GENTLEMEN,

I beg most respectfully to offer myself as a Candidate for the Chair of MEDICAL JURISPRUDENCE, vacant by the resignation of Dr. P. A. Simpson.

While Medical Jurisprudence has reference to *all* the different departments of Medical Science, the fact appears to be well known to the Patrons that more than one-half of its literature and real work is intimately associated with Insanity and Midwifery, or questions relating to these branches. To each of these I have devoted special attention.

In addition to an extended course of study at College, to which I do not refer, I attended Professor Laycock's Course of Lectures on Medical Psychology and Mental Diseases, and enjoyed the privilege of accompanying him weekly to Clinical Demonstrations at an Asylum. Besides, I was Resident Physician in two different Asylums for four months.

I was Resident Surgeon in the Royal Maternity Hospital of Edinburgh during the usual term; and while there I obtained extensive experience of a varied nature, both in the Hospital and its Out-door practice.

I held the appointment of Class-Assistant to the late distinguished Sir J. Y. Simpson, Bart., and had charge of his large and excellent Museum,—a matter of no little moment. After passing some time on the Continent—visiting many of its schools—I was while abroad asked

by Sir James to become his Private Assistant, and I continued with him in that capacity till his death. This was no less an honour than a highly-valued privilege; and as a means of becoming acquainted with the study of disease in all its varied aspects, it was unrivalled. I consider it my duty here, and it affords me sincere pleasure to say that I received from Sir James an impetus to study which I have never since ceased to feel.

Thereafter, I succeeded to the large practice, in this city, of his nephew, now Professor Simpson. Immediately after coming to Glasgow, I was elected a Fellow of the Faculty of Physicians and Surgeons.
