BUSHMEN CHILDREN. Two Bushmen (Boshies men) Children have lately been brought from the interior of Africa, and are now exhibiting some feats at the Egyptian Hall, in Piccadily. They are a girl and a boy, not related to each other: the fe-male is thirty-two inches high, and eight years old; and the male only forty-four inches in height, though nearly full grown, and sixteen years of age. They wear the dress of their tribe (Hottentots); they throw a spear, dance, &c.; the Bushman, as a Corporal of the Army, goes through the Manual and Platoon Exercises; and the Bush girl appears as a Soldier's Wife; and their several feats are very amusing. Their parents are stated to have been murdered by Kaffirs, who pursue and exterminate the Bushman Tribe with unrelenting ferocity: they were rescued by a Dutch Trader, and taken to Cape Town, whence they have been brought to this country. We hope they may here receive many visitors: the season, it is true, is some-what unpropitious for *sights*; to the Ethnographers, in a scientific point of view, these specimens of a "pigmy race" may be especially interesting.
