He also mentions another (in this, as in all instances, without naming the church) to "Mris Mary Harvie, wife of the late Eliab H., Esq.; and both father and mother of the now Sir Eliab H., Knight-B[art.];" but which could not have been at St. Laurence Pountney, inasmuch as she not die until 1673, being buried with M.I. at Hempstead, and when the church in question was not extant. The reference, however, shews that the book was partly compiled, and issued, long after the date it bears.

Mr. Eustace, a relative of the family) the Harvey entries in the Parish Register, communicating the results, with copious notes, to the Miscellanea Genealogica et Heraldica (2nd Series, Vol. I., pp. 357—62 and 384—88). It may be here mentioned that, where differing from such previous notes, this genealogy should be taken as the most correct.

(10) It was, however (with the exception of the Codicil), evidently made some time previously, i.e. between 10 July 1651 and May 1655, when his brother Daniel's wife died—probably shortly after the former date. MS. 23,105), and from which the Latin specimen facsimiled below, dated 8 May 1641, is copied, will testify: "No. 521 of the Sypistien Sale, where I bought it, principally because it contains the autograph of one of the most illustrious men that ever existed—Harvey. who discovered the Circulation of the Blood; and I never could find that his handwriting is to be seen anywhere else tho' I have inquired in all directions. D. T. [Dawson-Turner]." The volume, which formed lot 657 at the latter's sale, 10 June 1859, also contains another note, apparently by the same hand: "It has been commonly supposed that much of Harvey's autograph is to be found in the College of

Physicians, or in Caius College, Cam-bridge, or in St. Bartholomew's Hospital; but I believe there is no authentic specimen of it in any of these; and the late Sir Henry Halford told me, not long before his death, that, as far as he had been able to find, this is the only undoubted one in existence. Where is Dr. Paget's Letter to me about Harvey?" These authorities were, however, to a great

extent in error, for not only is his signature to be found among the Rupert Correspondence in Brit. Mus. Add. MS. 18,980, fo. 125, dated 17 Oct. 1643, and from which our other specimen is copied, but his MS. on the circulation of the blood, now in the Sloane Collection, is holograph, as are undoubtedly also three of the four pages and the signatures of his will and codicil in P.C.C., for we have his own evidence therein to that effect; and the compiler, during many years spent in collecting literary rarities, has met with two other specimens of his signature.





1 The Harvey Chapel is a plain rectangular building of brick with high pitched tile roof, on the north side of Hempstead Church, adjoining and communicating with the chancel, and lighted by three large windows; and appears to have been erected about 1655 by Eliab Harvey, the merchant of London, together with the "outer" vault beneath, as a place of sepulture for his family. It is externally from north to south about 19 ft. 10 in, and from east to west 28 ft. 9 in., and divided by a wall into two apartments, one of which, on the east, was formerly used as a school, but now as a vestry room, and the western is the mortuary chapel proper. This latter, until lately enclosed with a chestnut screen and kept under lock and key, is, with a portion extending into the chancel, about 21 ft. 6 in. by 10 ft. 9 in., having the floor 2 ft. above that of the nave. The "outer" and original vault, which was formerly entered by stairs from the recess (8 ft. by 6 ft.) between Dr. and Capt. Edw. Harvey's monuments, but now, from outside of the church, is 24 ft. 6 in. by 17 ft., and 7 ft. 4 in. high; the "inner" one, built (as appears by an inscription cut in stone over the entrance) by Eliab Harvey of Claybury, in 1766, being 17 ft. 10 in. by 15 ft. 6 in., of similar height and arched with brick. They contain in all fifty-one coffins (including Dr. Harvey's, removed in 1883 to the sarcophagus in chapel above), fourteen of which are of lead, and mostly very curious, resembling Egyptian mummy cases in shape, and having raised letters, and masks of the features thereon. That of Eliz. Harvey, 1696, and all the subsequent coffins were of lead enclosed in wood, and are very similar to those of the present day.
