13,006. The number of Fellows was 2,309. The admissions to the Gardens were 218,585, and to the Museum 7,134. In the accounts of this year the first entry of money received for 'Proceedings' (£2) occurs. At the Anniversary Meeting Mr. Edward T. Bennett was elected Secretary in place of Mr. Vigors, who had resigned the office.

1833.

In February 1833 Gould was appointed Superintendent of the ornithological department of the Museum. Dr. Grant delivered before the Society a course of lectures on the

structure and classification of animals. A Medical Superintendent was appointed to visit the Gardens at stated periods, in order to record the diseases of the animals and the remedies employed, and to report thereon to the Council, so as to collect a body of facts for future guidance.

The Farm at Kingston was given up in 1833, and the land placed in the hands of an agent for disposal.

The principal works were the transfer of the aviaries from the Farm to the North Garden, and the erection of a Parrot House.

In this year the President sent from his private collection at Knowsley various animals desirable for that of the Society. This year was also marked by the loss of the fine collection of Indian pheasants and other birds, made by Mr. B. H. Hodgson, British Resident in Nepaul. Nearly a hundred were sent down to Calcutta, but most of them died on the journey or at Calcutta, and not one reached England alive. Nine species of mammals and thirteen of birds new to the collection were exhibited in 1833. Duplicates were sent from the stores in Bruton Street to several provincial Museums.

On January 8th, 1833, the first General Meeting of the Society for the transaction of Scientific Business was held under the new by-laws, whereby these Meetings were ordered to replace those of the Committee of Science and Correspondence, commenced on Nov. 9th, 1830. The Chair was taken by Mr. Joseph Sabine, Vice-President, and papers were read by Mr. Bennett, Mr. Yarrell, Mr. Broderip, and Dr. Grant.

In August 1833, the first part of the first volume of the Quarto 'Transactions' was published.

The income of 1833 amounted to £14,843, and the expenditure to £13,154. The number of Fellows was 2,470. The admissions to the Gardens were 211,343, and to the Museum 5,333.

1834.

In 1834 an additional space of ten acres of ground, along the south western verge of the South Garden was acquired from the Commissioners of Woods and Forests at a yearly rent of £6 6s. per acre. This was separated from Regent's Park by a strained wire fence, and a hedge and fence were made on the eastern boundary of the south part of the Gardens, from a little east of what is now the South Entrance to the Outer Circle Road, and that portion of the South Garden was laid out by the gardeners. Other works carried out were the sinking of a well and the erection of an engine-house in the North Garden, and the setting up of turnstile gates at the entrance.

Examples of twelve species of Mammals and twenty-six species of birds were exhibited for the first time. Of the former the most important was an Indian Rhinoceros, for which the sum of £1,050 was paid. Three Curassows were hatched at Stubton Hall, Lincolnshire, from eggs laid by birds belonging to the Society, and entrusted to the care of Sir Robert Heron. These were probably the first of this bird ever reared in England. Negotiations were carried on for the disposal of the Farm at Kingston.

The first volume of the 'Proceedings of the Zoological Society of London,' containing an account of the business carried on at the General Meetings for Scientific Business in 1833 was completed and published early this year.

The income of 1834 amounted to £16,833, and the expenditure to £12,980. The number of Fellows was 2,781. The admissions to the Gardens were 208,583, and

to the Museum 4,939. In the accounts of this year the first entry of any rent received for the refreshment rooms (£45) appears.

1835.

In 1835 a house was built for elephants and rhinoceroses in the North Garden, near the spot where the present Elephant-house now stands; and a little westward sheds were erected to serve as a protection for the larger deer. These were near the pheasantries which adjoined the road, opposite the site of the present Zebra House. The ten acres lately acquired in the South Garden were separated from the "Mall" (now the "Broad Walk") by a wire fence, and an exit gate was made at the South-eastern corner, near what is now the South Entrance.

In 1835 His Majesty the King presented to the Society a fine young Indian Elephant, and the specimen till then living in the Gardens was sent to the Dublin Zoological Society. A Chimpanzee (*Anthropopithecus niger*), as also ten other species of Mammals and ten of birds, were exhibited for the first time.

The fourth part of the Society's Quarto 'Transactions,' completing the first volume and containing the title and index, was issued in 1835. It contained altogether forty-three Zoological memoirs, amongst the authors of which were the well-known names of Yarrell, Ogilby, Bennett, Gould, Bell, Owen, MacLeay, Broderip, Rüppell and Lowe.

The income of 1835 amounted to £16,033, and the expenditure to £13,330. The number of Fellows was 2,941; the admissions to the Gardens were 210,068, and to the Museum 4,138.

1836.

On May 24th, 1836, four Giraffes (three males and a female) arrived at the Gardens, in charge of M. Thibaut, who had obtained them for the Society in Kordofan. They were the origin of the famous herd which died out in 1881. Of the seventeen Giraffes of this herd subsequently born in the Gardens, one was presented to the Dublin Society in 1844, five were sold at prices ranging from £150 to £450, and eleven died in the Menagerie (*see* P.Z.S., 1882, p. 257). The first Giraffe brought alive to England was that presented to His Majesty George IV. by the Pacha of Egypt (Mohammed Ali).

Early in the year 1836 a new house, No. 28 Leicester Square, was taken for the Offices and Museum, and the transfer thither from No. 33 Bruton Street (which was given up) was effected during the months of April, May, and June. The new house had been formerly occupied by John Hunter, and contained his famous museum till its removal to the Royal College of Surgeons in 1799. The Alhambra now stands on the site. Mr. G. R. Waterhouse was engaged as Curator of the Museum. The number of specimens of vertebrated animals exhibited in it at this time was 6,720.

The chief works at the Gardens in 1836 were the erection of the Giraffe house and the removal of the adjoining pheasantry. In June a descriptive article on the Gardens appeared in the "Quarterly Review." In recording the donations in their Report the Council called

the "special attention of the Members to a donation by H.R.H. the Princess Victoria of two Musk Deer." The interest thus manifested in the Society by the Princess, who as Queen became Patroness, ceased only at the close of her long and glorious reign.

Some beginning was made in the formation of a Library this year, and the number of volumes it contained is put down at 427.

The income of 1836 amounted to £19,123, and expenditure to £19,637. The number of Fellows was 3,057; the admissions to the Gardens were 263,392, and to the Museum 3,660. Mr. E. T. Bennett, the Secretary, died in August, 1836, and the well-known naturalist, William Yarrell, was appointed to fill the vacant post.

1837.

In 1837 Her Majesty Queen Victoria signified her pleasure to become Patroness of the Society. At the Gardens improvements were made in the Giraffe-house, and a cage was put up at its western end for an Orang (a female purchased for £100), the first exhibited since 1830. Examples of seven other species of mammals and seven of birds were also exhibited for the first time in this year.

Besides other valuable donations, the Museum received two perfect skins of the Apteryx from the New Zealand Association, and from the President, the Earl of Derby, the body of an example of the same bird, which formed the subject of Owen's famous paper.

In this year Mr. Gould resigned his position as ornitho-

logical curator, on leaving England for Australia in order to make researches for his work on the birds of that country, and was elected a Corresponding Member.

The income of 1837 amounted to £13,960, and the expenditure to £14,350. The number of Fellows was 3,106. The admissions to the Gardens were 173,778, and to the Museum, 4,431.

1838.

In 1838 the Rev. John Barlow, F.R.S., became Secretary in the place of William Yarrell, who resigned. In this year a residence for the Superintendent was provided at the Gardens, the rooms hitherto occupied by the keepers being fitted up for him, while accommodation for them was found in the Giraffe-house. The Curator of the Museum became Assistant Zoological Secretary, and the Assistant Curator was dispensed with.

At the Gardens a clerk of the works was appointed, to act also as architect, and the cultivation of the Gardens and the laying out of the walks was contracted for.

In 1838 ten mammals and eighteen birds were exhibited for the first time, together with nine reptiles and two batrachians. A new catalogue of the Museum, prepared by Mr. Waterhouse, was published ; in this the Quinarian arrangement formerly adopted was dropped.

The income of 1838 amounted to £14,094, and the expenditure to £12,588. The number of Fellows was 3,081. The admissions to the Gardens in 1838 were 179,197.

1839.

In July 1839 the Rev. John Barlow resigned the Secretaryship, and was succeeded by Mr. William Ogilby, who retained that position till 1847. In the same year, in response to a petition, the Crown granted the Society a reduction of the rent paid for the Gardens, by which an annual saving of £243 11s. 6d. was effected. A Monkey-house was erected on the spot where the Eagles' Aviary now stands, though the outside-cages for the animals in fine weather were not finished till 1840.

On June 19th a young male Giraffe was born, the first recorded instance of this species breeding in captivity, but it died on the ninth day from a sudden attack of inflammation. Tuberculosis attacked the monkeys seriously in their new house, and a number of the commoner species and two Gibbons died from this disease.

Twenty-two mammals (of which seven were of new species) and twenty-one birds were exhibited for the first time in 1839. Owing to the limited space for the Museum, and the general inconvenience of the premises in Leicester Square, referred to by the Council in their Report, little was added to the Library.

The income of 1839 amounted to £13,431, and the expenditure to £13,637. The number of Fellows was 3,038. The admissions to the Gardens in 1839 were 158,432, and to the Museum 3,716.

1840.

At the Gardens, in 1840, the external cages were added to the Monkey House. Examples of fourteen species of mammals (of which one was new to science) and of nine species of birds were exhibited for the first time. From Mr. Hugh Cuming, the well-known conchologist, several specimens were received, among which were a fine Argus Pheasant, believed to be the first living example of this species seen in Europe, a Fire-backed Pheasant, and a Gibbon. Capt. Belcher, R.N., presented a Babirusa, the first seen alive in England.

There were numerous donations to the Museum in 1840, and the Library received many additions by donations and exchanges.

The income of 1840 amounted to £12,732, and the expenditure to £11,838. The number of Fellows was 2,994. The admissions to the Gardens were 141,009, and to the Museum 3,901.

1841.

In 1841, a considerable inconvenience having been caused by the pulling down of the houses adjoining the Museum, the Council determined to give up the lease of

No. 28 Leicester Square at Midsummer. The offices were then transferred to 57 Pall Mall, and the Museum was removed temporarily to a warehouse in Dufour's Place, Broad Street, Golden Square. There was also a rearrangement of the ground held from the Crown for the Gardens. The Society surrendered the strip on the north bank of the Canal, and a portion at the east end of the North Garden was exchanged for a corresponding portion at the west end. Permission was granted by the Crown to extend the landscape-gardening over and to erect buildings on the ten acres of pasturage ground adjoining the South Garden. The Council also determined to erect a building for the Museum in the Gardens, and a design for it was provisionally adopted. The donations to the Menagerie were larger than in preceding years. Mr. J. Brooke, C.M.Z.S. (afterwards Rajah Brooke) sent to the Society five Orangs from Borneo, but unfortunately they all died on the passage. On May 27th, a young male Giraffe was born—the first ever reared in captivity.

The second volume of 'Transactions,' issued in five parts, was completed this year. It contained altogether twenty-six memoirs, amongst the authors of which were Bell, Yarrell, F. Cuvier, Waterhouse, Westwood, Cantor and Sykes.

The income of 1841 amounted to £11,611, and the expenditure to £10,931. The number of Fellows was 2,819. The admissions to the Gardens were 132,616.

1842.

In 1842 no works of importance were carried out at the Gardens, but plans were prepared for the new

Carnivora Terrace. The Queen presented a young Leopard to the Society, and there were very many other donations. From the President, the Earl of Derby, was received among many other animals a female hybrid between the Mountain Zebra and the Kiang. Examples of twelve species of mammals and of fourteen species of birds were exhibited for the first time. The Museum and the Library received numerous contributions; but owing to the inconvenient situation of the apartments temporarily occupied by the Society, the scientific meetings and the publications were somewhat interfered with.

The income of 1842 amounted to £10,087, and the expenditure to £9,721. The number of Fellows was 2,630. The admissions to the Gardens were 107,459. The Museum was closed to the public this year.

1843.

The new Carnivora Terrace, extending from the Bear Pit to the steps, was completed, and the animals transferred to the dens in September, 1843. The effect of more air and increased exercise became visible almost immediately. There was a large number of donations in 1843, the President heading the list. Eighteen mammals, five birds, and four reptiles were exhibited for the first time. Jenny, the orang, died, having lived at the Gardens for four years, about twice as long "as any individual of the species was ever known to live in Europe before" at that period. Part of the Zoological Collection was removed to the new building in the North Gardens, which was opened to the public without extra charge.

A new house, No. 11, Hanover Square, was taken for the offices in 1843, and afforded "every accommodation required by the Society." Cases were placed in the Council Room for some of the more valuable objects of the preserved collection, and in the Secretary's room for the Library. One result of the removal to more convenient premises was a revival of interest in the Scientific Meetings. On some evenings the rooms were barely sufficient to afford accommodation to the visitors. This was especially the case during the reading of Prof. Owen's papers on *Dinornis*, and of Dr. Falconer's discourse on *Colossochelys atlas*, the gigantic Tortoise of the subhimalayan strata.

The income of 1843 amounted to £9,137, and the expenditure to £12,858. The number of Fellows was 2,410. The admissions to the Gardens were 98,280.

1844.

In 1844 the Polar Bears' den with the enclosure and bath was the only work of importance undertaken at the Gardens. The Council reported a great improvement in the health of the Carnivora since they had been removed to the open dens in the Terrace. There was a large list of donations. Examples of twenty-two species of mammals and of twenty-four birds (including several Parrots and Lories) were exhibited for the first time. A pair of White-headed Sea-eagles nested in the aviaries. The Council established premiums for various descriptions of poultry, in order to carry out one of the objects in the foundation of the Society—the improvements of breeds of domestic

animals ; and there was some extension of the promenades for the members and their friends. The removal of the Museum to the Gardens was completed ; and there were numerous donations to it of preserved specimens, and of books to the Library.

The income of 1844 amounted to £8,658, and the expenditure to £10,999. The number of Fellows was 2,217. The admissions to the Gardens were 101,527.

1845.

In 1845 the Clock-tower was reconstructed and the drainage of the Gardens was relaid. An *Echidna* (*Echidna hystrix*), the first specimen exhibited alive in Europe, was added to the collection. The list of animals exhibited for the first time was very small, including only one mammal (a Falkland Island wolf) and two birds.

Mr. Louis Fraser, the Curator, resigned his post in the Museum in 1845, and the care of the collection devolved on two subordinate officers, with occasional assistance.

The income of 1845 amounted to £8,831, and the expenditure to £9,290. The number of Fellows was 2,067. The admissions to the Gardens were 104,908, including 5,293 admissions to the Promenades.

1846.

In 1846 little work of importance was carried on at the Gardens. The list of species exhibited for the first time included five mammals, eleven birds, and one reptile. A young Condor was hatched, from an egg laid in the aviary, but the chick only lived three weeks.

In October, 1846, the largest of the Giraffes died, having been upwards of eleven years in confinement.

The chief work at the Museum was the rearrangement of unmounted specimens to render them available for study.

