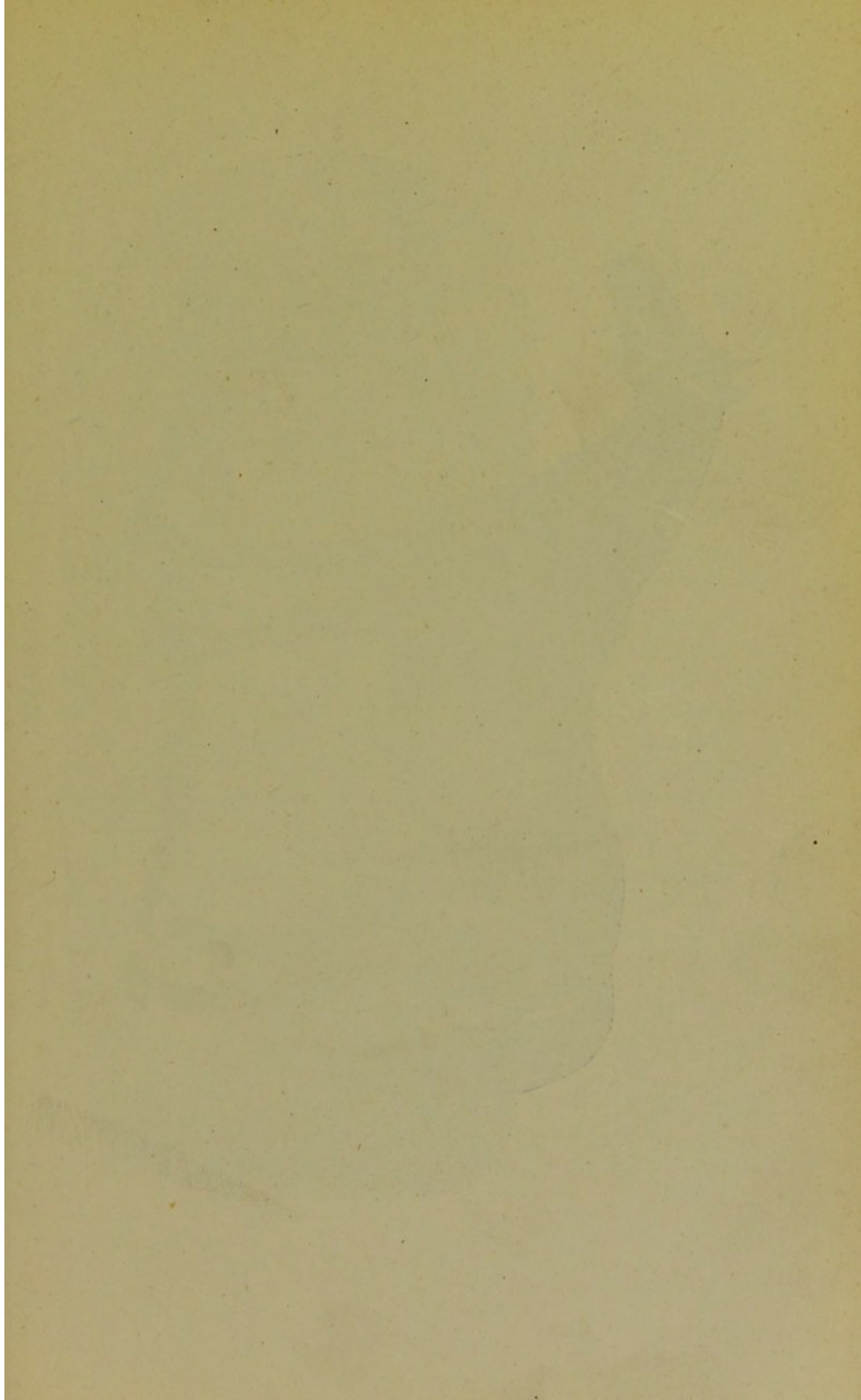

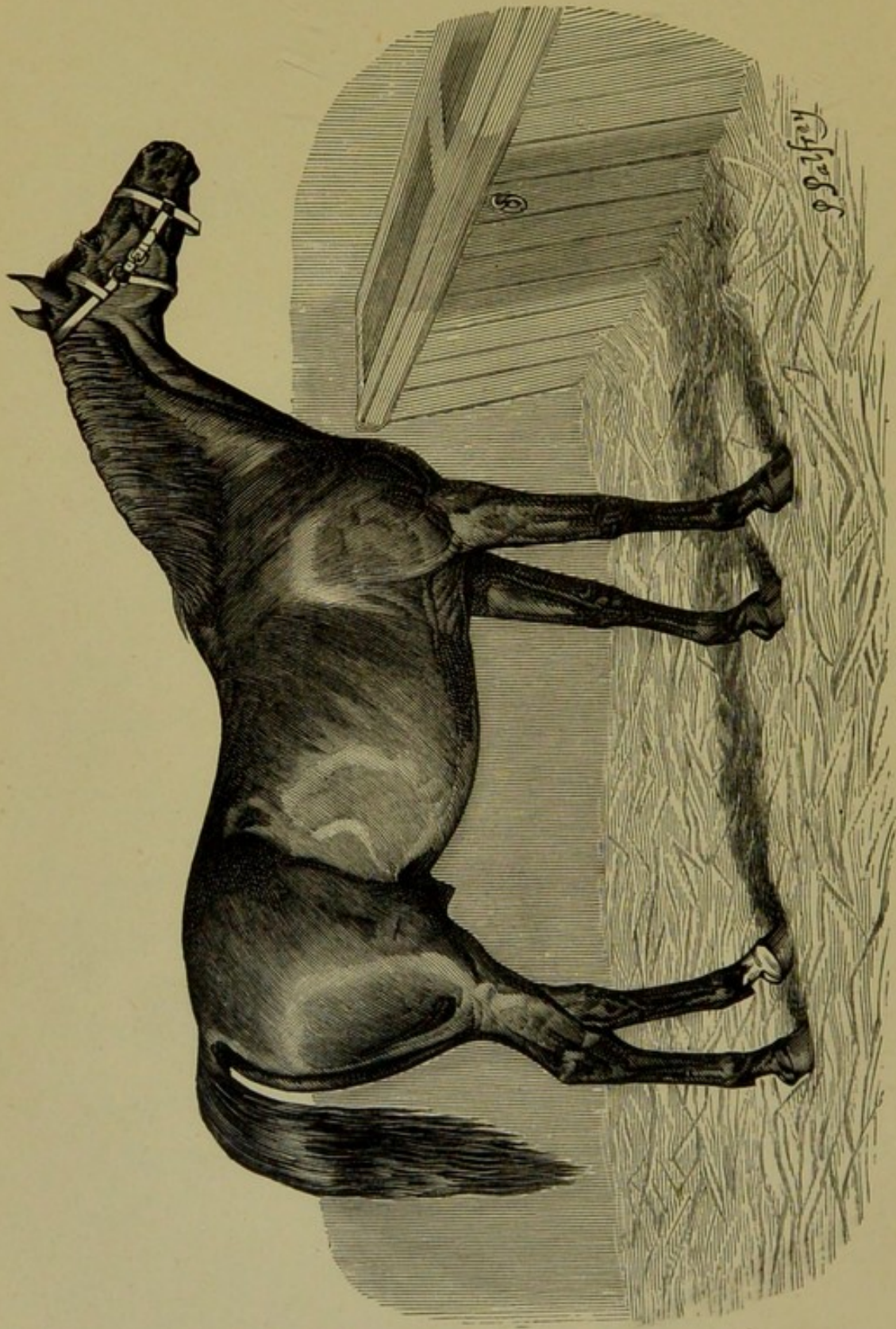
1. To improve and encourage the breeding of Horses for Hunting, Riding, Driving, and Military purposes.

4. To attract public attention to a subject so important to the nation, and to spread knowledge of the principles upon which better horses may be bred.





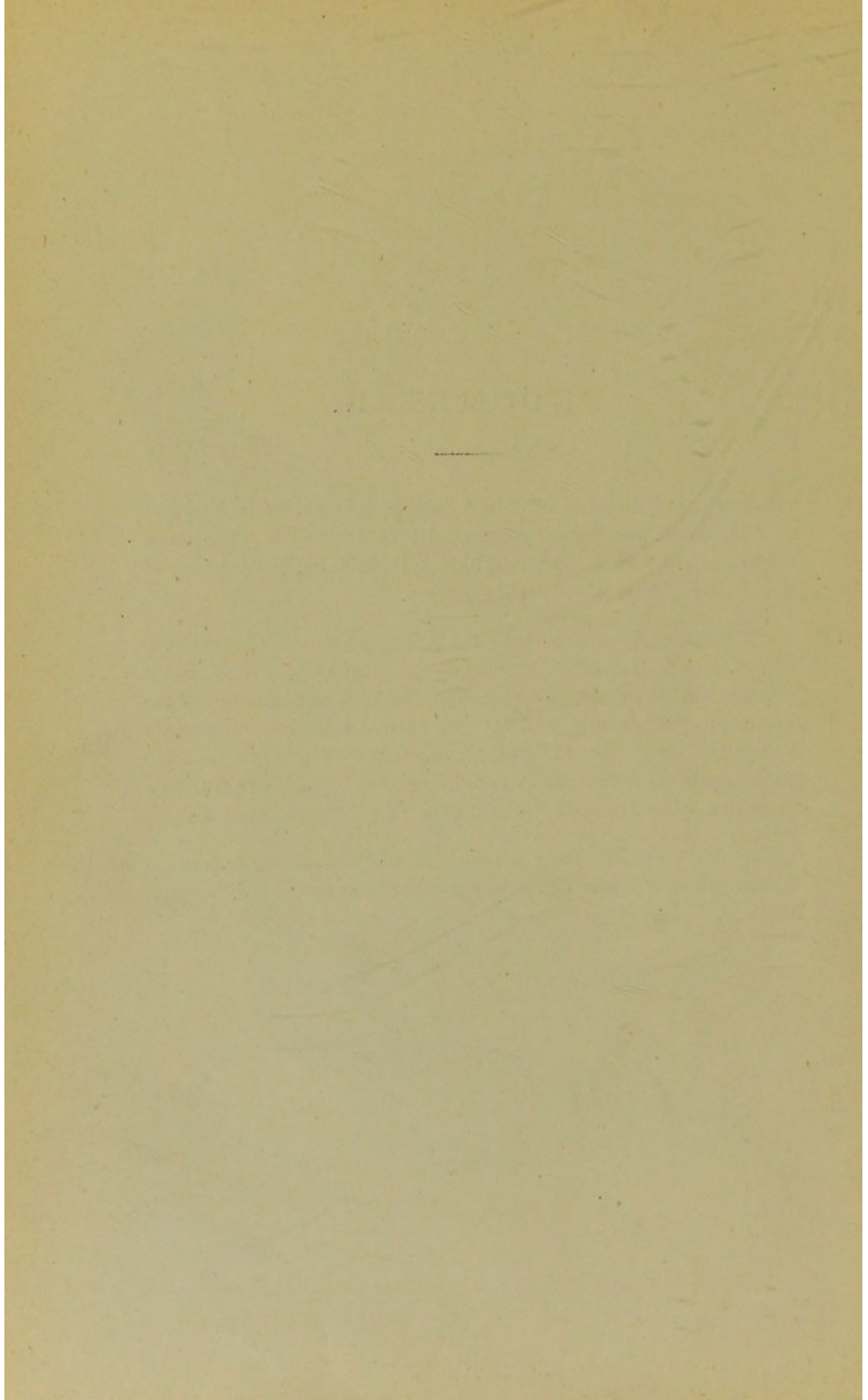
PEDOMETER.

P E D O M E T E R .

“PEDOMETER,” foaled in 1872, by “King Tom,” dam “Miss Peddie” by “Poynton,” was bred by Baron M. de Rothschild, Mentmore, Bucks; and at the time of his death in July, 1889, was the property of Mr. Walter Gilbey, Elsenham Hall, Essex.

“PEDOMETER” won in 1885 the FIRST PRIZE, £100, and GOLD MEDAL at the HUNTERS’ IMPROVEMENT SOCIETY’S SHOW, and a SILVER MEDAL in the following year. In 1887 he gained one of the SOCIETY’S PREMIUMS of £50. In 1888 he won a “QUEEN’S PREMIUM” of £200 at the SPRING SHOW at NOTTINGHAM, and £50 PREMIUM at the HUNTERS’ IMPROVEMENT SHOW; in 1889 a QUEEN’S PREMIUM at the JOINT SHOW held at the Royal Agricultural Hall.

His death resulted from effects of a cold contracted during the WINDSOR SHOW, where he was being exhibited as one of the Premium Stallions.

