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

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I beg to offer myself as a candidate for the post of Visiting Surgeon to the Royal Hospital for Sick Children, and to submit for your consideration the accom-

panying testimonials.

I have been an extra surgeon to the Hospital for the last fourteen years, the greater part of which time has been spent as surgeon in charge of the Country Branch at Drumchapel. Two years ago I took up duty at the Dispensary in town, and came more closely into touch with the work done at the Hospital.

Since 1904 I have acted as consulting surgeon to the Children's Home at Aberfoyle (now removed to Strathblane), and have in this way been able to study over a period of years the course of some of the more chronic diseases of children, and feel that this experience is of great value in helping to determine the appropriate treatment in the earlier stages.

I graduated M.B. and C.M. with commendation at Glasgow University in 1892, and since then have held the following appointments:

As assistant surgeon to the Western Infirmary I gained a wide surgical experience both in regard to the study of disease and also its operative treatment, assisting as I did at operations and attending in the wards almost daily for a number of years. In addition to this, during the twelve years of my appointment, I was entrusted with the full charge of wards for three or four months each year, and in this way a large amount of operative work fell to my lot.

I have had experience in teaching students for ten years, and during my tenure of the surgical examinership in Edinburgh University I was enabled to appreciate more fully the students' difficulties and to arrive at a better understanding of what is required in their teaching.

With a view to widening my surgical outlook, I have made repeated visits to the cliniques of distinguished surgeons in France and Germany and also in the United States of America, while more recently I have visited some of the best known Children's Hospitals in this country and studied the work done there.

I am not at present on the staff of any hospital, except that of the Royal Hospital for Sick Children, and should you do me the honour to appoint me to the position of Visiting Surgeon, I shall be able to devote ample time to the work of the Institution, and shall endeavour to discharge the duties of the post to the best of my ability.
