ABSTRACT OF THE PRINCIPAL LAWS AFFECTING THE MEDICAL PROFESSION IN AUSTRALASIA.

THE MEDICAL OFFICERS ORDINANCE (1881)

(Ordinance, No. 15.)

Medical Districts.—The Governor may, by proclamation in the *Royal Gazette*, declare any part of the Colony to be a medical district for the purposes of this Ordinance, and may also appoint, subject to the approval of the Secretary of State, any Medical Officer for any such medical district.

Duties of Medical Officer.—The Medical Officer of any district as aforesaid shall, in addition to any other duties imposed on such officer by the Chief Medical Officer of the Colony, visit every plantation in such district once within such regular periods as may be from time to time determined for the said district by the Chief Medical Officer, and shall also, when desired in writing so to do by the employer on any such plantation, visit any immigrant or native on the said plantation suffering from any severe illness or from any serious accident, and shall thereafter visit such case as may be necessary.

Medical Officer's Visiting Book.—On visiting any immigrant or native on any plantation at the request of the employer thereon, the Medical Officer shall enter in the Medical Officer's Visiting-book (to be provided by the employer on such plantation) the day and hour at which such visit was made, the name, age, country, and number of any immigrant or native so visited, the nature of the illness or accident from which the same may be suffering, and the treatment prescribed, and shall sign such entry in his own handwriting, and for every such special visit there shall be paid to the Medical Officer a sum of five shillings, if the distance from the residence of the Medical Officer to the plantation visited is under ten miles, or the sum of ten shillings if over ten miles.

Penalty for making False Entry.—Any Medical Officer that shall make any false entry in the Medical Officer's Visiting-book, or that shall omit or neglect to make any entry as hereinbefore provided; shall, in addition to any order made in such case by the Governor, be liable on conviction to a fine not less than Five Pounds and not exceeding Twenty-five Pounds.

Inability of Medical Officer to Visit Natives.—When any Medical Officer shall be unable from any cause to visit any immigrant or any native suffering on any plantation from any serious illness or accident within twenty-four hours of the time when such Medical Officer may have been requested by the employer to visit the same, such Medical Officer shall as soon as possible thereafter, if the Medical Officer considered such visit necessary, report the matter to the Chief Medical Officer, and shall state the reasons that prevented the visit being made within the time herein specified.

Medical Officer's Annual Return.—In the month of January in each year, the district Medical Officer shall forward to the Chief Medical Officer an annual return showing the number of immigrants and natives employed during the preceding year ending the thirty-first day of December, on every plantation in his district, the number of cases of sickness, or of accident under treatment on such plantation, or in any hospital from the said plantation, and the number of deaths among the immigrants and natives employed on such plantation, with the causes thereof.

Capitation Rate.—In the month of June in each year, or at the first meeting of the Legislative Council after that date, the Governor in-Council, shall on the motion of the Receiver-General for the time being, fix and determine for each medical district a certain capitation rate payable on each immigrant and native over ten years of age on any plantation therein by the person having such immigrant or native as aforesaid in his employ, and the proceeds of the said rate from any medical district shall be paid to the Medical Officer of such district in addition to any salary, but no rate fixed and determined as aforesaid shall for any year exceed four shillings.

District Hospitals to be under control of Medical Officer.—Every district hospital shall be under the direction and control of the Medical Officer of the district, and shall be visited and examined by the Chief Medical Officer not less than twice in the year, and the Chief Medical Officer shall, once in every year, report to the Governor the condition of all such district hospitals, and shall be held responsible for their general administration and condition.

THE CONTAGIOUS DISEASES ORDINANCE (1881).

(Ordinance, No. 17.)

Medical Officer's Certificate.—Should it be found by the Medical Officer examining any woman known to be a common prostitute, that she is suffering from any venereal disease (this term includes Gonorrhoea), he shall sign the following certificate in duplicate, and shall hand it to the police officer in charge:—

I, A.B., Government Medical Officer, do hereby certify that I have this day examined C. D., of , brought to me by virtue of the warrant of E. F., Esquire, Stipendiary Magistrate, and that she is suffering from Venereal Disease within the meaning of the Contagious Diseases Ordinance, 1881. Dated this day 18 . A. B.

Such certificate shall have the same force and effect as an ordinary warrant of commitment, and the police officer shall thereupon take such woman to the nearest public or Government hospital.

Government Medical Officer may Examine Immigrants.—Any Government Medical Officer may, upon the application of any persons employing indentured immigrants, on the request of any Inspector of immigrants, or of his own motion, examine any immigrant, male or female in the employ of such person, and if he shall find that the immigrant is suffering from a venereal disease he shall sign a certificate as above, and give it to the employer of such immigrant. And the employer shall send such immigrant to some hospital, where he shall be detained until cured.

Duty of Medical Officer.—It shall be the duty of the Medical Officer who inspects any immigrants on their arrival in the Colony to order any immigrant, male or female, suffering from venereal disease, to be sent to the nearest Government depot or public hospital, there to be detained until cured.

VACCINATION (1877).

(Ordinance, No. 4.)

Duties of Vaccinator-General.—The Vaccinator-General, who must be a duly registered Medical Practitioner, and is appointed by the Governor, shall act as District Vaccinator for the islands of Ovalau, Moturiki, Naigani, Yanucalailai, Yanucalevu,

Mokogai, and Wakaya, and shall, in addition, vaccinate all immigrants imported as abourers as soon as possible after their arrival at Levuka. He shall keep an office in the town of Levuka, and shall attend at such office on Friday in each week, from the hour of nine until eleven in the forenoon, for the purpose of vaccinating all persons residing within the said islands, who shall appear or be brought before him for that purpose, and also of inspecting the progress of such vaccination in the person so vaccinated.

Supply of Lymph to be kept.—The Vaccinator-General shall maintain a continual supply of recent lymph, and shall supply the same as may be required to the District Vaccinators.

District Vaccinators.—The Governor shall appoint District Vaccinators for such districts as shall be defined by the Governor, and such District Vaccinators shall be duly registered Medical Practitioners, and shall receive such remuneration as shall be determined by the Governor in Council, and such District Vaccinators shall, for the purposes of vaccination, attend at such places within their districts and at such times as may be directed by the Vaccinator-General.

Non-medical Vaccinators.—To facilitate the speedy vaccination of the adult native population, a District Vaccinator may employ non-medical vaccinators to vaccinate under his supervision, but the District Vaccinator shall in every case be responsible for the proper performance of the operation by such non-medical vaccinators.

Notice of intention to Vaccinate to be given.—Before a District Vaccinator visits any native town for the purposes of vaccination, he shall intimate to the Stipendary Magistrate the time at which vaccination will be performed at such town, and such Stipendary Magistrate shall forthwith communicate such information to the Roko-Tui or other chief native Government officer of the Province, who shall take care that all unvaccinated natives aged over six months, residing in such town, shall be presented for vaccination at the time and place indicated.

Vaccinated persons to appear before the Vaccinator for Inspection.—Upon the eighth day after any adult or child shall have been vaccinated as aforesaid, such adult shall present himself, or the father, or mother, or guardian of such child shall take such child before the Vaccinator in whose district the vaccination was performed, in order that such Vaccinator may ascertain by inspection the result of such operation.

Certificate of Vaccination.—Upon and immediately after the successful vaccination of any adult person or any child, the Vaccinator-General or the District Vaccinator in whose district the operation shall have been performed, shall deliver to such adult or to the father or mother or guardian of the said child, a certificate under his hand that such adult or child has been successfully vaccinated.

When unfit for Vaccination.—If the Vaccinator shall be of opinion that any adult or child presented for vaccination is not in a fit and proper state to be successfully vaccinated, he shall thereupon immediately deliver, without fee, to such adult or to the father, or mother, or guardian of the said child, a certificate that the adult or child is in an unfit state for vaccination, and such certificate shall remain in force for a period marked thereon by such Vaccinator.

Register of Vaccination.—The Vaccinator-General and every District Vaccinator shall keep a register, in which he shall enter the date of vaccination, the name, age, sex, and name of parent or guardian, and place of abode of every person vaccinated in his district, and the operation, whether successful, unsuccessful, or doubtful. And every District Vaccinator shall, on or before the first day of February of each year, transmit a signed copy of such register to the Vaccinator-General, who shall file the same in his office.

Vaccinator-General to Report Yearly.—The Vaccinator-General shall, on or before the first day of March of each year, make a general report to the Governor, showing the state and progress of vaccination during the year ending on the thirty-first day of December next preceding.

Recovery of Penalties.—All pecuniary penalties for any offence under this Ordinance may be recovered in a summary manner on the information of the Vaccinator-General or of a District Vaccinator.

Penalty for attempting to produce Small-pox.—Any person who shall produce, or attempt to produce, by any means whatsoever, the disease of small-pox in any person, shall be liable for every such offence to be imprisoned for any term not exceeding six months.

NEW SOUTH WALES.

MEDICAL WITNESSES (1838).

(1 Vic., No. 3.)

Coroners' Inquests.—Whenever upon the holding of any Coroner's Inquest, or upon the holding of any inquiry by a Justice of the Peace, touching the death of any person, it shall appear to the Coroner or Justice that the deceased person was not at or immediately before his death attended by any legally qualified Medical Practitioner, such Coroner or Justice may issue a summons for the attendance, as a witness at such inquest or inquiry, of some legally qualified Medical Practitioner in actual practice who shall reside near to the place where such inquest or inquiry is holden, but that where the deceased person was attended by any such Practitioner, the Coroner or Justice shall issue a summons for his attendance only, or if the deceased was attended by more than one such Practitioner, the Coroner or Justices may cause all or any of them to be summoned at his or their discretion.

Post-mortem Examinations.—The Coroner or Justice may, at any time, before the termination of the inquest or inquiry, direct any legally qualified Medical Practitioner to perform a *post-mortem* examination of the body of the deceased, provided that, if in any case it appear to the Coroner or Justice that the death of such deceased person was probably caused by the improper or negligent treatment of any Medical Practitioner or other person, then such Practitioner or other person shall not be allowed to perform or assist at any such examination, although he shall in every such case be allowed to be present thereat.

Additional Medical Evidence.—Whenever it shall appear to the Coroner or to a majority of the Jury at any such inquest, or to the Justice at any such inquiry, that the cause of death had not been satisfactorily explained by the practitioners examined in the first instance, the Coroner or Justice shall cause any other legally qualified practitioner to be summoned as a witness, and shall direct him to perform a *post-mortem* examination whether such an examination shall have been previously performed or not, provided that where such additional evidence is at the instance of a majority of the Jury, it shall be lawful for such majority to name to the Coroner any particular practitioner whom they wish to attend, and in that case such practitioner shall be summoned and no other.

Remuneration to Medical Witnesses.—When any legally qualified Medical Practitioner has attended at an inquest or inquiry in obedience to any such summons as aforesaid he shall for such attendance and for giving evidence be entitled to receive the remuneration of one guinea, and (in addition thereto) for making of any such *post-mortem* examination the remuneration of two guineas, and if the place of his residence shall be more than ten miles distant from the place where the inquest or inquiry is holden, then such practitioner shall be entitled to a sum of one shilling for every mile of such extra distance in addition; provided that no remuneration shall be paid for the performance of any *post-mortem* examination instituted without the previous direction of the Coroner or Justice, and, also, that where the death shall have happened in any public hospital, gaol, or other public building, no Medical Officer appointed with salary to attend such hospital, gaol, or building, shall be entitled to any such remuneration.

Penalty for Neglecting to Attend.—Where any such summons or order of any Coroner or Justice as aforesaid, shall have been served upon any Medical Practitioner to whom the same was directed, or shall have been left at his usual residence in sufficient time for him to obey the same, and he shall nevertheless not obey such summons or order, he shall for such neglect forfeit a penalty of not less than three pounds nor more than twenty, unless he shall at the hearing of the case show a good and sufficient excuse for such neglect.

QUALIFICATIONS OF MEDICAL WITNESSES DEFINED (1838 and 1845).

(2 Vic., No. 22, and 9 Vic., No. 12.)

Medical Board.—The Governor may appoint a Committee consisting of not less than three Members, being of the Medical Profession, one of whom shall be nominated

President, together with a Secretary, under the style of the "New South Wales Medical Board," three Members to form a quorum, and any person desirous of being declared a legally qualified Medical Practitioner shall submit his degree, diploma, or other certificate, or proof of his being so duly qualified for the examination and approval of the said Medical Board, and shall obtain from the said Medical Board a certificate of his being so qualified.

Legally Qualified Medical Practitioners Defined.—No person shall be deemed a legally qualified Medical Practitioner unless such person shall have proved to the satisfaction of the Medical Board that he is a Doctor or Bachelor of Medicine of some University, or a Physician or Surgeon licensed or admitted as such by some College of Physicians or Surgeons in Great Britain or Ireland, or a Member of the Company of Apothecaries of London, or a Member or Licentiate of the Apothecaries' Hall of Dublin, or who is or has been a Medical Officer duly appointed and confirmed of Her Majesty's sea or land service.

MEDICAL PRACTITIONERS' REGISTRATION (1855).

(19 Vic., No. 17.)

Foreign Medical Practitioners.—Any person who shall prove to the satisfaction of the Medical Board that he has passed through a regular course of medical study of not less than three years' duration in a School of Medicine, and that he has received after due examination from the University of Sydney, or from some University, College, or other body duly recognised for that purpose in the country to which such University, College, or other body may belong, a diploma, degree, or license entitling him to practice medicine in that country, shall be deemed to be a legally qualified Medical Practitioner, and shall be entitled to a certificate as such from the said Board.

Penalties.—The said Board may examine any person who may present himself for examination, or any witness who may be produced before them, and to take a solemn declaration from such person or witness, and, if any person shall wilfully, knowingly, and corruptly make any false statement upon such examination, or in such declaration, or shall utter, or attempt to utter, or put off as true before the said Board, any false, forged, or counterfeit diploma, degree, license, certificate, or other document, or if any person shall fraudulently or by false representations obtain any certificate as a duly qualified Medical Practitioner, or shall forge, alter or counterfeit any such certificate, or shall utter or use any such forged certificate knowing the same respectively to have been forged, or shall falsely advertise or publish himself as having obtained such certificate, every person, guilty of any, or either of the said offences, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanour and be liable to imprisonment with or without hard labour for any period not exceeding three years.

INFECTIOUS DISEASE SUPERVISION ACT (1881).

(45 Vic., No. 25.)

Board of Health.—The Governor may appoint a Board of Health to consist of not less than six persons to carry out the provisions of this Act, and three members of such Board shall, at any meeting thereof, constitute a quorum.

Case of Small-pox to be reported.—On the appearance of any case of Small-pox or eruptive fever, which may reasonably be supposed to be Small-pox, in any house or premises in New South Wales, the householder or occupier of the said house or premises, and also the Medical Practitioner attending the case, shall immediately report in writing such case to the proper authorities in manner following, that is to say, if the case occur within the City of Sydney, then the report of the case shall be delivered to the officer in charge at the nearest police station or lock-up, or to the officer in charge at the Central Police Station, or to the Health Officer of the Port of Sydney, or to any member of the Government Medical Staff, or the Secretary of the Board of Health, and if the case occur beyond the City of Sydney, then the report shall be delivered to the nearest Magistrate Officer of Police, Clerk of Petty Sessions, or to the Government Medical Officer of the district within which the case has occurred.

Penalty for Non-reporting.—If any person, required to report any such case, shall fail to make such immediate report, as hereinbefore required, every such person shall be liable to a penalty of not less than ten nor more than fifty pounds; or in default of payment, by imprisonment with or without hard labour for any term not exceeding six calendar months.

Powers of Board of Health.—The Board of Health shall be the authority to carry out (subject to any orders, directions, and general regulations which may be made by the Governor) the powers of isolation and all other powers conferred by the second section of the Act third William the Fourth number one, and subject to the approval of the Governor, it shall be lawful for the said Board to define, by notification in the *Gazette*, any district in the Colony, now or hereafter, to be placed under the charge of a Government Medical Officer, and in like manner to amend, alter or extend the boundaries of any such district.

CERTIFICATES IN LUNACY (1879).

(42 Vic., No. 7.)

Medical Certificates.—Any person deemed to be insane may be received and detained as a patient in a hospital for the insane, or a licensed house, on two medical certificates, according to the following form :—

I, the undersigned, being a Medical Practitioner, hereby certify that I, on the
 day of one thousand eight hundred and
 at (*here insert the particulars of the place of examination, as the street, number of the house, or other particulars*) separately from any other Medical Practitioner personally examined of (*insert residence and profession or occupation, if any*) and that the said is (*insane or an idiot*) and a proper person to be taken charge of and detained under care and treatment, and that I have formed this opinion upon the following grounds, viz. :—

1. Facts indicating insanity observed by myself (*here state the facts*).
2. Other facts (*if any*) indicating insanity communicated to me by others (*here state the information and from whom*).

Dated this day of one thousand eight hundred and

(Signed)

Place of abode

Each certificate must be signed by a Medical Practitioner, who shall, separately from the Medical Practitioner who shall have signed or shall thereafter sign the other of such certificates, have personally examined the person to whom such certificate relates not more than ten clear days previously to the reception of such person into such hospital or licensed house. Every Medical Practitioner who shall sign any certificate, shall specify therein the facts upon which he has formed his opinion that the person to whom such certificate relates is an insane person, and shall distinguish in such certificate facts observed by himself from facts communicated to him by others, and no person shall be received into any hospital for the insane or licensed house under any certificate which purports to be founded only upon facts communicated by others.

Who not to Sign Certificates, &c.—No Medical Practitioner whose father, brother, son, partner, or assistant shall have signed the order or request, or one of the certificates for the reception of a patient into an hospital for the insane, reception house, or licensed house, shall sign any certificate for the reception of the same patient, and no Medical Practitioner who, or whose father, brother, son, partner, or assistant, shall be the superintendent of, or a medical officer of an hospital for the insane, reception house, or licensed house, or a regular professional attendant in a licensed house, or wholly or partly the proprietor or the mortgagee or lessee of a licensed house, or who shall receive a percentage on or otherwise be interested in the payments to be made by or on account of any patient received into such hospital, reception house, or licensed house, shall sign any order, request, or certificate for the reception of a patient into any such hospital, reception-house, or licensed house. And no Medical Practitioner shall himself or by his servants or agents receive to board or lodge in any licensed house, or take the charge or care of any person upon or under any medical certificate signed by himself or his father, brother, son, partner or assistant. And no Medical Practitioner, having signed any certificate for the reception of any person into a licensed house, shall be the regular professional attendant of such person while under care or charge under such certificate.

No Certificate to be granted without Examination.—If any Medical Practitioner shall grant any such certificate as aforesaid without having seen and carefully examined the person to whom it relates at the time and in the manner specified in such certificate for the purpose of ascertaining the condition of such person to the best of his

knowledge and power, he shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds. And if any such practitioner shall wilfully and falsely certify in writing that any person is insane, knowing him not to be insane, the practitioner so certifying shall be guilty of a misdemeanour.

Medical Certificates may be Amended.—If after the reception of any insane person into any hospital for the insane or licensed house, it shall appear that the medical certificates or either of them upon which he was received is or are in any respect defective or incorrect, such medical certificates, or either of them, may be amended by the person and persons who shall have signed the same within twenty-eight days next after the reception of such insane person, provided nevertheless that every such amendment shall be approved by the Colonial Secretary.

Payment of Fees to Medical Practitioners.—Justices causing any person to be examined by any Medical Practitioners may grant a certificate for the payment of remuneration to such Medical Practitioners, and of all other expenses in or about the examination of such person, and such expenses where they cannot be obtained from the estate of the person examined, shall be defrayed out of such fund as shall have been appropriated by Parliament for such purposes, provided always that the remuneration and expenses so awarded shall in every case be subject to the approval of the Colonial Secretary.

THE ANATOMY ACT (1881).

(44 Vic., No. 25.)

Licenses to Practise Anatomy.—The Governor may grant a license to practice anatomy in any School of Anatomy to any Medical Practitioner, or to any legally qualified professor or teacher of anatomy, medicine, or surgery, or to any student attending any school of anatomy, on application from any such person, countersigned by two Justices of the Peace certifying that to their knowledge or belief such person so applying is a fit person to be so licensed.

Inspectors of Schools of Anatomy.—The Governor may appoint one or more Inspectors of Schools of Anatomy, who shall make a quarterly return to the Registrar-General of every body that has been removed for anatomical examination to any School of Anatomy, distinguishing the sex, and, as far as is known, the name and age of each person whose body was so removed. And every such inspector may visit and inspect at any time any School of Anatomy for which he is appointed inspector.

Bodies for Anatomical Examination.—Any executor or other person, not being an undertaker, having lawful possession of the body of any deceased person, may permit such body to undergo anatomical examination, unless such deceased person shall have expressed his desire, at any time during his life, that his body after death might not undergo such examination; an anatomical examination may also be made of the body of any person who, at any time during his life, may direct in writing, attested by two or more witnesses, that his body after death may be examined anatomically, provided in all cases that no relative of the deceased person shall require the body to be interred without such examination.

Removal of Bodies.—In no case shall the body of any person be removed for anatomical examination from any place where such person may have died, until after twelve hours from the time of such person's decease, nor until after six hours' notice to the inspector of the district of the intended removal of the body, or if no such inspector have been appointed, or such inspector shall reside at a greater distance than ten miles from the place of death, then to the legally qualified Medical Practitioner or Stipendiary Magistrate nearest to the place of death, nor unless a certificate stating in what manner such person came by his death shall, previously to the removal of the body, have been signed by the legally qualified Medical Practitioner who attended such person during the illness whereof he died, or if no such practitioner attended such person during such illness, then by some such practitioner or some Stipendiary Magistrate who shall be called in after the death of such person to view his body and who shall state the manner or cause of death according to the best of his knowledge and belief, but who shall not be concerned in examining the body anatomically, and in case of such removal such certificate shall be delivered, together with the body, to the person receiving the same for anatomical examination, and every person so receiving a body for anatomical examination after removal shall demand and receive, together with the body, a certificate as aforesaid, and shall within twenty-four hours next after such removal transmit to the inspector of the district such certificate, and also a return, stating at what day and hour and from whom the body was received, the

date and place of death, the sex and (as far as is known at the time) the christian and surname, age, and last place of abode of such person, or if no such inspector have been appointed, to the legally qualified Medical Practitioner or Stipendiary Magistrate residing nearest to the place to which the body is removed, and shall enter or cause to be entered the aforesaid particulars relating thereto, and a copy of the certificate he received therewith in a book to be kept by him for that purpose, and shall produce such book whenever required so to do by any inspector so appointed as aforesaid.

Anatomical Examinations to be carried on at places Licensed.—It shall not be lawful for any person to receive or possess for anatomical examination or examine anatomically any body except at such places as are authorised for that purpose under this Act.

How Bodies are to be removed for Examination.—Every body removed for the purpose of examination shall, before such removal, be placed in a decent coffin or shell and be removed therein, and the person causing the same to be removed shall make provision that such body, after undergoing anatomical examination, be decently interred in consecrated ground, or in some public burial ground in use for persons of that religious persuasion to which the person whose body was so removed belonged, and that a certificate of the interment of such body shall be transmitted to the inspector of the district within ten weeks after the day on which such body was received.

Post-mortem Examination not Prohibited.—Nothing in this Act contained shall prohibit any *post-mortem* examination of any body required or directed to be made by any competent legal authority,

Offences.—Any person offending against the provisions of this Act shall be punished by imprisonment for a term not exceeding three months, or by a fine not exceeding fifty pounds.

REGISTRATION OF DEATHS (1855).

(19 Vic., No. 34.)

Householder to give Notice of Death.—In each case of the death of any person, the tenant of the house or place shall, within thirty days next thereafter, inform the District Registrar of such death, and of all particulars required to be registered. (The term "tenant" means the householder or principal occupant of any house, building, hut, farm, store, or other establishment in which a death may occur; in squatting districts the lessee or licensed occupant of a run, or his superintendent should give the information.)

Penalty.—Every person who shall refuse or neglect to give the required information shall forfeit a sum not exceeding ten pounds.

[N.B.—A Medical Certificate is not required.]

ADULTERATION OF FOOD ACT (1879).

(42 Vic., No. 14.)

Mixing Drugs or Articles with Injurious Ingredients.—Every person who shall for purposes of sale mix any ingredient or material with any article of food, drug, or drink, or shall colour any such article, so as to render such article injurious to health, or to affect injuriously the quality or potency of such drug, or who shall sell any drug or article of food or drink mixed with any such ingredients or material so coloured, shall for the first offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds, and in case of any subsequent offence shall be liable to imprisonment, with or without hard labour, for a term not exceeding six months.

Mixing or Selling Drugs or Articles.—Every person who shall, for purposes of sale, mix any ingredients or material with any drug or article of food or drink, in order thereby fraudulently to increase its weight, bulk, or measure, or to conceal its inferior quality; or who shall, to the prejudice of the purchaser, sell any drug or article of food or drink mixed with any ingredient or material whereby the weight, bulk, or measure of such drug or article has been increased, or its inferior quality concealed, or who shall, to the prejudice of the purchaser, sell any drug or article of food or drink which is not of the nature, substance, or quality of the drug or article demanded by such purchaser, or any compounded drug, or compound article of food, which is not composed of ingredients in accordance with the demand of the purchaser, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds, and for any subsequent offence to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

Exemption from Penalties.—No person shall be convicted if he shall show to the satisfaction of the Justices that he did not know the drug or article in question to have been thus mixed; or if he shall show that at the time of selling such drug or article he distinctly apprised the purchaser that it was mixed; or shall show that the added ingredient or material (not being injurious to health) was added not for any fraudulent purpose, but solely for the production or necessary preparation of the drug or article as an article of commerce, or was unavoidably mixed with it in the process of preparation; or that such drug or article was a patented or proprietary medicine, and sold as such.

Expense of Analysing Articles.—Where the prosecutor in any case under this Act shall have caused the drug, liquor, or article, forming the subject of prosecution to be analysed by any competent analyst, the reasonable expense of and attending such analysis to be assessed by the justices may, in case of a conviction, be awarded against the defendant as part of the costs of the prosecution; provided that before the making of such analysis the person prosecuted shall have had reasonable notice of the time and place of the intended production of the drug, liquor, or article to the analyst for examination, with the name of such analyst, and shall have been allowed to attend on such production.

SALE AND USE OF POISONS ACT (1876).

(40 Vic., No. 9.)

Regulations for the Sale of Poisons.—Every person who shall sell any of the following poisons, viz.:—Part I., Arsenic, Prussic Acid, Strychnine, Savin and its Oil, Ergot of Rye and its preparations, Chloral Hydrate, and Laudanum. Part II., Cyanides of Potassium and all metallic Cyanides, all poisonous vegetable Alkaloids and their Salts, Aconite and its preparations, Tartar Emetic, Corrosive Sublimate, Cantharides, Oxalic Acid, Chloroform, Belladonna and its preparations, Opium and all preparations of Opium or of Poppies other than Laudanum, Arsenical preparations except Green and other coloured Paints shall, before delivery thereof to the purchaser, inquire his name, place of abode, and occupation, and the purpose for which such poison is required, and shall thereupon make an entry of such sale, specifying the poison and the quantity thereof, and all such particulars so given by the purchaser together with the date in a book to be kept by the vendor for that purpose, and every such entry shall be signed by the person making the same, and also by the purchaser, unless he shall declare himself unable to write (in which case the person making the entry shall add thereto the words "Purchaser cannot write") and whenever a witness to the sale is required by this Act, such entry shall be signed by such witness, together with his place of abode. In cases where sales and purchases of poisons are made by correspondence, the letter ordering the same shall be preserved by the vendor, and a memorandum of the date of the said letter, by whom it was written, and the quantity and particulars of the poison therein ordered shall be entered in the said book, and no person shall sell poison so ordered to any person with whose signature he is not acquainted unless such signature shall have been witnessed by a Justice, clergyman, or public officer, or be authenticated by some person known to the vendor. And no person shall sell any of these poisons to any person under eighteen years of age, or who is unknown to the vendor, unless the sale be made in the presence of some witness who is known to the vendor, and to whom the purchaser is known, and which witness signs his name together with his place of abode to the required entry before the delivery of the poison to the purchaser. And it shall not be lawful to buy or sell any poison for the purpose of destroying rats or other vermin infesting houses, unless the purchaser be a householder. Every bottle or other vessel, wrapper, cover, box, or case immediately containing the poison sold, either by wholesale or retail, must bear thereon the word "Poison" printed conspicuously, together with the name of the article and the name and address of the seller thereof.

Arsenic and Strychnine must be coloured.—No person shall sell any arsenic or strychnine or any preparation of the same, unless in the case of arsenic and any uncoloured preparation of the same, such poison shall be mixed before delivery thereof with soot or indigo in the proportion of one ounce of soot or half an ounce of indigo at the least, to one pound of arsenic, and so in proportion for any greater or less quantity. And in the case of strychnine or any uncoloured preparation of the same, such poison shall be covered with Armenian bole or other red colouring matter

before delivery thereof, provided always that whenever the purchaser states that such arsenic or strychnine or any preparation thereof is required not for any pastoral or agricultural use, but for some other purpose for which such admixture would according to the representation of the purchaser render it unfit, such poison may be sold without the admixture hereinbefore specified.

Penalties.—Every person offending against any of these regulations shall for every such offence, upon summary conviction before two Justices, be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

Medicines and wholesale transactions excepted.—This Act shall not extend to the sale of any poison when made up as a medicine according to the prescription of a medical Practitioner, or in the form of homœopathic medicine unless in the crude state, mother tincture, or of a greater strength than the third potency. Nor to the sale of patent medicines or of photographic materials for the purpose of photography, nor to the sale of medicine dispensed by veterinary surgeons for animals under their treatment, nor to the sale of fly-poison papers or packets of poisonous mixtures for the destruction of vermin when duly marked as such; nor shall it extend to any sales by wholesale dealers, in the ordinary course of wholesale dealing, if an order in writing signed by the purchaser shall be given for the supply of the same, provided that all such sales be entered in a book and the packages of poison be labelled as required.

Board of Pharmacy.—The Governor with the advice of the Executive Council may appoint, for the purposes of this Act, a Board of Pharmacy, to consist of the President of the New South Wales Medical Board, the Medical Adviser to the Government, and the Council of the Pharmaceutical Society of New South Wales.

Unqualified persons not allowed to sell Poisons.—No person shall sell any poison unless he shall have received a certificate from the said Board that he is duly qualified to be a dealer in poisons, and any person so selling without such certificate shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

Certificate of Qualification.—No person shall receive such certificate unless he shall prove to the satisfaction of the said Board that he has been duly admitted a Pharmaceutical Chemist by the Pharmaceutical Society of Great Britain, or a Member or Licentiate of the Apothecaries Halls of London or Dublin—Or has received a certificate as a legally qualified Medical Practitioner—Or is entitled to be certified as such under the authority of the Acts passed in the second, ninth, and nineteenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty and numbered respectively twenty-two, twelve, and seventeen—Or unless he be a person who shall at the time of the passing of this Act be carrying on business as a chemist and druggist in New South Wales—Or unless he shall make a declaration, accompanied by a certificate, that he has served as an apprentice or assistant to a chemist and druggist for not less than three years, and during that period been actually engaged in the dispensing and compounding of medical prescriptions, and been examined as to his skill and competency to conduct the business of chemist and druggist. Provided always that in places remote from large towns any person who shall produce a certificate from a legally qualified Medical Practitioner and a Police Magistrate that he is a fit and proper person to be allowed to sell poisons in such place, shall receive a certificate as a "dealer in poison." Such persons shall be entitled to be registered upon paying a fee of one pound for such registration. However, any chemist and druggist claiming to be registered must send to the Secretary of the said Board (who shall also be the Registrar for the purposes of this Act) a claim in the prescribed form.

Penalty.—Any person selling any poison otherwise than is herein provided shall, upon summary conviction thereof, before any two Justices be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds, and for the purposes of this section the person on whose behalf any such sale is made by any apprentice or servant shall be deemed to be the seller, provided always that such apprentice or servant shall be liable to a like penalty.

Names to be erased from the Register.—The Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, may direct the name of any person, who is convicted of any offence against this act which in their opinion renders him unfit, or who shall be deemed by them unfit through habitual intoxication or otherwise to be on the register, to be erased from the same, and the Secretary and Registrar shall erase his name accordingly.

NEW ZEALAND.

THE MEDICAL PRACTITIONERS' REGISTRATION ACT, 1869.

(32 and 33 Vic., No. 51.)

