The late Solomon Porown, of Landlake, many years ago, olecked damp hay with ault; which came out almost a passe, when the rick was opened; but the cattle devanced it with avidity. In Germany they cure Grafs, fresh cut, by packing in fits with 1th of salt to the cut; and find it go much further in food than the same quantity of grafs made into hay. In fact, by sun drying, the hay deems to become rather more woody, and, Therefore, left digestable and nutritions; but the outseems to have a contrary effect, softening the wordy stalks and thus rendering them digestible food. A method which appears to be preferable to these, both in convenience and economy, is to stack the green grafs or clover in layers with show or old hay, sprinkling the salt whon each green player. Thus the juices drawn by the salt from the grafs will be absorbed by the have; and I think not only the nutritive power of the damp hay or grafs may be improved in this way. but that the otraw itself may be brought back lowerds the state.

Say I low of Thow to 4 lone of grap; and suppose the grafs to give out half its juice to the obaco (by aid of the oalt) we shall have the whole doft and dariff, without being disposed to drop of teak. If old hay is used instead of show, per haps, one thirt, or even one half might be nearer the mark, as it is much less absorbant. For meadow grafs or any green fodder, cut damp, the quantity of otraw or old hay may be proportionably increased. For hay partly dried, it may be reduced or omitted altogether. 