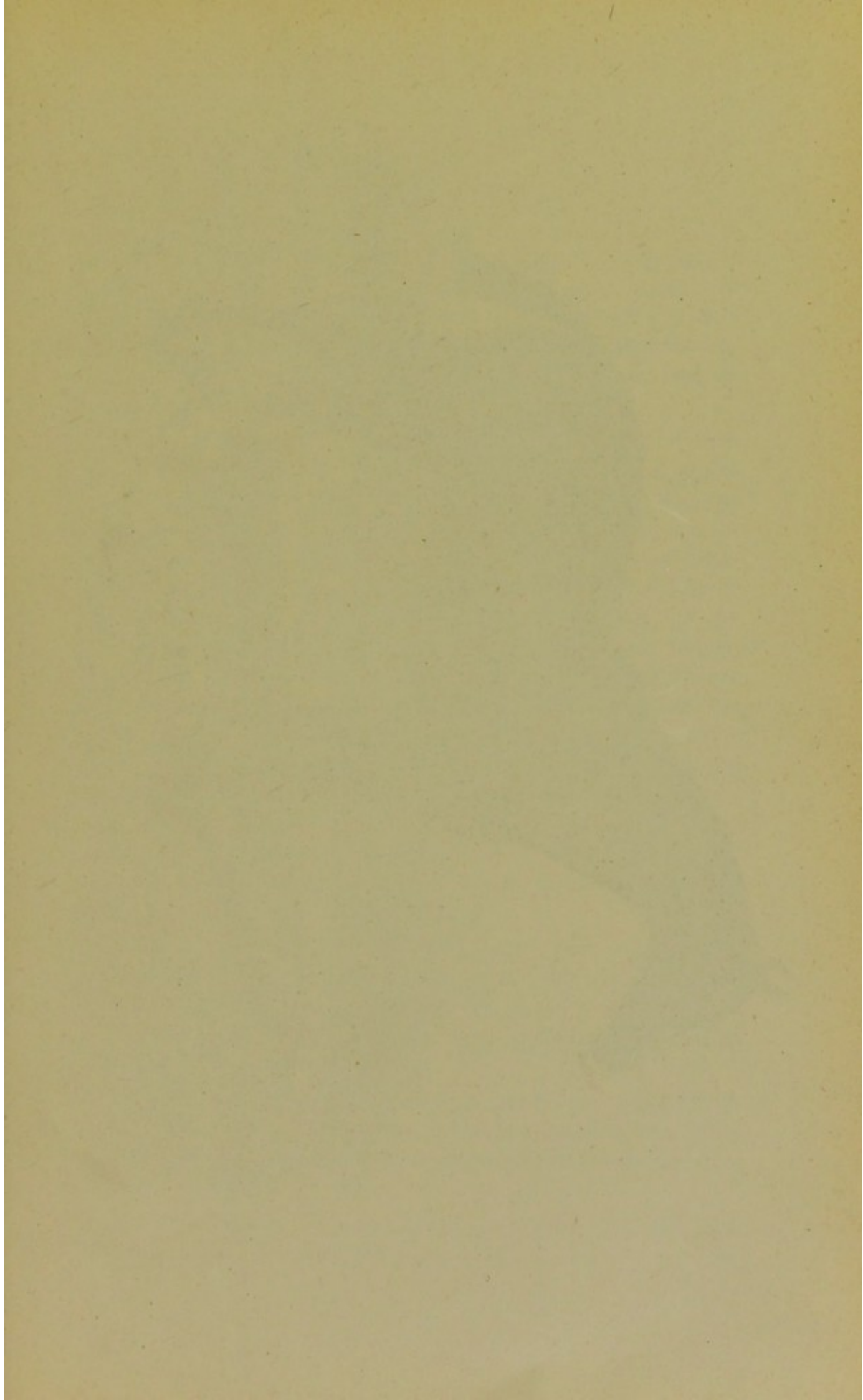

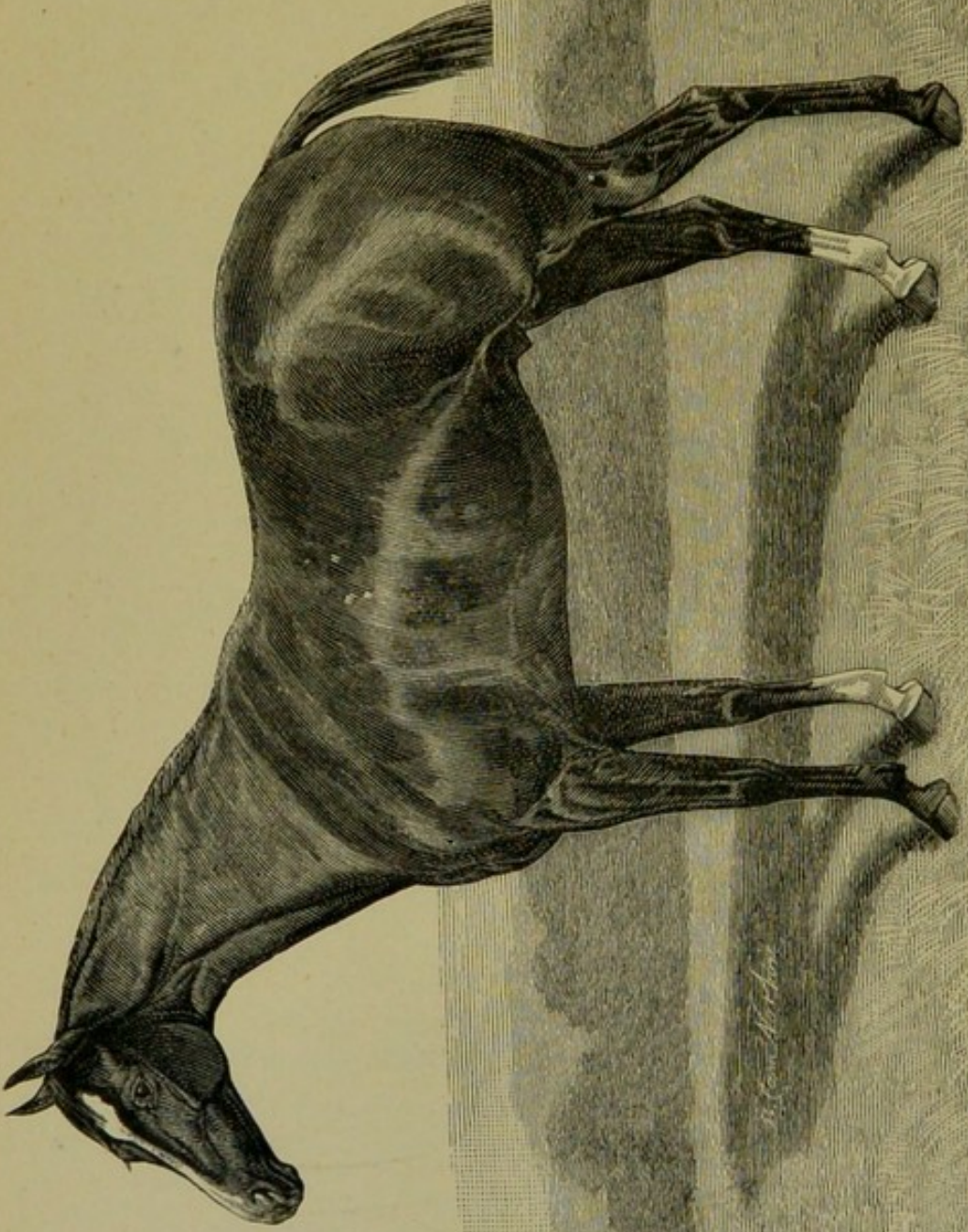

HUGUENOT.

HUGUENOT.

"HUGUENOT" by "Lowlander," out of "Eurydice" by "Orpheus," was a winner of numerous prizes in the show-ring, among which were the following:—The HUNTERS' IMPROVEMENT SOCIETY'S MEDAL and £50 three years in succession; FIRST PRIZE at Chester, Lincoln, Spalding, Cardiff, Lancaster, Bath, and West of England; and the QUEEN'S PREMIUM of £200 at Nottingham, 1888, &c.

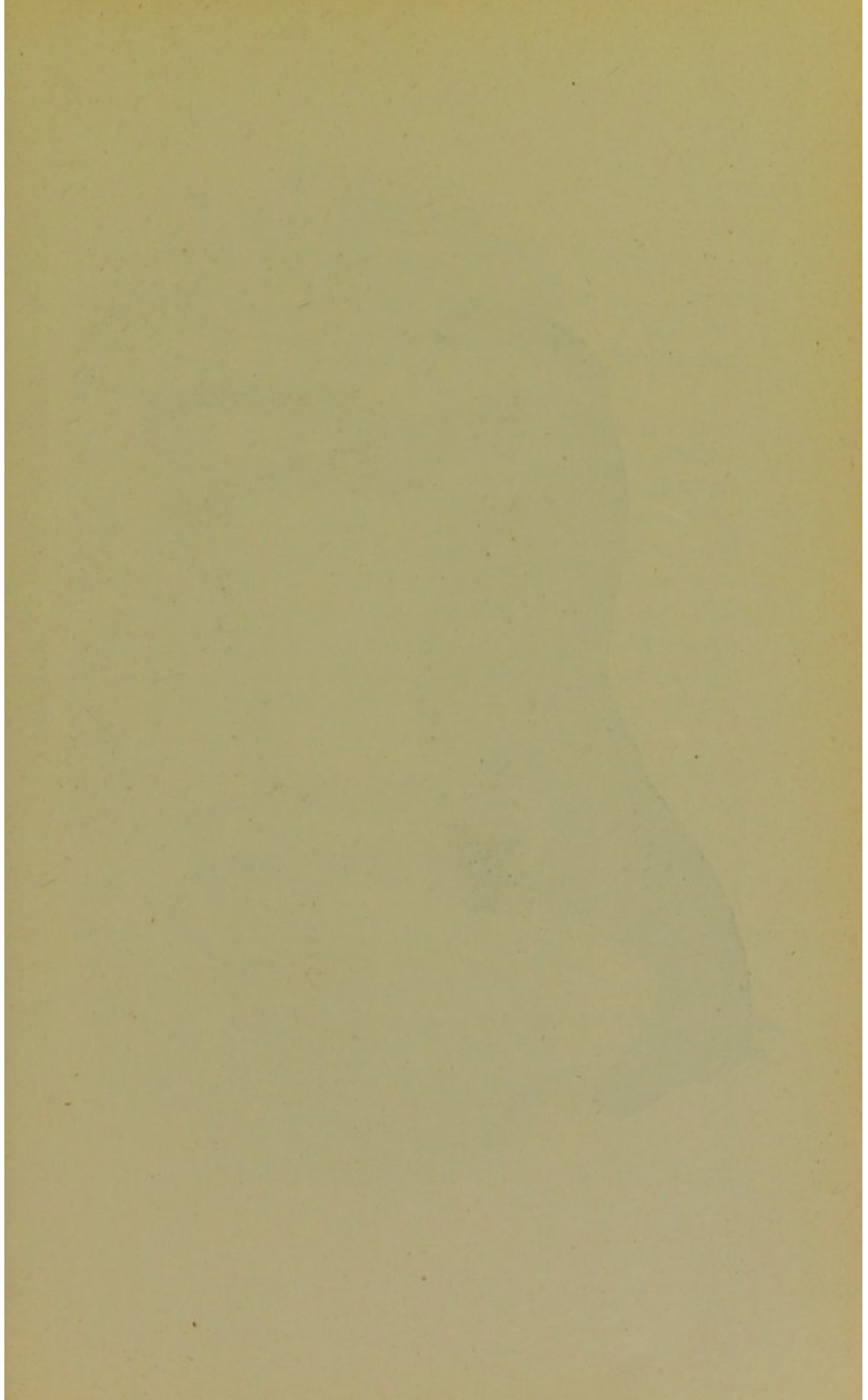
"HUGUENOT" was bred in 1878 by Mr. Constable; he was not trained when two years old, but in 1882 he ran for the Spring Hurdle Handicap at the Curragh, in which he was placed third. His next appearance was at Howth and Baldoyle, where, carrying 10 st. 6 lb., he won the Sutton Hurdle Handicap easily by a length. His next essay was at Cork Park, where, carrying 11 st. 3 lb., he gained the Visitors' Handicap Hurdle Plate in a canter; and next day he won the Munster Plate, one mile and a half on the flat, easily by six lengths. In 1883, on the first occasion of his running over a country, he was beaten by "Pride of Prussia" at the Baldoyle Spring Meeting; but at Manchester he won the Spring Steeplechase, three miles and a quarter, by ten lengths, and next day, carrying 11 st. 7 lb., he won the County Palatine Hurdle Handicap. This event he gained easily by a length; he thus won five times out of the seven that he started, being only twice beaten. Unhappily he injured his leg in this last race, and never subsequently ran; otherwise he would have proved a hot favourite for the Liverpool Grand National of that year.

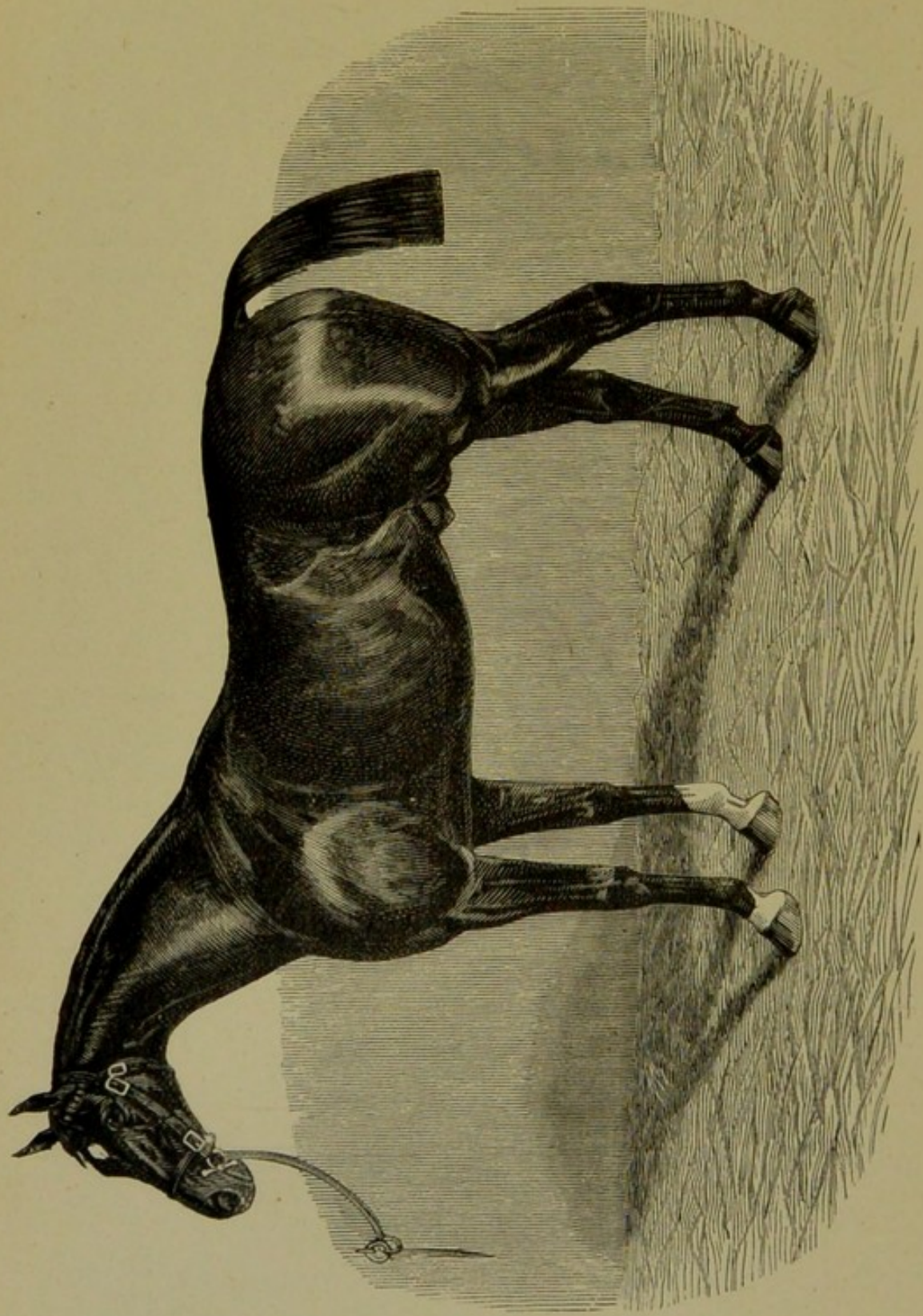
"HUGUENOT" was purchased by the Compton Stud Company from Lord Marcus Beresford in 1885, and remained their property till he died in the spring of 1889. The loss was a great one to his owners, and his death was greatly regretted not only by them, but by breeders of half bred stock generally.

