REPORT of *U. Corbett*, Junior, Esquire, and *W. O. Markham*, Esquire, M.D., Poor Law Inspectors, to the Right Honourable *Gathorne Hardy*, M.P., President of the Poor Law Board, dated 18th January 1867, relative to the Metropolitan Workhouses.

Sir,

IN accordance with the instructions contained in a letter addressed to us by the Poor Law Board, of date 11 August 1866, we have visited the 43 workhouses included in the Metropolitan District for the purpose of inquiring:

“1. With respect to the immediate arrangements necessary for improving the existing infirmaries and sick wards, and the system of medical attendance and nursing; and,

“2. With respect to the more extensive alterations generally required for permanently insuring the proper care and treatment of the sick poor throughout the Metropolitan District.”

We have already answered the first of these inquiries in special reports, wherein we have recommended such improvements as might in our judgment be immediately effected.

We have now to consider and report upon the second branch of the inquiry in relation to which we were instructed to ascertain:—

“1. Whether the workhouse is or is not generally adapted for its purposes?

“2. Whether it is capable of such adaption, either by altering the internal arrangements, or extending the existing buildings?

“3. If not, whether the workhouse can be made suitable for paupers of any particular class or classes, if the lunatics and children, or any other class, were placed elsewhere?

“4. How many inmates of each class were in the workhouse on the 1st of February and the 1st of August 1866?

“5. If the accommodation for the several classes of inmates, other than the sick, is not sufficient, what further provision is requisite?

“6. How many inmates were on the Workhouse Medical Relief Book on

the 1st of February and the 1st of August 1866, distinguishing them as follows :—

- (1.) Fever and zymotic cases.
- (2.) Venereal cases.
- (3.) Acute cases.
- (4.) Chronic cases (exclusive of aged and infirm).
- (5.) Aged and infirm, requiring medical treatment.
- (6.) Inmates requiring extra diet only.

“ 7. How many of the sick on the Workhouse Medical Relief Book, on the 1st of August 1866, were suffering from incurable diseases, such as phthisis, cancer, scrofula, &c., or from other diseases, or deformities or injuries from which they were likely to become permanently disabled ?

“ 8. What number of the infirm inmates not on the Workhouse Medical Relief Book at the date of your visit were bedridden and likely to be permanently confined to their beds ?

“ 9. If the accommodation for the sick is not sufficient, what further provision is necessary ?

“ 10. Whether the infirmary can be made a separate and distinct establishment from the rest of the workhouse ?

“ 11. Whether there are any objections on sanitary grounds to the site of the workhouse ?”

The answers to questions Nos. 4, 6, 7, and 8, as far as they could be satisfactorily obtained, will be found in Appendix (A).

The most important part of the inquiry entrusted to us embraces a consideration of the subjects referred to in Questions Nos. 1, 2, 3, 9, 10, and 11.

We are therein called upon to report : as to the general capabilities of each workhouse ; whether it is at present sufficient in itself for its purposes ; or, if not, whether it may by alterations or extensions be rendered sufficient ; or whether again it may be more fitly appropriated for the use of some one or more special class or classes of inmates.

We are also requested to consider whether the present provision for the sick is sufficient, or what further accommodation they require ; whether the present infirmaries of workhouses can be separated from the rest of the establishment ; and whether objections, in a sanitary point of view, may be taken to any of the present workhouse sites.

In connection with these special inquiries we have also considered, and made recommendations concerning the administration, medical attendance, nursing, and other matters which apply generally to all workhouses.

Deficiency of Accommodation.—The most serious of the difficulties under which metropolitan workhouses at present labour, and that which has necessarily first engaged our attention, is deficiency of accommodation.

The cause of this deficiency is easily explained. It is certain, for whatever reasons, that the inmates, and especially the aged inmates of these houses, have surely and progressively increased in number year by year ; and that corresponding accommodation has not been provided to meet the increase. This difficulty has been necessarily enhanced by the fact that a larger amount of space is now demanded for the sick inmates of workhouses than was formerly thought requisite.

