THE KITCHETTER MEMORIAL MEDICAL SCHOOL

ANGLO EGYPTIAN SUDAN.

I. It is proposed to train qualified Medical Men in Khartoum, but, at present, not Dispensers or Hospital Attendants.

II.

III.

In order to accomplish this, it is necessary to found a Medical School under the supervision of a Director and a Council and with a Patron and a Vice Patron and for this purpose an Ordinance is required.

The Patron it is suggested, shall be H.E. The Governor General and the Vice Patron shall be The Director of Education and the Director and Chairman of the Council shall be the person for the time being discharging the duties of Director of the Wellcome Tropical Research Laboratories.

The Council, it is further suggested, shall consist of five members in addition to the Chairman and these shall be:-

- 1. The person for the time being discharging the duties of Principal Medical Officer of the Egyptian Army.
- 2. The person for the time being discharging the duties of Director of the Medical Department of the Sudan Government.
- The person for the time being discharging the duties of Assistant Director of Education.
- 4. The person for the time being discharging the duties of Chief Justice.
- 5. The person for the time being discharging the duties of Senior Medical Officer of the Khartoum District of the Egyptian Army who shall also be Registrar to the Council.
- IV. Admission as a student of the school shall be restricted to persons between the ages of 16 and 19 years selected by the Director

IV.

of Education, and who shall have satisfied the requirements of the examiners of the Preliminary Examination of the Medical School. The fee for this examination and for any re-examination shall be P.T. 50.

V.

This Preliminary Examination shall conform with the regulations of the General Medical Council of Great Britain with regard to the preliminary examination necessary for registration as a Medical Student.

In order that this may be accomplished, the subjects of this examination shall be:-

- a. English Language with questions on History and Geography.
- b. Classical Arabic.
- c. Arithmetic, Elementary Algebra and Geometry.
- d. Ordinary (not classical) Arabic.
- e. Elementary Experimental Science.

The Examiners for this examination shall be persons appointed by the Council.

VI.

On admission a student begins a course of five years free education in the following subjects:-

1st Year: - Chemistry, Physics, Biology.

2nd Year: - Anatomy, Physiology, Materia Medica and Dispensing.

3rd Year: - Anatomy, Physiology, Therapeutics, Hospital Practice, Junior Ward Classes and Clinical Lectures.

4th Year: Pathology, Parasitology, Bacteriology, Medical Jurisprudence (including Insanity), Hygiene, Hospital Practice, Clinical Clerking, Post Mortem Clerking and Clinical Lectures.

5th Year: - Medicine, Surgery, Midwifery, Diseases of Women and Children, Skiagraphy, Anaesthetics, Ophthalmology, Ear, Nose and Throat Diseases, Operative Surgery, Senior Ward Classes, Surgical Dressing and Clinical Lectures.

VII.

The knowledge acquired by the Students during any Year's course of instruction shall be tested by written and practical examinations, called professional examinations which will be held in May while re-examinations for unsuccessful candidates will take place in October. These examinations will deal with the subjects taught during the preceding session or year and no student will be permitted to pass from one year's course of study to the next more advanced year until he has satisfied the examiners of the corresponding professional examination. The fee charged for each examination or re-examination will be P.T. 50.

If any student fails in both the May and the October examinations he will be required to pay L.E. 5. before being permitted to retake the courses of instruction required by the examiners.

All the subjects of an examination must be taken at one and the same time and a candidate failing to obtain 33% of the marks in any one subject or 40% of the total marks of the whole examination shall be rejected in the whole examination.

The Examination Lists shall be classified into Honours, for which a minimum of 50% of the total marks will be required, and Pass.

The Examiners shall be the Lecturers of the given year while the first three and the last two examinations shall be controlled by a Government Assessor for each group.

VIII.

Successful candidates in the 5th Professional Examination shall be awarded a diploma entitled "Licence in Medicine and Surgery of the Kitchener Memorial Medical School Khartoum" and shall be permitted to use the letters L.M.& S. Khartoum after their names.

As it is proposed that this licence shall conform with the

VIII.

regulations of the General Medical Council of Great Britain, it is suggested that an application shall subsequently be made to the Privy Council so that Part II of the Medical Act of 1886 shall be made applicable to the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan.