"HUGUENOT" not only won numerous prizes himself, but his offspring also followed in his footsteps, as his stock have won over thirty 1st prizes, besides numerous 2nds, at various shows, though the oldest are only 3 years old.

The following are some among the many prizes that his stock have won:—viz., 1st prize for yearlings, at Sherborne; 1st prize

for yearlings, at Bath; 1st prize at Bath and West of England for yearlings; 1st prize at Sherborne for two-year-olds; 1st prize at Bath and West of England (two-year-olds); 1st prize for the best Filly (two-year-old) at the Royal, Windsor, and Champion Gold Medal at Windsor for best Hunter Mare in the Show; 2nd also for yearling at Windsor in a class of 38 competitors, and the Hunters' Improvement Society's Premium for two-year-olds at Islington.





TRUEFIT.

TRUEFIT.

“TRUEFIT,” foaled in 1880, dark chestnut, by “Outfit,” dam “Eleanora” by “Wild Dayrell,” was bred by the late Mr. C. Snewing, and is now the property of Mr. Burdett-Coutts, M.P., of Holly Lodge, Highgate, N.

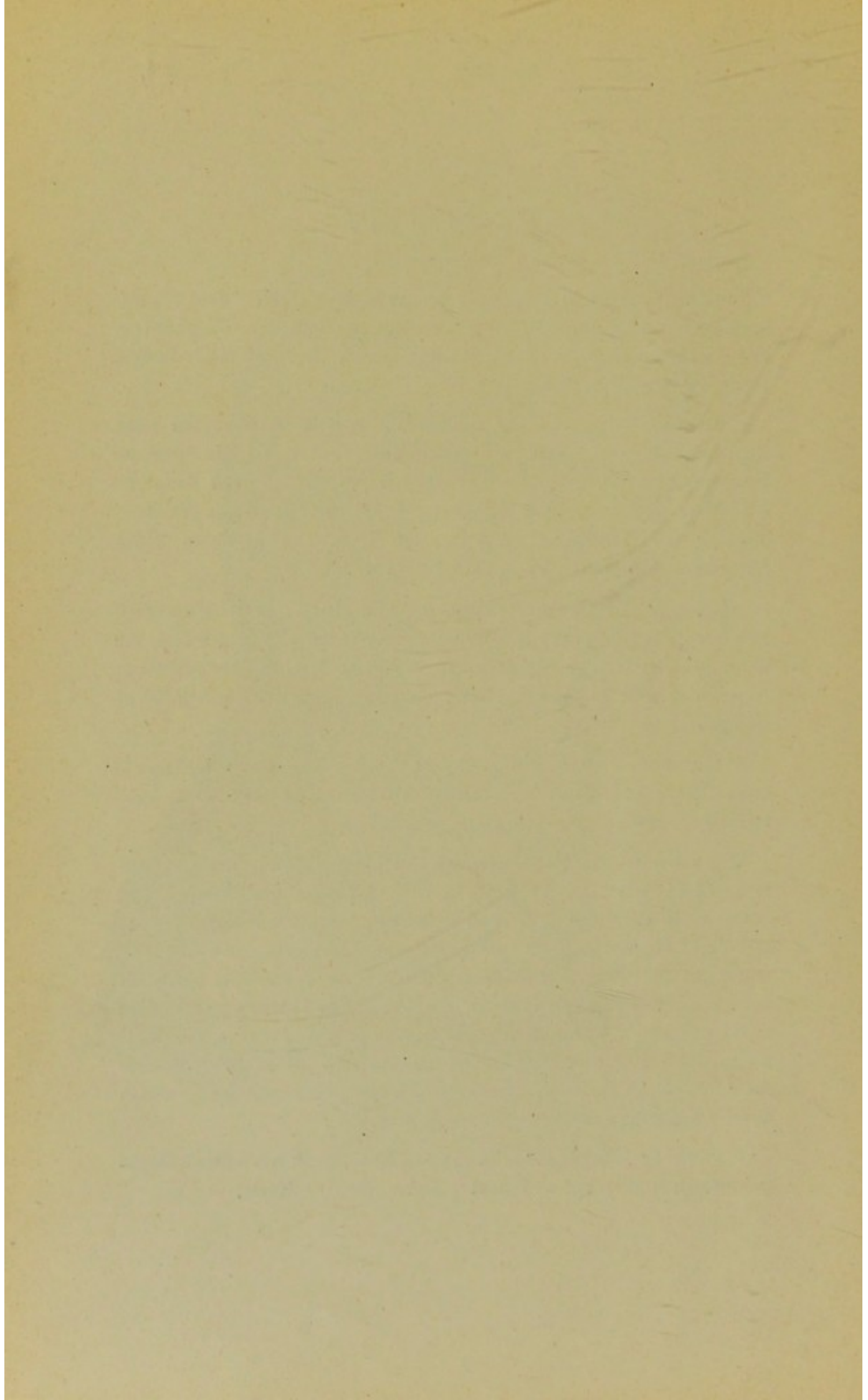
“TRUEFIT” has won the following races:—1884, Kempton Park Qualifying Hunters’ Steeplechase, carrying 10 st. 3 lb.; the Southern Hunters’ Flat Race, Sandown Park, carrying 11 st.; the Hunters’ Flat Race at Lewes, carrying 12 st.; Kempton Park Open Hunters’ Steeplechase, carrying 11 st. 1 lb.; in 1885, the Littleton Hunt Steeplechase, Kempton Park, carrying 11 st. 2 lb.

He gained in 1886 PREMIUM of £50 and MEDAL at the HUNTERS’ IMPROVEMENT SOCIETY SHOW, Islington; in 1887, FIRST PRIZE for Thoroughbred Hunter Stallions, Royal Agricultural Society’s Show at Newcastle; and in March, 1889, QUEEN’S PREMIUM of £200 at Islington.

“TRUEFIT’S” successful career as a racehorse and steeplechaser is exemplified in his successes recorded above, and he deserves at least to have the best steeplechase mares sent to him.

His shoulders are grandly placed, and his back and quarters first-rate. He is exceptionally good in bone, his fore-legs possessing $8\frac{3}{4}$ inches of it below the knee, and in addition being wonderfully clean and flat. He shows plenty of muscle on his thighs. “TRUEFIT,” moreover, possesses that great desideratum in a stallion, plenty of heart room, as he has great depth of chest, and he is also a grand horse to meet or follow. One other great feature in this horse is, that he is a splendid walker, a virtue that he transmits to his offspring to a remarkable extent, while he trots with that easy powerful swing which at once takes the eye of every hunting man.

“TRUEFIT” stands at the Brookfield Stud, St. Alban’s Road, Highgate Road, N.W.; and at Purseley Farm, Shenley, Herts.

