I am a Graduate in Arts and Medicine of Edinburgh University, having taken my Degree in Arts in 1882, and in Medicine in 1886. In 1890 I obtained, by examination, the Fellowship of the Faculty of Physicians and Surgeons of Glasgow.

After a year in the Royal Infirmary in Edinburgh and a winter of study abroad, I settled in Glasgow, when I received the appointment of Demonstrator of Anatomy in Anderson's College Medical School. This position I held for two sessions, and on the institution of the Medical School of Queen Margaret College in 1890, I was invited to organize and undertake the Anatomical Department.

Since then I have conducted Courses on Anatomy—Junior and Senior Classes and Demonstrations, and Summer Classes on Embryology and Morphology—these Classes being recognized as qualifying for the Examinations of the University of Glasgow, and of the Triple Qualification Board.

In the practical work of the Dissecting Rooms I have had charge of between 40 and 50 pupils.

This year I have received the honour of appointment by the University Court as "Lecturer on Anatomy to Women Students in the University of Glasgow."