Who may be Registered.—Every person possessed of any one or more of the following qualifications shall be entitled to be registered:—(a) Fellow, Member, Licentiate, or Extra Licentiate of the Royal College of Physicians, London, England. (b) Fellow, Member, or Licentiate, of the Royal College of Physicians of Edinburgh, Scotland. (c) Fellow or Licentiate of the King's and Queen's College of Physicians of Dublin, Ireland. (d) Fellow, or Member, or Licentiate in Midwifery of the Royal College of Surgeons of England. (e) Fellow, or Licentiate of the Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh, Scotland. (f) Fellow, or Licentiate of the Faculty of Physicians and Surgeons, Glasgow, Scotland. (g) Fellow, or Licentiate of the Royal College of Surgeons of Dublin, Ireland. (h) Licentiate of the Society of Apothecaries, London, England. (i) Licentiate of the Apothecaries' Hall, Dublin, Ireland. (k) Doctor or Bachelor, or Licentiate of Medicine, or Master in Surgery of any University of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or Doctor of Medicine by Doctorate granted prior to August 2, 1858, by the Archbishop of Canterbury. (l) A Medical Officer, duly qualified, of Her Majesty's Land or Sea Service. (m) Any person registered before passing of this Act. (n) Any person who has passed through a regular course of medical study of not less than three years' duration in a school of medicine or surgery, and has received, after due examination, from some university, college, or other body, a diploma, degree, or license other than those before specified, entitling him to practise medicine or surgery, whether within Her Majesty's dominions or not. (o) Any person who shall have been registered as a legally qualified Practitioner in England, Ireland, or Scotland, under any Act of the Imperial Parliament.

Notice of Application.—Any person desiring to be registered shall give notice of his intention to apply for that purpose to the Registrar-General, or Registrar in the towns of Auckland, New Plymouth, Napier, Nelson, Hokitika, Picton, Christchurch, Dunedin, and Invercargill, and shall state in such notice his residence, his qualification, and the date of his intended application, and that his diploma or other evidence of qualification is deposited for public inspection in the office of the Registrar-General or Registrar as the case may be, and shall affix to such notice his name in full.

Publication of Notice.—The diploma or other evidence of qualification shall be produced to the Registrar, and a copy thereof certified by a Justice of the Peace shall be deposited as stated in the notice, and such notice shall be published in a newspaper circulating near the place of the applicant's residence, at least one month before the date of his application, and in the *New Zealand Gazette*.

Registrar to Act Judicially.—The Registrar-General or Registrar may examine any person applying to be registered, and any opponent and any witness who may be produced by either party, and may require any statement to be made on oath, and for that purpose may administer oaths, and if satisfied that such applicant is qualified to be registered under this Act shall enter his name and other particulars in the Register, provided that the Registrar may, if he see fit, in any case abstain from entering the name of such applicant and the particulars of his qualifications until after he shall have transmitted a copy of the same, and the evidence, if any, taken by him thereon, to the Registrar-General and received his direction thereon.

Appeal from Registrar.—If any such applicant as aforesaid, or any person objecting and appearing before the Registrar-General or Registrar as aforesaid, shall be dissatisfied with the decision of the Registrar-General or Registrar, it shall be lawful for him respectively by motion in the Supreme Court to apply to such Court for an order to the Registrar-General or Registrar, and the Court may order that the person applying shall be registered, or that he shall be registered conditionally, or upon terms, or may decline to make such or any order, with or without costs.

Fees Payable.—The Registrar-General or Registrar shall receive the under-mentioned fees:—(a) On deposit of diploma or other evidence of qualification, 20s. (b) Certificate of Registration (which may be obtained on application), 5s. (c) Alteration of Qualification in Register, 10s. (d) Any other alteration of Register, 5s. (e) Inspection of Register, 2s.

Physicians may Sue.—Every registered person shall be entitled to sue in any court of law in New Zealand for the recovery of his fees or other remuneration for his professional services, whether medical or surgical.

Unregistered persons not to be entitled to receive Fees.—No person shall be entitled to recover any charge in any court of law in the Colony for any medical or surgical advice, or attendance, or for the performance of any operation, or for any medicine which he shall have both prescribed and supplied, unless he shall prove on the trial that he is registered.

No Unregistered person to hold Medical Appointment.—No person unless registered shall hold any appointment as a physician, surgeon, or other medical officer in any institution supported wholly or in part by public funds, for affording medical relief in sickness, infirmity, or old age, or as a medical officer of health, and no certificate required to be signed by any Medical Practitioner shall be valid, unless the person signing the same shall be registered, provided that nothing in this Act contained shall render invalid any such certificate from a duly appointed medical officer of any of Her Majesty's Land or Sea Forces in full pay, although such officer may not be registered under this Act.

Registered Persons may be Erased from Register.—If any person shall have procured himself to be registered by fraudulent representation or declaration either verbally or by writing, or if any person not entitled to be registered shall have been registered, or if any registered person shall be or shall have been convicted of any felony or misdemeanour in Great Britain or Ireland, or in any of the British Dominions, the Registrar-General and Registrar respectively shall erase the name of any such person from the Register, and such erasure shall be notified by the Registrar-General in the *New Zealand Gazette*.

Not to affect Chemists.—Nothing in this Act contained shall in any way affect chemists, druggists, and dentists.

Penalties.—Any person who shall wilfully and falsely pretend to be, or take or use the name or title of a physician, doctor of medicine, licentiate in medicine and surgery, bachelor of medicine, surgeon, general practitioner, or apothecary, or any name, title, addition, or description, implying that he is registered under this Act, or that he is recognised by law as a duly qualified Medical Practitioner, shall for every such offence pay a sum not exceeding fifty pounds. And any person who shall fraudulently or by false representations procure himself to be registered as a Medical Practitioner, or shall forge, alter, or counterfeit any such certificate, or shall utter or use any such forged, altered, or counterfeited certificate, knowing the same to have been forged, altered, or counterfeited, or shall falsely advertise or publish himself as having been registered as a Medical Practitioner, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanour, and be liable to imprisonment, with or without hard labour, for any term not exceeding three years.

THE LUNATICS' ACT (1882)

(46 Vic., No. 34.)

PROCEEDINGS TO RESTRAIN LUNATICS.

Lunatics at large.—In all cases in which any person shall be discovered and apprehended under circumstances denoting a derangement of mind, and a purpose of committing suicide or some crime for which he would be liable to be indicted, or if any person imprisoned or detained in any prison, or reformatory, or industrial school, or other place of confinement, shall appear to be a lunatic, or any person believed to be a lunatic, but who is not under proper care and control, or is cruelly treated or neglected, and who is a proper person to be taken charge of, in any such case a Resident Magistrate shall call to his assistance two Medical Practitioners to be selected by him, and shall examine such Practitioners and any other witness upon oath, and each of the Medical Practitioners upon whose evidence the Resident Magistrate shall make an order under this section, shall fill up and sign a certificate and statement in the undermentioned form, which certificate and statement shall be delivered along with the lunatic and a copy of the order to the superintendent of the asylum, manager of the hospital, or keeper of the licensed house, or occupier of the house, to whose custody the lunatic is committed.

MEDICAL CERTIFICATE.

Lunatic Prisoners.—The Colonial Secretary, if it be made to appear to him by any means, that there is any reasonable ground to think that any person in confinement is lunatic, and that removal to an asylum or hospital is necessary or desirable, may himself appoint two or more Medical Practitioners to inquire into the state of mind of such prisoner. And if on such inquiry the prisoner be found lunatic, the same shall be certified in writing by such Practitioners to the Colonial Secretary, according to the following form :—

Lunatics unfit to be removed.—If the medical practitioners by whom any lunatic person shall be examined certify in writing that he is not in a fit state to be removed, the removal of such person shall be suspended until the same or some other two Medical Practitioners certify in writing that such person is fit to be removed; and such Medical Practitioners are hereby required to give the required certificate as soon as in their judgment it ought to be given.

Payment of Medical Fees.—The Resident Magistrate causing any person to be examined by any medical practitioners may grant to them a certificate, and the Colonial Treasurer is to pay the amount mentioned in such certificate from the Consolidated Fund.

Persons not found Lunatic by Inquisition.—Where any person not found lunatic by inquisition is believed to be lunatic, any relative or friend of such person, or any householder, may give information on oath to a Resident Magistrate. Thereupon the Resident Magistrate may either examine such person at his abode or elsewhere, and if he shall think there is reasonable cause for further examination of the said person, he shall call to his assistance two Medical Practitioners, who shall examine the said person, both separately and jointly. And if on such medical examination both Medical Practitioners shall be of opinion that the said person is a lunatic, and requires detention in an asylum, hospital, or licensed house, they shall severally sign the usual certificate.

One Medical Certificate sufficient in Special Cases.—Any person not found lunatic by inquisition may, under special circumstances, previously to his examination by two Medical Practitioners, be received into an asylum, or licensed house on the order of a Resident Magistrate, on the certificate of one Medical Practitioner, provided that the statement accompanying the order set forth such special circumstances; and in every such case certificates by two other Medical Practitioners shall, after due examination of such person, be signed and delivered to the Superintendent of such asylum, within three clear days of the reception of such person.

Medical Certificates.—Every Medical Practitioner signing any certificate, shall specify therein the facts upon which he shall have formed his opinion that the person to whom such certificate relates is a lunatic, distinguishing in such certificate facts observed by himself from facts communicated to him by others, and stating the names and addresses of the persons who have communicated the facts. No person shall be received into any asylum, hospital, or licensed house under any such certificate which purports to be founded only upon facts communicated by others. Every certificate by a Medical Practitioner shall bear date of the day when it was signed, and his last examination of the lunatic took place; and no one shall be received into such asylum, or licensed house under an order more than seven days after the date of the certificate delivered along with the order to the superintendent of such asylum.

Who not to Sign Medical Certificates.—No Medical Practitioner who, or whose father, brother, son, or partner, or assistant, shall apply under this Act for the reception of a patient into an asylum, or licensed house, shall sign any certificate for the reception of the same patient, and no Medical Practitioner who, or whose father, brother, son, or partner, or assistant, shall be an officer in or a medical officer of an asylum, or licensed house, or wholly or partly the proprietor, or the mortgagee or lessee, or an officer or a regular professional attendant in a licensed house, or who shall receive a percentage on, or otherwise be interested in, the payments to be made by or on account of any lunatic received into an asylum, hospital, or licensed house, shall make any application or sign a certificate for the reception of a lunatic into any asylum, or licensed house.

Who not to take care of Lunatics.—No Medical Practitioner shall, himself or by his servants or agents, receive to board or lodge in any licensed house, or take the charge or care of, any person upon or under any medical certificate signed by himself, or his father, brother, son, or partner, or assistant; and no Medical Practitioner, having signed any certificate for the reception of any person into a licensed house, shall be the regular professional attendant of such person while under care or charge under such certificate.

Statement of Previous Treatment.—Every Medical Practitioner signing any certificate under or for the purposes of this Act for the reception of a lunatic into an asylum, or licensed house, shall make and sign a statement in writing of the previous treatment of the lunatic to whom such certificate shall so relate, so far as the same shall be known to such practitioner; and such statement shall be delivered to the person receiving the lunatic into an asylum or licensed house.

Defective Certificates.—If, after the reception of any lunatic into any asylum, hospital, or licensed house, it appear that both or either of the medical certificates upon which he shall have been received is or are in any respect incorrect or defective, such medical certificates may be amended by and on the sole authority of the person or persons signing the same, at any time within twenty-one days next after the reception of such lunatic. Provided that no such amendment shall have any force or effect unless the same shall receive the sanction in writing of the Colonial Secretary. And if any such certificate shall be at any time deemed by the Inspector to be incorrect or defective, and the same shall not be amended to his satisfaction within twenty-one days after the receipt by the superintendent of such asylum or licensed house of a direction in writing from such Inspector requiring amendment of the same, such Inspector may, if he see fit, make an order for the patient's discharge.

HABITUAL DRUNKARDS.

Application for Detention.—Application may be made to a Judge of the Supreme Court for an order of detention by the following persons and in the following cases :—

1. By the habitual drunkard himself declaring that he is willing to submit to curative treatment under the order of the Court ; or
2. By the parent, husband, wife, child, or friend of such habitual drunkard, in cases—(a.) Where such person is suffering or has been recently suffering from delirium tremens or other dangerous physical effects of habitual drunkenness ; or (b.) Where such person, through habitual drunkenness, has recently been wasting his means, and been neglecting his business, or insufficiently providing for his family ; or a wife has been wasting the means of her husband ; or (c.) Where such person has recently, under the influence of drink, used or threatened violence towards himself or any member of his family.

Order for Detention.—On any such application in writing, stating the grounds upon which it is founded, to a Judge of the Supreme Court, such Judge may, after the expiration of twenty-four hours from the service of a notice thereof on such habitual drunkard, when he himself is not the applicant, on hearing the evidence of not less than two Medical Practitioners, and of such other persons as he may think fit, make an order in writing, under his hand, for the detention of any such habitual drunkard, in any asylum or place authorized by this Act for the detention of lunatics, but in a ward or division thereof in which lunatics are not detained, or in any place specially appointed for the purpose, by order of the Colonial Secretary, for curative treatment for a period not exceeding twelve months, which order, till rescinded, shall be a sufficient authority to all persons acting under it.

Leave of Absence.—The Medical Officer of such asylum or place may, for probationary purposes, grant to any person detained under such an order, leave of absence in writing under his hand, for a certain period to be specified therein.

LICENSED HOUSES FOR THE RECEPTION OF LUNATICS.

Medical Attendance.—Every licensed house containing 50 or less lunatics shall be visited three times a week by a Medical Practitioner ; and every such house containing over 50, and not more than 100 lunatics, shall be visited daily by a Medical Practitioner ; and every such house containing more than 100 lunatics shall have at all times a Medical Practitioner, who shall not be the licensee or proprietor thereof, resident therein, who shall be the keeper thereof. No license shall be of any validity unless the keeper of the house licensed shall reside therein, or the house be visited by a Medical Practitioner as before mentioned.

VISITATION OF LUNATIC ASYLUMS AND LICENSED HOUSES.

Appointment of Inspectors.—The Governor may appoint Inspectors, or an Inspector of asylums, hospitals, and licensed houses, for the colony, and also Deputy-Inspectors. And no such Inspector shall, during the continuance of his office, himself carry on in New Zealand, or be the partner or assistant of any person carrying on in New Zealand the profession or business of a physician, surgeon, or apothecary. And any Inspector who shall violate this enactment shall be guilty of a misdemeanour.

Official Visitors.—The Governor also may appoint one or more official visitors of particular asylums, hospitals, and licensed houses in New Zealand, all of whom shall be Justices of the Peace.

Quarterly Visitations.—Every asylum, hospital, and licensed house or private house in which a lunatic is detained shall, without any previous notice, as often as an Inspector or an official visitor thinks fit, and at least once in every three months, be visited by an Inspector and an official visitor respectively.

PENALTIES.

Medical Men Signing False Certificates.—Any Medical Practitioner who shall falsely state or certify anything in any certificate or statement under this Act, and any person who shall sign any certificate under this Act in which he shall describe himself as a Medical Practitioner, not being such within the meaning hereinbefore defined, shall be guilty of a misdemeanour.

Penalty for otherwise Contravening Act.—Any Medical Practitioner who shall sign any certificate or do any other act, not hereby declared to be a misdemeanour, contrary to any of the provisions herein contained, shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds, or, at the discretion of the convicting Justices, to imprisonment not exceeding six months.

Penalties and their Recovery.—Every act or omission declared by this Act to be a misdemeanour, but not made liable to a specified punishment, shall be punishable by a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds, or imprisonment not exceeding twelve months.

THE PUBLIC HEALTH ACT (1876).

(40 Vic., No. 60.)

WITH AMENDMENTS (1877, 1881, 1882 and 1884).

(41 Vic., No. 23 ; 45 Vic., No. 30 ; 46 Vic., No. 22 : 48 Vic., No. 12.)

Central Board of Health.—The Governor may appoint any number of persons, not more than 7, nor fewer than 4, to be called "The Central Board of Health," and the Governor may at his pleasure, remove all or any of the persons so appointed, and appoint others in their place. The Colonial Secretary for the time being shall be the President of the Board. The powers and duties vested in the Central Board may be exercised and executed by the President, together with any three other members present at a meeting. At all meetings of the Central Board the President, if present, shall preside, and, if he be not present, the members present shall elect a President. The President shall have a vote, and in case of equality a casting vote. During any vacancy in the Central Board, the continuing members, not being fewer than four, may act as if no vacancy had occurred. The place and time of meetings of the Central Board shall be fixed by the Board.

Local Boards of Health.—The Local Boards of Health shall include the City or Borough Council, Town Board, Board of Wardens, or Commissioners, or other like body, howsoever denominated, of every city, town, and borough, and the Council, Road Board, Board of Wardens, Commissioners, or Trustees of every road district, or highway district, or other like body, and where there shall be no Local Board, then the Central Board may appoint such and so many persons (not less than three) as it may think fit, to form a Local Board ; and all the powers and duties vested in any Local Board may be exercised and executed by a majority of the members thereof.

Medical Officer.—Each Local Board of Health may, if it thinks fit, appoint a fit and proper person, being a legally qualified Medical Practitioner, to be called "The Medical Officer," who shall be removable by the said Local Board, and shall perform such duties and in such manner as the Central Board of Health may direct. The Local Board may direct such remuneration to be paid to such officer as it may see fit.

PROVISIONS AGAINST INFECTION.

Prevention of Epidemic Diseases.—Whenever any part of New Zealand appears to be threatened with or is affected by any formidable epidemic, endemic, or infectious disease, the Central Board may make regulations for all or any of the following purposes, namely :—(1.) For the speedy interment of the dead ; and (2.) For house to house visitation ; and (3) For the provision of medical aid and accommodation, for the promotion of cleansing, ventilation, and disinfection, and for guarding against the spread of disease.

The Governor in Council may from time to time, by Proclamation in the *Gazette*, declare that certain diseases are deemed to be infectious within the meaning of this Act, and upon the publication of any such Proclamation the diseases mentioned therein shall be deemed to be infectious accordingly.

Power of Entry.—The Local Board and its officers shall have power of entry on any premises for the purpose of executing or superintending the execution of any regulations so issued by the Central Board as aforesaid.

Premises to be Cleaned and Disinfected.—Where any Local Board is of opinion, on the certificate of its Medical Officer, or of any other legally qualified Medical Practitioner, that the cleansing and disinfecting of any house or part thereof, and of any articles therein likely to retain infection, would tend to prevent or check infectious disease, it shall be the duty of such Board to give notice in writing to the owner or occupier of such house or part thereof, requiring him to cleanse and disinfect such house or part thereof and articles, within a time specified in such notice.

Notice of Infectious Disease.—When a householder knows that a person within the house occupied by him is taken sick of small-pox, cholera, or any other highly infectious disease dangerous to the people, he shall immediately give notice thereof to the Local Board of the district in which he dwells. If he refuses or neglects to give such notice, he shall forfeit a sum not exceeding ten pounds.

It shall be the duty of the Medical Practitioner in attendance on such case to state to the householder, as early as possible, the infectious nature of such disease, and also to give immediate notice thereof to the Local Board of the district in which the patient resides; if he refuses or neglects to give such notice he shall forfeit a sum not exceeding ten pounds: Provided that any Medical Practitioner so giving notice as above required shall be entitled to receive from such Local Board the sum of two shillings and six pence in respect of each case of which notice shall be given: Provided also that a Medical Practitioner shall not be entitled to payment in respect of more than three cases of the same disease reported from the same house during the course of one month.

Removal of Infected Persons.—Where any suitable hospital or place for the reception of the sick is provided within the district of a Local Board, or within a convenient distance of such district, any person who is suffering from any dangerous infectious disorder, and is without proper lodging or accommodation, or lodged in a room occupied by more than one family, or is on board any ship or vessel, may, on a certificate signed by a legally qualified Medical Practitioner, and with the consent of the superintending body of such hospital or place, be removed, by order of any Resident Magistrate, to such hospital or place at the cost of the Local Board.

Penalty on Letting Infected Houses.—Any person who knowingly lets for hire any house, room, or part of a house, in which any person has been suffering from any dangerous infectious disorder, without having such house, room, or part of a house, and all articles therein liable to retain infection, disinfected to the satisfaction of a legally-qualified Medical Practitioner, as testified by a certificate signed by him, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

Removal of Dead Body to Mortuary.—Where the body of one who has died of any infectious disease is retained in a room in which persons live or sleep, or any dead body which is in such a state as to endanger the health of the inmates of the same house, any Justice may, on a certificate signed by a legally-qualified Medical Practitioner, order the body to be removed, at the cost of the Local Board, to any mortuary provided by such Board, and direct the same to be buried within a time to be limited in such order.

UNWHOLESOME FOOD.

Medical Officer to Inspect Meat, &c.—If any animal, carcase, meat, poultry, game, flesh, fish, fruit, vegetables, corn, bread, flour, or milk exposed for sale and intended for the food of man, appears to the inspecting Medical Officer who may inspect and examine any such food at all reasonable times, to be diseased, or unsound, or unwholesome, or unfit for the food of man, he may seize the same in order to have the same dealt with by a Resident Magistrate's Court.

Penalty for hindering Officer from inspecting Meat.—Any person, who in any manner prevents any Medical Officer from entering any premises and inspecting any article intended for the food of man, or who obstructs or impedes any such Medical Officer when carrying into execution the provisions of this Act, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds, and on complaint made on oath by a Medical Officer, or other officer of a Local Board, any Resident Magistrate may grant a warrant to any such officer to enter any building, or part of a building in which such officer has reason for believing that there is kept or concealed any article intended for sale for the food of man, and is diseased, unsound, or unwholesome, or unfit for the food of man; and to search for and seize any such article, in order to have the same dealt with by a Resident Magistrate.

PORT HEALTH OFFICERS.

Health Officer for each Port.—The Governor may, from time to time, appoint, for each port in New Zealand, a Health Officer, and may at any time remove such officer and appoint another in his place.

Health Officer to take Answer on Oath.—In all cases, wherein by virtue of this Act, any answer shall be taken or made upon oath, the Health Officer who shall take such answers shall be deemed to have full power to administer such oaths.

Inspection of Ship.—The master of any vessel shall permit the Health Officer, either alone or together with any Medical Practitioner accompanying him, to inspect any part of the vessel, and all or any of the passengers or crew of such vessel. And if it shall appear to the Health Officer that such vessel is not liable to perform quarantine, he shall give to the master of such vessel a clean bill of health. But if it appears that such vessel has arrived from any place notified by the Governor as being infected, or if the Health Officer shall apprehend any danger to the public health from the immediate admission of such vessel to entry, by reason of there then being, or of

there having been during the voyage, any infectious or contagious disease on such vessel, or of such vessel having touched at any place where any such disease shall have prevailed, or having communicated with any other vessel on board which any such disease may have existed, such vessel shall be liable to perform quarantine, and the Health Officer shall immediately notify the same to the master or other person in charge as aforesaid, under a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds for any neglect therein.

Health Officer may visit Vessel during Quarantine.—During the period any vessel may be in quarantine, the Superintendent of Quarantine or the Health Officer may visit her alongside from time to time, and institute such regulations and give such orders and directions as the nature of the case may demand.

VACCINATION.

Supply of Lymph.—The Colonial Secretary shall at all times cause to be kept an adequate supply of pure vaccine lymph, for the purpose of furnishing on application and without payment to Public Vaccinators, and to legally qualified Medical Practitioners, such reasonable quantities of lymph as may be required.

Vaccination Districts.—The Governor may from time to time divide New Zealand into convenient districts for affording increased facilities for vaccination, and shall appoint a convenient place or places in each such district for the performance of vaccination, and shall take the most effectual means for giving to all persons (not already successfully vaccinated) resident within such district, due notice of the days and hours at which a Public Vaccinator will attend at such place.

Public Vaccinators.—The Governor may appoint for each district one or more Public Vaccinators, and also one or more Vaccination Inspectors to enforce in such district the provisions of this Act.

Remuneration to Vaccinators.—Every Public Vaccinator and Vaccination Inspector shall be paid such annual salary or fees as the Governor shall appoint. Where any public Vaccinator is paid by fees, the fees for each successful vaccination shall, if the vaccination be performed at the residence or place of business of such Vaccinator or elsewhere, and not at a duly appointed vaccination station, not exceed the sum of two shillings and sixpence. If such vaccination be performed at a duly appointed station other than such place of residence or business, then such fee shall not exceed two shillings and sixpence, together with one shilling for every mile or part of a mile of the distance at which such station is from such place of residence or business.

Gratuitous Vaccination.—The Governor may from time to time issue regulations providing for the vaccination and re-vaccination of persons gratuitously by Public Vaccinators, and Public Vaccinators shall be paid in respect of such vaccination or re-vaccination such fees as the Governor shall from time to time fix, not exceeding those fixed for primary vaccination.

Persons Vaccinated without Charge to return for Inspection.—Where the operation of vaccinating or re-vaccinating any person is performed by the Public Vaccinator without charge to such person, the Public Vaccinator shall deliver to such person a notice requiring him to attend at the same place on the same day in the following week, in order that he may be inspected and the result of the operation ascertained, and stating that in default he will be liable to pay a fee of five shillings; and the Public Vaccinator, if required, shall deliver to the person vaccinated or re-vaccinated a certificate of the result of the operation of vaccination or re-vaccination.

Inmates of Reformatories to be Vaccinated.—The masters or other persons in charge of reformatories and industrial schools, lunatic asylums and other places where the poor or sick are received, and keepers or gaolers of prisons, shall, at the expense of their respective establishments or institutions, cause all inmates thereof to be vaccinated immediately upon their entrance thereto, unless they produce sufficient evidence of previous successful vaccination within five years, if such vaccination shall not in the opinion of a duly qualified medical man be attended with danger to such person. And provided also that the obligation to be vaccinated or re-vaccinated under this clause shall not apply to lunatic asylums or hospitals in any case in which the medical officer of the institution shall consider it inexpedient.

Qualifications for Public Vaccinator.—Any person who shall be a legally qualified Medical Practitioner shall be qualified to be appointed a Public Vaccinator. And the Governor may from time to time appoint for each district constituted under this Act, or for several of such districts of the colony, a Medical Practitioner to be a Certifying Officer for the purposes hereinafter mentioned; and any person not being a legally qualified Medical Practitioner, and whether such person shall hold any degree

or diploma in medicine or surgery or not, whom any such Certifying Officer shall certify to be a competent and proper person to be appointed a Public Vaccinator, shall be deemed qualified to be so appointed. And for such certificate there shall, on the appointment of any person so certified to be a Public Vaccinator, be paid, out of the moneys to be appropriated for the purposes of this Act by the General Assembly, such fee not exceeding three pounds as the Governor shall from time to time determine.

Children to be Vaccinated within six months of Birth.—Every child born in New Zealand shall, within six calendar months after birth, be taken to the Public Vaccinator for the district, for the purpose of being vaccinated, and the Public Vaccinator to whom such child shall be brought shall vaccinate such child without fee or reward other than such salary or fees appointed by the Governor.

Success of Vaccination.—Upon the same day in the following week, when the operation shall have been performed by the Public Vaccinator, and between the hours of eleven o'clock before noon and three o'clock in the afternoon, the parent or other person shall again take the child to the Public Vaccinator by whom the operation was performed, in order that such Public Vaccinator may ascertain by inspection the result of such operation, and if he sees fit take from such child lymph for the performance of other vaccinations; and in the event of the vaccination being unsuccessful, such parent or other person shall, if the Public Vaccinator so direct, cause the child to be forthwith again vaccinated and subsequently inspected as on the previous occasion.

Not fit to be Vaccinated.—If any Public Vaccinator or Medical Practitioner shall be of opinion that the child is not in a fit or proper state to be successfully vaccinated, he shall give to the parent or other person having the custody of such child a certificate under his hand, in the following form:—

I, the undersigned, hereby certify that I am of opinion that _____, the child of _____ of _____, in the _____ of _____, in the _____ of _____, aged _____ is not now in a fit and proper state to be successfully vaccinated. I, do hereby postpone the vaccination until the _____ day of _____ (a).

Memo.—This is to be kept by the parent or other person to whom it is given,
(a) This must not exceed two calendar months from the date of the certificate.

Such certificate shall be renewable for successive periods of two months, until a Public Vaccinator or Medical Practitioner shall deem the child to be in a fit state for successful vaccination.

Insusceptible of Vaccination.—If any Public Vaccinator or Medical Practitioner shall be of opinion that any child whom he has three times unsuccessfully vaccinated is insusceptible of successful vaccination, or that a child brought to him for vaccination has already had the small-pox, he shall deliver to the parent of such child a certificate, under his hand according to the following form, and the parent shall thenceforth not be required to cause the child to be vaccinated:—

Memo.—This is to be kept by the parent or other person to whom it is given.

Duplicate of Certificate to be forwarded by Public Vaccinator.—A duplicate of every certificate of a child being unfit for or insusceptible of successful vaccination shall, within twenty-one days after the examination of the child upon which such certificate is founded, be transmitted by the Vaccinator to the Vaccination Inspector of the district within which such child resides.

Certificate of Successful Vaccination.—Every Public Vaccinator who shall have performed the operation of vaccination upon any child, and have ascertained

that the same is successful, shall, within twenty-one days after the performance of the operation, transmit by post or otherwise a certificate under his hand, according to the undermentioned form, or the like effect, certifying that the said child has been successfully vaccinated, to the Vaccination Inspector or Registrar of the district within which the operation has been performed, and shall deliver a duplicate thereof to the parent or other person aforesaid :—

Medical Practitioner (*i.e.* M.D., L.A.H., or F.R.C.S. or otherwise as the case may be).

*When the vaccination is performed by a Medical Practitioner not the Public Vaccinator for the district, he is to fill up and sign the certificate, and the parent is within the same time to transmit it to the Vaccination Inspector of the district in which the operation was performed.

Vaccination Inspector to Register Vaccination.—The Vaccination Inspector of every district shall keep a book in which he shall register the certificates transmitted to him under this Act.

Searches and Copies.—Every Registrar and Vaccination Inspector shall at all reasonable times allow searches to be made in his register, and upon demand give a copy, certified under his hand, of any entry in the same, on payment of a fee of sixpence for each search and threepence for each copy of an entry. But no fee shall be charged for any search made by a Public Vaccinator or Vaccination Inspector appointed under the Act in the course of his official duty.

Penalty for neglecting to transmit Certificate.—Every Public Vaccinator, Medical Practitioner, or other person, as the case may be, who shall neglect to transmit any certificate or duplicate of a certificate required by this Act to be by him transmitted, completely filled up and legible written to the Vaccination Inspector within the time herein specified, and every Public Vaccinator and Medical Practitioner who shall refuse to deliver on request to the parent or other person as aforesaid any certificate or duplicate of a certificate, shall be liable to pay a penalty not exceeding forty shillings.

False Certificates.—Every person who shall wilfully sign a false certificate or duplicate under this Act shall be guilty of a misdemeanour, and shall be liable on conviction thereof to pay a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds, or to be imprisoned for any term not exceeding six months.

Penalty on persons inoculating with Small-pox.—Any person who shall produce or attempt to produce in any person, by inoculating with variolous matter, or by any other means whatever, the disease of small-pox, or any person who shall use vaccine lymph not produced or formed in the manner defined in this Act, shall be guilty of an offence, and upon conviction pay a penalty not exceeding ten pounds or to be imprisoned for any term not exceeding one month.

Public Vaccinators not to Charge Fees.—No fee or remuneration shall be demanded or received by the Public Vaccinator of or from the parent or other person for any such certificate as aforesaid given by him as Public Vaccinator, nor except such salary or fees appointed by the Governor for any vaccination or re-vaccination done by him within the district for which he is appointed, whether such vaccination or re-vaccination shall be done within or without his district.

Children in Public Schools to be Vaccinated.—Every child admitted to any school which shall be maintained in whole or in part by grant or from rates, or any public funds, or by any endowments, whether colonial, provincial, municipal, or district, shall be vaccinated by a Public Vaccinator, unless such child shall have been previously vaccinated. In the case of persons above the age of sixteen, the examination shall be conducted by a legally qualified Medical Practitioner, and the person, if necessary, be vaccinated by him.

THE ANATOMY ACT (1875).

(39 Vic., No., 42.)

Licenses to Practise Anatomy.—The Governor in Council may grant a license to practise anatomy to any legally qualified Medical Practitioner, who shall be engaged at a School of Anatomy as a teacher of medicine on application from any such person

for such purpose, countersigned by two Justices of the Peace, certifying to their knowledge or belief that such person so applying is about to carry on the practice of anatomy; and every person on obtaining such license as aforesaid shall pay the sum of five guineas to the Treasurer or Secretary of the School of Anatomy, where he intends to practice, and no other person shall receive or have in his possession for anatomical examination any dead human body.