To meet this deficiency of accommodation we have had, in the first place, to ascertain the amount and kind of accommodation required by individual workhouses ; and, secondly, to consider how that accommodation may be best provided—basing our considerations as to the amount of space required by the various inmates upon the conclusions of the committee appointed to report upon this subject.

Number of Paupers requiring Accommodation.—As regards the number of paupers to be provided for, we have taken as a guide, the number of inmates, viz., 26,795, who according to our returns were accommodated in the 43 metropolitan

metropolitan workhouses during the last week of December 1866. (*See Appendix, Table B.*)*

These returns of workhouse inmates, taken at a time when pauperism is always high, may be regarded as representing a full average of the highest number of inmates accommodated during any week of the year.

The number of 26,795 (which does not include the children residing in district and separate schools) is made up of the following classes of inmates viz. :—

"Temporarily disabled"	-	-	-	-	-	7,046
"Old and infirm"	-	-	-	-	-	13,685
"Able-bodied"	-	-	-	-	-	2,899
"Children" (above two years of age)	-	-	-	-	-	2,150
"Infants"	-	-	-	-	-	1,015

Of these 26,795 inmates 1,977 appear as "imbeciles and idiots," being included in some one or other of the above classes.

In the district and separate schools there were at the same date 6,976 children (*see Appendix, Table C.*), making, with those in the workhouses, a total of 9,126 children above two years of age.

Consequently, the total indoor pauper population of the metropolitan district, in the last week of December 1866, amounted to 33,771, exclusive of those who were at the time provided for in the fever, the small-pox, the lock, and other hospitals. The number of these has probably at no time exceeded 500.

The number of actual sick, those requiring hospital accommodation, comprised among workhouse inmates, is necessarily fluctuating, but may be estimated at the present time at about 5,000. (*See Appendix, Table G.*)

Considerations affecting the Question of Accommodation required.—In using these returns as a basis for calculating the additional accommodation required in metropolitan workhouses, we must, to avoid error, take the following particulars into consideration.

It may be accepted as certain that the number of 26,795 inmates indicates that the workhouses are actually crowded beyond their fitting capacity, *i.e.*, in accordance with modern views, as to the amount of space which each individual requires; and the crowding of workhouses, again, indicates a pressure upon them from without, or in other words, that the demand exceeds their power of accommodation. Consequently, we must not assume that the highest number of inmates contained in a workhouse at any one period of the year, represents the number for which the workhouse ought legitimately to make provision.

(The present capacity of each workhouse is given in the Appendix, where in Tables H. will be found the dimensions of the several wards, the character of the occupation, and the number of inmates which in the opinion of the medical officer they can properly accommodate).

Increase and Longevity of Indoor Poor.—It must also be borne in mind that the increase of metropolitan workhouse inmates, which, as already stated, has been year after year constantly progressive, is mainly due to the accumulation of those who are classed as "old and infirm" and "temporarily disabled." Thus the returns show that of the 26,795 inmates referred to, no less than 20,731 are classified under these heads.

Table F. in the Appendix gives illustrations of the advanced age to which many of the inmates of the metropolitan workhouses attain, after long continuous residence therein. It will be seen that of 6,992 inmates above 70 years of age no less than 4,783 had been in the workhouse upwards of one year, 1,352 from five to ten years, and 857 ten years and upwards. This return does not include any inmate of the ages specified who had been in the workhouse less than 12 months prior to the date of the return.

Changes in the Classes of Workhouse Inmates.—The change in the classes of inmates which has gradually taken place in workhouses since the establishment of

of the Poor Law system is also worth noticing. It was never anticipated, at the time these workhouses were originally planned, that they would become large establishments, partaking partly of the character of an infirmary and partly of that of an almshouse, nor was provision then made to meet such a contingency. This great change, which has been gradually taking place in the character of the occupants of the workhouses, has only been recently recognised. At the present time, of 26,795 workhouse inmates, not more than 2,899 are classed as "able-bodied," and of this number only 868 are of the male sex. Whether this fact be or not an indication of the beneficial operation of the Poor Law system, it must, at all events, be matter of satisfaction to ratepayers to know that, with a comparatively small exception, the relief given in workhouses is bestowed upon those who, through mental or bodily infirmity, are unable to provide for themselves.

