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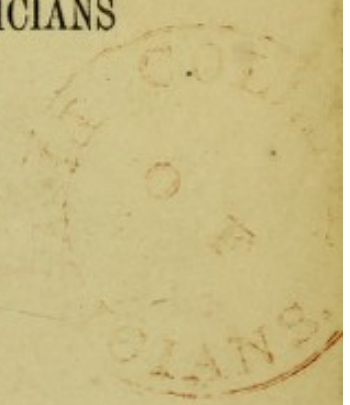

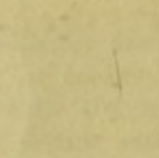

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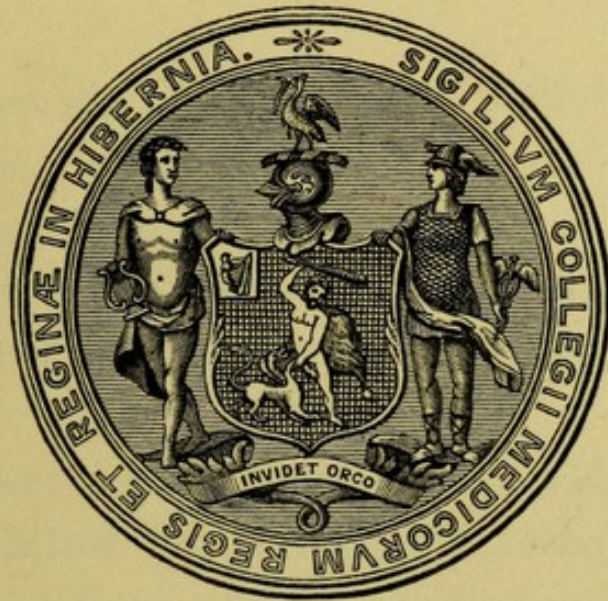

CHAPTER I.

OF THE COLLEGE SEAL, AND THE PRESIDENT'S SEAL.

1.

THE Seal whereof the above is an engraving, is ^{The} the Seal of this College; and shall be affixed to ^{College} Seal. all Testimonials, Licenses, Certificates, and other public acts of the College.

2.

The President shall have a Seal bearing the ^{The} Armorial Ensigns of the College, surrounded by ^{President's} Seal. this legend "SIGILLUM PRÆSIDIS COLLEGI MEDICORUM REGIS ET REGINÆ IN HIBERNIA," to be affixed to all presidential acts.

CHAPTER II.

OF THE NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF FELLOWS,
HONORARY FELLOWS, AND OFFICERS OF THE COLLEGE.

3.

Mode of
Election.

ALL Elections shall be by Ballot. A majority of votes shall determine the question. The President, or in his absence the Vice-President, shall have a casting vote.

4.

Fellows of

No Fellow of any College of Surgeons, shall be admissible to the Fellowship of this College.

5.

tiates of
three years
standing.

No person shall be proposed as a Fellow of this College, until he shall have been a Licentiate thereof for three years, to be computed from the day on which he shall have subscribed his name as a Licentiate.

6.

Every person admitted to the Fellowship shall pay to the College a Fee of Twenty Pounds, in addition to the Stamp Duty.

Fee for the Fellowship.

7.

No person shall be proposed as a Fellow of this College, unless the Treasurer's receipt for the fee to the College, and for the stamp duty on his admission be produced.

Treasurers Receipt to be produced.

8.

Every Candidate for admission to a Fellowship or Honorary Fellowship, shall be proposed and seconded, at one stated meeting, and the ballot for him shall take place, at the next stated meeting, unless the Candidate be withdrawn.

Fellowship Candidates to be proposed and seconded.

9.

The College shall not proceed to ballot for any Candidate proposed as a Fellow, until he have signed a declaration to the effect that he shall neither continue to be, nor become a Fellow of any College of Surgeons, so long as he shall be a Fellow of this College.

No Candidate for admission to the Fellowship or Honorary Fellowship, who has been rejected by the College, shall be again proposed, until after the expiration of twelve months from the day of his rejection.

Election of
Officers.

The President, Censors, Treasurer, Registrar, Librarian, and Inspectors of Apothecaries' Shops,

shall be nominated and elected by ballot annually on St. Luke's Day.

13.

The Professor of Midwifery, and the Professor of Medical Jurisprudence shall be nominated and elected by ballot annually on St. Luke's Day.