In the event of this application being granted all holders of the said licence will be entitled, after the payment of the necessary fees, to practice Medicine and Surgery in any of His Majesty's Dominions except where excluded by local law.

IX.

The Staff of the Medical School shall comprise Lecturers, Demonstrators, Clerks and Servants.

In addition to the estimated cost of the building (£40,000) it is calculated that the annual recurrent expenditure for the maintenance of the Medical School will be approximately £3000, and a further sum of £3000 would be required for the equipment of the School.

It is estimated, therefore, in round figures that a sum of £50,000 would be required if the building is unendowed, but thoroughly equipped: or £150,000 if fully equipped and endowed.

With reference to the buildings required for the proposed Medical School at Khartoum and new accommodation for the Wellcome Research Laboratories. I have prepared rough estimates based on the notes and descriptions given me yesterday by Dr. Chalmers. The buildings included are as follows: --Central Administrative Block comprising general offices and council room, laboratories, and other necessary accommodation for medical research work, and class rooms, etc., for medical students. Anatomical Block comprising dissecting room, lecture theatre, preparation room and lecturer's and demonstrator's rooms. Chemist's Block comprising offices, laboratories and other accommodation for research work, and laboratory and lecture rooms for students. Separate building with students' library and common room. Hosh containing animal houses. . 0 Latrines and other necessary outhouses. (1)

COPY.

The cost of the foregoing including equipment, is estimated at £E.40,000. This figure is necessarily a very rough estimate as in the time at my disposal it has not been possible to go into any detail. It should also be pointed out that the estimate is for plain, substantial building and is not intended to include elaborate architectural work. The rates on which it is based are pre-war prices as it is assumed that work would not be started in any case till a more reasonable level of prices is reached than those ruling at present.

The site suggested is the plot of ground lying between the Primary School and the Railway and bounded on the North and South by Khedive Avenue and Sirdar Avenue respectively. In the Town Plan this area is cut in two by a Street running East and West but it is believed that no objection would be raised to stopping this street at the East end of the Primary School as connection with Khedive and Sirdar Avenues could be so arranged that there would be no inconvenience to traffic either present or prospective.

Dear Mr. Harvey.

An announcement in Reuter's telegram, that the Prime Minister had proposed the erection of a statue to Lord Kitchener, induced me to telegraph to you to-day asking that the Gordon Memorial College Pund Committee should suspend any action they contemplated in regard to a Memorial until you received this letter.

It occurred to me that the idea of Memorials having been once started, all sorts of schemes would be likely to be propounded by those who had ideas on the subject, and as I have an idea which I am confident Lord Mitchener, had he been alive, would have warmly advocated, I venture to submit it for the consideration of the Committee with a view to its possible adoption as a Memorial to our late Chairman and the Pounder of the Institution.

In the course of many of Lord Eitchener's visits to the Sudan,

I often discussed with him the possibility of starting a Medical School for the

training of natives of this country in Medical Science and Surgery - I always found

him a warm advocate of the project, but hitherto ways and means of giving effect to

it have been financially impossible.

The necessity of some such Institution, which might be attached to the Gordon Memorial College, has been still further emphasised since the outbreak of the war, for our usual sources for obtaining Native Medical Officers for the Egyptian Army and Sudan Government Service have become closed to us. Hitherto the Medical College at Beyrouth has supplied most of our wants. The Medical School at Masr el Aini, Cairo, has never been able to help us much, as the demand in Egypt

for Medical Officers is continually increasing and the stoppage of the supply from Syria practically excludes us from getting even one. It is more than probable that the many changes that will be effected in Syria when the war is over will render the Beyrouth College even less accessible for our needs than in pre-war days. We are therefore faced with the necessity of finding some new source of supply.

For many obvious reasons, with which any members of the Committee who are acquainted with Egypt and the Sudan will I am sure agree, it is undesirable to turn to India to supply our needs in this direction. We are therefore forced back on to cur own resources and there seems every reason to believe that the native of this country has all the ability and intelligence to adapt himself to the Medical Profession. I repeat that Lord Eitchener fully agreed with me in this view, and now that he is no more and that some form of Memorial is most desirable for one who has done such magnificent service for his King and Country in many parts of the world, but in the Sudan in particular, and whose interests and affections were largely centred in the Capital from which he takes his title, I think the Committee will agree with me that it would be specially suitable and desirable to attempt to put into effect a project which he warmly advocated in his lifetime, and which is in such complete consonance with the views which prompted him in the first instance to establish the Gordon Memorial College in Ehartoum and to further develop the Educational and Professional training of the youth of this country.