The income of 1846 amounted to £8,304, and the expenditure to £8,611. The number of Fellows was 1,939. The admissions to the Gardens were 94,049, to the promenades 5,996, making together 100,045.

1847.

In January, 1847 Mr. Ogilby resigned the Secretaryship, and it was determined by the Council to appoint a paid officer, who should devote his whole time to the Society's affairs. Mr. David William Mitchell, B.A., was elected to the post. On the death of the Assistant

Secretary no successor was appointed, and his duties were taken over by the Secretary and the Accountant.

In 1847 the privileges of the Fellows were increased by the issue of six tickets to each for the admission of two friends, except on Promenade-days. The public were admitted on Mondays and Tuesdays without an order, on payment of one shilling, and at Easter and Whitsuntide the Gardens were opened on the same terms from Monday to Friday inclusive.

The Pheasantry in the South Garden was reconstructed in 1847, with a view to the better accommodation of gallinaceous birds. H.M. the Queen presented a Tapir and a Jaguar, and the Emperor of Russia a pair of European Bisons. The mode of their capture and their treatment were described in a paper communicated to the Society by M. Dolmatoff, the Master of the Imperial Forests in the Government of Grodno. To that gentleman and to Sir Roderick Impey Murchison, through whose influence the Emperor became interested in the matter, the Council awarded the Silver Medal of the Society, to commemorate the introduction of this animal into England. This was the first occasion of its presentation.

Fifteen species of mammals, forty-five of birds, and three of reptiles were exhibited for the first time in 1847.

The income of 1847 amounted to £7,765 only (the lowest point reached since 1828), and the expenditure to £9,710. The number of Fellows was 1,844. The admissions to the Gardens were 88,582, and to the Promenades 4,964, making together 93,546.

1848.

In 1848 the principal works were the enclosure of a piece of ground at the west of the Giraffe-house for the European Bisons, and the erection of a Store-house in the North Garden. In the South Garden the Pheasantry was completed, and close by an enclosure was made for the wading-birds. A new entrance gate was erected at the extremity of the South Garden communicating with the Broad Walk,

Early in April, 1848, it was decided to admit the public to the Gardens on Mondays, and children at any time, on payment of sixpence each. The list of species exhibited for the first time this year included thirteen mammals, thirty-three birds, and nine reptiles. The most important additions were a Tree-kangaroo (*Dendrolagus inustus*), a Maleo, some Australian Brush-turkeys, and the Silky Bower-bird. The chief losses by death were the old male Giraffe and the male European Bison.

In 1848 a new series of the Society's 'Proceedings' with coloured plates, many of them drawn by Joseph Wolf, was commenced, and continued until 1860, but an edition with the letterpress only was also issued, and sold at the price of 6s. per volume.

The Income of 1848 amounted to £8,165, and the expenditure to £9,822. The number of Fellows was 1,735. The admissions to the Gardens were 143,630, which included 2,936 to the Promenades.

1849.

In answer to a Memorial addressed to the Commissioners of Woods and Forests in 1849, the Society obtained a reduction of the Ground-rent of the Gardens to £337 per annum. The principal works executed this year were the conversion of the old Carnivora-house in the North Gardens into a Reptile-house; the erection of a west wing to the Giraffe-house, and the building of the New (now called the Western) Aviary, in the South Gardens. Among the donors were the Queen, who sent to the Gardens a Lioness, a Leopard, a pair of Ostriches, and a pair of Gazelles, presented to Her Majesty by the Emperor of Morocco, and His Highness Ibrahim Pasha, Viceroy of Egypt, who contributed a female Giraffe, two Dromedaries, two Leucoryx Antelopes, two Addax Antelopes, two Ostriches, and two Gazelles. In December news was received by the Council that Abbas Pasha (who had succeeded to the Viceroyalty on the death of Ibrahim Pasha) had sent to the Hon. C. A. Murray, Consul-General at Cairo, a young Hippopotamus, which had been brought down from the White Nile expressly for the acceptance of the Society. The Council expressed their gratitude by sending the Viceroy a small stud of greyhounds and deerhounds under the care of an experienced trainer.

The list of species new to the collection in 1849 included sixteen mammals, twenty-eight birds, and twenty-two reptiles.

The sixth part of the third volume of the Society's quarto 'Transactions,' containing eighteen zoological memoirs, and completing the volume, was issued this

year. Amongst its contents will be found the first description and figure of the fragment of the birds-femur from New Zealand, upon which the genus *Dinornis* was subsequently established, besides three other important memoirs by Professor Owen on the same subject.

The donations to the Museum were few, and the additions of mounted specimens were limited to rare specimens which had died in the Menagerie.

The income of 1849 amounted to £8,771, and the expenditure to £9,580. The number of Fellows was 1,665, and the admissions to the Gardens were 168,895.

1850.

The Hippopotamus-house, at the eastern end of the Giraffe-house, was completed in 1850, and sheds for Antelopes and small Deer were erected on the south side of the Museum. A large Eagles' Aviary on the lawn, opposite the side of the Fish-house, was commenced. The transport to England of the Hippopotamus presented by Abbas Pasha, was successfully carried out. The shipment was effected under the personal superintendence of the Hon. C. A. Murray, and the animal arrived at the Gardens on May 25th of this year. In their Report the Council gratefully acknowledged Mr. Murray's help, the liberality of the directors of the P. and O. Steam Navigation Company, and the faithful service of Hamet Saafi Canaana, the native attendant in charge of the animal. In addition to the Hippopotamus, the donation of Abbas Pasha comprised a Lioness, a Cheetah, an Ibex, and a Wild-swine. Another valuable gift was that of Mr. Ronald Gunn and

Dr. Grant, consisting of a pair of the Native Wolf of Tasmania (*Thylacinus cynocephalus*), the first brought alive to this country.

In July, 1850, a special Committee of the Council recommended that, subject to the approval of a General Meeting, the specimens in the Museum should be offered to the Government for a fair and sufficient equivalent, and this policy was adopted.

The income of 1850 amounted to £14,957, and the expenditure to £13,186. The number of Fellows was 1,652, and the admissions to the Gardens were 360,402.

On June 30, 1851, the Earl of Derby, the President of the Society, died at Knowsley. He had been connected with the Society from its foundation, and ever since his election as a Fellow, in 1826, had taken an active part in its management until the state of his health compelled him to reside at Knowsley during the greater part of the year. H.R.H. Prince Albert, on the invitation of the Council, consented to accept the vacant office.

The chief works at the Gardens in 1851 were the erection of a strong enclosure and large tank at the Hippopotamus-house, with platforms around them for spectators; the Antelope-house at the west end of the Giraffe-house; the completion of the Eagles' Aviary; the house built for Mr. Gould's collection of Humming Birds, which formed a great attraction (subsequently converted

into a Parrot-house), and the commencement of the Aquatic Vivarium, now called the 'Fish-house.'

By bequest from the late President the Society acquired in 1851 the herd of Elands from Knowsley (two males and three females), which was the origin of the Society's stock of this important animal. Examples of sixteen species of mammals, fifty-nine of birds, and eleven of reptiles were exhibited for the first time in 1851. At the sale of the Knowsley menagerie, 160 specimens, representing 62 species, were purchased by the Society at a cost of nearly £1,000.

The income of 1851 amounted to £26,452, and the expenditure to £22,380. The number of Fellows was 1,641. The admissions to the Gardens were 667,243.

1852.

In 1852 the drainage of the Gardens and of the adjoining portion of the Regent's Park, begun in 1851, was completed by the Commissioners of Works, with beneficial effect on the health of the animals. The principal works carried out were the Aquatic Vivarium, the completion and fitting up of the Python-house and the Chimpanzee-house, and the extension of the Three Island Pond enclosure.

Mr. Alexander Miller, the Superintendent, who had held office since 1829, was superannuated in 1852, and Mr. John Thompson was appointed in his stead.

Twenty-one mammals, eighteen birds, and eleven reptiles were exhibited for the first time. The Council in their Report called special attention to the acquisition of

a Red River Hog (*Potamochoerus penicillatus*), at that time so rare that "they believed no Museum in Europe contained an example." *

In view of the development of the Natural History Galleries at the British Museum, the Council determined to display only generic types in the Society's Museum, to send the duplicates to national and provincial museums, and to dispose of the rest of the specimens to the best advantage.

The income of 1852 amounted to £12,802, and the expenditure to £17,821. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 1,662. The admissions to the Gardens in 1852 were 305,203.

1853.

In 1853 the Aquarium was completed and opened, with a collection of Fishes, Crustaceans, and other fresh-water and marine animals. Examples of eight species of mammals, twelve birds, and four reptiles were exhibited for the first time; the most important among these being a pair of Great Ant-eaters, and a pair of Asiatic Lions from Gujerat. The Ant-eaters proved to be a great attraction, and were figured and described in the public Press.

The income of 1853 amounted to £17,508, and the expenditure to £17,121. The number of Fellows was 1,662. The admissions to the Gardens were 409,076.

1854.

The chief works carried out in 1854 were the completion of the Hippopotamus-house, with a large bath and massive iron railings; the repair of the Monkey-house, a winter house for Carnivora in the South Garden; a glass house and enclosure for the Great Ant-eater; and the rearrangement of the basement-story of the Giraffe-house, where sleeping apartments for six keepers were provided.

Seven species of mammals, eight of birds, and four of reptiles were exhibited for the first time in 1854. Among the donors to the Menagerie were the King of Portugal, the Pasha of Egypt, the Prince of Wales (now King Edward VII.), and Prince Alfred (the late Duke of Coburg). The most important addition was the female Hippopotamus, "Adhela," presented by the Pasha of Egypt. It arrived on July 22nd, on which date a pair of these animals were exhibited for the first time in any of the vivaria of Europe. They were the dam and sire of "Guy Fawkes" (born Nov. 5th, 1872), the large female still living in the Gardens. The Clouded Tiger (*Felis macrocelis*), so closely associated with the name of Sir Stamford Raffles, was exhibited for the first time this year, as was also the small Two-toed Ant-eater (*Cycloturus didactylus*).

The Council, in their Report, called attention to the fertility of the Elands, bequeathed to the Society by the late President (the Earl of Derby), and expressed a hope that these beautiful animals might be established and acclimatised in the parks of England. They also described the hatching out of some eggs of the Australian Brush-

turkey, and the breeding of the Impeyan and Japanese Pheasants.

The income of 1854 amounted to £16,901, and the expenditure to £19,043. The number of Fellows was 1,744. The admissions to the Gardens were 407,676.

1855.

In 1855 little new work of importance was carried out. The Museum was closed, the types of the species described in the Society's publications being transferred to the Trustees of the British Museum, as the Council believed that in this way they would best carry out the intentions of donors and collectors. The Trustees of the Museum also purchased a series of specimens for an agreed price of £500. Sales to the amount of £700 were effected to the Queen's Colleges in Galway and Cork, besides smaller sales to provincial and other museums.

In the list of donors occur the names of the Prince Consort and the King of Portugal. Examples of seven species of mammals, of eight birds, and of four reptiles were exhibited for the first time. Among these were three specimens of the large Indian Fruit-Bat (*Cynopterus collaris*), which, since then, has bred freely in the Gardens. Three young Elands were sold to Viscount Hill, who proposed to carry on experiments on the acclimatisation of this Antelope. The death of a small female Elephant took place in July, and was believed to have been due to fright at the thunderstorm which broke over London on the fourteenth of the month. In other respects

the general health of the Menagerie was satisfactory, and losses by death were small.

The income of 1855 amounted to £14,088, and the expenditure to £14,737. The number of Fellows was 1,752. The admissions to the Gardens were 315,002.

1856.

Few new works of importance were undertaken in 1856. The Queen and the King of Portugal headed the list of donors. Examples of six species of mammals, eleven of birds, and sixteen of reptiles were exhibited for the first time. Among these may be mentioned the Beatrix Antelope, the Brindled Gnu, and the Markhoor; also the Mantchurian Crane and the Honduras Turkey. The Elands disposed of to Viscount Hill thrived satisfactorily at Hawkstone, and the Marquis of Breadalbane purchased from the Society three fawns, born in 1856, in the hope of establishing this Antelope as a park-animal in Scotland. The herd of Wapiti had increased beyond the means of accommodation, and a male and two females were sold to Lord Hastings for his park at Melton Constable. A young Bactrian Camel, born in their camp on the Heights of Sebastopol in February 1855, was presented by the Corps of Royal Engineers on their return from the Crimea; and the Society was indebted to Mr. Alderman Finnis for a pair of Mesopotamian Lions, interesting as affording opportunity for comparing them with the Indian Lions from Gujerat. A collection of Himalayan Pheasants had been made chiefly by the assistance of Viscount Canning, Governor-General of India, in response to a

request made by H.R.H. the President; and, in September, Mr. James Thomson, the head-keeper, was sent to India to receive the birds and bring them home. The Queen, the Marquis of Breadalbane, and Viscount Hill each contributed £100 to the expense of this undertaking, on the understanding that an equivalent proportion of the birds should, on their arrival, be at the disposition of the donors, so as to increase the probabilities of their acclimatisation.

The residue of the specimens in the Museum was disposed of in 1856, and the Museum was closed.

The income of 1856 amounted to £15,279, and the expenditure to £15,839. The number of Fellows was 1,773. The admissions to the Gardens were 344,184.

1857.

In 1857 the principal works at the Gardens were the strengthening of the fence on the south-west borders, to keep out dogs, which "in some instances had occasioned actual loss of life in specimens of value;" and the clearing of a large space on the north side of the Terrace to afford more accommodation for the spectators. The King of Portugal, Lord Fitzwilliam and Viscount Canning headed the list of donors.

The list of species exhibited for the first time in 1857 consisted of six mammals, fifteen birds, and fourteen reptiles, besides a number of marine invertebrates. Among the most important additions were a Mexican Jaguar, a Southern River Hog, the Purple Plantain-eater, and the Crested Guinea-fowl. The collection of Himalayan Pheasants arrived, diminished in numbers by the difficul-

ties of the voyage. The Council, however, reported that the Cheer, the Purple Kaleege, the White-crested Kaleege, the Black-backed Kaleege, and the Hill Partridge had arrived in sufficient numbers to afford a reasonable prospect of acclimatising them in this country. During Dr. Livingstone's short stay in London he offered to co-operate with the Society, and the King of Portugal transmitted orders to the Governor of Zambesia for the acquisition and transport of such animals as Dr. Livingstone might be able to procure.

The income of 1857 amounted to £14,822, and the expenditure to £14,352. The number of Fellows was 1,736. The admissions to the Gardens were 339,217.

Few new works were undertaken in the Gardens in 1857, the principal being a new walk from the South Entrance to the Reservoir, to meet the walk leading up from the Swine Sheds.

The list of donors in 1858 included the Queen, the King of Portugal, and Prince Alfred; and the new species exhibited consisted of ten mammals, twelve birds, and eleven reptiles. Among the more notable was a male Quagga, presented by Sir George Grey, Governor of Cape Colony, the last specimen of this now extinct animal ever received by the Society.

In this year the Bennett's Cassowary (named in honour of the donor, the late Dr. George Bennett, of Sydney), and Darwin's Rhea were exhibited for the first time. Among

the animals that bred were some of the Himalayan Pheasants; while the Cheers and Kaleeges, which had been sent to Lord Hill at Hawkstone, throve in an open enclosure.