14.

The office of Librarian shall not be held by any Professor of the School of Physic, nor by any Professor elected by this College.

15.

The person elected to the office of Agent to the estates of Sir Patrick Dun, shall, before the estate is committed to his charge, give such security as shall be directed by the legal adviser of the College.

16.

No Person, who is or has been a Fellow, Honorary Fellow, or Licentiate of this College shall be eligible to the office of Land Agent to the Estates of Sir Patrick Dun.

The President and Fellows of the College, may accept of the resignation of any Fellow.

CHAPTER III.

OF THE DUTIES OF THE PRESIDENT, AND OTHER
OFFICERS OF THE COLLEGE.

19.

THE President having taken the oaths according to the prescribed form, shall, as soon as possible after his Election, nominate and appoint under his hand and official seal, one of the Censors to the office of Vice-President. The President, or in his absence the Vice-President, shall then, and upon all subsequent occasions, preside over the meetings of the College; and shall, whenever he may think fit to do so, issue summonses to the Fellows, calling upon them to assemble in the Hall of the College for the despatch of Business.

The President shall give three clear days' notice of every Meeting of the College, unless in cases of emergency, when it shall be left to his discretion, what length of notice shall be given.

The President shall not promise, nor appoint a day for Examination, until he shall have notified the application of the Candidate, at a Meeting of the College; but he shall not summon the College for the examination of a Candidate for the License, until he has received the Treasurer's Certificate that the amount of Admission Fee and Stamp Duty has been lodged in his hands, and he shall be bound to give three clear days' notice in every case where a Candidate is to be examined.

The President shall be at liberty to examine Candidates for the License, in the Greek or Latin Medical Authors, or on any subject connected with Medical science, he may think fit.

23.

At the annual Election of Officers, the President shall select the subjects upon which each Censor shall examine.

24.

Treasurers
Security.

The Treasurer to the private Funds of the

College shall, before the funds are committed to his charge, pass a bonded security of five hundred pounds sterling for a faithful account and discharge of all money and securities entrusted to his care.

25.

The Treasurer shall, on the Monday preceding each St. Luke's Day, submit all his books and vouchers to the standing Committee of Accounts and Audit, previous to their being submitted to the College at the Annual Meeting.

The Registrar shall keep all the books of the College; shall cause to be fairly transcribed into the journals the proceedings of each Meeting; shall summon and attend the Meetings of the various Committees of the College, and give due notice to the Licentiates whenever the Examination of a Candidate is to be held; and shall conduct the correspondence of the College.

The Registrar, at the commencement of his office every year, shall inspect the minutes of the

preceding year, and lay before the College, at the next meeting succeeding his appointment, an account of all outstanding business; and upon every election of a President, shall cause to be fairly transcribed into the College copy of the By-Laws, all those By-Laws which had been passed since the election of the late President.

Every Fellow, Honorary Fellow, or Licentiate, upon his admission, or at some subsequent time, shall have a Copy of the By-Laws, upon application to the President.

CHAPTER IV.

OF THE MEETINGS OF THE COLLEGE.

29.

THERE shall be five stated Meetings of the President and Fellows of the College, every year, viz., one on St. Luke's Day, and one on the Monday before the first day of each Law Term; and as many other Meetings as the President may consider necessary for the despatch of business. When St. Luke's Day happens to fall on a Sunday, the Annual stated Meeting shall take place on the day next following.

On every occasion of the Examination of a Candidate, and at all the stated Meetings, the Members present shall wear such Habits as the College may direct.

The order of business at all Meetings shall be, first, to have the minutes of the last meeting read and signed; secondly, to consider the matter for

No motion shall be discussed at any Meeting unless notice thereof has been given in writing to the President at a previous Meeting, within two hours after the period for the assembling of the College, and the same have been circulated among the Fellows of the College; nevertheless it shall be competent for them, if unanimous, to consider and vote upon any question, without notice.

Every Application for Admission to Examination shall be received and read at one Meeting of the College, and at the next Meeting shall be taken into consideration.

When any Fellow of the College, is speaking to any matter then under consideration, it shall not be lawful for any person, except the President, (or,

in his absence, the Vice-President,) to interrupt or stop him, unless on a point of order, until he shall have finished what he had to say on such subject. And when any question is put to the vote, the junior Fellow of the College shall be required to give his vote first, and after him, the next immediate senior, concluding with the President.

