YORK LUNATIC ASYLUM.

At an Annual Court of Governors of the York Lunatic Asylum, held at the Asylum on the 10th day of August, 1815,
(The Right Honourable Earl FITZWILLIAM in the Chair.)

IT WAS RESOLVED,

THAT a Committee be appointed to take the State of the Asylum Buildings into consideration; and to report their opinion respecting any Alterations, Additions, or Improvements therein, and the Means of the Institution to accomplish them, to a Special Meeting of the Governors.

RESOLVED UNANIMOUSLY,

THAT the said Committee do consist of seven, viz. BENJAMIN BROOKSBANK, Esq. Rev. T. C. R. READ, Rev. WILLIAM DEALTRY, Mr. SAMUEL TUKE, Mr. JONATHAN GRAY, DAVID RUSSELL, Esq. and the Rev. ROBERT THOMPSON.

RESOLVED, That a Special Court of Governors be held on Tuesday next, the 23d inst. immediately after the Election of Matron, for the purpose of receiving and taking into consideration the Report now agreed to; and that the said Meeting be advertised in the three York Papers.

REPORT.

YOUR Committee, having examined the State of the Buildings and the Plans laid before the last Building Committee, have to report that it appears to them highly expedient to make some alterations in the present State of the Buildings, as early as possible. The provision which was made for the Patients in the burnt Building was only of a temporary nature; the accommodation being, in many respects, extremely defective, and part of those Buildings being now in a very dangerous state. The Airing Courts are very small and confined; and the number of Patients in each Lodging-Room appears to your Committee much too great. The manner in which the Male and Female Patients are distributed in the main Building, the want of connection with Airing Courts, and the difficulty of proper inspection, have also claimed the attention of your Committee. It appears to them, that these defects in the construction and arrangement in the Buildings, would be most effectually remedied by taking down a part of the burnt Buildings, and adopting the Plan which accompanies this Report.

This Plan adapted to accommodate 40 Patients, who are proposed to be Females. By this arrangement the division of the Sexes would be complete; and the inspection by the Matron, both of these Patients and of the domestic parts of the Establishment, would be easy. It is proposed to appropriate the present main Building to 70 Male Patients, with the exception of the Laundry and the Room adjoining, which would accommodate 10 Females; these arrangements would provide in the whole for 70 Male and 30 Female Patients. Considering that the Paupers from the West Riding will shortly be removed from the Asylum, and that the other Ridings have similar plans in contemplation, it appears to your Committee that it may not be prudent at present to make provision for a larger number. There are now in the house 109 Patients, of whom 54 are Paupers;

Paupers: viz. 31 from the West Riding, 5 from the North, 7 from the East, 4 from the City and Ainsty, and 7 from other Counties.

There are at present upwards of twenty applications for the admission of Patients (chiefly Paupers) whom the house cannot accommodate.

It will be necessary to provide Airing Courts at the End of the Building, for the Male Patients, from which they would have immediate communication with the Day-Rooms.

The expense of these alterations and improvements is estimated at 3600*l.*; and though this sum may seem considerable, your Committee think that the proper accommodation of the Patients, and the security against abuse, which a good arrangement of the Buildings would afford, are points of sufficient importance to justify this expenditure.

The Committee proceed to the second head of their Report, viz. The Means of the Institution to accomplish any Improvements.

The Institution is possessed of 8200*l.* 3 per cent. Consols, of which about 1300*l.* Stock appears to your Committee to belong to the Reduction Fund, and to be inapplicable to the purpose of Buildings. The remaining sum of 6900*l.* Stock, taking the three per Cents at 60, would produce 4140*l.* Sterling.

The Committee have made an Estimate of the Annual Income and Expenses of the house, upon an average of the two last Quarters, during both which the Patients paid the present advanced Weekly Rates.

The Annual Receipt from Dividends of the Funded Property, and from some small Turnpike Securities, amounts to 230*l.* The estimated Annual Expense of Repairs, Furniture, Bedding, and Linen, is 500*l.* There is, therefore, a deficiency on this account of 270*l.* per annum, which, if taken from the above surplus of 928*l.* reduces the ultimate annual surplus to 658*l.*

It appears, that provided the projected Improvements can be carried into effect for not more than 3600*l.*, the Annual Income of the Institution for Repairs, Furniture, and Linen, will be reduced to 50*l.* Still, however, there will remain a surplus upon the general account of the house of 478*l.* per annum; so that the proposed Plan may not only be carried into effect, but a considerable reduction in the Payments of the indigent Classes of Patients may immediately be made.