Inspectors of Schools of Anatomy.—The Governor in Council may appoint one or more Inspectors for every School of Anatomy, who shall make a quarterly return to the Colonial Secretary of all bodies that during the preceding quarter have been removed for anatomical examination to every such School of Anatomy, or that may have been removed to any other place, distinguishing the sex, and as far as is known at the time, the name and age of each person whose body was so removed, and every such Inspector may visit and inspect at any time the School of Anatomy for which he is appointed Inspector.

Bodies for Anatomical Examination.—The surgeon of any hospital and the keeper of any lunatic asylum or gaol, may permit the body of any deceased person to undergo anatomical examination, unless such person shall have expressed his desire, at any time during his life, that his body after death might not undergo such examination; an anatomical examination may also be made of the body of any person who may direct, at any time during his life, either in writing or verbally, in the presence of two or more witnesses, that his body after death may be examined anatomically, provided in all cases that no relative of the deceased person shall require the body to be interred without such examination.

Removal of Bodies.—In no case shall the body of any person be removed for anatomical examination from any place where such person may have died until after thirty-six hours from the time of such person's decease, nor until after twenty-four hours' notice, to be reckoned from the time of such decease, to one of the Inspectors of the district, of the intended removal of the body, or, if no such Inspector has been appointed, to some legally qualified Medical Practitioner residing near the place of death, nor unless a certificate stating in what manner such person came by his death shall previously to the removal of the body have been signed by the legally qualified Medical Practitioner who attended such person during the illness whereof he died, or if no such practitioner attended such person during such illness, then by some legally qualified medical practitioner who shall be called in after the death of such person to view the body, and who shall state the manner or cause of death according to the best of his knowledge and belief, but who shall not be concerned in examining the body after removal, and that in case of such removal such certificate shall be delivered, together with the body, to the party receiving the same for anatomical examination.

Anatomical Examination to be carried out at places Licensed.—No party shall carry on or teach anatomy, receive or possess for anatomical examination, or examine anatomically any dead human body, except at such place as authorized for that purpose, but any person properly licensed, who shall obtain the permission of one of the Inspectors in writing for that purpose, and also the permission of the proper authorities of the school at which he is licensed to practice anatomy, may remove any body or portion of a body to such place as the Inspector shall seem fit.

Removal of Bodies for Examination.—Every body when removed for the purpose of examination shall before such removal be placed in a decent coffin or shell, and be removed therein, and the party removing the same or causing the same to be removed shall make provision that such body, after undergoing anatomical examination, be decently interred, and a certificate of the interment of such body shall be transmitted to the Inspector of the district within eight weeks after the day on which such body was received after such removal.

Post-mortem Examination not Prohibited.—Nothing in this Act contained shall prohibit any post-mortem examination of any body required or directed to be made by any competent legal authority.

Offences.—Any person offending against the provisions of this Act shall be punished by imprisonment for a term not exceeding three months, or by a fine not exceeding fifty pounds.

THE SALE OF POISONS ACT (1871).

Sellers of Poisons to be Registered.—Any person who wishes to sell or keep open shop for retailing, dispensing, or compounding poisons may be registered, without fee, on application to the Registrar under this Act, personally or by registered letter; but persons registered under the "Medical Practitioners' Registration Act, 1869," shall not be registered under this Act.

Restrictions on the Sale of Poisons.—Any persons who shall sell or keep an open shop for the retailing, dispensing or compounding poisons not being registered under this Act, or shall fail to conform with any regulation as to the keeping or selling of poisons, shall, for every such offence, be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds.

Poisons Defined.—The articles which are to be deemed poisons are divided into two classes :—Part I.—Arsenic and its preparations, including the compound sold for the destruction of vermin, known as "Rough on Rats." Prussic acid. Cyanide of Potassium, and all metallic cyanides. Strychnine, and all poisonous vegetable alkaloids and their salts. Aconite and its preparations. Emetic tartar. Corrosive sublimate. Cantharides. Savin and its oil. Ergot and its preparations. Laudanum. Opium. Digitalis. Part II.—Oxalic acid. Chloroform. Belladonna and its preparations. Essential oil of almonds, unless deprived of its prussic acid. All preparations of opium or of poppies. Preparations of corrosive sublimate. Preparations of morphine. Red oxide of mercury, commonly known as red precipitate of mercury. Ammoniated mercury, commonly known as white precipitate of mercury. Every compound containing any of the poisons mentioned in this Schedule, when prepared or sold for the destruction of vermin. The tincture and all vesicating liquid preparations of cantharides. Carbolic acid. Nitric acid. Sulphuric acid. Chloral. Chlorodyne.

Regulations for the Sale of Poisons.—It is unlawful to sell any poison unless the box, bottle, vessel, wrapper, or cover in which such poison is contained be distinctly labelled with the name of the article, and the word "Poison" in white letters on a red ground (such letters to be in block type of not less than a quarter of an inch in length and one-eighth of an inch in breadth), and with the name and address of the seller of the poison. It is also unlawful to sell any poison of those which are specified in the First Part to any person unknown to the seller, unless introduced by some person known to the seller, and on every sale of any such article the seller shall, before delivery, make or cause to be made an entry in a book to be kept for that purpose, stating the date of the sale, the name and address of the purchaser, the name and quantity of the article sold, and the purpose for which it is stated by the purchaser to be required, to which entry the signature of the purchaser and of the person, if any, who introduced him, shall be affixed. These provisions, however, do not apply to any medicine supplied by a legally qualified Medical Practitioner to his patient, nor to any article when forming part of the ingredients of any medicine dispensed by a person registered under this Act, provided such medicine be labelled with the word "Poison," with the name and address of the seller and the ingredients thereof be entered with the name of the person to whom it is sold or delivered, in a book to be kept by the seller for that purpose, nor to the sale of arsenic by wholesale dealers in quantities not less than one hundredweight.

Sale of Strychnine and Arsenic.—No person shall sell any strychnine or arsenic, unless such person shall, previous to making the entry required by this Act, obtain from the intending purchaser of such strychnine or arsenic a statutory declaration setting forth the particulars hereinafter mentioned. Immediately upon completion of the purchase the seller of such poison shall forward such statutory declaration to the Registrar of the district : Provided that this regulation shall not apply to the sale of arsenic wholesale for use in the cure of diseases in sheep. Every such declaration shall state precisely (1) the Christian name and surname of the intending purchaser at full length, together with his or her occupation and address ; (2) the exact quantity and name of the poison required ; and (3) the express purpose for which such poison is alone intended to be used, and the places or localities where the same is to be used or deposited respectively.

QUEENSLAND.

MEDICAL ACT (1867).

(31 Vic., No. 33.)

Medical Board.—The Governor in Council may appoint a committee consisting of not less than three persons, being legally qualified members of the medical profession, one of whom shall be nominated president, together with a secretary, under the style and description of "Queensland Medical Board," three members to form a

quorum, and any person desirous of being declared a legally qualified Medical Practitioner shall submit his degree, diploma, or other certificate or proof of his being so duly qualified, for the examination and approval of the said Medical Board, and on approval shall obtain from the said Medical Board a certificate of his being so qualified. The Medical Board shall also be the board for registering chemists and druggists under this Act.

Legally Qualified Medical Practitioners Defined.—Any person who shall prove to the satisfaction of the Medical Board that he has passed through a regular course of medical study of not less than three years duration, in a school or schools of medicine, and that he has received after due examination from some university, college, or other body duly recognised for that purpose, in the country to which such university, college, or other body may belong, a diploma, degree, or license, entitling him to practice medicine in that country or who is or has been a medical officer duly appointed and confirmed of Her Majesty's sea or land service, shall be deemed to be a legally qualified Medical Practitioner, and shall be entitled to registration, and to a certificate as such from the said Board. A person entitled to practice medicine shall mean any physician, doctor of medicine, bachelor of medicine, licentiate in medicine and surgery, surgeon, general practitioner or apothecary, who has obtained a diploma, degree, or license in the manner and of the character therein described.

Persons Registered under the Imperial Act.—Nothing herein contained shall prevent or restrain any person registered under the Imperial Act, "*To regulate the Qualification of Practitioners in Medicine and Surgery*" from practising according to his qualifications in medicine or surgery, in any part of the colony, or from demanding and recovering in any court of law, with full costs of suit, reasonable charges for professional aid, advice, and visits, and the costs of any medicines or other medical or surgical appliances, rendered or supplied by him to his patients, or be construed to affect the privileges of any persons so registered, provided that gentlemen registered under the said Imperial Medical Act, who wish to practice in this colony, shall present to the Medical Board a certificate of such registry, or send to said board such certificate authenticated by a declaration made before some magistrate for the colony, in whose petty sessions district such practitioner may reside, which declaration shall state that said declarant is duly qualified and is the person mentioned in the certificate thereto annexed, and any person making a false declaration shall be deemed guilty of perjury.

Chemists and Druggists.—No Chemist and Druggist shall obtain a certificate from the Medical Board of this colony, except upon the production of testimonials satisfactory to such board, and stating that he has been engaged for a period of not less than three years in learning pharmacy and chemical affinities, and that he is qualified to compound and dispense medicine, provided that this Act shall not prevent any person from selling un compounded drugs or patent medicines.

Registered Persons may Sue.—Every person registered under this Act shall be entitled according to his qualifications to practice medicine or surgery, or to compound and dispense medicine in any part of this colony, and to demand and recover in any court of law, with full costs of suit, reasonable charges for professional advice, aid, and visits, and the costs of any medicine, or other medical or surgical appliances supplied by him to his patients or customers. But no person shall be entitled to recover any charge in any court of law for any medical or surgical advice, attendance, or the performance of any operation, or for medicines compounded and sold, unless he shall prove that he is registered under this Act, and any person being so registered as aforesaid who shall practice, or act under any qualification other than that for which he has been registered, shall not be entitled to recover any charge made by him in respect thereof, and no person registered as a chemist and druggist only shall recover any charge as a Medical Practitioner.

Medical Certificates.—No certificate required by any Act from any Medical Practitioner shall be valid unless the person signing the same be registered.

Penalties.—This provision is the same as contained in the "*Medical Practitioners' Registration Act*," passed in N. S. Wales in 1855, (see page 5).

Fraudulent Registration.—If any person shall wilfully procure or attempt to procure himself to be registered under this Act by any false or fraudulent representation, or declaration, either verbally or in writing, every person so offending, and every person aiding and assisting him therein, shall be guilty of a misdemeanour, and on conviction be sentenced to be imprisoned for any term not exceeding twelve months.

Unregistered Practitioners.—Any person who shall wilfully and falsely pretend that he has been and is duly registered under the provisions of this Act as a Medical Practitioner, or who shall represent himself to be a Medical Practitioner, or use any title

or term which may be construed to mean that he is qualified to perform the duties, and at the same time practice, or compound and dispense medicine without being registered, or whom being registered as aforesaid shall practice, profess to practice, or act in any manner contrary to his registered qualifications, shall pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding twenty pounds.

MEDICAL WITNESSES.

The "Medical Witnesses Act" (1 Vic. No. 3) passed in New South Wales in 1838, is incorporated with the above Act, and therefore in full force in Queensland. (See page 4).

THE INSANITY ACT (1884).

(48 Vic., No. 8.)

DETENTION OF INSANE BY UNLICENSED PERSONS.

Examination of Patient in Private Houses.—If the occupier or inmate of any private house keeps or detains an insane person therein, although he is a relative of such occupier or inmate, beyond the period of a year after the malady has become apparent and confirmed, and such insane person during any part of such period has required coercion or restraint, such occupier or inmate, or the Medical Practitioner attending such insane person, shall notify such detention to the Minister and shall transmit to the Minister a written certificate signed by a Medical Practitioner setting forth the condition of the person so detained, and the reasons, if any, which render it desirable that such person should remain under private care. The Minister may thereupon, or without such notice, authorise the Inspector or Justice, accompanied by two Medical Practitioners, to visit and make such inquiry respecting the treatment of such person as to the Inspector or Justice and Medical Practitioners seems fit. And if upon such inquiry it appears that such person is insane, and has been so for a space exceeding a year, and that restraint or coercion of any kind has been resorted to, and that the circumstances are such as to render the removal of such person to an asylum necessary or expedient, the Minister may order the removal of such person accordingly.

Penalty for non-reporting Lunatic Patients.—Any person who, without notice to the Minister, keeps, harbours or conceals, or aids in keeping, harbouring, or concealing beyond the period aforesaid, an insane person, who has during such period been subjected to coercion or restraint, and any Medical Practitioner attending on him beyond such period who wilfully neglects to disclose the condition of such person to the Minister, shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding two hundred pounds, or to imprisonment for any period not exceeding three months.

PROCEEDINGS TO RESTRAIN LUNATICS.

Medical Certificate.—The Justices before whom any person suspected to be insane is brought, shall call to their assistance two Medical Practitioners, who shall, after having been furnished by the Justices with a written statement of all the information previously obtained with respect to the condition of such person,—1. Examine him apart from each other; and 2. Severally sign separate certificates with respect to him according to the following form:—

I, the undersigned, being a Medical Practitioner, hereby certify that I, on the _____ day of _____ one thousand eight hundred and _____, at (here insert the particulars of the place of examination, as the street, number of the house, or other particulars) separately from any other Medical Practitioner personally examined _____ of _____ (insert residence and profession or occupation if any), and that the said _____ is of unsound mind, and a proper person to be taken charge of and detained under care and treatment, and that I have formed this opinion upon the following grounds, viz.:—

1. Facts indicating insanity observed by myself (here state the facts).
2. Other facts (if any) indicating insanity communicated to me by others (here state the information and from whom).

Dated this _____ day of _____ one thousand eight hundred and _____

(Signed)

Place of abode

And if upon examination of such person and of the Medical Practitioners, and upon other proof (if any), the Justices are satisfied that he is insane,

and that such insane person requires to be taken charge of and detained under care and treatment, the Justices may, by order under their hands, with a statement of particulars attached thereto, direct such person to be removed into some asylum to be named in the order.

Patient's Removal may be Deferred.—If either of the Medical Practitioners certifies in writing that such person is not in a fit state to be removed, his removal shall be deferred until the same or some other Medical Practitioner certifies in writing that he is fit to be removed.

Payment of Fees to Medical Practitioners.—The Justices causing any person to be examined by Medical Practitioners may grant a certificate for the payment of such remuneration to such Medical Practitioners. Such expenses, where they cannot be obtained from the estate of the person examined, shall be defrayed out of moneys appropriated by Parliament for that purpose.

Patients to be Received into Asylum.—Any person may be received and detained as a patient in an asylum, on the authority of a request under the hand of some person; and every such request shall be—1. Authenticated by the signature of a Justice, or a minister of religion registered to celebrate marriages; 2, accompanied by a statement in writing containing the particulars specified in the fifth schedule to this Act; and 3, supported by two medical certificates as above; each of which certificates shall be signed by a Medical Practitioner who has, not more than fourteen days before the date of admittance, personally and separately examined the person to whom the certificate relates. (Such request may be signed before or after the date of the medical certificates.)

Medical Certificates to Specify Facts.—Every Medical Practitioner who signs any certificate for the purposes of this Act, shall specify therein the facts upon which he has formed his opinion that the person to whom such certificate relates is an insane person, and shall distinguish, in such certificate, facts observed by himself from facts communicated to him by others. No person shall be received into an asylum or reception house under any certificate which purports to be founded only upon facts communicated by others.

Who not to Sign Certificates, &c.—No Medical Practitioner whose father, brother, son, partner, or assistant, has signed the order or request, or one of the certificates, for the reception of any person as a patient into an asylum, shall sign any certificate for the reception of the same person; and no Medical Practitioner who, or whose father, brother, son, partner, or assistant, is the Medical Superintendent of an asylum, shall sign any order, request, or certificate for the reception of a person into such asylum.

No Certificate to be Granted without Examination.—If a Medical Practitioner signs any certificate for the purposes of this Act, without having seen and carefully examined the person to whom it relates, at the time and in the manner specified in such certificate, for the purpose of ascertaining the condition of such person to the best of his knowledge and ability, he shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds. If any practitioner wilfully and falsely certifies in writing that a person is insane, knowing him not to be insane, he shall be guilty of a misdemeanour.

Medical Certificates may be Amended.—If after the reception of an insane person as a patient into an asylum, it appears to the superintendent that any document, being one of the documents upon the authority of which he was received, is in any respect defective or incorrect, such document may be amended by the person who signed the same at any time within twenty-eight days next after the reception of the patient. Provided that every such amendment shall be approved by the Minister. If any such defective or incorrect document is directed by the Minister to be amended, it may be so amended by the person who signed the same at any time within twenty-eight days after the receipt by the superintendent of a direction in writing from the Minister requiring such amendment, and if it is not amended within that time the Minister may order the inspector to visit the patient to whom such document relates, and such inspector may order the patient's discharge.

Cases of Emergency.—In cases where it is impracticable to obtain the certificates of two Medical Practitioners, a person may be received into a reception-house upon the certificate of one Medical Practitioner alone, but in every such case one other such certificate, signed after such person was received into the reception-house, shall, before such person shall be received into an asylum, be produced to or lodged with the superintendent of such asylum.

Criminal Insane.—If a person indicted for an offence is found to be insane by a jury lawfully empannelled for that purpose, so that he cannot be tried upon such

indictment, or if upon the trial of a person so indicted such person is found by the jury to be insane, the Court may thereupon order him to be kept in strict custody. And whenever any person committed to take his trial for an offence is certified by two Medical Practitioners to be insane, the Minister may direct that such person be removed to and detained in an asylum until he is duly certified to be of sound mind; whereupon the Minister may order the removal of the patient to the custody of the governor of the gaol from whence he came, in order to his being tried for such offence.

Inspector's Visits.—The Inspector appointed by the Governor in Council, shall visit every asylum and reception-house at least once in every six months, with or without previous notice, and at such hour of the day or night as he thinks fit or the Minister directs.

Official Visitors.—The Governor in Council may appoint for every asylum and reception-house, two or more official visitors, one at least of whom shall be a Medical Practitioner and the other or others barristers-at-law, solicitors, or police magistrates, and one of whom shall visit the place to which they are appointed visitors once at least every month, and also at such times as the Minister directs, and with or without any previous notice, and at such hours of the day or night, and for such length of time as they think fit, and shall after every visit transmit to the Minister a statement of the number of patients admitted and discharged since the date of the last visit, and any other information they consider necessary.

Official Visitor not to Sign Certificate.—No official visitor shall sign a certificate for the admission of a patient to any asylum, reception-house, or other place for the reception of insane patients, of which he is an official visitor.

Discharge of Patients.—The Inspector or an official visitor of any asylum or reception-house may, with the advice in writing of the medical superintendent of the asylum or medical officer of the reception-house, as the case may be, order the discharge of any patient detained therein, whether he has recovered or not.

Allowance to Friends for Maintenance of Patients.—In cases where a relative or friend of a patient is willing to take care of him, but is unable owing to indigent circumstances to maintain him, the Minister may, on the recommendation of the Inspector or of an official visitor, grant an allowance for maintenance to the relative or friend of the patient delivered over to his care, and in such case the allowance for maintenance shall be paid once in every three months, upon the certificate of some Medical Practitioner in the following form:—

I, A.B., a Medical Practitioner, have this day examined (C.D.), residing at _____, and hereby certify that he is still insane, and that he appears to be kindly treated by the persons under whose care he is living.

(Signed)

(Address)

Dated this _____ day of _____ one thousand eight hundred and _____

If not properly cared for, Practitioner to Report to Inspector.—If it appears that the patient is not properly cared for by his relative or friend, or that his mental state is such as to render it advisable that he should be no longer entrusted to the care of such relative or friend, the Medical Practitioner shall report the facts to the Inspector, who shall make inquiry into the case, and may thereupon direct that the patient be returned to the asylum from which he was delivered over to his friends without any further certificate or statement.

MICELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

Misdemeanours.—Every person who, for the purposes of this Act—(a) Signs or describes himself, in any statement or certificate, as a Medical Practitioner, not being such within the meaning of this Act; or (b) Wilfully makes, or is privy to the making of an untrue entry in any book required by this Act to be kept; or (c) Wilfully makes an untrue statement in any report, or with reference to anything by this Act required to be made or done, shall be guilty of a misdemeanour.

THE HEALTH ACT (1884).

(48 Vic., No. 17.)

Central Board of Health.—The Governor in Council may from time to time appoint any number of fit and proper persons, not more than seven, to be called "The Central Board of Health." The Minister shall be *ex officio* a member and Chairman of the Board. He shall have a vote, and in case of equality of votes shall have a casting vote. Three members of the Board at the least shall be legally qualified Medical Practitioners.

Meetings.—The Board shall hold their meetings at such times and places as the Minister may appoint, and the powers and duties vested in the Board may be exercised and executed at such meetings by a majority of the members of the Board. In the absence of the Minister any other member of the Board may be chosen to preside, but he shall have only a casting vote.

Houses Unfit for Habitation.—Where, on the certificate of the Health Officer, it appears to a local authority that any house is unfit by reason of its filthy or dilapidated condition or improper construction to be used as a dwelling or otherwise occupied, the local authority may give notice in writing to the owner or occupier of such house to purify or repair or alter the same so as to render it fit for human habitation or occupation.

Houses to be Purified.—Where, on the certificate of the Health Officer or of any two Medical Practitioners, it appears to a local authority that any house or part thereof is in such a filthy or unwholesome condition that the health of any person is affected or endangered thereby, or that the whitewashing, cleansing, or purifying of any house or part thereof would tend to prevent or check infectious disease, the local authority shall give notice in writing to the owner or occupier of such house or part thereof to whitewash, cleanse, or purify the same, as the case may require.

Lodging Houses.—The keeper of a common lodging-house shall, at all times when required by any officer of the local authority, give him free access to such house or any part thereof; he also shall, when a person in such house is ill of fever or any infectious disease, give immediate notice thereof to the local Health Officer.

Unwholesome Food.—Any Health Officer or Inspector of Nuisances may at all reasonable times inspect and examine any animal, carcase, meat, poultry, game, flesh, fish, fruit, vegetables, corn, bread, flour, or milk, intended for the food of man; and if any such food appears to the Health Officer or Inspector to be unfit for the food of man, he may seize the same in order to have the same dealt with by two Justices.

Premises to be Cleansed and Disinfected.—Where a local authority is of opinion on the certificate of the Health Officer, or of any other legally qualified Practitioner, that the cleansing and disinfecting of any house or part thereof, within its district, or of any articles therein likely to retain infection, would tend to prevent or check infectious disease, it shall be the duty of such local authority to give notice in writing to the owner or occupier of such house or part thereof, requiring him to cleanse and disinfect such house or part thereof and articles within the time specified in such notice.

Removal of Infected Persons.—Where any suitable hospital or place for the reception of the sick is provided within the district of a local authority, or within a convenient distance of such district, then any person who is suffering from any dangerous infectious disorder, and is without proper lodging or accommodation, or lodged in a room occupied by more than one family, or is on board any ship or vessel, may, on a certificate signed by a legally qualified Medical Practitioner, and with the consent of the superintending body of such hospital or place, be removed by order of any Justice to such hospital or place at the cost of the local authority. Any order under this section may be addressed to an officer of police or to such officer of the local authority as the Justice or local authority making the same thinks expedient.

Prevention of Epidemic Diseases.—The Board may from time to time, with the approval of the Governor in Council, make regulations as to the treatment of persons affected with cholera or any epidemic, endemic, or infectious disease, and for preventing the spread of cholera and such other diseases as well on the seas, rivers, and waters of Queensland, and on the high seas within three miles of the coast thereof, as on land, and may declare by what person or authority such regulations shall be enforced and executed.

Power of Entry.—Local authorities and their officers shall have power of entry on any premises or vessel for the purpose of executing or superintending the execution of any Regulations or Orders so made by the Board as aforesaid.

Medical Officer entitled to Costs.—Whenever, in compliance with any Regulations so made by the Board, the Health Officer of a local authority performs any medical service on board any vessel, he shall be entitled to charge for such service at the general rate of his allowance for services for the place for which he is appointed; and such charge shall be payable by the captain of such vessel on behalf of the owners together with any reasonable expenses for the treatment of the sick. Where such services are rendered by any Medical Practitioner who is not a Health Officer, he shall be entitled to charges for any service rendered on board, with extra remuneration on account of distance, at the same rate as those which are usually paid by private patients of the class of those attended and treated on shipboard, to be paid as

aforesaid. In case of dispute in respect of such charges, the dispute may, where the charges do not exceed twenty pounds, be determined by a court of summary jurisdiction; and such court shall determine summarily the amount which is reasonable, according to the usual rate of charge at the place where the dispute arises, for attendance on patients of the like class as those in respect of whom the charge is made.

Health Officer.—A person shall not be appointed a Health Officer unless he is a legally qualified Medical Practitioner. The same person may be appointed Health Officer or Inspector of Nuisances for two or more districts. A Health Officer may exercise any powers of an Inspector of Nuisances under this Act. In case of illness or incapacity of the Health Officer, a local authority may appoint and pay a Deputy Health Officer.

Officers not to be Concerned in Contract.—Officers appointed by a local authority shall not be concerned or interested in any bargain or contract made with such local authority for any of the purposes of this Act. If any such officer or servant is so concerned or interested, or under colour of his office or employment, exacts or accepts any fee or reward whatsoever other than his proper salary, and allowances, he shall be incapable of afterwards holding or continuing in any office under this Act, and shall forfeit and pay the sum of fifty pounds, which may be recovered by any person, with full costs of suit, by action.

THE PREVENTION OF CONTAGIOUS DISEASES ACT (1868).

(31 Vic. No. 40.)

Visiting Surgeon.—The Governor shall appoint a medical officer for each of the towns, townships, or other places to which this Act applies, to be during pleasure Visiting Surgeon for the purposes of this Act.

Justice may order Medical Examination.—Upon an information or oath by an officer of police any Justice of the Peace may order that a female known to be a common prostitute be subjected to a medical examination by the Visiting Surgeon, to ascertain whether she is affected with a contagious disease, and such female may be at the discretion of the said Justice subjected to a periodical medical examination for any period not exceeding one year, and the order shall be a sufficient warrant for the Visiting Surgeon to conduct such examinations accordingly, and shall specify the time and place at which the female shall attend for the said examination.

Duties of Visiting Surgeon.—The Visiting Surgeon having regard to the regulations and to the circumstances of each case, shall at the first examination of each female examined by him, and afterwards from time to time as occasion requires, prescribe the times and places at which she is required again to attend for examination, and he shall from time to time give, or cause to be given to each such female, notice in writing of the times and places so prescribed.

Medical Certificate.—If on any such examination the female examined is found to be affected with a contagious disease, the Visiting Surgeon shall sign a certificate accordingly, naming the hospital in which she is to be placed, and he shall sign that certificate in duplicate, and shall cause one of the originals to be delivered to the female and one to the chief officer of police of the town, township, or other place in which the said female shall reside, and if any female, after the certificate has been delivered to her, shall neglect or refuse to proceed to the hospital named in that certificate, any constable, acting under the orders of the said chief officer of police, may apprehend and convey her to that hospital, and place her there for medical treatment, and the certificate of the Visiting Surgeon shall be sufficient authority for his so doing.

ADULTERATION OF FOOD ACT (1881 & 1882).

(45 Vic., No. 13, and 46 Vic., No. 15.)

Mixing of Drugs with Injurious Ingredients.—No person shall, except for the purpose of compounding, mix, colour, stain, or powder any drug with any ingredient or material, so as to affect injuriously the quality or potency of such drug, with intent that the same may be sold in that state, and no person shall sell any such drug under a penalty in each case not exceeding fifty pounds for the first offence, and for every subsequent offence shall be liable to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months, with hard labour.

Exemption from Penalties.—No person shall be liable to be convicted in respect of the sale of any article of food, or of any drug, if he shows to the satisfaction of the court that he did not know of the article of food or drug sold by him being so adulterated.

Sale of Articles of Food and of Drugs.—No person shall sell any article of food or any drug, which is not of the nature, substance, and quality of the article demanded by such purchaser, under a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds. Provided that an offence shall not be deemed to be committed in the following cases:—1. Where any matter or ingredient not injurious to health has been added because the same is required for the production or preparation thereof as an article of commerce. 2. Where the drug or food is a proprietary medicine, or is the subject of a patent in force. 3. Where the food or drug is compounded. 4. Where the food or drug is unavoidably mixed with some extraneous matter in the process of collection or preparation. 5. Where at the time of delivering such article or drug he supplies to the person receiving the same a notice, by a label distinctly and legibly written or printed on, to the effect that the same is mixed.

DUTIES OF ANALYSTS.

Appointment of Analysts.—Government analysts, for the purposes of this Act, are appointed by the Governor in Council, but any local authority may, and when required to do so by the Minister shall, appoint for their municipality one or more competent persons as public analysts. Provided that no person who is engaged directly or indirectly in a trade or business connected with the sale of food or drugs in any municipality shall be appointed or perform the duties of a public analyst.

Articles of Food Analysed by Public Analyst.—Every Inspector under the provisions of this Act, who may have procured samples of food or drugs, or the purchaser of an article of food or of a drug shall, on payment of a sum not exceeding twenty shillings, be entitled to have such article analysed with all convenient speed by any Public or Government Analyst, and to receive from him a certificate of the result thereof.

Reports of Analysts.—Every public analyst shall report quarterly to the local authority appointing him, the number of articles analysed by him under this Act during the foregoing quarter, and shall specify the result of each analysis, and the sum paid to him in respect thereof, and such report shall be presented at the next meeting of the local authority appointing such analyst, and every such local authority shall annually transmit to the Minister a certified copy of each such quarterly report. Every Government Analyst shall make a similar report once in each year to the Minister.

Special Provisions as to Milk.—Any Inspector of Nuisances, or other officer charged with the execution of this Act, may procure any sample of milk in the course of delivery to the purchaser, and such officer, if he suspects the same to have been sold contrary to any of the provisions of this Act, shall submit the same to be analysed, and proceedings shall be taken, and penalties, on conviction, be enforced.

REGISTRATION OF DEATHS.

(Amended Regulations Gazetted on December 18, 1885.)

Medical Certificates.—In cases where a legally qualified Medical Practitioner attended the deceased previous to death, a medical certificate of the cause of death, in the prescribed form, must be obtained and lodged with the certificate of death. (In case of a death resulting from fractures, contusions, wounds of any kind, poison, or drowning, the Registrar-General particularly requests medical men to state specifically the *Nature of the Injury*, and whether the cause of death was *accidental, suicidal, or homicidal*.)

When a medical certificate of the cause of death cannot be obtained owing to the non-attendance of a legally qualified Practitioner on the deceased previous to death, the District Registrar must make all reasonable inquiries, through the police or otherwise, as to the cause of death, and the reasons why the deceased was not attended by a legally qualified Medical Practitioner.

If it appears to the District Registrar that the friends, relatives, or persons in charge of the deceased wilfully and unjustifiably neglected to obtain the assistance of a legally qualified Medical Practitioner to attend on deceased previous to death, or that

the cause of death is uncertain, or that there are any suspicious circumstances connected with the death, he should refuse to grant a certificate of registration, and should forthwith report the circumstances to the police authorities, in order that the case may be investigated and a magisterial inquiry held to ascertain the cause of death.

* * *Any person making, or causing to be made, any false statement touching any of the particulars required to be registered, is subject to a fine of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, with imprisonment with hard labor for THREE YEARS.*

SOUTH AUSTRALIA.

THE MEDICAL ACT (1844 & 1880).

(7 & 8 Vic., No. 17 and 43, and 44 Vic., No. 193.)

Medical Board.—The Governor shall appoint a Board, consisting of not less than three members, being of the medical profession, one of whom shall be nominated president, together with a secretary, under the style and description of "The South Australian Medical Board"; and any person desirous of being declared a legally qualified Medical Practitioner, as aforesaid, shall submit his degree, diploma, certificate, or other proof, for the examination and approval of the said Medical Board, and shall obtain from the said Medical Board a certificate of his being a legally qualified Medical Practitioner, and for every such certificate there shall be paid to the president of the said Medical Board the sum of One Guinea.

Who shall be deemed a Legally Qualified Medical Practitioner.—No person shall be deemed to be a legally qualified Medical Practitioner, unless such person shall have proved to the satisfaction of the majority of the members present, not being less than three of the Medical Board, that he is possessed of one of the qualifications mentioned in the following Schedule, and shall have received from the said Board a certificate of his being a legally qualified Medical Practitioner.