You are aware that several rooms of the present Building are allotted for the service of the Wellcome Research Laboratories, and the great benefits that have accrued to the country from the liberality of Mr. Wellcome in the establishment of these is too well known to need recapitulation here, but on the other hand, the need for increased space in the College Building itself becomes more pronounced every year.

especially now that boarders are admitted. It is therefore very desirable that the Laboratories should be transferred from their present locality and the rooms they occupy returned to the Educational Authorities, but no building exists which could accommodate them and it is for this reason that I would suggest that the Memorial to Lord Kitchener should take the form of a building sufficiently large to contain the Research Laboratories as well as the new Medical School which it is proposed to found and to endow as a Kitchener Memorial in Khartoum.

With this object in view I have called on the Principal Medical Officer of the Egyptian Army, Colonel F. Carroll, R.A.M.C., in collaboration with Doctor A.J. Chalmers, Director of the Research Laboratories, to draw out a project for a suitable building and for the establishment of a Medical School to be staffed principally by the present staff of the Laboratories, the Egyptian Army and the Sudan Government Medical Departments. I venture to enclose the Joint Memorandum of Colonel Carroll and Doctor Chalmers, together with the estimated cost of the building and the annual cost of maintenance of the Medical School. The figure will probably be considered somewhat large, but it must be remembered that the cost of building in Khartoum is very high. In addition to the actual sum required for bricks and mortar, it would of course be very desirable to raise a Fund the interest on which would be sufficient to cover the annual cost of the Medical School In all a sum of say £150.000 would be required, and I am inclined to think that if a well-worded appeal were made to the British Public, and indeed the whole Empire. this sum would be forthcoming in spite of war economies and the general financial depression. However, the Committee will be in a far better position than I am to judge of this and I merely throw out the project in this crude form, and I write hurriedly as I think there is no time to be lost, in the hope that those of the

Committee whom you may consult will consider it of sufficient importance to convene a meeting for the discussion of this project.

LORD KITCHENER SUDAN MEMORIAL.

Lord Kitchener's services in the present war have been so much greater and wider in their appeal than any which even he had previously rendered, that the National Memorial Committee rightly determined to dedicate all funds they collected exclusively to the use of those disabled in this war.

But it is equally right that Lord Kitchener's earlier achievements in Egypt, India and the Sudan should be commemorated in local ways by those who owe to these episodes in his career their most precious possessions or memories.

It has been decided, accordingly, to found in Khartoum a special Sudan Memorial to Lord Kitchener, as the Sudan was the theatre of Lord Kitchener's first great successes and Khartoum will be for ever linked with his name.

The proposed Memorial will take the form of a School of Medicine, a project which was very close to Lord Kitchener's heart and frequently advocated by him in conversation.

The School will be, as he wished, directly affiliated to the Wellcome Tropical Research Laboratories: it will be, in consequence, an integral part of the Gordon Memorial College Foundation, and, all moneys now collected will be spent upon building and equipment.

As the immediate successor of Lord Kitchener both as Governor-General of the Sudan and Sirdar of the Egyptian Army, I confidently appeal to past and present members of the Sudan Government and the Egyptian Army, to the people of the Sudan, and to all others interested in the work initiated here by Lord Kitchener, for funds sufficient to provide a building appropriate to our requirements and worthy of the name it will commemorate.

Dear Mr. Crowfoot.

I enclose you a list of the subscribers to the Lord Kitchener Sudan Memorial up to date. Both Mr. Baldwin Harvey and myself feel disappointed that the amount received is not larger, but under existing circumstances when the National Memorial to Lord Kitchener has monopolised the attention of the public at home and is still doing so, it is what we anticipated.

The lamented death of Lord Cromer has deprived us of a valuable ally, and I had arranged to confer with him shortly with the view of making some further effort, when his fatal illness supervened. I am now about to make another appeal in all the leading newspapers in London and the country publishing the list of subscribers up to date, and calling attention to the late Lord Cromer's great interest in the scheme, in the hope that further subscriptions will be forthcoming. Mr. Harvey agrees that this is the only thing we can do at present.