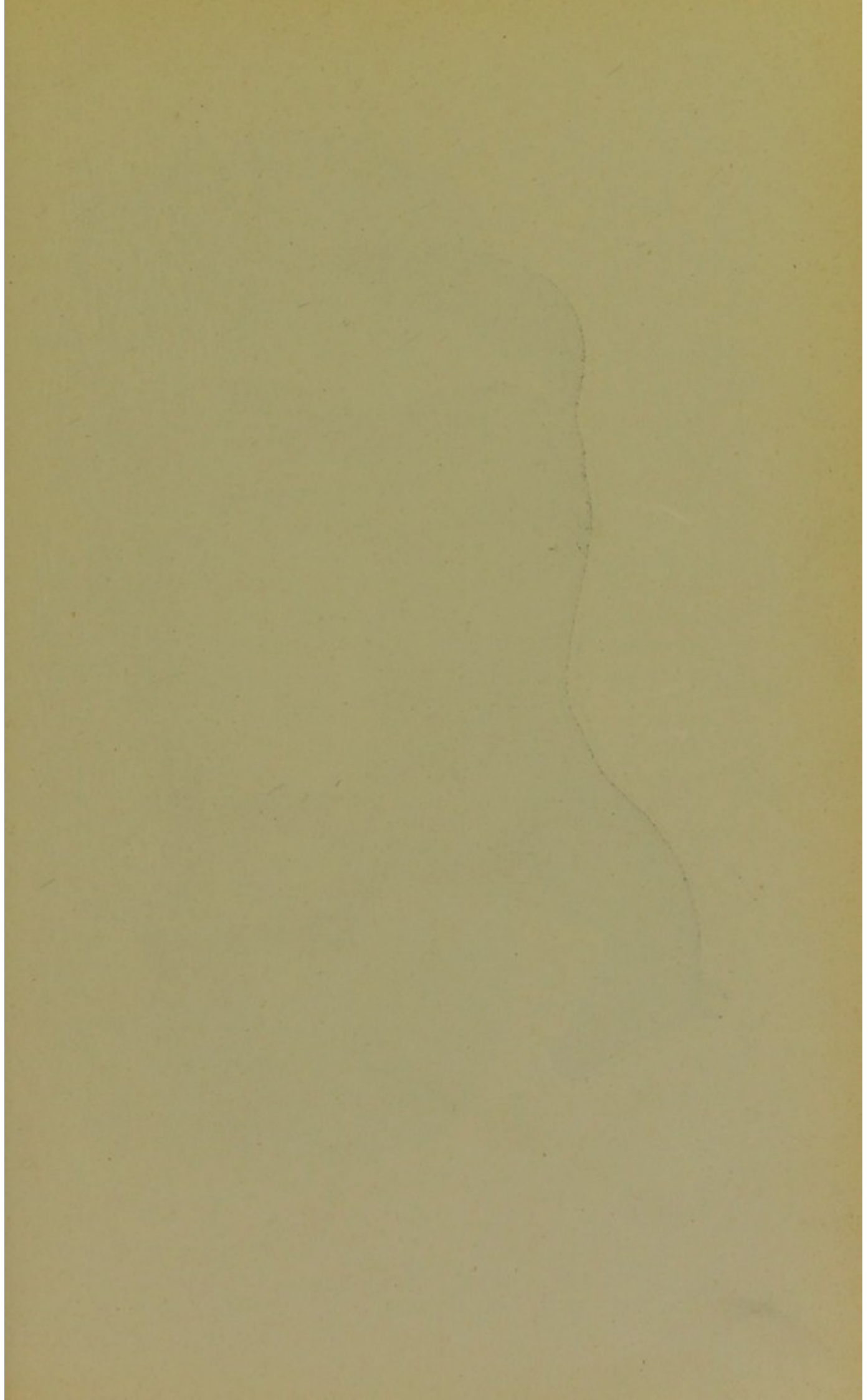

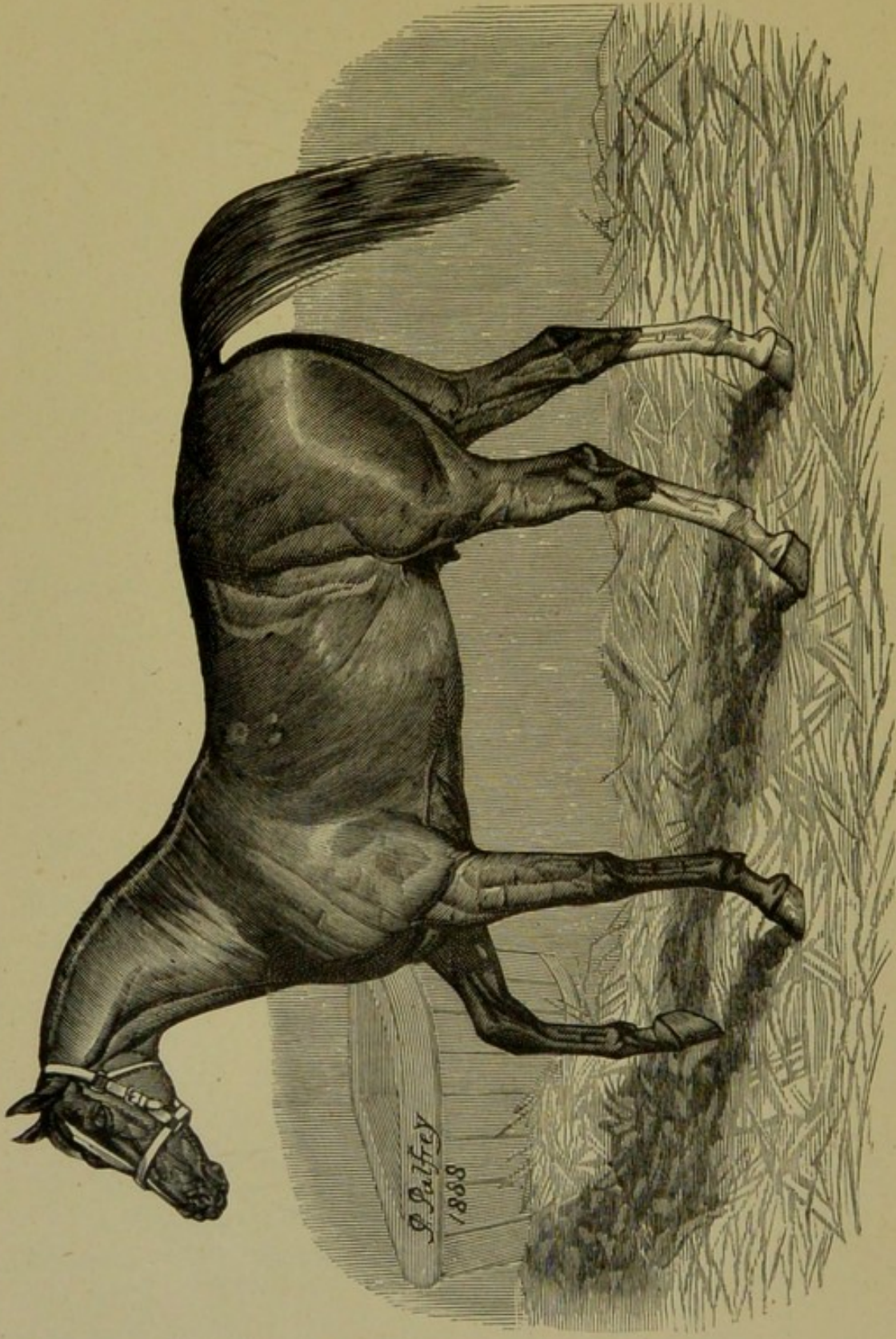

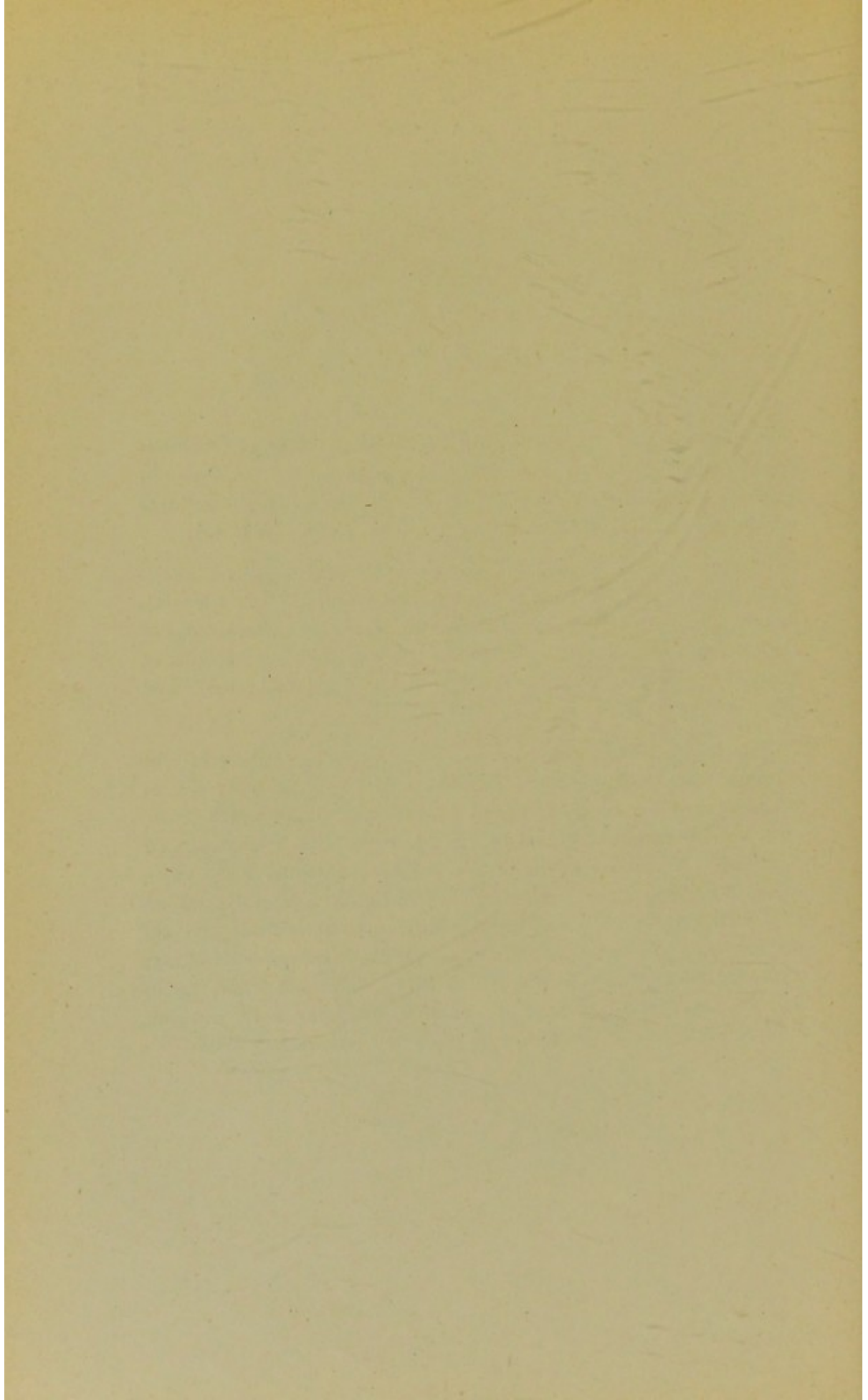
BLUE GRASS.

BLUE GRASS.

"BLUE GRASS," the property of Mr. William Steel, of Camerton Stud Farm, Workington, Cumberland, is a chestnut stallion, foaled in 1880, by "Pat Molloy," dam "Amy Farley" by "Planet," and was bred by Mr. A. J. Alexander, Woodburn Stud, Kentucky, U.S.A.

"BLUE GRASS" gained the MEDAL of the HUNTERS' IMPROVEMENT SOCIETY in 1887, and a PREMIUM of £50 and SILVER MEDAL in 1888; while in the same year at Nottingham he was awarded one of the QUEEN'S PREMIUMS. In 1889 he won a QUEEN'S PREMIUM in District Class B (Cumberland, Durham, Northumberland, and Westmoreland).

His racing career was most successful. He ran second for the Ditton Stakes, carrying 8 st. 9 lb., when only two years old; and as a three-year-old won the Burwell Stakes (8 st. 5 lb.), worth £470, with such horses behind him as "Wild Arab," "Britomartis," and "Export." The same season he won the Ascot Biennial (9 st.), value £710, beating a large field, and the Racing Stakes at Goodwood (8 st. 10 lb.), value £510, beating "Ossian," who afterwards won the Leger! At four years he ran into a place for the Manchester Handicap, value £1,285; at five, he gained the Northumberland Plate, £950, and the Cumberland Plate, £540; and in 1886, as a six-year-old, "BLUE GRASS" won the Alexandra Plate at Ascot, value £960.