Schedule.—1. Fellow, Member, Licentiate, or Extra-Licentiate of the Royal College of Physicians of London. 2. Fellow, Member, or Licentiate of the Royal College of Physicians of Edinburgh. 3. Fellow or Licentiate of the King's and Queen's Colleges of Physicians of Ireland. 4. Fellow or Member of the Royal College of Surgeons of England. 5. Fellow or Licentiate of the Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh. 6. Fellow or Licentiate of the Faculty of Physicians and Surgeons of Glasgow. 7. Fellow or Licentiate of the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland. 8. Licentiate of the Society of Apothecaries, London. 9. Licentiate of the Apothecaries' Hall, Dublin. 10. Doctor, or Bachelor of Medicine, or Master in Surgery of any Chartered University in Her Majesty's dominions authorised to grant degrees in medicine and surgery. 11. Any qualification entitling the holder to be registered in the United Kingdom, under the Act of Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, passed in the 21st and 22nd year of Her Majesty, c. 90, or any amendment thereof. 12. Any qualification which would entitle the holder to practice in all branches of medicine in any foreign state, and also to hold medical Government appointments in such state.

Remuneration to Medical Witnesses.—When any legally qualified Medical Practitioner has attended and given evidence at any inquest, inquiry, or trial, in obedience to any summons or subpoena, he shall be entitled to receive the remuneration of one guinea, and (in addition thereto) for the making of any *post mortem* examination, the remuneration of two guineas, and if the place of his residence be more than ten miles distant from the place where the inquest, inquiry, or trial is holden, then such practitioner shall be entitled to a sum of one shilling for every mile of such extra distance in addition. And until such funds shall be otherwise specially provided for that purpose, it shall be lawful for the Governor to order payment of every such sum by the Colonial Treasurer from the public moneys, provided that no remuneration shall be paid for the performance of any *post mortem* examination instituted without the previous direction of the Coroner, Justice, or Court (as the case may be), and provided also, that where the death shall have happened in any public hospital, gaol, or other public building, no medical officer, appointed with salary to attend such hospital, gaol, or public building, shall be entitled to any such remuneration.

THE LUNATICS ACT (1882).

(27 and 28 Vic., No. 21; and 29 Vic., No. 19.)

CERTIFICATES IN LUNACY.

Pauper Lunatics.—No pauper shall be received into any asylum without an order under the hand of one Justice, together with statement of particulars, nor without a medical certificate according to the following form, signed by one Medical Practitioner, who shall have personally examined him not more than seven clear days previously to his reception:—I, the undersigned, A.B., of _____ in the Province of South Australia, a Medical Practitioner of the said Province, and now in actual practice, hereby certify that I, on the _____ day of _____ at _____ [Here insert the street, and the number of the house, (if any), or other like particulars], in the said Province, [in any case where more than one medical certificate is required by this Act, here insert separately from any other Medical Practitioner], personally examined A.B., of _____ [insert residence and profession or occupation, (if any)], and that the said A.B. is a lunatic [or an idiot, or a person of unsound mind], and a proper person to be taken charge of, and detained under care and treatment, and that I have formed this opinion on the following grounds, viz.:—1. Facts indicating insanity observed by myself [here state the facts]. 2. Other facts, (if any), indicating insanity communicated to me by others [here state the information and from whom obtained]. Dated this _____ day of _____ 18____, (Signed)

Lunatics not being Paupers.—No person not a pauper, shall be received into any asylum without an order under the hand of some person, together with statement of particulars, nor without the medical certificate, according to the above form, of two Medical Practitioners, neither of whom shall be in partnership with, or an assistant to the other, and each of whom shall separately from the other, have personally examined the person to whom it relates, not more than seven clear days previously to the reception of such person into such asylum, and such order as aforesaid may be signed before or after the medical certificates or either of them: Provided always that any person may, under special circumstances preventing the examination of such person by two Medical Practitioners as aforesaid, be received into any asylum upon the certificate of one Medical Practitioner alone, if the statement accompanying such order set forth the special circumstances which prevented the examination of such person by two Medical Practitioners; but in every such case two other such certificates shall, within three clear days after the reception of such patient in such asylum, be signed by two other Medical Practitioners not in partnership with, or an assistant to the other, or the Medical Practitioner who signed the certificate on which the patient was received, and who shall within such time, separately from the other of them, have personally examined the person so received as a lunatic.

Medical Certificate to Specify Facts.—Every Medical Practitioner signing any certificate, shall specify therein the facts upon which he has formed his opinion that the person to whom such certificate relates is a lunatic, an idiot, or a person of unsound mind, distinguishing in such certificate facts observed by himself from facts communicated to him by others; and no person shall be received into any asylum under any certificate which purports to be founded only on facts communicated by others.

Medical Certificates contrary to Provisions.—Any Medical Practitioner who shall sign any certificate contrary to any of the provisions herein contained shall, for every such offence, forfeit any sum not exceeding Twenty Pounds; and any Medical Practitioner who shall falsely state or certify anything in any certificate under this Act, and any person who shall sign any certificate under this Act, in which he shall be described as a Medical Practitioner, not being a Medical Practitioner within the meaning of this Act, shall be guilty of a misdemeanour.

BOARD OF VISITORS.

Appointment of Visitors.—The Visitors of each asylum shall be appointed by the Governor, and shall continue in office until the first Monday in January in the year next following the date of their appointment. Provided that, after the expiration of the term for which any Visitor is appointed, he shall be eligible for appointment for the next ensuing year, and so from year to year.

Books, &c., to be laid before Visitors.—Upon every visit of the Visitors, there shall be laid before them by the Resident Medical Officer, the several books by this Act required to be kept; and also all orders and certificates relating to patients admitted

since the last visitation of the Visitors; and also all such other documents as the Visitors shall require to be produced to them; and the Visitors shall sign the said books as having been produced to them. Any Visitor may, at any hour of the day or night, enter and inspect any asylum, and the patients confined therein.

Visitors may order Discharge of Patients.—Any three of the Visitors of any asylum may, by writing under their hands, order the discharge of any person detained in such asylum, whether such person be recovered or not; and any two of the Visitors, with the advice in writing of the Resident Medical Officer of such asylum, may discharge any person detained therein as aforesaid, or permit any such person to be absent from the asylum upon trial for such period as such visitors think fit. And on application being made to the Visitors of any asylum by any relative or friend of a pauper lunatic confined therein, requiring that he may be delivered over to the custody and care of such relative or friend, any two of the Visitors aforesaid may, if they think fit, and upon the undertaking, in writing, of such relative or friend, to the satisfaction of such Visitors, that such lunatic shall be properly taken care of, and shall be prevented from doing injury to himself and others, discharge such lunatic.

THE VACCINATION ACT (1882).

(45 and 46 Vic., No. 248.)

Vaccine Matter.—The Vaccination Officer shall procure and preserve a sufficient supply of animal and humanised lymph, and shall furnish the same, without charge, to the Public Vaccinators and Medical Practitioners who shall apply for the same.

Children to be Vaccinated.—The parent of every child born in the colony shall, within six months after the birth of such child, take or cause the same to be taken to the Public Vaccinator for the district, for the purpose of being vaccinated, unless such child shall have been previously vaccinated by some Medical Practitioner, or by some other Public Vaccinator; and the said Public Vaccinator shall thereupon vaccinate the said child.

Inspection of Vaccination.—Upon the same day in the following week when the operation shall have been performed by the Public Vaccinator, the parent shall again take the child, or cause it to be taken, to him, that he may inspect it and ascertain the result of the operation, and if he see fit, take from such child lymph for the performance of other Vaccinations; and in the event of the Vaccination being unsuccessful, such parent shall, if the Vaccinator so direct, cause the child to be forthwith again vaccinated and inspected as on the previous occasion.

Unfitness for Vaccination.—If any Public Vaccinator or Medical Practitioner shall be of opinion that the child is not in a fit or proper state to be successfully vaccinated, he shall forthwith deliver to the parent a certificate under his hand that the child is then in a state unfit for successful vaccination, which certificate shall remain in force for two months, and shall be renewable for successive periods of two months, until a Public Vaccinator or Medical Practitioner shall deem the child to be in a fit state for successful Vaccination, when the child shall be vaccinated, and the certificate of successful Vaccination duly given if warranted by the result.

Successive Certificates.—At or before the end of each successive period the parent shall take or cause the child to be taken to the Public Vaccinator or Medical Practitioner, who shall then examine the child and give the required certificate, so long as he deems requisite under the circumstances of the case.

Not Susceptible of Successful Vaccination.—If any Public Vaccinator or any Medical Practitioner shall find that a child, whom he shall have three times unsuccessfully vaccinated, is insusceptible of successful Vaccination, or that a child brought to him for Vaccination has already had the Small-pox, he shall deliver to the parent a certificate under his hand, and the parent shall thenceforth not be required to cause such child to be vaccinated.

Certificates of Successful Vaccination.—Within seven days after the successful Vaccination of any child, the Public Vaccinator who shall have performed the operation, or ascertained the same to have been successfully performed, shall deliver to the parent of the said child a certificate, under his hand, that the said child has been successfully vaccinated, and shall also transmit a duplicate of the said certificate to the Registrar-General, in Adelaide.

Public Vaccinator not to Charge Parents.—No fee or remuneration shall be charged by any Public Vaccinator to the parent for any certificate or duplicate certificate given, nor for any Vaccination done under this Act.

Medical Certificates.—Notwithstanding anything contained in this Act, any Medical Practitioner in the colony may give a certificate of the operation of Vaccination having been successfully performed upon any child, or of the incapacity of any child to receive the vaccine disease, or of any child being in an unfit state for vaccination, and every such certificate shall be valid for the purposes of this Act.

Transmission of Certificates.—Where vaccination shall be performed by a Medical Practitioner not being a Public Vaccinator, the parent causing the child to be vaccinated shall submit to such Medical Practitioner a certificate in duplicate, to be filled up and signed by such Medical Practitioner, who shall, within seven days after the successful performance of the operation of Vaccination, transmit one copy of such certificate so signed, by post or otherwise, to the Registrar-General.

Remuneration to Vaccinators.—Every Public Vaccinator shall be entitled to receive out of the public revenue of the province the sum of 2s. 6d. for every successful Vaccination performed and certified by him, and every Medical Practitioner, not being a Public Vaccinator, shall be entitled to receive, out of the public revenue of the province, the sum of one shilling for every certificate of successful Vaccination transmitted by him to the Registrar-General of Births.

Quarterly Returns.—Public Vaccinators are required to make out quarterly returns of all children vaccinated by them from the 1st January to the 31st March, from the 1st April to the 30th June, from the 1st July to the 30th September, and from the 1st October to the 31st December, and to transmit the same to the Vaccination officer not later than the tenth day after each quarter; the returns to include all successful cases of Vaccination performed up to the last day of each quarter inclusive.

Signing False Certificates.—Any person who shall wilfully sign a false return or certificate, or duplicate thereof, shall be guilty of a misdemeanour, and shall on conviction thereof be imprisoned for a period not exceeding twelve nor less than three months.

Payment for Re-Vaccination.—No Public Vaccinator shall be entitled to any fee under this Act for successfully vaccinating any person who shall have been previously successfully vaccinated, unless such re-vaccination shall be performed in compliance with any instructions issued under the authority of the Governor.

Cases of Small-pox to be Reported.—If at any time the disease of Small-pox shall be declared to be present in the colony, any person who shall neglect to report to the Central Board of Health or to the Local Board of Health, or to the officer of police for the district in which such person resides, any case of Small-pox or disease resembling Small-pox, immediately on the existence of any case of such disease coming to such person's knowledge, shall, on conviction of such neglect, forfeit a sum not exceeding Fifty Pounds nor less than Twenty Pounds.

Vaccination Officer to Provide Books.—The Vaccination Officer shall deliver to the Public Vaccinators such books, forms, and regulations as they may require for the performance of the duties imposed upon them by this Act.

Correspondence to be Free of Postage.—The Vaccination Officer, and every Public Vaccinator, may transmit and receive by the General Post Office to and from places in the colony all letters and packets relating exclusively to the execution of this Act free of postage. And such letters and packets shall be in covers open at the sides, and be directed to or bear the signature of the Vaccination Officer or Public Vaccinator.

Penalty for Producing Small-pox.—Any person who shall by any means whatsoever produce the disease of Small-pox in any person, shall, on conviction, be liable to a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Pounds, or to be imprisoned for a term not exceeding twelve months.

THE PUBLIC HEALTH ACTS (1873, 1876, & 1884).

(37 Vic., No. 22 and 39; 40 Vic., No. 56; and 47 Vic., No. 316).

Central Board.—The Governor shall appoint any number of persons, not more than seven, nor fewer than four, to be a Board for superintending the execution of this Act, such Board shall be called the Central Board of Health. The Chairman of the Central Board, who shall be called the President of the Central Board of Health, together with any other three members thereof, shall be a quorum. The Chairman, who is appointed by the Governor, is remunerated by a fixed salary. Every other

member of the Central Board is paid for each attendance at its meetings a fee of one guinea. The Central Board of Health is empowered to appoint, for all places and land not situate within a town or sanitary district, all such medical and other officers as it shall deem proper.

Local Boards of Health.—Every Municipal Council may annually appoint, out of their own number, so many persons, not exceeding five, as they may think fit, to be the Local Board of Health for the ensuing year, and may fill up any vacancies in such Board occurring during the year. The Chairman, together with any other two members of such Board, shall be a quorum.

Reports of Local Boards.—Every Local Board shall make a report to the Central Board during the months of January and July in every year, and upon the appearance of any epidemic, endemic, or contagious disease, or any indications thereof, or of any peculiar circumstances or occurrences involving or affecting the sanitary condition of any town or other place, the Local Board thereof shall immediately report the same to the Central Board, and upon the receipt of any such report from any Local Board, the Central Board of Health shall forthwith consider it, and shall then transmit the same to the Chief Secretary, and the Governor may then direct that the required provisions for the prevention and mitigation of epidemic, endemic, and contagious diseases be put in force in the colony, or in any parts thereof.

Officer of Health.—Each Local Board of Health shall, whenever the Central Board of Health requires it so to do, appoint, subject to the approval of the Central Board, a legally qualified Medical Practitioner, or a properly qualified Analytical Chemist, to be called the "Officer of Health," who shall be removable by such Local Board, with the permission of the Central Board, and shall perform such duties, and in such manner, as the Central Board may by written instructions direct.

No Officer to be concerned in Contract.—No Member, Officer, or servant of the Central or of any Local Board shall be interested directly or indirectly in any bargain or contract entered into by such Central or Local Board respectively; and any such person offending against this provision shall be incapable of afterwards holding or continuing in any office or employment under this Act, and shall for each such offence incur a penalty not exceeding Fifty Pounds.

Unwholesome Food to be Seized.—Any Local Board of Health, or any Officer of such Board acting under the authority thereof, may at all reasonable times enter into and inspect any butcher's, poulterer's, or fishmonger's shop, or any abattoir or slaughter-house, or any place kept or used for the sale of any articles used as food for human consumption, and may inspect any carcass, provisions, or articles intended as food for human consumption; and in case any such carcass, provisions or articles, appear to be unfit for such food, may seize and carry the same before two Justices.

Officers may Inspect.—Each Local Board of Health shall occasionally make, either by its Members or by its Officers, inspection of the town, or other place within its jurisdiction, with a view to ascertain what nuisance exist calling for abatement under the powers of this Act, and to enforce the provisions thereof, and any persons acting under the authority of the Central or any Local Board may, with such assistants as may be necessary, at all reasonable times in the daytime, enter and inspect any abattoir, shop, stall, dwelling, and all other places whatsoever, whether private or public, within the jurisdiction of any Local Board, in order to ascertain if any person has recently died of any epidemic, endemic, or contagious disease in any of the places aforesaid. And whenever any house or any part of a house is let in lodgings, the Local Board of Health and its Officers may at all times enter and inspect such house.

Houses, &c., may be Declared Unfit for Human Habitation.—Whenever any Medical Officer or Inspector of the Central Board of Health, or of any Local Board of Health, or any two legally qualified Medical Practitioners, shall certify in writing to a Local Board of Health that any house or other building within their respective jurisdictions, or any part thereof, is unfit for human habitation, the Local Board of Health within the jurisdiction of which such house or building is situate, may, by an order in writing or print, declare that such house or building, or such part thereof, is not fit for human habitation, and direct that it shall not, after a time specified in such order, be inhabited by any person, and may cause such order, or a copy thereof, to be affixed to some conspicuous part of such house or building, before the expiration of the time mentioned in such order.

Case of Infectious Disease to be Reported.—The Medical Practitioner in attendance at any house in which there is any person suffering from Small-pox, Cholera, Plague, Yellow Fever, Leprosy, or any other disease declared by the Governor by Proclamation to be contagious or infectious, shall report the existence of such disease to the Central Board of Health; where the house is situate more than ten miles from

Adelaide the Medical Practitioner shall also forward a copy of such certificate to the Local Board of Health. Every Medical Practitioner shall be entitled to receive from the Central Board a fee of Five Shillings for every such report.

Penalty for Non-reporting.—If any practitioner fails to comply with the provisions of the foregoing section, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence under this Act, and shall, on conviction thereof, be liable to a penalty of not less than Two Pounds nor exceeding Fifty Pounds for every such offence.

Premises to be Cleansed and Disinfected.—Where the Officer of Health or any legally qualified Medical Practitioner shall certify in writing to the Local Board of Health that the cleansing and disinfecting of any house, or part thereof, or of any articles therein likely to retain infection, would tend to prevent or check the spread of any of the said contagious or infectious diseases, the Board may cleanse and disinfect such house, or part thereof, and articles, and may recover the expenses incurred by them in the execution of this section from such owner or occupier, in a summary manner, before two Justices of the Peace, or may, if the Board sees fit, themselves defray such expenses, or any part thereof.

Supervision of Dairies.—The Central Board of Health shall make regulations, to be signed by the President, for the inspection, lighting, ventilation, cleansing, drainage, and water supply of dairies and cowsheds; for the health of the cattle therein; for the cleanliness of milk shops or milk stores, and of milk vessels; for the protection of milk against contamination; for preventing the milk of a diseased cow from being used for human food, mixed with other milk, or used, without being boiled, for the food of swine or other animals; and for the exclusion of persons suffering, or exposed to infection, from any such contagious or infectious disease from milking cows, handling milk vessels, or taking any part in the business of a cowkeeper, dairyman, or vendor of milk.

THE SALE OF POISONS (1862).

(25 and 26 Vic., No. 5.)

Restrictions on Sale of certain Poisons.—No person under the age of seventeen years shall buy or sell the several poisons called arsenic, corrosive sublimate, prussic acid, essential oil of bitter almonds, or strychnine, and no person shall sell any of the aforesaid poisons to, or buy from any person under the age aforesaid, nor sell any of the said poisons unless the sale be made in the presence of a witness; and no person shall sell any of the said poisons to any person who is unknown to the seller, unless the purchaser be known to the witness and the witness be known to the seller.

Regulations for the Sale of Poisons.—Every person who shall sell any of the aforesaid poisons shall, before the delivery of any such poison to the purchaser, enter in a book to be kept by the seller for that purpose, a statement of such sale, with the name of the poisons so sold, the quantity thereof, the purpose for which such poison is required or stated to be required, the day of the month and year of the sale, and the name, place of abode, and condition or occupation of the purchaser, and of the witness, into all which circumstances, as well as the age of the purchaser, the person selling such poison is to inquire of the purchaser before the delivery to such purchaser of the poison sold; and such entries shall, in every case, be signed by the person making the same, and shall also be signed by the purchaser, unless such purchaser profess to be unable to write, in which case the person making the entries shall add to the particulars of such sale the words "cannot write," and shall also be signed by the witness before the delivery to the purchaser of the poison sold.

Poisons to be Labelled.—Every packet, bottle, or other parcel containing any of the before-mentioned poisons, or any opium, laudanum, white precipitate, red precipitate, sugar of lead, oxalic acid, sulphate of zinc, or Goulard's Extract, which shall be hereafter sold, shall be, before such sale, clearly and distinctly labelled with a printed or written label, having the name of the contents and the word "Poison" legibly printed or written thereon, firmly affixed to such packet, bottle, or other parcel.

Sale of Arsenic.—This provision is the same as that contained in the "Sale of Poisons Act" passed in New Zealand in 1871. (See page 22.)

Poisons in Medicines, or any Wholesale Dealing Exempt.—Nothing in this Act contained shall extend to the sale of any of the aforesaid poisons when the same or any of them form part of the ingredients of any medicine required to be made up or compounded according to the prescription of any Medical Practitioner, or to affect dealings between one trader and another upon orders in writing in the ordinary course of dealings, or to affect wholesale dealing upon orders in writing.

Penalties.—Any person offending against any of these provisions is liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty Pounds.

TASMANIA.

THE MEDICAL PRACTITIONERS' ACT (1842 & 1867).

(6 Vic., No. 2, & 31 Vic., No. 34.)

Court of Medical Examiners.—The Governor may appoint seven persons, one of whom shall be called the President, to form a Court to be called the Court of Medical Examiners. A quorum of the Court shall consist of not less than three members thereof.

Legally Qualified Medical Practitioners.—No person shall do or perform for fee, or in expectation of receiving a fee, any of the acts following, that is to say practice as a physician, surgeon, or apothecary, or prescribe to be taken, or administer any medicine, or do or perform any surgical act or operation, unless such person shall have received from the president or some member of the Court of Examiners a certificate that it has been proved to his satisfaction that such person is a doctor of medicine of some university, or that he is a physician, surgeon or apothecary, licensed or admitted as such by some College of Physicians or Surgeons, or by the Society of Apothecaries of London or Dublin, or unless such person shall have obtained, after an examination publicly held before such Court of Examiners, letters testimonial of such Court to practice as a physician, surgeon, or apothecary, upon pain of forfeiting for every such offence a penalty or sum not exceeding one hundred pounds. Provided that every doctor of medicine of any university, and every physician, surgeon, and apothecary licensed or admitted as such by any College of Physicians or Surgeons, or by the Society of Apothecaries of London or Dublin, shall be deemed a legally qualified Medical Practitioner, and shall be entitled to receive such remuneration and allowance as given below, notwithstanding that he shall not have received such certificate or letters testimonial as hereinbefore mentioned, provided he shall prove to the satisfaction of the coroner presiding at any such inquest that the attendance, if any given by him upon the person on whose body such inquest shall be held, was gratuitous, and provided that he shall also prove to the satisfaction of such coroner that he is really and in fact such doctor of medicine, physician, or apothecary, as the case may be.

Government Fees.—For giving evidence at an inquest—One Guinea.

For making a post-mortem examination—Two Guineas.

For travelling to the inquest—One Shilling a mile one way, for each mile after the first ten. Ten miles or under, no fee allowed.

For giving evidence in Court of Law—One Guinea a day.

For travelling to the Court—Eighteen Shillings a day, and coach or railway fare.

Letters Testimonial.—No person shall be entitled to such letters testimonial as aforesaid, unless he shall have conformed to any course of education which may be required by the said Court of Examiners or unless the said Court of Examiners shall be satisfied that the course of Education which such person had pursued elsewhere was sufficient to entitle him to examination for such letters testimonial.

Pupils.—Every legally qualified Medical Practitioner may receive as a pupil any person not under the age of sixteen years, who shall have received such a preliminary course of instruction as may be declared by any by-law to be passed by such Court to be sufficient.

The Sale of Drugs.—No person shall vend any medicine or drug without having obtained a license so to do from the president and two or more members of the Court, every person so offending shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Fifty Pounds. Provided that nothing in this section shall be deemed or taken to prevent any person being a wholesale importer of drugs or medicines, from vending the same by wholesale. Provided also that no person shall incur any penalty by selling medicines or drugs at any place which is distant more than two miles from the place of business of any person who has obtained such license, provided such medicines or drugs shall be sold in unopened packages made up by, and bearing the label of, some person who has obtained such license as aforesaid, and not otherwise. Every legally qualified Medical Practitioner may also vend any medicine or drugs without having obtained any license so to do.

THE INSANE PERSONS' HOSPITALS ACT (1858 and 1885).

(22 Vic., No. 23 ; and 49 Vic., No. 35.)

Superintendent and other Officers of Hospitals.—Every Hospital, and the Insane confined therein, shall be under the immediate control and management of the Superintendent ; and every such Hospital shall have a Medical Officer, who may be also the Superintendent thereof, and such other Officers and Servants as by the Governor may be deemed to be necessary.

Medical Certificates.—Any Insane person wandering at large, not being properly taken care of by relations or friends, may be removed to some hospital for the Insane by an order of two Justices, and one Medical Certificate according to the following form :—

I, the undersigned, being a Medical Practitioner, hereby certify, that I, on the day of (in any case where more than One Medical Certificate is required by this Act, here insert separately from any other Medical Practitioner), personally examined A.B. of (insert residence and profession or occupation, if any) and that the said A.B. is a Lunatic (or an Idiot, or a person of unsound mind) and a proper person to be taken charge of and detained under care and treatment, and that I have formed this opinion upon the following grounds ; viz.

1. Facts indicating insanity observed by myself (here state the facts).
2. Other facts (if any) indicating Insanity communicated to me by others (here state the information, and from whom).

Dated this day of one thousand eight hundred and eighty

(Signed).

Place of abode.

But any person may be received and detained as a patient in a Hospital, if accompanied by an order of some responsible person according to the prescribed form, together with statement of particulars as contained therein, and two Medical Certificates according to the above form. The two Medical Practitioners who sign the certificates shall not be in partnership with or an assistant to the other, and each shall separately from the other personally examine the person to whom it relates, not more than ten clear days previously to the reception of such person into such hospital. However, any person may, under special circumstances which prevent the examination of such person by two Medical Practitioners as aforesaid, be received into any such hospital upon the certificate of one Medical Practitioner alone, but in every such case another certificate shall, within fifteen clear days after the reception of such patient into such hospital, be signed by one other Medical Practitioner, not in partnership with or an assistant to the Medical Practitioner who signed the certificate on which the patient was received, and who has, within such time and separately from such last-named Medical Practitioner, personally examined the person so received as an Insane Person.

Fees for Examination.—Any Justice may grant a certificate for the payment of a reasonable remuneration to any such Medical Practitioner for the examination of such person, and of all other reasonable expenses.

Medical Certificate to Specify Facts.—Every Medical Practitioner signing any certificate, shall specify therein the facts upon which he has formed his opinion that the person to whom such certificate relates is an Insane Person, distinguishing in such certificate facts observed by himself from facts communicated to him by others ; and no person shall be received into any such hospital under any certificate which purports to be founded only upon facts communicated by others.

Medical Certificates may be Amended.—If after the reception of any Insane Person it appears that any order or Medical Certificate is incorrect or defective, such Order or Medical Certificate may be amended by the person signing the same at any time within Thirty days next after the reception of such Insane Person, which amendment shall receive the sanction of two or more of the Commissioners.

Who Not to Sign Certificates.—No Medical Practitioner who, or whose father, brother, son, partner, or assistant, signs the order for the reception of a patient, shall sign any certificate for the reception of the same patient.

Criminal Lunatics.—If any person, while imprisoned in any place of confinement, appears to be Insane the Sheriff shall inquire, with the aid of two Medical Practitioners, as to the Insanity of such prisoner ; and if certified by the Sheriff and such Medical Practitioners that such prisoner is Insane, the Governor, upon the receipt of such certificate may direct, by warrant under his hand, that such person be removed to some hospital.

Medical Men Signing False Certificates.—Any Medical Practitioner who signs any certificate contrary to the provisions of this Act, shall, for every such offence, forfeit any sum not exceeding Twenty Pounds; and any Medical Practitioner who falsely states or certifies anything in any certificate, and any person who signs any certificate in which he is described as a Medical Practitioner, not being a legally qualified Medical Practitioner, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

Official Visitors.—The Governor in Council may appoint for every hospital for the Insane, or other place where patients certified to be Insane are detained, three Official Visitors, one of whom shall be a Medical Practitioner, and one a Magistrate, any two or more of whom, one being a Medical Practitioner, shall visit the place to which they are appointed Visitors once at least every month, and also at such other times as the Chief Secretary may direct. No Official Visitor shall be appointed for a longer period than one year; and any or all of the Official Visitors may be appointed to two or more hospitals for the Insane or other places where patients certified to be Insane are detained; and any Official Visitor shall be eligible for re-appointment.

Official Visitor to have No Interest in Hospital.—No person shall be or act as an Official Visitor of any hospital or other place where patients certified to be Insane are detained, who shall be directly or indirectly interested therein; and no such Visitor shall sign any certificate for the admission of any patient into any hospital or other place for the reception of Insane persons, or shall professionally attend on any patient in any hospital of which he shall be an Official Visitor.

THE INEBRIATES' ACT (1885).

(49 Vic. No. 17.)

Licensed Retreats.—The Governor may grant to any person, or to two or more persons jointly, a Licence to keep a Retreat for the protection, treatment, and cure of habitual inebriates, and may from time to time revoke such Licence; and such Retreat shall be conducted by a Superintendent, under the supervision of a Committee of Management, to consist of eight Members to be elected from the contributors thereto, four Members to form a quorum.

Appointment of Medical Officers.—The Committee shall appoint the Superintendent (who shall be a Special Constable), Medical and other officers necessary for the requirements of such Retreat; and as occasion may require, shall have power to suspend or remove the persons so appointed and appoint others in their places, always subject to the approval of the Governor in Council.

Apprehension of Habitual Drunkard on his own Application.—Any person desirous of being committed to a Retreat may make application to any Justice, and such Justice, if he be satisfied that the applicant has habitually used excessive quantities of intoxicating liquor, and that he at the time fully understands the nature of his application, may make an order for his detention in some Retreat for any term not exceeding twelve months.

Inebriates may be Committed.—Upon the application of any relation or friend of any person addicted to the habitual use in excess of intoxicating liquor, any Judge of the Supreme Court sitting in Chambers, Police or Stipendiary Magistrate, or two Justices of the Peace, may, upon proof of the reasonableness of the application, summon such person to appear before him or them, and eventually order such person to be conveyed to, and detained in some Retreat for any term not exceeding twelve months, provided that two Medical Practitioners certify by statutory declaration in writing (according to the following form), that such person requires curative treatment in a Retreat.

And I make this solemn declaration conscientiously believing the same to be true, and by virtue of the provisions of "The Statutory Declarations Act, 1837."

Committee may discharge Inebriate.—The Committee of Management of the Retreat may at any time before the expiration of the term specified in the Order of Detention discharge any person so detained, with the approval of the Medical Officer attending such Retreat.

THE PUBLIC HEALTH ACT (1885).

(49 Vic., No. 18.)

Application of Act.—This Act shall, save where the application thereof or of any portion thereof is hereinafter expressly limited, apply to the City of *Hobart* and the town of *Launceston*, to every Rural Municipality in *Tasmania* now existing or which may hereafter be constituted, and to every town proclaimed under and for the purpose of "The Town Boards Act, 1884"; and its provisions, or any portion thereof, may from time to time be extended by the Governor in Council to any other portion of *Tasmania* than is hereinbefore mentioned, by proclamation in the *Gazette*.

Formation of Local Board in certain cases.—If the provisions of this Act or of any portion thereof be at any time extended to any such other portion of *Tasmania* as aforesaid, the Governor in Council may from time to time appoint, and may remove such and so many persons, not less than Three, as he may think fit, to be the Local Board for such portion; and any Local Board so appointed shall have and may exercise all the powers given to Local Boards under this Act.

CENTRAL AND LOCAL BOARDS OF HEALTH.

Central Board of Health.—The Governor in Council may appoint any number of persons not exceeding Five to be a Central Board of Health; and the powers and duties vested in the said Board may be exercised and executed by a quorum thereof of not less than Three members. And at all meetings of the said Board the President or Chairman shall have a vote, and in case of an equality of votes shall also have a casting vote; and during any vacancy in the said Board, whether of the office of President or not, the continuing members may act as if no vacancy had occurred.

Officers of Health.—Each Local Board shall appoint a legally-qualified Medical Practitioner as Officer of Health of their district, and may remove any such officer, and shall thereupon appoint another in his stead. The appointment and removal of such officer shall be subject to the approval of the Central Board. Such Officer of Health shall be paid a sum as remuneration for his services, being not less than Ten Pounds for any year, as such Local Board may fix, and shall perform such duties and in such manner as such Local Board may from time to time direct, and also such as are specially prescribed by any Minute or Order addressed by the Central Board to such Local Board.

The Local Boards of two or more contiguous districts may, with the approval of the Central Board, join in the appointment of an Officer of Health, and in remunerating him to an amount not less than that hereinbefore mentioned.