No motion shall become a By-Law until it shall have passed at three consecutive Meetings, to the end that none may pretend surprisal in any act of the College: and the same course shall be observed in the repeal of any By-Law.

CHAPTER V.

OF THE FUNDS OF THE COLLEGE.

THE surplus funds of the College, shall be vested in Government or Bank of Ireland Stock.

37.

Votes of
money.

All motions which respect the disposal of any sum of money exceeding Ten Guineas, belonging to the College of Physicians, or for the disposal of which they are Trustees, shall be subjected to the same forms as motions for making or amending By-Laws, before the sum so proposed to be granted shall be disbursed, except in cases where the payment of money is directed by Act of Parliament, or has become obligatory in consequence of money expended for, or service yielded to the College.

The President and Censors shall form a Standing Committee for auditing and examining the Accounts of the College ; any three of said Com-

mittee to form a quorum. The Registrar shall give at least two clear days' notice of any Meeting to be summoned. of this Committee.

The Standing Committee of Accounts shall Meetings of the Committee of Accounts, &c. meet annually for the purpose of auditing and examining the Treasurer's Accounts on the Monday next before St. Luke's Day, and make their Report at the next Meeting of the College.

CHAPTER VI.

OF THE QUALIFICATIONS, EXAMINATION, AND ADMIS-
SION OF CANDIDATES FOR THE LICENSE OF THE
COLLEGE.

No Member or Licentiate of any Company of Apothecaries, shall be admissible to the License of the College; and should any such, after due examination, be approved of, he shall not be admitted as a Licentiate until he shall have surrendered his License as an Apothecary, and produced satisfactory evidence of his name having been removed from the List of the Company.

No person engaged in any kind of trade, shall be admitted to Examination for the License.

Every Candidate for the License of the College, except those who have entered as Students in Arts, shall be required to produce a Certificate of Matriculation in the University of Dublin, conformably to the Statute, 40 Geo. III., c. 84, s. 34.

Candidates must produce evidence of having been engaged in the study of Medicine for four years at least, and of having attended not less than two of the required Courses in each year.

Candidates must produce evidence of having completed the following Course of Education, viz. : of having attended one or more courses of lectures on Anatomy and Physiology, Chemistry, Institutes of Medicine, Materia Medica and Pharmacy, Midwifery and Diseases of Women and Children, Practice of Medicine, and on Surgery—each course to be of six months' duration ; on Botany and on Medical Jurisprudence for at least three months each ; of having performed a course of Dissections and attended the accompanying Demonstrations during six months, and of having attended a course of Practical Chemistry for at least three months.

All the Lectures are required to have been delivered by the respective Professors of the School of Physic in Ireland, or by other Lecturers recognised by the College.

Candidates must produce Certificates of Attendance for Two Years and Six Months on the Practice of a recognised Hospital, and the Clinical Lectures delivered therein during that period ; also for Six Months on the Practice of a Lying-in Hospital recognised by the College.

Candidates who, on having performed the full Acts, have Graduated in Medicine in one of the Universities of Great Britain or Ireland, or who have been admitted as Licentiates of either of the Royal Colleges of Physicians of London or Edinburgh shall be admissible to Examination on such qualification.

Candidates who have been Licentiates of a College of Surgeons in the United Kingdom for Four Years, or upwards, or who, in addition to their Diploma, as such shall produce Certificates of Attendance on a Course of Lectures on Botany and the Institutes of Medicine, and on the Practice of a recognised Lying-in Hospital for six months, shall be admissible to Examination on such qualifications.

The Examination of Candidates for the License of the College to practice Medicine shall be conducted on two separate days;—the subjects of Examination for the first day shall be Anatomy and Physiology, Botany, Chemistry, and Materia Medica; for the second day, Acute Diseases, Chronic Diseases, the Institutes of Medicine, and Midwifery.

Candidates who are Graduates in Medicine of one of the Universities in Great Britain or Ireland, Licentiates of either of the Royal Colleges of Physicians, London or Edinburgh, or Members of

a Royal College of Surgeons in the United Kingdom, being Graduates in Arts of the Universities of Dublin, Oxford, or Cambridge, shall be required to undergo the second day's Examination alone,— Botany and Materia Medica in the case of Members of a College of Surgeons being added thereto.

