

BYE-LAWS AND REGULATIONS RELATING TO LICENTIATES.

The College will, under its Charter, grant Licences (which LICENTIATES. are not to extend to make the Licentiates Members of the Corporation) to persons who shall conform to the Bye-Laws and Regulations.

Under the provisions of Clause XIX of the Medical Act (1858), an agreement was entered into in February, 1883, between the Royal College of Physicians of London and the Royal College of Surgeons of England to form a Conjoint Examining Board, and to provide that every Candidate who shall have passed the Final Examination conducted by the Board shall, subject to the Bye-Laws of each College, be entitled to receive the Licence of the College of Physicians and the Diploma of Member of the College of Surgeons.

It was further agreed that each College should abstain from the exercise of its independent privilege of giving a qualification for admission to the *Medical Register* with respect to all Students who should commence their Professional Studies on and after 1st October, 1884.

This agreement remains in force.

BYE-LAW CLXIX.

The Licentiates of the College shall have the use of the Their Library and Museum, subject to the Regulations relating Privileges. thereto, and shall be admitted to all Lectures, and shall enjoy such further privileges as may from time to time be defined by the Bye-Laws.

BYE-LAW CLXX.

Every Candidate for the College Licence (unless specially How eligible. exempted) shall be required to produce satisfactory evidence of having passed, before the commencement of Professional By Prelimi-Study, one of the Preliminary Examinations on subjects of General Education recognized by the General Medical Council.

BYE-LAW CLXXI.

By Registration.

Every Candidate shall be required to produce satisfactory evidence of having been Registered as a Medical Student by the General Medical Council, not less than fifty-eight months previously to admission to the Final Examination, unless specially exempted.

BYE-LAW CLXXII.

By Age, &c.

Every Candidate shall be required to produce satisfactory evidence of being Twenty-one Years of age, and of Moral Character.

Bye-Law CLXXIII.

By Course of Study

Every Candidate shall be required to produce satisfactory evidence of having completed the Course of Study required by the Regulations.

BYE-LAWS CLXXIV.

By Examinations.

There shall be Four Professional Examinations: a First Examination, a Second Examination, a Third, and a Final Examination, each being partly written, partly oral, and partly practical.

Bye-Law CLXXV.

By Notice.

Every Candidate intending to present himself for Examination shall give 14 days' notice in writing to the Registrar of the College or other appointed Officer, at the same time transmitting the necessary Certificates.

BYE-LAW CLXXXI.

The subjects of the Third Examination shall be:—

BYE-LAW CLXXXII.

Re-examina-

A Candidate rejected in the Third Examination shall not be re-admitted to Examination until after the lapse of six months from the date of rejection.

BYE-LAW CLXXXIII

Final Exami-

A Candidate shall not be admitted to the Final Examination till the expiration of one year after he has passed in the subjects of the Third Examination.

BYE-LAW CLXXXIV.

The subjects of the Final Examination shall be :-

I. Clinical Medicine.

II. Clinical Surgery.

III. Midwifery and Diseases peculiar to Women.*

BYE-LAW CLXXXV.

Re-examina-

A Candidate rejected in the Final Examination shall not be re-admitted to Examination until after the lapse of six months from the date of rejection.

Bye-Law CLXXXVI.

Exemptions.

Any Candidate who shall produce satisfactory evidence of having passed an Examination for a Degree in Medicine in the subjects of Parts I and II of the First Examination, conducted at a University in the United Kingdom, in India, or in a British Colony, shall be exempt from re-examination on those subjects in which he has passed.

⁺ Candidates may present themselves for Examination in Midwifery and Diseases of Women at the Third Examination or at the Final Examination.

Form of Admission.

BYE-LAW CXXXIII.

Promise of Licentiates. Every Candidate, before receiving the College Licence, shall be required to pledge himself by subscribing his name to the following words:—

"I faithfully promise to observe and obey the Statutes, Bye-Laws, and Regulations of the College relating to Licentiates, and to submit to such penalties as may be lawfully imposed for any neglect or infringement of them."

Fee.

BYE-LAW CXLII.

The Fee to be paid for the Licence to practise Physic as a Licentiate of the College shall be Fifteen Guineas.

Of the College Wist.

BYE-LAW CXXXV.

College List to be published annually. A List of the Fellows, Members, Extra-urbem Licentiates and Licentiates of the College, with their places of residence as existing on the first day of January in every year, shall be printed annually under the direction of the Censors, and a copy of such list certified under the College Seal shall be sent to the Registrars of the Branch Medical Councils for England, Scotland, and Ireland.

BYE-LAW CXXXVII.

College List held correct. The College List shall be considered as containing a correct list of all the Fellows, Members, Extra-Licentiates, and Licentiates of the College, and it shall be incumbent on each one to ascertain that his name and residence are correctly entered thereon.

BYE-LAW CXXXVIII.

Every official letter or notice which shall be sent by the Letters sent accordingly, Registrar or Bedell to any Fellow, Member, Extra-Licentiate, a sufficient or Licentiate of the College, addressed to him by his name, at his place of residence as entered on the College List, shall be considered to have reached him, and he shall be deemed to have sufficient notice of the contents of such letter or notice, and shall be bound and concluded thereby.

Of the Onties and Conduct of Fellows, Members, and Vicentiates.

BYE-LAW CLII.