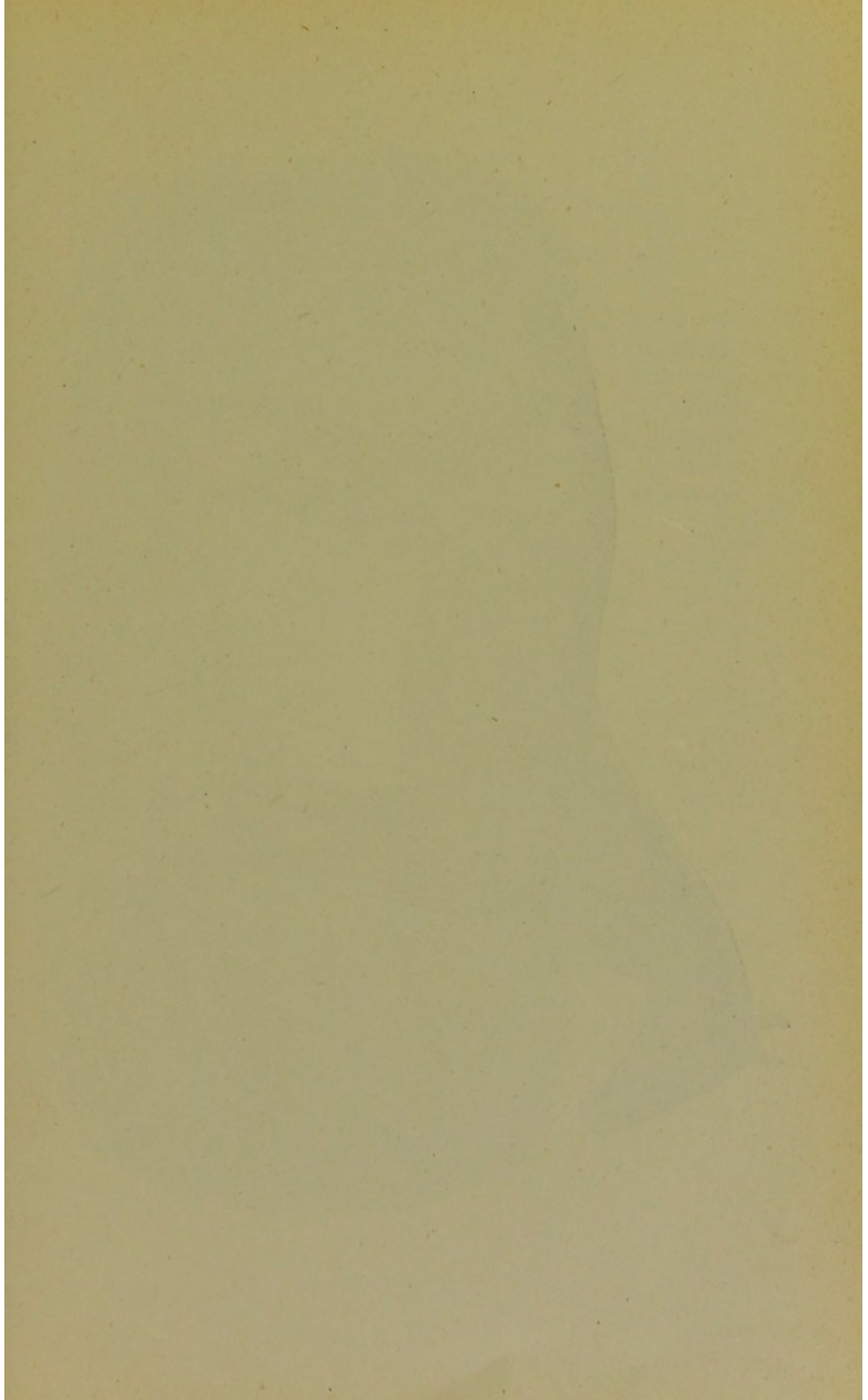

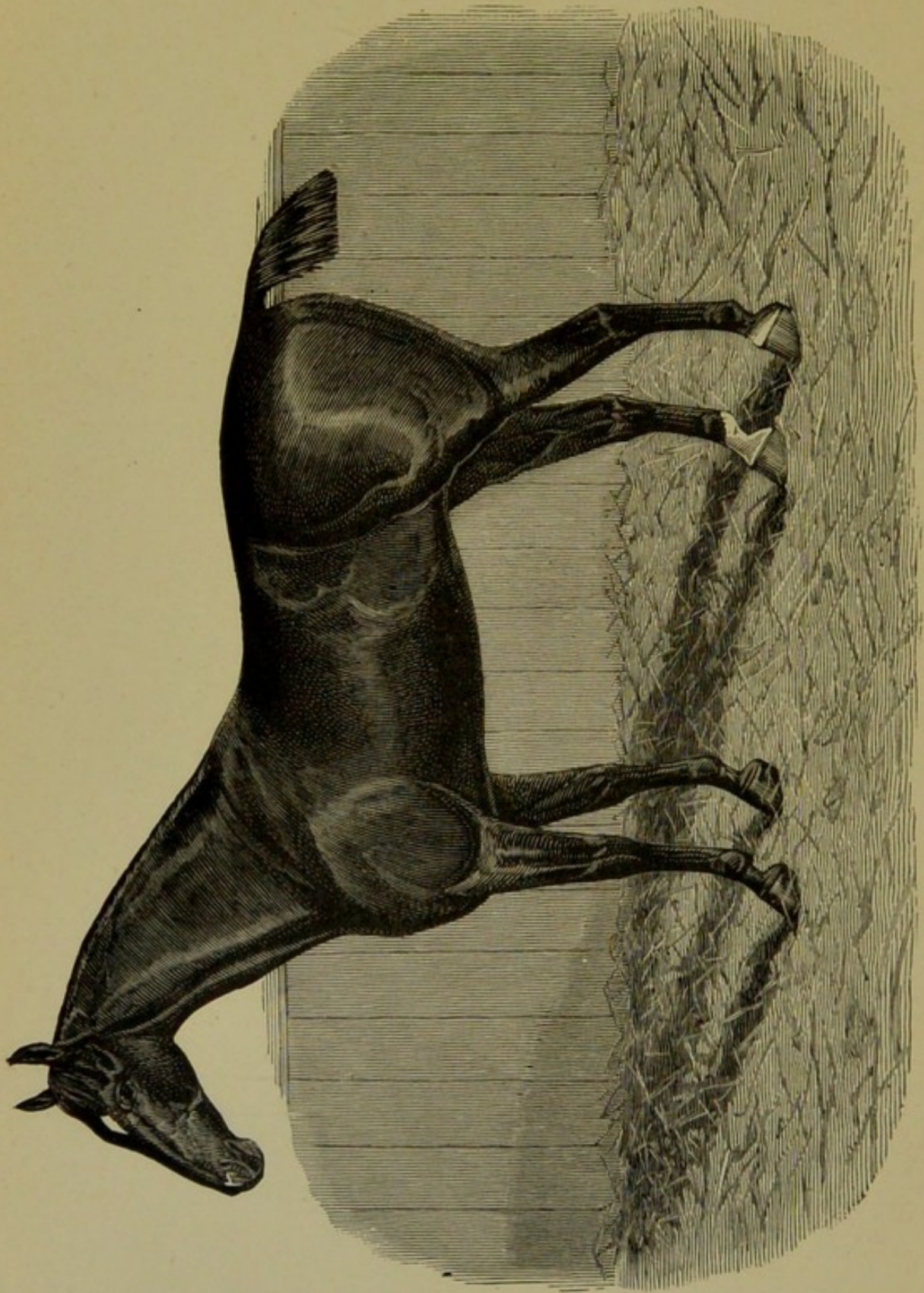

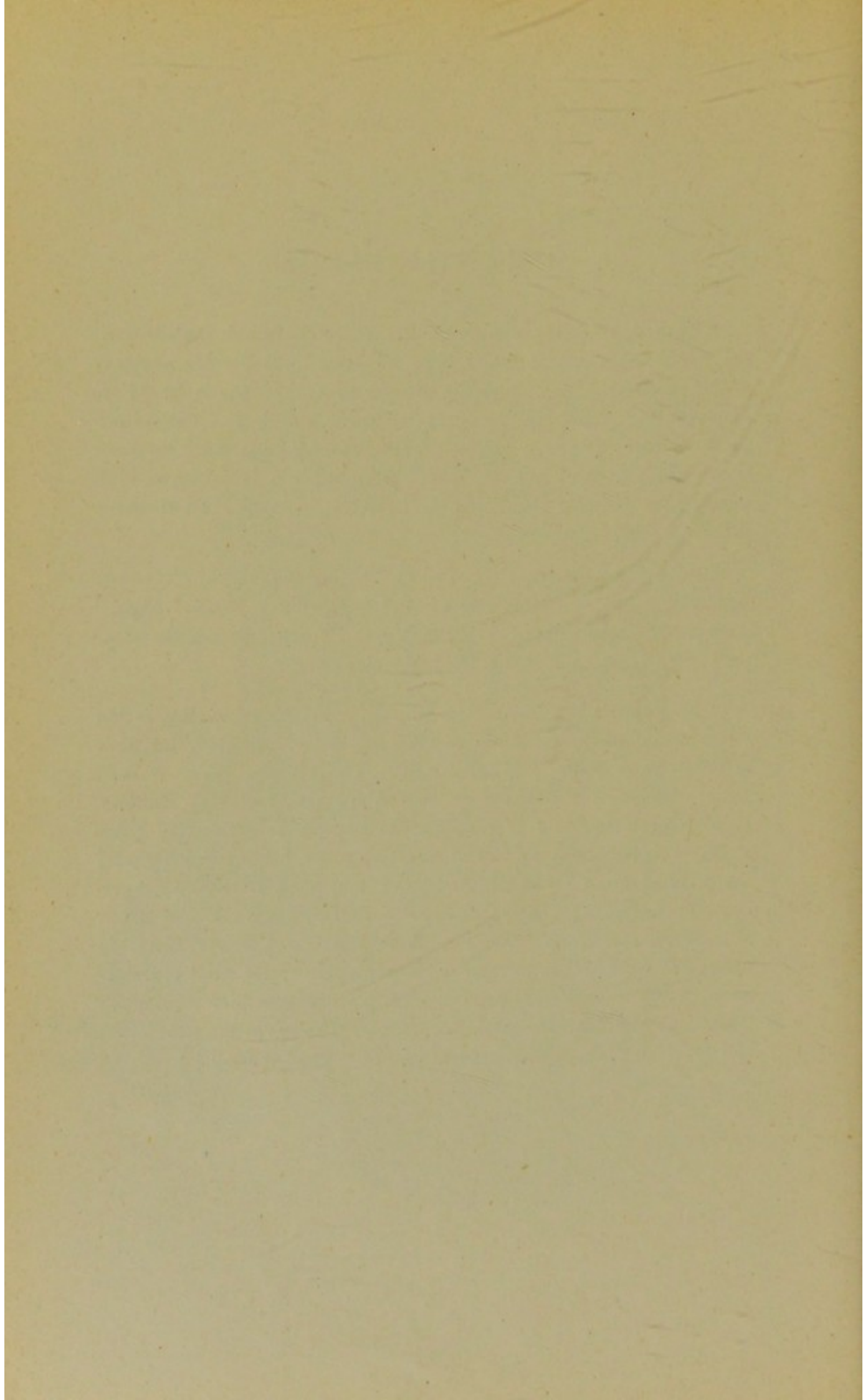
PRINCESS (247).

PRINCESS (247).

"PRINCESS" (247), a brown mare, three years old, foaled April 9th, 1886, standing 15·3 hands high, was bred by and is the property of Mr. Charles Miles, Tatenhill, Burton-on-Trent; she is by "Pero Gomez" by "Beadsman" out of "Lavinia" (74), the well-known prize winner. She is a big, wide, deep-bodied good mare, on short legs, with plenty of quality, bone and substance; is sound, and has good action. She is the fourth foal out of "Lavinia," all of which, including the dam, are prize winners.

"PRINCESS" is now in foal to "Connaught" by "George Frederick" out of "Duchess of Edinburgh" by "Blair Athol." "PRINCESS" was hunted with the Meynell Hounds during the latter part of last season, and is a fine jumper.

"PRINCESS" had been very successful in the show-ring, as the following list of the prizes won by her will show:—In 1887, 3rd prize at Trent Horse Show; 2nd prize at Hoar Cross Horse Show; V.H.C. Derbyshire A.S. at Derby. In 1888, Premium of £15 at Hunters' Improvement Society's Horse Show, Islington, London; 2nd prize at Royal Agricultural Society of England Show, held at Nottingham; 1st prize at Hoar Cross Horse Show; 2nd prize Derbyshire Agricultural Society at Derby; 2nd prize at Gawsworth Horse Show, near Macclesfield. In 1889, Premium of £15 and Silver Medal to breeder at Hunters' Improvement Society's Show; 1st prize at Peterborough Horse Show; 1st prize at Hoar Cross Horse Show; 1st prize (special as the best animal in the Hunter Classes) at the same show, and 1st prize Staffordshire Agricultural Society at Walsall.



P R E F A C E .

THE Third Volume of the Prize Record contains an entry of 247 mares, which includes 198 fresh entries, and the re-entry of 49 registered mares with further particulars as to prizes, produce, &c.

The establishment of a prize line, commenced in the last volume, has been continued in the present book, several entries being the produce of mares registered in Volumes I. and II. The Editing Committee trust that members and others who have this year contributed entries will assist them in this direction in the next and future volumes ; and they would direct their attention to the condition of entry (No. 5), which enables a mare, by a premium thoroughbred sire and out of a dam, registered or eligible for registry, to be entered in the Prize Record.

Entries, accompanied by a veterinary certificate, have been submitted to the Editing Committee under Regulation 4, and in many instances were approved, and will be found among the entries.

The illustrations given in this volume comprise four stallions and one mare, viz. :—

PEDOMETER,
HUGUENOT,
TRUEFIT,
BLUE GRASS,
PRINCESS (247).

to whose owners the Society is indebted for the trouble that they have taken to provide the engravings. By the courtesy of the LIVE STOCK JOURNAL the portraits of "Pedometer" and "Blue Grass" are reproduced, in a reduced form, from the portraits which appeared in that paper.

The Report of the London Show is included, and deals with the Hunter Brood Mares and Fillies entered for the Society's premiums, the Royal Commission on Horse-breeding and the Royal Agricultural Society of England having offered at the

Show their respective service Premiums for Thoroughbred Stallions. A list of the awards, with the names of the District Committees to whom were entrusted the service arrangements, is included, and particulars of the awards made at the Royal Dublin Society's Spring Show, with location of each stallion, are also given.

The conditions of entry for this Volume were as follows :—

- (1) Any Mare is eligible for entry which has been awarded a prize, been highly commended, commended, or reserved, in Hunters' classes at any show in the United Kingdom.
- (2) Any Mare, by a thoroughbred sire or out of a thoroughbred dam, not having herself taken honours, but whose offspring have been awarded honours in Hunters' classes, is eligible for entry.
- (3) Any Mare can be re-entered which has taken further prizes, or produced foals, or changed owners since Volumes I. and II. were compiled.
- (4) Any Mare suitable for breeding hunting and half-bred stock, being approved by Editing Committee, will be eligible for entry. A veterinary certificate, stating that the Mare is free from hereditary disease, must accompany each entry under this condition.
- (5) A Mare by a premium* thoroughbred sire and out of a dam registered, or eligible for registry in the Prize Record, is eligible for entry.

* N.B.—That has gained any of the service premiums of the Hunters' Improvement Society, the Royal Commission on Horse-breeding, the Royal Agricultural Society of England, or the Royal Dublin Society.

The above will also form the conditions of entry for Volume IV. Entry forms will be found at the end of this Volume.

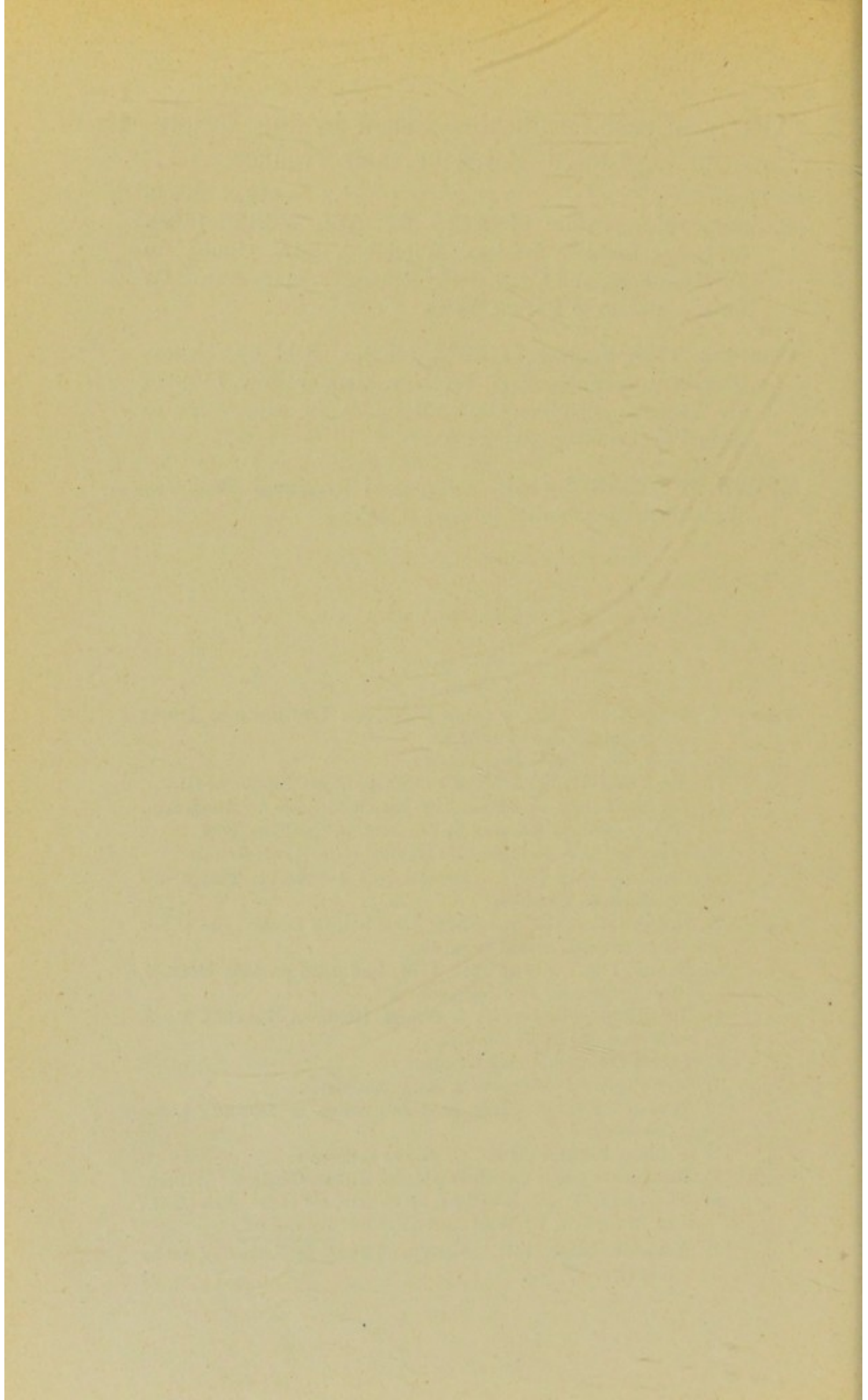

It cannot be too often repeated that this Society came into existence not with any view of direct profit to anybody, but simply to assist in the production of sounder and better horses for hunting, riding, driving, and military purposes; and success herein must necessarily result in considerable profit or advantage to the entire community, and eventually to every part of the world.

Since the formation of the Society, five annual Shows have been held, and the table below conveys a very clear statement of the advances which have gradually been made.

The Show of 1889, with which this report mainly deals, was, of its kind, the grandest exhibition that the world has ever seen. It was the result of the joint action of the Hunters' Improvement Society, the Hackney Horse Society, The Yorkshire Coach-horse Society, and lastly, the Royal Commission on Horse-breeding, acting in conjunction with the Royal Agricultural Society of England.

