THE TROCADERO GIANTESS.

WHEN the Trocadero clock is pointing to the hour of ten the Trocadero stage is occupied by Colonel Ulpts, of the Illinois Irregulars, or some other regiment equally well-known to fiction. The colonel does not give one at first sight the impression of a hero who has smelt powder face to face upon the field of carnage. He is only about three feet high, and his voice is like the voice of the corncrake in the reeds by the river. But he is a sprightly young gentleman, who sings a comic song as well as ever he can, and dances with more agility than the generality of colonels—with whom girth is too often a hindrance to saltatory exercise.