The income of 1858 amounted to £14,034, and the expenditure to £12,195. The number of Fellows was 1,716. The admissions to the Gardens were 333,980.

1859.

At the Anniversary Meeting of 1859 Mr. Mitchell, having undertaken the direction of the new Jardin d'Acclimatation at Paris, retired from the office of Secretary, and Mr. Philip Lutley Sclater, M.A., Fellow of Corpus Christi College, Oxford, and Barrister-at-law, who had been a Member of the Council during the previous two years, was elected in his place.

In this summer the first section of the present Antelope-house was opened, and here for some time the Zebras and other *Equidæ* were also kept. There was a long list of donors, headed by H.M. The Queen, who presented an African Leopard. Examples of seven mammals, fourteen birds, and eight reptiles were exhibited for the first time. The most important acquisition was a female Kiang (*Equus hemionus*), presented by Major W. E. Hay, the first example of this animal ever received. The breeding-list of 1859 contained the names of twenty-five species of mammals and twenty-three of birds.

The Silver Medal of the Society was awarded in 1859 to Viscount Canning, Lord William Hay, Capt. Hay,

Capt. James, the Rajah Rajendra Mullick, and Mr. Richard Green, for their assistance in forming the first collection of Himalayan Pheasants; and to Mr. Christie William Dougall, for his many valuable donations.

On June 30th, Mr. John Thompson, the Superintendent of the Gardens, died, and Mr. A. D. Bartlett was appointed as his successor.

The income of 1859 amounted to £15,194, and the expenditure to £14,345. The number of Fellows was 1,721. The admissions to the Gardens were 364,356.

The new Antelope-house, a portion of which had been opened in 1859, was completed in 1860 at a total cost of £4,289. It was described by the Council as "one of the most useful as well as one of the most ornamental additions that has been made to the Society's grounds for many years." For the convenience of visitors all the houses in the Gardens were conspicuously labelled with the names given to them in the 'Garden Guide.'

The Queen, the King of Portugal, Prince Alfred, and the Duke of Oporto headed the list of donors in 1860. Examples of seven mammals, sixteen birds, eleven reptiles, and two fishes were exhibited for the first time. The most important of these were a Javan Wild Hog (*Sus vittatus*), two Shoe-birds (*Balaniceps rex*), which had been obtained on the White Nile, and were the first brought alive to Europe, and a Gigantic Salamander (*Megalobatrachus maximus*). The Himalayan Pheasants produced 141 eggs, of which 82 were hatched, and 45 chicks

were reared. In 1859 the same number of hens had laid 168 eggs, of which 62 were hatched and 50 were reared. In the preceding year eleven hens had laid 184 eggs, of which 126 were hatched and 116 chicks were reared. On Dec. 31st the number of animals in the menagerie was 1,590, showing an increase of 270 since the corresponding period of 1859.

The income of 1860 amounted to £16,863, and the expenditure to £15,949. The number of Fellows was 1,716. The admissions to the Gardens were 394,906.

1861.

In 1861 the Deer sheds in the North Gardens were rebuilt. The larger Antelopes were removed to the new house in the South Garden. The collection in that house then included :—

Two valuable collections of mammals and birds were received from Sir George Grey, Governor of Cape Colony. Among these the most noteworthy were a female Koodoo, believed to be the first received alive in Europe ; a Bless-bok, a Steinbok (the first received alive in Europe), a Grysbok (new to the collection), and a Burchell's Zebra. In this year also a specimen of *Ælian's* Wart-hog (*Phacochoerus africanus*) was added to the Menagerie for the first time.

The total number of species exhibited for the first time

in 1861 comprised eight mammals, ten birds, nine reptiles, and one fish. Fifty-four chicks were reared from the Himalayan Pheasants, and satisfactorily disposed of among the Society's Members and correspondents. Two Eland fawns were born, making a total of twenty since the bequest of the herd in 1851. In all, nineteen mammals and twenty-four birds are entered on the breeding list of 1861.

A new series of 'Proceedings' was commenced in 1861, under the title of 'Proceedings of the Scientific Meetings of the Zoological Society of London.' These were continued in nearly the same form until 1890, and Index volumes were issued for each of the three decennial periods.

On December 14th, the Prince Consort, President of the Society, died at Windsor.

The income of 1861 amounted to £16,072, and the expenditure to £16,974. The number of Fellows was 1,725. The admissions to the Gardens were 381,837.

1862.

At the first Council Meeting of this year, it was agreed that an address of condolence on the death of the Prince Consort should be forwarded to the Queen; and, at the Anniversary Meeting, the election of the Right Hon. Sir George Clerk, who had been chosen to fill the chair on the death of Prince Albert, as President of the Society, was confirmed.

The series of Wild Sheep was removed from the pens opposite the Museum building to the new sheds in the South Garden, and on the site of the old pens the Kangaroo

sheds were erected. The Pheasantry at the western side of the South Garden was built, and an additional gate and money-taker's lodge were constructed at the south entrance.

The Queen, the Prince of Wales, the King of Portugal, and the King of Italy were among the principal donors to the Menagerie in 1862. The list of species new to the collection comprised fourteen mammals, sixteen birds, six reptiles, and three fishes. Among the mammals was an Aye-Aye, from Madagascar, till then only known in Europe by preserved specimens. Two Lesser Birds of Paradise (*Paradisea minor*), brought home by Mr. A. R. Wallace, were acquired; and a Kagu (*Rhinochetus jubatus*) was presented by Dr. G. Bennett, to whom, in acknowledgment of his numerous valuable donations, the Society's Silver Medal was awarded. The breeding list of this year enumerated twenty-six species of mammals, twenty-nine birds, and one reptile; and the number of chicks of the Himalayan Pheasants reared was sixty-nine. The number of animals in the Menagerie on December 31st showed an increase of 334, the figures being 1,748, as compared with 1,414 on December 31st, 1861.

The first edition of the 'List of Vertebrated Animals,' prepared by Louis Fraser under the direction of the Secretary, was issued this year. It contained a list of the animals living in the Gardens on December 31st, 1861, and of those that had been received subsequently up to the 1st of June, 1862. It recorded the names of 1,450 specimens, belonging to 188 species of mammals, 409 of birds, 62 of reptiles, and 23 of fishes; altogether 682 species of vertebrates.

In 1862 the fourth volume of the Society's quarto 'Transactions' was completed by the issue of Part VIII. In this volume will be found four more of Professor Owen's memoirs on *Dinornis*, and the first description, by Strickland, of the new Didine genus *Pezophaps*, from the Island of Rodriguez; also three memoirs by Professor Owen on the Chimpanzees and Orangs.

In this year the by-law entitling every Fellow to the

letter-press of the 'Proceedings' without payment was repealed; and in its place it was agreed to supply those Fellows, and Foreign and Corresponding Members, who paid a subscription of £1 1s. before the Anniversary Meeting, with the whole of the publications for the year.

The income of 1862 amounted to £27,397, the largest ever received up to this date. The expenditure was £18,713. The number of Fellows was 1,731. The admissions to the Gardens were 682,205, an increase of 14,962 as compared with 1851.

1863.

In 1863 three new entrance-lodges were built, to replace the wooden boxes previously occupied by the money-takers in the Gardens. The Eastern Aviary was rebuilt on what was practically the old site, though the new building was larger than the old one and afforded much more light and air to the inmates, while the elevated floor gave the visitors a better view of the birds. The Cattle-sheds were constructed, and a new Monkey-house was commenced.

There was a large list of donors this year, and the list of species new to the collection included twelve mammals, thirty-five birds, twenty-two reptiles, and eight fishes. Sœmmerring's Pheasant, the Rufous-tailed Pheasant, and the Black-headed Tragopan were the most noteworthy of these additions. In April, the Secretary read a paper at one of the Scientific Meetings on the Phasianidæ, enumerating fifty-six species, of which twenty-nine had been exhibited, at various times, in the Menagerie. In order to assist the Society's correspondents, copies of this paper

were sent out to India and China, with coloured figures of such species as were wanted to fill gaps in the collection, and with instructions as to the best method of keeping these birds in confinement and packing them for conveyance to England. Several of the Corresponding Members in India had sent notice that collections were waiting for transmission to England, and Mr. John Thomson, the head-keeper, was despatched to Calcutta to take charge of them and bring them home. The Council sent out, under his care, a selection of living animals for the Rajah Rajendra Mullick, as some return for the many valuable donations he had made from time to time to the Menagerie. The breeding list of 1863 included twenty-four mammals, twenty-nine birds, one reptile, and two fishes.

The first edition of the 'List of Vertebrated Animals' having been found of great use for transmission to foreign correspondents, and for naming the animals in the Gardens on a uniform system, a second edition was published this year, containing the names of the animals that were living in the Gardens on January 1st, 1863, together with those received up to the end of May, 1863. It included altogether the names of 822 species of vertebrates.

The income of 1863 amounted to £20,284, and the expenditure to £21,252. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 1,815. The admissions to the Gardens were 468,700.

1864.

In 1864 the Eastern Aviary and the new Monkey-house were completed and opened to the public. The last-named building, erected at a total cost of £4,840,

including fittings, was announced to be a great success. The old wooden fencing of the Giraffe Yard was replaced by an iron palisading, and the platform opposite the Carnivora Dens, from which the visitors witnessed the feeding of the animals, was reconstructed.

The Indian animals collected for the Society by the exertions of their corresponding members—the Babu Rajendra Mullick of Calcutta, Mr. A. Grote of Alipore, Dr. John Squire, and Mr. William Dunn of Akyab—arrived in July. The most important were :—

Very few losses were experienced on the passage home, and the Council voted Mr. Thomson a gratuity of £50 and their special thanks for his services.

The species new to the collection in 1864 comprised eight mammals, twenty-three birds, two reptiles, and two fishes. The most noteworthy were a Saiga Antelope, the Hornbills and Lineated Pheasants of the Indian collection, and a Tooth-billed Pigeon from Samoa, which, when it died, filled a gap in the bird-galleries of the British Museum. In this year the first specimen of the order Cetacea was exhibited, being a Common Porpoise from the British Seas. The number of specimens in the Menagerie on December 31st was 1,858.

The income of 1864 amounted to £21,713, and the expenditure to £24,889. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 1,918. The admissions to the Gardens were 507,169.

1865.

In 1865 the Eagle Aviary was built on the site of the old Monkey-house, railings and gates were put up at the main entrance, and among the minor works carried out were the construction of the Beaver Pond, the fencing of the Antelope Paddock, and the sheds for smaller deer near the Superintendent's house.

In 1865 Dr. James Murie was appointed Prosector, with the duty of making an anatomical examination of every animal dying in the Menagerie, and a Dissecting Room, with the necessary fittings, was provided for his use.

The Queen and the Prince of Wales were among the list of donors, and the list of species new to the collection included twenty-one mammals, fifty birds, and four reptiles. The more remarkable additions to the Menagerie were a Prong-buck (the specimen upon which the fact of the animal's horns being deciduous was established by Bartlett*), a three-banded Armadillo, a Tree-Kangaroo, a King Penguin, a pair of Fruit Pigeons from the Seychelles, and an Abyssinian Hornbill. In June the first African Elephant ever seen alive in England was received (in exchange for an Indian Rhinoceros) from the Jardin des Plantes, Paris. This was the famous Jumbo, and in September a female of the same species (Alice) was bought from Mr. Rice, the dealer, of St. George's St., E. The breeding list of 1865 contained thirty mammals and thirty-six birds. The number of animals in the Menagerie

at the close of the year was 1,956, showing an increase of ninety-eight as compared with December 31st, 1864.

The third edition of the 'List of Vertebrated Animals' in the Society's Gardens was issued this year, and recorded the names of all the species of which specimens had been exhibited in 1864. It contained altogether the names of 1,730 specimens.

The income in 1865 amounted to £23,457, and the expenditure to £23,571. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 2,143. The admissions to the Gardens were 525,176.

1866.

The old Eagle Aviary in the centre of the Gardens was pulled down in 1866 and the site was laid down with turf to enlarge the lawn. New cages for Eagles and Vultures were erected on the walk leading eastward from the south entrance. The erection of a set of sheds for hardy Rodents was commenced by the side of the Swine-sheds. An exhibition of Mr. Wolf's sketches was opened in the upper part of the old Museum-building, which had been fitted up for that purpose.

The animals exhibited for the first time this year comprised fifteen mammals, forty-five birds, and five reptiles, and the breeding list included twenty-one mammals, twenty-three birds, and one reptile. The most noticeable additions were a young male Sea-lion from Patagonia, purchased of Lecomte, who afterwards entered the service of the Society as keeper, a male Gayal, a Formosan Deer, a Puđu Deer, a pair of Straw-necked

Ibises, three Trumpeter Swans, and three Ruddy Flamingoes. Mr. Clarence Bartlett (now Superintendent) was sent by the Council to Surinam to bring home a young Manatee, but the animal unfortunately died a few hours before the vessel arrived at Southampton. A second example, forwarded from Porto Rico, died under similar circumstances.

On December 6th a fire broke out in the Giraffe-house, and, though it was quickly extinguished, an adult female Giraffe and her fawn were suffocated by the smoke. The cause of the fire was never discovered. The loss, estimated at £545, was covered by insurance.

In the winter of 1866 a heavy snowstorm destroyed the covering of the breeding-aviary for Pheasants, near the cattle-sheds. The birds (many of which were worth £50 each) escaped into the Park, but were mostly recovered.

The number of animals in the Menagerie on December 31st, 1866 was 2,013, showing an increase of fifty-seven over the previous year.

The Scientific Meetings of the Session 1866-67 were held, by the kind permission of the Linnean Society, in their rooms at Burlington House.

Up to this date an edition of the Proceedings without illustrations had been issued; but it was now decided to discontinue it, and to issue instead a cheap edition with uncoloured plates.

The fourth edition of the 'List of Vertebrated Animals' living in the Society's Gardens was prepared by the Secretary and published in July of this year. The names of all the animals received in 1865 and 1866 were inserted in their proper places, and the List, therefore, contained a complete record of the names of all the species that had been exhibited alive from 1863 to the end of 1866. These were altogether 1,212 in number, viz.—mammals 339, birds 721, reptiles 73, batrachians 25, and fishes 54.

In 1866 the fifth volume of the Society's 'Transactions,' containing eleven zoological memoirs, was completed. In this volume Prof. Owen continued his memoirs on the Anthropoid Apes and on the *Dinornithidæ*; and Flower, at

that time Conservator of the Museum of the Royal College of Surgeons, published one of his earliest papers on the brain of the Javan Loris. Owen's elaborate memoir on the Aye-Aye (*Chiromys*), illustrated by thirteen plates, also forms part of this volume.

Three keepers—H. Hunt, M. Scott, and B. Misselbrook—were awarded the Bronze Medal in 1866 “for their meritorious success in breeding foreign animals in the Society's Gardens.”

The income in 1866 amounted to £24,378, and the expenditure to £22,418. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 2,459. The admissions to the Gardens were 527,349.

1867.

The President of the Society, the Right Hon. Sir George Clerk, Bart., died on Dec. 23rd, 1867.