Inspectors to carry out instructions of Officer of Health.—Officers of Health are hereby empowered to give to any Inspector appointed by the Local Board of Health of their respective districts such directions and instructions as such Officers may deem necessary for the due execution of this Act, and such Inspectors are required to faithfully obey and carry out any such directions or instructions so given.

Officers of Health to have powers of Inspectors.—Officers of Health shall, in addition, have all the powers hereby conferred on any Inspector appointed by the Local Board of Health of their respective districts.

No Officer to be concerned in Contract.—No member, officer, inspector, or servant of the Central Board, or of any Local Board, shall be concerned or interested directly or indirectly in any bargain or contract entered into by such Central or Local Board respectively; any person offending against this provision shall be incapable of afterwards holding or continuing in any office or employment under this Act, and shall for each such offence incur a penalty not exceeding Fifty Pounds.

Inspector to Prosecute.—Every Inspector of any Local Board shall, without any express order of such Local Board, take proceedings against any person offending against any By-law made by such Local Board.

ADULTERATION OF ARTICLES OF FOOD OR DRUGS.

The provisions of this Section are the same as those of the "Adulteration of Food Act" (1881 and 1882) in Queensland. (See page 28).

APPOINTMENT AND DUTIES OF ANALYSTS, AND PROCEEDINGS TO OBTAIN ANALYSIS.

The provisions of this Section are the same as those of "The Public Health Amendment Statute (1883)" of Victoria. (See further on).

DWELLING HOUSES.

(The same as in Victoria.)

THE VACCINATION ACT (1882).

(46 Vic., No. 19.)

Vaccinators.—The Governor in Council shall appoint fit persons to be vaccinators for such districts as he sees fit, and any person may be appointed the vaccinator for more districts than one, and any of such Vaccinators or Officers may be removed at any time.

Notice of Gratuitous Vaccination.—Every Vaccinator shall notify in the *Gazette* the times when, and the places where, he will be prepared to vaccinate gratuitously all children and others brought or applying to him for the purpose of being vaccinated; and also the time when such Vaccinator will attend at such places to inspect the progress of such vaccination in the persons so vaccinated.

Remuneration.—There shall be payable to each Vaccinator such salary and allowances as the Governor in Council sees fit, or, in lieu of salary, to each Vaccinator for each person not previously vaccinated, and who is successfully vaccinated by such Vaccinator, such sum of money not exceeding Five Shillings. No Vaccinator shall charge or receive from any person any fee or reward for or in respect of any Act performed or any certificate given by him under this Act.

Duty of Vaccinators.—Every Vaccinator shall vaccinate gratuitously all children and others brought or applying to him for that purpose, and every Vaccinator shall keep a register of vaccinations and of the results thereof on the eighth day thereafter in such form as shall be prescribed.

Certificates.—Upon and immediately after the successful vaccination of any child or person, the Medical Practitioner who performs the operation shall prepare, in duplicate, a certificate, that such child or person has been successfully vaccinated.

Unfitness for Vaccination.—If any Medical Practitioner shall be of opinion that any person or child is not in a fit and proper state to be successfully vaccinated, he shall forthwith prepare a certificate, in duplicate, that such person or child is then in a state unfit for successful vaccination, which certificate shall remain in force for such period as such Medical Practitioner shall deem necessary, and shall be renewable from time to time until some Medical Practitioner deems such person or child to be in a fit state for successful vaccination, when such person or child shall, with all reasonable despatch, be vaccinated, and the certificate of successful vaccination duly given if warranted by the result.

Insusceptible of Vaccine Disease.—In the event of any Medical Practitioner being of opinion, after three successive vaccinations, that any such person or child is insusceptible of the vaccine disease, or that any such person or child coming or brought to him for vaccination has already had the Small-pox, he shall prepare in duplicate a certificate according to the required form.

Medical Certificates.—In every case where any Medical Practitioner prepares a certificate of vaccination, or of postponement of vaccination, or of insusceptibility to vaccine disease, in respect of any child born in *Tasmania*, he shall immediately thereupon give one copy thereof to the parent of such child, and transmit the duplicate for registration to the Deputy Registrar of the district within which the child referred to in such certificate was born, under the penalty of Twenty Shillings for each omission, and in respect of any person above the age of fourteen years, he shall immediately thereupon give one copy thereof to such person and shall retain the duplicate in his own possession.

Penalty for Neglecting Duty.—If any Medical Practitioner wilfully neglects or refuses to perform any duty which he is by this Act required to perform, or in any manner infringes or disobeys any provision of this Act, he shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds.

THE DENTISTS' ACT (1884).

Registration of Dentists.—From and after the first day of January, 1885, a person other than a legally-qualified Medical Practitioner shall not be entitled to take or use the name or title of Dentist (either alone or in combination with other words), or of Dental Surgeon, Surgeon Dentist, Dental Practitioner, or any name, title, addition, or description implying that he is registered under this Act, or that he is a person specially qualified to practise Dentistry and Dental Surgery, and no person shall be entitled to take or receive any fee or charge for the performance of any dental operation, or for any dental attendance, prescription, or advice, unless he is registered under this Act, or is a legally qualified Medical Practitioner.

Penalties.—Any person who, after the first day of January, 1885, not being registered under this Act, takes or uses any such name, title, addition, or description as aforesaid, or takes or receives any fee or charge for the performance of any dental operation, attendance, prescription, or advice, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Fifty Pounds, to be recovered in a summary way before any two Justices of the Peace: Provided that nothing in this section shall apply to any legally qualified Medical Practitioner.

Who to be entitled to Registration.—Any person who—(a.) Is at the passing of this Act *bona fide* engaged in any part of Tasmania in the practice of Dentistry or Dental Surgery, either on his own behalf or as assistant to some person engaged in the practice of Dentistry or Dental Surgery, either separately or in conjunction with the practice of Medicine, Surgery, or Pharmacy; (b.) Holds any recognised certificate, granted in any British Possession or foreign country; or (c.) Has been for at least three consecutive years the apprentice or pupil of a person registered under this Act, or of one or more such persons, and who has been continuously and wholly engaged during that period in the practice of Dentistry, and shall have obtained a licence under this Act; shall be entitled to be registered under this Act.

Mode of Application.—When a person entitled to be registered under this Act produces or sends to the Registrar the document conferring or evidencing his qualification, with a statement of his name and address and other particulars, if any, required for registration, and pays the registration fee, he shall be registered in the Dentists' Register.

(NOTE.—Any person who wilfully procures or attempts to procure himself or any other person to be registered under this Act by making or producing, or causing to be made or produced, any false or fraudulent representation or declaration, either verbally or in writing, is liable to imprisonment for a period not exceeding twelve months).

Doubtful Applications.—The Registrar shall refer any doubtful application for registration under this Act to the Board of Examiners, who may decline to register such person, or otherwise, as they may think fit.

Fees Payable.—The Registrar shall take and receive the undermentioned fees:—On application, £1; Certificate of Registration, 5s.; any alteration of Register, 5s.; Inspection of Register, 2s. 6d.

VICTORIA.

MEDICAL PRACTITIONERS' ACT (1865 & 1876).

(28 Vic., No. 262, and 39 Vic., No. 527.)

MEDICAL BOARD OF VICTORIA.

Medical Board.—The Governor in Council may appoint a committee consisting of at least three members being of the medical profession, one of whom shall be nominated president, under the style of "The Medical Board of Victoria," and may

from time to time remove the said members or any of them. A quorum of the board shall consist of not less than three members thereof, and, in the absence of the president from any meeting of the board, one of the members present may be elected chairman of such meeting.

Examination of Candidates and Witnesses.—The board may question any person who may attend before the board, and any witness who may be produced, and may take a solemn declaration from such person or witness, and if any person shall wilfully, knowingly, and corruptly make any false statement upon such examination, or in such declaration, or shall utter, or attempt to utter, or put off as true before the board any false, forged, or counterfeit diploma, degree, license, certificate, or other document or writing, he shall be liable to be imprisoned for any period not exceeding three years.

Board may alter Register.—The board may from time to time make the necessary alterations in the registration of the qualifications and addresses of the persons registered, and may from time to time write a letter to any registered person addressed to him according to his last known address, to enquire whether he has ceased to practise or has changed his residence, and if no answer be returned to such letter within the period of six months from the sending thereof, the board may erase the name of such person from the register, and may, if they shall afterwards think fit to do so, restore the same to the register. Any legally qualified Medical Practitioner, on changing his address, shall intimate the same to the Medical Board.

LEGALLY QUALIFIED MEDICAL PRACTITIONERS.

Qualification of Medical Practitioners.—Every natural born or naturalised subject of Her Majesty possessed of any one or more of the qualifications described in the following schedule, who shall prove on personal attendance to the satisfaction of the Medical Board that the testimonium, diploma, license, or certificate testifying to such qualification, was duly obtained by him after due examination from some university, college, or other body duly recognised for such purpose in the country to which such university, college, or other body may belong, shall be entitled to registration as a legally qualified Medical Practitioner, and shall receive from the Medical Board a certificate of qualification.

SCHEDULE.

(1.) Fellow, Member, Licentiate, or Extra-Licentiate of the Royal College of Physicians of London. (2.) Fellow, Member, or Licentiate of the Royal College of Physicians of Edinburgh. (3.) Fellow or Licentiate of the King and Queen's College of Physicians of Ireland. (4.) Fellow or Member of the Royal College of Surgeons of England. (5.) Fellow or Licentiate of the Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh. (6.) Fellow or Licentiate of the Faculty of Physicians and Surgeons of Glasgow. (7.) Fellow or Licentiate of the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland. (8.) Licentiate of the Society of Apothecaries, London. (9.) Licentiate of the Apothecaries' Hall, Dublin. (10.) Doctor or Bachelor of Medicine, or Master in Surgery of some British or Colonial University. (11.) Any legally-qualified Practitioner registered in the United Kingdom under the Acts of the Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland passed respectively in the Twenty-first and Twenty-second year of Her Majesty, intituled, "*An Act to regulate the Qualifications of Practitioners in Medicine and Surgery*," and in the Twenty-second year of Her Majesty, intituled, "*An Act to Amend the Medical Act (1858)*." (12.) Medical Officers duly appointed and confirmed of Her Majesty's Sea or Land Service. (13.) Any person who shall prove to the satisfaction of the board that he has passed through a regular course of medical study of not less than three years' duration in a British or foreign school of medicine, and has received after due examination from some British or foreign university, college, or body, duly recognised for that purpose in the country to which such university, college, or other body may belong, a medical diploma or degree certifying to his ability to practise medicine or surgery as the case may be.

Forging or Obtaining a Certificate under False Representations.—If any person fraudulently or by false representations obtains a certificate as a legally-qualified Medical Practitioner under the provisions of this part of this Act, or shall forge, alter, counterfeit any such certificate, or shall utter or use any such forged, altered, or counterfeited certificate, knowing the same to have been forged, altered, or counterfeited, or shall falsely advertise or publish himself as having obtained such certificate, he shall be liable to imprisonment with or without hard labour for any period not exceeding three years.

Persons Unregistered using Medical Titles.—It shall not be lawful for any person, unless registered, to pretend to be, or to take, or use the name or title of a

Physician, Doctor of Medicine, Licentiate in Medicine and Surgery, Master in Surgery, Bachelor of Medicine, Doctor, Surgeon, Medical or General Practitioner, or Apothecary, or Surgeon-Apothecary, or Accoucheur, or Licentiate, or Practitioner in Midwifery, or any other Medical or Surgical name or title, and every unregistered person so offending shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Fifty Pounds, to be recovered in a summary manner before any two Justices, by any person suing for the same in any Court of Petty Sessions. Provided that any person who shall feel himself aggrieved by any such conviction or order of justices, may appeal therefrom to the next Court of General Sessions of the Peace.

Medical Practitioners may Sue.—Every Medical Practitioner who shall have received such certificate of qualification as aforesaid shall afterwards be entitled to sue in any Court of Law within Victoria for the recovery of his fees or other remuneration for his professional services, whether Medical or Surgical, and it shall be sufficient to state in the particulars of demand the words "for medical services," which shall include every demand for Medical or Surgical aid including medicines, when supplied by the plaintiff to the defendant, and no person shall be entitled to recover any charge in any Court of Law for any Medical or Surgical advice or attendance, or for the performance of any operation, or for any medicine which he shall have both prescribed and supplied, unless he shall prove on the trial that he is duly registered.

Medical Appointments and Certificates.—No unregistered person shall hold any appointment as a Medical Officer in passenger or other vessels leaving any port in Victoria, or in any public institution for affording medical relief in sickness, infirmity, or old age, or as a Medical Officer of Health, and no certificate required by any Act from any Medical Practitioner shall be valid, unless the person signing the same be duly registered. Provided that nothing herein contained shall render invalid any such certificate from a duly appointed Medical Officer of any of Her Majesty's land or sea forces in full pay, although such Officer may not be registered under this Act.

Chemists and Dentists.—Nothing in this Act shall infringe on the rights and privileges hitherto enjoyed by Chemists and Druggists or Dentists.

MEDICAL WITNESSES.

This part is identical with the "Medical Witnesses Act" (1 Vic., No. 3) passed in New South Wales in 1838, which, therefore, is in force in Victoria. (See page 4).

SCHOOLS OF ANATOMY.

Licenses to Practise Anatomy.—The Governor may grant a license to practise anatomy, subject to revocation, to any graduate or licentiate in medicine, or to any legally-qualified Medical Practitioner in Victoria, or to the legally-qualified professor or teacher of Anatomy, Medicine, or Surgery, or to any student attending any school of Anatomy, on application from any such person, countersigned by a Stipendiary Magistrate, or by the Chief Medical Officer of Victoria, certifying that to his knowledge or belief such person so applying is about to carry on the practice of Anatomy.

Inspectors of Schools of Anatomy.—The Governor may appoint one or more Inspectors of places where Anatomy is carried on, and every such Inspector shall make a quarterly return to the Registrar-General of Victoria of every deceased person's body that has been removed for anatomical examination to any place in his district where Anatomy is carried on, distinguishing the sex, and, as far as is known at the time, the name and age of each person whose body was so removed, and every such Inspector may visit and inspect at any time any place within his district at which Anatomy is practised.

Bodies for Anatomical Examination.—The Chief Medical Officer, the Inspector General of Penal Establishments, the Inspector of Lunatic Asylums, or any Resident or Honorary Medical Officer, connected with any public institution supported wholly or in part by funds from the general revenue, if authorised by a license under the hand of their respective Minister, or any Executor or other person, not being an undertaker, having lawful possession of the body of any deceased person, may permit such body to undergo anatomical examination, unless such person shall have expressed his desire at any time during his life, that his body after death might not undergo such examination; an anatomical examination may also be made of the body of any such person who may direct at any time during his life, either in writing, or verbally in the presence of two or more witnesses, that his body after death may be examined anatomically,—provided in all cases that no relative of the deceased person shall require the body to be interred without such examination.

Removal of Bodies.—In no case shall the body of any person be removed for anatomical examination from any place where such person may have died, until after twelve hours from the time of such person's decease, nor until after six hours' notice to the inspector of the district of the intended removal of the body, or if no such inspector have been appointed, or such inspector shall reside at a greater distance than ten miles from the place of death, then to the legally qualified Medical Practitioner or stipendiary Magistrate nearest to the place of death, nor unless a certificate stating in what manner such person came by his death shall, previously to the removal of the body, have been signed by the legally-qualified Medical Practitioner who attended such person during the illness whereof he died, or if no such practitioner attended such person during such illness then by some such Practitioner or some stipendiary Magistrate who shall be called in after the death of such person to view his body, and who shall state the manner or cause of death according to the best of his knowledge and belief, but who shall not be concerned in examining the body after removal, and in case of such removal such certificate shall be delivered, together with the body, to the party receiving the same for anatomical examination.

Certificate to be Transmitted to the Inspector.—Every person so receiving a body for anatomical examination after removal shall demand and receive together with the body a certificate as aforesaid, and shall within twenty-four hours next after such removal transmit to the Inspector of the district such certificate, and also a return stating at what day and hour, and from whom the body was received, the date and the place of death, the sex, and (as far as is known at the time) the christian and surname, age, and last place of abode of such person, or if no such inspector have been appointed, to the legally qualified Medical Practitioner or stipendiary Magistrate residing nearest to the place to which the body is removed, and shall enter the aforesaid particulars relating thereto, and a copy of the certificate he received therewith, in a book to be kept by him for that purpose, and shall produce such book whenever required so to do by any Inspector so appointed.

Notice to be given to Chief Secretary.—No person shall carry on or teach anatomy at any place, or at any place to receive or possess for anatomical examination, or examine anatomically, any deceased person's body after removal of the same, unless such person or the owner or occupier of such place, or some person authorised to examine bodies anatomically, shall at least one week before the first receipt or possession of a body for such purpose at such place, have given notice to the Chief Secretary of the place where it is intended to practice anatomy.

Interment of Bodies.—Every such body so removed for the purpose of examination shall, before such removal, be placed in a decent coffin or shell, and be removed therein, and the person removing the same, or causing the same to be removed, shall make provision that such body after undergoing anatomical examination be decently interred, and that a certificate of the interment of such body shall be transmitted to the Inspector of the district within six weeks after the day on which such body was received.

Post-mortem Examinations.—Nothing in this part contained shall extend to or prohibit any *post-mortem* examination of any human body required or directed to be made by any competent legal authority.

Offences.—Any person offending against the provisions of this part of this Act shall be punished by imprisonment for a term not exceeding three months, or by a fine not exceeding Fifty Pounds.

THE BRITISH PHARMACOPŒIA,

as published in England under the direction of the General Council of Medical Education and Registration of the United Kingdom, is the only recognised Pharmacopœia in Victoria (Act 32 Vic., No. 333, passed in 1868).

THE COMPULSORY VACCINATION ACT (1874).

(38 Vic., No. 501.)

The tenor of this Act is identical with that passed in South Australia in 1882 (see page 32), with the exception that the Public Vaccinator shall transmit all certificates under this Act to the Deputy-Registrar of the district in which the operation was performed, instead of to the Registrar-General for the Colony, as required in South Australia.

CERTIFICATES IN LUNACY (1867).

(31 Vic., No. 309).

Medical Certificates.—Any person who shall appear to be insane may be removed to a lunatic asylum or licensed house by an order of two Justices and two Medical Certificates according to the following form :—

I, the undersigned, being a Medical Practitioner, hereby certify that I, on the day of , one thousand eight hundred and at [here insert the particulars of the place of examination as the street, number of the house, or other particulars] in the county of [where more than one Medical Certificate is required add separately from any other Medical Practitioner] personally examined A.B. of [insert residence and profession or occupation, if any], and that the said A.B. is a lunatic and a proper person to be taken charge of and detained under care and treatment, and that I have formed this opinion upon the following grounds, viz. :—

1. Facts indicating insanity observed by myself [here state the facts].
2. Other facts (if any) indicating insanity communicated to me by others [here state the information and from whom].

The two Medical Practitioners who sign the certificates shall not be in partnership with, or be the father, son, or brother of, or an assistant to the other, and each of whom shall separately from the other have personally examined the person to whom such certificate shall relate not more than seven clear days previously to the reception of such person into such asylum, hospital, or licensed house ; and such order as aforesaid may be signed before or after such medical certificates or either of them. Any person not found lunatic by inquisition may, under special circumstances preventing the examination of such person by two Medical Practitioners, be received into any asylum or licensed house upon the certificate of one Medical Practitioner alone, provided that the statement accompanying such order set forth the special circumstances which prevent the examination of such person by two Medical Practitioners ; but in every such case two other such certificates shall within three clear days after the reception of such patient into such asylum or licensed house be signed by two other Medical Practitioners according to the aforesaid provisions. Every Medical Practitioner signing any certificate shall specify therein the facts upon which he shall have formed his opinion that the person to whom such certificate relates is a lunatic, distinguishing in such certificate facts observed by himself from facts communicated to him by others ; and no person shall be received into any asylum or licensed house under any such certificate which is founded only upon facts communicated by others.

Who not to Sign Certificates.—No Medical Practitioner who or whose father, brother, son, or other relative, or partner, or assistant, shall sign the order for the reception of a patient into an asylum or licensed house, or be the Superintendent of, an officer in, or a Medical Officer of an asylum or hospital, or wholly or partly the proprietor or the mortgagee or lessee or the superintendent of, or an officer or a regular professional attendant in a licensed house, or who shall receive a percentage on, or otherwise be interested in the payments to be made by or on account of any patient received into an asylum, hospital, or licensed house, shall sign any order or certificate for the reception of a patient into any asylum, hospital, or licensed house ; and no Medical Practitioner shall himself or by his servants, or agents, receive to board or lodge in any licensed house, or take the charge or care of any person upon or under any Medical Certificate signed by himself or his father, brother, son, or other relative or partner or assistant ; and no Medical Practitioner having signed any certificate for the reception of any person into a licensed house shall be the regular professional attendant of such person while under care or charge under such certificate.

Medical Statement.—Every Medical Practitioner signing any certificate for the reception of a patient into an asylum, hospital, or licensed house, shall make and sign a statement in writing of the previous treatment of the patient to whom such certificate shall relate, and such statement shall be delivered to the person receiving the patient into an asylum, hospital, or licensed house.

Medical Certificates may be Amended.—If after the reception of any lunatic into any asylum or licensed house it appear that either of the medical certificates upon which he shall have been received is in any respect incorrect or defective, such medical

certificate may be amended by and on the sole authority of the person or persons signing the same, at any time within fourteen days next after the reception of such lunatic, but no such amendment shall have any force or effect unless the same shall receive the sanction in writing under the hand of the Chief Secretary.

Criminal Lunatics.—If any person, while imprisoned or detained in gaol or any other place of imprisonment, shall appear to be insane, any two justices may call to their assistance any two Medical Practitioners, and inquire with their aid as to the insanity of such person, and on receipt of a joint certificate according to the annexed form, the Chief Secretary may direct by warrant that such person be removed to some Lunatic Asylum.

Release of Criminal Lunatics.—If upon an examination it shall appear to two or more Medical Practitioners that any person detained in an asylum has become of sound mind and may be suffered to go at large with safety, they shall sign the following certificate :—

We, the undersigned, A.B. and C.D., Medical Practitioners, having been present at the examination by two Justices of, and having then viewed and examined Y.Z., a person in custody at the time of the coming into operation of the "*Lunacy Statute*," by virtue of a warrant of commitment issued under an Act theretofore in force relating to lunatics, and it appearing to us that the said Y.Z. is not an insane person or a dangerous lunatic, and may be suffered to go at large with safety, do hereby certify that the said Y.Z. is not an insane person or a dangerous lunatic, and may be suffered to go at large with safety.

To E.F. [or E.F. and G.H.] the Visiting Justices [or Justices or other authorities] of the gaol [or other place] at in which the said Y.Z. is in custody.

VISITATION OF LUNATIC ASYLUMS AND LICENSED HOUSES.

Inspector and Official Visitors.—The Governor in Council may appoint an Inspector or a Deputy-Inspector, and also one or more Official Visitors of asylums, hospitals, or licensed houses in Victoria who shall be Justices of the Peace.

Visits to Asylums.—Every asylum and hospital, and every licensed house for the reception of lunatics shall, without any previous notice, as often as the Inspector or an Official Visitor think fit, and at least once in every three months be visited by the Inspector and an Official Visitor, and also at such other times as the Chief Secretary shall direct.

THE INEBRIATES' ACT (1872).

(36 Vic., No. 449.)

Inebriates may be Committed.—Upon the application of any relation or friend of any person addicted to the habitual use, in excess, of intoxicating drinks, any Judge of a County Court may summon such person to appear before him, and order

such person to be conveyed to some Retreat for any term not exceeding twelve months, if two Medical Practitioners make statutory declarations to the following effect :—

I, _____ in the Colony of Victoria, do solemnly and sincerely declare—(1.) That I am a legally-qualified Medical Practitioner. (2.) That I have seen and examined _____ of _____ who is at present suffering from the habitual use, in excess, of intoxicating drinks. (3.) That I am of opinion that the said _____ requires curative treatment in a retreat, as defined in "*The Inebriates' Act, 1872.*"

And I make this solemn declaration, conscientiously believing the same to be true, and by virtue of the provisions of an Act of Parliament of Victoria rendering persons making a false declaration punishable for wilful and corrupt perjury.

REGISTRATION OF DEATHS (1865).

(28 Vic., No. 246.)

Persons present at Death to give Particulars of Death.—Every person present at the death, or in attendance during the last illness of any person dying in Victoria, or in the case of the death, illness, inability, or default of all such persons, the occupier of the house or tenement in which any death shall have happened, shall, within sixty days next after the day of such death, give notice and information to the Deputy-Registrar of the particulars required to be known and registered touching the death of such person. And every person by whom the information contained in any register of deaths shall have been given, shall, at the time of giving such information, sign or attest his name, description, and place of abode, in the register, and no register or certificate of register of deaths shall be given in evidence, which shall not be signed or attested by some person professing to be the informant.

Penalties.—Every person hereby required who shall refuse or without reasonable cause neglect to give such notice or information as aforesaid, either by himself or a duly authorised agent, shall for every such offence forfeit a sum not exceeding Ten Pounds. And every person who shall wilfully make, or cause to be made, for the purpose of being inserted in any register of deaths, any false statement touching any of the particulars hereby required to be known and registered, shall be subject to the same pains and penalties as if he were guilty of perjury.

Accidental Errors.—No person charged with the duty of registering any death, who shall discover any error to have been committed in the form or substance of any such entry, shall be deemed to be guilty of any offence, or to be liable to any penalties, if, within six months next after the discovery of any such error, in the presence of the inmate of the house where the death registered may have occurred, or in case of the death or absence of the respective parties, then in the presence of the Deputy Registrar or of two credible witnesses who shall respectively attest the same, he shall correct the erroneous entry according to the truth of the case by entry in the margin, without any alteration of the original entry, and shall sign the marginal entry and add thereunto the day of the month and year when such correction shall be made, and shall make the like marginal entry attested in like manner in the form to be transmitted, by him, or in case such last-mentioned form shall have been already transmitted, shall make and transmit in like manner a separate certified copy of the original erroneous entry and of the marginal correction therein made.

THE CONSERVATION OF PUBLIC HEALTH ACT (1878).

(42 Vic., No. 631.)

Hospitals.—The Governor may appoint any hospital receiving aid from the Consolidated Revenue, or any ward thereof, a place in which persons may, under this Act, be placed for medical treatment.

Diseased Female to place herself in Hospital.—Upon complaint made on oath by a sergeant of police, or by an officer of a higher rank in the police force, that a female is reputed to be a common prostitute, and he has reason to believe that she is

suffering from the disease, a police magistrate may direct such female to place herself in a hospital to be named, for medical treatment, unless she can prove by the evidence of some legally-qualified Medical Practitioner that she is free of disease.

Female to be Detained until Cured.—Any female placed in a hospital under warrant as aforesaid, shall be there detained for medical treatment until the medical officer in charge of such hospital shall give her a certificate in writing that she is cured of the disease, and may safely be discharged from such hospital, provided that the term for which such female shall be detained shall not exceed three months.

Female may Appeal for her Discharge.—If any female detained in a hospital for medical treatment as aforesaid shall consider herself entitled to be discharged therefrom, and the medical officer in charge of the hospital refuses or neglects to give her a certificate as aforesaid, such female shall, at her request, be conveyed before a police magistrate, who, on proof of her being free from the disease, shall order her to be discharged from such hospital.

PUBLIC HEALTH AMENDMENT STATUTE, 1883.

(47 Vic., No. 782.)

CENTRAL AND LOCAL BOARDS OF HEALTH.

Appointment of Central Board.—The Governor in Council may appoint any number of persons not exceeding nine to be called the Central Board of Health; and such board shall have and execute under the direction of the Minister all the powers and duties vested in or imposed upon such board by this Act; and the Governor in Council may from time to time at his pleasure remove all or any of the persons so appointed and appoint others in their stead; and the powers and duties vested in the said board may be exercised and executed by a quorum thereof, of not less than five members.

President or Chairman of Central Board.—The Governor in Council shall appoint one of the members of the Central Board to be the President thereof. In the event of the absence of the President from any meeting, the members present shall elect one of their number to be Chairman of such meeting; and at all meetings of the said board the President or Chairman shall have a vote and in case of an equality of votes shall also have a casting vote; and during any vacancy in the said board whether of the office of President or not, the continuing members or member may act as if no vacancy had occurred.

Officers of Central Board.—The Governor in Council may appoint and remove a Secretary, Inspectors, and such other officers of the Central Board of Health as may be deemed necessary for the purposes of this Act, and the qualifications of every such officer shall be approved of by the said board before his appointment.

Documents Signed by Secretary to be Evidence.—All documents whatever purporting to be issued or written by or under the direction of the Central Board and purporting to be signed by the Secretary of the said board shall be received as evidence in all courts of law, and shall be deemed to be issued or written by or under the direction of the said board without further proof unless the contrary be shown.

Local Boards of Health.—The members of the Municipal Council for the time being of each city, town, borough, and shire, shall constitute the Local Boards of Health of such city, town, borough, and shire respectively.

Officers of Health.—Each local board shall appoint, subject to the approval of the Central Board of Health, a legally-qualified Medical Practitioner as officer of health of such local board's district, and may remove any such officer which such local board have appointed, and shall thereupon appoint another in his stead. Such officer of health shall be paid a sum as remuneration for his services, being not less than Ten pounds for any year, as such local board fix, and shall perform such duties and in such manner as such local board may from time to time direct, and also such as are specially prescribed by any minute or order addressed by the Central Board to such local board.

The local boards of two or more contiguous districts may with the approval of the Central Board join in the appointment of an Officer of Health, and in directing the duties to be performed by such officer, and in remunerating him to an amount not less than that hereinbefore mentioned.

If any local board do not appoint or join in appointing an Officer of Health within two months from the coming into operation of this Act, or from the occurrence of a vacancy in such office, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council upon a recom-

mendation from the Central Board to appoint an Officer of Health for the district of such local board, and also to fix a sum as the amount of remuneration not less than that hereinbefore mentioned which shall be paid to such Officer of Health by the local board and in default of payment may be recovered by action of debt by such officer in any court of competent jurisdiction.

Inspectors to carry out Instructions of Officer of Health.—Officers of Health are hereby empowered to give to any Inspector appointed by the local board of health of their respective districts such directions and instructions as such officers may deem necessary from time to time for the due execution of this Act.

Officers of Health to have powers of Inspectors.—Officers of Health shall in addition to the powers conferred on such officers by this Act have all the powers hereby conferred on any Inspector appointed by the local board of health of their respective districts.

Local Boards to appoint Officers.—The local Boards of Health shall from time to time appoint such Officers, Inspectors, and Servants, as may be necessary for the due carrying out of the provisions of this Act, and shall make such rules specifying the duties and conduct of such Officers, Inspectors, and Servants, as they think necessary.

No Officer to be Concerned in Contract.—No Member, Officer, Inspector, or Servant of the Central Board or of any local board shall be concerned or interested, directly or indirectly, in any bargain or contract entered into by such central or local board respectively; and if any such Member, Officer, Inspector, or Servant is so concerned or interested, or if any such Member, Officer, Inspector, or Servant under colour of his office or employment exact, take, or accept any fee or reward whatsoever other than his proper salary, wages, remuneration and allowances, he shall be incapable of afterwards holding or continuing in any office or employment under this Act, and shall for each such offence incur a penalty not exceeding Fifty pounds.

PREVENTION OF ADULTERATION OF ARTICLES OF FOOD OR DRINK AND OF THE SALE OF UNWHOLESOME FOOD OR DRINK.

Power to Purchaser of an Article of Food to have it Analysed.—Any purchaser of an article of food or of a drug shall be entitled on payment to the analyst, appointed under this Act, of a sum not exceeding Ten shillings and sixpence to have such article analysed by such analyst, and to receive from him a certificate of the result of his analysis.

Officer may obtain a Sample of Food or Drug to submit to Analyst.—Any officer of the Central Board or of any local board, or any member of the police force may at the cost of the Central Board or of the local board procure any article of food or drugs, and if he suspect the same to have been sold to him contrary to any provision of this Act shall submit the same to be analysed by the analyst of the place, being a district in which he then is, or if there be no such analyst then acting for such place to the analyst of any district where there is an analyst appointed under this Act, and such analyst shall upon receiving payment, as is provided in the last section, with all convenient speed analyse the same and give a certificate to such officer or member of the police force, wherein he shall specify the result of the analysis.

