& judge of his capability

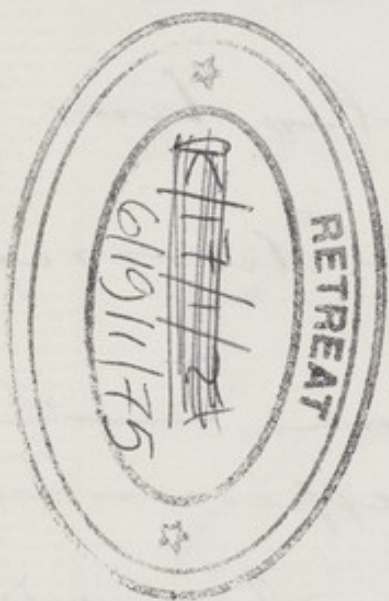
