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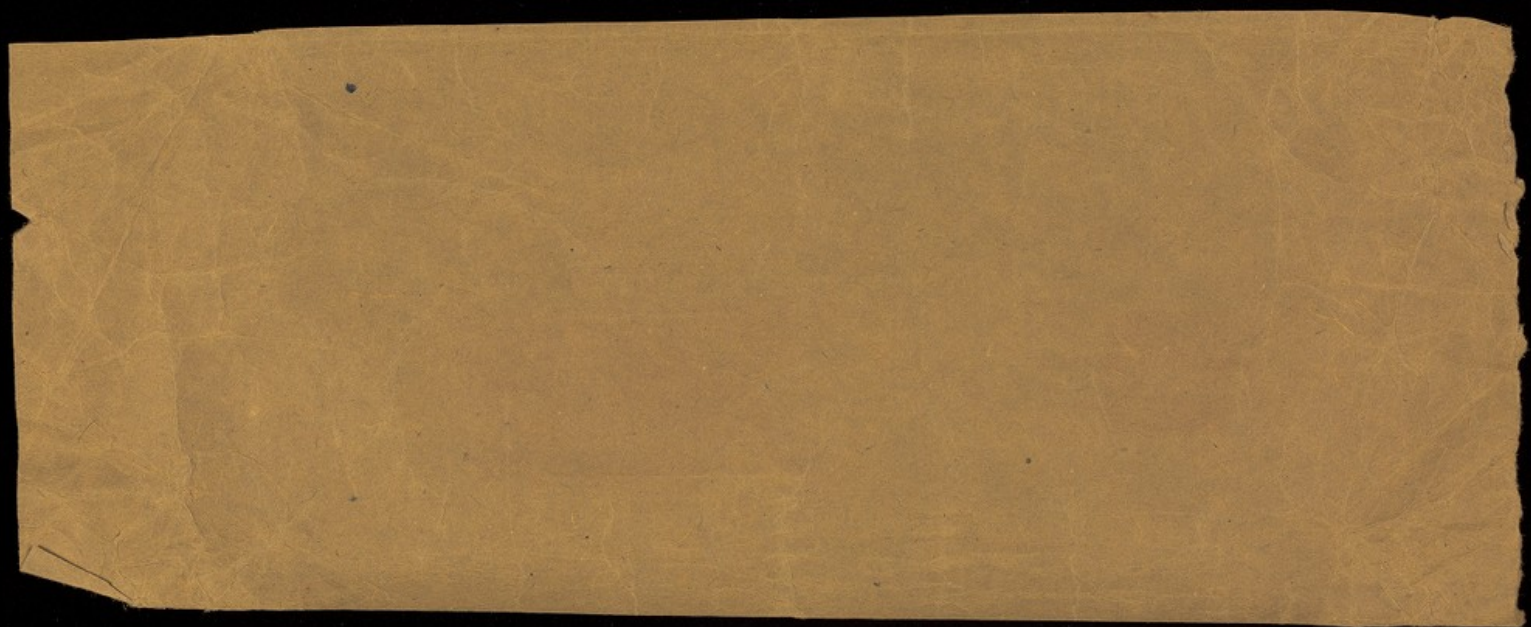

of the Late John Calbyn who sent me word ^{th^t} he knew nothing

Case of Dymond Gurney Garrett
a Lunatic in the Retreat.

Dymond Gurney Garrett was admitted as a patient in 1830 at a weekly charge of eight shillings for Board and attendance. The payments made by his father's trustees, from year to year, were insufficient to satisfy the claims of the institution for Board, attendance and clothing. In the year 1843 there was a debt due of £18. Last year his mother died, and the payments made by his father's trustees were discontinued. The debt now amounts to £65. 15. 5.

The property of Dymond Gurney Garrett in the hands of Trustees is nearly a thousand pounds sterling. The Trustees and his next of kin all wish to have it placed under Chancery control.

I have received from Fresh Post, Samuel Cook and John Ritching arrears of dividends to the amount of $\overset{203. 17. 6.}{\cancel{183. 16. 3}}$ which sum I now pay over to the Retreat in part payment of the debt due for his board and attendance, and of course have nothing left in my hands.

You will please to observe that over the Principal, as stated on the other side, I have no control whatever. My concern is only with the dividends arising from it.