The Deer Sheds in the South Gardens were built this year, the Rodents'-houses completed and stocked, and the Pheasantry rebuilt. In the North Garden the Wapiti Sheds were cleared away to provide a site for the Elephant-house; the Hippopotamus-house was enlarged by taking in the court on the north side; a walk was made from the Kangaroo Sheds, over the Tunnel, to the back of the Parrot House, and the pens for the Wombats were built. Thirteen species of Mammals and thirty-one of Birds were exhibited for the first time, and the breeding list enumerates thirty-three mammals and sixty-six birds.

Mr. Clarence Bartlett was sent to India in 1867 to take charge of a collection of animals offered to the

Society by their Corresponding Members, the Rajah Rajendra Mullick, Mr. A. Grote, F.Z.S., Dr. John Anderson, and other friends in the East. He returned in August 1867, having unfortunately lost many of the animals by death on the passage, but the following were safely brought home and deposited in the Society's Gardens:—

A young male Walrus, brought to Dundee from Davis Straits by a Steam-whaler, was purchased this year, but did not live long. A female Lyre-bird was also acquired. In March the Sea-lion, purchased in January 1866, died, having swallowed a hook in the fish with which it was fed. Lecomte, the keeper, was sent out to the Falkland Islands to obtain another example, and to make a zoological collection.

The undated tickets for Saturdays and Sundays were abolished this year, and in place of them books of dated tickets were issued to Fellows.

With the close of the scientific session of 1866-67, the meetings at the Linnean Society's Rooms, Burlington House, came to an end, and were subsequently always held on the Society's premises in Hanover Square. The business of the Library having greatly increased, a clerk was appointed to take charge of this branch of the scientific establishment.

The income of 1867 amounted to £25,041, and the expenditure to £26,209. The number of Fellows was 2,702. The admissions to the Gardens were 556,214.

1868.

At the Anniversary Meeting of 1868 the election as President of Arthur, Viscount Walden (afterwards Marquess of Tweeddale), which had been made by the Council on January 15th this year, was confirmed.

In the South Garden the Deer Sheds were completed this year, and the animals transferred to them; and a large iron water tank was erected in the south-east corner, in place of the old reservoir. In the Middle Garden the new Elephant-house was commenced, but the contractors were unable to complete the first part of the building at the time specified (Nov. 1st).

The list of donors was long, and was headed by the names of the Prince of Wales and the Duke of Edinburgh. Among the more remarkable of the species exhibited for the first time were a Hoolock Gibbon, presented by Mr. A. Grote, F.Z.S.; and an African Two-horned Rhinoceros (*R. bicornis*), captured in Upper Nubia, and purchased from Mr. Carl Hagenbeck of Hamburg. This was believed to be the first specimen of an African Rhinoceros received alive in Europe since the days of the Romans. An Aard Wolf, a Smooth-headed Capuchin, and a Spanish Ibex were also new to the collection. A pair of Syrian Wild Asses, a young male Koodoo, a male Lyre-bird (making up a pair), and a Regent-bird (new to the collection) were valuable acquisitions.

In August 1868 Lecomte returned from the Falkland Islands; but, through no fault of his, the results obtained from his journey were disappointingly small. He left Port Stanley with a good stock of animals, including

four Sea-lions, and upwards of eighty other mammals and birds. Seventy of these died before Monte Video was reached. At this port they were transhipped for home, and for some time the four Sea-lions remained in good condition; but a passenger having died of yellow fever, the stock of fish laid in to feed these animals was thrown overboard on account of its smell. Three of the Sea-lions consequently died, and the fourth was kept alive with difficulty. Lecomte brought safely to the Gardens

The breeding list of 1869 contains thirty-four mammals and thirty birds. On December 31st, the number of specimens in the Menagerie was 1,970.

The income of 1869 amounted to £24,958, and the expenditure to £26,313. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 2,924. The admissions to the Gardens were 573,186.

1869.

This year the land on the north side of the Canal, surrendered to the Crown in 1841, was again granted to the Society by the Commissioners of Works at a yearly rental of £20 7s. 8d.

The new Elephant-house was completed, and when opened in the summer contained the following animals :—

- 2 African Elephants (male and female).
- 2 Indian Elephants (male and female).
- 2 Indian Rhinoceroses (male and female).
- 1 African Rhinoceros (male).
- 1 American Tapir (male).

The Council in their Report pronounced this to be "the finest and most nearly complete series of the larger representatives of the Cuvierian order of Pachyderms ever brought together in Europe." The upper story of the Elephant-house contained four rooms for keepers and two large lofts for forage. The Gazelle Sheds adjoining the Hippopotamus-house were rebuilt in 1869, and in the South Gardens the Refreshment Rooms were reconstructed on a larger scale.

Among the more important additions to the Menagerie in 1869 were a Cape Ant-bear (believed to be the first brought alive to Europe), six Amherst's Pheasants, and an Owen's Apteryx (the first specimen received alive in Europe), two Père David's Deer (male and female) and a Panda. The breeding list records twenty-nine mammals and twenty-eight birds. The census of specimens in the Menagerie taken on December 31st showed an increase of forty-three over the corresponding period in 1868.

In 1869 the eighth part of the sixth volume of the Society's 'Transactions,' completing the volume, was issued. Amongst the memoirs in this volume occur the names of Allman, Parker, Gray, Mivart, and Flower. The eleventh and twelfth parts of Prof. Owen's memoirs on *Dinornis* were likewise published in this volume.

The Silver Medal of the Society was awarded this year to Sir Rutherford Alcock for his present of a pair of Père David's Deer, and the Bronze Medal to Mr. William Penney, F.Z.S., for his numerous donations to the Fish-house.

The income in 1869 amounted to £22,768, and the expenditure to £25,748. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 2,966. The admissions to the Gardens were 572,848.

1870.

In 1870 the principal works carried on at the Gardens were the making of yards and ponds, the erection of fences for the new Elephant-house, and the formation of the terrace walk in front of it. Among the mammals added to the Menagerie in 1870 were a new Rusine Deer from the Philippines (*Cervus nigricans*), a Side-striped Jackal from Gaboon, a Deer of a new species, named *Cervus alfredi* in honour of the Duke of Edinburgh, who sent the specimen to the Society, and three Bladder-nosed Seals. The more noticeable birds received were Blyth's Tragopan, a Sclater's Monaul, a Huia (*Heteralocha gouldi*), a Rosy Spoonbill, a Burmeister's Cariama, a Red-necked Bustard, and a Red-tailed Guan. A Kakapo or Night Parrot of New Zealand was received on deposit.

The breeding list of 1870 contained 25 mammals and 26 birds. On December 31st, the number of specimens in the Menagerie was 2,118, showing an increase of 105 during the year.

In 1870 a legacy of £2000, bequeathed to the Society by Mr. Alfred Davis, F.Z.S., was received. It was to form a "perpetual fund, the income from which is to be applied to the creation of prizes, or any other purpose which may seem to the Council of the Society most conducive to its interests." The legacy was invested in L. & S. W. Railway Preference Stock.

Dr. Murie resigned his office of Prosector in March of this year, but at the request of the Council continued nominally in the post in order to complete certain zoological memoirs for the 'Transactions.'

The income in 1870 amounted to £23,257, and the expenditure to £24,408. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 3,021. The admissions to the Gardens were 573,004.

1871.

In 1871 works at the Gardens were of a minor character, the most important being two new water mains laid down to supply the North Garden and the Hippopotamus Pond.

The Queen, the Prince of Wales, and the Duke of Edinburgh headed the list of donors. Examples of eight species of mammals, nine of birds, and six of reptiles were exhibited for the first time. Among the mammals of special interest were a young male Anoa, a Baird's Tapir, a Cape Sea-lion (the only one which arrived out of three examples sent to the Society by Sir Henry Barkly), and two Grey Seals. The new birds included examples of the Peruvian Thick-knee, the Fregate Bird, and the Sulphury Tyrant-bird. A female example of Prince Alfred's Deer, closely resembling the male in all but the absence of antlers, was received in exchange in April, and in December a fawn of this species was born. A Kakapo (*Stringops habroptilus*) was presented by Mr. D. L. Murdoch, of Auckland, New Zealand.

The breeding list of 1871 included thirty-two mammals and twenty-two birds. The most important birth was that of a Hippopotamus on February 14th, though the little one lived only two days. Mr. Bartlett's notes on the subject were printed in the 'Proceedings' for this year. The skin was carefully mounted for the British Museum, the skeleton and preparations of the internal organs were

preserved in the Museum of the Royal College of Surgeons, and a plaster cast of the calf was made and presented to the Society by Mr. Frank Buckland.

In 1871 the Zoological Record Association was founded for the purpose of publishing a series of Annual Reports containing a complete index of the Zoological literature of each year. To this Association the Council devoted the first year's interest of the Davis Fund.

At the end of the year Mr. R. B. Sharpe tendered his resignation as Librarian, in order to be able to devote more attention to some important works on Ornithology. The Council accepted his resignation with regret, and early in 1872 Mr. F. H. Waterhouse was appointed to the vacant post.

The income in 1871 amounted to £24,620, and the expenditure to £22,037. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 3,047. The admissions to the Gardens were 595,917.

1872.

The most important work carried out in 1872 was the construction of the bridge over the Regent's Canal, connecting the new grounds on its north bank with the Gardens. The north entrance and lodge were commenced, but were not completed till 1873. A new iron front and new doors and bars were fitted to the Hippopotamus-house.

The Prince of Wales again headed the list of donors. Examples of seventeen species of mammals and of forty-eight of birds were exhibited for the first time. Among the former, the most important were the Sumatran and the

Hairy-eared Rhinoceroses, the Beatrix Antelope, and the Red Brocket from Brazil. The latter included Maximilian's Araçari, the Kea or Mountain Parrot, the American Darter, the Crested Screamer, Denham's Bustard, two species of Tinamous, and the Southern Apteryx.

The breeding list of 1872 included thirty-five mammals and twenty-six birds. The most important births were two young Hippopotamuses. The first, a male, was born on January 6th, and died on January 10th. On November 5th, the second, a female, was born, and named "Guy Fawkes," in commemoration of the day. This is the larger of the two specimens now in the Gardens. It is noteworthy that this calf was reared by its dam; the only case of rearing a young Hippopotamus up to that time having been in the Gardens at Amsterdam. There, however, the calf was taken away from the mother and brought up by hand. In acknowledgment of the great skill and care shown by Mr. Bartlett upon this occasion, and of the services he had rendered generally to the Society, the Council presented him with the Silver Medal of the Society. The Bronze Medal was also given to the two keepers, Prescott and Thomson, in acknowledgment of their services on this occasion.

The number of specimens in the Menagerie on Dec. 31st, 1872, was 2,010, showing a decrease of sixty-two as compared with the number on the corresponding date of 1871.

Mr. Alfred Henry Garrod, B.A., entered on his duties as Prosector on January 1st of this year, and, as is well known from his communications to the Scientific Meetings, directed special attention to the anatomy of birds.

A revised 'List (fifth edition) of the Vertebrated Animals living in the Society's Gardens' was prepared by the Secretary and issued in 1872, and contained nearly a complete catalogue of all the living vertebrates received by the Society during the previous ten years. It was illustrated by thirty wood-cuts, mostly taken from the Society's 'Proceedings,' and comprised the names of 498 mammals, 1,044 birds, 181 reptiles, 35 batrachians, and 68 fishes.

Early in 1872 the seventh volume of the Society's 'Transactions' was completed by the issue of Part 8. The principal contributors to this volume were Professor Owen, Sir William Flower, and Dr. Murie. This volume also contains an article by Dr. Finsch, C.M.Z.S., on the birds collected by Jesse, the Zoologist of the Abyssinian Expedition.

As in the previous year, the interest of the Davis bequest was devoted to the Zoological Record Association.

A Catalogue of the Library was issued in 1872, and £206 was spent in the purchase of new books.

The income in 1872 amounted to £26,728, and the expenditure to £26,900. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 3,050. The admissions to the Gardens were 648,088, of whom 44,608 passed the gates on Whit-Monday (May 20th), the greatest number admitted in any day since the Gardens had been opened.

1873.

In 1873 the main Refreshment-room in the South Garden was rebuilt, to correspond with the new dining-rooms erected in 1869. The new lodge and entrance gates opposite Primrose Hill were also completed, and the land on the north side of the Canal was fenced and laid out, and this part of the Gardens was opened to the public.

The list of species new to the collection exhibited during this year comprised seventeen mammals, fifty-four birds, fourteen reptiles, six batrachians, and six fishes. Among the mammals the most noteworthy were two species of

Monkeys of the genus *Colobus*, a Sharp-nosed Badger, a Muscat Gazelle, a Virginian Deer, and a Chinese Water Deer. The new birds included a Collared Jay Thrush, a Tabuan Parrakeet, a Violet-necked Lory, a Boyce's Stork, a Chinese Scaup Duck, an Amazonian Guan, a White-necked Crane, and a Rock-hopper Penguin.

Twenty species of mammals and twenty-two of birds were registered in the breeding list of 1873. The number of animals in the Menagerie on December 31st was 2,187, showing an increase of 177 over the number at the corresponding period in 1872.

The interest of the Davis bequest was employed for assistance in the publication of the Zoological Record.

The income in 1873 amounted to £28,099, and the expenditure to £27,667. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 3,173. The admissions to the Gardens were 713,046.

1874.

In 1874 the only important work undertaken was the erection of the North Aviary, on the new ground opposite the north end of the bridge. The Lodge at the South Entrance was enlarged, and the Picture Gallery was fitted up as a hall for the lectures to which the interest of the Davis bequest was this year devoted. These lectures were delivered on Tuesdays and Fridays, between Easter and Whitsuntide. The first, on the Animals in the Gardens, and the following four on the Geographical Distribution of Mammals, were given by the Secretary, Mr. Sclater. Mr. A. H. Garrod, the Prosector, delivered a course of five lectures on the General Classification of Vertebrates,

and Dr. W. B. Carpenter two on the Aquarium and its Inhabitants.

The Princess Beatrice headed the list of donors this year. Twenty-one mammals, forty-five birds, nine reptiles, one batrachian, and one fish, new to the collection, were exhibited. Among the mammals the most noteworthy were a Sondaic Rhinoceros, an Arabian Gazelle, a Beisa Antelope, a Pampas Deer, a Raccoon Dog, a Servaline Cat, a Dusky Monkey, a Black-tailed Marmoset, and a Black-fronted Lemur. The birds included a Malayan Hornbill, Finsch's, the Blue-faced, and Guilding's Amazons, Goffin's Cockatoo, the Pink-headed Duck, the Falcated Teal, the Gentoo Penguin, and examples of three species of Cassowary.

The breeding-list of 1874 contained twenty-three mammals and thirty birds. The number of specimens in the Menagerie on December 31st was 2,122, as contrasted with 2,187 on the corresponding date in the previous year.

On the 2nd of October this year an explosion took place in a boat loaded with gunpowder on the canal near the Gardens, causing great damage to some of the aviaries and other buildings.

