

+ Of the 185 struck off Roll during the half-year, 59 died, 12 were married, 5 resumed work, 4 left the country, 12 were addicted to drink, 3 selfsupporting, 6 guilty of immoral conduct, 30 removed to Hospital at Barnhill, 8 deception, and 46 on the ground of income.

Those marked ‡ are only temporarily disposed of, and generally come up for consideration on the same application, and are included under the other heads.

\* Of the 81 refusals, the Sheriff ordered relief in 2 cases.

It is here necessary to explain that in addition to the 3,135 applications considered by the Relief Committee, there are included in the 5,449 cases brought before that Committee the usual monthly renewals, special reports, enquiries as to families, &c.

Of the 458 cases revised at Poorhouse, 142 were discharged with donations in money and clothing, of which latter 94 have continued to do for themselves outside; 22 returned within one month, 13 within two months, 8 within three months, and 5 within four months.



There was sent to each Member during the course of the year 485 pages of printed minutes, as against 563 pages during the year 1889.

#### ADJUSTMENT COMMITTEE.

This Committee at 4 sittings, confirmed the decisions in 40 cases, as against 42 for the year 1889—6 of which were by Mr. Dempster, Inspector for Glasgow; 24 by Mr. Wallace, Inspector for Govan; and 12 by myself. 21 cases were decided in favour of Glasgow, 6 in favour of Govan, and 16 in favour of Barony the disposal of the same involving the submission of statements, replies thereto, getting up evidence, arranging for diets, examination of witnesses, &c.


