

These singular people being different from all other North American Indians, demand the particular attention of the Public, in consequence of the great National Interest which has been manifested in fitting out the late Expedition for Northern Discoveries, and from their being a race of beings until very lately unknown to Europe-the above are the only two ever brought to this Country, and are universally acknowledged to be objects of great public curiosity.—The following short description may not be uninteresting. They take their food in a raw state; their countenances pleasant; their hair is a jet black, nearly as strong as horse hair, the country they inhabit is a desolate and frozen part of the world, where there is no vegetation; as strong as norse hair, the country taey inhabit is a desolate and frozen part of the world, where there is no vegetation; their food consists of Rein-deer, Fox, Wolf, Otter, Beaver, Porcupine, Seal, Salmon, and Salmon Trout, which they prefer eating in its raw state; they have no place of abode, but rove from place to place; they keep a quantity of large and fierce Dogs, as beasts of draught, to draw their Sledges from one place to another; in the winter season they dwell back in the interior of the country; in the summer they come to the sea coast, in search of Cod Fish, Seal, Salmon, and Salmon Treat. They will perform A DANCE peculiar to their own Country, it being the only Wedding Ceremony they make use of.—Also the Male will throw his Dart, in the manner in which he kills Game, in the presence of the Company; and the Captain who brought them to England, will relate many interesting particulars of their manners, and a description of their Country.
