THE ROYAL SOCIETY.

Incorporated in London, 1662, by Royal Charter granted by Charles II.

THE ORIENTAL TRANSLATION FUND. Instituted in London in 1828 under the

patronage of King George IV., and subsequently of Her Most Excellent Majesty The Queen.

The Oriental Translation Fund was established in 1828 by several Oriental scholars and others interested in Eastern literature "for the translation and publication of such works on Eastern history, science, and belles lettres as are inaccessible to the European public in MS. form and indigenous language."

The object thus proposed attracted considerable attention, and received very liberal support. The Royal Family honoured the proposal with their special approbation. Their Majesties George IV. and William IV. consented to become patrons and subscribers. Her present Majesty, as well as His

Royal Highness the Prince Consort, graciously continued the same beneficial encouragement.

A Committee composed of scholars well known for their attainments in Eastern literature, was appointed to carry out the design of the Institution. Although from the distinct field of operations contemplated by this body, it necessarily acted as a separate society, yet it was regarded as an important branch of the Royal Asiatic Society, and was encouraged and aided by its support.

The Committee thus formed was successively presided over by the Earl of Munster, Sir Gore Ouseley, the Earl of Clare, the Earl of Ellesmere, Professor Wilson, and Beriah Botfield, Esq., M.P.

The advantages and support enjoyed by the Committee enabled them to assist the labours of many Oriental scholars, and to promote the cultivation in this country of Oriental Literature by the publication of translations into European languages of various original works, thus affording material assistance to students of ecclesiastical and civil history, philology, and other collateral branches of useful knowledge connected with the East.

The Committee invited and obtained the assistance of many eminent scholars, and during a period of thirty-two years published or aided in the publication of seventy-one translations, in upwards of one hundred volumes, quarto and octavo. Of these many are highly valuable, all are curious or interesting, and several of them are of such a nature that without the aid afforded by the Society they could scarcely have been undertaken.

The Sanscrit translations include those of the Sankhya Karika, Rig Veda, and Vishnu Purana. Amongst those from the Arabic are found the travels of Ibn Batuta, and of the Patriarch Macarius, Al-Makkari's history of the Muhammadan Dynasties in Spain, and the extensive Lexicon of Hajji Khalfa. There are also translations from the Persian, Syriac, Ethiopic, Armenian, Chinese, and Japanese languages.

The last person who joined this useful Society was Mr. Osmond de Beauvoir Priaulx. He was enrolled as a member about the year 1855. A few years afterwards, he and Dr. Hoole, the representative of the Wesleyan Mission House, were the only two surviving members of the Society, and its existence as a publishing corporation was therefore virtually Under these circumstances an amicable ended. arrangement was effected, that the Wesleyan Mission should have the entire remaining stock of the Oriental Translation Fund publications for the sum of f_{570} . After having held it some time, and furnished each of their foreign stations with a copy of every book, the Mission authorities ultimately sold the much-reduced stock to me at the price they had paid for the entire remainder. Subsequently I found it necessary to pay £100 for one of the Wesleyan depôts which would otherwise have come into the market to my detriment. Dr. Hoole accomplished, therefore, a highly successful commercial transaction by getting about twenty complete sets of the Fund publications and f_{100} in cash, as the clear profit of his enterprise. Later on, another depôt of the Society's books was unearthed in Paris, and it was similarly indispensable that I should annex them to the general stock. It might be supposed that I had a certain right to favourable treatment in the matter, but Mr. Priaulx, acting as Treasurer, compelled me to undergo further heavy

exactions—I was compelled to pay £220 for the warehoused stock, a bonus of £110 to the Baron MacGuckin de Slane for the labour of editing his own work (already half printed), and £235 to cover the amount of the printer's bill for producing the third and fourth volumes of Ibn Khallikan (No. 57 of the ensuing list). It will thus be seen that I became, at a very heavy outlay, the proprietor of all the Oriental Translation Fund publications, excepting only two works (the last two of the ensuing list), which Mr. Priaulx had printed with the money obtained from me.

The publications consist of chomolithographic facsimiles of Fresco and other Paintings by the Old Masters, Engravings, Literary Works, &c. *First Annual* Subscription list, limited to 1500, began 1849; still going on. A Second Annual Subscription list was opened in 1867, still going on. Independently of the annual publications, the Society has issued Occasional or Extra Plates, of a limited issue. These latter chromos are now very scarce for that reason.