There is a balance of interest remaining due to me as Trustee from two parties to the amount of about $\pounds 25$ which I expect soon to receive, and one or two dividends on the Consul and the 3rd June which I cannot receive till ~~the~~ next year, as the Accountant General has not yet given ^{me} ~~the~~ power to receive them. I hope in the beginning of next year to have enough in hand nearly to discharge the whole of the debt due to the Retreat.

The Expenses of suing out the Commission will be paid by the Accountant General out of the Principal in his hands, and will probably ^{amount to} ~~be about~~ $\pounds 80$ or $\pounds 90$, but this cannot be done at present as the Act of Parliament has not prescribed the regulations.

So far may perhaps be entered on the minutes of the Retreat Committee.

On applying to the Registrar of the Court of Chancery for our half years dividend on the monies belonging to D G Garritt, I found that the Attorney had omitted to invest two sums amounting to £318. 0. 3. which had therefore remained at the Bank of England unproductive. I received a check for £19. 18. 6 being ~~half~~ a years dividend on the remainder which I now remit and for which I must request thee to send me a stamp receipt.

The future yearly income will be about £28. or £29 per annum and if I should succeed in recovering a sum due to the Estate, it will be about £32
per annum.

On the other side is a bill of charges which
I have incurred, for which I add a receipt. I must
get thee to open an account in your Ledger as

