

# La pianophobie de Reyer.

Encore une phobie que Gelineau a négligé de catégoriser dans ses Peurs morbides, si tant est que la pianophobie soit une maladie.

L'auteur de Sigurd, qui vient de mourir, avait, dit on, car d'aucuns le contestent, à l'égard de cet instrument qu'il qualifiait d'infernal, une aversion qui datait de loin: elle remontait à l'époque où Reyer fréquentait chez Th. Gautier, de qui est la boutade, si souvent répétée: « La musique est le plus cher de tous les bruits. »

Les deux amis ne pouvaient qu'avoir une même opinion sur le piano, contre lequel ils lançaient les plus violents anathèmes. Or, un jour qu'ils se livraient à leurs imprécations ordinaires, on remit à Gautier une carte ainsi libellée:

## Z. Ziski

Pianiste ordinaire du prince régnant de Valachie.

Puis au-dessous l'apostille suivante :

« Mon cher Théo,

« Je prends la liberté de vous adresser M. Ziski, un artiste distingué, et de le recommander à votre attention.

« Merci d'avance et tout à vous.

« Victor Hugo. »

En achevant la lecture de cette carte, Gautier parut anéanti. Il la tendit à Reyer, qui se contenta de répondre :