In June, 1874, the eighth volume of the Society's 'Transactions' was completed by the issue of Part 9. of that volume. It contained sixteen memoirs, amongst the authors of which were Flower, Owen, Dr. Murie, Mivart, and Allman. Two important memoirs on the Cetaceans, by Flower, formed part of this volume, as also two of Owen's memoirs on *Dinornis* (parts xviii. and xix.).

In this year Mr. Brian H. Hodgson, formerly Resident at the Court of Nepaul, presented to the Society a fine collection of original drawings of the mammals and birds of India. As an acknowledgment of this donation and of his eminent services to Zoology, Mr. Hodgson was elected an Honorary Member of the Society. Col. S. R. Tickell also presented an original illustrated MS. work, in nine folio volumes, containing memoirs on the Mammals,

Birds, Reptiles, Fishes, Crustacea and Lepidoptera of India.

A grant of £100 was made to the Zoological Station, Naples, in 1874, to assist Dr. Dohrn in establishing that institution on a permanent footing.

The income of 1874 amounted to £28,417, and the expenditure to £25,577. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 3,197. The admissions to the Gardens were 706,907.

1875.

In February, 1875, the new Lion-house was commenced and the main building was practically completed before the end of the year. It is described in the Council's Report as being at that period the largest and best building yet erected for keeping the larger Carnivora. "The total length is 228 ft., and the width from the walls to the front of the dens 35 ft. There are fourteen dens, each of which will accommodate a pair of animals, and to each den there are two inside compartments, so that the animals can be separated if necessary. At the back of the building are day-rooms and sleeping-rooms for the keepers." The first Tortoise-house in the North Garden was also built this year.

Seventeen species of mammals, thirty-nine of birds, six of reptiles, one batrachian, and three fishes were exhibited for the first time in 1875. Among the mammals were the Tora Antelope, Grant's Gazelle, a Philippine Deer, and a Manatee.

The breeding-list of 1875 contained twenty mammals and twenty birds. The number of specimens in the

Menagerie on December 31st was 2,205, showing an increase of eighty-three over the number at the corresponding date in 1874.

The interest of Davis Fund was again devoted to popular lectures at the Gardens.

A supplement to the 'Revised List of Vertebrated Animals,' published in 1872, was issued this year. It contained the names of the animals received during the previous three years, which belonged to species not included in the Revised List.

Three new Honorary Members were elected this year: Col. Tickell, in acknowledgment of his valuable donation to the Library, and of his services to Zoology; the Hon. Ashley Eden, for assistance rendered to the Society while he was Commissioner of Burmah; and the Sultan of Zanzibar, for his donations to the Menagerie.

Special leave of absence was granted by the Council to Mr. Clarence Bartlett, the Assistant Superintendent, in order that he might act as Zoological Collector during the Indian tour of the Prince of Wales.

The income of 1875 amounted to £28,738, and the expenditure to £31,667. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 3,241. The admissions to the Gardens were 699,918.

1876.

In 1876 the Lion House was finished, and early in the year the larger *Felidae* were removed to their new dens. The transfer of the animals excited a good deal of interest, and Mr. Bartlett, the Superintendent, received a number of suggestions as to how this could best be

accomplished. It was, however, effected in a very simple manner. The animals, one by one, were enticed into travelling boxes by food placed at the far end. As each entered what was practically a trap, a keeper told off for the duty dropped the sliding door behind it. The bell was then rung, the keepers gathered together on the Terrace, the travelling den was wheeled to the Lion House, and its occupant safely deposited in its new home. The operation of shifting was necessarily somewhat slow; but it was managed without the slightest accident to man or beast. At the date of the Anniversary there were in the new house six Lions, seven Tigers, two Jaguars, two Leopards, three Pumas, and one Clouded Tiger—twenty-one in all.

The great event of 1876 was the deposit by the Prince of Wales (now the King) of the collection made by him during his Indian tour. The animals arrived at the Gardens in May, in excellent condition, in charge of Mr. Clarence Bartlett, the Assistant Superintendent. The following is a list of the animals placed by H.R.H. under the care of the Society:—

Of these the Prince of Wales presented to the Society two Tigers, two Leopards, an Elephant, two Antelopes, and two Tragopans.

Six mammals, fifty-three birds, eight reptiles and one batrachian were exhibited for the first time in 1876. The breeding list included twenty-four mammals and twenty-two birds. The number of animals in the Menagerie on December 31st was 2,265, showing an increase of sixty over the number at the corresponding period of the previous year.

The interest of the Davis Fund in 1876 was devoted to popular lectures on Zoology.

The ninth volume of the Society's 'Transactions' was completed in December 1876 by the issue of Part XI. It contained twelve memoirs by various authors, amongst which was an important article by Dr. A. Leith Adams on the Maltese Fossil Elephants, illustrated by twenty-two plates. Other contributors to the volume were Owen, Parker, and Viscount Walden, the President. The final article in this volume was by the Secretary on the Rhinoceroses living in the Society's Menagerie, which are illustrated in five beautiful plates, drawn by Wolf.

The great attraction of the Indian animals brought home by the Prince of Wales raised the income of the Society in 1876 to £34,955. The expenditure was £31,635. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 3,311. The admissions to the Gardens were 915,764.

1877.

The large summer-cages outside the Lion House were finished and opened in 1877 with satisfactory results.

The animals were able to take air and exercise, and the visitors had much greater facilities for seeing them. The Sheep Sheds were removed from their old position near the Lion-house, new stone steps were put up at the Terrace, and an ornamental fence and gates were erected at the North Entrance. The second-class Refreshment Room was rebuilt.

The Queen and the Prince of Wales headed the list of donors in 1877. Examples of twenty mammals, thirty-two birds, five reptiles, and one batrachian were exhibited for the first time. The most important mammals were the White-cheeked Gibbon, the Gelada Baboon, the Woolly Cheetah, the Burrhel Wild Sheep, the Bohor Antelope, the East African Buffalo, the Mesopotamian Fallow Deer, the Porcine Deer, and a Three-banded Armadillo. The birds included the Brazilian Motmot, the Guianan Crested Eagle, the Ceylon Hawk Eagle, and the American Tantalus. The breeding list comprised twenty-two mammals and fourteen birds. There was a slight decrease in the number of animals in the Menagerie on December 31st, as compared with the corresponding number in 1876.

The Davis Fund of 1876 was devoted to popular lectures, which, with the exception of the first, were delivered in the old Museum-Building.

In 1877 the sixth edition of the 'List of the Vertebrated Animals in the Society's Gardens,' prepared by the Secretary, was issued, the names of all the specimens added to the Collection during the years 1872 to 1875 having been inserted in their proper places. The results showed that since the commencement of 1861 up to that period, specimens of 2,143 species of vertebrated animals had been exhibited.

On June 7th, 1877, the Gold Medal of the Society was presented to H.R.H. The Prince of Wales at Marlborough House, in acknowledgment of his many valuable donations to the menagerie, and other favours. The presentation was made by a deputation to The Prince, consisting of the President, Vice-Presidents, and Secretary.

In this year also the Silver Medal was conferred on Mr. Robert Hudson, F.R.S., V.P., in recognition of his valuable services as a member of the Council, and of various committees.

In 1877 the freehold of the house used as offices (No. 11, Hanover Square) and of the house at the back was purchased, in order to obtain additional accommodation.

The Rev. E. A. Tickell presented to the Library four illustrated manuscript volumes on the 'Birds of India,' prepared by the late Col. S. R. Tickell.

In this year also the Rev. W. C. Raffles Flint (now Canon Raffles Flint, F.Z.S.), presented to the Society a marble bust of his relative, the late Sir Stamford Raffles, the Founder and first President of the Society. This bust was placed in the Lion-house.

The income of 1877 amounted to £30,988, and the expenditure to £29,002. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 3,358. The admissions to the Gardens were 781,377.

1878.

The only new works at the Gardens carried on this year were the lowering of the pump in the well in order to obtain a better supply of water, and the repair of the slip on the canal-bank in front of the Elephant-house. This slip had long been a subject of contention between the Regent's Canal Company and the Society, but was at last satisfactorily settled.

On December 29th, 1878, the Marquess of Tweeddale, President of the Society, died, and Prof. W. H. Flower, F.R.S., was selected by the Council as his successor.

Sixteen species of mammals, twenty-four of birds, and

eleven of reptiles were exhibited for the first time during this year. Among the mammals were the Brown Mouse-Lemur and Smith's Dwarf Lemur, the Isabelline Bear, the Equine Antelope, and the Hairy Tapir. The most important acquisition was that of a young male Hippopotamus, born in the Amsterdam Gardens, purchased for the sum of £800.

The breeding-list of 1878 included twenty-six mammals, twenty-seven birds, and two reptiles. The total number of animals in the Menagerie on December 31st was 2,178, showing a decrease of twenty-two as compared with the corresponding period of 1877.

Prof. Huxley was the Davis Lecturer for the year 1878, his course consisting of six addresses on Crustaceous Animals and their Organization.

In 1878 the Society's Silver Medal was presented to Col. Sir Frederick Richard Pollock, K.C.S.I., in acknowledgment of his donations to the Menagerie.

At the Anniversary Meeting, April 29th, 1878, a gold watch and chain, of the value of fifty guineas, was presented to Mr. John H. Leigh, the Society's Accountant, in testimony of his long and valuable services, extending over a period of fifty years.

The income of 1878 amounted to £27,944, and the expenditure to £27,266. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 3,416. The admissions to the Gardens were 706,713.

1879.

In 1879 a new work-shed was erected for the use of the painters and mechanics in the eastern corner of the North Garden.

A slip on the North Canal bank took place, which again raised the question as to whether the Society or the Canal Company were liable in such cases. The iron and glass building which formerly served as a second-class refreshment room was re-erected near the north entrance.

At the Anniversary Meeting the election of Prof. W. H. Flower to the office of President was confirmed.

The list of species new to the Collection in 1879 included twelve mammals, twenty-six birds, ten reptiles, and two fishes. Among the mammals were the Mitred Monkey, Red-faced Saki, Japanese Goat-Antelope, and Mule Deer. Special attention was called in the Council's Report for this year to the beautiful pair of Horned Parrakeets, from New Caledonia, rare even in the principal museums, and a plate illustrating this species was given as a frontispiece.

The breeding-list comprised twenty-three mammals, eighteen birds, and three reptiles. The number of animals in the Menagerie on December 31st was 1,955, showing a decrease of 223, chiefly among the reptiles. The old male Hippopotamus, presented by the Viceroy of Egypt in 1850, died on March 11th.

Among the Davis Lectures given this year was one by the President, Prof. Flower, F.R.S., on Birds that do not Fly.

In October, 1879, the tenth volume of the Society's 'Transactions' was completed by the issue of the thirteenth part. The principal contributors to this volume were Mivart, Busk, Garrod, Parker, and Flower. The last part (Part xxi.) of Owen's long series of papers on *Dinornis* appeared in this volume.

In 1879 a new story was added to the Society's house, No. 11, Hanover Square, in order to provide additional accommodation for the Library. The back room on the second floor was assigned to readers, while the new large room on the upper story allowed ample space for additions. A new Library Catalogue was printed, and the sum of £326 was devoted to the purchase of Zoological books.

Mr. A. H. Garrod, F.R.S., Prosector to the Society,

died on October 17th, after about eight years' service. The Council placed on record the expression of their great regret at this loss, and to fill the vacancy thus caused appointed, as Prosector, (on January 7th, 1880), Mr. William Alexander Forbes, B.A., Scholar of St. John's College, Cambridge, who had acted as Mr. Garrod's deputy during his absence abroad in the winter of 1878-79.

The seventh edition of the List of Vertebrated Animals in the Society's Gardens, prepared by the Secretary, was issued this year. It contained the names of 2,325 species of vertebrated animals, specimens of which had been exhibited since the commencement of the work in 1862.

Mr. John Henry Leigh, the Society's Accountant, died in January, 1879, and Mr. John Barrow, who had acted as Mr. Leigh's Assistant for upwards of nine years, was appointed to succeed him.

The income of 1879 amounted to £26,463, and the expenditure to £25,146. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 3,364. The admissions to the Gardens were 643,000.

1880.

In 1880, in consequence of falling revenue, the expenditure on new works in the Society's Gardens was restricted to narrow limits. The building now used as an Insect-house was removed from the South Gardens into its present position, and fitted up for the reception of delicate animals which thrive only when kept in a continuously high temperature. The Parrot-house was reconstructed, and the Crows'-cages that stood on the south side of it

were removed, so as to provide a more suitable doorway. After being put into good repair, these cages were re-erected in the South Gardens, near the western Aviary as "Crows'-cages."

By the kindness of Mr. Charles Henry Gatty, F.Z.S., of Felbridge Park, East Grinstead, a new Band-stand was presented to the Society, and erected in the centre of the South Gardens. Some additional accommodation being needed for naturalists engaged in special anatomical investigations at the Prosector's Office, the erection of some workrooms at the back was commenced; and, towards the close of the year, the ground was cleared for the proposed new Reptile-house in the South Gardens.

In 1880 the Prince of Wales again headed the list of donors, having presented to the Society two Thars, two Wild Boars, six Himalayan Monauls, three Horned Tragopans, one Temminck's Tragopan, and one Spotted Turtle Dove. The list of species exhibited for the first time in 1880 included fifteen mammals, thirty birds, and seventeen reptiles. Among the new mammals were the Burrhel Sheep, the Short-nosed Bandicoot, the Koala, or Native Bear of Australia (the first brought alive to Europe), the Lühdorf's Deer, and the Tchéli Monkey. The birds included a Japanese Hawk-Eagle, a Tufted Umbre, and an Ivory Gull.

The breeding list of 1880 enumerates twenty-two mammals, eighteen birds, and one reptile. The number of specimens in the Menagerie on December 31st was 2,372, showing an increase of 417 as compared with the corresponding period in 1879. The old female Polar Bear died in 1880, after having lived in the Gardens for about thirty-four years.

A grant of £50 was made to the Zoological Record Association, and the proceeds of the Davis Trust Fund were devoted to a series of Zoological lectures. These were given by Prof. Flower, F.R.S., Prof. Mivart, F.R.S., Prof. Parker, F.R.S., Prof. Huxley, F.R.S, Mr. Sclater, and other naturalists.

New shelving was provided for the Library; the books

were rearranged, and the press-marks were entered in the standard catalogue.

A supplement to the List of Vertebrated Animals in the Society's Gardens, issued this year, contained the names of the animals received in 1879, together with the date of their arrival, and the mode of acquisition of each specimen.

The income of 1880 amounted to £27,388, and the expenditure to £26,579. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 3,309. The admissions to the Gardens were 675,979.

At the Society's Gardens, in 1881, the principal works carried out were the repairs of existing buildings, the preparations of the site for the proposed new Reptile-house, and the fitting-up of the Insect-house, which was opened on April 25th, and placed under the charge of Mr. Watkins, an experienced Entomologist and breeder of insects.

The list of animals new to the collection in 1881 contained eleven mammals, seventeen birds, eleven reptiles, and one fish. Among the mammals the most remarkable additions were a White-nosed Saki (of which till this time the type specimen in the Paris Museum was unique in Europe), a Goral Antelope, a Rubiginous Cat, and a Gemul Deer. The Twelve-wired Bird of Paradise, the Red Bird of Paradise, the Green Manucode, the Indian Darter, the Vinaceous Amazon, and the Germain's Polyplectron were special novelties among the birds.

