REPORT

OF THE

COMMITTEE to the ANNUAL MEETING, August, 1817.

THE Committee announce to the Governors the satisfaction which they derive from a review of the state of the Asylum during the last Year.

Though one half only of the New Erection has been prepared for the reception of Patients, the good effects of this improvement are already sensibly felt. When the whole shall be completed, your Committee anticipate that the York Lunatic Asylum will scarcely be surpassed by any other, in the means of affording secure and comfortable accommodations for Patients. The apartments of the Male Patients will be entirely detached from those of the Females; the Day Rooms and Airing Grounds will, in general, be under the immediate view of their respective superintendents; and each class of Patients will enjoy an uninterrupted access to their Airing Grounds.

The Committee of Finance, (to whose laborious attention to that intricate subject the Institution is much indebted,) have not yet completed a method of keeping the Accounts of the Asylum, which is intended to prevent future uncertainty and error, and will exhibit, under a distinct classification, the various branches of Income and Expenditure. Your Committee lament that they are not able, under these circumstances, to give a more detailed account of the state of the Finances of the Asylum than the following; and submit, that when the Committee of Finance shall have brought their labours to a close, a Statement should be printed and circulated among the Governors.

In addition to the above, there is a balance of Lupton's Fund unappropriated, of £11. 10s. in the hands of the Steward.

N. B. The above balance includes *all* the outstanding Debts, several of which are considered as nearly desperate.

Your Committee have not, during the last Year, raised the Weekly Payments of the Patients above the reduced scale of the Year preceding; these Payments, in the cases of 65 Patients, have been aided, in different degrees, by the sum of £73. 10s. from Lupton's Fund, in the course of the two Quarters of its operation. They have the satisfaction to add their hope, that a still farther reduction may be immediately made.

Your Committee report, that the conduct of the Officers and Servants of the House has been satisfactory.

SUPPLEMENT

To the ANNUAL REPORT of August 1817.

IN compliance with the directions of the last Quarterly Court, the Committee have printed the following Statement of the Finances and Expenditure of the Institution, from June 1816 to June 1817, as contained in the Report of the Committee of Finance.

The Committee have the pleasure to announce, that encouraged by the prosperous state of the Funds, they have considerably reduced the Quarterly Payments of Patients in indigent circumstances not receiving parochial relief; and that the payment for Parish Paupers is reduced from Ten Shillings per Week to Eight Shillings and Sixpence. This sum is farther reduced to Eight Shillings by an allowance of Sixpence per Week each from Lupton's Fund, in the case of all Parish Paupers belonging to the City, Ainsty, or County of York.

REPORT

OF THE

SPECIAL COMMITTEE to the QUARTERLY COURT at the Asylum.

YOUR Committee appointed to assist the Steward in arranging the Accounts, and to devise a better mode of keeping them, have proceeded to make such arrangements as to them seemed desirable; and having instituted a very thorough examination, present the accompanying Statement of the Income and Expenditure of the Asylum for the Year ending June 7, 1817.

In this Statement it appears that the sum of £1776 7s. 11½d. was then owing from Patients; but it should be observed that this includes the amount of their bills for the quarter then ending, as well as £816 11s. 1d. of the arrears of former quarters;—a large proportion of which your Committee fear will never be recovered. The balance of £84 13s. 2d. held by the Steward, includes £11 10s. the unappropriated balance of Lupton's Fund.

In the printed Statement of the Accounts of the Asylum for the year ending June 1815, the funded property of the Institution is stated to be £8200 Stock, in the 3 per Cent. Consols, producing an income, after deducting the property-tax, of £221 8s. per annum. This Stock is now reduced to £3200, in which is included Lady Gower's Reduction Fund,—“established for the relief of those Patients in low circumstances who pay for themselves, and have no parish relief,”—amounting to £1303.* Consequently the Stock remaining at the disposal of the Governors is no more than £1896, and out of this the Building Committee are empowered to raise the sum of £300 to complete the £3600 placed at their disposal to carry into effect the alterations and improvements in the Buildings.

In the printed Statement above-mentioned, the Institution appears possessed of the following sums secured on Turnpikes, viz.

- ½ of £100 on Garraby Turnpike.
- ½ of £250 on Kexby ditto.
- ½ of £200 on Boroughbridge ditto.

