settlement ^{on him} administered

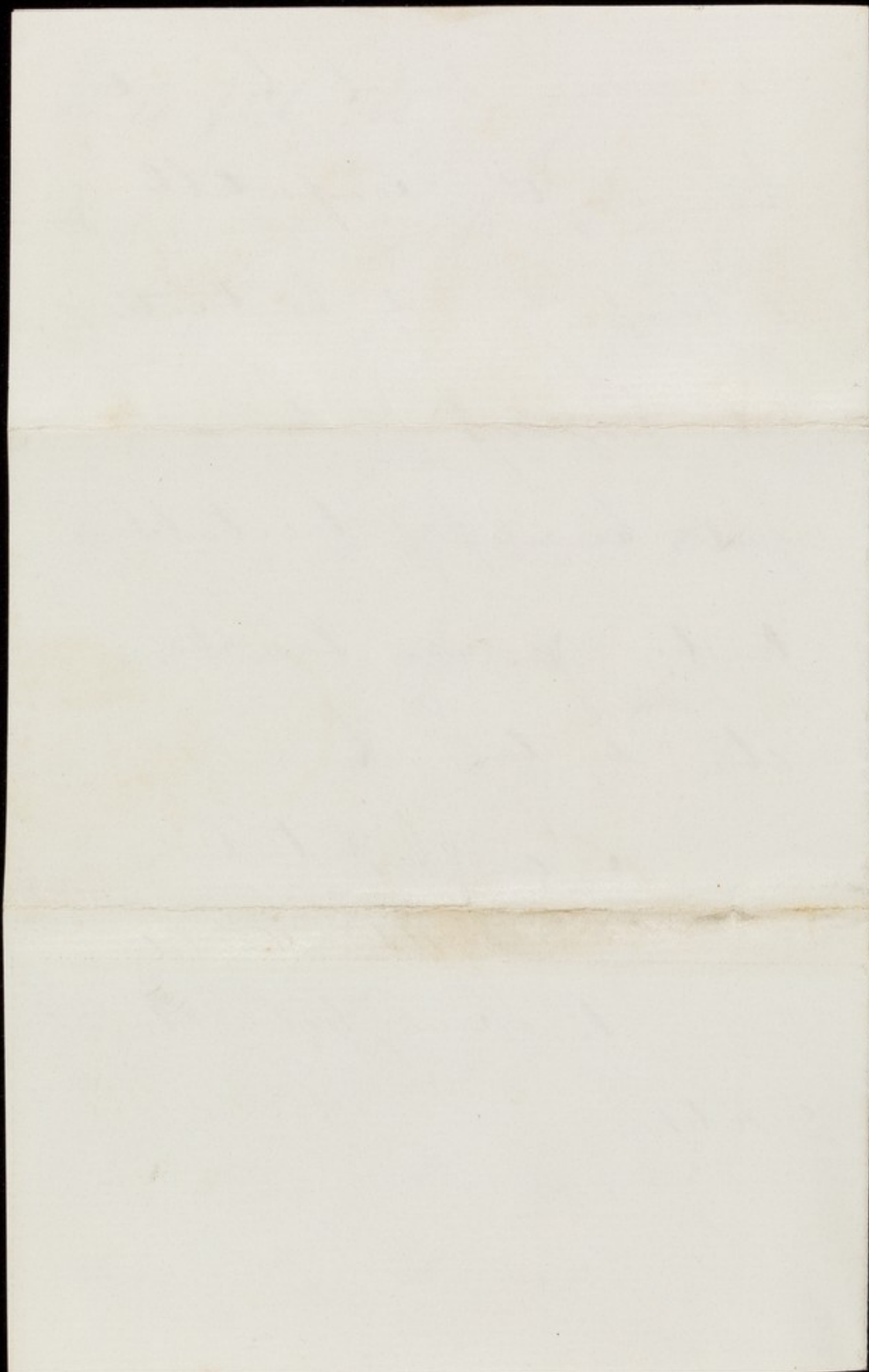

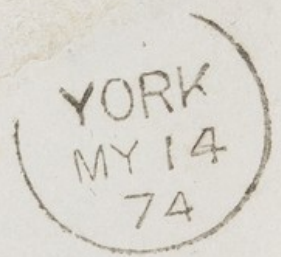

give you his name.