The breeding list of 1881 included thirty mammals, among which was the Beisa Antelope (probably the first instance of this Antelope breeding in captivity), twenty-three birds, and two reptiles.

The number of animals in the Gardens on December 31st, 1881, was 2,294, showing a decrease of seventy-eight as compared with the corresponding period of 1880. The new studies in the Prosector's Office were occupied by a long-vacation class from Cambridge, who worked at the Comparative Anatomy of the Mammals, under Mr. Lister, the Demonstrator. The Pathological Society formed a Committee for the study of Comparative Pathology, and two members worked regularly in the Prosector's room. The most important death was that of a male Giraffe, the last of those bred in the Menagerie.

Mr. Robert Drummond, the Treasurer of the Society, died on the 29th of April of this year, and his son, Mr. Charles Drummond was elected Treasurer in his place.

The usual grant was made to the Zoological Record Association, and the Davis Lectures were given at the Gardens. Prof. Flower chose for his first subject "Whales," and for his second lecture "Dolphins."

Additional space being required in the Society's House, especially a larger room for holding the scientific meetings, it was determined to build a new meeting-room, with a store-room beneath it for the stowage of publications. This arrangement, however, was not carried out, the difficulty having been met in another way.

The income of 1881 amounted to £25,810, and the expenditure to £25,687. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 3,213. The admissions to the Gardens were 648,694.

1882.

In 1882 a reserve-shed for spare animals was built at the back of the Cattle Sheds; a glass roof was fixed over the Kangaroo Sheds, and a large tank was erected in the Fish-house, to enable the movements of the Diving Birds under water to be seen. The contract for the new Reptile-house was signed, and the works were begun.

The Prince of Wales and Prince Christian headed the list of donors. Seventeen mammals, forty birds, twenty reptiles, four amphibians and one fish were exhibited for the first time. The mammals included the Pigmy Hog, the Mediterranean Seal, an apparently undescribed species of Dog from the Amazons, and Coquerel's Mouse-Lemur. Among the new birds were the Warty-faced Honey-eater, the Rifle-Bird, the Radiated Fruit-Cuckoo, the Black-headed Tragopan, the Jackass Penguin, and the Elliot's Pheasant. The most noteworthy reptile was a Heloderm Lizard, the venomous character of which was established by experiments in the Gardens. In the breeding list were enumerated twenty-one mammals, eighteen birds, and one reptile. The breeding of the Gayal is believed to be the first recorded instance in Europe, and the Tapirs bred this year for the first time in the Gardens. The number of animals in the Menagerie on December 31st was 2,355.

This year Jumbo, the great African Elephant, was sold to Mr. Barnum, because it was considered unsafe to keep him in the Gardens any longer. The sale caused a great deal of excitement, but the Council would not have parted with the animal unless satisfactory reasons

for so doing had been placed before them by the responsible executive of the Gardens. A passage in the 'Notes' left by the late Superintendent, Mr. A. D. Bartlett, and subsequently published, tersely explains this: "Finding that Jumbo . . . was likely to do some fatal mischief, I made an application to the Council to be supplied with a sufficiently powerful rifle, in the event of finding it necessary to kill him." The excitement about Jumbo led to the introduction of "riding-tickets." After May 1st, 1882, rides on the Elephants and Camels were restricted to persons who had bought tickets, for which twopence each was charged. The price for Camel tickets was soon reduced to a penny. But the new regulation produced £305 in the eight months of this year in which it was in force. It has been found to work satisfactorily ever since, and a portion of the money taken in this way is divided amongst the keepers of these animals.

In 1882 there was the usual grant of £50 to the Zoological Record Association, and the Davis Lectures were given at the Gardens. Prof. Flower, F.R.S., spoke on Armadillos, Living and Extinct; Prof. Boyd Dawkins, F.R.S., on the British Lion; Prof. Parker, F.R.S., on Crocodiles; Prof. Mivart, F.R.S., on British Snakes and Lizards; Mr. W. A. Forbes, on Frogs and Toads; Prof. Martin Duncan, F.R.S., on Insects and their Metamorphoses; and Mr. Sclater, on Foreign Zoological Gardens.

The Silver Medal of the Society was presented this year to Dr. John Dean Caton, LL.D., Corresponding Member, in acknowledgment of his valuable donations to the Society's Menagerie.

The income of 1882 amounted to £34,270, and the expenditure to £29,376. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 3,213. The admissions to the Gardens were abnormally increased by the excitement caused by the "Jumbo-mania," and rose to the large number of 849,776, the second highest on record, having been only surpassed in 1876 (915,764), when the Prince of Wales's Indian collection was on view.

1883.

The new Reptile-house was completed and opened to the Public in August 1883. The total cost of this new house was £9174. A new heating apparatus was provided at the Monkey-house, and the asphalt flooring of the Lions' Dens was covered with wood.

The species new to the collection exhibited during 1883 comprised twelve mammals, fourteen birds, thirteen reptiles, and one batrachian. One of the most important acquisitions was a young female Chimpanzee, purchased in October. This was the famous "Sally" (probably referable to the form described by Du Chaillu as *Troglo-dytes calvus*), which lived eight years in the Society's Gardens. Another was the Grey Lemur (*Hapalemur griseus*). A male and two female Babirussas (*Babirussa alfurus*) were presented, and shortly before their arrival in England one of the females gave birth to a young one, which reached the Gardens safely with its dam.

The eighth edition of the List of Vertebrated Animals living in the Society's Gardens, prepared by the Secretary, was published in 1883, and contained what may be considered a nearly complete list of the animals that had been represented in the Society's Menagerie during the previous twenty years. It was illustrated by sixty-one woodcuts, mostly taken from the Society's 'Proceedings,' but some of them kindly lent by the proprietors of 'Nature.' The List contains the names of 667 species of mammals, 1,447 of birds, 307 of reptiles, 48 of batrachians, and 88 of fishes, altogether 2,557 species.

The breeding list of 1883 enumerated twenty-two mammals, seventeen birds, and three reptiles. Among

these were four Pigmy Hogs (*Porcula salvania*), which however did not long survive their birth.

The total number of animals in the Menagerie on December 31st, 1883, was 2,398, showing an increase of forty-three as compared with the corresponding period of the previous year.

The proceeds of the Davis Trust Fund in 1883 were devoted to lectures in the Gardens, which were given by Prof. Flower, F.R.S., Prof. Mivart, F.R.S., Prof. Parker, F.R.S., Mr. Henry Seebohm, and other zoologists.

The office of Prosector became vacant on January 14th of this year by the death of Mr. W. A. Forbes at Shonga, 400 miles up the Niger, whither he had gone, on his own account, on a collecting expedition.

The special Committee of the Council, appointed to deal with the question of utilising the premises in Oxford Street (formerly leased by the Society to Mr. Purdey, the gunmaker), and the provision of a new Meeting Room, reported that the addition thus acquired would be unsatisfactory, and would give only temporary relief. It was, therefore, proposed to sell this site and to purchase the freehold house, No. 3 Hanover Square (then vacant), for the sum of £16,250. This plan was carried out, and possession was taken of the new premises in the autumn of 1883. This house having been vacant many years and in bad repair, it was necessary to spend a large sum on repairs and new fittings, which altogether ultimately amounted to nearly £10,000.

In order to carry out this purchase and the necessary expenditure on the building, the sum of £12,000 was borrowed from Messrs. Drummond, upon mortgage at 4 per cent., the Society undertaking to pay off the amount by annual instalments of £1000. This undertaking was duly carried out, the last sum of £1000 having been paid to Messrs. Drummond on the 15th of June, 1895.

The income of 1883 amounted to £28,966, and the expenditure to £38,040. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 3,210. The admissions to the Gardens were 743,485.

1884.

In consequence of the large expenditure on the new Offices in Hanover Square, no important works were undertaken at the Gardens in 1884, though a good deal was done there in the way of repairs and painting by the ordinary staff of workmen.

The animals new to the collection exhibited this year comprised eleven mammals, thirty-two birds, sixteen reptiles, and two batrachians. The more important mammals were the Wild Ass from Somaliland, and a Hairy-fronted Muntjac (*Cervulus crinifrons*). Among the birds were the African Cormorant (*Phalacrocorax africanus*), the Nepalese Hornbill (*Aceros nepalensis*), the Banded Gymnogene (*Polyboroides typicus*), the Red-cheeked Coly (*Colius erythromelon*), the Purple Barbet (*Trachyphonus purpuratus*), and the Blue Snow-Goose (*Chen caerulescens*).

The breeding list of 1884 included thirty-three species of mammals and fifteen of birds.

Mr. F. E. Beddard was appointed Prosector to the Society on the 16th of January, 1884, to succeed the late Mr. W. A. Forbes.

The income of the Davis Trust Fund in 1884 was devoted to Zoological Lectures.

The Anniversary Meeting of 1884 was held in the large room of the new offices, No. 3, Hanover Square, and the opinion expressed by the Council, that a wise decision had been arrived at in making the move, was endorsed by the Fellows present. It was stated that when the Society had entered in 1843 on the occupation of No. 11, Hanover

Square, the income was £9,137; and that when that occupancy terminated in 1883 it had more than trebled, being £29,966.

In 1884 the Silver Medal was awarded to the Rev. George H. R. Fisk, C.M.Z.S., in acknowledgment of his numerous donations to the Society's Collection of Reptiles.

The income of 1884 amounted to £29,939, and the expenditure to £33,845. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 3,255. The admissions to the Gardens were 745,460.

1885.

In 1885 the new Sheep-yard was formed, consisting of a circular enclosure at the farther end of the Broad Walk, near the outer fence of the Gardens. The house was placed in the centre and covered with rockwork, so as to afford a run for these animals suitable to their habits. To this a family of Burrhel Sheep (*Ovis burrhel*) was transferred, and the animals appeared to enjoy their new quarters very much. The old Reptile-house in the North Garden was thoroughly repaired, and converted into a house for the smaller Carnivora.

The new species exhibited in 1885 comprised eleven mammals, seventeen birds, twelve reptiles, three batrachians, and one fish. Among these mammals were the Siamese Gibbon (*Hylobates pileatus*), the Pleasant Antelope (*Tragelaphus gratus*), and the Pale Fennec Fox (*Canis pallidus*). The birds included the Brown Pelican (*Pelecanus fuscus*), the Wattled Starling (*Dilophus carunculatus*), the Striated Colies (*Colius striatus*), the Gouldian

Grass Finch (*Poëphila gouldiae*), and the Black-browed Albatross (*Diomedea melanophrys*).

The breeding list of 1885 contained thirty-six mammals fifteen birds, two reptiles, and two batrachians. On December 31st, the number of animals in the Menagerie was 2,551.

The income of the Davis Trust Fund in 1885 was devoted to Zoological Lectures.

In 1885 the eleventh volume of the Society's 'Transactions' was brought to a conclusion. It contained nineteen memoirs, amongst the authors of which were Owen, Flower, Garrod, Parker, Forbes, and Günther. It contained altogether 502 pages, and was illustrated by 97 plates.

The income of 1885 amounted to £25,809, and the expenditure to £25,084. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 3,193, and the admissions to the Gardens were 659,896.

1886.

In 1886 the Antelope-house was repaired and painted, and the foundations were laid for the new Dog-kennels, planned with a view to bringing most, if not all, of the representatives of the genus *Canis* together in one building.

The animals exhibited for the first time in 1886 included twelve mammals, sixteen birds, twenty-four reptiles, three batrachians, and three fishes. Among these the most important were the Bald Ouakari (*Brachyurus calvus*), the Lesser Koodoo (*Strepsiceros imberbis*), and the Glaucous Macaw (*Ara glauca*).

The breeding list contained thirty mammals, twenty

birds, and three reptiles. The most important death was that of a male Hippopotamus, born at the Amsterdam Gardens in 1876, which had lived for nearly nine years in the Society's Gardens, and a West African Python, which had lived twenty-three years in captivity.

The Davis Lectures were given in the Lecture Room in the Gardens.

In 1886 the Society took over from the Zoological Record Association the publication of the 'Zoological Record,' which contains an annual summary of the work done by naturalists in zoological subjects all over the world. The Society also acquired possession of the whole of the back stock of this publication since its commencement in 1864. Mr. F. E. Beddard, the Prosector, was appointed Editor of the 'Zoological Record,' which has been continued in annual volumes ever since.

In 1886 a grant of £100 was made in aid of the establishment of the new Laboratory of the Marine Biological Association at Plymouth, which the Council believed would be of great importance to the future advance of marine zoology.

The income of 1886 amounted to £25,787, and the expenditure to £24,568. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 3,146, and the admissions to the Gardens were 639,674.

1887.

In 1887 the new Dog-kennels were completed and stocked. The building consisted of a central part with four large dens, and two wings, each with five smaller dens.

The great Aviary for flying birds, opposite the Eastern Aviary, was also opened this year. It is 105 ft. long and 62 ft. wide; the roof rises to a height of 27 ft. in the centre, and is formed of galvanised wire. The object of this Aviary was to provide a space in which the birds might have an opportunity to use their wings, to lead a more natural life, and to show off their habits better than they could possibly do in ordinary aviaries. Although the birds were not put in till June, 1887, pairs of two species of Ibis (*Carphibis strictipennis* and *Ibis bernieri*) nested in some of the trees and reared their young.

The animals new to the collection exhibited in 1887 comprised eight mammals, ten birds, eight reptiles, and six batrachians. Among these were a Gorilla (*Anthropopithecus gorilla*) purchased on October 10th, of Mr. Cross, of Liverpool, which, however, unfortunately died within the year.

The breeding-list of 1887 included twenty-nine mammals, twenty-one birds, and three reptiles. The number of animals in the Gardens on December 31st was 2,525.

Mr. Beddard, Prosector to the Society, was appointed Davis Lecturer in 1887, and gave a course on the Classification of Vertebrates.

In order to mark the Jubilee of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, which took place this year, in some special way, it was decided to hold the General Meeting in June in the Gardens. After the usual formal business had been transacted, the Silver Medal awarded to the Maharajah of Kuch-Behar was presented to His Highness in person, and suitably acknowledged. Prof. Flower, C.B., President of the Society, then delivered an Address, which was printed as an Appendix to the Council's Report. It dealt in general terms with the principal points in the history of the Society from its foundation in 1826, tracing its progress throughout. The connection of the Royal Family with the Society as patrons and donors, the scientific meetings, the publications, the Davis Lectures, the Menagerie, and the recent improve-

ments in the Gardens, were passed in review. The President concluded by appealing for the continued support of the public, either by becoming Fellows or by visiting the Gardens, and expressed the hope that the "brief record of the Society's history would show that such support was not undeserved by those who have had the management of its affairs." A reception held after the meeting was numerously attended by the Fellows and their friends and by many specially invited guests, among whom were the Queen of Hawaii and Princess Liliokalani, the Thakore Sahib of Limbdi, H.H. the Prince Devawongse, and the Maharajah of Bhurtpore.

A new Catalogue of the Library was issued in 1887, containing the titles of about 6,560 publications.