The latter of these has since then been paid in.

As there is now upwards of £800 in the hands of the Bankers, your Committee propose to the Court, to authorize the Building Committee to take £300 from this sum, instead of still further reducing the funded property by the sale of Stock to produce that amount. They also beg leave to suggest to the Court to take into its consideration the present low state of the disposable property of the Institution, and to adopt some means of increasing it, in order to be provided for any emergency which may hereafter arise to require a large expenditure.

REPORT
OF THE
COMMITTEE of the YORK LUNATIC ASYLUM
TO THE
ANNUAL MEETING.

THE Committee trust that the Governors of this Charity will derive satisfaction from the annexed Statement of its Income and Expenditure.

Considering the reduction which was made, nine months ago, in the weekly payments of the pauper and lower classes of Patients, and that a large sum is included in the expenditure of the present year, for repairs of the old, and the furniture of the new building, the Committee are happy to find that the receipts from Patients have approached so near to the expenditure, and they cannot but consider the result as a fair evidence of general economy.

The amount of the funded property remaining is now £3200. three per cent. consols; and as, by a resolution of a late Quarterly Court, all future donations and legacies are directed to be funded, your Committee have no doubt that the property of the Institution will, from this time, continue to augment, whilst the *payments of the poor* will, according to the original design of the Establishment, continue *to be reduced by the overflowings of their less needy* fellow sufferers. The application of £164. 9s. from Lupton's Fund, has afforded essential benefit to several indigent but respectable families, struggling to support themselves without parochial aid. The balance of this fund now unapplied is £17. 1s.

The expenditure on account of the new building does not come within the province of the House Committee to report. The delays which have unavoidably taken place in the completion of the work, have greatly protracted those arrangements which they considered necessary to the comfort as well as security of the Patients. The buildings are now, however, very nearly completed, and the Committee have great satisfaction in stating, that the Asylum now admits of a degree of classification, both as regards the Patients' rank in life and state of mind, which they are certain greatly diminishes the sufferings of their necessary confinement, and, they believe, in an equal degree, aids the progress of recovery. Whilst the accommodations for the poor are such as may justly be styled *comfortable*, the provision for the more opulent class is adapted to their previous habits, and the Committee are persuaded that the expense bestowed upon this part of the Establishment will prove to it a source of considerable future income.

The Governors will observe that the deaths in the present year exactly equal the whole number from October 1814 to June 1817. The number, in the present year, is not however more remarkably *large* than that of the previous period was remarkably *small*, and the total number from October 1814 to the present time, is rather below than above the average of other respectable Establishments.

The Committee, convinced that the welfare of this and of all similar Institutions depends essentially upon vigilant inspection, cannot conclude their Report without noticing, with feelings of great satisfaction, the continued attention of the visiting Governors and Ladies; and they also consider the grateful acknowledgments of the Governors to be due to the Rev. T. JESSOP, for the continuance of his judicious and gratuitous instructions, upon which many of the Patients appear to have attended with great satisfaction.

REPORT

OF THE

COMMITTEE of the YORK LUNATIC ASYLUM

TO THE

ANNUAL MEETING.

ON laying the Annual Statement of the concerns of the York Lunatic Asylum before the Governors, the Committee have to observe, That, contrary to the fears that have been entertained, the West Riding Asylum for Pauper Lunatics has very little tended to diminish the number of Patients in this Institution. And when it is considered that the York Asylum, in respect of classification, superintendence, and comfort of accommodation, is inferior to very few in any part of the kingdom, and that the excellence of its regulations are becoming daily more known, it will not be doubted that the utmost number of Patients it can accommodate in its enlarged state, will, ere long, be offered for reception. The Expenditure of the year just closed exceeds the one preceding. This, in some degree, arises from an additional keeper being engaged, and in some degree from the increased price of different articles of consumption, and a change of the diet table. How far these circumstances account for the increase, will be a subject of immediate attention to the Committee. Should this increase of expense be found unavoidable, the funds of the Asylum will still, it is presumed, more than suffice for the future charge upon them. The disbursements for furniture and alterations during the past year, very greatly exceed the average expense; had this not been the case, the whole regular income would have much more than equalled the expenditure, independently of legacies and benefactions which have amounted to £221.

