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
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In Lunacy



In the Matter of Emma Lucy  
Wilcox a supposed insane person and of  
The Lunacy Regulation Act 1862

To the Right Honourable the Lord High Chancellor  
of Great Britain

The Humble Petition of  
Daniel Beulter of Great Yarmouth  
in the County of Norfolk Gentleman

Sheweth

That Emma Lucy Wilcox now residing at  
the Asylum for Lunatics known by the name of "The Friends Retreat"  
situate near the city of York is now and has for twenty <sup>two</sup> years last  
been of unsound mind and incapable of managing her affairs so by  
the Affidavits herunto annexed appears

That the property of the said Emma Lucy consists of the  
following particulars that is to say

1 The dividends of One thousand and fifty six pounds New £5 per  
cent consolidated Bank Annuities standing in the Books of the Governor  
and Company of the Bank of England in the names of Edward  
Beulter and William Worsip the Executors of John Fuller who was  
the surviving Trustee and Executor of the Will of Joseph Beulter deceased  
the Father of the said Emma Lucy who bequeathed the dividends  
thereof to her for her life with remainder over

2 £108 New £5 per cent consolidated Bank Annuities lately standing in  
the said Books in the name of Emma Beulter of Great Yarmouth Spinster  
(the maiden name of the said Emma Lucy) but since transferred to the  
Commissioners for the reduction of the National debt as unclaimed for  
Ten years and upwards

3 A sum of £97. 16. 10 cash being an accumulation of dividends

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on the said £108 Bank Annuites accrued theron to the month of October 1863 standing to the credit of Emma Butler (now the said Emma Lucy) in the Books of Mess<sup>r</sup> Gurney and Co Bankers at Exmouth.

It An accumulation of dividends on the said £108 Bank annuites accrued theron since the said month of October 1863 which have not been received in consequence of the last surviving Attorney named in the power given to Mess<sup>r</sup> Burying of London the correspondent of the said Mess<sup>r</sup> Gurney &c to receive same having died.


That the said Emma Lucy is a widow and has no father or mother living and is the first cousin once removed of your Petitioner (your Petitioner being the Grandson of the paternal Uncle of the said Emma Lucy).

That your Petitioner and his Sister Rachel the wife of Henry Bradfield Brewster of Kings Lynn in the County of Norfolk remmange at the present instant to the said Emma Lucy that your petitione is aware of but he is under the circumstances set forth in the Affidavit annexed unable to set forth as to his belief or otherwise whether your Petitioner and his said Sister are the persons who would be intitled to the estate of the said Emma Lucy under the Statutes for the distribution of the effects of intestates in case she were dead intestate.

That the dividends on the said £1055 New £3 per cent Bank annuites have been applied from time to time as the same accrued due towards the maintenance of the said Emma Lucy at the Friends Retreat apnised but the same have been and will be insufficient for that purpose and there is owing to Mr Ward the manager of the said Friends Retreat the sum of £216. 19. 9 for past maintenance of the said Emma Lucy.

Your Petitioner therefore humbly prays your Lordship that his costs charges and expenses of this application and consequent theron may be ordered to be taxed.

That the said sum of £108 New £3 per cent Bank annuites may be ordered to be transferred by the proper Officer of the Bank of England in the name of the Chancellor General of the Court of Chancery In trust in the Matter of Emma Lucy an insure person & the Summary Regulation Act 1862 and that the said unaccrued accumulations of



dividends thereon may be ordered to be paid by the said proper Officer with the privity of the said Accountant General to the like credit and when so paid may be ordered to be invested in like Bank Annuities in the name of the said Accountant General In trust in the said matter

That the said Miss Quincy He may be at liberty to pay the said sum of £97. 16. 0 cash into the Bank with the privity of the said Accountant General to the credit aforesaid

That the amount of the said costs when taxed may be ordered to be paid out of the cash for the time being standing to the credit aforesaid