The Examinations shall be conducted in the English language; but every Candidate, except Graduates in Arts of Dublin, Oxford, or Cambridge, may be required, at the option of the President, to translate from a Latin or Greek Medical author, before being Examined as to his professional acquirements.

Every Candidate shall, previously to Examination, sign the following Declaration:—

I, A. B., hereby authorise the President and Fellows of the King and Queen's College of Physicians in Ireland, to erase my name from the list of Licentiates, and I consent to surrender my License, and to have my privileges as a Licentiate withdrawn, if I shall, after having obtained the License from said College, either continue to be or

become a Licentiate of any Company of Apothecaries; or if I shall at any time hold or have any interest in an Apothecary's shop, or engage in any trade in any part of the United Kingdom.

Rejected

When the College shall not be satisfied with the answering of any Candidate, it shall be in their power, if they think fit, to repeat the examination of either day, at an interval of not less than two months; and should he ultimately be rejected, the Fees to the College, and the amount of Stamp Duty lodged with the Treasurer, shall both be returned.

Every person who shall be admitted as a Licentiate of this College, shall upon such admission, and before he receives his License, subscribe and promise the due fulfilment of the following Declaration, viz.:—

I, A. B., do hereby solemnly and sincerely promise that I will observe the statutes and by-laws of this College, and to my power endeavour that the honor of the College be preserved entire; and in all things that belong to the honor or profit thereof, I shall be ready to give my advice and assistance.

I engage not to practice any system or method, (so called), for the cure or alleviation of disease of which the College has disapproved; nor to endeavour to obtain practice or to attract public notice by advertising, or by any other unworthy means: I also engage that I will neither permit nor sanction the use of my name by any other party for such purposes, nor in connexion with any secret or other remedy; and in case of any doubt relative to the true meaning or application of this engagement, I promise to submit to the judgment of the College.

I promise that in all things lawful and honest, I will be obedient to the President, Vice-President, and Censors of the College.

And I solemnly and sincerely declare, that should I violate any of the conditions enumerated in this Declaration, so long as I shall be either a Licentiate or Fellow of the College, I thereby render myself liable, and shall submit to any reasonable punishment, whether censure of the College, pecuniary fine (not exceeding twenty pounds), or expulsion and surrendering of the License, whichever the President and Fellows of the College, or the majority of them, shall think proper to inflict.

Every Member of this College who shall desire to obtain the License to Practise Midwifery shall produce a Certificate of Attendance for Six Months on the Practice of a recognized Lying-in Hospital, when the College shall proceed to examine him as to his knowledge of Midwifery, and if approved of, they shall grant him a Special License as a Practitioner in Midwifery, and shall

cause him to be designated as such in the authorised Lists of the College.

All Licentiates of this College shall have permission to attend the Meetings during the Examinations for License. Licentiates may attend Examinations.

CHAPTER VII.

OF THE PROFESSIONAL CONDUCT OF MEMBERS OF
THE COLLEGE.

49.

Preceden-
cy of the
President. AT all Meetings of Physicians of the College,
where the President is present, precedence and all
marks of honor shall be paid to him.

50.

Of Con-
sultations. To preserve a good understanding among the
Members of the College, every Member shall con-
sult with every other Member who is not under
the censure of the College; and whosoever shall at
any time refuse so to do, shall be liable to the
censure of the College.

51.

Members
may be
censured. Any Member of this College who is guilty of
unprofessional conduct, either by advertising or
other practices unbecoming the honorable profes-
sion of Physic, shall be placed under the censure
of the College.

52.

No Member of this College shall consult with, or otherwise sanction any other Member who is under censure; nor consult with, or sanction professionally, any person who by advertisement, or other unworthy means, endeavours to obtain practice, or to attract public notice.

No Member under censure to be consulted with.

53.

No Member of the College shall consult with any person who, for the cure or alleviation of disease, uses any secret remedy, or adopts and practises any system or method of which the College has disapproved.

Members not to consult with quacks.

The Member of the House of Representatives
in either session and other Member who is
under arrest, the court shall be satisfied
that the same is for the benefit of the
public and that the same is for the
benefit of the public.

The Member of the House of Representatives
and other Member who are in the
possession of the same shall be
deemed to be in the possession of the
same and shall be liable for the same
as if they were in the possession of the
same.