No Fellow, Member or Licentiate of the College shall Conduct as officiously, or under colour of a benevolent purpose, offer medical aid to, or prescribe for, any patient whom he knows to be under the care of another legally qualified Medical Practitioner.

BYE-LAW CLIV.

No Fellow, Member, Extra Licentiate, or Licentiate of the College shall assume the title of Doctor, or append to his name the title of Doctor of Medicine, or the letters M.D., or any other letters indicating that he is a Graduate of a University, unless he has obtained a degree entitling him to do so.

BYE-LAW CLV.

No Fellow, Member, or Licentiate of the College shall Remedies to refuse to make known, when so required by the President and be made known.

Censors the nature and composition of any remedy he uses.

BYE-LAW CXXXVIII.—Regulation.

In all official communications between the College and its Fellows, Members, Extra-Licentiates, or Licentiates, the titles employed shall be in accordance with the registered qualifications of the person addressed.

BYE-LAW CLVI.

Resignation of made in writ-

That no Fellow, Member, or Licentiate be permitted to Diploma to be resign his Fellowship, Membership, or Licentiateship, as the case may be, unless he has signified to the Registrar in writing his desire so to do, and unless such resignation has been accepted by the College.

BYE-LAW CLVII.

Licentiates for whom to dispense.

Licentiates of this College shall not compound or dispense medicines, except for patients under their own care.

BYE-LAW CLVIII.

No Licentiate of this College shall, by virtue of his Licence, Limitation of Title. represent himself as being a Fellow or Member of the College.

BYE-LAW XLIX.

The Censors shall, in accordance with the Charter of Henry VIII., confirmed by Act of Parliament, inquire into any alleged misconduct or infringement of the Bye-Laws by Fellows, Members, or Licentiates, and shall carry into effect the Bye-Laws and Regulations of the College in regard to such matters.

On the 27th day of December, 1881, the College passed the following Resolution :-

" That while the College has no desire to fetter the opinion of its Members in reference to any Theories they may see fit to adopt in connection with the Practice of Medicine, it nevertheless considers it desirable to express its opinion that the assumption or acceptance by Members of the profession of designations implying the adoption of special modes of treatment is opposed to those principles of the freedom and dignitg of the profession which should govern the relations of its Members to each other and to the public.

"The College therefore expects that all its Fellows, Members, and Licentiates will uphold these principles by discountenancing those who trade upon such designations."

Of Fines and Penalties.

BYE-LAW CLXV.

If it shall at any time hereafter appear, or be made known of Fellows, to the President or Censors, that any Fellow or Member of Members, Licentiates, the College has obtained admission into the College, or that for misany Licentiate of the College has obtained the Licence of the College by fraud, false statement, or imposition, or that any Fellow, Member, or Licentiate has been guilty of any great crime or public immorality, or has acted in any respect in a dishonourable or unprofessional manner, or has violated any Statute, Bye-Law, or Regulation of the College relating to Fellows, Members, or Licentiates, as the case may be, the President and Censors* may call the Fellow, Member, or Licentiate so offending before them, and having investigated the case, may admonish, or repremand, or inflict a fine not exceeding £10; or, if they deem the case of sufficient importance, may report the case to the College, and thereupon a majority of two-thirds of the Fellows present at a Meeting of the Fellows, which must be specially summoned for that purpose, may declare such Fellow to be no longer a Fellow or a Member of the College, as the College shall determine; or such Member to be no longer a Member of the College; or such Licentiate to be no longer a Licentiate, and his Licence shall be revoked and withdrawn; and such Fellow, Member.

On the 27th day of July, 1882, the College passed the following Resolution :-

[&]quot;That the system of extensively advertising Medical Works, and the custom of giving, whether for publication or not. laudatory Certificates of Medicinal and other Preparations or of Medical or Surgical Appliances is misleading to the public, derogatory to the dignity of the Profession, and contrary to the traditions and resolutions of the Royal College of Physicians."

or Licentiate shall forfeit all the rights and privileges which he does or may enjoy as a Fellow, or as a Member, or as a Licentiate, as the case may be; and his name shall be expunged from the list of Fellows, or from the list of Members or from the list of Licentiates, as the case may be, accordingly.

Of the Library.

BYE-LAW LXXXIII.

Reading Room. A Reading Room at the College, for the convenience of Fellows, Members, and Licentiates using the Library, shall be open daily, Sundays, and such other times as the Library Committee shall direct, excepted.

Regulation 1.

The Reading Room shall be open from One o'clock until Six o'clock.

Regulation 2.

Medical Officers of the Army, Navy, and Indian Service, who have retired and are not in practice, may be admitted to the privileges of the Reading Room, and to all Lectures delivered in the College, on making application to the Registrar in writing, accompanied by a recommendation from some Fellow or Member of the College, or from the Head of the Department to which they belong. The application to be renewed after twelve months.

Regulation 3.

The Librarian, conjointly with the Registrar, shall be empowered, on the recommendation of a Fellow of the College from personal knowledge, to grant permission to any Medical Man to read in the College for a period not exceeding three months; such permission to be reported to the Library Committee at its next meeting.

BYE-LAW LXXXVIII.

No Book shall be supplied from the Library to any Fellow, Member, or Licentiate without an order signed with his name, and such order shall be returned to the holder of the Book on its return to the Bedell, or other official in attendance.