That the sum of £216. 19. 9 may be ordered to be paid to the said Mr Wood out of the balance of cash to the credit aforesaid after payment of the said costs and if such balance of cash shall be insufficient for the purpose then that the whole of such balance may be paid to the said Mr Wood and in that event that a sufficient part of the said £108 New £3 per cent Bank annuities when so transferred as will be necessary to raise the deficiency may be sold and that the proceeds of such sale be paid to the said Mr Wood

That if the said balance of cash shall be more than sufficient to pay the said sum of £216. 19. 9 then that the residue thereof may be invested in like bank annuities in the name of the said Accountant General in trust in the said matter

That the dividends of the said £108 Bank annuities when so purchased as aforesaid may be paid to your Petitioner during the life of the said Emma Lucy or until further order

That your Petitioner may be authorized to receive from the said Mrs Sewell & Mr Newcup the dividends of the said £1055 New £3 per cent consolidated Bank annuities during the life of the said Emma Lucy



That the said last mentioned dividends and  
also the dividends to accrue on the said  
\$108 Bank Annuates and any other Bank  
Annuates so to be purchased as aforesaid may  
be applied by your said attorney in the maintenance  
of the said Anna Lucy

Or that such other order may be made as  
you may consider expedient for the purpose of  
undering the property of the said E Lucy  
available for her maintenance and benefit



I take the opportunity of writing to thee to say I hope all the Family is well. I have been wanting to hear from thee. I flitted my self <sup>and</sup> I should see some Friends the last <sup>quarter</sup> but one the last was held at Leed's I saw no Friends but the York that I knew, it would give me great comfort if I could see you often but I feel bound to think I am fearful, I never shall without I was ill. I hope I shall not be forsaken but I wish I could have some relations near in York it is a nice distance a pleasant walk in summer. I am fond of the Town. I have lost all my Plymouth Friends my Father I don't what they have done with the <sup>and</sup> my Cousin Henry Beattie my Mother and my Cousin Clark is about eighty I heard she had fell down and hurt herself J. Fuller & wife remained over the Bridge is since dead. Some years ago the Garrison the wife I never saw that I know off <sup>is dead</sup>

I lost Mr. Draper & his wife and Mrs Dyblee  
of Wootton near Norwich a County Village about  
three miles <sup>Wootton</sup> from North Walsham and to Mr.  
Draper that I lodge with kept a Cleaning  
Shop here a sister lived about seven  
miles from Norwich I have often walked  
and carried my cloths in a large laundry  
and sometimes went home with Mr. Piggott  
of a Sunday afternoon and stay'd a week  
sometimes I rode in a Dicky Cart I used  
to chum sometimes and some <sup>time</sup> out the  
Table & pens sometimes out a visiting  
in the village, <sup>with her to tea</sup> those days are past &  
gone I used to visit a Clergyman  
& the Housekeeper Mrs J Draper since  
are both deceased she caught cold  
without trying to remove her Sister thinks  
her - Richard Hill, man of Guiney fell  
off his pony coming from some meeting  
He was a handsome man I like Guiney

at the time at Vanech he was taking  
old in his Garden & <sup>due</sup> he was a nice Preacher  
he used to say like the Creator better than  
the Creature and not to dwell in the  
skins of flesh there has been many  
excellent Speakers before us I wish thould  
inform me what is become of all  
thy Brothers whether they <sup>are</sup> all deceased  
I wish thou would write to me and  
let me know how all are and  
I mean to give my Remembrance to  
thy Husband and Family <sup>whom</sup> I should  
like to see again never if it was for all  
your good but the Almighty is ever near  
he is the same yesterday and for evermore  
I wrote the world send me a piece of  
Poetry and I am so fond of Books oh  
what a pity I can not have my things  
and Books I left at your mouth <sup>about 30</sup> I worked  
for my things and it is done I should

~~close~~ them. my Linn Henry Bullets some  
times send me a parcel at Christmases  
but he seldom writes. we are fond  
of our Yarmouth Hensings they are  
very nicely cured I wish I could convey  
some but it is so far.