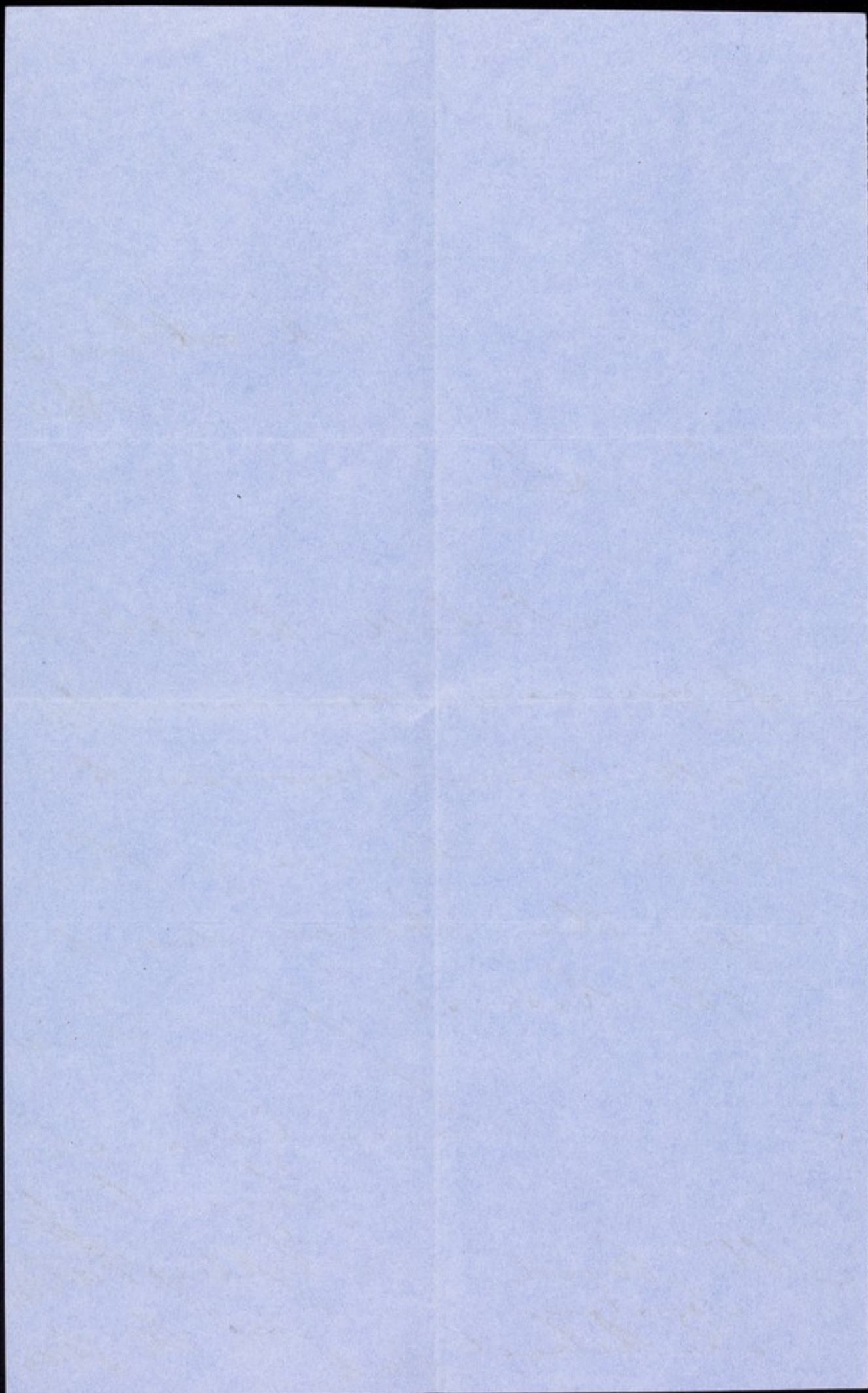