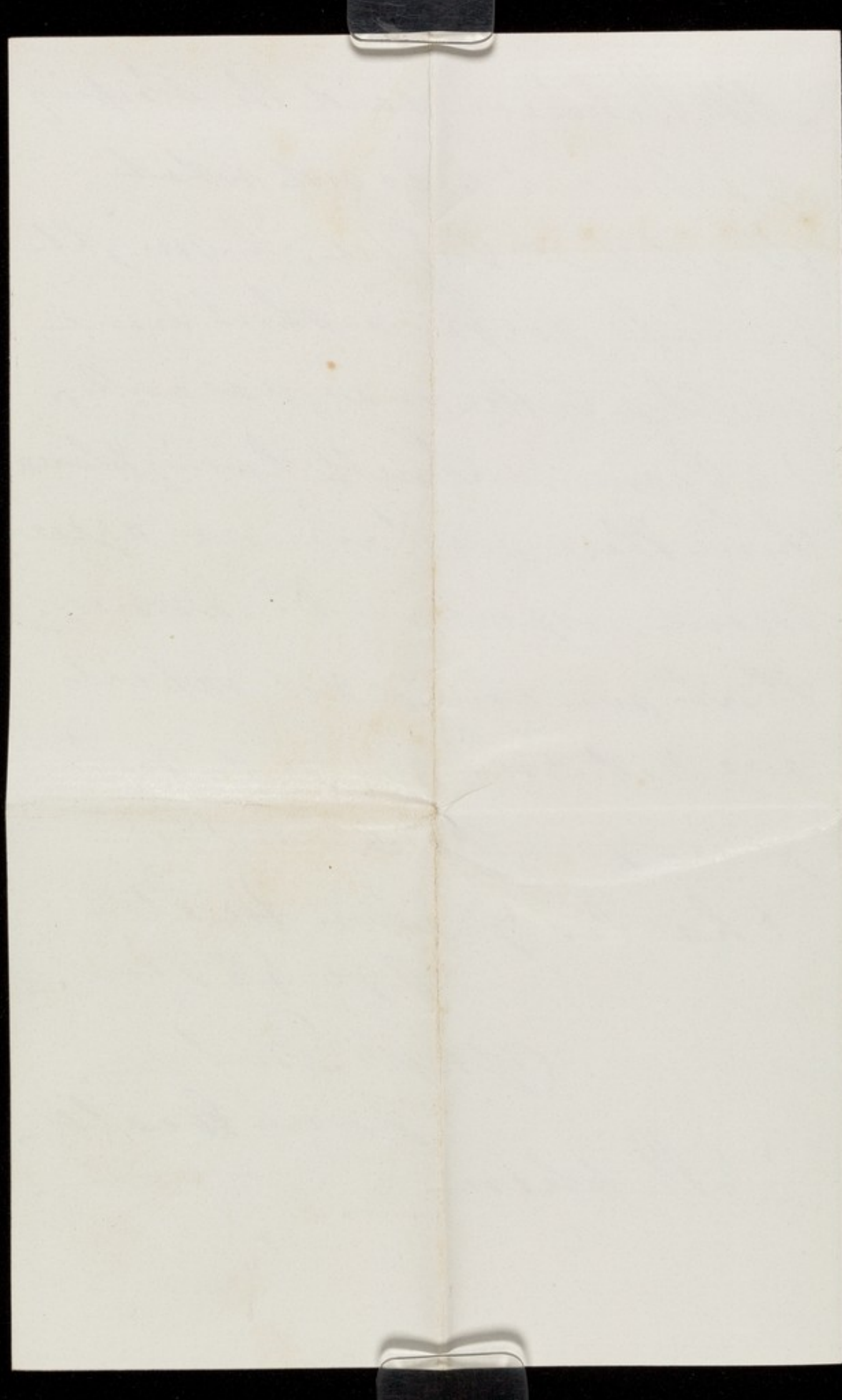