The Committee trust that the general state of the Asylum is such as to give satisfaction to the Governors who may view it at the approaching General Meeting.

The Committee have great pleasure in stating a considerable decrease in the number of Deaths this year.

TO THE

ANNUAL MEETING.

THE Committee have great satisfaction in laying the annexed Report before the Governors, as it appears that notwithstanding the late reduction made in the payments of the lower class of Patients, the Income derived from the Patients, and from Lupton's Fund, equals the total Expenditure on their account; and that, exclusive of the Donations and Legacies, which are ordered to be invested, the Property of the Institution has been, this year, improved.

A minute investigation has been made into the Economy of the Establishment; and it will be seen that the Expenditure of the present year, partly arising from the decreased price of provisions, is materially less than that of the preceding. Since the making up of the Report, the number of Patients has risen to 114; and the increasing applications from persons of respectability to have their friends placed in the Asylum, as well as the frequent acknowledgments which come under the notice of the Committee, attest the estimation in which the Institution is now held by the public. The reports of the Visitors also, and the observations of the Committee themselves, justify them in giving a very favourable report of its present state; and they trust that the Asylum is now realizing the anticipation of its original founders,—affording, as a charitable Institution, relief to the poor from the overflows of the rich; as an Asylum, the best means of cure to those whose cases admit of it; and to the incurable, the comforts compatible with their situation.

REPORT

OF

THE COMMITTEE

THE YORK LUNATIC ASYLUM.

1821

YOUR Committee have regretted that, through the indisposition of the Steward, this Report could not be put in circulation among the Governors before the Annual Court.

Their regret, however, at this departure from an established and important rule, is relieved by the satisfaction which they derive from the consideration, that, with the exception of a proposed enlargement in the Premises, to be decided upon by the ensuing Quarterly Court, they had little to communicate which required the deliberative wisdom, and nothing which called for the animadversion of the Annual Court.

They are happy to state that no alteration is necessary in the reduced rate of payment, introduced in a former year. The balance in favour of the Asylum this year, appears to exceed that of the preceding, by more than £400.

The number of Patients, raised in the course of last year from 114 to 130 now in the house, affords the best proof of the high and rising reputation which the Institution holds in the estimation of the public. And should the next Quarterly Court decide on enlarging the house, by adding eleven lodging, and several excellent day-rooms, your Committee confidently expect that they will soon be filled.

The following Resolutions passed at the late Annual Court:

RESOLVED,—1. "That the Report be completed and printed, prior to the Quarterly Court in September.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF THE YORK LUNATIC ASYLUM, FOR THE YEAR ENDING JUNE 1, 1823.

YOUR COMMITTEE must again express their extreme regret, that difficulties attending the adjustment of the Accounts, have prevented the publication of the Report previously to the day of the General Annual Meeting.

With much pleasure they are enabled to announce, that they can report favourably of the finances, and of the general prosperity and good state of the Institution.

The large additions made to the house by the long connecting galleries between the old and new buildings, together with the lodging and day-rooms attached to them, being now completed and occupied, are found to promote, in a high degree, the great objects of enlarged accommodation, convenience of intercourse, and extended classification.

Several rooms are fitted up in a style adapted for the reception of Patients of the first respectability; and provisions and arrangements are nearly completed, which, while they combine security with freedom from unnecessary coercion, and humane treatment with vigilant superintendence, to each class, afford to superior Patients a degree of liberal accommodation, varied amusement, and general comfort, if equalled, perhaps not surpassed, in any Asylum in the kingdom. The Committee will only add that the arrangements in this department, will possess every degree of privacy, which is compatible with security for the proper treatment of the Patients; and that it will, therefore, combine the advantages of a private, with those of a public establishment.

The Governors will learn with pleasure, that the great expense incurred by the late additions and improvements have, in a great measure, been defrayed out of the income of the year; a fact which emboldens your Committee to anticipate, that the time is near, when a farther considerable reduction may be made in the weekly payments of the more indigent Patients.

Your Committee, under the authority delegated to them by the last Annual Court, have, on mature deliberation, resolved on the appointment of a House Steward; a measure, which, if a proper person can be found, will, they are persuaded, in addition to other important advantages, tend much to promote economy, both in the purchase, and in the consumption of articles of provision for the house.
