**"Electric Woman"
Sent to Rome**

**STUDY OF LUMINOUS
EMANATION**

From Our Own Correspondent

ROME, April 20.

Signora Monera, the "electric woman," has been brought from Trieste to Rome in order that the phenomenon of the luminous glow which emanates from her body may be studied under the highest scientific auspices. She was brought by car under most secret conditions, and was accompanied by her husband, who is finally reconciled to the medical importance and consequent public interest in the case.

The patient is housed in the neuropsychiatric ward of a Rome hospital, and has been placed in the charge of Professor de Sanctis, the famous authority on nervous and mental disorders. Special apparatus has been assembled to record and study any repetition of the light phenomenon already described in previous messages.

What is described as a "journalist-proof" cordon has been organised round her room. Not only the Press, but all the doctors and nurses of the hospital not specifically engaged on the case are prohibited from approaching the ward in which the electric woman is lying.
