While in practical, regional and systematic descriptions the attention is riveted on the individual structures, regions or systems, and their relations, this work presents the body in such a way that organic unity of the whole may never be lost sight of. The method of the work is at once destructive and contructive; the abdomen can be reduced to its parts, the parts can be studied both individually and in relation to each other, and, lastly, the parts can be rebuilt into the whole. In the text this is accomplished by the order. Each part is described in natural sequence to what has gone before and in natural precedence to what is to follow, and all the parts are further correlated by references. The plates, though few in number and by no means overcrowded with detail, present a complete abdomen proper with every structure in situ. By a simple and entirely novel device almost any degree of correlation is possible, and since the body is presented in its organic unity the work provides the solution to many difficult problems, not only in pure anatomy, but also in every branch of Medical Science and Art in which anatomy plays a part, e.g., in systematic, regional and practical anatomy, surface anatomy, clinical medicine and surgery, operative surgery, etc. An example or two must suffice. Every organ can be studied completely, its surface anatomy, its parietal, visceral, and peritoneal relations, and its blood- and lymph-vascular and nervous supply. Again, the peritoneal sac is presented in the plates in its entirety, and may be studied not only in the usual way by a consideration of the great and small sacs or by vertical and transverse sections, but also by the destructive and constructive method advocated in the work itself. In the text the peritoneal sac is described from an altogether new point of view, and, in addition, its different portions are dealt with in relation to the individual organs in such a way that the whole sac is gradually built up.

From the very nature of the work it ought to be of service to everyone who is interested in anatomy, whether student or teacher, general practitioner, surgeon or physician.

A model of the sterilising rooms which have been erected at this firm's premises is shown, from which it will be seen that they have installed a powerful autoclave in two specially designed chambers. The apparatus is one of Manlove & Alliott's latest types of high-pressure machines, and has been erected so that the inlet is in one room and the outlet in another, i.e., pure and impure rooms. The dressings are contained in a patent tin, hermetically sealed down. These drums are filled and placed in the steriliser from the impure side, the air is then exhausted at 20 inches pressure, steam at a

temperature of at least 260° Fahr, and 20 lbs. pressure is then forced through the dressings for 20 minutes, and lastly, a vacuum of 20 inches is produced for 20 minutes, abstracting the steam and leaving the dressings perfectly dry. 

HOT SPRINGS OF BATH.

The presence of Radium in considerable quantity in the Bath waters may explain their curative properties. The extremely rare gases, Krypton and Xenon, have recently been discovered by Sir James Dewar.

The accommodation at the Bathing Establishment provides for every form of balneotherapy, and includes Deep Baths, containing from 600 to 800 gallons, and fitted with various douches, Reclining Baths and Swimming Baths. Aix and Vichy Douche Massage is largely employed, and Thermal Vapour Baths, Berthollet Local Vapour treatment, and Needle and other douches are available. The Inhalation Room is fitted with sprays for the treatment of the throat, eyes, and face with pulverised mineral water, and small douches for the nose and ears are included.

Nauheim Baths are largely employed, and Hydro-Electric Baths and Electric Hot Air treatment are administered.

It has also yielded satisfactory results in Gout in all its forms, and Diseases of the Skin (especially those of gouty origin), Rheumatoid Arthritis, Sciatica, and Diseases of the Nervous System, including Neurasthenia and Neuritis, restoring movements and muscular tone after accidents. Various Diseases of Women greatly benefit.

As a table water it is palatable and refreshing, and provides an effective means of continuing at home the benefits obtained at Bath. 

The Macdonald Steriliser.—This steam steriliser is produced as a cheap, extremely simple and absolutely efficient means of sterilising and drying dressings.

It is almost as simple as a pneumatic tyre, being constructed of an outer and inner chamber with a space between, and fitted with lid of a particular form, in which is enclosed a vacuum.

For use, a small quantity of water, 1 to 3 pints, according to the size of the steriliser, is poured into the space between the cylinders, the dressings, loose or in canisters, are placed in the inner chamber, the lid fixed, the tap on the lid opened, and the whole instrument placed on the fire or gas ring, or if desired the heating may be effected electrically. The sterilisation is continued for half an hour after steam has begun to issue vigorously from the escape tap. The tap is then closed and the apparatus set aside to cool

What is novel? The physical principle of steam condensing at the coolest part exposed is made use of to dry the dressings, and a glance at the instrument will show that all condensation takes place in the outer chamber, the inside of the lid being prevented from cooling by the vacuous space. In consequence, after the instrument has been cooled, the dressings, etc., may be removed and will be found to be perfectly dry, and in the most suitable condition for use, and this without any high pressure apparatus whatever. The efficiency of the steriliser is as great as that of the most expensive steriliser produced, and has been repeatedly tested bacteriologically.

Anthrax spores were killed in 10 to 15 minutes, Mesentericus spores which resisted boiling for 20 minutes were destroyed in 20 to 25 minutes, and Streptococci, Staphylococci, and Typhoid Bacilli were killed in 3 to 5 minutes.

Instruments may be sterilised along with the dressings.