Provision for dealing with the Sample when Purchased.—The person purchasing any article with the intention of submitting the same to analysis shall, after the purchase has been completed, forthwith notify to the seller, or his agent selling the article his intention to have the same analysed by the public analyst and shall offer to divide the article into three parts to be then and there separated, and each part to be marked and sealed or fastened up in such manner as its nature will permit, and shall, if required to do so, proceed accordingly and shall deliver one of the parts to the seller or his agent. He shall afterwards retain one of the said parts for future comparison and submit the third part, if he deems it right to have the article analysed, to the analyst.

Provision when Sample is not Divided.—If the seller or his agent do not accept the offer of the purchaser to divide the article purchased in his presence, the analyst receiving the article for analysis shall divide the same into two parts, and shall seal or fasten up one of those parts, and shall cause it to be delivered either upon receipt of the sample or when he supplies his certificate to the purchaser, who shall retain the same for production, in case proceedings are afterwards taken in the matter.

Quarterly Report of the Analyst.—Every analyst shall report quarterly to the local board appointing him the number of articles analysed by him under this Act during the foregoing quarter and shall specify the result of each analysis and the

sum paid to him in respect thereof, and such report shall be presented at the next meeting of the local board appointing such analyst, and every such local board shall annually transmit to the Central Board, at such time and in such form as the said board directs, a certified copy of such quarterly report.

PROVISIONS AGAINST INFECTION.

Isolating Houses, &c.—Upon proof by the certificate in writing of the Officer of Health of the district and of two other duly-qualified Medical Practitioners that small-pox, cholera, or any other malignant, infectious, or contagious disease exists within a district, that there is danger that the same may spread, and that to prevent the spreading thereof it is necessary to the public safety that power should be given to isolate any tenements, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to make an order empowering and directing such persons as the Central Board may for that purpose appoint, to stop the traffic into or through any streets, thoroughfares, or places, whether public or private, which the Central Board shall specify, and to limit or prevent ingress, egress, or regress of any persons to or from any house or premises within the streets, thoroughfares, or places so specified, for so long as shall seem to the Central Board necessary for the public safety, and no proceedings at law or otherwise shall be taken or lie against any person for anything done in conformity with such order and direction.

Infectious Diseases to be Reported.—The legally-qualified Medical Practitioner in attendance at any house in which there is any person suffering from any smallpox, cholera, plague, yellow fever, or other malignant, infectious, or contagious disease, shall furnish to the occupier of such house a certificate that there is in such house a person suffering from such disease, and such occupier shall thereupon report the existence of such disease in such house to the local Board of Health not later than twenty-four hours after the receipt of such certificate; and if any person fails to comply with the provisions of this section, he shall be deemed to be guilty of an offence under this Act and shall on conviction thereof be liable to a penalty not exceeding Fifty pounds for every such offence.

Premises to be cleansed and disinfected.—Where the Officer of Health or any two legally-qualified Medical Practitioners certify in writing to the local Board of Health that the cleansing and disinfecting of any house or part thereof or of any articles therein likely to retain infection would tend to prevent or check infectious disease, it shall be the duty of such board to give notice in writing to the owner or occupier of such house or part thereof requiring him to cleanse and disinfect the same or any articles therein within a time specified in such notice.

Where the owner or occupier is from poverty or otherwise unable in the opinion of the local board effectually to carry out the requirements of this section, such board may disinfect such house or part thereof or any articles therein likely to retain infection, and may defray any expenses so incurred.

Destruction of infected bedding, &c.—Any local board may direct the destruction of any bedding, clothing, or other articles which in their opinion have been exposed to infection from any dangerous infectious or contagious disease, and may give compensation for the same.

Removal of infected Persons.—Where any hospital for the reception of the sick is provided within the district of a local board or within a convenient distance of such district, any person who is suffering from any dangerous infectious or contagious disease, and is without proper lodging or accommodation, or lodged in a room occupied by more than one family, or is on board any ship or vessel, may on a certificate signed by a legally-qualified Medical Practitioner and with the consent of the superintending body of such hospital, be removed by order of any justice to such hospital at the cost of the local board, and any person so suffering who is lodged in any common lodging-house may with the like consent and on a like certificate be so removed by order of the local board. Any order under this section may be addressed to such officer of the local board as the justice or local board making the same may think expedient; and any person who wilfully disobeys or obstructs the execution of such order shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

NUISANCES.

Duty of Local Board to complain to Justice of nuisance arising from offensive trade.—Where any noxious or offensive trade, business, or manufacture, whether established before or after the coming into operation of this Act; or any abattoir or slaughter-house, or any manufactory, building, or place used for any trade, business, process, or manufacture whatsoever, causing effluvia, offensive fumes, vapours, or gases, or discharging dust, foul liquid, or other impurity, is certified to any local board of health by their Officer of Health or by any two legally-qualified Medical Practitioners,

or by any ten inhabitants of the district, of such local board to be a nuisance, or injurious to the health of any of the inhabitants of the district, such local board shall cause complaint to be made before a justice, who may summon the person by or on whose behalf the trade so complained of is carried on to appear before a court of summary jurisdiction; and the person so offending (being the owner or occupier of the premises, or being a foreman, or other person employed by such owner or occupier) shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds, nor less than Forty shillings, and on a second and any subsequent conviction to a penalty double the amount of the penalty imposed for the last preceding conviction, but the highest amount of such penalty shall not in any case exceed the sum of Two hundred pounds. Provided that the court may suspend its final determination on condition that the person complained of undertakes to adopt within a reasonable time such means as the court may deem to be practicable and order to be carried into effect for abating such nuisance or mitigating or preventing the injurious effects thereof.

Danger to Health from Premises in a Filthy State.—If upon the certificate of the Officer of Health, or of any one or more duly-qualified Medical Practitioners, or of any ten or more persons residing in the neighbourhood, it appears to any local board or to any two justices, that any abattoir or slaughter-house, or any shop, building, stall, or place kept or used for the sale of butchers' meat, or any place used for carrying on the business of a soap boiler, tallow melter, candle maker, starch manufacturer, blood boiler, bone boiler, tripe boiler, boiler of refuse or animal matter, tanner, currier, or fellmonger, or gas manufacturer, or the premises occupied with the same or appurtenant thereto, in any city, town, borough, shire, or district, is or are in such a filthy state as to be a nuisance or offensive to persons residing in the neighbourhood, or in such an unwholesome condition that the health of any person is likely to be endangered thereby, or that the white-washing, cleansing, ventilating, or purifying of any such place, premises, or appurtenances, would tend to prevent or check infectious, contagious, or epidemic disease, such local board or justices may give or cause to be given notice to the owner or occupier of such place or premises to whitewash, cleanse, ventilate, or purify the same as the case may require; and such notice may be served by leaving a copy thereof with any person found on the premises, or by affixing a copy thereof on a conspicuous part of the place or premises directed to be whitewashed, cleansed, ventilated, or purified as aforesaid.

DWELLING-HOUSES.

Houses, &c., may be declared unfit for Human Habitation.—Whenever any Officer of Health or Inspector of the Central Board or of any local board, or any two legally-qualified Medical Practitioners certify in writing to a local board that any house or other building within their respective jurisdictions or any part thereof is unfit or unsafe for human occupation or habitation, such local board may by an order declare that such house or building or part thereof shall not after a time specified in such order be occupied or inhabited by any person, and may cause such order or a copy thereof to be affixed to some conspicuous part of such house or building before the expiration of the time mentioned in the order.

Overcrowding in Houses.—Upon the certificate of the Officer of Health or of any two legally-qualified Medical Practitioners that any house or building, or any part thereof, is so overcrowded as to be dangerous or prejudicial to the health of the inmates or inhabitants or persons employed therein, the local board shall cause complaint to be made before any justice, who may summon before any two justices the person permitting such overcrowding; and the justices shall thereupon make such order as they may think fit to abate such overcrowding; and the person permitting such overcrowding shall forfeit a sum not exceeding Five pounds nor less than Twenty shillings.

THE SALE AND USE OF POISONS ACT (1876).

(40 Vic., No. 559)

Poisons Defined.—The following drugs, viz.—Arsenic and its preparations, and all solutions or admixtures thereof (except green and other coloured pigments); Prussic acid and its preparations; Strychnine and its preparations, and all solutions or admixtures thereof; Savin and its oil; Ergot of rye and its preparations; Chloral hydrate; all poisonous vegetable alkaloids and their salts, and solutions or admixtures thereof; Aconite and its preparations; Tartar emetic; Corrosive sublimate and its preparations; Cantharides; Cyanide of potassium and all Metallic cyanides; Vermin killers, if preparations of any of the poisons aforesaid, shall be deemed poisons within the meaning of this Act.

Unqualified Persons not Allowed to Sell Poisons.—Every person other than a legally-qualified Medical Practitioner or a registered pharmaceutical chemist, who shall sell any poison, shall, unless he hold a certificate from the Pharmacy Board of Victoria, be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty Pounds.

Regulations for Sale of Poisons.—No person shall sell any of the aforesaid poisons to any person who is under 18 years of age, or who is unknown to the vendor, unless the purchaser is introduced by some person known to the seller, and every seller shall before delivery make an entry in the "Poison Book" of (1.) Date of sale; (2.) Name and address of purchaser; (3.) Name and quantity of article; (4.) Purpose for which it is wanted; signed by the purchaser, and whenever required by a witness, and if the purchaser is unable to write, the seller shall add the words "Purchaser cannot write." Sales and purchase of poisons may be made by correspondence, the letter ordering the same shall be preserved by the vendor, and a memorandum of the date of the said letter, by whom it was written, and the quantity and particulars of the poison therein ordered, shall be entered in the said book; and no person shall sell poison so ordered to any person with whose signature he is not acquainted, unless such signature shall have been witnessed by a justice, clergyman, or public officer, or be authenticated by some person known to the vendor.

Poison to be Marked.—No person shall sell any poison, either by wholesale or retail, unless the bottle or other vessel, wrapper or cover, box or case, immediately containing the same, bears thereon the word Poison, printed conspicuously, together with the name of the article, and the name and address of the seller thereof.

Arsenic and Strychnine must be Coloured.—Arsenic or strychnine, or any preparation of the same respectively, shall be mixed before the sale, with soot in the proportion of one ounce of soot at least to one pound of arsenic, and in the case of strychnine with Armenian bole, or other red colouring matter unless the purchaser states that such arsenic or strychnine, or any preparation thereof respectively, is required for some purpose for which such admixture would render it unfit.

Second Part of Poisons.—The following articles must be labelled with name of article, the word "Poison," and name and address of seller, viz.—Oxalic acid; Chloroform; Belladonna and its preparations; Chloral hydrate, solutions and preparations of; Opium, and all preparations of opium or of poppies; Essential oil of almonds, unless deprived of its prussic acid; Red oxide of mercury, or red precipitate; Ammoniated mercury, or white precipitate; the tincture and all vesicating liquid preparations of Cantharides; Vermin killers containing poisons, not mentioned in the former list.

Penalties.—If any person shall sell any poison contrary to the provisions of this Act, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten Pounds.

Exemptions.—This Act shall not extend to the sale of any poison when made up as a medicine, according to the prescription of a legally-qualified Medical Practitioner, or in the form of homœopathic medicine, unless in the crude state, mother tincture, or of a greater strength than the third decimal potency; nor to the sale of patent or proprietary medicines; nor to the sale of photographic materials for the purpose of photography; nor to the sale of medicines dispensed by veterinary surgeons for animals under their treatment; nor to the sale of fly poison papers, or packets of poisonous mixtures, except poisoned seed for the destruction of vermin; nor to any sales by wholesale dealers, if an order in writing, signed by the purchaser, shall be given for the supply of the same, provided that all such sales shall be entered in a book, and that the bottle or other vessel, wrapper or cover, box or case immediately containing the poison, be labelled as required by this Act.

WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

THE MEDICAL ORDINANCE (1869).

(33 Vic., No. 8).

Medical Board.—The Governor in Council may appoint a board consisting of not less than three Members being of the medical profession, one of whom shall be appointed President, under the style and description of "The Medical Board," and the Governor may in like manner remove the said Members or any of them.

Registration.—Every person, not registered under the provisions of the Imperial Medical Act, 21 and 22 Vic., cap. 90, but possessed of any one or more of the qualifications described in the said Imperial "Medical Act, 1858," desirous of being registered under this Ordinance, shall submit his degree, diploma, certificate or other proof for the examination and approval of the said Medical Board, and shall thereupon obtain from the said Medical Board a certificate of his being qualified to be registered as a general practitioner.

Board may grant a Certificate without production of Diploma.—The said Medical Board may, by special orders, dispense with the production of such degree, diploma, certificate or other proof as aforesaid, and on due proof to the satisfaction of such Board of his qualification, skill, and ability to practise medicine or surgery may, in their discretion, grant to any person a certificate of his being qualified to be registered as a Medical Practitioner.

Fee for Registration.—Every person who is registered under the Imperial Medical Act, 21 and 22 Vic., cap. 90, and every person who shall obtain a certificate as aforesaid from the said local Medical Board shall, on payment of a fee of one guinea, be entitled to be registered on producing to the Colonial Secretary the document conferring or evidencing the qualification or each of the qualifications in respect whereof he seeks to be so registered, or upon transmitting by post to the said Colonial Secretary information of his name and address, and evidence of the qualification or qualifications in respect whereof he seeks to be registered, and of the time or times at which the same was or were respectively obtained. Provided, nevertheless, any person who was actually practising medicine in this colony before first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, shall also on payment of such fee as aforesaid, be entitled to be registered on producing to the Colonial Secretary a declaration, signed by him, or upon transmitting to the Colonial Secretary information of his name and address and enclosing such declaration.

Name may be Erased.—The Colonial Secretary may write a letter to any registered person, addressed to him according to his address on the register, to enquire whether he has ceased to practice, or has changed his residence, and if no answer shall be returned to such letter within the space of six months from the sending of the letter, the name of such person may be erased from the register; provided always that the same may be restored by direction of the Medical Board aforesaid.

Evidence of Qualification to be given.—No qualification shall be entered in the register, either on the first registration or by way of addition to a registered name, unless the Colonial Secretary be satisfied by the proper evidence that the person claiming is entitled to it; and any appeal from the decision of the Colonial Secretary may be decided by the said Medical Board, and any entry which shall be proved to the satisfaction of the said Medical Board to have been fraudulently or incorrectly made, may be erased from the register by order in writing of such Board.

None but Registered Persons may Sue.—No person shall be entitled to recover any charges in any court of law for any medical or surgical advice, attendance, or for the performance of any operation, or for any medicine which he shall have both prescribed and supplied, unless he shall prove upon the trial that he is registered under this ordinance.

Legally Qualified Medical Practitioner.—The words "legally-qualified Medical Practitioner," or "duly qualified Medical Practitioner," or any words importing a person recognised by law as a Medical Practitioner or member of the medical profession, when used in any ordinance or Act, shall be construed to mean a person registered under this ordinance.

Medical Certificate.—No certificate required by law from any Medical Practitioner shall be valid unless the person signing the same shall be registered under this ordinance.

Obtaining Registration by False Representations.—If any person shall wilfully procure, or attempt to procure himself to be registered under this ordinance by any false or fraudulent representation or declaration, either verbally or in writing, every such person so offending, and every person aiding and assisting him therein shall be liable to be imprisoned for any term not exceeding twelve calendar months.

Falsely Pretending to be a Registered Person.—Any person who shall wilfully and falsely pretend to be, or take or use the name or title of a Physician, Doctor of Medicine, Licentiate in Medicine or Surgery, Bachelor of Medicine, Surgeon, General Practitioner or Apothecary, or any name, title, addition, or description implying that he is registered under this ordinance, or that he is recognized by law as a Physician or Surgeon, or Licentiate in Medicine or Surgery, or a Practitioner in Medicine, or an Apothecary, shall pay a sum not exceeding Fifty Pounds.

Chemists not to be affected.—Nothing in this ordinance contained shall in any way affect Chemists and Druggists and Dentists.

THE VACCINATION ACT (1878).

(42 Vic., No. 13).

Governor to appoint Officers.—The Governor shall appoint a Superintendent of Vaccination and such Public Vaccinators as may be required for performing the duties prescribed by this Act.

Duty of Superintendent.—It shall be the duty of the Superintendent of Vaccination so take measures for the regular supply of vaccine virus to the several Public Vaccinators, and to superintend the distribution of the same.

Urban, Suburban, and Rural Districts.—The Governor in Council shall from time to time declare such districts as he may see fit, being within a radius of five miles of the place of residence of a Public Vaccinator, to be "urban districts," for the purposes of this Act; and such districts, being within a radius of twenty miles of the place of residence of a Public Vaccinator, to be "suburban districts;" all other parts of the colony, not included in any urban or suburban district, shall be deemed to be a "rural district," for the purposes of this Act.

Children to be Vaccinated.—The parent of every child which may hereafter be brought to live in any urban or suburban district of the colony, being of the age of seven years or under, not having been already vaccinated, shall within the prescribed period (this means *three* months in the case of any child within an urban district, and *six* months within any suburban district) after its arrival in such district of the colony—and the parent or guardian of every child that may be born in any urban or suburban district after the passing of this Act, shall, within the prescribed period after its birth, take it or cause it to be taken to any Public Vaccinator, who is, without fee, to vaccinate such child.

Travelling Public Vaccinators.—The Governor may appoint some person to travel through any rural district of the colony as a Public Vaccinator, and to assign him such travelling expenses and remuneration as he may see fit. Any such person shall send to any parent or other person having the custody of any child that may be of the age of seven years or under, and which has not been vaccinated, notice that he will be at a place to be named in such notice, not being more than seven miles distant from the place of residence of such parent or other person as aforesaid, on a day and at an hour to be therein named, and requiring such parent or other person as aforesaid, to have such child at such place on the day and at the hour appointed, and the said Public Vaccinator shall, without fee, vaccinate the children brought to him in pursuance of the said notice.

Inspection of Vaccination.—This provision is the same as in the South Australian Vaccination Act (see page 32).

Vaccination and Inspection Repeated.—Such vaccination and inspection shall be repeated, until either the operation shall have proved successful, or the Public Vaccinator, having three times unsuccessfully vaccinated any child, shall find that such child is insusceptible of successful vaccination, and shall give the parent or other person as aforesaid a certificate to that effect.

Unfitness for Vaccination.—This provision is the same as in the Vaccination Act for South Australia (see page 32).

Successive Certificates.—At or before the end of any such period of two months, the parent or such person as aforesaid shall apply to a Public Vaccinator for a renewal of the said certificate as aforesaid, and the said Public Vaccinator shall then, if satisfied that the said child is still in a state unfit for vaccination, renew the said certificate.

Not Susceptible of Successful Vaccination.—If any such Public Vaccinator, or other person aforesaid, shall find that a child who has been three times unsuccessfully vaccinated is insusceptible of successful vaccination, or that a child brought to him for vaccination has already had the Small-pox, he shall deliver to the parent or other person as aforesaid a certificate under his hand, exempting such child from the provisions of this Act, and shall also transmit a copy of the same to the District Registrar of Births and Deaths in the district within which the birth of such child was registered.

Certificates of Successful Vaccination.—Every public Vaccinator, or other person who shall have inspected the vaccination of any child, and shall have ascertained that the same has been successful, shall within twenty-one days after such inspection transmit by post or otherwise to the District-Registrar of the district as aforesaid, a certificate, certifying that the said child has been successfully vaccinated, and upon request shall deliver a duplicate thereof to the parent or other person as aforesaid.

Registered Medical Practitioners may Vaccinate.—Any parent or other person may take any child to be vaccinated by a duly qualified Medical Practitioner instead of a Public Vaccinator; and if any such Medical Practitioner shall undertake such vaccination, he shall be liable to perform all the duties in connection with such vaccination which are required by this Act to be performed by the Public Vaccinator, and shall further be vested with the powers and authority conferred by this Act on such Public Vaccinator in respect to such vaccination performed by him; provided, always, that no person, other than a Public Vaccinator, shall be entitled to receive any fee from public funds in respect of any vaccination.

Persons above seven years of age to be Vaccinated.—The Governor may make rules and regulations as to the terms on which Public Vaccinators shall be bound to vaccinate persons above the age of seven years, and as to the conditions on which the Public Vaccinators shall be entitled to receive a fee from public funds in respect of any such vaccination; and it shall be the duty of any Public Vaccinator, without fee, and subject to such rules and regulations, to vaccinate any person above the age of seven years, who may present himself for the purpose, and to subsequently examine, and if necessary to re-vaccinate, such person in the manner provided in the case of children under the age of seven years; and to send in to the Superintendent of vaccination, periodically, returns showing the names and ages of the persons so vaccinated, together with such other particulars as may be required by the rules and regulations aforesaid.

Inoculating with Small-pox.—Any person who shall inoculate any person with the Small-pox matter or virus, shall pay any sum not exceeding Fifty Pounds, or at the discretion of the Justices be imprisoned with or without hard labour for any term not exceeding six calendar months.

Public Vaccinator may demand age of any Child.—Any Public Vaccinator may inquire of the parent or other person having custody of any child, whose age apparently does not exceed seven years, the age of such child, and if it appear from the answer or otherwise, that any child is of an age not exceeding seven years, it shall be lawful for such Public Vaccinator to examine such child to see whether it has been vaccinated or not; and unless such Public Vaccinator is satisfied on such examination that such child has been successfully vaccinated, he shall forthwith vaccinate such child, and shall subsequently inspect, and, if necessary, re-vaccinate and do all things in accordance with the provisions of this Act applicable to the case of a child brought for vaccination to any Public Vaccinator.

Information to be authorised by the Superintendent.—No information shall be received in respect of any offence punishable under this Act, unless the informant satisfies the Justice or Justices that the same is laid with the approval and consent of the Superintendent of vaccination.

THE LUNACY ACT (1871).

(34 Vic., No. 9).

CERTIFICATES IN LUNACY.

Medical Certificates.—Any pauper deemed to be a lunatic, or any dangerous lunatic, may be conveyed to and detained in a Lunatic Asylum upon a Medical Certificate signed by one Medical Practitioner, and any person, not being a pauper, on a Medical Certificate of two Medical Practitioners, according to the following form:—

B. of _____ (here insert residence and profession or occupation (if any) and that the said A. B. is a lunatic (or an idiot or a person of

unsound mind) and a proper person to be taken charge of, and detained under care and treatment; and that I have formed this opinion on the following grounds, viz:—
 1.—Facts indicating insanity observed by myself (*here state the facts*). 2. Other facts (if any) indicating insanity communicated to me by others (*here state the information, and from whom obtained*)

Of the two Medical Practitioners in the latter case, neither of whom shall be in partnership with, or an assistant to the other; and each of whom shall, separately from the other, have personally examined the person to whom it relates, not more than seven clear days previous to the reception of such person into such asylum; and such order as aforesaid may be signed before or after the medical certificates, or either of them. Provided, always, that any person may, under special circumstances preventing the examination of such person by two Medical Practitioners as aforesaid, be received into any asylum upon the certificate of one Medical Practitioner alone, if the statement accompanying such order set forth the special circumstances which prevented the examination of such person by two Medical Practitioners; but in every such case two other such certificates shall, within three clear days after the reception of such patient into such asylum, be signed by two other Medical Practitioners, not in partnership with or an assistant to the other, or the Medical Practitioner who signed the certificate upon which the patient was received, and who shall within such time, separately from the other of them, have personally examined the person so received as a lunatic.

Every Medical Practitioner signing any certificate under this Act, shall specify therein the facts upon which he has formed his opinion that the person to whom such certificate relates is a lunatic, an idiot, or a person of unsound mind; distinguishing, in such certificate, facts observed by himself from facts communicated to him by others; and no person shall be received into any asylum under any certificate which purports to be founded only on facts communicated by others.

If after the reception of any lunatic into any asylum, it shall appear that the medical certificate, or (if more than one) both or either of the medical certificates upon which he was received, is or are in any respect incorrect or defective, such medical certificate or certificates may be amended by the person or persons signing the same, within fourteen days next after the reception of such lunatic; provided, nevertheless, that no such amendment shall have any force or effect, unless the same shall receive the sanction of one or more of the visitors.

When any medical certificate upon which a patient has been received into any asylum, or any of such certificates, is deemed by the visitors incorrect or defective, and the same is or are not duly amended to their satisfaction within fourteen days next after the reception of such patient, the visitors, or any two of them, may forthwith order the discharge of such patient.

Discharge of Patients.—The resident or superintending Medical Officer, or any two of the visitors of any asylum (of whom the Colonial Surgeon shall be one), on the receipt of a certificate signed by two Medical Practitioners, that any person contained therein as a dangerous lunatic is no longer a dangerous lunatic, and may be suffered to go at large with safety (such certificate setting forth that such person has been personally examined by the Medical Practitioner signing the same), may order such person to be forthwith discharged.

Penalty for False Certificate.—Any Medical Practitioner who shall sign any certificate contrary to the provisions of this Act shall for every such offence forfeit any sum not exceeding Twenty Pounds; and any Medical Practitioner who shall falsely state or certify anything in any certificate under this Act, and any person who shall sign any certificate under this Act, in which he shall be described as a Medical Practitioner, not being a Medical Practitioner within the meaning of this Act, shall be guilty of a misdemeanour.

BOARD OF VISITORS.

Appointment of Visitors.—Visitors of each asylum shall be appointed by the Governor, and shall continue in office till the first Monday in January in the year next following the date of their appointment; provided, that after the expiration of the term for which any visitor is appointed, he shall be eligible for appointment for the next ensuing year; and so on from year to year, unless he shall have failed to make six visits during his year of office to such asylum in his official capacity.

Duty of Visitors.—Every asylum shall be visited once every week, at least, by some one or more of the visitors, who shall enquire what occupation or amusements are provided for the patients, and the result thereof; and whether there has been adopted any system of non-coercion, and, if so, the result thereof; and also as to the classification of patients, and the condition of the pauper patients (if any); and shall also make such other inquiries as to such visitor shall seem expedient.

Board of Inquiry.—The Colonial Surgeon, the Resident or Superintending Medical Officer, and any two or more of the visitors, shall be constituted a Board, called "The Board of Inquiry;" and shall have and exercise all the powers and authorities conferred upon them; and the Colonial Surgeon shall be the Chairman of such Board; and at the meetings of such Board of Inquiry, the Colonial Surgeon, or the Resident or Superintending Medical Officer, and two of the visitors shall form a quorum.

THE SALE OF POISONS ACT (1879).

(43 Vic., No. 14).

Persons Selling Poisons to be Licensed.—No person shall sell, or keep open shop for retailing, dispensing, or compounding poisons in any part of Western Australia, unless licensed thereto by the Resident Magistrate or Police Magistrate of his town or district, and shall conform to such regulations as to the keeping, dispensing, and selling of such poisons as may from time to time be prescribed by such Resident Magistrate or Police Magistrate; provided, however, that such regulations shall not be contrary to the provisions of this Act, and shall be subject to the approval of the Governor.

Articles to be Deemed Poisons.—The following articles shall be deemed to be poisons within the meaning of this Act, viz.:—Part I.—Arsenic and its preparations; Prussic Acid; Cyanides of Potassium and all Metallic Cyanides; Strychnine and all Poisonous Vegetable Alkaloids and their Salts; Aconite and its preparations; Emetic Tartar; Corrosive Sublimate; Cantharides; Savin and its Oil; Ergot of Rye and its preparations. Part II.—Oxalic acid; Chloroform; Belladonna and its preparations; Essential Oil of Almonds, unless deprived of its Prussic Acid; Opium, and all preparations of Opium or of Poppies.

Regulations for the Sale of Poisons.—It shall be unlawful to sell any poison, either by wholesale or retail, unless the box, bottle, vessel, wrapper, or cover in which such poison is contained be distinctly labelled with the name of the article and the word "Poison," and with the name and address of the seller of the poison, and it shall be unlawful to sell any poison of those which are in the first part, on which may hereafter be added thereto, to any person unknown to the seller, unless introduced by some person known to the seller; and on every sale of any such article the seller shall, before delivery, make an entry in a book to be kept for that purpose, stating the date of the sale, the name and address of the purchaser, the name and quantity of the article sold, and the purpose for which it is stated by the purchaser to be required, to which entry the signature of the purchaser and of the person, if any, who introduced him shall be affixed; or in the event of the order for such article being sent to the seller by letter or telegram, in lieu of the signature of the purchaser being required to be affixed to the entry above-mentioned, the seller shall annex such letter or telegram to the said book, opposite the entry of the sale therein; and the person delivering the article so ordered and sold shall make and sign a memorandum opposite such entry, setting forth the date when, and the person or post office to whom or through which the said article was delivered or transmitted; and if the said article was delivered to any person, the person receiving the same shall also sign such memorandum. And any person selling poison otherwise than as herein provided shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds for the first offence, and to a penalty not exceeding Ten Pounds for the second, or any subsequent offence. But the provisions of this section, which are solely applicable to poisons in the first part, or which require that the label shall contain the name and address of the seller shall not apply to articles to be exported from Western Australia by wholesale dealers, nor to sales by wholesale to retail dealers in the ordinary course of wholesale dealing. Nor shall any of the provisions of this section apply to any medicine supplied by a duly-qualified Medical Practitioner to his patient; nor apply to any article when forming part of the ingredients of any medicine dispensed by a person licensed under this Act, provided

such medicine be labelled in the manner aforesaid with the name and address of the seller, and the ingredients thereof be entered with the name of the person to whom it is sold or delivered in a book to be kept by the seller for that purpose.

Resident Magistrate may withhold Licenses.—Such Resident Magistrate or Police Magistrate may in his discretion withhold, suspend, or discontinue the license mentioned above.

SANITARY REGULATIONS.

Noxious Trades, and Filthy or Overcrowded Houses.—Upon the certificate of the Officer of Health to any council, or in any municipality where no such officer has been appointed, of any legally qualified Medical Practitioner, that any manufactory, building, or place, used for any offensive or noxious trade, is a nuisance, or offensive to the inhabitants of the neighbourhood, or injurious to their health, the council shall summon such offender before any two Justices; or if it appears from the certificate, as aforesaid, that any such place is in a filthy and unwholesome condition, such council shall give notice in writing to the occupier of such place to whitewash or purify the same; or if it appears from the certificate, as aforesaid, that any building, or any part thereof, is so overcrowded as to be dangerous or prejudicial to the health of the inmates, or persons employed therein, the council shall summon before any two Justices any person permitting such overcrowding.

Unwholesome Food to be Seized.—Any Member or Officer of any council, acting under the authority thereof, may at all reasonable times enter into and inspect any place kept or used for the sale of any provisions, or other articles used, or intended to be used, as food for human consumption, and may inspect any such articles, or any part thereof, if offered or exposed for sale; and in case any such articles, or any part thereof respectively, appear to such officer to be unfit for such food, may seize and carry the same before two Justices.

REGULATIONS AFFECTING MEDICAL ATTENDANCE

AT

Lockups and Elsewhere, at the Request of the Police
in New South Wales, which came into Force on
June 10, 1883.

Ordinary Visits.

Legally-qualified Medical Men will be allowed a fee of ten shillings for each visit in ordinary cases, to include all necessary medicines, dressing, &c.

Minor Operations.

For minor operations, a fee of one guinea.

Capital Operations.

For capital operations the account will be paid after reference to the Medical Adviser to the Government, if considered reasonable.

Fees at Night.

Double fees on ordinary visits will be allowed at night, *i.e.*, between 10 p.m. and 5 a.m.

Fees for Examination and Evidence, &c.

The fee for examination and evidence in Lunacy and other cases will be one guinea, and where two or more cases are heard on the same day half fees only will be allowed after the first. The charge for attending and examining the prisoner in the lock-up will be included in the fee of one guinea.

Mileage.

Mileage from the medical man's residence to the place where the patient is seen will be allowed at the rate of five shillings per mile beyond the first up to five miles, and seven shillings per mile for each mile above five up to twenty-five. Four miles by rail to be equal to one by road. Cases occurring above twenty-five miles to be submitted for the determination of the Medical Adviser to the Government.

Accounts.

The accounts to be rendered to the Police quarterly, and to specify the dates of the service, the names of the patients, and the nature of the complaints, with a special explanation justifying more than one visit to a patient in any one day.

In cases where more than one patient is medically attended during a visit to a lock-up or other place, only half fee for each visit after the first is to be charged, and no mileage; this is not to refer to operations.

MATRICULATION.

I. Candidates for Matriculation must make application to the Registrar before the commencement of Lent Term.

II. The Matriculation Examination shall take place at the commencement of Lent Term, but the Examiners, in special cases, with the sanction of the Chancellor or Vice-Chancellor, are authorised to hold such examinations at such other times as may be deemed expedient.