Workhouse Infirmary Accommodation.—The returns (as we have said) which give the number of workhouse sick (*see* Appendix, Table G.) enable us to form only an approximate estimate of the infirmary accommodation required by the different workhouses. In this particular, however, it is certain that a large increase is required: first, to meet the actual wants of the present workhouses; and, secondly, to satisfy the demand for a larger allotment of space to the sick than has been heretofore considered necessary.

Under this head, as affecting the future accommodation of workhouses, it may be noted, that additional space will be gained by the removal, as proposed, from the workhouses of all "imbeciles" and "children" who are at present retained there. The number of these persons may be fixed in round numbers at about 4,000.

In some instances, as at the City of London, Mile End, Shoreditch, St. Pancras, St. Marylebone, Fulham, and other workhouses, the accommodation which will be thus afforded by the removal of the imbeciles is at least equal to that which has been hitherto provided for the sick inmates. Again, at St. George's Hanover-square, Hackney, and elsewhere, the removal of the children will give the guardians facilities for making the infirmary of the workhouse an independent establishment.

Space required by Sick and other Inmates.—In estimating the additional infirmary accommodation required it was necessary in the first place to determine the amount of space which should be allotted to each bed. For this purpose a committee, presided over by Sir Thomas Watson, was appointed by you to consider and report upon the amount of space which should be allotted to the occupants of beds in the sick, infirm, and lying-in-wards, and the ordinary dormitories of the metropolitan workhouses.

The committee, after full and anxious consideration of the subject, have recommended that a space of not less than 850 cubic feet on an average, with six feet across the beds, should be provided for each sick inmate; of not less than 1,200 cubic feet in "separation" wards for each "offensive case;" of not less than 1,200 cubic feet for each lying-in-woman; and of 500 cubic feet for the chronic and infirm. They have not recommended any alteration of the space of 300 cubic feet at present allotted to each bed in the dormitories of healthy inmates. (*See Report on the Space Committee.*)

It may be fairly anticipated that the conclusions arrived at by this committee after careful personal investigation of the workhouses, and full consideration of the whole bearings of the matter, will be accepted as a satisfactory and authoritative solution of the question by the medical profession, as well as by the public.

Workhouse Accommodation generally.—The foregoing considerations seem to show that we cannot anticipate with perfect accuracy the amount of accommodation which a workhouse should, at any given time, provide for its several classes of inmates. But, practically, from a consideration of the actual number of inmates, the demand for accommodation, and the highest number of sick during the year, we may obtain a sufficiently accurate basis for estimating the requirements in this respect both of the body of the house and of the infirmary of each workhouse, always making a provident allowance for the constant increase of aged and infirm pauperism.

In accordance with these views, we consider that in any recommendations which

which may be made for the future settlement of the different metropolitan workhouses, ample accommodation of the kind required should be secured.

Adhering generally to the present system of local administration, and endeavouring as far as possible to utilize the existing workhouses, we advise: That those workhouses which either already afford, or which by partial reconstruction or extension of their present buildings can be made to afford sufficient accommodation for all their purposes, should remain, as they are at present, independent establishments. In certain other cases, however, where the required accommodation cannot be afforded by the individual workhouses we have, for the sake of convenience and economy, suggested a grouping of unions or parishes; to the effect, that the workhouses forming the group may be appropriated to those special purposes for which they seem best adapted.

The Management of the Sick in Workhouses.—The accommodation of the sick has naturally demanded our special attention; and on this subject we have the following remarks to make.

The Infirmary must be a Separate Establishment.—In the first place, we consider it absolutely necessary for proper administration that the infirmary be entirely separated from the other part of the workhouse, and that there should in fact be no communication between the sick and the other inmates of the workhouse; or in other words, that the treatment of the sick paupers should be carried out in a separate establishment, under independent management, and upon principles different from those to which the healthy and able-bodied pauper is subjected.