The income of 1887 amounted to £23,102, and the expenditure to £23,135. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 3,104, and the admissions to the Gardens were 562,898.

1888.

In 1888 little was done in works at the Gardens besides repairs and renewals. The contract with Messrs. Trotman for the supply of refreshments in the Gardens having come to an end, it was taken over by Spiers and Pond, Limited, and the main refreshment building was thoroughly painted, repaired, and redecorated. The walks near the Camel-house and the Band Stand were altered, and other smaller repairs were carried out.

The list of animals new to the collection in 1888 contained the names of five mammals, eleven birds, nine reptiles,

and five batrachians. Among the mammals the novelties were a Samango Monkey (*Cercopithecus samango*) and a Small-clawed Otter (*Lutra leptonyx*). The birds included examples of the Prince of Wales's Pheasant (*Phasianus principalis*), the Spotted Hawk-Eagle (*Spizaetus nipalensis*), from Northern India, and a new Penguin (*Eudyptes sclateri*). A young Chimpanzee purchased of Mr. Cross belonged apparently to the Bald-headed species (*Anthropopithecus calvus*). As there was a Common Chimpanzee (*A. troglodytes*) of about the same age in the Gardens, it was easy to compare the two together.

In this year there occurred an irruption into Western Europe from North-east Asia of Pallas's Sand Grouse (*Syrrhaptes paradoxus*), according to Prof. Newton, "in numbers quite incalculable." Three living specimens of this bird—one from Berwick-on-Tweed and two from the island of Tiree, Argyllshire, N.B., were presented to the Society.

In the breeding list of 1888 there were recorded the names of thirty-one species of mammals, seventeen birds, and two reptiles. The number of animals living in the Menagerie on December 31st was 2,290, showing a decrease of 235 as contrasted with the corresponding period in the previous year.

Mr. F. E. Beddard, Prosector to the Society, was appointed Davis Lecturer for this year, and delivered a course of ten Lectures on Reptiles, Living and Extinct.

In 1888 Madame Cornély, widow of M. J. Cornély, C.M.Z.S., of Tours, on her death bequeathed to the Society her late husband's Zoological Library, which was received from the executors in October. The bequest comprised about 840 volumes, of which 256 were new to the Society's Library. Many of the works thus acquired were rare, and would have been difficult to obtain under ordinary circumstances.

The income of 1888 amounted to £24,025, and the expenditure to £22,139. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 3,076, and the admissions to the Gardens were 608,402.

1889.

In 1889 additions were made to the money-takers' lodges at the north entrance, where the accommodation had been found insufficient. In the Gardens generally the works were of a minor character. A new glass roof was placed on the Monkey-house; the walk round the Seal Pond was raised so as to afford a better view of the feeding of the Sea Lions; and other repairs were carried out.

The list of animals new to the Collection exhibited in 1889 included six mammals, thirteen birds, four reptiles, and two batrachians. The most important new mammal was a young Gaur (*Bos gaurus*) presented by Sir Cecil C. Smith, K.C.M.G., Governor of the Straits Settlement. This was the first specimen of the species received alive in Europe, and in recognition of the value of the gift the donor was elected an Honorary Member.

The breeding list of 1889 comprised thirty-one mammals and eighteen birds. Among the noteworthy deaths were a Condor which had lived for thirty-three years in the Gardens, and a large Anaconda which measured 15 ft. 9 in. in length. The number of specimens in the Menagerie on December 31st was 2,232, showing a decrease of fifty-eight on the corresponding period in 1888.

Mr. Benjamin Misselbrook, who had filled the office of Head Keeper for twenty-one years, retired this year after more than sixty years' service in the employ of the Society. Mr. Arthur Thomson, son of Mr. James Thom-

son a former Head Keeper, was appointed to the vacant post.

Mr. F. E. Beddard, the Society's Prosector and Davis Lecturer, delivered a course of six Lectures on some of the more interesting animals in the Society's collection.

The Silver Medal of the Society was awarded to Dr. E. D. Dickson, C.M.Z.S., of Constantinople, in recognition of the zoological collections which he had presented to the Society.

The income of 1889 amounted to £26,427, and the expenditure to £23,228. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 3,075, and the admissions to the Gardens were 644,679.

1890.

In 1890 the improvements in the Monkey-house commenced in the previous year, were completed, and much other work was done in repairs of a minor character.

The list of species exhibited for the first time in 1890 comprised seven mammals, eighteen birds, nine reptiles, two batrachians, and one fish. Especially noteworthy novelties were a Bay Colobus (*Colobus ferrugineus*) and a young female Selous' Antelope (*Tragelaphus selousi*). The last-named animal had been captured near Lake Ngami by Mr. Nicolls and carried in his waggons 800 miles to Kimberley, whence it was brought to this country. A young white Bull from the Chartley Herd, Staffordshire, presented by Earl Ferrers, was the first example of any of the old breeds of English Wild Cattle

exhibited by the Society. A Grey Hypocolius (*Hypocolius ampelinus*) was the first specimen of this rare Passerine form which had reached Europe alive. A Chinese Alligator (*Alligator sinensis*) excited considerable interest among zoologists, as affording them an opportunity of seeing an example of a genus that till 1879 had been supposed to belong exclusively to the American Continent.

The twelfth volume of the Society's 'Transactions' was completed in 1890 by the issue of the tenth part. It contained fifteen zoological memoirs, amongst the authors of which were Owen, Parker, Mr. Boulenger, and Mr. F. E. Beddard, the Prosector.

The breeding list of 1890 contained the names of twenty-eight mammals, twenty birds, and one reptile. Among the noteworthy deaths were a male Thylacine (one of a pair purchased in 1884), and a Common Crane, bred in the Gardens (1863), which had lived in confinement nearly twenty-eight years.

On December 31st the number of specimens in the Menagerie was 2,256, showing an increase of twenty-four as compared with the corresponding period of the previous year.

In response to frequent applications to know "how the animals were fed," the Council's Report published this year contained a table showing the nature and quantities of the provisions consumed during the period 1880-89.

The Davis Lectures of this year were delivered by Mr. F. E. Beddard, and consisted of six addresses on 'The Colours of Animals.'

The income of 1890 amounted to £25,059, and the expenditure to £23,572. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 3,046, and the admissions to the Gardens were 640,987.

1891.

In 1891 a new yard for the Barbary Sheep was constructed near the Band Stand, to correspond with that erected for the Burrhel Sheep, near the Lion-house, and the occupants were stated to thrive in their new quarters, as they have done ever since. A Kiosk, for the sale of photographs of animals living in the Gardens, was built near the Broad Walk. At the eastern end of the Monkey House an open-air cage was erected for a Tcheli Monkey (*Macacus tcheliensis*), in which it has lived in good health till the present time.

The list of species new to the collection in 1891 comprised four mammals, twenty-four birds, eight reptiles, two batrachians, and one fish. The most important were a young Ounce or Snow Leopard (*Felis uncia*), a Lhuy's Impeyan Pheasant (*Lophophorus lhuysi*), and examples of the Tibetan Crossoptilon (*Crossoptilon tibetanum*).

The breeding list of 1891 contained the names of twenty-six species of mammals, nine of birds, and two of reptiles. The Bald-headed Chimpanzee, "Sally," which had lived in the Gardens eight years, and an African Rhinoceros (*Rhinoceros bicornis*), purchased in 1868, died this year.

The number of animals in the Menagerie on December 31st, 1891, was 2,232, showing a decrease of twenty-four as compared with the corresponding period of 1890.

Mr. Beddard resigned the editorship of the 'Zoological Record' this year, and was succeeded by the present editor, Dr. David Sharp, F.R.S., to whom the income of the Davis Trust Fund was assigned as remuneration for this work.

A course of six lectures was delivered during the summer by Mr. F. E. Beddard, the Prosector, on the Animals Living in the Society's Gardens.

At the commencement of the decennial period 1891-1900 it was determined to discontinue the edition of the Society's 'Proceedings' with uncoloured plates, and to have a single uniform issue under the title, 'Proceedings of the General Meetings for Scientific Business of the Zoological Society of London.' The 'Proceedings' were continued in annual volumes under this title up to the end of the century.

At the Anniversary Meeting in this year, the Silver Medal of the Society was awarded to Mrs. Edmonston and Mr. R. T. C. Scott, in acknowledgment of the effective protection accorded for sixty years to the Great Skua (*Megalestris catarrhactes*) by the families of Edmonston and Scott at Uist and Foula.

The income of 1891 amounted to £24,054, and the expenditure to £23,697. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 2,985, and the admissions to the Gardens were 598,730.

1892.

In 1892 no new buildings were erected in the Society's Gardens, but the staff of workmen was kept busily employed in repairs and renewals throughout the year. In the Great Aviary the large central pond was filled up, and several smaller shallow ponds were made, as better adapted for the wading birds.

Of species new to the collection there were exhibited in 1892 eleven mammals, twenty birds, fourteen reptiles, and one batrachian. Of these the most important were a young Gibbon (*Hylobates hainanus*), of a uniform black colour, from Hainan; a Monkey (*Cercopithecus stairsi*), new to science, from the Lower Zambesi, and a Puisa Ichneumon (*Bdeogale puisa*). Other valuable accessions were a young male Hippopotamus, born in the Antwerp Gardens, and a very fine male Ostrich (*Struthio camelus*), from West Africa, deposited by H.M. the Queen.

The breeding list of 1892 comprised twenty-six mammals, sixteen birds, and two reptiles. The most important death was that of the male Giraffe, acquired in 1879, the last survivor of the old stock. The Gardens were now, for the first time since the arrival of the original stock on May 24th, 1836, without a representative of this mammal. Since that epoch thirty individuals had been exhibited, of which seventeen had been born in the Gardens, and thirteen purchased. The last birth in the Menagerie had taken place on March 17th, 1867.

The total number of animals in the Gardens on December 31st, 1892, was 2,413, showing an increase of 181 over the corresponding period of the previous year.

In the summer of 1892, Mr. F. E. Beddard, the Society's Prosector, delivered four lectures on Anthropoid Apes in the Lecture-room at the Gardens.

The income of 1892 amounted to £24,877, and the expenditure to £23,855. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 2,999, and the admissions to the Gardens were 605,718.

1893.

In 1893 the old stables at the north-west corner of the Middle Garden, used for the reception of new arrivals, were pulled down and rebuilt, and a large number of other repairs and renewals were carried on.

The most interesting animals added to the Collection in 1893 were a female Caucasian Wild Goat (*Capra caucasica*), a family of European Beavers (*Castor fiber*) from the Lower Rhone, a Corean Sea Eagle (*Haliaëtus branickii*), and an example of the Great Grebe of Antarctic America (*Aechmophorus major*). Other important additions were an adult male of Stairs' Monkey (*Cercopithecus stairsi*), and three White-tailed Gnus from the Transvaal, which were the foundation of the Society's breeding stock of this Antelope.

The breeding list of 1893 contained twenty-nine mammals, fifteen birds, one reptile, and two batrachians. The most interesting birth was that of a female Waterbuck (*Cobus ellipsiprymnus*), the first example, so far as is known, of this antelope bred in captivity.

The number of animals in the Menagerie on December 31st was 2,522, showing an increase of 109 over the number at the corresponding period of 1892.

In this year Sir Henry Arthur Blake, K.C.M.G., then Governor of Jamaica, who by presents of valuable animals to the Menagerie, and in other ways, had promoted Zoological science, was elected an Honorary Member. The President and the Principal of the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons were added to the list of *ex officio* Honorary Members.

The Council passed a resolution in 1893 approving of a proposal by the Government of New Zealand for the protection of the native birds in reserves, and suggesting also that in these reserves protection should be afforded to the Tuatera Lizard (*Sphenodon punctatus*).

In 1893 the Society's Silver Medal was awarded to Mr. Donald Cameron, of Lochiel, and Mr. John Peter Grant, of Rothiemurchus, in recognition of the efforts made by them to protect the Osprey (*Pandion haliaëtus*) in their respective districts. The Silver Medal was also bestowed on Mr. George S. Mackenzie, F.Z.S., who, during his residence in British Central Africa, had sent home many valuable animals as presents to the Menagerie.

In this year Benjamin Misselbrook, formerly Head Keeper, died at the age of eighty-two, having been pensioned in 1889. Misselbrook had entered the Society's service as a boy in 1828, and was Head Keeper for twenty years.

In 1893 the principal rooms in the Society's House in Hanover Square were fitted with electric light, and additional oak bookcases were made for the library.

The income of 1893 amounted to £26,217, and the expenditure to £25,278. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 2,985, and the admissions to the Gardens were 662,649.

1894.

In 1894 no special works of any magnitude were carried out at the Gardens, but a scheme for draining them was prepared, and the staff of workmen was kept busy on general repairs.

The species new to the Collection of which specimens were exhibited in the Gardens in 1894, included seventeen mammals, twenty-nine birds, four reptiles, two batrachians, and two fishes. Among these were a valuable collection of small mammals presented by Dr. J. Anderson, F.R.S., being part of the acquisitions made during a recent expedition to Egypt, and a fine example of a Livingstone's Eland (*Oreas canna livingstonii*) from the Transvaal, which differs from the ordinary form in carrying stripes.

The breeding list of 1894 contained thirty mammals, twelve birds, and sixteen reptiles. During the year the White-tailed Gnu (*Connochætus gnu*) bred for the first time in the gardens. Among the deaths was that of a Polar Bear which had lived for about twenty-three years in the Gardens.

The number of animals in the Menagerie on December 31st was 2,563, showing an increase of thirty-nine over the number on the corresponding date in 1893.

A course of five lectures, in connection with the London Society for the Extension of University Teaching, was delivered by Mr. F. E. Beddard, F.R.S., in the Lecture Room in the Gardens on Geographical Distribution.

The Silver Medal of the Society was bestowed in 1894 on Mr. H. H. (now Sir Harry) Johnston, H.B.M. Commissioner for British Central Africa, in recognition of his distinguished services to all branches of Natural History during his residence in Nyasaland. Lieut.-Col. Sir C. B. H. Mitchell, K.C.M.G., Governor of the Straits Settlements, who had made several valuable donations to the Society's Menagerie, was elected an Honorary Member.

The income of 1894 amounted to £25,107, and the expenditure to £23,616. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 2,972, and the admissions to the Gardens were 625,538.

1895.

The new scheme for the drainage of the Society's Gardens, planned in 1894, was brought to a satisfactory conclusion in 1895. Up to this date the drainage of the Gardens had, with the acquiescence of the authorities, been carried into the Regent's Canal. A new sewer, running along the Outer Circle, having been brought up to the Gardens by the parochial authorities, the drainage of the Gardens was now diverted into it at a cost to the Society of about £1,150. Thus was settled without litigation a serious question, which had occupied the attention of the Vestries, of the Directors of the Regent's Canal, and of the Council of the Society for the past fifty years.

The animals new to the Collection exhibited in 1895 were ten mammals, ten birds, ten reptiles, one batrachian, and one fish. These included the first example of the southern form of the Giraffe (*Giraffa camelopardalis capensis*), the Alexandra Parrakeet (*Polytelis alexandræ*), the Forsten's Lorikeet (*Trichoglossus forsteni*), and a specimen of the Australian Frilled Lizard (*Chlamydosaurus kingi*). Other important additions filling gaps in the Society's Collection were a pair of Brindled Gnus (*Connochætes taurina*), and a pair of Sable Antelopes (*Hippotragus niger*).