YORK LUNATIC ASYLUM.

THE Committee of the York Lunatic Asylum, in presenting the annexed Report to the Governors, beg leave to accompany it with a few explanatory remarks on the extraordinary expenditure of the last year.

In consequence of the late fire, the Governors thought it necessary to erect a large Day-Room for Male Patients; to fit up, in a temporary manner, for Female Patients, part of the Building which had been in a great measure destroyed; and to provide three new Airing Courts.

The improvement of the main Building was a matter of imperious necessity for the safety, health, and comfort of the Patients; and the Committee have the satisfaction to report, that by ventilating almost every part; by arching and relaying the decayed floors of the low Gallery; by spouting the roof; by fitting up many of the rooms with safe and cheerful windows; by making a warm Bath; by an alteration of the Privies, (by which four more lodging Rooms are obtained, and a great nuisance removed); and by various other additions and alterations, the House is now perfectly dry, cheerful, and, with one temporary exception, free from offensive smells.

The Sums thus expended on the Buildings alone, since the calamity of the fire, amount to nearly £2700 *. And it is estimated that the expense occasioned chiefly by the fire in Beds, Linen, and other Furniture, has amounted to more than £300.

The Committee do not profess to state with exact precision the actual cost of each Patient for attendance and maintenance; from the calculations, however, which they have made, with some care, they estimate the expense of each Patient at upwards of 12s. per week. It was, indeed, to be expected that each individual Patient would necessarily cost the Institution more than formerly; as the number of Patients accommodated is little more than one half, and it has been found absolutely requisite to employ the same number of Attendants, and to give to them much higher salaries, on account of their being precluded from every species of perquisite.

The Committee have found it necessary to advance universally the weekly payments of the Patients sent by parishes, and of such others, whose circumstances seemed to admit of it.

They have proceeded in this delicate and difficult task with indulgent attention to such claims for mitigated charge, as, after much inquiry and consideration, appeared to them to be well founded. And they have the satisfaction to believe, that an indigent Patient can still be admitted into the Asylum on as reasonable terms as into most similar institutions.

The general advance in the terms commenced with the present quarter, and the Committee have no doubt that the income from Patients will fully equal the expenditure on their account in the current year.

The following statement of the number of Patients at present in the house, on the different rates of payment, when compared with the quarterly accounts of expenditure, will enable the Governors to judge respecting the accuracy of the Committee's calculation. And as the applications from persons in superior situations of life, to place their friends in the Asylum, have of late considerably increased, they trust that their successors will soon be able to reduce the expenses of the indigent, by the overflowings of the payments of the more affluent Patients, without a disproportionate admission of numbers of the latter class.

Though the Committee are aware that the Institution labours under many evils of construction, which they trust the liberality of the Public will, in time, enable the Governors in some degree to remedy, and though they feel convinced that the work of improvement is not yet complete, they can safely venture to congratulate the Governors and the Friends of the Patients, on the very improved condition of the Asylum, not only in the state of the Building, but in the order, attention, and humanity which are manifested, in general, by the Officers and Attendants, in the discharge of their duties to the Patients. They believe that, in very few similar Institutions, is a greater degree of comfort, or of judicious medical attention obtained for the Patient. This conviction is grounded on

on the cleanliness and wholesomeness of the House; on the improved look and health of the Patients; on the remarkably small number of deaths that has occurred within the last twelve months; on their own personal observation; and on the Reports entered from time to time in the Visitors' books. Nor can they entertain a doubt, that so long as the Visitors shall continue to exercise that degree of watchful attention and judicious superintendence, for which the Ladies and Gentlemen who have hitherto been appointed to that most essential Office are entitled to the gratitude of the Governors, so long will this Asylum, even under all the disadvantages and imperfections with which it is still encumbered, continue to maintain its present claim to the confidence and support of the Public.

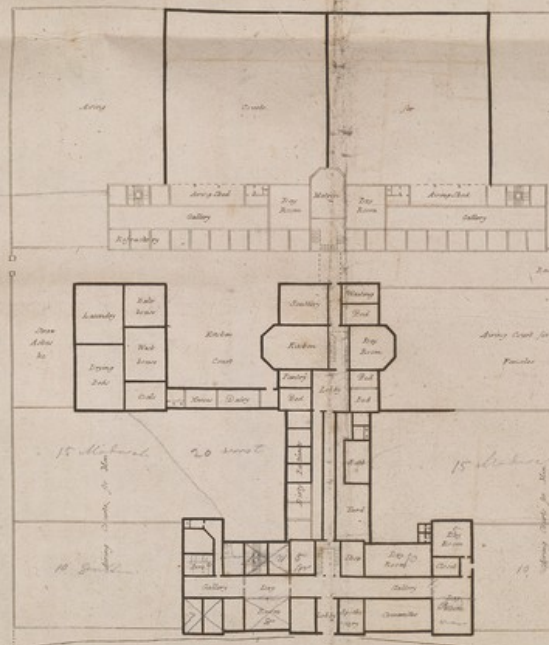

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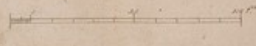

