In the year 1842 some gentlemen connected with Lambeth, convinced of the success of the Homœopathic system in the treatment of disease, determined to found an Establishment conducted upon its principles in that quarter.

In conformity with these views, the Lambeth Homeopathic Dispensary was opened on the 13th of August of that year, and Dr. Laurie accepted the appointment of Physician. The founders relied solely upon the efficacy of the system as the means of its advancement, and their expectations have not been disappointed.

In order to afford the inhabitants of Lambeth an apportunity of testing, by their own experience, the benefits offered to them, no other qualification was required for admittance than the plea of illness; and among a population to whom the very name of the science was unknown, the cures performed gradually awakened attention, and the numbers of applicants augmented.

With these increased calls upon them, the Committee, anxious to extend to the poorer classes the advantages which they have themselves derived from the system, nominated Drs. Hamilton and Mayne to take a part of the duties, and in June 1843, opened an Establishment upon a more extended scale at No. 13A, Cannon-row, Westminster, called The Westminster and Lambeth Homœopathic Medical Institution and Dispensary. Since the latter epoch the applications have been so numerous, as to render it necessary to limit the admissions to those, who produced an order from a Subscriber,

warrant an exception in their favour.—Still however this did not meet every case, as many presented themselves without orders, who could not be classed amongst the exceptions, such as small tradesmen, journeymen, &c.; which induced the Committee to adopt a middle course, and admit all such on the payment of the small sum of five shillings a quarter. This voluntary system they are happy to state has been attended with success. A reference to the accompanying statement will shew that the sum accruing to the Institution from this source is not large, but it must be gratifying to the friends of Homeopathy, to observe this indication of its progress amongst a class who can judge of it only by its effects.

The Committee feel satisfied, that investigation must lead to a reliance on the truth of the Homœopathic doctrines, and that nothing but a conviction of the benefits derivable from that system is necessary, on the part of the public, to induce them to come forward in support of an Institution founded for the alleviation of the sufferings of their humbler brethren, and for shortening the hours of illness to those, whose sole capital is their labour.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

- I. Every Subscriber of One Guinea Annually shall be entitled to have always one patient on the books; a Subscriber of Two Guineas, three patients; Three Guineas, five patients; Five Guineas, seven patients; and above Five Guineas, one patient for every Guinea.
- II. A Donor of Five Guineas can have one patient continually on the books; Ten Guineas, two patients, and so on.
- III. A Subscription of Three Guineas Annually, or a Donation of Twenty Guineas, entitles the Subscriber to become a Governor, and vote at the General Meetings.
- IV. No patient can be admitted to the benefit of the Institution without a letter of recommendation from a Subscriber or Governor.
- V. Indigent patients, who cannot obtain a letter, and whose cases are urgent, may be relieved on application to the Medical Officer at the Dispensary, for the day.
- VI. Patients suffering from acute disease, and unable to attend, may be seen at their own houses if within one mile of the Dispensary, on forwarding a properly authenticated application to that effect.
- VII. Patients dismissed for irregularity of attendance unless due cause be shown, are not re-eligible.
- VIII. Every patient discharged cured, shall receive the form of a letter of thanks to fill up, and present to the Governor or Subscriber by whom he has been recommended.
- IX. A Committee to be appointed every year to report on the state of the Dispensary, audit the Accounts, &c. &c.