The list of breeding species in 1895 included twenty-three mammals, twenty-two birds, and one reptile. Eggs were deposited by the Surinam Water Toad (*Pipa americana*), and the egg-bearing female was successfully photographed. Among the noteworthy deaths were a Cunning

Bassarid (*Bassarid astuta*), and the fine male Ostrich (*Struthio camelus*), deposited in 1893 by Queen Victoria.

Seth Sutton, after nearly forty years' service in the Gardens as keeper, retired on a pension in 1895.

In 1895 the thirteenth volume of the Society's quarto 'Transactions' was brought to a conclusion. It contained fifteen memoirs, which were illustrated by sixty-two plates. Amongst the authors were Mr. Beddard, Mr. Boulenger, Dr. Gadow and Dr. Parker. Mr. Boulenger's Catalogue of the Reptiles and Batrachians of Barbary, and Parker's important account of the Hoatzin, appeared in this volume.

The number of animals in the Menagerie on December 31st, 1895, was 2,369, showing a decrease of 194 as compared with the corresponding period in 1894.

The income of 1895 amounted to £26,958, and the expenditure to £25,110. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 3,027, and the admissions to the Gardens were 665,326.

1896.

In 1896 plans were prepared for a new Ostrich-and-Crane-house, for the site of which the ground was cleared by removing the sheds and enclosures south of the Monkey-house. Small works and repairs were carried on by the Garden staff, the chief of which was the erection of a row of cages for the more hardy small Carnivora outside the Small Cats'-house.

The animals exhibited for the first time in 1896 comprised eleven mammals, eleven birds, twenty-two reptiles, and three batrachians. Among these were examples of Brazza's Monkey (*Cercopithecus brazzae*), from French

Congoland; of the Clawless Manatee (*Manatus inunguis*), from the Amazons; of a Loder's Gazelle (*Gazella loderi*), from Western Egypt; of the Klipspringer (*Oreotragus saltator*); of the Lettered Araçaris (*Pteroglossus inscriptus*); and of Franklin's Gulls (*Larus franklini*). In March a young female Gorilla (*Anthropopithecus gorilla*) was purchased, and did well for some months, but died on August 16th.

The breeding list of 1896 included twenty-one mammals, sixteen birds, and one reptile. Eggs were again deposited on the back of the Surinam Water Toad, and on this occasion the way in which the deposition took place was fortunately discovered, and described in the Society's 'Proceedings' (P. Z. S. 1896, p. 395), by the Superintendent. The most serious loss by death was that of the male Indian Elephant, Jung Pershad, deposited by the Prince of Wales on his return from India in 1876. To fill the vacancy a young elephant from Burmah was purchased.

Mr. W. J. Williams, the Chief Clerk, who had been in the Society's service for upwards of thirty-seven years, retired at the close of 1896 upon a well-earned pension, and Mr. W. H. Cole was appointed Chief Clerk in his place. The charge of the Scientific Meetings and Publications was then assigned to Mr. George A. Doubleday, lately Assistant in the Society's Library.

The ninth edition of the 'List of Vertebrated Animals in the Gardens,' prepared by the Secretary, and published in 1896, gave references to all the specimens that had been registered in the books during the previous twelve years, arranged in systematic order. The names of the species recorded in previous Lists, of which no examples had been received during the preceding twelve years, were likewise inserted in the text, so that the result was a nearly complete catalogue of all the species of Vertebrates of which living specimens had been received by the Society during the preceding thirty-four years. This List is illustrated by seventy woodcuts, and contains the names of 3,044 species of vertebrates.

The number of animals in the Menagerie on December 31st, 1896, was 2,473, showing an increase of 104 as compared with the corresponding period in 1895.

The income of 1896 amounted to £27,081, and the expenditure to £26,405. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 3,098, and the admissions to the Gardens were 665,004.

1897.

The new Ostrich-and-Crane-house was completed in 1897, at a total cost of £3,383. The southern half of the building, with twelve compartments, was devoted to the Ratite birds, with the Ostriches in the centre. The northern half of the building, with sixteen compartments, was assigned to the Storks and Cranes. The new Tortoise-house, almost immediately adjoining the Reptile-house, was erected at a cost of £464, towards which the Hon. Walter Rothschild kindly contributed £150. Besides these new buildings a great number of smaller works, repairs, and renewals were carried out by the Society's workmen.

The species new to the collection in 1897 comprised twelve mammals, eighteen birds, twenty reptiles, two batrachians, and one fish. Among these the most noteworthy among the mammals were the Tantalus Monkey (*Cercopithecus tantalus*), the Altai Deer (*Cervus eustephanus*), the White-naped Weasel (*Pæcilogale albinucha*), and a new Wild Cat (*Felis dominicanorum*) from China. Among the new birds exhibited were the Uvæan Parakeet (*Nymphicus uvænsis*), the Pigmy Goose (*Nettopus coromandelianus*), Smith's Bronze-winged Pigeon (*Geo-*

phaps smithi), the Thick-billed Penguin (*Eudyptes pachyrhynchus*), and the White-legged Falconet (*Microhierax melanoleucus*). A Daudin's Tortoise (*Testudo daudini*), believed to be the largest Land Tortoise now living, was deposited by the Hon. Walter Rothschild.

The breeding list of 1897 comprised twenty-four mammals and seventeen birds. Among the more important deaths were the Snow Leopard, purchased in 1894, and a Reticulated Python, supposed to be the largest ever exhibited. A Giraffe, sent as a present by the Chief Bathoen, of Bechuanaland, to Queen Victoria, died almost as soon as it had been received at the Gardens.

The total number of specimens in the Gardens on December 31st was 2,585, showing an increase of 112 over the corresponding period in 1896.

On May 7th, 1897, Mr. Abraham Dee Bartlett, who had held the office of Superintendent of the Gardens for thirty-eight years, died at his residence in the Gardens. At the following General Meeting the Council recorded "their deep sense of the services rendered to the Society by the late Mr. Bartlett, during the long period for which he had held his post, and of their full appreciation of the skill, energy, and faithfulness with which he discharged the multifarious and difficult duties of his office." His second son, Mr. Clarence Bartlett, who had long been Assistant Superintendent and Clerk of the Works, was appointed as his successor.

The Silver Medal of the Society was awarded to Mr. Alexander Whyte, F.Z.S., for the valuable services rendered to Zoological Science by his researches in British Central Africa. Many papers based on his collections had been published in the 'Proceedings.'

The income of 1897 amounted to £28,713, and the expenditure to £27,705. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 3,158, and the admissions to the Gardens were 717,755.

1898.

The principal works executed at the Gardens in 1898 were the Fellows' Tea-Pavilion on the Lawn, opposite to the Band Stand, and the reconstruction on the old site, but in an improved form, of the Llama-house. The cost of the former was £779, and of the latter £767. The space available at the Western end of the Middle Garden, owing to the removal of the old Cassowary Sheds and the transfer of the birds to the Ostrich-house, was utilised for a new Zebra-house, which was begun this year. A new bore was made in the well, sunk on the canal bank in the early days of the Society; the cost of this, with a new engine and machinery for raising water, was £1,288.

The animals new to the collection exhibited in 1898 comprised ten mammals, thirteen birds, fourteen reptiles, one batrachian, and one fish. Among these were the Siamang Gibbon (*Hylobates syndactylus*), the Rüppell's Colobus (*Colobus guereza*), the L'Hoëst's Monkey (*Cerco-pithecus l'hoësti*), and the Bedford Deer (*Cervus xanthopygius*). Two examples of Forster's Lung Fish (*Ceratodus forsteri*), from Queensland, were purchased of Mr. D. O'Connor.

In the breeding list of 1898 were enumerated twenty-eight mammals and sixteen birds.

Two grants were made for scientific objects in 1898—the sum of £100 to the funds of the International Zoological Congress, and a similar sum towards the expenses of preparing an 'Index Generum et Specierum Animalium,' a most important work for the future progress of Zoology, undertaken by Mr. C. Davies Sherborn, F.Z.S.

On August 27th, 1898, the President and Council held a reception in the Society's Gardens for the Members of the Fourth International Congress of Zoology, which had met at Cambridge during the preceding week. The reception was attended by a large number of Members of the International Congress and of the Society.

The fourteenth volume of the Society's quarto 'Transactions' was completed in 1898 by the issue of the eighth part. It contained eleven Zoological papers by Mr. Boulenger, Prof. Lankester, Dr. Brady, and other authors. Mr. Oldfield Thomas's memoir on the new and remarkable mammals obtained by the late Mr. John Whitehead in the Philippines appeared in this volume.

In 1898 Mr. F. E. Beddard, F.R.S., Prosector to the Society, was appointed Vice-Secretary, with the special object of assisting the Secretary in all matters connected with the Gardens. A course of ten lectures on Amphibians and Reptiles was delivered by Mr. Beddard in the Lecture Room at the Society's Gardens.

The income of 1898 amounted to £29,208, and the expenditure to £29,698. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 3,185, and the admissions to the Gardens were 710,948.

1899.

In 1899 the internal fittings of the new Zebra-house were completed and the building was finished at a total cost of about £1,100. The animals were placed in their

stalls early in March. The staff of workmen was engaged in general maintenance and repairs, and in the erection of several small buildings.

The animals new to the Collection in 1899 comprised ten mammals, twenty-six birds, five reptiles, and three fishes. Of the mammals the most important were a pair of Grévy's Zebras (*Equus grevyi*) deposited by Queen Victoria, to whom they had been presented by the Emperor Menelik of Abyssinia. Besides these fine animals the series of Equidæ in the Gardens then comprised:—

- 1 African Wild Ass (*Equus tæniopus*).
- 1 Somali Wild Ass (*E. somalicus*).
- 2 Onagers (*E. onager*).
- 1 Kiang (*E. hemionus*).
- 6 Burchell's Zebras (*E. burchelli*).
- 2 Mountain Zebras (*E. zebra*).

Other animals deserving special notice in 1899 were a fine young male Argali (*Ovis ammon*), a Cape Jumping Hare (*Pedetes caffer*), the first example which, despite repeated trials, had reached the Gardens alive, and a male Selous' Antelope (*Tragelaphus selousi*). In 1899 Mr. Rothschild deposited under the Society's care a fine series of Cassowaries, six of which were new to the Collection. A young male Giraffe from South Africa was purchased for £800, making a pair of this animal.

The breeding list of 1899 contained the names of twenty-five mammals, nine birds, and one reptile. The number of animals in the Menagerie on December 31st was 2,753, showing an increase of ninety-seven over the corresponding period of the previous year.

On July 1st the Presidentship of the Society became vacant by the death of Sir William Flower, who had filled the office for more than twenty years. During this period Sir William Flower had regularly occupied the Presidential chair, and had been constantly engaged on Committees and on other matters connected with the Society's affairs. In Sir William Flower the Society lost a zoologist of the highest ability, and a most able and energetic President. To succeed him the Council selected

His Grace The Duke of Bedford as President, and their choice was confirmed at the Anniversary Meeting in 1900.

In 1899 Mr. F. E. Beddard, F.R.S., delivered a course of eight popular lectures on Aquatic Mammals, in the Lecture-room in the Gardens. A grant of £100 was made towards the expenses of the 'Index Generum et Specierum Animalium.'

Early in this year Mr. Arthur Thomson, Head Keeper, was made also Assistant Superintendent.

The income of 1899 amounted to £28,879, and the expenditure to £29,420. The number of Fellows on December 31st was 3,246, and the admissions to the Gardens were 696,707.

1900.

In 1900 the most important works executed at the Gardens were the completion of the machinery for the deep well, the construction of a second reservoir for water, and the reconstruction of the roof of the Lion-house, with larger skylights. The Pheasantry in the North Garden was completed by the Garden staff, but was not opened till the following year.

The list of species new to the Collection exhibited in 1900 contained fourteen mammals, thirty-two birds, twenty-one reptiles, three batrachians, and two fishes. The most important mammal was a Rocky Mountain Goat (*Haploceros montanus*), believed to be the first living specimen of this animal brought to Europe. Among the new birds may be mentioned the Ural Owl (*Syrnium uralense*), the Rose-collared Lorikeet (*Trichoglossus rubri-*

torques), the Caffre Bustard (*Eupodotis caffra*), the Bouquet's Amazon (*Chrysotis bouqueti*), and a fine series of Indian birds, presented by Mr. E. W. Harper, F.Z.S., of Calcutta, comprising examples of twenty species, mostly new to the Collection.

The breeding list of 1900 contained nineteen mammals, twelve birds, and one reptile. Among these was the Brindled Gnu (*Connochætes taurina*)—the first instance of this Antelope breeding in the Gardens. The number of animals in the Menagerie on December 31st, 1900, was 2,865, showing an increase of 112 as compared with the corresponding date of the previous year.

The Silver Medal of the Society was conferred in 1900 on the late Mr. John Ernest Matcham, C.M.Z.S., in recognition of his many valuable donations to the Menagerie. From the beginning of 1894 up to the end of 1900 he had sent to the Society 525 African animals—57 mammals, 48 birds, and 420 reptiles.

The Zoological Lectures of 1900 were delivered in the Meeting-room, No. 3, Hanover Square, W., after the General Meetings in April, May, June, and July, in the following order: Dr. A. Smith Woodward (on the Animals of Australia); Mr. G. A. Boulenger, F.R.S. (on the Fresh-water Fishes of Africa); Prof. E. Ray Lankester, F.R.S. (on the Gigantic Sloths of Patagonia; and Mr. F. E. Beddard, F.Z.S. (on Whales). Grants to the amount of £350 were made in aid of science; £200 to the funds of the National Antarctic Expedition; £100 to the expenses of preparing the 'Index Generum et Specierum Animalium'; and £50 in aid of the Expedition of Mr. J. S. Budgett, F.Z.S., to the Gambia.

At the close of the century, the Staff at Hanover Square consisted of the Secretary (P. L. Sclater, Esq., M.A., Ph.D., F.R.S.), the Vice-Secretary and Prosector (F. E. Beddard, Esq., F.R.S.), an Accountant, a Librarian, four clerks, and two messengers. The Garden Staff consisted of the Superintendent and Assistant-superintendent, one store-keeper, one head-gardener, one Prosector's assistant, a Clerk of the Works, and a clerk in

the office. There were also twenty-one keepers and three money-takers—making thirty-one persons in all paid by monthly salaries. Besides these there were twenty-one helpers in the Menagerie, two butchers, two stokers, two night watchmen, one cook, and one messenger paid by weekly wages. On the Gardener's Staff there were one propagator, two assistant-propagators, and ten labourers. On the Works Staff there were two carpenters, two bricklayers, one smith, two wire-workers, one engine driver, one net-worker, eleven painters, eleven labourers, and one time-keeper—all at weekly wages, so that the number of the Garden Staff might be reckoned at about 105.

The income of 1900 amounted to £28,772, and the expenditure to £28,488. The number of Fellows on December 31st, 1900, was 3,250, and the admissions to the Gardens were 697,178.