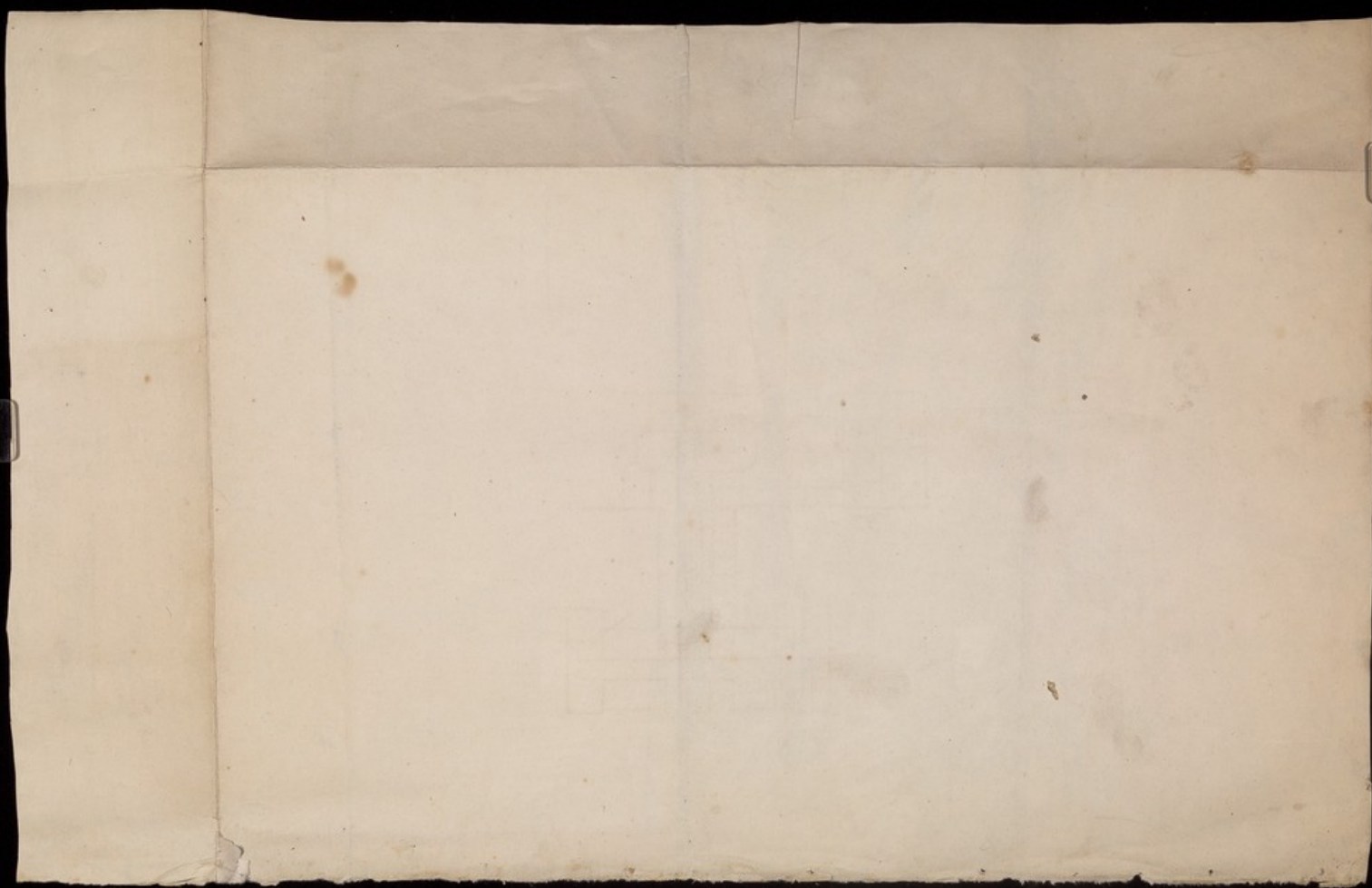


A SKETCH