We are glad to record that boards of guardians generally have already adopted the conclusion, that treatment of the kind inferred should be ungrudgingly given to their sick poor. What, therefore, is now mainly required is, by the formation of distinct and separate infirmaries, to render this treatment a settled plan and system in practice. We have, therefore, in all our recommendations made especial provision for the attainment of this object.

The Site of the Infirmary.—In carrying out our proposals we have adhered as far as possible to the present plan of attaching to each workhouse its own infirmary, and for the convenience of the unions and parishes, as well as in the interests of the sick, recommend that the infirmary should, in all cases, be placed as near as possible to the workhouse itself, and to the district to which it belongs.

Large United Hospitals Objectionable.—The combination of the sick of several workhouses into one large infirmary or hospital is in our opinion highly objectionable.

The medical profession will, we are certain, agree with us, that the massing together of large bodies of sick people should always be avoided when practicable. The danger of the rise and spread of hospital diseases increases in proportion with the number of sick collected under one roof. But in the present case, in addition to what objection may be taken to large hospitals on this score, it is certain that each workhouse requires its own hospital. Even if a combination of the hospitals of many workhouses into one large establishment were effected, hospital wards and medical service would nevertheless still be required in each of the workhouses. Many of the inmates of workhouse hospitals are, it is true, brought directly from their homes into the hospital; but a very large proportion of the ordinary inmates of workhouses are aged and infirm, who are constantly requiring medical treatment; who are, on and off, subject to attacks of illness necessitating their admission into hospital; and who, for the most part, eventually become permanent inmates of the hospital or of the infirm wards.

Moreover, the benefits which the community and the sick poor derive from the existence of a large number of hospitals spread over the metropolitan district are patent and undeniable. It needs no argument to show, that the blessings of a refuge for the sick must be brought home to their doors far more effectually by 40 hospitals scattered through the metropolis than they could be by the limitation of the hospitals to half a dozen localities.

We need not dilate upon the other objections which might be urged to the concentration of the workhouse sick in a few large hospitals; upon the diffi-

culty of obtaining convenient and proper sites for such buildings; or upon the needless expenditure in the particulars of site and building which would be occasioned in the many instances, where the workhouses already possess sufficient infirmary accommodation, or the means of obtaining it by extension or reconstruction.

The proposal of concentrating the metropolitan workhouse sick in a few large infirmaries has, we believe, found its main support, not so much on a clear consideration and proof of their utility and appropriateness as upon the too-hastily accepted conclusion, that the sick poor cannot, under the present system, receive fitting treatment, the treatment to which they are entitled.

We cannot accept this conclusion. A careful study of the facts of the case has satisfied us that the instances of ill-treatment of the poor in workhouses, which have naturally excited the indignation of the public, are accidental and exceptional; and that they are of a kind which result from, and in fact demonstrate, careless management. It is only just to those who are responsible for the management of metropolitan workhouses to say, that in this matter the neglect of the few has been indiscriminately visited by the public upon all.

It should also in fairness be remembered that workhouses are not the only public institutions obnoxious to charges of the kind inferred. Our best accredited establishments, general hospitals, lunatic asylums, gaols, &c., occasionally present the public with facts which excite the public indignation. But no one in such case thinks of laying to the charge of them all the sin of the one. It may be anticipated that evils must always occur in such like institutions, unless a watchful supervision be exercised over all ranks of the officials entrusted with their administration. We believe that a proper discipline and supervision is as capable of being maintained in the working of the poor law system as in that of any of the other establishments mentioned. At all events, we cannot doubt that the adoption of a proper method of administration will insure for the inmates of workhouse infirmaries all the benefits they can reasonably demand.

Small-pox and Fever Hospitals.—The necessity for the non-admission into workhouses of patients suffering from contagious fevers has been already practically acknowledged by the guardians. At the present time such cases are, as far as possible, excluded from workhouses, and provided for in hospitals specially devoted to their cure. But these hospitals do not afford accommodation equal to the wants of the metropolis; and being mainly supported by charity, are improperly called upon to do the work of the ratepayer. Moreover, the interests of the community, as well as of the patients themselves, require that adequate accommodation should be abundantly afforded for the reception of persons suffering from this class of diseases. At present a certain number of both small-pox and fever patients are of necessity admitted into workhouses, although there is in most cases no fitting place for their reception. The danger of the spread of these contagious diseases is obvious enough. For the sake of the community, therefore, for the sake of the patient, and for the sake of those with whom they dwell, it is evidently desirable that all facility should be afforded for the *direct and immediate* removal into separate hospitals of persons suffering from such diseases.