The Hackney Horse Society endeavours to provide high-class harness horses and cobs with elegant action, and Nos. 2 and 4 on the table below show by the gradual advancement in the number of its exhibits that success is attendant upon its laudable efforts. However, as Mr. Vero Shaw is writing a special report for the Hackney Horse Society, it will not be necessary for me herein further to refer to it.

The abolition, in 1886, of the races known as "Queen's Plates," has set free certain moneys, which, together with a

small—perhaps too small—Governmental grant, now enable the Royal Commission to dispense five thousand pounds a year in direct assistance to breeders; and the Royal Agricultural Society, also wisely following the initiative of the Hunters' Improvement Society, has in 1889 given £650 for the same all-important national object. At No. 1 in the accompanying table the ninety thoroughbred Stallions (four of these being entered as "extra stock") shown in 1889 were attracted, not as in previous years by premiums given by the Hunters' Improvement Society, but by the offer of twenty-five premiums of £200 each, total, £5,000—£4,400 of which were given by the Royal Commission, and £600 by the Royal Agricultural Society.

It is most important that the farmer should recognise the desirability of securing good brood mares; a really good hunter brood mare, that breeds good stock, is worth more than some of the country stallions, and often proves an important source of income to the farmer.

Judgment
essential.

To become the owner of good brood mares, good hunters, or, in fact, anything that is good, two conditions are requisite. The first and foremost is judgment, and the second is money.

The Show system may not be all that can be desired, but no one will deny that it is a great educational medium on a subject in which further knowledge is sorely needed, and the full attainment of that knowledge would soon result in the provision in very large numbers of such good horses as have hitherto only been seen in very small numbers.

What would the present important Shire Horse interest have been without the educational influences connected with its grand annual Show? Would ten years of existence, without Shows, have enabled it to eliminate sidebones, and to have become, as it admittedly now is, the exporter of the best, soundest, and heaviest draught horses?

The Show system is the best system that has yet been devised, and is a natural and logical extension of the movements of our ancestors in the improved breeding of horses.

Mr. S. Sidney, in his "Book of the Horse," wrote as follows:—

"It is therefore abundantly clear that, without any assistance from the State beyond the importation of Charles the Second's royal mares, and a trifling sum annually expended in King's Plates, the noblemen, country gentlemen, and yeomen of England, succeeded between the years 1618 and 1700 in founding on the stock of the best British mares, by the aid of Oriental sires—Barb, Turkish, Arab, Persian—and a few Oriental mares, a tribe of horses superior to either."

Alleged
decline in

Then, as now, there were writers who deplored the decline of our breed of horses, and implored the restrictive interference of the State.

Even as recently as 1826 George the Fourth recommended

“that the exportation of horses should be forbidden,” and in our day this ignorant cry is sometimes repeated. Nothing but immediate national danger would justify such an unfair interference with the liberty of breeders and traders, and were it enacted to-morrow it would not increase or improve the supply for the home market, inasmuch as such curtailment of demand would immediately bring about a lessened supply.

Export of horses.

In the reign of James II., when Turkey was a great European as well as Oriental power, the Sultan obtained, by conquest or tribute, the finest Oriental horses in his armies, and certain of these found their way to England, to the great advantage and improvement of the breeds then prevailing here. Further records fully prove that throughout the eighteenth century the landed gentry encouraged their tenantry to improve their native stock by the use of the then well-established racing blood.

History.

Then, as now, improvements were sought in the four following points, viz.—size, strength, quality, and soundness.

Admiral Rous was in the habit of saying that the average height of race-horses had been raised at the rate of four inches per century; but this could hardly be borne out, seeing that the beautiful long, low, and powerful skeleton of the unconquered and unconquerable “Eclipse,” who lived in 1764, may be now measured to prove that he stood 15·2. He is, however, reported as a biggish horse for that day. The average height of race-horses may now be about 15·3.

Size is a great advantage when it is accompanied by strength, quality, and soundness; but those who breed for size at the sacrifice of other good qualities will repent when 'tis too late.

Advantage of size.

The generality of small hunters are at a discount in the open market, and do not pay for breeding; whereas there is a large margin of profit for the breeder who is fortunate enough to combine size and power with quality. How, in the face of this well-established fact, anyone can breed from ordinary small stock, seems unaccountable. There are in England many hunter-stallions standing the full height of 16 hands to 16·1, that also possess as much quality as the smaller horses can boast. As a

model, I may mention Lord Fitzwilliam's "Xenophon," who stands about 16·1, and yet is built on the same short-legged lines as the beautiful little cobby "Peppermint," who walks under 15·2.

Some like a small stallion to mate with a big coarse mare, with a hope of getting quality from the former and size from the latter. A long and careful experience in breeding horses brings me to the conclusion that the above *desiderata* would not be realised more often than once in ten foals so bred; and the natural tendency being always towards deterioration—or, more correctly speaking, towards the unimproved original jungle or prairie stock—the foal so hopefully bred from the small blood-horse of quality and the coarse sour mare of size, is most likely to inherit the small limbs and other weaknesses of the horse without his quality, together with the coarse unseemly head and other undesirable parts of the mare without her size. The successful small stallions are those that have descended from big stock, and there is no serious objection to the use of such horses, though I fail to see how they are better than a horse belonging to a family whose members all grow to a full 16-hand standard.

Although the importation of Arabs and other Eastern horses has played such an important part in the formation of the English thoroughbreds, that is no reason whatever for again resorting to the Arab. Having spent two centuries in a well-sustained effort to obtain size, let us not for a moment entertain the idea of a retrograde movement to a pony-breed, however otherwise attractive. The idea is too preposterous to need further comment.

Let us persevere on the lines of the more recent improvements of the blood-horse, the principle of which is the selection and propagation of the best performers. If sire and dam alike were asked to qualify with hounds in a quick country, there would be a ghastly weeding out, but the successful animals would form the nucleus of a great national stud that would supply the world with good hunters and other fashionable horses of general utility.

In addition to the above, *Silver Medals* were offered to the breeders of the Mares gaining the premiums.

The above ten premiums of £15 each brought out the finest and largest class of hunting brood-mares ever seen at any Show in England.

There were 38 entries, nearly all of which put in an appearance.

Mr. James Joicey, of Eastcourt, Malmesbury, Wiltshire, took a premium with "Jill" (196),* a sharp blood-like mare by Jill, "Stockton." "Jill" has carried Mr. Joicey several seasons, and has a reputation for cleverness over a country. She was third at this Show in 1887. Has been shown twice only. "Jill" bred a filly to "Huguenot" in 1888, and is now in foal to "Peppermint." Jill,

Mr. W. H. J. Hogg took a premium with his big fine weight-carrier named "Busybody," by "Makehaste." She won a premium last year, and was also first for brood-mares at Tunbridge Wells, but has not further been shown. She stands 16·1 on short Busybody,

legs, and looks like carrying 17 stone. In 1888 she bred to "Truefit." She is entered for Volume III. of the Prize Record (301).

Mr. Barlow's "Primrose" (111) is a fine weight-carrying symmetrical mare by "Beaconsfield," dam by "Orpheus." She has won a great many prizes, as may be seen by "The Book." As a huntress, she is wanting in nothing but blood, so the impression of a thoroughbred stallion like "Murdock," to whom she is in foal, ought to produce something good. She was sold by auction by Mr. Sexton, at the close of the Show, for 100 guineas, to Mr. Gilmour, who takes her to Scotland. Scotland is slowly beginning to compete with Ireland in the exportation of hunters.

One of the most attractive exhibits was Mr. Alfred Withers' well-bred bay mare "Kate Coventry" (198) by "Thunderer," dam by "Cardinal." Having herself been a first-class grass country huntress, there is great probability that her stock will be far superior to that of Show mares that did not excel in the field. She is in foal to the famous "Truefit."

"Lorna" (81) is a mare of medium size, but she won many prizes before her present owner, Mr. Guy Fenwick, bought her of Mr. J. G. Joicey. She is by "Argyll," and is in foal to "Peppermint." Her shoulders are good.

Mr. John Goodwin's "Marion" (87) has been persistently shown for four successive years, and boasts a long and unbroken succession of victories. She is by "Grandmaster," dam by "General Williams," and is now in foal to "Knight Templar," a lovely horse for a mare of this solid type. At the Show she was sold privately to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, who will do a great national good by setting a fashion in breeding hunters from such fine mares as "Marion."

Captain Fife's "Mermaid" (94) by "Baron Cavendish," dam by "The Dean," has had the misfortune to slip the twins of that irreproachable stallion, "Huguenot." Her shape is correct. She has won twelve prizes.

Messrs. Ford, of Givendale, Pocklington, York, showed a bay mare named "Primrose" (436), that captivated every 14-stone hunting man who likes to go in the first flight. She is by

"Knight Templar," dam by "Nine Elms," her grand-dam being a fine blood-like huntress. She is only five years old, and has evidently been severely hunted this season. This is the class to ride or breed. She stands 15·3½.

"Princess Beatrice" (249) is a 16-stone mare, and stands 16·1. She has a good back and body, and is the winner of a great number of prizes, never having been beaten as a three-year-old. She is in foal to "Tally Ho." Princess

Mr. T. Forsyth Forrest showed a superior mare in "Promotion" (251), who stands 16 hands, and could carry 17 stone. She has won about ten first prizes, and report says that at Bath, and also at Abingdon, she was placed before the great "Marion" herself. She shows a lot of bone, and is a fine walker. On May 4th, 1888, she bred a colt-foal to "Huguenot," and is in foal to him again. Promotion

The above ten fine mares each take a premium of £15. I now pass on to a brief description of mares in the same class which were not fortunate enough to get a premium. Ten

There was very little unsoundness in this class, only three mares of the fourteen sent out failing to pass the veterinary surgeons. Soundness

"Adventuress" (2) by "Westwick," dam by "Ballot," has had three foals to "Lord Lyon," and is now in foal to "Pullman." She is a nice long heavy-bodied mare, but with hardly sufficient bone for a successful competitor. Her quality and breeding, however, secured her the Reserve number, and at the auction she went very cheap to the Prince of Wales at 51 guineas. She has won several prizes. Adven-

Major Shuttleworth entered his brown mare "Agitation," but she was not sent. Agitation.

"Beauty" (11) is a long low mare of advanced age, but she is now in foal to "Peppermint," and has a yearling by "Friar Rush," which latter stallion created a favourable impression at the shows of 1887, but has not been seen in public recently. "Beauty" is by "Darlington," but she naturally shows a bit harnessy, her dam being a Cleveland. Beauty.

- Carline.** "Carline" (165) is a sharp, blood-like, handsome mare by "Troll," who will be remembered as about the best stallion at the first Show of this Society. "Carline" may be by some considered somewhat parky, but she has a good back, and has won several prizes.
- Cigarette.** "Cigarette" looks like a fine mount for a light weight, but being barren this year she was sold at auction for the small sum of 18 guineas.
- Confidence** "Confidence" has evidently been severely hunted this season, and is now rather inclined to leggyness. She hardly shows the quality now required.
- Countess.** "Countess" is full-sized and coachy.
- Duchess.** "Duchess" (320) is by no means handsome, and not quite the sort required, but she might breed useful cattle.
- Empress.** "Empress" (324) is a van-like mare who has won many prizes, and has bred three foals, and is now believed to be in foal to that grand weight-carrying hunter stallion "Silver Crown." At the auction she was almost given to the Prince of Wales at 34 guineas.
- Griselda.** Sir Thomas Lennard, Bart., showed a very handsome short-legged, thick-backed mare named "Griselda" (343), but the competition was too severe for a small animal, however good. She is in foal to Sir Thomas' own stallion, "St. Peter," and is likely to breed a good hunter.
- Lady Eva.** "Lady Eva" is of a very indifferent type, and little can be said in her favour.
- Landrail.** "Landrail" is a big, strong, thick, general purpose sort of mare, but is not noticeable for quality or speed.
- Lavinia.** "Lavinia" (74) was bred in Ireland. In 1888 she bred a foal to "Pero Gomez." Her constitution is good. Her quarters are rather drooping, but nevertheless she breeds prize-winners, "Princess" (Class 2) being one of them.
- Maid of Mowbray** "Maid of Mowbray" (217), once the terror of exhibitors, and the heroine of many shows, is barren this year, and has lost her form altogether. She looks thin and "tucked up," and in her present condition had no chance whatever in this great and good class.

"Sweetness" is a useful plain mare. She fetched 46 guineas at the auction. Sweetness.

Mr. John Goodwin's "Misfortune" is a long, low, short-legged, thoroughbred mare that will bear looking over two or three times. Having met with an accident, she was put to "Petronel," the Two Thousand winner. She herself is by "Pelligreno" out of "Stitch of Canvas" and is in the Thoroughbred Stud Book. She stands 15·3½ and shows great bone and quality, and a successful show-ring career may be before her. Misfortune.

"Paget" (100) has bred three successive years to "Master Ned" and "Huguenot," but is barren this year. She has won many prizes. Paget.

"Misunderstood" is a full-sized chestnut with two white stockings and a blaze, and a silver tail. She looks fit to hunt now, and can carry weight though only 4 years old. Misunderstood.

"Persistency" (240) is a very big good mare to breed a weight-carrier, but she is somewhat wanting in quality. She measures 6·10 round the girth, and stands 16·1 in height on very short legs that contain plenty of bone. She has beaten "Maid of Mowbray" and other good ones. This is a very fine mare for those who like cross-breeding. Persistency.

"Phœdra" (428) is a big, plain, useful 14-stone mare, rather light in the flank, but looks like galloping. She is by "Don Pedro," and is in foal to "Aruncus." Phœdra.

