INTRODUCTION.

THERE are scarcely any Diseases, incident to the human frame, to which the Poor of this Metropolis, from a variety of circumstances, are more subject than those which affect the Eye ; nor are there any whose consequences are more painful and distressing. This general consideration, added to the peculiar sufferings of the Soldiers and Sailors since the Egyptian Expedition, induced Mr. WATHEN PHIPPS to lay before their Majesties, the proposition of establishing an Infirmary, exclusively for the reception of persons afflicted with Diseases of the Eye ; where every advantage resulting from operations, proper treatment, attention, and diet, might be obtained. He had for many years received indiscriminately all poor persons labouring under Diseases of the Eye, on certain days and hours, and administered to them gratuitously both advice and external applications. But as the number of these

had for fourteen years amounted annually to 1000, 1500, and even to 2000, the small relief afforded by a single individual was totally inadequate to their wants; since in a variety of cases and operations they required the aid of an Hospital, where they might receive advantages, it was impossible to give them at their own habitations. These facts having been represented to their Majesties, they most humanely and graciously condescended, not only to approve the plan, but also to become the Patrons of it, and Benefactors to it. His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, and the other branches of the Royal Family, were also pleased to receive it under their protection. With this sanction, the promoters of this Institution appealed to a generous Public to second these endeavours; and enable them to establish such a foundation as would secure to the afflicted every comfort and advantage their situations might demand, by admitting those into the House whose cases require peculiar attention, or who may be the subjects of the operation for the cataract; and by extending more widely and effectually the help of advice and medicine to those whom it would

not be necessary to take into the Infirmary. The liberal contributions already received have enabled the promoters of this Institution to open the Infirmary; and they trust, that the continuance and increase of the Subscriptions will permit them by degrees to admit a larger number of persons into the House. For this purpose they still earnestly solicit the benevolence of the Public.

REGULATIONS.

THE affairs of this Charity, under the Patronage of their Majesties and the Royal Family, are conducted by the President, Vice Presidents, Treasurer, Surgeon, and a Committee of 24 Gentlemen, which is open to any Governor who may wish to attend. Of these, five Gentlemen are annually appointed as a Committee of Accounts.

The Committee meet at the Royal Infirmary the first Tuesday after every Quarter Day, at 11 o'Clock in the Forenoon, for the transaction of Business, and for this, three Persons are sufficient.

A General Meeting is called by Advertisement, annually on the 26th of March, and to which, all the Accounts and Transactions of the Charity are submitted.

The Treasurer presents his Accounts quarterly to the Committee, and pays all Monies received by him into the hands of the Banker; and all Drafts signed by him, are

also to be signed by the Chairman, and countersigned by the Secretary.

The Secretary attends all Meetings of the Committee, and all General Meetings, keeps all the Minutes and Papers, receives such Subscriptions as may be paid at the Infirmary, and transfers the same into the hands of the Treasurer.

No annual Subscriber is allowed to vote at any General Meeting, until a second Subscription shall have been duly paid.

No persons are deemed proper objects of this Charity, but Soldiers, Sailors, and such as are really necessitous.

All poor Persons applying for relief at this Charity, as Out-Patients, are placed upon the List of a Subscriber, taking their names in rotation; but these do not interfere with the Subscribers' privilege of sending the number of Patients to which their Subscriptions entitle them.

The present Finances of the Charity circumscribing the number admitted into the House, the In-Presentations are reserved for such Cases only as may require operation, and are to be obtained from the Committee on the Surgeon certifying that the Object is proper for admission.

A Sub-Committee for these Presentations attends at the Infirmary every Tuesday, at 10 o'Clock, one Member of which is sufficient to transact Business.

The Terms of Subscription are, a Life Governor, Twenty Guineas, or upwards; an Annual Governor, Two Guineas, or upwards. These have the privilege of keeping three Out-Patients constantly on the books.

These Subscriptions become due annually on the 26th of March, and will be called for by the Collector.
