

La pianophobie de Reyer.

Encore une phobie que Gelineau a négligé de catégoriser dans ses *Peurs morbides*, si tant est que la *pianophobie* soit une maladie.

L'auteur de *Sigurd*, qui vient de mourir, avait, dit-on, car d'aucuns le contestent, à l'égard de cet instrument qu'il qualifiait d'inférieur, une aversion qui datait de loin : elle remontait à l'époque où Reyer fréquentait chez Th. Gautier, de qui est la boutade, si souvent répétée : « La musique est le plus cher de tous les bruits. »

Les deux amis ne pouvaient qu'avoir une même opinion sur le piano, contre lequel ils lançaient les plus violents anathèmes. Or, un jour qu'ils se livraient à leurs imprécations ordinaires, on remit à Gautier une carte ainsi libellée :

Z. ZISKI

Pianiste ordinaire du prince régnant de Valachie.

Puis au-dessous l'apostille suivante :

« Mon cher Théo,

« Je prends la liberté de vous adresser M. Ziski, un artiste distingué, et de le recommander à votre attention.

« Merci d'avance et tout à vous.

« Victor Hugo. »

En achevant la lecture de cette carte, Gautier parut anéanti. Il la tendit à Reyer, qui se contenta de répondre :

— Tu ne peux te dispenser de recevoir ce visiteur, car il est muni d'un passe-port devant lequel doivent s'ouvrir toutes les portes, surtout celles d'un poète.

Aussitôt on fit entrer Ziski dans la grande salle. C'était, conte G. CLAUDIN, de qui nous tenons l'histoire, un petit homme, très joli garçon, fait au tour et vêtu à la hongroise, portant des bottes molles allant jusqu'aux genoux, une culotte gris de lin collante et une tunique bariolée de galons d'or. Il salua Gautier avec infiniment de grâce et lui dit :

— Je sais, Monsieur, que vous êtes un maître et j'ai lu vos œuvres. Je sais aussi que vous aimez peu la musique et que le piano est loin d'avoir vos bonnes grâces, mais je suis pauvre, et c'est pour cela que M. Victor Hugo m'a donné cette précieuse recommandation.

— « Si Gautier vous accorde vingt lignes dans son feuilleton, m'a dit M. Hugo, vous deviendrez tout de suite à la mode à Paris, et vous vous tirerez sûrement d'affaire. »

Devant une aussi puissante recommandation, Gautier ne put que s'incliner. Le singulier visiteur voulut, sans plus tarder, profiter de cet encouragement muet.

— Je n'ai pas l'intention, dit-il à son bienveillant protecteur, de vous jouer un long morceau, mais je voudrais bien cependant vous faire comprendre en quoi ma façon de jouer diffère de celle des grands maîtres. Voici précisément un piano ; prêtez-moi deux minutes d'attention, rien que deux minutes.

Dear Mr Cooper,

The drawing of the leper, which you have kindly forwarded to me has just arrived and I am very pleased with it. I think it tells its story well and the background is most appropriate. There is only one small alteration I should like making, and it is so trivial that I will not return the picture, but you could correct it the first time you come to London and call and see me. I think the street looks rather too clean for a town of the period, and also the crowd of townsfolk that are rushing up the steps seem a little but too regular, when looking at the drawing at a distance. These two small defects in my opinion could easily be rectified the next time you are in town.

With respect to the sketch for the drawing of 'typhoid,' I think the idea is a good one, if it is thoroughly worked out, but it would not be a bad plan if you could introduce the skeleton as in the act of poisoning the water supply to the town, or contemplating the evil that has been wrought. Somehow, I don't think the skeleton pledging the town with a glass quite clearly ^{states} ~~states~~ the story we want to ~~tell~~. Perhaps you will think this over by the time you see me. I find I shall not be able to be in Paris until the third week in this month, and hope to come and see you on the 18th or 19th inst., which I trust will be convenient to you. Probably by that time, you will have completed another sketch for the syphilis or consumption drawing, and we could discuss the matter together.

The chief points that would improve it which occur to me are that we do not want the figure of the patient on the bed uncovered, she certainly ought to be covered three parts of the body; and that with respect to the crab, it should be an ordinary common variety of crab, as regards the shape of the body, and not one of the rock species. The word "Cancer" has always been associated from the time of the early Greeks with the ordinary common crab of the sea-beach. He might be a little more distinct in the finished drawing than in the rough-out, and his claws thicker, and not so many of them. The figure of Science, I think, would be improved if it was in the act of flying down instead of kneeling on the end of the bed, attempting to cut away the terrible nipper of the crab.