For these reasons we recommend the establishment of metropolitan workhouse fever and small-pox hospitals, in suitable positions. One fever, and one small-pox hospital at least will be required for the metropolitan unions and parishes situated north of the Thames, and similar accommodation for those south of the river.

Table D. in the Appendix shows the number of pauper patients admitted during one year into the Fever Hospital, the highest and lowest numbers at any one time in the hospital, the aggregate number of days the patients resided in hospital, and the amount charged to each parish for their maintenance. We have failed to obtain any returns from the Small-pox Hospital.

Venercal Diseases.—There is no reason why patients suffering from venereal diseases should not be treated in workhouse hospitals; but, when they are so, special wards should be provided for the purpose. Such patients are entitled to as much consideration in the matter of medical treatment as any other of the sick, and ought not to be placed in what are called "foul" wards with patients suffering from "offensive" diseases. Indeed the word "foul," as applied

applied to wards, should be unknown in a modern hospital; it is apt to produce laxity in treatment. For such a term, "separation" or "special" wards should be substituted. Where the number of this class of diseases is small, boards of guardians may probably find it, as at present, most convenient to send their patients to Lock Hospitals. But in all such cases special arrangements should be made respecting the remuneration for the treatment with the governors of these hospitals.

Table E. in Appendix contains returns showing the amount of contributions from metropolitan parishes and unions to the Female Lock Hospital; the number of patients admitted in one year, and the highest number in the hospital at one time.

Removal of Imbeciles and Children.—We have already referred to the proposed removal of imbeciles and of children from the workhouses. There can, we apprehend, be no doubt as to the desirableness of such removal. As regards imbeciles, it is certain that they can only obtain in separate asylums that special treatment and protection which the nature of their affliction demands. Their removal into asylums would naturally bring them under the more direct management of the Commissioners in Lunacy; and we may assume that the provision required in such case for their reception would be made with the advice and under the superintendence of the Commissioners.

Again, the removal of all children, except infants, from workhouses is, for obvious reasons, desirable. Indeed the necessity of this has already been practically acknowledged by most of the Boards of Guardians. Of the 41 metropolitan parishes and unions there are at this time only six where the children are not placed in district or separate schools.*

Table C. in the Appendix shows how the children of 35 unions and parishes are at present provided for. The remaining parishes and unions where the children, in number 805, are still retained in the workhouses are the following: The Fulham, and the Holborn unions; the parishes of Paddington; of St. George, Hanover-square; of St. Margaret and St. John, Westminster; and of St. Giles and St. George, Bloomsbury.

It is much to be desired, that the present objectionable practice of receiving and temporarily retaining the children at the workhouse before passing them to the school should cease. Proper receiving or probationary wards should be established at all the schools so that the children may be sent directly to them. If any of the children are found, on admission, to require medical treatment, the treatment should be carried out at the school, and not at the workhouse. For this purpose sufficient hospital accommodation, with separate infectious wards, should be provided at all the schools.

The Medical Service.—The separation of the infirmary from the workhouse, as proposed, will naturally lead to the adoption of an improved system of management. We therefore make the following recommendations for the due carrying out of the medical service of the workhouse infirmaries.

Medical Officer.—The Medical Officer should have entire control in his own department, and be responsible for the treatment of the sick. He should regularly visit every patient under his charge, and make a note of such visit on the prescription card hanging at the head of the patient's bed. He should never act upon the reports of nurses as to the state or requirements of any of his patients. He should keep a record in each case of the disease, of the diet and medicines prescribed, of the date of admission into and discharge of the patient from the hospital, &c. He should send a report to the Poor Law Board once every year, at least, on the state of his department; detailing the condition of the infirmary as to healthiness and ventilation; reporting as to the supply of sick appliances of every kind, as to the state of the bedding, waterclosets, baths, lavatories, supply of water, the quality of the food, beer, wine, medicines, the efficiency of the nurses, &c., &c. He should, moreover, be

be required to report to the guardians, in a book to be kept for that purpose, whenever he finds any deficiency in these matters.

