## THE FEMALE PRISON BREAKER.

AT the Westminster Police-court, Alice Rogier, the young Belgian woman, who was charged with stealing marked money and jewellery from Miss Helen Clarke, of Lowndes street, in whose service she was as lady's mais, was brought up on remand to answer further charge of escaping from the female prisoners waiting room at the court on the 14th November. Denis Hegan, thirty, butler, of Summersham, Maidenhead, was charged with aiding and abetting her escape. Abraham Lapper, a constable of the Berks Constabulary, said shortly before eleven on the night of Saturday, the 14th ult., he saw the prisoners in the carriage drive of Summersham House, Ray Park. Subsequently Hegan was apprehended in the house, when he said Rogier had gone in the direction of Maidenhead. Superintendent Dorrell said in consequence of a telegram he went on the night in question to Ray Park and saw Hegan, who was asked where the prisoner was who had escaped from London. He answered, "She is not here; she has gone back to Maidenhead. I left her at the gate, and she must have gone down the road," Witness searched, and found Rogier concented in some shrub-bery near Hegan's badroom. Both the prisoners were then taken into custody, and conveyed to London. Mr. Sheil said the man did not actually assist Rogler to escape. Of course he might be charged with harbouring her after she had committed fetony, but there was really no evidence that he knew she had done so. He thought it was a case of a weak minded man and a strong-minded woman, and he should not and the man for trial. A woman named Louiss Carney explained that she lived at the back of 19, Lower Brearley-street, and early on Sunday morning she was aroused from her sleep by her infant crying. To her unutterable surprise she found that a strange man was one side of her, while her husband occupied the other. The latter promptly awakened the intruder, and a somewhat desperate encounter ensued between the two men, during which the woman says she was injured. The stranger is said to be William Scott, who once lived in the neighbourhood, and the explanation is that he sought a night's shelter at Carney's house.