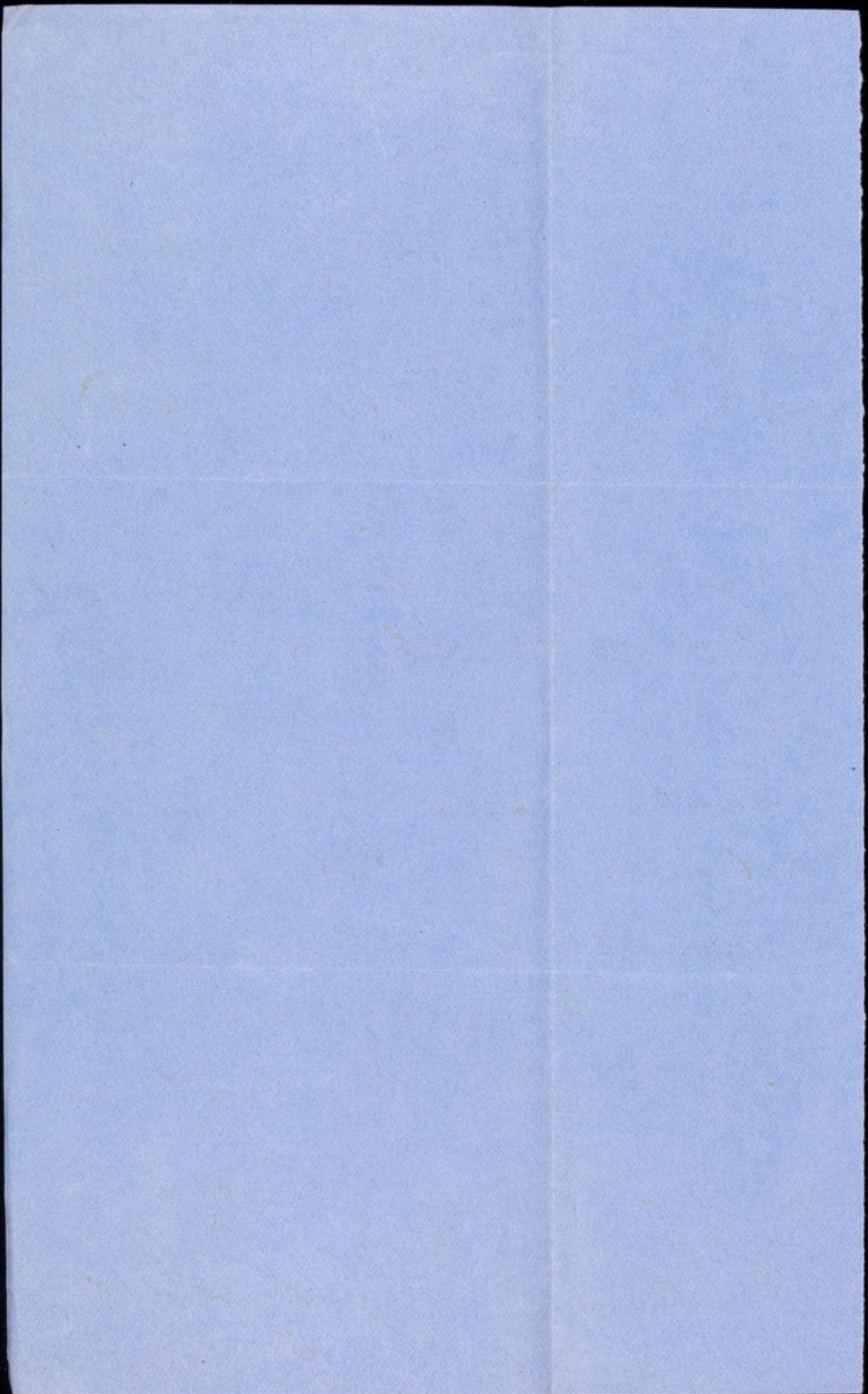

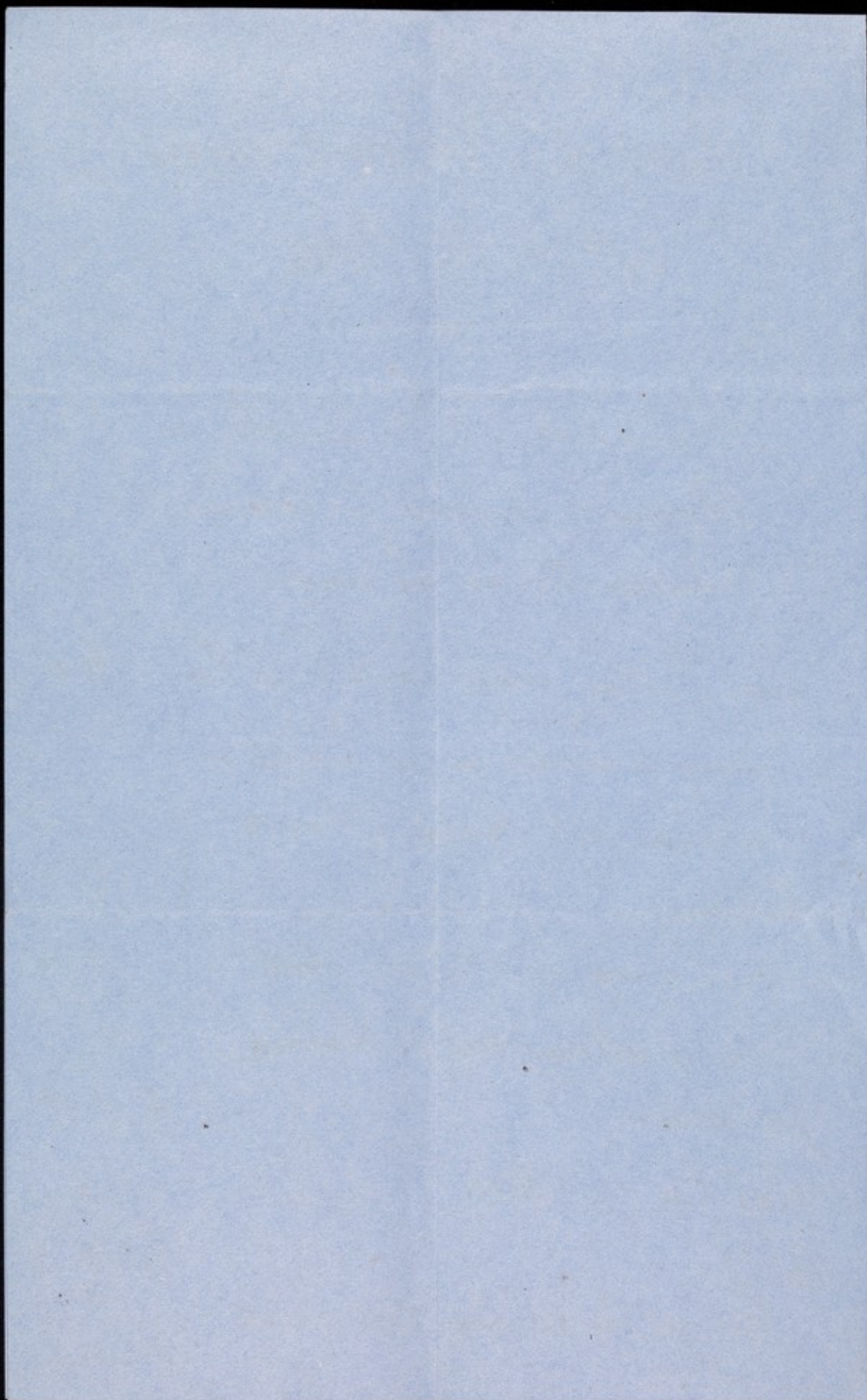
