I have had the background gilded as you will see, but it is too prominent, and wants toning down considerably so that it does not strike in front of the figures. You will no doubt remember the other points; the cap of the saint on the left side of the picture to be made like the cap of the saint on the right, the medicine box to be divided with more partitions, the spatula that the saint is holding to be made like the one I showed you in the Museum, and the face to be made of the French and not the Flemish type. The back of the tiled flooring should also be lightened to show perspective.