III. The examination shall be conducted by means of written or printed papers; but the examiners shall not be precluded from putting *vivâ voce* questions.

IV. The names of all candidates who have passed the Matriculation Examination shall be arranged and published in such order as the Board of Examiners shall recommend to the Senate.

V. Students who shall have passed the Matriculation Examination and shall have paid a fee of Two Pounds to the Registrar, may be admitted by the Senate as Members of the University.

VI. The Examination for Matriculation shall be in the following subjects :—1. English Grammar and Composition. 2. Latin. 3. Arithmetic. 4. Algebra to Simple Equations, inclusive. 5. Geometry, Euclid, Book I. And one of the following :—6. Greek. 7. French. 8. German. 9. Elementary Chemistry. 10. Elementary Physics.

BACHELOR OF ARTS.

I. Candidates for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts shall during their first year attend the University Lectures on the following subjects :—1. Latin. 2. Mathematics. 3. Elementary Chemistry and the Elements of Natural Philosophy ; and one of three following languages :—4. Greek. 5. French. 6. German.

II. Candidates for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts shall during their second year attend the University Lectures on the following subjects :—1. Latin and Ancient History. 2. Mathematics ; and one of the three following languages :—3. Greek. 4. French. 5. German.

III. Candidates for the Degree of B.A. shall during their third year attend lectures upon the following subjects :—Latin or Greek Language and Literature. 2. Mathematics (pure and mixed). 3. French or German Language and Literature. 4. Mental Philosophy and Logic, Physical Geography and Geology, Zoology and Botany.

IV. The Examination for the Degree of B.A. shall take place once a year, at the beginning of Lent Term.

V. No candidate shall be admitted to this examination unless he produce a certificate from the Dean of the Faculty of Arts that he is of nine terms' standing, and that he has passed all the examinations required since his admission to the University.

VI. The fee for the Degree of B.A. shall be Three Pounds. No candidates shall be admitted to the examination unless he have previously paid this fee to the Registrar. If a candidate fail to pass an examination, the fee shall not be returned to him ; but he shall be admissible to any subsequent examination for the same degree without the payment of an additional fee.

VII. The examination shall be conducted in the first instance by means of printed papers, and at the termination of such examination each candidate shall undergo a *viva voce* examination if the examiners think fit.

VIII. To obtain the Degree of B.A., candidates shall pass satisfactory examinations in the following subjects :—1. Latin Language and Literature. 2. Mathematics (pure and mixed). 3. Greek, French or German Language and Literature.

IX. Students proceeding to the Degree of B.A. who have passed the First Year Examination, and who have thereat been placed in the honour list both in Classics and in Mathematics, may elect to attend lectures during their second year in one of these subjects only, and if they again obtain honours in that subject at their Second Year Examination, they shall be deemed to have passed that examination.

X. Students of the Third Year who have obtained honours in either Classics or Mathematics at both their First and Second Year Examinations, may elect to attend lectures during their third year in that subject only, and if they again obtain honours in that subject at their B.A. Examination, they shall be deemed to have passed for their Degree.

XI. The Candidate for Honours, who shall have most distinguished himself at the B.A. Examination in Classics or in Mathematics, shall, if he possess sufficient merit, receive a gold medal or a prize of the value of Ten Pounds.

MASTER OF ARTS.

I.—There shall be a Yearly Examination for the Degree of M.A. during Lent Term, or at such other times as the Examiners, with the sanction of the Chancellor or Vice-Chancellor, may appoint.

II.—Every candidate for this Degree must have previously obtained the Degree of B.A., and two years must have elapsed since the time of his examination for such Degree. He will also be required to furnish evidence of having completed his twenty-first year.

III.—The fee for the Degree of M.A. shall be Five Pounds. No candidate shall be admitted to the Examinations unless he have previously paid this fee to the Registrar. If a candidate fail to pass the Examination, the fee shall not be returned to him ; but he shall be admissible to any subsequent Examination for the same Degree without payment of an additional fee.

IV.—Candidates for the Degree of M.A. shall elect to be examined in one or

more of the following branches of knowledge :—1. Classical Philology and History. 2. Mathematics and Natural Philosophy. 3. Logic, Moral, Mental, and Political Philosophy.

N.B.—The candidate most distinguished in each branch at the Examination shall, if he possesses sufficient merit, receive a gold medal.

V.—The Senate may at its discretion, admit to Examination for the Degree of Master of Arts any person who shall have obtained at least two years previously the Degree of Bachelor of Arts or equivalent first Degree in Arts in any other University approved by the Senate. Every candidate for admission under this By-Law must make application in writing to the Registrar, and supply satisfactory evidence of his qualification as aforesaid, and that he is a person of good fame and character, and upon the approval of his application shall pay to the Registrar a fee of Two Pounds for the entry of his name in the University books, in addition to the prescribed fee for his Degree. Every candidate, before he is admitted to his Degree, shall be required to furnish evidence of having completed his twenty-first year.

MEDICAL BY-LAWS.

BY-LAW

85.—Fellows of the Senate who are legally qualified members of the Medical Profession, the Professors and Lecturers connected with the Medical School of the University, and the Examiners in Medicine appointed by the Senate from time to time, shall constitute the Faculty of Medicine.

86.—The Dean shall exercise a general superintendence over the administrative business connected with the Faculty of Medicine, and it shall be the duty of the Registrar to summon meetings of the Faculty on the third Thursday of each term, and at such other times as may be required by the Dean. Upon the written requisition of any three members of the Faculty, the Dean, or in his absence the Registrar, shall convene a Special Meeting. No question shall be decided at any meeting of the Faculty unless there shall be present at least five members. The Dean shall act as Chairman at all the meetings of the Faculty, but in his absence the members then present shall elect a chairman from amongst themselves. The chairman at any such meeting shall have a vote, and, in case of an equality of votes, a second or casting vote.

87.—The Faculty shall meet from time to time for the purpose of considering and reporting to the Senate such subjects as have relation to the Studies, Lectures, Examinations and Degrees in Medicine, and such questions as may be referred to it by the Senate.

88.—The Academic Year in medicine shall comprise two sessions, the Long or Winter Session, including Lent and Trinity Terms, and the Short or Summer Session, including Michaelmas Term.

89.—Courses of Lectures shall be delivered on subjects directed by the Senate, and shall consist either of a hundred lectures of one hour each, to be called a Long Course, or of fifty lectures of one hour each, to be called a Short Course, and, as far as possible, the long course of lectures shall be delivered during the long session, and the short course of lectures during the short session.

90.—At least three Written Class Examinations shall be held during a long course of lectures, and at least two such examinations during a short course. No Undergraduate shall absent himself from these examinations except under medical certificate, and at the end of each session a report of the results shall be presented to the Senate, signed by the Lecturer and by the Dean of the Faculty.

91.—Every Undergraduate in Medicine must have passed the Matriculation Examination, and during his First Year must have pursued the course of studies provided for Undergraduates in Arts, and have passed satisfactorily the examinations in the subjects of lectures before proceeding any further. Graduates in Arts are exempted from the provisions of this By-law.

92. The Undergraduate shall be required to attend the following courses of instruction in his Second Year :—

During the Long Session—General and Descriptive Anatomy (senior), Regional and Surgical Anatomy, Chemistry.

During the Short Session—Botany, Zoology and Comparative Anatomy, Practical Chemistry, Demonstrations in Comparative Anatomy, Clinical Instruction in Practical Surgery at a recognised Hospital.

He shall also attend a six months' Course of Dissections.

93.—In his Third Year the Undergraduate shall be required to attend the following courses of instruction :—

During the Long Session—Physiology, Practical Physiology, Surgery.

During the Short Session—General and Descriptive Anatomy (senior), Practical Pharmacy, Out-door Surgical Practice at a recognised Hospital.

He shall also attend a six months' Course of Dissections, and shall be required to produce a certificate of having attended the Practice of a recognised Hospital during the Twelve Months.

94. In his Fourth Year the Undergraduate shall be required to attend the following courses of instruction :—

During the Long Session—Physiology (senior), Materia Medica, Pathology, Regional and Surgical Anatomy (senior).

During the Short Session—Operative Surgery, Practical Pathology, Vaccination.

He shall also be required to produce certificates—

1. Of having attended the Practice of a recognised Hospital during the Twelve Months.
2. Of having been present at at least ten Post Mortem Examinations at a recognised Hospital.
3. Of having attended the out-door Medical Practice of a recognised Hospital during at least three months of the year.
4. Of having attend at least fifty lectures on Clinical Surgery during the year.

95. In his Fifth Year the Undergraduate shall be required to attend the following courses of instruction :—

During the Long Session—Midwifery and Diseases of Women, Principles and Practice of Medicine, Medical Jurisprudence.

During the Short Session—Clinical Instruction in Diseases of Children at a recognised Hospital, Psychological Medicine, including three months attendance at a recognised Hospital for the Insane, with at least twelve Lectures on Psychological Medicine, Clinical Instruction in Diseases of the Eye.

He shall also be required to produce certificates—

1. Of having attended the Practice of a recognised Hospital during the twelve months.
2. Of having attended at least twelve cases of Practical Midwifery.
3. Of having attended at least fifty Lectures on Clinical Medicine during the year.

96.—There shall be three Degrees granted in the Faculty of Medicine—viz., Bachelor of Medicine (M.B.), Master of Surgery (Ch.M.), and Doctor of Medicine (M.D.)

97.—Candidates for the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine must have completed the course of study prescribed for students of the First Year in the Arts Classes, and must have passed three Professional Examinations.

98.—The First Professional Examination shall take place at the end of the Second Year, and shall include Zoology and Comparative Anatomy, Chemistry, and Botany. The second Professional Examination shall take place at the end of the Fourth Year, and shall include Anatomy, Physiology, Materia Medica, and Pathology. No Undergraduate shall be admitted to the Second Professional Examination unless he shall have produced certificates showing that he has dissected at least one side of the entire body.

99.—Before admission to the Final Examination for the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine, the Candidate shall furnish a declaration, in his own handwriting, that he has completed his twenty-first year, and also a certificate as to his moral character, signed by two competent persons.

100.—The Candidate who at graduation is found to have most distinguished himself at the Professional Examinations shall, if he possess sufficient merit, receive a Gold Medal, or a Prize of the value of ten pounds.

101.—The Third or Final Professional Examination shall not take place before the completion of the Fifth Year, and shall include Medicine, Clinical Medicine, Surgery, Clinical Surgery, Midwifery, Medical Jurisprudence, Psychological Medicine, and Diseases of the Eye.

102.—At the three Professional Examinations the Candidate shall be required to give proof of his knowledge by written answers to the questions set, to be followed by a Practical or *vivâ voce* Examination in all subjects whatsoever.

103.—Candidates who shall have passed to the satisfaction of the Faculty in all the subjects of the above Examinations shall be classified in order of merit, and shall be recommended to the Senate for admission to the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine and to the Degree of Master of Surgery, if he so elect.

104.—If any Candidate at these Examinations be found unqualified, he shall not be again admitted to examination, until he has studied during another year the subjects in which he has failed to pass.

105.—Accredited Certificates of Attendance and of Examination from other Universities and Schools of Medicine recognised by the University of Sydney, may, on the report of the Dean of the Faculty, be accepted by the Senate as proof *pro tanto*, of the attendance on Lectures and Examinations required by these by-laws. But in all such cases a Degree in Arts, or some similar literary or scientific Certificate satisfactory to the Senate, on the aforesaid report, shall be required.

106.—Bachelors of Medicine and Masters of Surgery of this University shall not possess any right to assume the title of Doctor.

107.—The Degree of Doctor of Medicine shall not be conferred until after the expiration of two Academic Years from the granting of the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine.

108.—The Candidate must produce evidence that after having obtained the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine he has spent two years in Hospital Practice, or three years in Practice either private or in the public service.

109.—The Candidate shall be required to pass the following Examination, which will be conducted by means of printed papers and *vivâ voce* interrogations, &c. :—

- (a) Medicine, including Psychological Medicine,
- (b) Examination and Report on cases of patients under treatment in the wards of an Hospital,
- (c) *Vivâ voce* Interrogations and Demonstrations from normal and abnormal Specimens and Preparations.

He shall also be required to present and defend a Thesis on some subject in Medical Science.

110.—Candidates who shall pass the Examinations satisfactorily shall be classified in order of merit, and may, on the report of the Dean of the Faculty, be admitted by the Senate to the Degree of Doctor of Medicine.

111.—The Degree of Master of Surgery shall not be conferred on any person who is not already a Doctor of Medicine or Bachelor of Medicine, or who does not at the same Graduation Ceremony obtain the degree of Bachelor of the Medicine.

112.—The Senate shall have power to admit to the Examination for the Degree of Doctor of Medicine persons who shall have obtained the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine or some corresponding or equivalent first Degree in Medicine at a University recognised by the Senate. Provided that at least three years shall have elapsed since that Degree was obtained. Provided also that the Applicant shall supply proof satisfactory to the Dean of the Faculty of Medicine, that the attendance on Lectures and other conditions prior to the obtaining of that Degree have been equivalent to those required for the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine in this University. When such evidence cannot be supplied, the Applicant shall attend lectures either in this University or in some recognised University or School of Medicine in the required subjects, and shall pass a satisfactory Examination in them before admission to the Examination for the Degree of Doctor of Medicine. Every Applicant for admission under the By-law must make application in writing to the Registrar, and supply satisfactory evidence of his qualifications as aforesaid, and also that he is a person of good fame and character. Upon the approval of his application he shall pay the Registrar a fee of Two Pounds for the entry of his name in the University Books, in addition to the prescribed fee for his Degree.

113.—The Fees for the Degrees of Bachelor of Medicine, Doctor of Medicine, and Master of Surgery, shall be Ten Pounds respectively.

114.—The above fees shall be paid to the Registrar previous to the examination, and shall not in any case be returned to the candidate.

115.—Candidates who fail to pass an Examination shall be allowed to present themselves for one further similar Examination without fee, but for each subsequent Examination that may be required they shall pay the sum of Five Pounds.

EXTRACT FROM THE REGULATIONS OF THE FACULTY OF MEDICINE.

No Professor or Teacher in the Medical School shall grant a certificate of attendance upon any course of Lectures to any Undergraduate unless he shall have been present at at least 75 per cent. of the meetings of the class.

For the course of Practical Pharmacy the Senate may accept a certificate showing that the Undergraduate has been engaged for at least three months, by apprentice-

ship or otherwise, in compounding and dispensing drugs in the Laboratory of a Hospital, Dispensary, Licentiate of the London or Dublin Society of Apothecaries, or Pharmaceutical Chemist approved by the Faculty of Medicine.

These must be written on paper, a specimen of which may be obtained on application to the Registrar of the University. The Thesis is to be written on one side only of each leaf, and a margin of one and a half inches is to be left on each side.

In regard to By-law 109, Section *b*, Candidates will have the option of choosing the class of cases on which they shall be examined—medical, surgical, obstetrical.

Students from Sydney may reside either at their own homes or in one of the affiliated Colleges.

To pass the First Year of the Arts Curriculum is the ordinary portal by which the Undergraduate may enter the Medical Classes. By-law 105 should be referred to by those who may desire to be exempted from this preliminary year. The Undergraduate is strongly advised to apply himself exclusively to the work of the Art Classes in this year—it is certainly the safest and best course he can follow.

It will be noticed from the By-laws that the education for the M.B. Degree includes a complete training as well as in Surgery as in Medicine; Ch.M. Degree, however, removes any dubiety by distinctly declaring the surgical qualifications of the graduate.

For their encouragement certain prizes are open to Students in the Medical School, viz.:—1. The Renwick Gold Medal, awarded annually, for excellence in Anatomy. 2. The Renwick Scholarship of £50. 3. The R. C. Want Scholarship of £25, tenable for two years, for excellence in Theoretical and Practical Chemistry, given to Students of six terms standing. 4. The Levey and Alexander Endowment, awarded to a B.A. who intends to enter a liberal profession, including, of course, Medicine. 5. The Struth Exhibition of £50, tenable for four years, given to a Student who is just entering the Medical Classes. 6. Bowman-Cameron Scholarship, value £50, tenable for three years, given for General Proficiency to the most distinguished candidate of the First Year. 7. The James Aitken Bursary, value £50 per annum.

The Winter or Long Session begins on the 4th Monday of March.

The Summer or Short Session begins on the 2nd Monday of October.

For further particulars application should be made to the Registrar of the University.

ADMISSION AD EUNDEM GRADUM.

Admission *ad eundem gradum* in this University may, at the discretion of the Senate, be granted without examination to Graduates of the following approved Universities, that is to say, the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, London, Edinburgh, Glasgow, Aberdeen, and Dublin, the Queen's University of Ireland, and the Royal University of Ireland lately established in its place, and the Universities of Melbourne, New Zealand and Adelaide; and may also be granted to Graduates of such other Universities as the Senate may from time to time determine. Provided always that they shall give to the Registrar to be submitted to the Senate, sufficient evidence of their alleged Degrees respectively, and of their good fame and character. Upon the approval of his application each candidate shall pay to the Registrar a fee of Two Pounds for the entry of his name on the University Books in addition to the prescribed fee for his Degree.

PRELIMINARY SCIENTIFIC EXAMINATION.

I. *Compulsory Subjects*.—The compulsory subjects of the preliminary examination of medical students shall be the following:—1. English Language, including Grammar and Composition. 2. English History. 3. Modern Geography. 4. Latin. 5. Arithmetic. 6. Algebra. 7. Geometry. 8. Elementary Mechanics. 9. Biology.

II. *Optional Subjects*.—Every Candidate must also pass in one of the following subjects, as defined for the degree of Bachelor of Arts:—1. Greek. 2. French. 3. German. 4. Italian. 5. Mental Science. 6. Mathematics.

III. No Student can be registered till he has passed the first seven of the compulsory subjects at one examination.

IV. The remainder of the Preliminary Examination may be passed at or before the first professional examination.

V. Candidates in Biology must forward to the Registrar a certificate of their having done practical work.

N.B.—The fee for the first seven subjects is One Guinea; for all the remaining subjects, One Guinea.

UNIVERSITY OF OTAGO.

Affiliated to the University of New Zealand in 1874.

[Was founded at Dunedin in 1869, by an Ordinance of the Provincial Council, and received as an endowment 100,000 acres of pastoral land. It was opened in 1871. In 1872 the Provincial Council voted a further endowment of 100,000 acres of pastoral land, and this important accession to its revenues enabled the University to lay the foundations of a Medical School. In 1874 the University of Otago became affiliated to the University of New Zealand, at Christchurch. Its first Chancellor was the Rev. Thomas Burns, D.D., elected November 10th, 1869. A new University building was erected on a site containing about eight acres of ground, in 1878.]

OF THE ENTRANCE EXAMINATION.

1. An Entrance Examination shall be held in the month of December in each year, at which candidates shall be examined for Matriculation, Junior Scholarships, and the medical preliminary (the fee for the entrance examination is one guinea).

OF MATRICULATION.

I. Candidates for Matriculation shall, before they are admitted as students of the University, be examined in six or more of the following subjects:—1. Latin. 2. English. 3. Arithmetic. 4. Greek. 5. French. 6. German or Italian. 7. Algebra. 8. Euclid, Books I. and II. 9. History of England from the accession of William III. to the accession of Victoria. 10. Geography. 11. Elementary Chemistry: the Non-Metallic Elements, and the Atomic Theory. 12. Elementary Physics: Elementary Mechanics of Solids and Fluids. (In this subject the paper as set for Junior Scholarships is compulsory for Medical Students). 13. Elementary Biology: Elements of Animal Physiology, and of the Morphology and Physiology of Flowering Plants.

II. Each Candidate will be required to pass in at least six subjects, of which Latin, English, and Arithmetic must be three.

N.B.—The fee for the Matriculation Examination is One Guinea.

OF THE DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF ARTS.

The subjects of examination for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts shall be—1. Latin Language and Literature. 2. Greek Language and Literature. 3. English Language and Literature. 4. Modern Languages and Literature. 5. General History and Political Economy. 6. Jurisprudence and Constitutional History. 7. Pure Mathematics. 8. Applied Mathematics. 9. Physical Science to include (a) Heat and Radiant Heat, and (b) Sound and Light, or, at the option of the Candidate, Electricity and Magnetism. 10. Chemistry. 11. Natural Science, General Biology, and either Geology, Zoology, or Botany. 12. Mental Science.

N.B.—The fee for the examination for the degree of Bachelor of Arts is One Guinea.

OF HONOURS.

I. An examination for Honours shall be held in the month of November in each year.

II. No Candidate shall be admitted to the examination for Honours excepting at the examination of the year following that in which he shall have passed for the degree of Bachelor of Arts.

III. Candidates for Honours shall be examined in one or more of the following groups of subjects:—Group 1.—Language and Literature: Any two of the following subdivisions, of which Latin must be one—(a) Latin, (b) Greek, (c) English, (d) One Modern Language other than English. Group 2.—Political Science, including General History, Political Economy, Jurisprudence, and Constitutional History. Group 3.—Mathematics and Mathematical Physics. Group 4.—Chemistry and Experimental Physics. Group 5.—Natural Science. Group 6.—Mental Science.

IV. Every Candidate for Honours shall, on or before the twentieth day of February preceding the examination, give notice of his intention to present himself for the Honours Examination, and of the subjects in which he proposes to be examined.

V. There shall be three classes of Honours, first, second, and third; and the names of the successful Candidates shall be arranged alphabetically in the several classes.

VI. The fee for the examination for Honours is One Guinea.

OF THE DEGREE OF MASTER OF ARTS.

I. Candidates for the Degree of Master of Arts must have taken the degree of Bachelor of Arts either after examination or *ad eundem*.

II. Candidates for the degree of Master of Arts shall be examined in any one of the following groups of subjects:—1. Languages and Literature, any two of the following sub-divisions: (a) Latin, (b) Greek, (c) English, (d) One Modern Language other than English. 2. Political Science, including General History, Political Economy, Jurisprudence, and Constitutional History. 3. Mathematics and Mathematical Physics. 4. Chemistry and Experimental Physics. 5. Natural Science. 6. Mental Science. The papers set for the examination for the degree of Master of Arts shall be the same as those set for the Honours Examination, and Candidates will be required to show a degree of proficiency satisfactory to the Examiners, but not necessarily higher than that required for the third class in Honours.

III. Every Bachelor of Arts intending to proceed to the degree of Master of Arts shall, on or before the twentieth day of February preceding the examination, signify to the Chancellor the subjects in which he shall elect to be examined.

IV. Bachelors of Arts who may after examination have obtained Honours shall be deemed to have passed the examination for the degree of Master of Arts.

V. The fee for the examination for the degree of Master of Arts is One Guinea.

FACULTY OF MEDICINE.

OF THE REGISTRATION OF MEDICAL STUDENTS.

I. Every medical student shall be registered by the Registrar of the New Zealand University.

II. No medical student shall be registered unless he be a graduate in Arts of a University, or until he has passed a preliminary examination in the subjects of general education as hereinafter provided, and has produced evidence that he has commenced medical study.

III. The commencement of medical study shall not be reckoned as dating earlier than fifteen days before the date of registration.

IV. No candidate shall be admitted to the final examination for the degree of Bachelor of Medicine whose name has not been on the Medical Register for at least forty-two months previously.

V. The Registrar shall keep the Register of Medical Students according to the prescribed form.

VI. The Registrar shall furnish extracts from the Register of the particulars of their registration to all Students on application.

VII. All persons desirous of being registered as medical students shall apply to the Registrar according to the subjoined form:—"I hereby apply to be registered as a Student in Medicine, in conformity with the regulations of the General Council of Medical Education and Registration of the United Kingdom."

OF TERMS.

The session commences on the first day of May, and is divided into two terms of thirteen weeks each, separated by a midwinter vacation of a fortnight. The various classes are continued throughout the whole of the six months' session. The classes are open to all persons over sixteen years of age. All Students desirous of obtaining degrees in Medicine are required to pass a Preliminary Examination in General Knowledge, and to Register themselves as Medical Students.

PRELIMINARY SCIENTIFIC EXAMINATION.

Students who intend to graduate in Medicine in the New Zealand University are required to pass the Preliminary Examination prescribed by that body (as given below), which is, in any case, accepted in lieu of the Preliminary Examination of the University of Otago.

The Preliminary Examination is held during the first three days of May. Candidates who intend to appear at this examination are required to communicate with the Registrar of the University on or before the 14th of April, intimating the optional subjects in which they desire to be examined. The following six subjects are *compulsory*:—1. English. 2. Arithmetic. 3. Algebra. 4. Geometry. 5. Latin. 6. Mechanics and Hydrostatics.

The Candidates will also be required to pass in three out of the following nine *optional* subjects:—1. Greek. 2. French. 3. German. 4. Logic. 5. Moral Philosophy. 6. Higher Mathematics (Euclid, Algebra, Elements of Trigonometry). 7. Higher Natural Philosophy (Mechanics, Hydrostatics, Elementary General Physics, Heat). 8. Elementary Inorganic Chemistry. 9. The Rudiments of Botany and Zoology.

N.B.—Students desirous of obtaining Scottish Degrees and Diplomas in Medicine are limited to the first seven of the above optional subjects. No student can be registered who has not passed in English, Latin, Arithmetic, Geometry, and Algebra, along with one optional subject. For the Edinburgh M.D. degree Greek and Logic or Moral Philosophy are compulsory.

OF PROFESSIONAL EDUCATION AND EXAMINATIONS IN MEDICINE.

I. There shall be two degrees in Medicine—Bachelor of Medicine and Doctor of Medicine.

II. All candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Medicine must keep terms for at least two years at a Medical School in New Zealand recognised by the Senate of the New Zealand University.

III. There shall be three professional examinations for the degree of Bachelor of Medicine.

IV. These shall be conducted, as far as possible, both by written questions and by *vivâ voce* and practical examinations.

V. There shall be two examiners at every oral and clinical examination.

VI. Excellence in one or more subjects at an examination shall not compensate for failure in others.

VII. Rejected candidates must keep terms for one year before being re-admitted to examination.

VIII. The first professional examination shall be held at the end of the candidate's second year's terms, in November, and shall include Chemistry, Practical Chemistry, and Anatomy. Candidates must forward to the Registrar at least fifteen days before the date of examination, the following certificates:—1. Of having attended a course of not less than one hundred lectures on Chemistry. 2. Of having attended a three months' course of instruction in Practical Chemistry. 3. Of having attended a course of not less than one hundred lectures on Human Anatomy. 4. Of having dissected the human body during two periods of six months each.

N.B.—Candidates will not receive certificates of having passed the first professional examination unless either previously or at the time of examination they shall have completed the preliminary examination. Candidates in Anatomy may be called on to perform actual dissections. (The fee is Three Guineas).

IX. The second professional examination shall be held at the end of the candidate's third year's terms, in November, and shall include Physiology, Pathology (including Morbid Anatomy), Materia Medica. Candidates must forward to the Registrar at least fifteen days before the date of examination the following certificates:—1. Of having passed the first professional examination. 2. Of having attended a course of not less than sixty lectures on Physiology. 3. Of having attended a course of not less than sixty lectures on Pathology. 4. Of having attended a course of not less than sixty lectures on Materia Medica. 5. Of having practised the dispensing of medicines for three months at a public dispensary, or under the superintendence of a member of the Pharmaceutical Society of New Zealand. 6. Of having attended the *post mortem* examination of a hospital containing not less than a hundred beds, for two periods of not less than six months each.

N.B.—The fee for this examination is Three Guineas.

X. The third professional examination shall be held at the end of the candidate's fourth year's terms, and shall include Surgery and Surgical Anatomy, Clinical Surgery, Medicine (including Therapeutics and Insanity), Clinical Medicine, Midwifery and Diseases of Women, Medical Jurisprudence, and Public Health. Candidates must forward to the Registrar at least fifteen days before the date of examination the following certificates:—1. Of having passed the second professional examination. 2. Of having been registered a medical student at least forty-two months previously. 3. Of being twenty-one years of age before the date of graduation. 4. Of having attended a course of not less than one hundred lectures on Surgery. 5. Of having attended a course of not less than one hundred lectures on Medicine. 6. Of having attended a course of not less than one hundred lectures on Medical Jurisprudence and Public Health. 7. Of having attended a course of not less than sixty lectures on Midwifery and Diseases of Women. 8. Of having attended for three years the medical and surgical practice of a hospital containing not less than a hundred beds, and having a distinct staff of physicians and surgeons. This certificate must state that the candidate has acted as dresser for six months in the surgical wards, and as clerk for six months in the medical wards. Six months of this hospital practice may be taken at a lunatic asylum containing not less than a hundred beds. 9. Of having attended six midwifery cases. 10. Of dispensary practice for six months either in the out-patient department of a hospital or at a public dispensary, or with a qualified practitioner. 11. Of having had instruction and practice in vaccination. 12. Of having had clinical instruction in insanity.

N.B.—Candidates in surgery will be examined practically as to surgical appliances and surgical anatomy, and may be required to operate on the dead body.

XI. No certificates—except that of instruction in chemistry—shall be received, except from such schools as are approved of by the General Medical Council of Great Britain.

XII. Any candidate who produces satisfactory evidence that he has passed an examination in Chemistry, or in Anatomy, or in Physiology, or in Pathology, or in Materia Medica, required for a degree in Medicine at a University in the United

Kingdom or in the Colonies, or for the Fellowship of the Royal College of Surgeons of England, shall, subject to the approval of the Chancellor, be exempt from examination in these subjects.

XIII. Candidates for the degree of Doctor of Medicine shall not be less than twenty-four years of age. They must have obtained the degree of Bachelor of Medicine at least two years previously, and must have been engaged during the interval in the practice or study of their profession.

XIV. Candidates must send in for approval a thesis on some subject belonging to the medical curriculum.

XV. Candidates shall also be examined, both in writing and orally, on any one of the following groups of subjects they may choose:—1. Anatomy and Physiology. 2. Surgery and Anatomy. 3. Medicine and Pathology. 4. Public Health and Medical Jurisprudence.

XVI. The thesis, and notification of the subjects which the candidate chooses for examination, must be forwarded to the Registrar three months before the examination, which will be held in November of each year.

The fee for the third examination shall be Five Guineas, and 5s. for certificate of any examination.

N.B.—Candidates for Matriculation as well as for any other of the above Examinations are required to send notice of their intention to present themselves for examination to the Registrar of the New Zealand University, Christchurch. For the notice required and other particulars, students should consult the forthcoming Calendar of the New Zealand University, in which they will also find any alterations in the foregoing regulations which may have been made at the last meeting of the Senate.

UNIVERSITY FEES.

The fees payable for the degree of B.A. is £3 3s. ; M.A., £7 7s. ; M.B., £7 7s. ; M.D., £15 15s.

DUNEDIN HOSPITAL.

This Hospital is open daily to Students of Medicine during the Visiting hours of the Medical Staff. Clinical instruction is given at the bedside, and students have the privilege of attending all operations and *post mortem* examinations.

OF MATRICULATION.

I. No candidate shall be permitted to Matriculate who being a male shall not have completed the full age of sixteen years, and being a female shall not have completed the full age of eighteen years.

N.B.—A subsequent Statute fixes sixteen years as the age for both sexes, but empowers the Chancellor, or (in his absence) the Vice-Chancellor, to admit as students younger persons.

II. The Matriculation Examination shall be held in each year on the first Tuesday in March, or on such other day or days as the Council shall from time to time appoint. A second Matriculation Examination is held in December.

III. The subjects of examination shall be as follows:—*Compulsory subjects*: 1. Reading and writing from Dictation. 2. English Grammar. 3. Writing a short English Composition. 4. The Elements of Arithmetic. 5. The Outlines of Geography, and in particular the Geography of Australia, Tasmania, and New Zealand. 6. Outlines of English History, from the Norman Conquest. 7. Latin. 8. Mathematics, viz., Arithmetic, Algebra, and Euclid, Book I and II. *Optional Subjects*: 9. Classics (Latin or Greek). 10. Mathematics (Algebra as far as the Binominal Theorem; Euclid, Books I to IV and VI; Elementary Trigonometry). 11. Modern Languages (French, or German, or Italian). 12. English (Composition, English Language and English Literature). 13. Physical Science (Chemistry, or Natural Philosophy). 14. Natural Science (Animal Physiology, Botany, or Geology). 15. Ancient or Modern History.

N.B.—Each Candidate must pass in two at least of the optional subjects, and of these two either 9 or 10 or 11 must be one. The fee is Two Guineas.

OF DEGREES.

I. The course for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts shall extend over three Academical Years, and must be completed by each student before he or she can attain the Degree.