The largest sizes are sufficient to sterilise all the coats and dressings for a major operation, the smallest sizes are designed to sterilise dressings and instruments for post-operative and other wounds, all that is necessary for repeated use being to drop the remains of the dressings and the instruments back into the steriliser and repeat the process. It will thus prove to be the most profitable investment a practitioner can make.

steel rod passing through a hem in the end of the sheet and fitting into a groove in the roller. The roller is rotated by a worm gearing and handle, by turning which both sheet and patient are drawn up towards the head of the bed. A few turns bring the patient on to the pillow, a few more turns into a sitting posture in which the whole spine is thoroughly supported.

The double form of the appliance has a second roller at the foot of the bed, a few more turns of the handle sufficing to lift the patient entirely free of the mattress.

The rollers are made to fit any breadth of bed. Suitable sheets are supplied.

THE ANASTASIA,

A further device operated by the same roller, is designed for the relief of patients, such as wounded soldiers or the victims of accidents, requiring constant sanitary attention. It enables one attendant to change with celerity and ease an ordinary sheet, and also dress the patient's back.

By a few turns of the handle the frame that surrounds the bed in such a position as not to interfere with the bed clothes is elevated to the desired height. Removable webs covered with mackintosh are stretched across it, upon which the patient lies in a perfectly horizontal position. The apparatus can also be tilted to any desired angle.







The apparatus is of simple construction. consists of an adjustable burner, a boiler and an exit tube which serves the purpose of a steam injector. The injector, which takes the place of the ordinary spout of a kettle, is the principal and most important feature of the apparatus. Steam at a slight pressure, controlled by a safety valve, escapes through a small coned orifice and is projected along the spout. By injection action this current of pressure steam draws in considerable volumes of air at the inlets on the tube just above the boiler. The result is that a current of warm, moist air, with an output of from 200 to 300 feet per minute, is projected into the room. If the water in the boiler contained 1 per cent. of phenol the steam on escaping would contain the phenol in exactly the same proportion, but afterwards, of course, the mixture is considerably diluted with air. So long as the water supply with its antiseptic is maintained, so long therefore is a current of warm, moist, antiseptic air furnished. In short, the apparatus effects the warming, moistening, and charging of the air of the room with an antiseptic which is obviously available for the patient suffering from any form of respiratory disease. It should be added that the spout can be turned in either a vertical or horizontal direction, so that, if desired, the current of antiseptic, moist, warm air can be projected straight to the patient."

At the Annual Meeting of the British Medical Association at Belfast in July, 1909, Her Excellency the Countess of Aberdeen paid a visit to inspect the invention, which secured the highest approval of the many practitioners present.

Since its exhibition at Belfast, a number of minor details, suggested by the Medical Profession have been adopted in connection with the apparatus, which have considerably added to the



sterile, that it has no flavour of having been boiled, and that it contains no added substance that would inhibit the growth of microbes intentionally added.

It is used in all forms of rheumatism, and also in such allied disorders as rheumatoid arthritis, lumbago, gout, sciatica, etc.

Jothion.—An organic iodine compound, for external use, provides "iodine" or "iodide" treatment. It is painted on in strengths varying from 5 to 25 per cent., according to circumstances, care being taken that the diluent is water-free.

Mesotan.—An external anti-rheumatic, is applied mixed with olive oil, and enables salicylic acid to reach directly the affected parts.

Although they contain a much smaller percentage of iodine and bromine, they produce equal results. The adult dose of each preparation is 15—45 grains, 3 times a day.
- Tannigen.—An internal astringent, is recommended in diarrhoea, especially the summer diarrhoea of children. It is tasteless and odourless, and passes through the stomach unchanged. The dose is 10—15 grains at first, reduced later to 5—10 grains.
- Theorin-sodium Acetate.—Perhaps the most powerful diuretic known to the profession, is used in 4-grain doses dissolved in water. Many accounts of apparently hopeless cases cured by the Theorin salt have appeared in the medical journals.
- Thyresol.—A methyl ester of santalol, is used in gonorrhea. It is an improvement on sandalwood oil in that it is less toxic, less irritating to the stomach, produces no eructation, and is practically odourless. The dose is 5 minims 3 times a day, and may be given in drops or in capsules (5 minims in each).
- Veronal has been described as the surest of all hypnotics. A 5-grain dose is usually sufficient. It is advised that Veronal should be dissolved in hot liquid before administration.
- Veronal Sodium is simply Veronal rendered very soluble, and is useful for rectal injection, in such cases as sea-sickness, where oral administration is impossible. The dose is the same as that of Veronal, viz., 5 grains and upwards.



- 1 Human milk requires less time for digestion in the stomach than diluted cow's milk.
- 2. The addition of Albulactin to cow's milk renders its gastric digestion equal in time to that of human milk.

Professor J. Cassel and Dr. H. Kamnitzer, at the Wilmersdorf Children's Home, Berlin, found that when Albulactin is added to diluted cow's milk it makes the resulting curds exactly resemble those of human milk. The result of using Albulactin proved that the infant's weight increased from two to four times as much as when fed by other means, and that in all particulars they resembled breast-fed children.



Albulactin + Cow's Milk = Human Milk

Sebelien has shown that the chief difference between human milk and cow's milk consists in their different quantities of milk-albumin, of which human milk contains three times as much as cow's milk. Albulactin, added to prepared cow's milk, removes this deficiency by affording the right -proportion of milk-albumin, thus making its composition identical with that of mother's milk. Albulactin, in fact, is simply milk-albumin as it exists in the natural milk, chemically pure and soluble in water.