Mr. Hamond's "Princess" (112) is plainer still, which seems strange, since she is by an Arab stallion, dam by "Landlord." She is of full size, and has evidently inherited from her granddam. In 1888 she had a filly foal by "Master of Arts," and was put to him again. There is no knowing what a mare like this may breed. Princess.

Mr. F. Forrest's "Wiry Sal" is the class of animal that should, and also will eventually, command more attention in the show-ring. She is not a show mare, but she is all over a huntress. Wiry Sal.

"Queen Bee" (114) has won prizes, but was rather outclassed here. Queen Bee.

Venus. Mr. Bank's "Venus" is up to a big weight, and has won many prizes in Cumberland.

Yorkshire Lassie. Mr. James Martin, of Wainfleet, Lincolnshire, is a well-known exhibitor, and generally gets a prize, but his "Yorkshire Lassie" (141) met a lot of good ones here. She is by "The Mallard," dam by "Cariboo," and has bred some nice ones.

In Class 2 the premiums were devoted to FILLIES, three years old (foaled in 1886), suitable for breeding Hunters or Half-bred Horses.

Silver medals were also offered to the breeders of the mares gaining the premiums.

Florence, Premium. In noticing the three-year-old fillies, the first-mentioned may very appropriately be Major Dent's "Florence" (334), a beautiful bay mare by "Spendthrift." When of mature age she will carry a lot of weight, and she trots and otherwise moves like hunting. She has a black mark down her spine, and my long experience leads me to conclude that no bad horse ever has it. This filly has great promise.

Improver, Premium. Mr. Frank Godson's "Improver" is another filly of great excellence, and is sure to carry weight some day. Her sire, "Outfit," gets good hunters, as I myself have proved over the country. "Improver" has a good back and body; and the lump outside the hough is only a slight accident, and does not lessen her great value.

Lady Colin, Premium. Mr. James Martin's "Lady Colin" (202) is one of the "Yorkshire Lassie" (141) fillies by "Fabius." She will some day be a weight-carrier of superior sort.

Mr. Sanders, of Brampton Hill, Northampton, showed a very

nice compact proportionate filly, "May Morn" (399), by "Theologian," dam by "Mars." The only fault that even adverse critics could find, was that they thought her rather small. She already shows the points of a huntress, and promises well for her owner.

Mr. Charles Miles' brown mare, "Princess" (247), by "Pero Gomez," out of "Lavinia" (74), had no difficulty to secure a premium. She has been to a great many shows, and has never but once left the yard without a ribbon. She is very much furnished for her age, and looks like hunting next season if required.

Sir Thomas Lennard, Bart., got the first reserve with a very nice improving poor filly, by "St. Peter," out of "Bridget." "St. Ebba" (456) is very blood-like, and will some day lead the way over the Roothings, which country (Essex hunting men contend) is the best in England.

Mr. Martin showed "Miss Florence" (409), in a light, healthy, and natural condition, which in young and breeding stock should never be exceeded. "Miss Florence" is capable of great improvement with time.

In addition to the above, *Silver Medals* were offered to the breeders of the Mares gaining the premiums.

It is quite impossible for even the best judge to form reliable opinions, by appearance alone, at so early an age as two years, therefore unsuccessful exhibitors need not be discouraged.

Olive Cromwell, Premium. Of the eighteen entries in this class, the judges decorated Mr. Martin's "Olive Cromwell" (423), because of her good thick back, and general muscular development. She is, moreover, a very growing and improving filly.

Countess, Premium. "Countess" (313) had many admirers, but some thought she leaned towards the hackney type of her dam "Lavinia," rather than towards the racing and hunting character of her great sire "Pero Gomez."

Florence, Premium. "Florence" is a lengthy, upstanding, blood-like filly that ought to become a huntress.

La Charité, Premium. "La Charité" (373) has all over taken the correct shape, style, and character of her hunting sire "Huguenot," and is a filly of most superior parts. Though a June foal, she measures over 6 feet in girth, and has the lovely shoulders of her sire.

Seabreeze, Premium. "Seabreeze" is very upstanding and hunting-like, and must grow into money.

Queen of Mowbray, Reserve. "Queen of Mowbray," out of the famous "Maid of Mowbray" (217), shows a lot of blood and a good back, and looks like beating her dam, which has beaten a good many.

Blossom, Jubilee. At present "Blossom" and "Jubilee" are small and do not fill the eye.

Downright. "Downright" is out of that famous big, but rather coarse

mare named "Persistency" (240), shown in the Brood Mare Class. "Downright" has a nice blood-like head, and though at present otherwise undeveloped, it would be dangerous to criticise her adversely.

Mr. Walter Gilbey showed a filly named "Half-a-Crown" by "Pedometer" (who won a premium), out of a sharp Shire mare. "Half-a-Crown" may become a useful animal for harness, but she certainly will never show the blood and quality of a modern hunter.

The Show as a whole was a great success, and the management throughout was excellent. The judging and parades were watched with unabated interest by a fashionable and numerous audience, and not a hitch was anywhere observed.

Success of Show.

The veterinary question is always surrounded by doubt and difficulty, and, in the opinion of the Council, the only way of successfully dealing with it is to instruct the veterinary surgeons to report in writing to the judges on every horse in which any unsoundness is discovered, adding their opinion as to whether the unsoundness is likely to be hereditary or not, and the judges will thus share the responsibility of rejecting the horse.

Veterinary Examination.

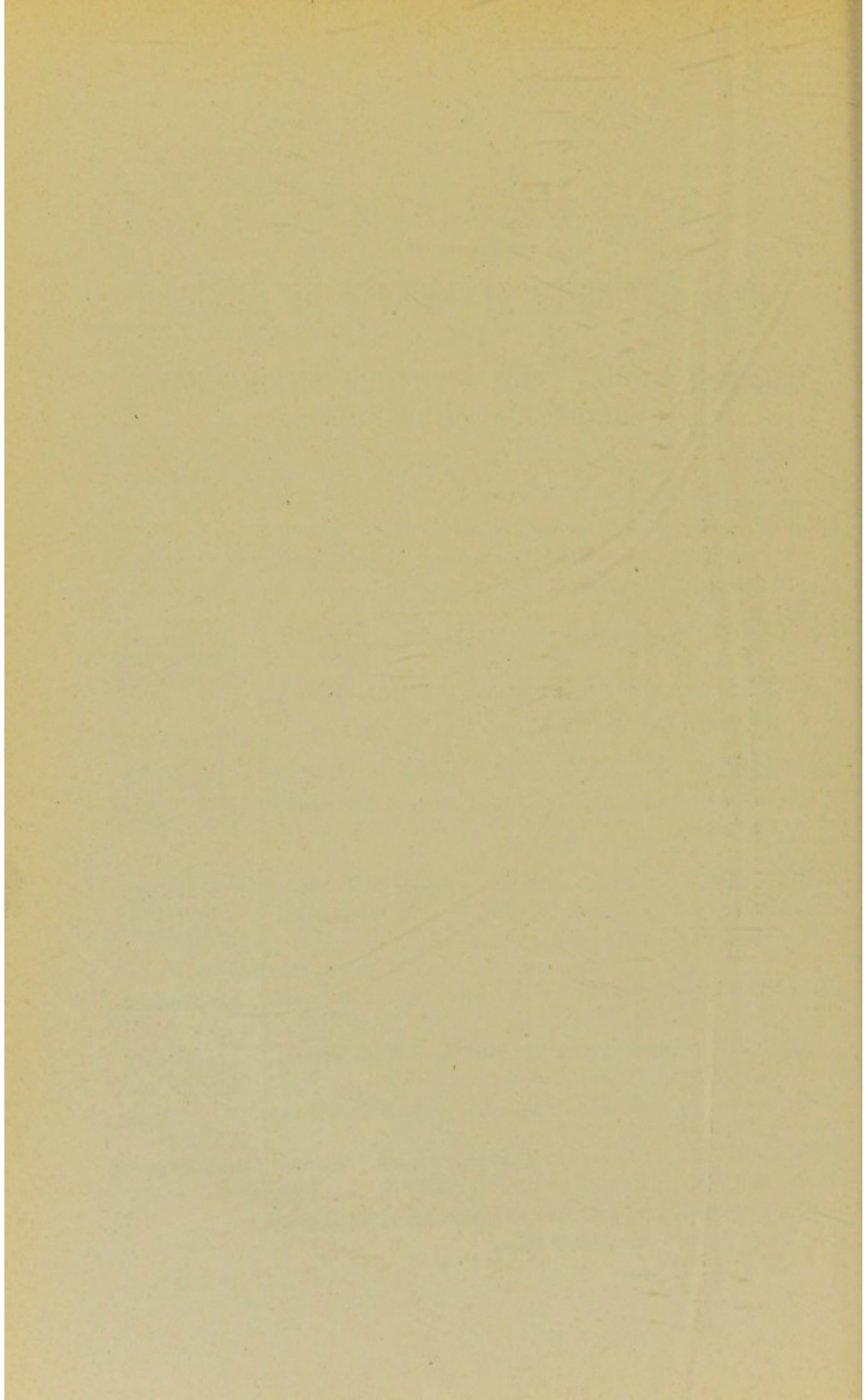

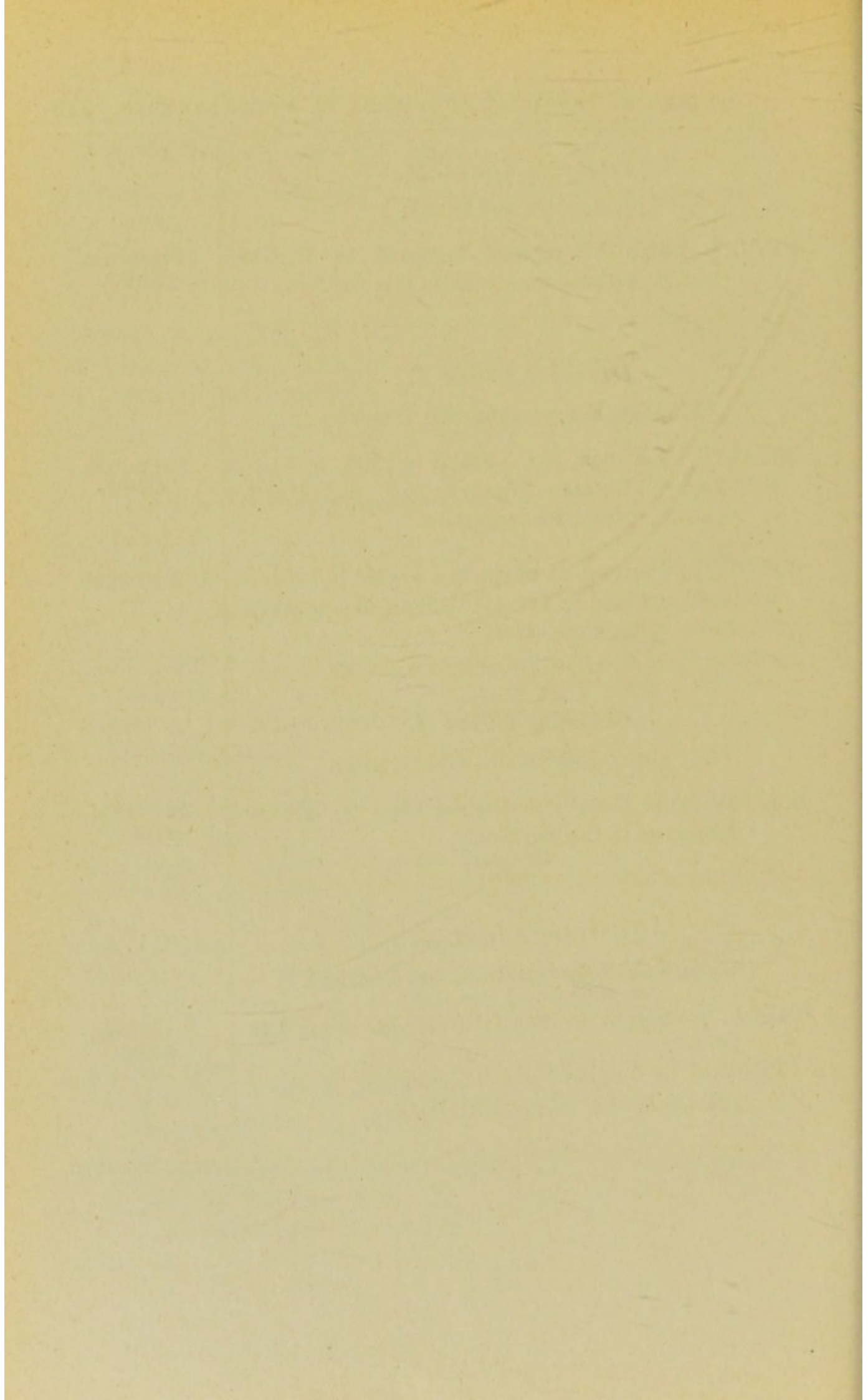

On Thursday, June 21st, 1888.

THE Council have to report that the Society numbers 547 Members, being composed of 35 Life and 512 Annual Members. Number of Members.

The Society's accounts for its financial year, ending April 30th, 1888, have been duly audited and found correct, and are herewith presented for adoption. The continued increase under each heading of receipts is most satisfactory, as the following comparison with last year will show :— Increase of Receipts.

On the other hand, as the Society has developed, the expenses of organisation have naturally increased, and the Society has had to provide for new offices, paid Secretary, &c., while the finances of the present year have been burdened with several items which should have come into former accounts. Had this not been the case, the Council would have been able to show a larger balance at the Bank. Increased expenses of organisation.

Towards the 1888 Show, the Council made a grant of £665, the largest sum that they have yet offered in premiums, viz., £500 for Stallions and £165 for Mares, and they have been enabled, by the increased receipts, to effect a saving of £216 3s. 9d. on the expenses of the late Show as compared with those in 1887. The second volume of the Prize Record has been issued to Members. It contains the entry of 284 Mares. Through the kind co-operation of their owners, the Council are able to give portraits of the Stallions Aerides, Huguenot, Peppermint, and of the Mares Jill and Lorna, all of which have been prize- or Prize Record, Vol. II.