II. Bachelors of Arts of not less than two years' standing who shall have fulfilled the conditions prescribed by the Regulations of the University of Adelaide may be admitted to the Degree of Master of Arts.

III. Persons who have been admitted to Degrees in any University recognised by the University of Adelaide, and who shall produce to the Council thereof satisfactory evidence of such admission, may be admitted to the same Degrees in the University of Adelaide.

IV. Persons who have completed the whole or part of their undergraduate course in any University or College of a University recognised by the University of Adelaide, and shall produce to the Council thereof satisfactory evidence of such completion, may be allowed corresponding standing in the University of Adelaide.

OF THE DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF ARTS.

The subjects of examination shall be:—*First Year*—1. Latin. 2. Greek. 3. Elementary Pure Mathematics. 4. Elementary Natural Philosophy. 5. Deductive Logic. *Second Year*—1. & 2. Latin and Greek, including Ancient History. 3. Elementary Applied Mathematics. 4. English Language and Literature. 5. Inductive Logic. *Third Year*—1. Latin. 2. Greek. 3. Comparative Philology. 4. Mathematics. 5. Political Economy.

N.B.—The fee for the degree is Three Guineas.

OF THE DEGREE OF MASTER OF ARTS.

Every candidate shall be required to show a competent acquaintance with one at least of the following branches of knowledge:—1. Classics and Comparative Philology. 2. Metaphysics, Logic, and Political Economy. 3. Mathematics.

N.B.—The fee for this degree is Five Guineas.

NOTE.

The certificate of having passed the Matriculation Examination of this University is recognised by the General Council of Medical Education and Registration of the United Kingdom, and as fulfilling the conditions of the Medical Council as regards preliminary examination.

The Royal College of Surgeons of England recognises the First Class Certificate of having passed the Matriculation Examination, and the degree of B.A. of this University, as exempting candidates from the necessity of passing the preliminary examination for the diploma of Member of the College.

OF THE FACULTY OF MEDICINE.

I. There shall be a Faculty of Medicine, consisting of the Chancellor, the Vice-Chancellor, and three other members of the Council, to be annually appointed by the Council; and of the Professor and Lecturers in the Medical School of the University; and of the Dean of the Professorial Board.

II. The Faculty shall advise the Council on all questions touching the studies, lectures, and examinations in Medicine, and on the appointment of Examiners. Notwithstanding anything contained in the third chapter of the Statutes, the Faculty shall, subject to the control of the Council, arrange the days, hours, and places of all lectures and examinations in the Medical Course and determine the subjects thereof.

III. The Faculty shall annually elect one of their number to be Dean of the Faculty of Medicine. The Dean of the Faculty of Medicine shall be *ex officio* a member of the Professorial Board.

IV. The Dean shall perform such duties as shall from time to time be prescribed by the Council, and (amongst others) the following:—

- (a) He shall at his own discretion, or upon the written request of the Chancellor or Vice-Chancellor, or of two members of the Faculty convene meetings of the Faculty.
- (b) He shall preside at the meetings of the Faculty and, in his absence, the Faculty shall elect a Chairman for that occasion.
- (c) Subject to the control of the Faculty he shall exercise a general superintendence over its administrative business.

V. The Registrar shall be the Secretary of the Faculty.

VI. The Council shall annually appoint a sufficient number of Examiners, who, together with the Professors and Lecturers, shall constitute the Board of Examiners.

THE MEDICAL SCHOOL.

The following Report of the Medical School Committee has been adopted by the Council, on the understanding that the recommendations concerning the number of lectures and the curriculum are only provisional:—

TERMS.—That the Medical Year be divided into two sessions, to be named the Long and the Short Session, the Long Session to commence about the second week in March and end about the twenty-second day of August, and that one week during the session be allowed for vacation; the Short Session to commence about the second week in September and end about the second week in December.

CURRICULUM.—*First Year—Long Session*: Chemistry, Physiology, Anatomy, Practical Anatomy.

Short Session: Botany, Zoology, Practical Chemistry, Practical Physiology.

Second Year—Long Session: The same as for the first year.

Short Session: Materia Medica, Practical Chemistry, Practical Physiology.

Lectures—Long Session: Anatomy, 100 lectures. Physiology, 100 lectures. Chemistry, 100 lectures.

Short Session: Botany, 50 lectures. Materia Medica, 36 lectures.

[To be delivered three days a week, or such number of lectures as may be necessary to satisfy the examining bodies at home. This course will not be wanted until the second Short Session].

Practical Chemistry, from 36 to 50 Lectures. Practical Physiology, including Histology, from 36 to 50 lectures.

OF THE DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF MEDICINE.

I. To obtain the degree of Bachelor of Medicine, every candidate must, after matriculation, complete five academical years of Medical Study, and pass the Examination proper to each year.

II. See Terms above.

III. The Examinations shall be held in the third term of each academical year.

IV. No student shall in any academical year be credited with attendance at the University lectures on any subject unless he shall have attended in each term of that year three-fourths of the lectures given in that subject, except in cases of illness or other sufficient cause to be allowed by the Council.

V. Candidates for admission to the First Examination shall produce certificates. (a) Of having diligently practised dissection during six months to the satisfaction of the Professor of Anatomy. (b) Of having performed practical physiological work during three months to the satisfaction of the Lecturer on Physiology. (c) Of having performed practical work in Inorganic Chemistry during three months to the satisfaction of the Professor of Chemistry.

VI. At the First Examination for the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine every Student proceeding to that Degree shall satisfy the Examiners in each of the following subjects:—1. *Elementary Anatomy and Dissections*. 2. *Elementary Physiology*, theoretical and practical. 3. *Inorganic Chemistry*, theoretical and practical. 4. *Botany*.

VII. Candidates for admission to the Second Examination shall produce certificates (a) Of having diligently practised dissection during six months to the satisfaction of the Professor of Anatomy. (b) Of having performed practical physiological work during three months to the satisfaction of the Lecturer on Physiology. (c) Of having performed practical work in Organic Chemistry during three months to the satisfaction of the Professor of Chemistry. (d) Of having performed practical work in Pharmacy during three months with some teacher recognised by the Council.

These certificates shall be in addition to the certificates required for the First Examination.

VIII. At the Second Examination for the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine every Student proceeding to that Degree shall satisfy the Examiners in each of the following subjects:—1. *Anatomy*—General and descriptive, with Dissections. 2. *Physiology*—Including practical Physiology, Histology, and Physiological Chemistry. 3. *Chemistry*—Organic Chemistry, theoretical and practical, with special reference to Physiology and Medicine. Inorganic Chemistry, with special reference to the detection of mineral poisons. 4. *Comparative Anatomy*. 5. *Materia Medica*.

NOTE.—In the Medical School, as at present constituted, instruction is only provided for the first two years of the Course for the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine, and at present the University does not undertake to give instruction in the last Three Years' Courses for that Degree.

IX. The Course of Practical Anatomy shall only be open to Matriculated Medical Students, who are proceeding to the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine, and who have paid the fees for every subject prescribed for the Medical Course of the session.

X. Schedules fixing the books and detailed subjects of study and examination, and defining as far as may be the necessary range of questions to be set in the various subjects, shall be drawn up by the Faculty of Medicine, subject to the approval of the Council, and shall be published not later than the month of January in each year.

XI. No candidate shall at any Examination be allowed to present himself in any subject, in which he has failed to gain credit for attendance at the University lectures during the current or some previous academical year.

XII. The names of the successful candidates at each Examination in the Third Term shall be arranged in three classes, in alphabetical order in each, according to the results of the whole examination.

XIII. Candidates, who have been unsuccessful at the examination in the Third Term of any year, or who have been prevented by illness or other sufficient cause allowed by the Council from attending such Examination, may present themselves at a Supplementary Examination to be held at the beginning of the next academical year. At such Supplementary Examination candidates, who at the previous Examination passed with credit in at least one-half of the required subjects, may by permission of the examiners, present themselves in the other subjects, and, upon passing in them, shall be held to have completed the preceding academical year.

XIV. Any student, who shall have passed in any subject of an Examination, shall be entitled to a certificate showing in what subjects he has passed.

 11. Elementary Chemistry. 12. Elementary Physics. 13. Elementary Physiology.
 14. Elementary Botany.

N.B.—All Candidates for Matriculation must have completed the full age of 15 years.

OF THE DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF ARTS.

I. Candidates for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts shall subsequently to their Matriculation pass three Examinations and complete three years. The subjects of the First Examination shall be—1. Junior Greek or Senior Greek. 2. Junior Latin or Senior Latin. 3. Lower Mathematics. 4. Upper Mathematics. 5. Chemistry, Mineralogy, and Botany. 6. Deductive Logic. 7. Ancient History.

N.B.—Candidates who at the First Examination shall have passed in Greek and Latin and in three other subjects shall thereby complete their first year.

II.—The subjects of the Second Examination shall be—1. Junior Greek or Senior Greek. 2. Junior Latin or Senior Latin. 3. English Language and Literature. 4. Upper Mathematics or Advanced Mathematics. 5. Elementary Natural Philosophy. 6. Comparative Anatomy and Zoology. 7. History of the British Empire, Part I.

N.B.—Candidates who at the Second Examination shall have passed in any five subjects shall thereby complete their second year.

III. The subjects of the Third Examination shall be—1. Senior Greek. 2. Senior Latin. 3. Advanced Mathematics. 4. Mixed Mathematics. 5. Advanced Natural Philosophy. 6. Geology and Palæontology. 7. History of the British Empire, Part II. 8. Political Economy. 9. Inductive Logic.

N.B.—Candidates who at the Third Examination shall have passed in any four subjects shall thereby complete their third year and may be admitted to the Degree of Bachelor of Arts.

OF THE DEGREE OF MASTER OF ARTS.

I. The subjects of Examination for the Degree of Master of Arts shall be divided into four Schools. 1. Language and Logic. 2. Mathematics and Physics. 3. Natural Science. 4. History and Political Economy, in any one of which a Candidate may pass.

II. Candidates shall be Bachelors of Arts of at least one year's standing.

III. Bachelors of Arts who shall have passed this Examination and attained two years' standing may be admitted to the Degree of Master of Arts.

OF THE HONOUR EXAMINATIONS.

I. Examinations for Honours in the first and second years of the course for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, and in the first year of the course for the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine, shall be held in the October Term after the corresponding Ordinary Examinations for the same subjects, and shall be open to all students who shall have passed the corresponding Ordinary Examination for the same Degree or Certificate in the same term.

II. Examinations for Honours in the second, third, and fourth years of the course for the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine shall be held in the February Term after the corresponding Ordinary Examinations, and shall be open to all Students who shall have passed the corresponding Ordinary Examination for the same Degree in that Term or in the next preceding Term or partly in the one and partly in the other of such Terms.

III. The Third Honour Examination of the course for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, and the Fifth Honour Examination of the course for the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine, shall be held in the February Term after the corresponding Ordinary Examinations in that Term, and shall be open to all Students who shall have passed the Final Ordinary Examination of the course for the corresponding Degree or Certificate, and shall not have completed eighteen months from that Degree or Certificate.

IV. At the Third Honour Examination of the course for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts Candidates may obtain in the same or in different years Honours in any or all of the four Schools following, but not more than twice in the same School—1. Language and Logic. 2. Mathematics and Physics. 3. Natural Science. 4. History and Political Economy.

V. The names of all Candidates who shall have distinguished themselves at any Honour Examination shall be published in three classes in order of merit.

FACULTY OF MEDICINE.

OF THE PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION.

I. No Student shall commence the course for the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine unless he shall have matriculated.

II. No Student shall be admitted to the First Examination of the course for the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine unless he shall have produced evidence that at some Matriculation Examination or other University Examination he has passed in Greek, Latin, English, Arithmetic, Algebra, and Geometry.

III. No Student shall obtain credit in the University of Melbourne for any portion of the course for the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine completed elsewhere, unless he shall have produced evidence that he has passed Examinations in the six subjects above named.

IV. No Candidate admitted from another University to the status of a Matriculated Student shall be admitted to the First Examination of the course for the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine, unless he shall have produced evidence that he has passed Examinations in the six subjects above named.

OF THE DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF MEDICINE AND OF THE DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF SURGERY.

I. Candidates for the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine or Bachelor of Surgery shall, subsequent to their Matriculation, pursue their studies for five years and pass five examinations. Any of the five Annual Examinations for the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine or Bachelor of Surgery may be passed either in the October Term or in the February Term, or except the First Examination partly in the October Term and partly in the next following February Term. In the last mentioned case, the Candidate, if he think fit, may in the October Term present any of the subjects of Examination prescribed for his year, and if he then pass therein may without repeating such subjects, present in the next following February Term the remaining subjects or subject.

II. During the first year Candidates shall attend Lectures on Natural Philosophy or on Greek and on Latin thrice a week during three Terms, on Chemistry daily during the February Term, and thrice a week during the July and October Terms, and on Practical Chemistry at the Laboratory thrice a week during the July and October Terms.

III. The subjects of the First Examination shall be all the subjects of Lectures of the first year.

IV. During the second year Candidates shall attend Lectures on Structural and Physiological Botany thrice a week during one Term, on Materia Medica, Therapeutics, and Medical Botany thrice a week during three Terms, on Comparative Anatomy and Zoology thrice a week during three Terms, on Descriptive and Surgical Anatomy daily except Saturday during three Terms, and they shall also attend dissections from May to October inclusive.

V. The subjects of the Second Examination shall be all the subjects of Lectures of the second year.

VI. During the third year Candidates shall attend Lectures on General Anatomy, Physiology, and Pathology during three Terms daily, with the exception of Saturday, on Descriptive and Surgical Anatomy daily except Saturday during three Terms, on Surgery thrice a week during three terms, and shall also attend Dissections from May to October inclusive, the Surgical Practice of a Hospital during twelve months, and shall produce a satisfactory certificate of having attended to Practical Pharmacy and of having acquired a practical knowledge of the preparation of Medicines.

VII. Before admission to the Third Examination Candidates shall produce from the House-Surgeon of a Hospital a certificate of their ability to perform the minor operations of Surgery.

VIII. The subjects of the Third Examination shall be General Anatomy, Physiology, and Pathology, Descriptive and Surgical Anatomy, and Surgery.

IX. During the fourth year Candidates shall attend Lectures on Theory and Practice of Medicine thrice a week during three Terms, on Obstetric Medicine and the Diseases of Women and Children thrice a week during three Terms, on General Anatomy, Physiology, and Pathology daily, with the exception of Saturday, during three Terms, and shall also attend Dissections from May to October inclusive, Clinical instruction in Surgery at a Hospital during six months, the Medical Practice of a Hospital during six months, and either in the fourth or in the fifth year the Practice of a Lying-in Hospital during three months, or shall produce a certificate from a Registered Medical Practitioner of having attended twelve cases of Midwifery.

X. The subjects of the Fourth Examination shall be the Theory and Practice of Medicine, Obstetric Medicine and the Diseases of Women and Children, and General Anatomy, Physiology, and Pathology. Candidates at this Examination will be required to give proof of their knowledge of Anatomy by Dissections.

XI. During the fifth year Candidates shall attend Lectures on the Theory and Practice of Medicine thrice a week during three Terms, on Surgery thrice a week during three Terms, on Forensic Medicine thrice a week during three Terms, and shall also attend Clinical instruction in Medicine at a Hospital during six months, and the Medical Practice of a Hospital during twelve months.

XII. The subjects of the Fifth Examination shall be the Theory and Practice of Medicine of the fourth and fifth years, Surgery of the third and fifth years, and Forensic Medicine.

XIII. Candidates at this Examination will be required to give proof of their knowledge of Surgery by Surgical operations on the dead subject, and of their knowledge of Clinical Medicine and Surgery by attending and prescribing for patients at the bedside, and by writing a brief history of at least one medical and one surgical case selected by the Examiner.

XIV. In each of these Examinations Candidates will be required to pass in all the subjects of such Examination.

XV. Candidates who shall have passed these Examinations and complied with these Regulations may be admitted to the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine, and to the Degree of Bachelor of Surgery, provided in the latter case that they have attended six months' additional Surgery Practice of a Hospital or Hospitals recognised by the University of Melbourne.

XVI. Bachelors of Arts, being Candidates for the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine, or Bachelor of Surgery, who shall have attended during one year's lectures on Chemistry, and on Descriptive and Surgical Anatomy, and shall have attended Practical Chemistry and Dissections, and shall have passed Examinations in Chemistry, in Practical Chemistry, and in Descriptive and Surgical Anatomy, may proceed with the third year of the course for the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine or Bachelor of Surgery.

XVII. Where any Student matriculated in the University of Melbourne, or in any University recognised by it, shall have produced evidence satisfactory to the Professorial Board that he has in any Medical School recognised by any Institution legally qualified to grant Medical or Surgical Degrees, Diplomas, or Licenses to Practise, attended Lectures upon or passed Examinations in any subjects which are prescribed for the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine, or Bachelor of Surgery, in the University of Melbourne, he may if he be a Candidate for the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine or Bachelor of Surgery obtain credit for such Lectures or Examinations.

XVIII. Where any such Candidate has so obtained credit for having both attended Lectures upon and passed Examinations in any subjects prescribed for the first four years of study for the Degree of Bachelor for Medicine or Bachelor of Surgery, he may if he shall have obtained credit for four such subjects be taken to have attended the Lectures, and passed the Examination of his first year, if for eight such subjects of his first and second years, if for eleven such subjects of his first, second and third years, if for fourteen such subjects of his first, second, third, and fourth years.

XIX. Where any such Candidate has obtained credit for any less number of such Lectures and Examinations than those required in the next preceding regulation, he may complete the required number in the University of Melbourne, and the number so completed shall be counted in the same manner, as if the whole had been completed in another Medical School.

XX. Where any such Candidate has obtained in respect of any subject credit for attendance upon Lectures only, he may present himself at any Ordinary Examination to be examined in all or any of those subjects for the Lectures of which he has so obtained credit, together with any other subjects in which, if he had obtained credit for having passed Examinations in such first-mentioned subjects, he would be entitled then to present himself to be examined.

XXI. Where any such Candidate has so obtained credit for his first, second, third, and fourth years, if he shall have attended or obtained credit for attending the Lectures prescribed for the fifth year, and if he shall have produced evidence satisfactory to the Professorial Board of his having attended the total amount of Dissections and Hospital Instruction and Practice prescribed by the University of Melbourne for the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine or Bachelor of Surgery, he may be admitted to the Fifth Examination.

XXII. Students who shall have kept any course of Lectures prescribed for the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine or Bachelor of Surgery, may on application to the Professorial Board obtain a certificate of their attendance on such Lectures with or without a certificate of Examination thereon.

XXIII. Nothing herein contained shall be taken to confer any right upon Bachelors of Medicine or Bachelors of Surgery of the University of Melbourne, as such to assume the title of Doctor.

XXIV. Candidates for the Degree of Bachelor of Surgery, who have graduated as Bachelors of Medicine, upon producing evidence of having attended two years' Surgical Practice in a recognised Hospital or Hospitals, may be admitted to the Degree of Bachelor of Surgery.

OF THE DEGREE OF DOCTOR OF MEDICINE.

I. Candidates for the Degree of Doctor of Medicine must be Bachelors of Medicine of at least two years' standing in the University of Melbourne or in some other University recognised by it.

II. Candidates for the Degree of Doctor of Medicine who shall have produced evidence satisfactorily to the Professorial Board that, subsequently to having taken the Degree of Bachelor of Medicine, they either have attended during two years the Medical Practice of a Hospital or of a Medical Institution, three months of which attendance shall have been at a Hospital for Lunatics, or have been engaged during five years in the practice of the Profession, and have attended for three months the Medical Practice of a Hospital for Lunatics, may be admitted to Examination for the Degree of Doctor of Medicine.

III. The subjects of the Examination shall be—1. Logic. 2. Principles and Methods of Observation, and Reasoning in Medical Enquiry. 3. Medical Psychology, comprising the Physiology of the Brain and Nervous System, Mental Pathology, Mental Therapeutics, and Mental Hygiene. 4. Medicine.

IV. Candidates will also be required to write Commentaries on cases in Medicine and in Obstetric Medicine and the Diseases of Women and Children, and to write Reports of such medical cases in a Hospital as the Examiner may direct, and to answer if required oral interrogations on their Commentaries and Reports.

V. Every such Report shall be written immediately after the inspection of the patient, and shall give in detail the history, symptoms, diagnosis, treatment, and prognosis of each case.

VI. Candidates who shall have passed in all the subjects of this Examination, and complied with these regulations, may be admitted to the Degree of Doctor of Medicine.

VII. Nothing herein contained shall affect the rights conferred by the Statutes on Bachelors of Medicine of other Universities.

OF THE DEGREE OF MASTER OF SURGERY.

I. Candidates for the Degree of Master of Surgery must be Bachelors of Surgery of at least two years' standing in the University of Melbourne or in some other University recognised by it.

II. Bachelors of Surgery, Candidates for the Degree of Master of Surgery, must produce satisfactory evidence that, subsequently to having taken the Degree of Bachelor of Surgery, they—1. Have filled the office of House Surgeon or of Dresser in a Hospital for not less than six months. 2. Have attended during two years the Surgical Practice of a Hospital, or 3. Have attended during one year the Surgical Practice of a Hospital, and have been engaged for three years in Surgical Practice, or 4. Have been engaged for five years in Surgical Practice.

III. Candidates may then be admitted to Examination for the Degree of Master of Surgery.

IV. The subjects of the Examination shall be—1. Logic (if not passed previously). 2. Surgery. 3. Surgical Anatomy, with Demonstrations on the dead subject. 4. Surgical Pathology. 5. Surgical Operations on the dead subject. 6. The practical use of Surgical apparatus.

V. Candidates will also be required to write Commentaries on Cases in Surgery, and to write Reports on such Surgical Cases in a Hospital as the Examiner may direct, and to answer oral interrogations on their Commentaries and on their Reports of Surgical Cases on Surgical Anatomy, Surgical Pathology, Surgical Operations, and the practical use of Surgical Apparatus.

VI. The Reports on Surgical Cases shall be written immediately after the inspection of the patients, and shall give in detail the history, symptoms, diagnosis, treatment and prognosis, in each case.

VII. Candidates who shall have passed in all the subjects of this Examination and complied with these regulations may be admitted to the Degree of Master of Surgery.

OF THE SPECIAL REGULATIONS FOR CONFERRING DEGREES IN MEDICINE.

I. Where prior to the establishment of a Medical School in the University of Melbourne (3rd March, 1862), any person shall have been in possession of a Diploma or License to practice from any Medical or Surgical Institution legally qualified to grant the same, if he matriculate, and if he produce evidence satisfactory to the Professorial Board that he has been engaged in the practice of his profession for five years at least subsequent to the date of such Diploma or License, such person may be admitted to Examination in the manner hereinafter mentioned for the Degrees of Bachelor of Medicine and Doctor of Medicine.

II. The Examination shall consist of two parts. In the first part the subjects of Examination shall be—The derivation of Medical Terms from the Greek and Latin Languages, the translation of passages from the Latin Pharmacopœia, and the translation of passages from either Xenophon's *Anabasis*, Book I., or Celsus *De Re Medica*, Books I. to IV., at the option of the Candidate, with grammatical questions.

III. No Candidate shall be admitted to the second part of this Examination unless he shall have previously passed the Examination in the first part. In the second part the subjects of Examination shall be—1. Medical Botany, *Materia Medica*, Therapeutics, and writing prescriptions without abbreviations. 2. Chemistry and Practical Chemistry. 3. General and Practical Anatomy, Physiology, and Pathology. 4. Surgery. 5. Theory and Practice of Medicine, and Forensic Medicine. 6. Obstetric Medicine and Diseases of Women and Children.

IV. Candidates will be required to write Commentaries on Cases in Surgery, in Medicine, and in Obstetric Medicine, and the Diseases of Women and Children, and also to write Reports on at least one Medical and one Surgical case, and to answer oral interrogations if any such be proposed on their Commentaries and Reports.

V. Every such Report shall be written immediately after the inspection of the patient, and shall give in detail the history, symptoms, diagnosis, treatment, and prognosis, of each case.

VI. Candidates who shall have passed in all the subjects of this Examination, and complied with these Regulations, may be admitted to the Degrees of Bachelor of Medicine, and Doctor of Medicine, by cumulation.

VII. All such Candidates shall be admitted to Matriculation without Examination.

VIII. Candidates for this Examination will be required to forward their names to the Registrar on or before the fourteenth day of February in each year.

IX. In the preceding Regulations relating to Degrees of Bachelor of Medicine, Doctor of Medicine, and in the Special Regulations for conferring Degrees in Medicine, all Commentaries and Reports therein mentioned shall be taken to form a part of the Examination in the subjects to which they severally refer, and the terms University, Hospital, and Institution, shall mean respectively some University, Hospital, or Institution recognised by the University of Melbourne.

NURSES' HOMES AND TRAINING SCHOOLS.

The Nurse Training School.

The intention of the Managers of the Institution is to instruct and form, not only a class to whom nursing would be the means of earning a livelihood, but also to impart instruction to those who might not be altogether dependent on such labour. From one no fees are asked, but they must do the duty of ordinary nurses for a year, being found by the hospital; from the other a fee of £12 12s. is asked, and they likewise must attend the hospital for a year, and both must pass an examination, after having attended certain lectures, before they receive the hospital's certificate of competency, which to them is their diploma. Gradually all the nurses at the hospital obtain this certificate, and are, as circumstances permit, hired out to private patients who pay for their services, while those who may have left the hospital can have their names placed on the hospital register, and get employment through its means. The managers invited ladies from outside these two classes to attend the lectures given by the honorary staff, and these lectures now possess such interest that the operating theatre, in which they are delivered, is well filled every Friday afternoon. The school continues to grow in public estimation, and the system of hiring out nurses is getting more known; applications are often in excess of the means at present at the disposal of the hospital.

THE AUSTRALASIAN COLONIES.

AUSTRALIA.

Australia is a compact mass of land, lying between lat. 10° and 39° S., and long. 113° and 154° E., having the Indian Ocean on the N. and W., the Pacific on the E., and the Southern Ocean on the S., and, though entirely surrounded by water, it is termed a continent. It is 2,500 miles long from E. to W. on the parallel of 25° S., and 2,000 miles in extreme breadth from N. to S. The area is 2,944,628 square miles, and the coast line about 8,000 miles. Australia is divided into the following five colonies, viz.:—New South Wales, Queensland, South Australia, Victoria, and Western Australia. The population is 2,714,000. The area of all the Australasian Colonies (exclusive Fiji) is 3,161,389 square miles, and the estimated population, 3,440,000.

NEW SOUTH WALES.

New South Wales is bounded on the North by Queensland, on the West by South Australia, on the South by Victoria, and on the East by the Pacific Ocean. The extreme latitudes are $28^{\circ} 10'$ and $37^{\circ} 20'$ S., and the extreme longitudes 141° and $153^{\circ} 40'$ E. It contains an area of 310,700 square miles, and a population of 1,000,000. Its metropolis is Sydney, and the other chief towns are—Newcastle, Maitland, Bathurst, Goulburn, Albury and Parramatta.

QUEENSLAND.

Queensland forms the North-Eastern portion of the Australian Continent. It lies between lat. 29° and $10^{\circ} 45'$ S., and long. 138° and $153^{\circ} 30'$ E. The Pacific, Torres Straits, and Gulf of Carpentaria form the Northern boundary; the Southern boundary is formed by New South Wales and South Australia; on the West it is bounded by South Australia, and on the East by the Pacific Ocean. It contains an area of 668,497 square miles, with a population of 340,000. Brisbane is the metropolis, and the other chief towns are—Ipswich, Rockhampton, Gympie, Townsville, and Maryborough.

SOUTH AUSTRALIA.

South Australia embraces the whole central portion of the Continent. From the Great Bight to lat. 26° S. it lies between long. 129° to 141° E., and from lat. 26° S. to the Gulf of Carpentaria, between long. 129° to 138° E. It is thus bounded on the North and South by the Ocean, on the West by Western Australia, and on the East by Queensland, New South Wales, and Victoria. It contains an area of 903,690 square miles, and a population of 325,000. Its metropolis is Adelaide, and the other principal towns are—Port Adelaide, Glenelg, Koorunga, Mount Gambier, and Kapunda.

VICTORIA.

Victoria is the smallest division of Australia, and forms the extreme S.E. part of the Continent. It extends from lat. 34° to 39° S., and from long. 141° to 150° E. It is bounded on the North by the river Murray, which divides it from New South Wales, on the East by the Pacific, on the South by Bass' Straits, and on the West by the meridian of 141° E., which divides it from South Australia. It contains an area of 87,884 square miles, and a population of 1,012,000. Melbourne is its metropolis, and the other chief towns are—Ballarat, Sandhurst, Geelong, Stawell, Clunes, Echuca, Warrnambool, Maryborough, Kyneton, Hamilton, Ararat, and Beechworth.

WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

Western Australia is formed by that portion of the continent situated to the West of long. 129° E., which divides it from South Australia; on all the other sides it is bounded by the ocean. It lies between lat. $13^{\circ} 44'$ and 35° S., and long. 129° to 113° E. It contains an area of about 1,060,000 square miles, and a population of 37,000. Perth is the metropolis, and the other chief towns are—Fremantle, York, Albany, and Geraldton.

TASMANIA.

Tasmania is an island situated south of the eastern part of Australia, from which it is separated by Bass' Strait, 150 miles wide. It lies between lat. $40^{\circ} 44'$ and $43^{\circ} 39'$ S., and long. $144^{\circ} 38'$ and $148^{\circ} 24'$ E. It contains an area of 24,330 square miles, or 26,375 square miles including the other islands belonging to the colony. The total population is 136,000. Hobart is the capital, and Launceston is the chief town in the north of the island; the other principal towns are—Beaconsfield, Longford, Westbury, and New Norfolk.

NEW ZEALAND.

New Zealand consists of a group of islands in the South Pacific Ocean, lying between lat. $34^{\circ} 12'$ and $47^{\circ} 20'$ S., and extending diagonally between the extreme long. of $166^{\circ} 30'$ and $178^{\circ} 40'$ E. The two principal islands are the North Island and the South or Middle Island, and a third off the south coast of the South Island is called Stewart Island; besides these there are the Chatham and Auckland Islands, and other groups belonging to the colony. The North Island is divided from the Middle or South by Cook's Strait, and the South Island from Stewart's by Foveaux Strait. The area of the whole group is about 104,403 square miles. The total population is 590,000, including about 45,000 Maoris. The North Island is divided into four provincial districts, viz.:—Auckland, Taranaki, Hawke's Bay, and Wellington. The South Island has five provincial districts—Nelson, Marlborough, Canterbury, Otago (with Southland), and Westland. Wellington is the capital of New Zealand and the seat of Government; Auckland was the former capital, and the other chief towns on the North Island are—Napier, Thames, Wanganui, and New Plymouth. The principal towns on the South or Middle Island are—Dunedin, Christchurch, Nelson, Oamaru, Invercargill, Lyttelton, Timaru, and Hokitika.

FIJI.

The Fiji Islands, in the Pacific Ocean, extend from lat. 16° to 21° S., and from long. 177° E. to 178° W. There are 200 islands in the group, about 80 of which are inhabited. The largest islands are—Viti Levu on the Western side, and Vanua Levu on the Northern side of the group. The seat of Government is at Suva on Viti Levu; the former capital was Levuka, on the island of Ovalau. The white population of this Crown-colony is about 2,500, and the native population 115,000. The principal districts are—Taviuni, Rewa, Navua, and Ba.

NEW GUINEA.

New Guinea lies wholly to the south of the equator, extending between lat. $0^{\circ} 22'$ and $10^{\circ} 42'$ S., and between long. $130^{\circ} 50'$ and $150^{\circ} 50'$ E. Its extreme length is 1,490 miles, and its greatest breadth about 410 miles. Its area is about 300,000 square miles. Port Moresby, on the S.E. shore of the large Papuan Gulf, is the principal port.

SAMOA.

The Samoa or Navigators Islands are situated between lat. $13^{\circ} 13'$ and $14^{\circ} 30'$ S., and long. 168° and 173° W. They consist of two groups, the eastern containing four islands, and the western thirteen; the largest island is Savaii, or Salovohi, which is 120 miles in circuit. The finest island is Upolu, on which is Apia, the chief town of the group. The native population is reckoned at about 35,000.

TONGA.

The Friendly or Tonga Islands lie 200 miles E. of the Fiji Group, between lat. 13° and 23° S., and long. 173° to 176° W. They consist of three separate groups, comprising in all about 120 islands, of which about 40 are inhabited by a population of about 30,000. Tonga, or Tongatabu, is the largest island.