Printing Clubs.

THE DILETTANTI SOCIETY.

The following particulars are extracted from an article in the EDINBURGH REVIEW, April, 1857.

In the year 1734 some noblemen and gentlemen who had travelled in Italy, desirous of encouraging at home a taste for those objects which had contributed so much to their entertainment abroad, formed themselves into a Society under the name of "the Dilettanti." Friendly and social intercourse was avowedly the first object they had in view, but they did not fail to combine with it a serious plan for the promotion of the Arts in this country. Between 1770 and 1790 the following names appear among the list of members :—Mr. (Sir Joshua) Reynolds,

Earl Fitzwilliam, Charles James Fox, Hon. Stephen Fox (Lord Holland), Hon. Mr. Fitzpatrick, Charles Howard (Duke of Norfolk), Lord Robert Spencer, George Selwyn, Colonel Fitzgerald, Hon. H. Conway, Joseph Banks, Duke of Dorset, Sir William Hamilton, R. Payne Knight, &c.

Most of the members, of whom the number has been always about sixty, were men of wealth, and the Society was thus enabled to apply large sums of money for the purposes of discovering relics of ancient art in Greece and Asia Minor.

In 1769 appeared the first volume of that magnificent work, the "Antiquities of Ionia," which for accuracy of observation, beauty of typography, and appropriate grace of design, is unsurpassed by any production of later art and more complete mechanism. It was followed by three others of equal merit. Penrose's "Investigation into the Principles of Athenian Architecture" was printed in 1851. Although mainly scientific, and especially devoted to the optical refinements exhibited in the construction of the ancient buildings at Athens, yet the general descriptions of the edifices are most valuable to the general scholar as representing their features and characteristics with the fidelity of a learned observation.

The excellent design to publish select "Specimens of Ancient Sculpture" was carried into effect. Mr. Payne Knight and Mr. Townley contributed the larger portion of the objects engraved, and superintended their execution. The artists employed were Henry Howard, Andrea Tendi, William Newton, John Agar, and William Evans, excellent in their day, though the manner now appears somewhat rough. The plates for the second volume exhibit a more delicate handling, and are quite satisfactory.

About the year 1820, those admirable monuments of the best period of Grecian Art, the Bronzes of Siris, were discovered on the banks of that river. They became the property of the Chevalier Bröndsted, who brought them to this country and offered them to the British Museum in 1833 for £1,000. The Trustees could not afford this outlay, and the Dilettanti immediately organised a subscription which produced above £800. The Trustees completed the purchase, and the Society engraved them, adding to the work a complete Archæological essay concerning them by Bröndsted himself, of whom Mr. W. H. Hamilton speaks as having done more towards the illustration of the Elgin Marbles than any other labourer in the same field.

The generous assistance rendered to the study of ancient art did not make the Society oblivious of patronage towards modern art at home. The Royal Academy may be said to owe its prosperity, if not its very existence, to the Dilettanti. The scheme of such an Institution had occupied the attention of some of the members before the infant Academy of Painting was founded, and it was through the friendly influence of the Society that the Charter was obtained from the Crown which ensured the future glories of the Royal Academy.

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THE ROXBURGHE CLUB.

Instituted in London, in 1812.

Originally limited to 31 members, afterwards 40. First President (1812), George John, Earl Spencer; President (1882), the Duke of Buccleuch and Queensberry.

To 1880, one hundred and three distinct works had been printed by the Club, nearly all in small 4to.

THE HAKLUYT SOCIETY, for printing rare or unpublished Voyages and Travels. Instituted in London, 1846.

From 1848 to 1884, this Society has issued (to its members only) 69 important volumes, all in 8vo.

THE PHILOBIBLON SOCIETY, composed of persons interested in the History, Collection, or Peculiarities of Books.

Instituted in London, in 1853, by R. Monckton Milnes, Esq. (Lord Houghton). Patron, H.R.H. Prince Albert; President (1854), the Earl of Gosford; Patron (1884), the Duc d'Aumale.

Originally limited to 35 members, the number was raised in 1857 to 40.

Each member received two copies of the works printed at the expense of the Club, but usually only one of those printed at the private expense of individual members. Unless otherwise described, all the volumes are small 4to.

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