Any Mare suitable for breeding hunting and half-bred stock, being approved by Editing Committee, will be eligible for entry in Volume III. A veterinary certificate, stating that the Mare is free from hereditary disease, must accompany each entry.

The last date for receiving entries for Volume III. is November 1st.

The Council have carefully considered the important question of veterinary examinations at Shows, which has been raised by the letter of SIR HENRY SIMPSON, read at the General Meeting of Members held at the Royal Agricultural Hall; they therefore propose, as there is a diversity of opinion among the veterinary profession as to what constitutes hereditary unsoundness, that the veterinary inspectors, after examining the horses submitted to them, will fill up the following certificate which will be handed to the Judges by the Stewards. The Judges will then use their own discretion as to award of premiums:—

Correspondence in reference to the proposed taxes on horses has been laid before a recent Council Meeting, and the following resolution has been unanimously passed :—

Taxes on horses.

“This Society views with very great regret the proposals of the Chancellor of the Exchequer in reviving a tax upon horses, which, they fear, if adopted, will be detrimental to the interest of horse-breeding in this country, the horse-tax having been originally removed for the benefit of horse-breeding on the recommendation contained in the Report of the Royal Commission of 1873.”

Copies of the resolution have been sent to the Chancellor of the Exchequer and the Press.

The Council have to congratulate the Society on the steady and continued increase of Members and on the growing interest taken by the public in the Society's work, as evinced by the large attendance at the last Show. These favourable conditions demonstrate that the utility of the Society is receiving wider recognition and appreciation, but the Council hope that Members will continue to bring its past work, influence, and objects prominently before friends, and induce them to join the Society.

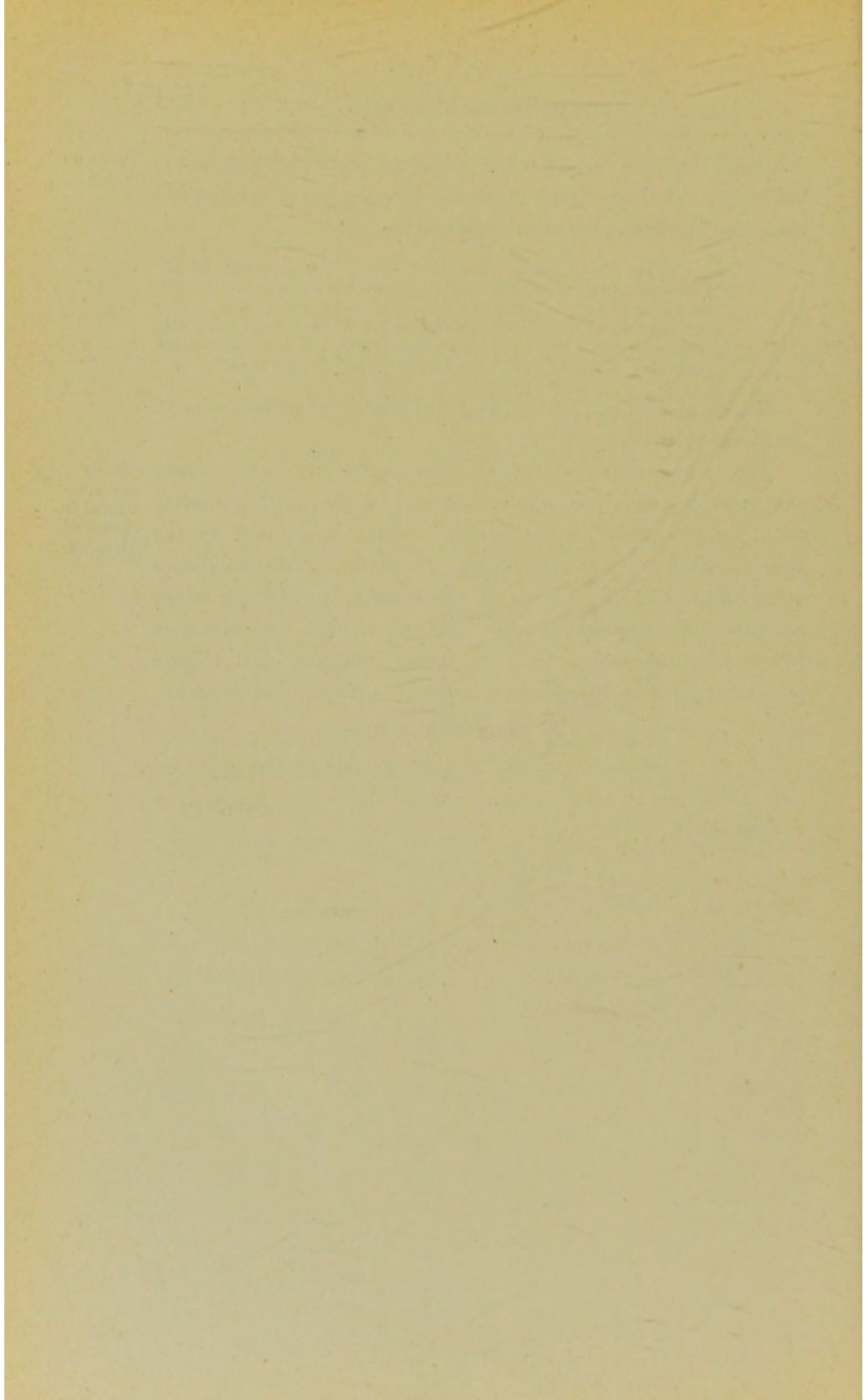

The present year's Show is held in conjunction with the Hackney Horse Society, the Royal Commission on Horse-Breeding and the Royal Agricultural Society of England, and classes are also included for Coach Horse Stallions offered by the Yorkshire Coach Horse Society.

The Council, at a special meeting held in July, in view of the Country Meeting of the Royal Agricultural Society of England for 1889 being held in the Metropolitan District, and the announced intention of the Royal Commissioners on Horse-Breeding (who acted last year with that Society), to hold an exhibition of Thoroughbred Stallions in the spring of this year, decided to invite these bodies to hold their exhibition at the same time and place as the Show of the Hunters' Improvement and Hackney Horse Societies, provided that the consent and approval of the latter Society could be obtained thereto.

The Hackney Horse Society cordially assented to these propositions, while the Royal Commission on Horse-Breeding and the Royal Agricultural Society of England accepted the invitation to hold a joint Show in London in the Spring of this year. Each body appointed a representative to arrange the details of the Show, and this Joint Committee first met in November. This Society was represented by Mr. WALTER GILBEY; the Hackney Horse Society by Mr. GARRETT TAYLOR; the Royal Commission on Horse-Breeding by Mr. JACOB WILSON; and the Royal Agricultural Society by Mr. G. H. SANDAY.

At the present Show, February, 1889, the Royal Commission on Horse-Breeding are offering Twenty-two “Queen's Premiums” of £200 each for Thoroughbred Stallions, while three equal Premiums of the same amount and Special Gold Medals are offered by the Royal Agricultural Society of England. The Council therefore decided to discontinue for this year the Society's Service Premiums for Stallions, and to enhance the Premiums offered for Mares, as follows:—

CLASS 1.—Mares, suitable for breeding Hunters or Half-bred Horses.
Ten Premiums of £15 each.

CLASS 2.—Fillies, three years old, suitable for breeding Hunters or Half-bred Horses. Five Premiums of £15 each.

CLASS 3.—Fillies, two years old, likely to become suitable for breeding Hunters or Half-bred Horses. Five Premiums of £15 each.

Silver Medals will be also awarded to the breeders of the Mares gaining the Premiums.

The question of improvement in the Veterinary accommodation at the Royal Agricultural Hall having come before the Council, they passed the following Resolution at their Meeting in July:—

Veterinary Accommodation.

"The Council are prepared to make a grant of £25 per annum towards improving the Veterinary accommodation at the Royal Agricultural Hall, provided that the Hackney Horse Society give a similar sum, and that the improvements are satisfactory to the Joint Horse Show Committee."

The Royal Agricultural Hall Company have arranged for the improvement of the veterinary accommodation, thus facilitating the examination of the horses exhibited.

The question of night accommodation for the men in charge of the horses has been under the consideration of the Councils of this Society, the Shire Horse and Hackney Horse Societies, with the result that Berners Hall has been engaged for the two Shows, fires and lights provided, and the new arrangement has added much to the men's comfort.

On the recommendations of the Editing Committee, it was decided at the last Council Meeting to extend the receipt of entries

for Volume III. of the Prize Record till the end of the year, and the conditions of entry were amended as follows:—

- (1) *Any mare is eligible for entry which has been awarded a prize, been highly commended, commended, or reserved, in Hunters' classes at any Show in the United Kingdom.*
- (2) *Any mare, by a thoroughbred sire or out of a thoroughbred dam, not having herself taken honours, but whose offspring have been awarded honours in Hunters' classes, is eligible for entry.*
- (3) *Any mare can be re-entered which has taken further prizes, or produced foals, or changed owners since Volumes I. and II. were compiled.*
- (4) *Any mare suitable for breeding hunting and half-bred stock, being approved by the Editing Committee, will be eligible for entry. A veterinary certificate, stating that the mare is free from hereditary disease, must accompany each entry under this condition.*
- (5) *A mare, by a Premium* thoroughbred sire and out of a dam registered, or eligible for registry in the Prize Record, is eligible for entry.*

* N.B.—That has gained any of the service premiums of the Hunters' Improvement Society, the Royal Commission on Horse-Breeding, the Royal Agricultural Society of England, or the Royal Dublin Society.

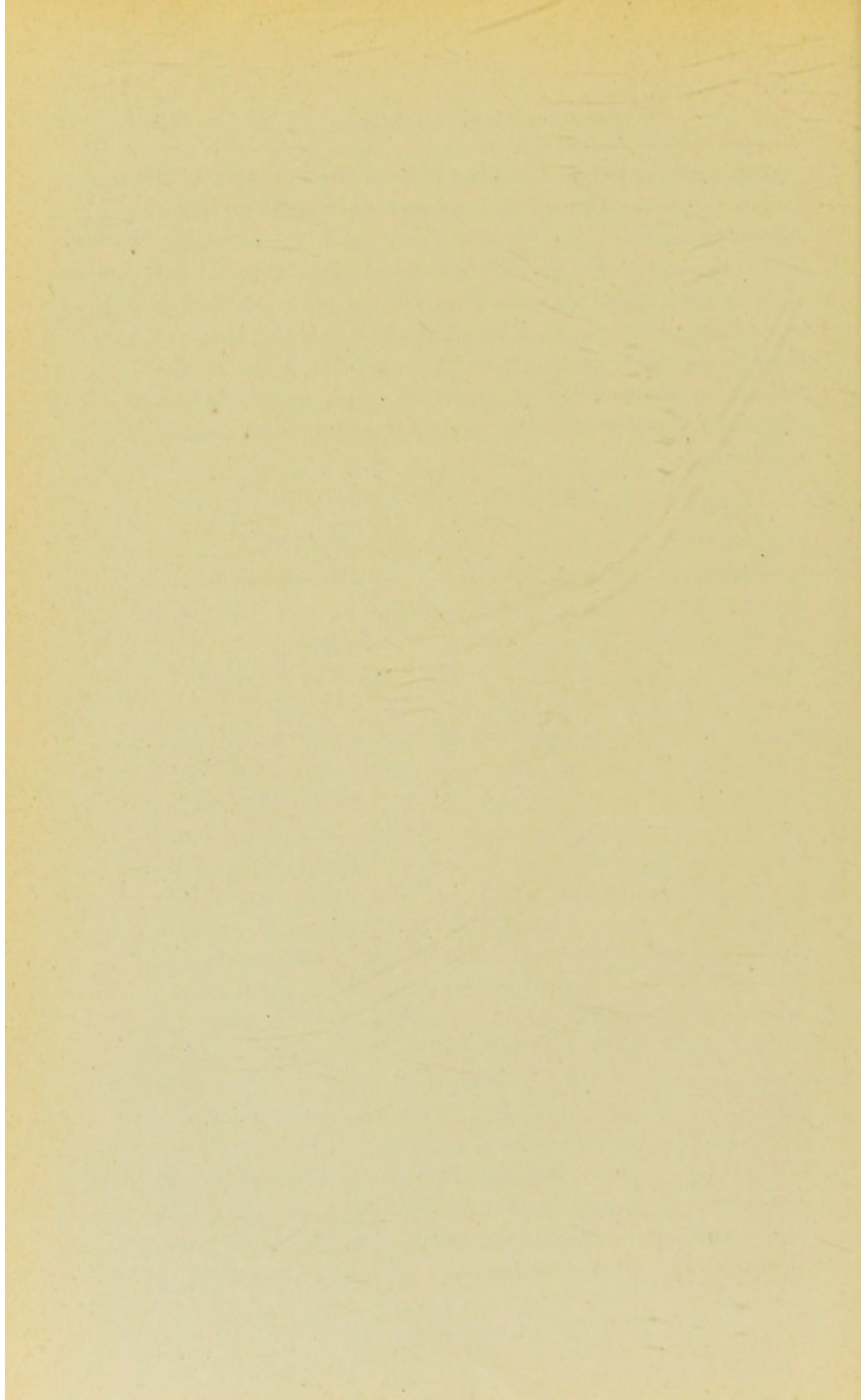

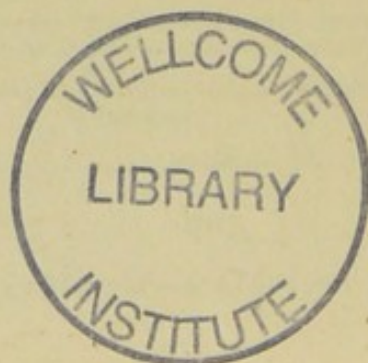
