Rules to be Observed by the  
Attendants at the Lodge,

In consideration of there being at the Lodge a larger number of attendants than is usually the case, & of their often exclusive of the Head Attendant, being married men. The following privileges are allowed to them, until fresh regulations become necessary, or the Superintendent shall see reason to revoke them.

1. The 3 married Attendants are permitted to take it in turn to be absent during the night, each spending one night at home in succession.
2. The attendant whose turn it is to sleep at home must not leave the Establishment until the patient or patients in his charge shall have supper & retired to bed, his returning should bring in no case hurried in order to likeable the attendants.

3. The attendant must not leave the establishment for the night until those attendants  
of whom by name may be known have had leave of absence for the  
evening, shall have returned.

4. This day of present ~~and~~ <sup>apply to the six week days</sup> will set aside the pastoral  
practices on Sundays. ~~Sunday will be reckoned~~  
~~as in the same way as other days - the attendant~~  
~~who has been out for the evening returning home~~  
~~to sleep in the establishment, unless it happens to be~~  
~~turn to sleep on it - had it not been Sunday.~~

5. Any night duties requiring to be performed  
are to be discharged in rotation by all the  
attendants enjoying the above privileges.

6. The attendant who has slept out is in  
every case to be ~~up~~ <sup>up</sup> later than 7 o'clock in the morning  
in returning (to be at his post again)

7. When an attendant has leave of absence  
for an afternoon, the leave of absence extends  
from 3 o'clock to a few minutes before 10. &  
for an evening from 6 o'clock or thereabouts  
till the same hour after which his master

8. The Head Attendant is charged to see  
that these regulations are not exceeded, & every  
attendant is required to inform him before  
leaving the establisht. is required to inform the  
Head attendant of his wish to leave until  
satisfied by him of his ~~not~~ being at liberty.