In every infirmary containing on an average more than 150 actual sick, there should be a *Resident Medical Officer*, whose duties should be wholly limited to the workhouse.

A superintendent medical officer of the workhouse infirmary should also be appointed in all cases, where such appointment may be considered requisite by the Poor Law Board.

It is desirable, in the interest of the patients themselves, as well as of medical science, that cases requiring the performance of serious operations should, as a rule, be removed for the purpose into general hospitals.

Moreover, the good of the sick requires that the medical officer should not be called upon to undertake a greater amount of work than may be reasonably apportioned to him. When the amount of duty committed to a medical officer is excessive, he cannot do justice to his patients. In such case, those minute attentions and that special regard to the condition of the patient which are necessarily comprised in a proper treatment of the sick, cannot be given to them. The feeling of incapacity to compass a work committed to their charge naturally leads men into a settled routine of neglected or ill-performed duties. For this reason medical officers ought not to be allowed to undertake work which it is out of their power to perform effectually.

Again, we would urge, that the remuneration of medical officers be fixed in accordance with the importance and the amount of work confided to them. Their present pay cannot, as a rule, be considered a fair equivalent for the services which they undertake to perform. There is a special reason why medical services should be properly remunerated. The full and proper performance of his duty by a medical man rests in great part with his own conscience; and over-work and ill-paid work naturally tend to stifle the fair play of conscience. At all events, those who knowingly accept services of this kind are not in a position to complain with justice if the work be badly done.

Summarily, we would say: If the medical officers' duties and the remuneration for them be fairly apportioned; if he be made, in his department, independent of the workhouse master, and more directly responsible to the Poor Law Board; if the responsibility for the proper conduct of his department be thrown wholly upon him; and if he be subjected to fitting medical supervision, we should then, in our opinion, obtain something like a positive assurance that the sick poor would be properly treated.

Dispenser.—Whenever the number of sick exceed 100, a dispenser of medicines should be appointed to the hospital. In certain cases the dispensary for the outdoor poor may be advantageously connected with the workhouse hospital. Where the services of an outdoor dispenser are not available, the dispensing might no doubt be economically performed in the workhouse by the attendance of a dispenser during a few hours of each day.

All drugs and medical appliances needed by the sick poor should be provided at the expense of the guardians.

By the aid of a special pharmacopœia, which might be usefully adapted for workhouse hospitals, economy in drugs, simplicity in prescribing, and facility in dispensing would be promoted.

Special dietaries should be framed by the Poor Law Board and uniformly adopted in all metropolitan workhouses.

Nursing.—The nursing and general management of the workhouse infirmary should be under the charge of a matron, who has had some previous hospital training. Qualified nurses should attend upon the sick, the more menial duties being performed by paupers under their supervision. It may be reasonably hoped that, under good instruction, and with proper management, a supply of efficient nurses will be eventually obtained from the better class of workhouse inmates.

We consider that one qualified nurse, with sufficient assistance, should be appointed to the charge of about every 50 patients; and that a qualified nurse (also with proper assistance) may take charge of double that number of patients during the night.

In no case should the nursing of the patients, the giving of medicines, wine, &c., be left in the hands of pauper assistants.

Special rules for both day and night nurses, and for the assistant nurses, should be framed and hung up in the hospital. An inventory of the furniture, linen, crockery, books, &c., assigned to each ward, and the dimensions of each ward, and the number of beds for which it is limited, should also be printed and placed in some conspicuous position in the ward.

Under the infirmary matron there should be an assistant, who should be responsible for the proper distribution and preservation of the furniture, linen, &c., and for the due performance of all duties not appertaining to nursing proper. Such assistance will enable both the matron and the nurse to devote themselves entirely to their special duties of superintending and nursing.

In Table I. in the Appendix is given the best and latest information we could obtain as to the number of paid nurses and paid cooks now employed in the metropolitan workhouses. In the same table will also be found the nature of the duties and the number of wards and patients assigned to each nurse.

It is satisfactory to know that since the 20th of July last, upwards of 90 additional paid nurses have been appointed in the metropolitan workhouses.

General Uniformity.—It is desirable that a system of uniformity in the internal economy as well as in the general management of the workhouses and workhouse infirmaries should be adopted as far as practicable; and that a standard of recommendations in such matters should be laid down by the Poor Law Board. The practice of uniformity in minor things naturally tends to bring about agreement in matters of more importance. Moreover, the existence of good arrangements in some of the workhouses becomes a rebuke to those where they are absent, and a stimulus to the adoption of them.

The more important matters, in which the value of a uniform standard will be recognised, are those which are concerned with medical administration, ventilation, dietary, and nursing.

Economy as well as convenience indicate the adoption of uniformity also in minor matters—in the matters of beds, bedding, furniture, in the system of waterclosets, baths, lavatories, &c. To each workhouse inmate and to each bed should be appropriated a given number of articles which should be deemed requisites—such as sheets, towels, brushes, combs, basins, &c.

Classification.—The separation of the infirmary from the workhouse, and the removal of the children and imbeciles will, it may be hoped, under the new arrangement proposed, enable an improved classification of the remaining inmates to be carried out.* A more distinct line of demarcation requires being made between the really able-bodied pauper, and those who through age, debility, or bodily infirmity are unable to work. The mere test of age in this division is a bad one. Many paupers who are at present classed as “old and infirm,” solely because they are above 60 years of age, are nevertheless in the enjoyment of good health, and ought to be classed as able-bodied. To carry out this object, we would suggest that the present class of “temporary disabled” and “old and infirm” should be divided as follows (*see* Table G. in the Appendix, where this has been attempted):—

I. The sick.

II. Those who are known in workhouse vocabulary as the chronic and infirm, *i. e.*, those who by reason of old age, debility, or bodily infirmity, are unable to work; who require a special dietary and special wards; who are

are for the most part inmates of the workhouse for life; and who, although not actually sick, demand from time to time medical attendance. It is for this class that the Space Committee have recommended 500 cubic feet for each bed, with the addition of convenient day rooms.

III. Those who, though classed as "old and infirm," because they are above 60 years of age, are nevertheless in the enjoyment of good health, and able to work, and may therefore be properly placed in ordinary wards in the body of the house.

Again, it is desirable that attempts should be made to separate the young from the aged healthy, and the disorderly from the more decent inmates of the house. Especially is this separation desirable in respect of the female inmates. Indeed it might be well, on grounds moral and economical, to place the able-bodied of both sexes in separate houses. For the carrying out of this in certain cases we have elsewhere made suggestions. By such separation these inmates would be better classified, subjected to a stricter discipline, and trained, it may be hoped, to habits of useful industry.

Thus, for example, some of the younger women and the girls, too old for the district or separate school, might be trained for domestic service in a special department of the workhouse, as is now done with excellent effect at the Liverpool workhouse, under the intelligent management of Mr. Carr, the master.

Infirmary of Lambeth Workhouse, November 9th, 1866.

DEAR SIR,—I have at your request completed a second survey of the wards and dormitories of Lambeth Workhouse. I have also at your suggestion disregarded cubic space, for the most part, as from the different altitudes of the various wards, I believe it is as likely as not to lead into error. In the women's dormitories it is not so easy to form a correct conclusion on account of double beds being used.

By this method, according to the best of my judgment, the original figures, 941, will be still further reduced, though only about 20.

The principal reduction will be found in the two male dormitories, where I found the beds nearly touching each other. This, by allowing a space between each bed sufficient for the purposes of decency, will cause a reduction of from 90 to 82 each.

I do not again offer these numbers for the workhouse as by any means a model arrangement, but as the best under the present circumstances. I have handed over the paper to the master for completion; and with respects to Dr. Markham and yourself,

I have formed this opinion from a night inspection of the sleeping wards and sick wards of this workhouse.
